
COME ALONG AND ENJOY THE MINI MAGIC PARADE

Under 11 team mates Michael Doherty and Patrick Roarty's were the first Celtic players to get a taste of the brand new artificial surface on their floodlit training area when Mark Coyne of Coynes Tyre Sales on the Ross Road presented the squad with two brand new sets of jerseys. "I just think the club does great work in the community," Mark told the Killarney Outlook. "And I'd like to try and help out in a small way where I can." It's not a small way, as Michael and Patrick or any of their young and enthusiastic players can attest!"

The training area has now been completely resurfaced with fine gravel overlaid with the highest grade of artificial grass available to the UEFA. Mary Lyne has been involved with the project right from its inception. "The old training area has served us brilliantly for twelve years," she explains, "But it was becoming very worn in places and honestly we didn't feel that it was properly safe anymore. It had simply run

its course. We spoke to Nick Ferrell and Sean Kelly of Sportsgrounds Development and they couldn't have been more helpful all through."

"It's a big investment for any volunteer club – the whole project cost E77,000 in total, but we have always been lucky in the great local support from people and businesses around Killarney, people like Mark, and they came through for us again. We also got simply fantastic help from Suzanne Gallagher of Clann Credo, a business-supported charitable organisation that helps local charities and community organisations to develop social investment. They gave us a low interest five year loan that made all the difference, and the FAI have given us great help and grant support that made this project affordable."

The club's U7s and U8s will be the first groups to have training sessions on the brand new ground this Saturday, and people in general will get their first look at it at our senior team's

FAI Junior Cup match against Mervue United of Galway. It's a huge game for the club, a chance to get into the top 32 teams in the country, so we are hoping to have big support on the night."

KILLARNEY PRIEST PUBLISHES 1916 STORY

A KILLARNEY priest and historian has penned an informative new book charting the remarkable story of Irish volunteers from Killarney whose Company was one of the very first in Ireland and grew from An Seabhac's Gaelic League Class of November 1913.

Fr Tom Looney's study tracks the progress of those founders and the 53 men armed and mobilised on Easter Sunday 1916.

Following the Rising 1,863 volunteers were imprisoned in the Frongoch Camp in Wales, including five Killarney men. Fr Tom's work features a total of 21 photographs and Frongoch autographs which help show their story.


The publication, Óglaigh Chill Airne 1913-1916, is part of the Echoes of Easter Irish language series. It is published in Irish by Coiscéim and it costs €7.50.





DONAL LAUNCHES HIS 17TH SLIABH LUACHRA JOURNAL



highland country straddling counties Kerry, Cork and Limerick was once an "asylum" for outlaws and a risen peasantry, according to the latest issue of the biennial Sliabh Luachra Journal. of Manv the principal roads that run through

the area today were not built until the 1820's and '30's by the British authorities who wanted to gain more control of the territory.

"The wild hilly country on the borders of the three counties was outlaw territory," writes Martin Murphy in an article on Whiteboys and Ribbonmen, relating the activities of secret societies against landlordism.

This vast region of around 1,000 square miles did not have proper roads, a British Government report noted in 1822. Engineer Richard Griffiths was commissioned to design and improve roads and he also built stone-arched bridges still in use today.

Griffiths described Sliabh Luachra as an asylum for Whiteboys and robbers whose "wickedness had frequently escaped punishment."

The 17th issue of the local history journal, published by Cumann Luachra, was launched by Fr Pat Moore, in Gneeveguilla, last Friday night.

"It's very hard to really define Sliabh Luachra which has probably been best described as a state of a mind," said Fr Moore who formerly served as a curate in the Rathmore and Kilcummin parishes.

"But one thing is certain - the people of the area have their own identity, wit and cultural richness. I learnt a lot from them when I was among them and loved my time in there."

The story of the 1916 Easter Rising, in which volunteer Patrick O'Connor, from Rathmore, was killed, features prominently in the 120page journal which also has a wide range of other articles and lots of old photographs.

As might be expected from Sliabh Luachra, a

deal of space is given to traditional Irish music. Popular accordionist John Brosnan, who lives in Milleen, Kilcummin, tells of his life and times. He also recalls memories of the legendary fiddle master Padraig O'Keeffe and how he visited the Lyrecrompane area where John grew up.

There's also an article on ceili bands in Sliabh Luachra by journal editor Donal Hickey who, for instance, traces the history of the Brosna Ceili Band from its origins in the late 1950's to the present day.

A trip to Killarney Fair as a boy with his father in the 1940's is recalled by John Kelly. He had a day off from school to drive in cattle they sold at the fair.

While the main business was the buying and selling of horses, cattle, sheep and pigs, fairs also brought in some colourful characters, vendors of clothes and footwear, tanglers, blockers and others who got involved in the haggling between farmers and buyers.

In those days, towns didn't have fancy restaurants, but they had "ating houses" where hungry farmers and their sons could get good feeds of bacon and cabbage and plenty of plain, wholesome food.

Bohereencaol, in Killarney, had three such establishments, all of which did brisk business

on fair and market days.

The Kellys' favourite was Mrs Twomey's, a woman known for her generous portions. The journal is on sale for €12.





LET'S TALK TOURISM NATIONAL FORUM - NEWS BRIEFS

CEO WANTS SEASON EXTENDED

EFFORTS need to be made and initiatives must to be launched to extend the tourism season in Kerry beyond the traditional May to October busy period, Kerry County Council Chief Executive, Moira Murrell, told delegates at the AIB Let's Talk Tourism forum.

