





## **Grand Marshal Honour** for Cathal

Known for his tireless voluntary work in Killarney, retired member of An Garda Siochana, Cathal Walshe has been announced as this years grand marshal at this year's St Patrick's Day parade in Killarney.

The honour of leading the parade to the VIP berton on the reviewing stand on Main Street has been bestowed on Cathal, who has devoted his whole life to voluntary community work and to helping and supporting others.

A native of Galway City and now aged 76, Cathal was a garda in Killarney from 1970 until his retirement in 2003, working initially on the beat and as the patrol car driver before he joined the scenes of crime team and, finally, becoming juvenile liaison officer, and it was the latter role, working closely with schools throughout south and east Kerry, that gave him the most job satisfaction.

Graduating from Templemore in 1966, prior to transferring to Killarney he spent three months based in Castleisland and three years in Farranfore.

In terms of his commitment to community life, Cathal has no equal as he spends almost all of his time helping local organiations, charities and community groups in any way he can.

Cathal has been the PRO for the hugely successful Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle for an astonishing 40 years and he has played a huge part in the event by helping to raise a whopping €18.6 million for various charities.

He cycled the event himself on 19 occasions but, these days, he leaves that task to his son, Enda, who is becoming a Ring of Kerry veteran in his own right.

Cathal also sets the questions and fills the role of guizmaster for numerous fundraising table guizzes and he spearheaded the annual guiz for the Irish Pilgrimage Trust for 20 years.

Many years ago Cathal launched the Killarney Sports Stars **Awards** which he ran for 13 years, honouring the area's great achievers in the various sporting arenas, nationally and locally.

Other events Cathal has been closely associated with over the years include establishment the Torc Youth Club and Woodlawn Youth Club, he is a member of the board of management at Gaelscoil Faithleann, PRO for both the Kerry Hospice and the Darkness into Light walk and he is also very involved with the Kerry Comfort for Chemo organisation.

A passionate sports fan, Cathal is also an officer with the Gleneagle Pitch and Putt Club and he is a GAA season ticket holder, seldom missing a Kerry game no matter where they are playing. He also served on Killarney Town Council for nine years but retired from active politics in

Cathal, a father of two boys, Finbarr and Enda, and a grandfather of four (three girls and a boy), married Tralee native June Moriarty in 1970 but, sadly, his life-long companion passed away in August 2020.

He said he considers it a wonderful honour to be asked to be grand marshal for the parade and he is really looking forward to the occasion. "I love being involved in the community and I'm a firm believer in the old saying that life is like an echo in that what you give you get.

"It's never too soon to do an act of kindness because you never know how soon it could be too late," said Cathal who was honoured with a Radio Kerry-Fexco Kerry Hero award last Christmas.

Remarkably fit and full of energy, despite having fought his own battle with serious illness last year, Cathal said his recipe for a great life is physical exercise, a good diet, sleep without medication, retaining a sense of humour and remembering that life itself dictates that there will be days when you will laugh and days when you will cry.

St Patrick's Festival Chairman, Paul Sherry, said Cathal Walshe is most worthy recipient of the honour of leading the parade in Killarney given what he has done for the town and its people for over half a century.

# Killarney plans a celebration to be proud of

Plans are at an advanced stage for the greening of Killarney with all the public buildings to be illuminated in various shades of the national colour and the town will be decorated to celebrate the life of the patron saint.

Killarney wants to ensure that this year's St Patrick's Day parade will leave all other locations green with envy as the country's tourism capital is planning a spectacular day and night to remember.

Buildings that will be lit up include St Mary's Cathedral, the Franciscan Friary, St Mary's Church of Ireland, the Methodist Church, Ross Castle and Killarney Town Hall as well as landmark statues and monuments, such as the Speir Bhean, the feature carved deer on Port Road and the life-sized carving of St Finian of Innisfallen at the ANAM building on East Avenue Road.

Hotels, shops, restaurants, public houses and several other business premises will also turn green and everybody has been asked to make a special effort this year.

"We want it to be a celebration to be proud of and one that will be a magnificent spectacle for locals and visitors," said St Patrick's Festival Chairman Paul Sherry.

This year will also feature a shop window competition with prizes up for grabs for the best green building and the best themed shop window. Community groups, sports clubs, charities, businesses, groups of friends and work colleagues are all asked to partake in this year's parade by entering a float or marching with prizes on offer in several categories.

The theme for the festival and parade is very much in keeping with the now corporate logo designed for the town which features the strapline Experience More.

