he iconic Atlantic Puffins are currently departing in their droves, which seems to be earlier than previous years from Skellig Michael, (Sceilg Mhichil) - 6th century Monastic Island 12 Km, off the coast of Kerry. Maybe they arrived earlier this year and successfully bred on the UNESCO Heritage Site. Typically in April, thousands of puffin return to Scellig Michael, to breed. Puffin nest sites are found in burrows or in cracks and crevices across the island which offers protection from avian predators. This year fish is in abundant supply, with plenty of adorable puffins recorded this season. Whatever the weather - NPWS staff have closely monitored this seabird colony. 

## Kerry Abú for Jack and Jill!



### HSE National Ambulance Service (NAS) Launches Pathfinder

The HSE National Ambulance Service in collaboration with University Hospital Kerry – South South West Hospital Group, is delighted to announce the official launch today Wed 2nd August 2023 of its patient orientated service called Pathfinder. The Pathfinder service which goes live today, is designed to safely keep older people who phone 112/999 in their own home rather than taking them to a hospital emergency department. Pathfinder improves outcomes for older people by providing safe alternative care at home rather than in hospital and will be provided by National Ambulance Service staff working with colleagues from University Hospital Kerry.

#### How the Pathfinder Service works:

The Pathfinder 'Rapid Response Team' respond to 999/112 calls for older people (65 years and older) in their homes. This may be someone for instance after a fall or who is generally unwell. The older person is assessed by both an Advanced Paramedic and Occupational Therapist/ Physiotherapist. Where safe, the team supports the older person at home rather than transporting them to emergency department, by linking with a wide range of alternative hospital and community services. Pathfinder also operates a 'Follow-Up Team' (Physiotherapy & Occupational Therapy) which provides immediate home-based rehabilitation, equipment

> provision and case-management in the subsequent days following a 999/112 call. The service will operate in Kerry from 8am to 8pm Monday to Friday, excluding Bank Holidays. In addition, the Advanced Paramedics for Pathfinder will operate on Saturday and Sunday for Follow Ups, Catheterisation and Advanced Life Support.

> Pathfinder has been working as a collaborative service between the NAS and Dublin's Beaumont Hospital Occupational Therapy & Physiotherapy Departments for more than two years and has now also expanded to operate in Limerick, Tallaght, Waterford, Kilkenny and Cork. On average two thirds of patients seen by Pathfinder following a 999 call have remained at home rather than being brought to the Emergency Department.

## Rossbeigh Under Constant Pressure from Erosion

The beautiful sand dunes at Rossbeigh Beach are under constant pressure from erosion and a survey of Castlemaine Harbour is eagerly awaited to see what plans are afoot to remedy the situation, according to local Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill. "The dunes in Rossbeigh have been breached on a number of occasions in recent years by the Atlantic Ocean, and further breaches will occur if steps are not taken to protect them and to protect homes all along the coast from Kells through Incherea, Dooks, and Cromane. The residents of these areas deserve to know when works will start to protect their homes and the general public deserve to know if Rossbeigh Sand-dunes are going to be totally wiped out by the tide" stated Councillor Cahill. "The survey of Castlemaine Harbour, which I have been calling for some time now, needs to be completed now as it appears to be dragging on. We need answers to what has been found and we need to know what plans are proposed to save our homes and our beach from the elements" said Councillor Cahill.

"I will be putting down another Notice of Motion to Kerry County Council to clarify with those carrying out this survey, what the hold up is, get this project up and running and put some defences in place along our coastline" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Many residents in Rossbeigh, Cromane and all along the Castlemaine Harbour Coastline can not sleep at night for fear of their homes being flooded and this must be addressed" added Councillor Cahill.

### **BUSY TIMES FOR KERRY MOUNTAIN RESCUE TEAM**



Kerry Mountain Rescue Team Were tasked to three callouts on Saturday 29th July, Corrán Tuathail, Hags Glen.

he team was tasked along with R115 at 13.30 to an incident involving a man in his twenties who had sustained serious injuries in a fall near the summit of Corrán Tuathail. R115 heli dropped team members and equipment to the top of the Devil's Ladder from where they were able to reach the scene of the incident swiftly. Having treated the casualty for his injuries, team members stretchered him down to the top of the Ladder for handover to the heli crew and subsequent transfer to UHK.

As this callout was concluding, news emerged of a female hillwalker in distress above Coimín Uachtar near Br. O'Sheas gully. The casualty was initially aided by a passing hiker before team members arrived at Loch Coimín Uachtar and short roped her to safety and an awaiting team vehicle at Ard na Locha.

While this casualty was being transported out the glen, another call for assistance was received after another hillwalker had fallen and sustained suspected wrist fractures while descending between the bottom of the ZigZags and Ard na Locha. Remaining team members in the area proceeded to the scene, treated the casualty for her injuries and short-roped her to the team command vehicle at Ard na Locha. The callouts concluded at approximately 19.30 and involved 22 members of the team.

#### RAIL PLANS - TIME TO LINK AIRPORT AND STATION IN KERRY

Just a short week after the 'railroaded' piece in this column outlining our poor rail and road system - we have fewer rail lines than Victorian times and the roads are not great either - out comes Ireland's first All-Island Strategic Rail Review. It recommends new and enhanced routes, 'greater regional balance' and improved speeds and frequency.

It also wants to upgrade the cross-country rail network to a dual-track railway (and four-track in places).

You'd think we knew! Then again, maybe it's the other way around. And perhaps it is not just Minister Simon Harris who reads the Killarney Outlook!