She said tourism contributed €120 million to the Kerry economy every year and it is a key economic driver but 75 per cent of business takes place over a six-month period.

"There is an onus on all of us to focus on quality and to strive for excellence. In Kerry even developing a car park or a lay-by must be carefully thought out. You can't just provide it," she said

KILLARNEY IS BEING 'CHOKED'

TRINITY College Professor of Finance, Brian Lucey, suggested at the Let's Talk Tourism forum that Killarney was becoming a problem for Kerry tourism in that the industry had become too big there and the town is being "choked".

He said there is a need to encourage people to stay longer in Kerry and to visit other places in the county, such as Sneem and Waterville, and other areas on the Ring of Kerry.

"We need to get sticky tourism so that they'll come and stay and visit other areas which will benefit," he said.

Professor Lucey said visitors need to be encouraged to travel to more rural locations, like The Glen and Ballinskelligs, and they should be advised to spend a day or two in places like Glencar

He said that while good access to the county was very important, care needed to be taken that the country is not stripped of its charm by building super roads.

THERE IS NO NEED FOR PANIC

FAILTE Ireland's Director of Business Development, Paul Keeley, said when the Brexit situation is being reviewed, there is no need for panic as it's worth noting that the average British tourism stays in Ireland for a shorter period and spends less than holidaymakers from other markets.

He said it is important to focus on markets that can be controlled in a better way and the important thing for Ireland is to concentrate on providing good value for money and quality service

"We've already come through 9/11, SARS, volcanic ash and a global economic crisis so there is need to panic. In terms of Britain, Brexit is just a speed bump," Mr Keeley told the AIB Let's Talk Tourism forum in the Muckross Park Hotel.

AIB's Head of the Hotel Business Unit and

Corporate Banking, Owen Travers, said Irish hotels need to be focused on their own business and that preparation and early planning were the important factors.

"The world changes. The UK visitor is a bit like the chickenpox – they are everywhere and they are very important to regional Ireland," Mr Travers stated.

SUPER TRAIN THE SOLUTION

THE provision of a super train travelling between the airports in Shannon and Dublin, with an estimated journey time of just 45 minutes, would be a sure-fire solution to the problems of access and regionality impacting on the industry, Kerry TD Michael Healy-Rae told delegates at the AIB Let's Talk Tourism forum.

He said it would open up the whole west of Ireland and it would provide a great boost for the entire western seaboard.

"It would be a shame and a scandal and a disgrace if one more euro was spent on improving Dublin Airport. We need to break this Red Cow barrier and this proposal makes perfect sense.

He said the new line could be provided immediately over the existing rail line between Limerick and Dublin and that would eliminate any need to acquire land or enforce compulsory purchase orders.

Deputy Healy-Rae also urged the government to sanction €2 million to safeguard the future of the Valentia Ferry.

"It's a no-brainer for Kerry. It we lose that ferry we would lose the whole ring from Valentia Island across to Portmagee," he said.

PEOPLE POWER IS ALL-IMPORTANT

WHEN visitors to Kerry and other parts of Ireland reflect on their holidays, it's the people they remember more than the food, the service or the scenery, Kerry Fine Gael TD, Brendan

Griffin, told the AIB Let's Talk Tourism forum. He said the interaction with friendly local people is the main attraction and the calibre of frontline staff in the Kerry hotel industry is second to none, just as it has been for the past 40 years or more.

POOR ACCESS A BIG PROBLEM

POOR regional access is the biggest single problem facing the Irish tourism industry, the President of the Irish Hotels Federation, Joe Dolan, told delegates.

Despite that, the country is "doing very well" and people were arriving in droves and "spending a lot of money," he said.

But he expressed concerns about what he described as the inequitable distribution of tourism, with 80 per cent of revenue generated in five counties, Dublin, Kerry, Cork, Clare and Galway.

"The more remote you are the more seasonal you tend to be," he said.

Mr Dolan said bad weather, seasonal closures and the unavailability of product in the off-season weren't helping the regions and the availability and cost of car hire was a major impediment.

DUBLIN NEEDS KILLARNEY

BUSINESS tourism is worthy three times the value of leisure tourism to Ireland, Conference Partners Managing Director, Nicola McGrane, reminded the forum in Killarney.

She said there is a real need for the industry to concentrate on conference and convention business.

Shelbourne Hotel General Manager, Stephen Hanley, told delegates that Dublin needs Killarney if it wants to attract more business.

"People coming to Shelbourne want to see the rest of the country too and that can help Killarney to develop for 12 months of the year instead of eight," he said.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Re - Cuain Fhionnain Ballydribeen Killarney

With reference to their recent inspection of the the Cluain Fionnain centre at Ballydribeen I wish to state that I feel it is rather disingenuous of HIQA to state that the staff have stymied progress on this movements of clients from residentail to community setting and am rather amazed on their lack of clarity on some aspects of same. Having spent 45 years of my working life in the psychiatric services in Kerry and 30 of those years in the area of community psychiatry I feel that I am also guite qualified to make my oiwn observations on this issue.

Firstly HIQA must take cognisance of the fact that the St John Deane designed St Finans Hospital opened it's doors in 1852 and when I entered the service in 1955 it had a patient population of 1200, and conditions were primitive for both patients and staff. This was very much an institutional setting and patients were very much confined to the hospital wards and those included people with Intellectual disabilities.