The new brand and logo are part of the Killarney Destination Experience Development project – in association with Fáilte Ireland – which is an exciting and comprehensive five-year development plan for the town.

## A tribute to the late MICHAEL O DONOGHUE



The death of Michael O'Donoghue, Killeen, Clonkeen, aged 81, brings to an end a remarkable lifetime of community service in Glenflesk parish. A dairy and sheep farmer Michael joined the local Branch of Muintir na Tire at a young age, later becoming an active member of the ICMSA. As a representative of the ICMSA Michael was twice elected to the Board of Kerry Co-op.

Michael promoted the establishment of local drama and light entertainment in the early sixties and seventies by helping to launch the Clonkeen Drama Group which subsequently evolved into the 'Tops of the Parish' and 'Tops of the Clubs'.

Michael's unparalleled contribution to community life in Glenflesk was particularly evident in his dedication to the GAA. Since attending his first All-Ireland Final in 1956, when he crossed the field from his home to board the train at Loo Bridge Station, Michael had been an indefatigable supporter of Glenflesk, East Kerry and Kerry teams for eight decades. As a player, administrator, supporter and mentor Michael embodied all that is best in the GAA.

Michael was the club's first chairman of Bord na nOg and he also served 3 terms as chairman of the senior Board. His greatest sporting satisfaction occurred in the year 2000 when the Sam Maguire cup was brought to Glenflesk by Seamus Moynihan and John Crowley, and later the same year when Glenflesk won the Millenium Cup. During his first term as chairman Michael was conscious of the need to provide permanent playing facilities for the youth of the parish. For many years the club had been dependent on the kindness of local farmers to provide a field for training playing games. The last temporary venue



was at Murphy's field in Knockanes for which Michael secured the goal posts from his neighbour Jimmy Cronin.He oversaw the purchase and development of suitable grounds at Curreal and he was a proud man when St. Agatha's Park was officially opened in 1976.

In a fitting finale as Michael's remains were lowered to their final resting place Killaha graveyard, under the shadow of O'Donoghue's Castle, resounded to the strains of 'Glenflesk of you we are proud'.


## **FIONN RAISES OVER €2000**

## Gorse burning - time to quench the fires

Farming methods other than setting a match to the landscape are badly needed.

It was very disquieting to see the beautiful day that was Saturday last in Killarney clouded in smoke. From the foot of Mangerton to Stoompa to the east there was a blanket of smoke and fire visible from High Street on what should have been a magnificent showcase day with the town full of visitors. It was the same on Monday only the flames had shifted to the west and to the Reeks.

The smell of acrid smoke is still around and the lovely moorland on Mangerton on my doorstep is a blackened charred mess.

Co-incidentally at the major Civil War conference in Tralee on Saturday there was a paper from a lecturer at the University of Essex on the phenomenon of setting fire to the countryside in wartime.

The question was 'Why burn?'. Burning was used to control people as well as territory, the lecturer explained.

'Fire communicates more powerfully than other forms and it sends a message,' was It is an expression of the conclusion. strength and was symbolic and often used as a statement. This was in the context of war. But I have often wondered after decades of peacetime burning, if there isn't still a primitive urge in these parts when it comes to fire?

The fire brigade had to be mobilised to Mangerton, on Saturday, two units no less, as flames spread across hundreds of acres onto the road to threaten the national park woods.

Because Mangerton is an area of special conservation the national park must give permission for 'controlled burning'. This is so even within the permitted period to March 1st, both the fire service and the NPWS told me. Astonishingly it appears the NPWS did give the go ahead. (I am awaiting a response as to what exactly was the procedure.)

Certainly, it is by no means fair if farmers lose grants for commonage that has bushes. But is it not even more unacceptable that whole communities are held to ransom and households are covered in smoke? That is apart from the health effects of asthma in the smoke. It is also the case that this stone age method of farming is causing great emotional upset to the general public now. A solution is needed.

### Benchmarking Moths

Thousands of moths including a rare moth has been recorded in Killarney National Park during a survey last year, this column has been told. The Black Arches (Lymantria monacha) was discovered during a survey conducted in two areas of woodland - the Blue Pool and Reen - in Killarney National Park where Rhododendron had been cleared and deer control measures were implemented

Moths were trapped with light traps, identified and released. The sites were trapped seven times each between April and the start of September

Almost 2500 moths were recorded in 15 nights of trapping.