Over the subsequent 50 years both the medical nursing and other staff disciplines worked tirelessly to improve matters with an aspiration that this institution would be replaced by a community care model which has been acomplished.

To support this view point I will now include some extracts from the recently published history of St Finans Hospital entitled "A Medical Sporting and Social History of St Finans"copies of which are still available.

"October 1998 the Chief Psychiatrist Dr Brendan Lynch confirmed the closure of St Finans Hospital which was an integral plan of the SHB seven year plan, A number of wards have been closed and and it is planed to transfer patients from the hospital to high support hostels on a phased basis,"

In 1995 the staff Union Rep Donie Doody stated that the one million from the sale of land at Gortroe should be used to to develop psychiatric services in Kerry. Mr Doody also called for the development of services for intellectual disabilities, intensive care units and a sector mental health centre in Killarney, and in 1995 the building of this 1-2 million unit for people with intellectual disabilities was announced.

This project to include six residentail units for five people each to be transferred from St Finans to what is now Cluain Fionnain at Ballydribeen, The total cost of this project was £900,000 for the residential unit and £300,000 for the day centre

In 1996 Donie Doody on behalf of the staff called on Killarney Town Council to provide appropriate support services for the 260 patients who would be leaving St Finans Hospital when the hospital finally closed it's doors and he recommended the setting up of a high support hostel, a shelted workshop and an activation centre, an assessment unit headed by a consultant psychiatrist and a unit to care for psycho geriatric patients.

As far back as 1993 the staff through their union rep Donie Doody was calling on the then Minister for Health Brendan Howlin to establish a review group to address to growing problem of suicide in the county and this was made in light of the many young people taking their own lives.

When then Psychiatric Nurses Association (PNA) was established their Union reps continued to lobby for improved conditions for both those suffering from psychiatric disorders and intellectual disabilities and it is through such lobbying that many of those improvements have been achieved and nowadays psychiatric nurses are recruited from the local Colleges and Universities who train them to a high standard.

I also wish to emphasise that the transition from the hospital to community settings was very much on a phased basis with close monitoring of the suitability of each client for their transfer to a community setting and such monitoring was very much part of the duties of the medical and nursing staff and even nowadays there is still a certain number of such clients still catered for in a high support fully staffed hostel setting.

Akin to the aforementioned developments I feel that the staff who are in daily contact with the residents of Cluain Fionnain are best qualified to assess the suitabity of the various residents for their transfer to a community setting and if this should be undertaken on a phased basis as has been the policy in all areas of the psychiatric services in St Finans where those clients were once resident.

Finally we must all take cognisance of the fact that finance has always been an impediment to having improvments made in both the psychiatric and intellectual disabilities sectors and thankfully we have made some movement from the days when the rate payers of the county had to be ejected from the hospital committee meetings when an increase in the local rates was being requested for improvements to the level of care in those areas.

While fully accepting the vital role that HIQA have in the area of health improvement we must also acknowlege the vast experience that nurses have accumulated over many years in their profession and experience can be a vital ingredient in decision making in our daily lives.



HAVE MOTOR PREMIUMS PEAKED?



McCarthy Insurances Group Paul Kavanagh takes a look at the future of motor premiums and asks have they peaked?

I would love if the answer was yes, but there is no evidence to support that theory, especially after the Central Bank recently released the official 2015 figures for motor insurance. Following on from losses of €253 in 2013 and €220 in 2014, it was anticipated that 2015 would have shown an improvement, but unfortunately this was not the case and the losses came in at a whopping €273, with over €1 Billion paid out on claims. This is not an opinion. These are the realistic facts

To put it in simple terms, the Industry paid out, on average, 125 for every 100 taken in. That is unsustainable. On top of this, Insurers are getting less than 1% on monies put away on deposit for claims, whereas ten years ago, they were getting 10%.

We now have a very litigious society in Ireland and if the awards keep increasing, then so too will the premiums. For most of us, who have not claimed, this looks totally dysfunctional. Who or What is going to stop the rot? Solicitors are further rejecting the Injuries Board awards and more and more cases are going to higher courts, which mean more costs per accident.

The much-awaited Book of Quantum might stabilise awards, that are already too high, that is of course if Judges would abide by the new book. They did not abide by the last book, in recent times, and the whole thing did become unworkable.

A number of insurers have gone to the wall. Other brands have just disappeared including No Nonsense and Tesco Financial. Catlin just pulled out and Zenith Insurance Company is ceasing to write new motor business in Ireland in two months, leaving the consumer with less choice and reduced capacity. Coupled with this, Insurers have invested heavily in computer software that will analyse risk, based on behaviour, like driving without an NCT or driving without your car taxed for a few months. Fraud and uninsured driving are on the increase. Garda detectives busted one of the biggest fraud rings last year, just a few miles up the old Kilbeheny road. So, its right on our doorstep and not just a big city problem. We need ZERO Tolerance on Fraud and Un-insured driving. We are being viewed by EU insurers as a basket case and plans for Brexit are not helping.

There is some light at the end of the tunnel with an Oireachtas enquiry about to deliver its findings to the Minister for Finance and the Cabinet, before the Christmas recess. The last time this happened, the resulting set up of the Personal Injuries Board, with the curbing of Legal cases and their resultant costs, did achieve the required solution of lowering premiums.