172 species were recorded at Blue Pool and 161 species at Reen (there are about 1500 moth species in Ireland)

Moths recorded included Goat Moth, Peacock Moth, Lobster Moth, Ringed Carpet and Square-spot which are all characteristic species of south-western woodlands but absent or less common elsewhere.

'The most unexpected and interesting record was of the Black Arches (Lymantria monacha) This has never been recorded in Munster and is just the seventh ever record in Ireland. Its presence suggests a very small resident population in the area. The caterpillars of

the moth feed on the leaves of oak trees,' a spokesman for the national park said

In the meantime, readers of this column have pointed out that when it comes to benches in the Demesne and Ross Island, there are not nearly enough. The norm across Europe, particularly for parks in the vicinity of towns, is for plenty of benches to rest and read a book or a paper.

I have asked the park and it seems they are looking into providing more:

'The NPWS continues to assess the needs of visitors and has carried out a significant amount of work in the last two years with regard to seating,' they said.

That is true. But a lot done, more to do when it comes to benches comes to mind!

## **Civil War:** Overkill on the violence

The Civil War, and hopefully this is the last time we will be talking about it, was not so civil to women who suffered terrible indignities was the message from the major conference in Siamsa Tíre last weekend. A lot of the focus of the conference was on violence, particularly male violence. But there was a also a glancing reference to the workers' momentum to end the Civil War.

Why we don't have a similar workers' movement to bring that ridiculous war in the Ukraine to an end is beyond me. I spoke with Ukrainian refugees in the guesthouse owned by Michael Healy-Rae TD last week. Residents there repeated what others from southern and eastern Ukraine said to me already. The war is about arms and money and the people feel trapped political powers, they said.

Not everyone was participating in the Irish Civil War either or even eager to do so. Many ordinary working people felt the Civil war was 'between two military elites', John Dorney historian said in Tralee...

Workers and trade unions held general strikes. The Labour party had its best election in 1922 with workers 'wanting the violence by the two elite military sides to end and hunger and emigration to be addressed', Mr Dorney said.

If I have a quibble about the Irish civil war and how it is being remembered so far, it is the understatement of this pacifist position and the almost industrial levels of recalling the violent message and the division. The overkill on Ballyseedy is also discomfiting with around five different commemorations this weekend. Why can't there be just one if there has to be one at all? And could we please shift the message to the people in Kerry who had no hand or part, perpetrator or victim?





## "Life to the Limit" Ukrainian documentary film marks one year of war







On the eve of the anniversary of the full-scale war in Ukraine, The Great Southern Killarney cinema hall was completely filled with guests. Ukrainian and Irish audiences became the first viewers of the film "Life to the Limit" about the formation and development of the Ukrainian resistance starting from the events of the Revolution of Dignity all the way to the full-scale war of Russia against Ukraine. This is the first and only film that covers the entire period of the Russian-Ukrainian war - from 2014 to the present day.

"We are very grateful to Ireland and the Irish people for their persistent support of Ukrainians. We greatly appreciate the desire of our Irish friends to learn more about our country and our modern painful history. We are glad to see in the hall the city mayor, KASI team, teachers, local leaders who are very involved in providing support to Ukrainians", say organizers, local representatives of AURI C.L.G (Association Ukrainians in the Republic of Ireland).

People couldn't hold back tears while watching the movie. Many people said after the screening that they saw their hometowns and homes on the screen. Ukrainians discussed the film for a long time until the end of the screening. "For us, the showing of the tape is an opportunity

to get together, to remember why we are here and how much we long for victory and to return home," said one of the viewers.

The authors of the film are Ukrainian veterans, director Pavlo Peleshok and producer Yurko Ivanyshyn. Their previous film "Winter on Fire" was nominated for an Oscar in 2016 for Best Documentary Feature.

Pavlo Peleshok and Yurko Ivanyshyn, who have been at war since 2014, defending Ukraine from Russian aggression, continued to film their reality, which was so distant from the rest of the world. To create the film, the authors processed 640 hours of archival materials. From the fragments of memories and their own film archive, veterans Pavlo and Yurko have assembled a mosaic of the causes and consequences of today's Russian-Ukrainian war - from the end of 2013 until the present day.

The film screening takes place within the framework of the international initiative of the World Congress of Ukrainians and AURI C.L.G (Association Ukrainians in the Republic of Ireland). Many thanks to the Great Southern Killarney for their continued support of Ukrainian cultural initiatives.

# Low take up nationally for VACANT HOUSE IMPROVEMENT SCHEME GRANT FUNDING

he Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage have confirmed to date, that only 765 applications for the vacant house improvement scheme nationwide were received with only 105 approved with another 558 still not even evaluated by the body. They also revealed to Deputy Michael Healy Rae by way of written parliamentary question reply that 102 were rejected outright.It has led to the Kerry Deputy condemning the Government's progress in their Pathway Four of Housing for All programme which has seen little take up nationally for two schemes which are open to address vacant house needs and make efficient use of existing housing stock.

"Our townscapes are blighted by many vacant properties which are in dire need of help of funding and despite these Schemes run under the auspicious of the Croí Cónaithe Towns Fund promising to help people who wise to make those vacant properties liveable, we have a slow uptake and an even slower turnaround time with almost half of those applicants reviewed to date being refused funding. I think there needs to be serious questions asked

as to why there is not more urgency by the Department especially for people who want to help improve their own vacant properties and make them liveable" Deputy Michael Healy Rae following his reply.

Dublin between their three county councils have only received 26 applicants with only one case to date approved for funding. Cork has seen the most interest nationally with 92 applicants of which ten have been grant while another 73 await decisions.

In July 2022, the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant was launched as part of the Croí Cónaithe Towns Fund. While in September 2022, the Ready to Build Scheme was launched, also funded by the Croí Cónaithe Towns Fund.

The schemes are being kept under on-going review with a full review to take place by mid-

Meanwhile Deputy Michael Healy Rae said he was disappointed that in his own county of Kerry of the 16 grants that were reviewed that only six were approved with ten rejected for funding, while another 48 cases are still awaiting decision.





# Earn while you Learn with an Apprenticeship



#### **APPRENTICESHIP**

With huge demand in a thriving economy for skilled personnel many young people are turning away from the third level route to qualifications as the preferred option. Instead, they are looking to apprenticeship training which offers an 'earn while you learn' approach to a high-status marketable qualification. An apprenticeship is a fully recognised qualification on the national Framework of Qualifications (NFQ). Instead of going to college, it enables a person to start off in an industrial or professional environment to get a practical training under the supervision of a master craftsman or career professional.

#### NEW OPTIONS

Initially, craft apprenticeships were the only one's available, but in a skills' driven economy a whole range of new apprenticeships have been developed in other areas. Craft apprenticeships generally involve some sort of manual work, such as plumbing, carpentry, mechanics or electrical, and involve on-the-job training as well as off-the-job training, which usually takes place in Education and Training Boards (ETB) and Technological Universities. Apprenticeships in the new areas of industry are built on a similar approach.

#### QUALIFICATION

Apprenticeships generally last for four years although many of the non-craft apprenticeships last for as little as two years. Those who complete a craft apprenticeship will receive an Advanced Certificate, which is NFQ Level 6. Apprenticeships in other areas of industry can lead to qualifications between Level Six and Level Ten on the NFQ, depending on a number of different factors. There are currently about 30,000 apprentices training with about 9,500 employers and the numbers in both cases are showing a continually upwards spiral.

#### **TYPES**

There are about 56 different types of apprenticeships available, with a further 16 apprenticeship programmes due to commence this year. The 16 new apprenticeships are Farm Management, Advanced Quantity Surveyor, Civil Engineering (Levels 6 & 7), Cybersecurity Practitioner, Farm Technician, Executive Chef, Horticulture, International Financial Services Advanced Specialist, Manufacturing Data Integration Engineer, Precision Machinist

& Quality Control, Robotics & Automation, Roofing & Cladding, Stud Farming Assistant Management, Software Solutions Architect, Sports Turf Management.

#### INCENTIVE

The financial incentive on offer to employers to take on apprentices, particularly female apprentices, has also been increased. A key objective of the 'Action Plan for Apprenticeship 2021-2025' is to ensure that there will be an adequate number of apprenticeships to meet Ireland's skills and human capital requirements by delivering 10,000 apprenticeship places per annum by 2025. Apprenticeship is a demandled, employer driven training system. As such, there are no limits on the number of places which can be provided, and no limit on the apprenticeships which may be developed under the 'Employer Grant Scheme,' which means that, for the first time, all apprenticeship programmes receive ongoing financial support.

BURSARY
A new gender-based bursary for apprenticeship employers was introduced in 2021. The gender-based bursary is available to employers who employ apprentices on any national apprenticeship programme with greater than 80% representation of a single gender. It covers all new apprentice registrations on eligible national apprenticeship programmes. Apprenticeship employers are eligible to receive a €2,666 bursary for each registered apprentice from the minority gender. To be eligible for the bursary, employers must have employed and registered an apprentice(s) from the minority gender on one of the eligible programmes.