Insurers hate UNCERTAINTY and that is something we have buckets of at the moment. That is not good news for the hard pressed motorist. The Large Insurers are cherry-picking the best risks *Over 30, *Full licences, *No penalty Points, *Insured and Partner, *Newer cars and *Low Mileage, but that is only half the motoring public. That is why we need the new Niche insurers to come in and insurer the older cars and those whose record may not be 100%,

like me.

MIG welcomes the Oireachtas Report on Motor Insurance and agree with most of its 75 points, but it is only a DISCUSSION document and what is now required is Quick Government action to implement legislation amendments, that will give the Central Bank, more power to make sure these changes are implemented in 2017. The Gardai are seriously, understaffed and under resourced. The Number Plate Recognition System that they have in the UK for the last 15 years, was offered to our Government, just after it was introduced in the UK. Why has it taken 15 years to accept this. We must equip our Gardai to be able to catch Uninsured Drivers, Road Tax and NCT defaulters, those drivers who should not be on the road, due to convictions or heavy penalty points. They must have the power to confiscate vehicles on the spot and to fine them 500 on the spot with 6 penalty points, as they do in the UK.

The GOOD NEWS is that three new players have already confirmed they are coming into Ireland in 2017, and we expect three more to be announced shortly. All these can only be accessed via a Broker so dont forget to shop around! At times like this, it is too easy to go for the Cheapest Premium, but my advice is; to Shop around and get the cover you want at the best price available.



TOP 10 TIPS FOR WINTER DRIVING



Taking a number of simple precautions can ensure safety on Irish roads during winter.

Don't get caught out if severe weather hits, make the necessary checks on your vehicle now.

There are a number of simple precautions the RSA advises for driving over the winter months:

- 1. **Check your tyres...** they are your only contact with the road. Tyres should be at least the minimum legal thread depth of 1.6mm but need to be changed before they get this worn. Tyres need to be to the correct tyre pressure to give the motorist the best chance in extreme conditions.
- 2. **Use your lights.** As we come into the winter months, motorists are advised to use dipped head lights during the day so you are easily seen. Headlights and taillights should be in working order.
- 3. **Understand your brakes.** Check your car manual and find out if your vehicle has safety

assist technology such as Electronic Stability Control (ESC) or Anti-Lock Braking System (ABS). Learn how these technologies can assist your driving in harsh weather conditions.

- 4. **Safe Distance.** It takes longer to stop a car during the winter weather so slow down and allow extra distance between you and the car in front.
- 5. **Make sure you can clearly see.** All too often motorists do not de-fog or de-ice windows and mirrors which can compromise visibility. This winter ensure windows and mirrors are clear, and carry a de-icer and screen scraper. Do not use boiling water as this can crack the windscreen.
- 6. **Beware of "Black Ice".** Black Ice is one of winter's biggest hazards as it is difficult to see. Watch out for sheltered/ shaded areas on roads, under trees and near high walls.
- 7. **Be prepared.** During these winter months it is advised that motorists carry a number of

essentials in the boot of their car.

- 1) High visibility vest
- 2) Spare fuel
- 3) Appropriate footwear in case you need to leave your vehicle e.g. boots
- 4) A hazard warning triangle
- 5) Spare wheel (Check that your spare wheel is in good condition and is fully inflated. Some cars may have an inflation repair kit instead of a spare wheel. Make sure that you know how to use it.)
- 6) Tow Rope
- 7) A shovel
- 8) De-icing equipment (for glass and door locks)
- 9) Spare bulbs
- 10) First aid kit
- 11) A fire extinguisher
- 12) A working torch
- 13) A car blanket, additional clothing & some food and water
- 8. In the event of a breakdown. Drivers need to ensure their vehicle is well in off the road so as not to obstruct other vehicles. The driver should also put on their hazard warning lights. If the vehicle breaks down on the motorway pull in as far as you can, alerting traffic behind you with hazard lights. The driver should leave their vehicle, get behind the barrier (on the embankment) and call the Gardaí, on their mobile phone or roadside telephone.
- 9. **Keep up to date.** Listen to local weather and traffic reports. Pay heed to the weather warnings alerting drivers of unsafe and dangerous driving conditions.
- 10. **Check out the RSA's publication** 'Severe Weather Advice for Road Users' for more detailed advice on what to do if severe weather strikes!

ARE YOU WINTER READY?

Bad weather such as torrential rain, severe winds, fog, ice and snow can strike suddenly catching road users off guard.

IF SEVERE WEATHER STRIKES! Before setting off on a journey check to see if there are any problems on your intended route.

IS YOUR JOURNEY ABSOLUTELY NECESSARY?: In extreme weather conditions you should ask yourself if making a journey by road is absolutely necessary? If it is not you might consider delaying your trip until the weather and road conditions improve. If using the roads in such conditions is unavoidable

be prepared. The golden rule is to drive, cycle or walk with care and caution and expect the unexpected.

IS YOUR VEHICLE READY FOR WINTER?

As the saying goes 'Prevention is better than cure', so take some time to prepare both your vehicle and yourself for the challenges of winter driving. Don't get caught out when severe weather strikes.

Your first step should be to get your vehicle serviced to ensure it is fit and safe for winter driving. Secondly you should carry out regular checks on the vehicle.

YOU SHOULD: Check for wear and tear on wiper blades and replace them as soon as they start to smear rather than clean windows.

keep tyre pressure at the manufacturer's recommended level and check you have at least 3 millimetres of tread depth.

check that your spare wheel is in good condition and is fully inflated. Some cars may have an inflation repair kit instead of a spare wheel. Make sure that you know how to use it. Make sure all vehicle lights are working and clean and top up with anti-freeze and screen wash.