#### SOLAS

Apprenticeships operate under the auspices of the State Further Education and Training Agency, Solas. While it is the responsibility of the apprentice to find an employer, there are many employers who regularly seek apprentices. A list of pre-approved employers who look for apprentices on a regular basis can be found at www.apprenticeships.ie. Prospective employers must be approved by Solas before they can hire an apprentice.

#### **PROFESSIONS**

Some organisations and professional bodies run their own apprenticeship schemes, to encourage young people to enter their industry, such as Accounting Technicians Ireland, the Insurance Institute of Ireland, and others. For these types of apprenticeships, the governing bodies themselves have their own list of preapproved employers with whom apprentices can be placed, which is continually expanding as the apprentice scheme continues to grow. **CAO TAB** 

The CAO website, www.cao.ie, provides a link to www.apprenticeships.ie, which includes upto-date information on apprenticeship options. The facility to visit to the apprenticeship website directly from the CAO options page has proven to be very popular since the facility first opened in November 2021.

## **HSE DEBT COLLECTION**

ianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill moved a 'Notice of Motion' at this month's meeting of Kerry County Council with regard to the practice of the HSE in handing over the collection of bills due to them at University Hospital Kerry, to Debt Collection Agencies.

Councillor Cahill's Motion was worded as follows;

'That Kerry County Council request the Health Service Executive Authority to provide details of the number and amounts of debts they have handed over to the Debt Collection Agencies in the past ten years for bills owed to Kerry University Hospital.'

"I am looking for clarity around this issue as demanding letters arriving through anyone's letterbox, can be very distressful and indeed can be traumatising for some. I'd like to see the full extent of the amount owed here and the size of some individual demands, to get a handle on how necessary this practice is" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I have been contacted by individuals and families living in Killarney, Killorglin and Cahersiveen and from many other parts of South Kerry that

have received such disturbing letters" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"We are in the midst of the greatest cost of living crisis of

our lifetime. Thousands of families are dealing with MABS, where many parents can not feed their children or themselves, where they wouldn't survive but for going to food banks and the St. Vincent de Paul, etc." said Councillor Cahill.

"I would also like to know the cost to the taxpayer, of this heavy handed practice" added Councillor Cahill.

Councillor Cahill's proposal received the unanimous support of all present and it was agreed to write to the HSE requesting the details of this new development.

he announcement of a deal on the Northern Ireland Protocol is welcome offers hope people and businesses in the region, according to Seán Kelly MEP and First Vice-Chair of the **EU-UK Parliamentary** Assembly. However, Kelly has warned that a political test remains

ahead to see if can become reality on the ground.

"The atmosphere in negotiations between the EU and UK became more positive and pragmatic once British Prime Minister Sunak took office. Today's announcement is the culmination of much hard work and significant progress at a technical level. Both negotiating teams should be commended on achieving this result", said MEP Kelly.

"There are some legitimate problems in terms of implementing the Protocol, but nobody can deny the patient and flexible approach taken by the European Commission over the last number of years in trying to solve them. These difficulties are the predicted consequences following the hard Brexit chosen, and the approach the UK took in implementing the subsequent Brexit deal, even if some elected representatives would like you to conveniently forget their own part in it. There will be many who will seek to blame the messenger for their own political gain. But the can cannot be kicked down the road any longer", Kelly warned.

"There are some hard truths to be faced at this point and we will need to see strong and responsible political leadership within the Conservative Party and the DUP. That's why this moment is a real leadership test for Prime Minister Sunak. The Prime Minister must create a coalition of the logical, who are capable of looking beyond the immediate term, to communicate the fact based realities of the situation.

"We all want to see this agreement on the Northern Ireland Protocol become a reality in order to provide certainty to the people and businesses there. A resolution of this impasse offers the hope for the eventual return of the Northern Ireland Assembly so that the electorate may have proper representation. It is also very important economically, by offering businesses the chance to seize trading opportunities not only in terms of Northern Ireland, but also from an all-island perspective", Kelly underlined.

In the coming days, MEP Kelly looks forward to reviewing the detail of the agreement reached. "The war in Ukraine has demonstrated that the EU and UK are allies - not adversaries, and that should be the solid foundation for future EU-UK relations", he added.

## GRANTS OF UP TO €20,000 FOR TAXIS, HACKNEYS AND LIMOUSINES IN KERRY TO GO ELECTRIC

- Griffin

Agrant scheme to support the transition of taxis, hackneys and limousines in Kerry to electric vehicles has been renewed, Deputy Brendan Griffin has said.

Deputy Griffin said: "The grant offer period has been amended to be valid for up to nine months, instead of three as in previous years, providing more flexibility for Small Public Service Vehicle (SPSV) licence holders to purchase electric vehicles.

"Eligible applicants can receive up to €10,000 in grants for the purchase of a new, full battery eSPSV, with an additional €2,500 available for models that are wheelchair accessible.

"SPSV owners are eligible for double the normal grant when they scrap an older, more polluting, or high mileage vehicle and switch to electric. The grant can reach up to €20,000 for a new, fully electric SPSV, and €25,000 for a wheelchair-accessible electric vehicle.

"In addition to these grants, SPSV owners who switch to an EV can also avail of VRT relief (up to €5,000), the Domestic Charger Scheme (up to

€600), and annual toll refunds (up to €1,000). These incentives, coupled with fuel savings and lower maintenance costs, make electric models an attractive option," Deputy Griffin concluded.

Since its launch in February 2018, the Electric SPSV Grant Scheme has supported over 1,400 SPSV owners in purchasing electric vehicles. To encourage greater uptake of EVs in the sector, the Department of

Transport is funding the installation of dedicated fast-charging infrastructure for the SPSV sector at selected Irish Rail stations nationwide, in addition to maintaining reduced tolls for eSPSV drivers. These measures will improve the sustainability of journeys provided and contribute to Ireland's national emission targets.

### **COMMON EYE CONDITIONS:** REFRACTIVE ERROR

Refraction is the bending of light as it passes from one medium to another. The eve has several optical elements that, if correctly powered, focus light onto the retina at the back of the eye. However, there are four common types of refractive eve conditions where the eye is unable to correctly focus light onto the retina.

These 'refractive errors' can cause vision to be blurred, and may lead to headaches and eye strain.

#### Myopia - short sightedness

Myopia is a refractive condition of the eye where light focuses in front of the retina. This makes distant objects appear blurry, but objects that are close are clearer. If the amount of myopia is large

enough and is left uncorrected, distance vision is poor and may lead to headaches and eye strain.

#### Hyperopia – long sightedness

Hyperopia is a refractive condition of the eye where light focuses behind the retina. This makes close objects blurry, and while distant objects may appear clearer sometimes they are blurry too. If the amount of hyperopia is large

enough and is left uncorrected, close vision may be poor and may lead to headaches and eye strain, particularly in adults.

#### **Astigmatism**

Astigmatism is where the optical surfaces are shaped more like a rugby ball than a football. This means that there is not a clear single point of focus. If left uncorrected, it can also lead to headaches and eye strain.

#### Presbyopia

Presbyopia is caused by a loss of flexibility of the lens inside the eye. It affects all people as they age, generally becoming problematic after 40 years of age. Presbyopia results in the inability to focus on close objects.

Presbyopia makes it difficult to read small print, and focus on closer objects, particularly in poor light.

From a routine sight test we can recommend wearing an appropriate correction, such as reading glasses, or multifocal glasses.







If points were given out for effort, the Scotts Lakers would definitely be at the top of the queue after this one. Their second trip to Dublin in consecutive weeks and once again they gave all they could. This time it was almost enough but the Lions roared when it mattered most in the final minutes as they steamed past a tired Lakers side who really couldn't give any more. The opening four minutes were evenly matched, Eoin Carroll and Saravia matching Righ Dau and Tiernan Howe exploits. Carroll and Jack Ferguson swapped scores with Harvey Killeen and Laurence Caffrey before Rui Saravia and Ferguson and Jamie O Sullivan with threes helped the Lakers into a 22-15 lead. In an even scoring spread for the Lakers Jack Fergsuon had 22, Senan O Leary (18), Eoin Carroll (18), Rui Saravia (17), Mark Sheehan (9), Jamie O Sullivan (3), Oisin Spring.

Righ Dau was top of the charts for the Lions with 36 points, Tiernan Howe shot 17, Cian Tiernan (15) and Laurence Caffrey netted 11. The Lakers return home this weekend with a double header of fixtures. On Friday night at 8.15 in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre Portlaoise Panthers are the visitors. They have only six wins in the league but they are one of the form horses at the moment winning three of the last four matches. Their top scorer this season has been Indiana University Kokomo graduate Desean Hampton who lines up alongside old reliables Gary Morrissey and Sean Condon.