MAGNIFICENT SEVEN AS CROKES CANTER TO PROVINCIAL TITLE

DR CROKES 3-15 THE NIRE 0-6 **KERRY O'SHEA REPORTS**

Colm Cooper's ambition to gain a first All-Ireland Club SFC title, the only honour he has yet to win in a glittering career, remains intact as his beloved Dr Crokes claimed their seventh AIB Munster Club title and a first since 2013 when they easily disposed of The Nire's challenge in an utterly one-sided provincial decider at the Mallow GAA Complex on Sunday.

In doing so, the Killarney club, who this season are managed by former Kerry senior boss Pat O'Shea, captured their first provincial crown since 2013 to add to their Kerry League and Championship titles.

An attendance of just over 3,000 watched the contest where the Killarney side were never really tested. A brilliant first-half hat-trick by Daithi Casey, the penetrating runs of Gavin White and of course the magic of the playmaker in chief Colm Cooper were the main ingredients behind this win, which, remarkably, was Crokes' 21st in 23 outings this year in all competitions.

Daithi Casey who finished the game with a personal haul of 3-1, stamped his own seal of brilliance on the tie, turning in a Man of the Match performance in the process before being called ashore in the 48th minute with a job well done, the match ball in his possession and a man of the match award to boot.

Casey's first green flag came in the 10th minute when he fired home from close range following superb build-up play from Colm Cooper and Eoin Brosnan.

Things went from bad to worse for the West Waterford side in the 20th minute when Crokes were awarded a penalty.

Cork official Kevin Murphy, having originally awarded a 20 metre free, changed his mind when he adjudged that Shane Ryan illegally fouled Kieran O'Leary.

Casey stepped up and confidently and drilled the subsequent spot kick low to the net past The Nire netminder Tommy Wall for an unassailable 2-5 to 0-0 lead.

Casey completed his hat-trick two minutes later with another fine individual effort and these three goals added to points from Casey, Kieran

A key element to Crokes' dominance of Kerry football this year has been their impressive substitutes' bench. Manager Pat O'Shea used the second half to introduce former Kerry minor Jordan Kiely, Chris Brady, Luke Quinn Michael Burns, Tony Brosnan and PJ Lawlor.

Kiely and Chris Brady managed to get in on the scoring act with second-half points as the gap widened. With the game meandering towards its conclusion, Crokes were content to go through the motions knowing that the provincial title was theirs.

Liam Lawlor and Dermot Ryan, who was easily The Nire's best performer on the day, added some fine points for the Waterford representatives but on the day the superiority of the Crokes was there for all to see.

Crokes are now just sixty minutes away from a possible All-Ireland final appearance on St Patrick's Day, but they must first overcome Connacht and Galway champions Corofin, who vanquished Roscommon's St Brigid's in the Western decider.

Hello Readers - as I write this it is freezing hard, by the time you read it I sincerely hope the weather will have changed back to our normal Irish rain - much and all as I complain about it, but if it hasn't please keep an eye on your elderly neighbours or people living alone. Please put out water and food for our wildlife and if possible simple shelter for strays or leave an outhouse door open. If you have pets or even guard dogs you are responsible for their welfare, please ensure they have access to warm shelter, fresh water and are well fed. Before starting your car in the morning hit the bonnet a few times as cats will curl up in the engine for the heat and remember Anti-Freeze will poison anything that licks it.

PEOPLE IN INDONESIA CAN USE RECYCLEABLES FOR FREE HEALTHCARE:

Patients in Indonesia can trade recyclable trash for doctor visits in a clever plan to get affordable medical care to people in rural villages.

Three in every five Indonesians have no health insurance and with no money to pay for doctors, they put off medical care allowing easily treated illnesses to turn into major problems. Dr. Gamal Albinsaid looked for a substitute for money – something people already had that they could trade for health care. He didn't have to look much farther than Indonesia's rubbish-strewn streets.

"There's rubbish everywhere on the ground, so we decided to use it as a financial resource, only about half the trash produced in Indonesia is collected, which creates health problems and allows tons of valuable recyclables to go to waste" he said.

Dr. Albinsaid created Garbage Clinical Insurance to take in trash, sell it to recyclers and use the money to pay for health care. Four pounds of plastic or 11 pounds of cardboard will sell for less than a dollar, but that's enough to buy a basic health insurance policy that pays for two visits to a doctor a month. Dr. Albinsaid has set up his own clinic and his company has helped 3,500 people buy health coverage.

For his innovative service, the young doctor won a prize of £50,000 and mentoring support from Cambridge University in the 2013 Prince of Wales Young Sustainability Entrepreneur Awards.

COMMUNITY PAYS FOR CROSSING GUARD'S PROSTHETIC REPAIRS:

Fetene Yezengaw is a crossing guard who has brought smiles and laughter to the same intersection for the last decade – so now, the community is repaying him for all the kindness.

When Fetene was a 15-year-old child soldier in Ethiopia, he stepped on a land mine that blew

his leg off. After healing in a refugee camp, he was eventually granted political asylum in the United States.

The now 42-year-old has used a prosthetic limb ever since, but it currently requires repairs that he can't afford. He also recently lost his second job and medical insurance, but the children and parents of Harvard Elementary School in Houston, Texas decided to raise the money themselves, to care for the beloved school official.

A school club, Girls on the Run, hosted a bake sale, while one of the mothers, Karen Johnson, created a GoFundMe page. Together, they have raised over \$10,000 for his medical needs.

GOOGLE STREET VIEW FOR CATS:

Japan loves cats. In case you were unsure of this, maybe you should visit one of the country's cat cafés. Or there's always Tashirojima, best known for being an island inhabited almost exclusively by cats. Now the prefecture of Hiroshima has created a GPS-based mapping system from the perspective of a cat.

Locals, but preferably tourists, now have the opportunity to travel around the city of Onomichi using a cat's-eye view. Designed with the same technology used in Google Street View, rather than mounting a camera on top of a car, members of the tourism board hung a camera so that it remained a perfect eight inches off the ground while creating the map. With such a low height, many felines from the city's population of over 150,000 cats are visible on the map. The most famous eleven cats even have a link where you can read up on their lives, or as it appears on the screen, 'biogra-fur-ical information.'

The main focus of the street view is a shopping arcade in the central part of the city. While this is already a major destination for visitors coming to the thriving port community, the tourism board wanted to entice a new set of visitors to come see the shops and buy the specialty wares produced in the city. Also included in the street view for cats is the area surrounding the city's famed Maneki-neko Museum, housing a collection of over 1,700 beckoning cat figurines. And to tie everything together, the walkway to the museum is called the Path of Cats, due to all the paintings of random cats that have been placed there over the last fifteen years.

Just like with Google Maps, users can click on various shops and figure out details including hours of operation and user reviews. Hiroshima prefecture has plans to develop additional cat's eye view maps for other areas in the state.

1867 - In a New York City theatre, British author Charles Dickens gave his first public reading in the United States.

1905 - T. Eaton Company, Canada hosted their first Santa Claus Parade as Santa arrived at Union Station and was escorted to the Eaton's store in a carriage; in 1913, Santa's sleigh was pulled by eight real reindeer from Labrador under the care of a veterinarian; in 1917 the parade featured nursery rhyme characters including Mother Goose, and a giant swan carrying musicians and clowns; in 1919, Santa landed in a small plane at an aerodrome on Eglinton Avenue; in 1952, the parade was broadcast on TV for the first time; in 1982, the Eaton family withdraw sponsorship, but it continues under a volunteer board; the event has blossomed into the world's longestrunning children's parade.

1917 – In New Zealand Six p.m. closing of pubs was introduced as a 'temporary' wartime measure. It ushered in what became known as the 'six o'clock swill', in which patrons drank their fill before closing time. The practice was to last for 50 years.

1928 Frederick Bennett, who had a Ngāti Whakaue mother and an Irish father, was ordained as an Anglican priest in 1897 and was consecrated the first Bishop of Aotearoa, New Zealand, as assistant to the Bishop of Waiapu, he ministered to Māori throughout the country.

1954 - The yacht Granma arrived on the shores of Cuba after travelling from Mexico where Fidel Castro, Che Guevara and 80 other members of the Cuban Revolution movement disembarked to begin the Cuban Revolution.

1942 - William Lyon Mackenzie King, Canadian Prime Minister proposed a new world order based on human rights and universal rule of law.

1970 - The Numbat (Western Australian anteater) was officially listed as endangered.

1971 - The United Arab Emirates (UAE) was formed as a federation from the seven emirates of Abu Dhabi, Ajman, Dubai, Fujairah, Ras al-Khaimah, Sharjah, and Umm al-Quwain becoming one united country.

1984 - The Bhopal gas tragedy in India when deadly methyl isocyanate (MIC) gas and other poisonous substances leaked from the American firm Union Carbide's pesticide plant in Bhopal, Madhya Pradesh, killing around 3,800 people, according to government estimates. Other estimates have put the death toll at a minimum of 8,000 within two weeks of the disaster, and an equal number in the years to follow. Besides the thousands who died, more than 500,000 people were affected by the gas leak.

1998 - Death of Mary Hortsmann McShain at Killarney House.

*Mary J Horstmann was born into a family of 6 children in Philadelphia on Mar. 27, 1907;

her parents were catholic and made their living as wool merchants. During her youth, Mary attended St. Leonard's Academy and then enrolled at Rosemont College, where she graduated in 1925. In 1927 she married John McShain whose ancestors came from County

A Lady of the Grand Cross of the Holy Sepulchre and a Dame of Malta, she was the recipient, in 1976, of the highest honour the Vatican can bestow on a laywoman, the Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice Cross. In 1977, she was given honorary doctorates from three universities.

Mr McShain became a member of a syndicate of wealthy businessmen which had purchased in the late fifties the Kenmare estate in Killarney, which covered about 25,000 acres. It included the Middle and Lower Lakes and other priceless, scenic property.

So that there would be no undesirable developments, Mr. McShain a highly successful American building contractor known as "The Man Who Built Washington" soon acquired the shares of all the other members.

According to their only child Sister Pauline of the Society of the Holy Child Jesus, her parents, from their earliest days in Killarney, considered the future of the lakes and lands they held in stewardship.

In 1973, they made a gift to the nation of Innisfallen Island and the ruins of its historic abbey. They also gave Ross Castle to the guardianship of the State.

The McShains decided, in 1979, to turn over the remainder of the estate for the people of Ireland to enjoy for a nominal sum on the understanding they would retain a life tenancy of the house and some acreage. Before signing the agreement, they insisted on the condition that the lands would be incorporated into Killarney National Park in perpetuity.