On Saturday night, again in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre, but at the earlier time of 7.30, the University of Ulster will be looking to cement their play off spot. Having captured the National Cup earlier this year they are full of confidence and have Corkonian Conor O Sullivan in their ranks. He is currently studying at the University and is a former underage star with the famed Neptune Club in Cork. They also boast Nate Shafer who has plenty of experience having previously played with SETU Carlow.

This top of the table clash certainly lived up to its pre match billing as the two sides went toe to toe and in the end it took a massive three pointer from Alarie Mayze to eventually settle the outcome. That pivotal score came with 1.55 still to go in that second period of overtime and St Pauls had opportunities to tie or even win the game but efforts from the impressive Sofia Paska and the hard working Denise Dunlea came agonisingly short. ## LATE HEARTBREAK AS SEM'S HOGAN HOPES ARE DASHED

Hogan Cup Semi-Final: Summerhill College (Sligo) 2-11 St. Brendans Killarney 1-11

An old saying has it that a journey of a thousand miles begins with just a few steps. Last Saturday in Tuam a long and rollercoaster journey by the footballers of St. Brendans Killarney ended in a matter of inches. The team gave a tremendous performance against the Connaught champions, hitting the crossbar twice, the post another two times, and clocking up fourteen wides in a cracking game, but ultimately returning home empty-handed. Such are the vagaries of colleges football at this level!

Summerhill served early notice of their intentions, with Shea O'Neill claiming a great mark and putting them in front before the second minute had elapsed. The Sem's response was even more emphatic, Luke Crowley chasing back what looked like a lost ball and forcing a brilliant turnover. A quick pass to Timmy Moynihan and in to the lurking Alex Hennigan, and the keeper had no chance. 1-1 to 0-1. Then it all started to go wrong. Alex Hennigan finally ended the Sem's 21 minute wait for a score, neatly clipping over. The same player crossed to Callum Cronin for a good chance, but his rocket came back off the crossbar with the keeper beaten. Fine margins indeed!

Aodhán O'Neill had a chance at the start of the second half, but his shot trailed just wide. It was the Sem's eighth wide, whereas Summerhill had only left one scoring chance behind them. A tough one for the Sem, especially so with the chances they left behind them, but in fairness they gave it absolutely everything along the way and it took a great team to beat them.



National League: Kerry 0-12 Armagh 0-10 Some days it's all about winning ugly. Spade work rather than craftsmanship. Kerry aren't up to top speed yet, we all know that, and realistically we needed to win here to avoid being drawn into a relegation dogfight. We



aren't out of the woods yet, but this is a big step closer to safety, which quite frankly is all I want from the National League. The tightness of the split season fixtures means that I don't think any Division One team really wants the hassle of a League Final. The crowds may be bigger, a lot bigger, but the National League is still a warm-up competition in real terms. Those medals aren't hard currency.

Speaking of the big crowds.....look, I'm just going to poke the hornet's nest here. Austin Stack Park is a fine stadium with a wonderful history. But it simply isn't designed and was never intended to host games of this magnitude. Parking is a huge issue. The game had to be put back ten minutes, and it wasn't that people were holding on in the pub for the last sup of a pint; it's because they were looking for somewhere to leave the car. Having the Kerry hurlers, who are mostly based closer to Tralee (13 of Kerry's starting fifteen against Offaly attended Causeway Comp.) and don't draw the same size crowds, in the Fitzgerald Stadium and the Kerry footballers in Austin Stack Park for a crunch game makes no sense to me

To be honest, those are small enough things that won't live long in the memory. Unfortunately, nor will this game. This was a rough, ugly game of football. You'd want eyes in the back of your head to see all the off the ball stuff. If I was a player, I'd want eyes on the back of my helmet; that's the kind of game it was. And I'm not saying that Kerry were innocent, or that it isn't a physical game. But too many people interpret 'dirty' as 'physical'. It's not the same thing at all. I do think that Kerry were a lot more sinned against than sinning, but either way, it didn't help the quality of the football.

Bitter cold as well, by the way. Arrah, don't mind me; I'm just cranky.

Jarly Óg Burns had a stormer and went very close early on. Adrian Spillane made a very welcome return to the fold, adding presence and muscle to our midfield. Stefan Okunbor was another to shine very brightly, having started instead of Pa Warren. He may not have the silkiest skills out there, but his energy and work-rate was ferocious. In a different context to Marlon Brando, this guy really could be a contender. He made the GAA Team of the Week. Dara Moynihan was chosen as man of

the match, a real trench warrior.