GOOD NEWS ON OFFICER WHO RESCUED ANIMALS FROM BURNING PET SHOP:

When the Route 23 Pet Centre in Franklin, New Jersey went up in flames due to an electrical malfunction, police were first to arrive on the

Though the building was already filled with smoke, Officer Rafael Burgos conducted an investigation of the facilities to make sure there were no staffers trapped inside. Once he was sure that there were no humans in the building, he got to work evacuating all the frightened, caged animals and dozens of pets are now safe and sound thanks to this hero.

Though humans are capable of sustaining a large amount of smoke inhalation, dog lungs are much more sensitive to irritation. If Burgos had not acted as quickly as he did, many of the pets could have perished from the smoke or flames.

They have been moved to another veterinary centre for treatment, while Burgos was taken to a local hospital. The courageous hero is expected to make a full recovery despite the smoke inhalation.

WAITRESS WAS GIVEN THOUSAND DOLLAR TIP IF SHE FOLLOWED 3 REOUESTS

A down-on-her-luck New York waitress was shocked recently when she was given a \$3,000 tip on a \$43.50 bill. The gift, however, did not come without conditions.

On the back of the receipt were three stipulations written by the anonymous

Firstly, "go to ReesSpechtLife and learn!" Secondly, he asked the waitress to pay it forward to someone else. Finally, he told her to keep their names anonymous so they could celebrate the idea of the gesture rather than the people.

The diner said that ReesSpechtLife was a payit-forward blog that was started by Ray Specht his old middle school science teacher after his son Rees drowned in 2012. Though the diner hadn't been taught by the grieving educator in over 10 years, he still fondly remembered his charismatic teaching.

The waitress - who was grateful for the gratuity since she was about to be evicted from her apartment – respected the request and posted a photo of the receipt to ReesSpechtLife where it was then seen by Ray. "In staring at that receipt, I never noticed the name and it wasn't until I read the note did I realise that it was a former student of mine," said Ray. "I immediately recalled who he was and realised that I had him at least ten years ago. To think that someone I had a decade ago would honour my little boy or even remember his 8th grade science teacher in such a way blows me away. In an age where politicians wish to identify 'high effective' teachers simply by test scores and data points, this moment could not be better timed."

RETIREMENT HOME FOR UNWANTED SENIOR DOGS OFFERS LOVE IN FINAL YEARS:

If you're over the age of fourteen, willing to move to Maryland in the U.S.A. and you've got a tail to wag, then you've got a friend at House With A Heart Senior Animal Sanctuary.

For nearly thirty years, Sherry Lynn Polvinale and her husband rescued dogs and cats. As the years went on, though, they got more and more calls from people who just "couldn't keep" their senior dogs.



"I got to a point where I couldn't stand trying to find the right home for these guys and not knowing if the owners will be committed for life. This way, we know that they're totally safe," Ms. Polvinale said in an interview.

"I thought, 'I'm getting older, and a treat for myself is going to be rescuing seniors and keeping them safe until they pass away"."

In 2006, they began operating with official nonprofit status for their Gaithersburg, Maryland home and have continued to transform it into a haven for four-legged residents who hail from all over the country. While her husband was still alive, only ten dogs lived in the home; when he passed away, she made room for thirty.

Today, a roster of 55 volunteers do everything from poop-scooping and manning nappystations to laundry and, of course, cuddling.

The home relies solely on donations from people who want to give, or those who want to board their pets there instead of dropping them at a kennel.

All of the pups spend their days eating and just enjoying life, despite some doggy dementia and wheelchair needs. Some still have plenty of pep in their step, and love to frolic in the yard.

Feeding time for 24 specific diets is no small fete, but at 4pm sharp, meals that have been prepared throughout the day are always ready to go. All of the residents dine in their assigned rooms with their main companions.

Sherry wakes up at 5:30 every morning, and goes to bed around 1am and is often roused during those few hours by dogs needing attention. "Never do I feel like oh my gosh, what a pain, you're waking me up. I never feel like that. As long as he needs me and is barking, it means he's still here and he's still alive," she said.

At the moment, they can't take in any new dogs that are not over the age of 14—Sherry says she doesn't want to take in any dogs that might outlive her-but is currently planning to begin a grant-giving programme that will help other people start similar shelters or adopt and care for senior dogs themselves.

Know Your Rights:

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS AT CHRISTMAS

QUESTION

I work full-time, Monday to Friday. What days off will I get at

ANSWER

The Christmas Day (25 December), St Stephen's Day (26 December) and New Year's Day (1 January) are public holidays every year.

In 2016 Christmas Day falls on a Sunday and St Stephen's Day falls on a Monday. New Year's Day 2017 falls on a Sunday. Where a public holiday falls on a weekend, you do not have any automatic legal entitlement to have the next working day off work. This means that, for example, Tuesday 27 December 2016 is not a public holiday. Your employer can require you to attend work on that day. Your public holiday entitlement for Christmas Day will be one of the following:

- A paid day off within a month of the public holiday
- An additional day of annual leave
- An additional day's pay

Under the Organisation of Working Time Act 1997, you may ask your employer, at least 21 days before a public holiday, which of the alternatives will apply to you. Your employer should respond to you at least 14 days before the public holiday. In practice, many employers will give employees Tuesday 27 December and Monday 2 January off in lieu of Christmas Day and New Year's Day – but it is important to remember that this is not an automatic entitlement.

You can find out more about public holidays in the Explanatory Booklet on Holidays and Public Holidays (pdf) which is available from the Workplace Relations Commission website, workplacerelations.ie.

If you do not get your public holiday entitlement, you may make a complaint under the Organisation of Working Time Act within 6 months of the dispute or complaint occurring. You must use the online complaint form available on workplacerelations.ie.

FOCUS ON BEECH HEDGING

Beech Hedging is an ideal hedging plant for most situations, because of its tolerance of a wide range of soil conditions including well drained soils, soils prone to draughts and soils that can get waterlogged due to heavy down pours of rain.

Even though the beech is deciduous, when it is grown as hedging and is trimmed regularly around August/ September the brown leaves will usually be retained throughout most of the winter.

Beech also comes with a purple leaf - copper beech. Copper beach is best planted in a sunny position to keep its leaf colour where as the green retains its colour better if planted in partial shade.

If you can - it is best to plant your beech hedge bare rooted as it will probably establish that bit quicker, so you have plenty of time from now until the end of March to get planting.



WORKPLACE STRESS

Whilst we can't control everything in our work environment, we're not powerless to make some changes – even in very difficult circumstances. Fear of losing our job, increased pressure to perform to meet rising expectations, staff cutbacks and increased overtime can all lead to excessive workplace stress. The way in which we deal with workplace stress and pressure is crucial. The key factor is to focus on those things that are within our control - namely ourselves. The better we are at managing our own stress, the less we will be affected negatively by other people's stress. Strategies to manage our own stress include

It is important not to ignore the warning signs of work stress as these can lead not only to less productivity and effectiveness but to physical and emotional problems. Some signs and symptoms of excessive job stress include lack of interest in work, sleeping problems, social withdrawal, headaches and muscle tension, fatigue, difficulty concentrating, feeling anxious or irritable and stomach upset. If you are experiencing any of these symptoms then it is time to take action. Taking care of you involves making more positive lifestyle choices - one step at a time.

- 1. Keep Active. Regular exercise is a powerful stress buster. Try to get at least 30 minutes of heart-pounding exercise at least 5 times a week. This will enhance your mood, increase your energy and relax your body and mind.
- 2. Healthy eating is vital for dealing with stress. Eat small but frequent meals to maintain a balanced blood sugar, avoid mood swings, keep your energy up and help you to concentrate.
- 3. Smoking can lead to higher levels of anxiety as nicotine is a very strong stimulant.
- 4. Don't drink to relieve job stress as this can lead to problems down the line.
- 5. Aim to sleep for 7-8 hours per night as a good sleep can keep us emotionally balanced and better resourced to deal with
- 6. We've all heard how 'a problem shared is a problem halved' so share how you are feeling with family or friends.
- 7. Prioritise and Organise your responsibilities. Good time management and organization can significantly reduce stress levels. Make a list of 'to-do' tasks and attend to them in order of importance – with high priority tasks first.
- 8. Break tasks into small steps and focus on each manageable step one at a time. This will prevent you from getting overwhelmed by taking on everything at once.

THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT TAX IF YOU'RE AN AIRBNB HOST IN IRELAND

1. Airbnb income does not qualify for rent-a-room relief

If you have any Airbnb income then you need to declare this to Revenue without exception as it doesn't qualify for rent-a-room relief. Revenue's quidelines on the subject confirm that providing accommodation to occasional visitors does not qualify for tax exemption and is subject to Income Tax (along with PRSI & USC) as a trade. It doesn't matter if you're an Irish resident or not — you still have to pay tax on income arising from all Irish properties rented out using Airbnb.

2. Allowable Expenses can reduce your tax liability

When filing your tax return, it's important to include any expenses you've incurred as these can reduce your tax bill. According to Revenue: 'expenses that have been incurred directly in the provision of the accommodation' can be deducted when calculating the taxable profits. Such expenses include: Cleaning, Food, Laundry, Commission to Airbnb, Additional insurance purchased, Electricity, Gas and Heating. In addition to the deductible expenses listed above you can also claim mortgage interest relief and wear and tear on household furniture & fittings.

It's important to note that proportional amounts of utility costs can be considered i.e. the amounts of electricity and gas that are used as a result of your hosting

3. Your Airbnb income should be declared annually

You can declare the income by filing an annual tax return — either a Form 11 or Form 12 - depending on your individual circumstances and other sources of income you may have.





At the time of conception God connects to the human spirit and at birth brings forth life in the same way as when He breathed up the nostrils of Adam and he became a living soul (Genesis 2:7). Adam's spirit and life were in right-standing with God but when he sinned and disobeyed his spirit was then in wrong-standing with God (the 'original sin'). Every human being born after that time is separated and in wrong-standing with God because of the nature we are born with - rebellion, handed down by Adam. This is what Jesus meant when He said that this spirit we each have must be born again and brought back into right-standing with God (also called righteousness). For this to happen a perfect human being with no sin had to be found: one who would take upon himself the blame for the sins of humanity, and pay the full penalty by allowing his life to be taken. This was the price demanded to redeem us from original sin. But as no human being qualified, God Himself came into the world as a Man – i.e. Jesus, and through His total obedience, His death and resurrection satisfied God's anger away from humans. So to be born again we must admit our sins, ask God for forgiveness, and then receive it. The blood of Jesus washes away our sin and the Father completely forgives and forgets our sins and, as we accept His Salvation we become His sons and daughters (John 1:12). Jesus says "I am the Way the truth and the life, no-one comes to the Father except by Me." (John 14:6) More next week