Adrian won an early free converted by David Clifford. Jarly Óg equalised from long distance. Darragh Roche looked lively early on and picked off a nice score. Paudie Clifford added another.

Still, it worked on this occasion, with Rafferty winning a free and Rian O'Neill kicking a fantastic point off it.

Good inter-play between Tadhg Morley and David Clifford set up Barry Dan O'Sullivan, who showed great technique to get the shot off in tight space. Good score. David Clifford got a hard bang to the face after getting the pass away and needed treatment. Inexplicably, the referee decided after consultation with the umpire to book himself and Aidan Forker. Either I missed something (being fair, that's always a very real possibility), or David was sanctioned for...attacking Aidan Forker's arm with his face? ## PLANTING A COLOURFUL FLOWER BOWL

When planting a colourful flower bowl, choose your bowl from either terracotta or plastic but make sure to get a saucer underneath when purchasing. Then put some gravel around the base surrounding the hole and add compost mixed with slow release fortilizer.

Fill your bowl to about one inch from the top as this will make it easier when watering afterwards. When choosing the plants start with the centre piece. An ideal plant for this would be an evergreen grass. This is an ideal plant as when you are finished with the bowl, the evergreen grass can be planted outdoors.

There are a huge range of plants with colour to fill around the centre piece. Some of the most popular to choose from are trailing variegated ivys, heathers in flower, primroses, polyanthus, forget-me-nots and you will also still be able to get some potted daffodils and tulios.

When finished planting, make sure to water the plants well, and if you decide to keep the flower bowl indoors make sure that the saucer is underneath. Keep the finished bowl in as much light as possible and this will flower well into the time for Summer bedding.

As certain flowers go off before others, dont be afraid to remove them as this will keep your bowl looking good for longer.


Welcome back dear student "....live in harmony with each other" (Romans 12:16). Think about what a beautiful word 'harmony' is. Here it alludes to 'having the same mind' or to 'cherish the same thing'. When a practised group of singers come together the various harmonies each voice brings can take a song from the ordinary to sublime. It's the same in God's family. Each one of us is a vital member of the body of Christ (Romans 12:4-5). As such we are representing our Father in Heaven as His Kingdom ambassadors (2 Corinthians 5:20). What does the Kingdom of Heaven look like? Because that's what its ambassadors need to reflect. We may be surrounded by sin and evil in this world, but none of that exists in God's Presence, so it shouldn't exist in His children either. One of the ways the devil takes territory is when the body of Christ are in competition with each other, pointing the finger of accusation which fosters strife causing division. And Jesus said 'a house divided cannot stand' (Matthew 12:25). Instead of criticism God desires that His children reflect His nature - which is Love. "Dear friends, let us continue to love one another, for love comes from God. Anyone who loves is a child of God and knows God. But anyone who does not love does not know God for God is Love" (1 John 4:7-8). The Lord Jesus told His disciples that one thing would reveal a true follower of Jesus - the love we demonstrate for one another (John 13:35).

Lots of very sincere people are fasting right now and that's great. Jesus told us to fast and pray (Matthew 6:5-18). But sometimes it's much easier to fast from certain foods or meals than it is to fast from negative behaviours or habits such as jealousy, strife, gossip, fear and anger. It's not enough to fast - you need to fill the gap with something else for meaningful change. For example, if you know you need to fast from criticism, anger and offence, then to see real transformation you must focus upon Love. Look for the good in that person or situation, and refuse to believe the worst. Study God's Word - find the Scriptures on Love, and allow Him to heal your heart and mindset. Pray for those you are angry at - for their happiness and peace. In some cases private prayer is all you will ever be able to do, because there are some people with whom it's impossible to get along with. And that's ok once you recognise it, but - keep a right heart towards them (Romans 12:17-21).



It's pointless clearing overgrowth only to let weeds take over again. This is what love does. "The end of all things is near. Therefore be clear-minded and sober, so that you can pray. Above all, love one another deeply, because Love covers over a multitude of sins" (1 Peter 4:7-8). When we truly learn to love the things that people do or say will just roll off like water off a ducks back. Is it easy? NO! But it is possible - 'for with God all things are possible' and there is great reward when our faith is tested (Matthew 19:26; Hebrews 11:6). So 'overcome evil with good'