In any case, the rail plan promises to be an interesting document. I just hope it is not like the Shannon LNG and other strategic infrastructure proposals. I sat through the presentation at Kerry County Council recently on the latest Shannon estuary plan and I cannot get too excited. Nothing wrong with the vision. Or the document. But this is the third such plan in my career alone and nothing has come of any of them. In fact, people like me should be consulted at this stage because we have spotted a pattern: huge initial burst of enthusiasm followed by long-drawn fizzle out. The push that is needed of course is not local, but international. And the lack of push from outside Ireland, either from the US or the EU is the key to the stalemate between Tarbert and Ballylongford over decades.

But back to the rail - local lobbying here should count because the new vision for rail already has the rubber stamp of the EU alongside NI and a chastened UK after Brexit.

Therefore, those "linked" to Ireland will all want to be seen to push greater rail links.

I can't see anything specific to Kerry in the programme. But there is an overall commitment to increase the rail line network, so there is an open door for us. Today, the island of Ireland has about 2,300 km (1,440 miles) of public rail lines. This would increase to 2,950 km (1,845 miles).

A shortcstep in the right direction would be the link between the airport and the rail at Farranfore. So, could we have the mile or so it would take to link Farranfore Railway with

#### KILLARNEY HOTELS -FULL OF HIDDEN HISTORY

Last week, the five-star Muckross Park Hotel marked the birthday of former guest, the writer George Bernard Shaw.

The 167th birthday was 'framed' with an unveiling of a 167 cm portrait - -A unique palette knife oil painting by Co. Donegal artist Mark McFadden Crafted meticulously, the portrait took over a year and is a tribute to Shaw, who is strongly suggested to have written the world-famous play Pygmalion during his many visits to Killarney.

"Shaw is one of only two people to have been awarded a Nobel Prize in Literature in 1925 and an Academy Award in 1938," Mark McFadden said.

McFadden's portrait, which involved lots of research is for sale for a few thousand short of  $\notin$ 70,000. But there are also limited edition

It's a phenomenon I have noticed all this year: we have more rainbows. I have never seen so many and I have been looking up what this might signify. Apparently, new research, conducted in Hawaii last year suggests climate change is bringing about more rainbows in our part of the world - and they are a sign of more rain.

Northern latitudes and very high elevations, where warming is predicted to lead to less snow and more rain, will experience the greatest gains in rainbow occurrence. However, places with reduced rainfall under climate change – such as the Mediterranean – are projected to lose rainbow days. prints for sale. Just how much of Shaw's worldfamous work Pygmalion (It evolved into My Fair Lady,' starring Rex Harrison and Audrey Hepburn), was actually written in the hotel is not known. Shaw spent "numerous" summer evenings reading and writing in the gardens and also apparently relishing the cosy ambience of the bar now known as 'The Monk's Lounge'.

"Shaw and his wife Charlotte Payne Townsend certainly stayed at the hotel on several occasions, and there are strong indications that parts of Pygmalion were written here," said Garrett Power, General Manager.

This got me thinking about how many Kerry hotels, the old hotels, in particular have hidden history up their sleeves and maybe it is time for a guide to Kerry's historic hotels?

The Great Southerns, before they were sold off by the State, published one or two guides to their hotels, including to Parknasilla which once welcomed De Gaulle.

But there are other overlooked literary hotels, especially. I recall reading Virgina Woolf's accounts of her stay at the old Glenbeigh Hotel for instance.

I wonder does this also mean we will find more pots of gold? Rainbows were a rare enough thing until recently and often taken to be a sign of good fortune. I rely on my old school copies from the 1930s and on the Dúchas.ie site for this weather lore which comes from Co.Galway:

'Southern rainbows are a sign of wild wet weather but to see a rainbow anywhere north is a good sign.'

And this one from Co. Mayo is probably the most accurate of all - 100 years ago is saying more or less the same as the scientists in Hawaii: 'If you see two rainbows at once we will have rain soon'.

A new bus route will improve connectivity between Waterville and Killarney.



**T**FI Local Link Kerry has recently launched a new bus route, which will improve connectivity between Waterville and Killarney.

This new route is part of the Connecting Ireland Rural Mobility Plan which is a major national public transport initiative developed and funded by the National Transport Authority (NTA) as part of the Transport for Ireland (TFI) Network.

Route 280 will operate seven daily return services Monday to Sunday between Waterville and Killorglin, which includes three daily return trips between Waterville and Killarney. The new route will provide a peak-time service for commuters as well as improved connectivity to rail services in Killarney and regional bus services in Kilorglin.

The route from Waterville to Killarney will offer enhanced connectivity to villages and areas such as Cahersiveen, Kells, Glenbeigh, Kilorglin and Beaufort.

Route 280, is part of a planned phased roll out this summer of new and enhanced TFI Local Link bus services in Co. Kerry, which when used together, will allow passengers to connect in Waterville to travel around the Iveragh Peninsula, all year round.

## PROGRAMME TO FOCUS ON **€2.9M UPGRADED BLASKET CENTRE**

The  $\in 2.9$  million upgrade of the Blasket Centre and many personal links with the island will be discussed on the Saturday Supplement on Radio Kerry on next Saturday August 5 from 9 to 11.

Centre manager Lorcan O Cinneide guides broadcaster Frank Lewis around what is now being described as the finest interpretative centre of its kind in the country.

Blasket Island Centre guide Tomas O Luing quotes Tomas O Criomthain comparing the great black-backed gull swooping to eat the fledgling guillemot chick and the Blasket fisherman catching pollock – both wanting to fill their bellies. By a large portrait of Muiris O Suilleabhain Centre guide Conall O Ciobhain remembers Muiris' many adventures in 'Twenty Years Agrowing' – climbing down the cliffs at Ceann Dubh to catch puffins for the pot.

In front of a large scale interactive wall map, showing the six Blasket islands and the nearby mainland, Conall said for much of the winter islanders survived on salted fish, some vegetables, birds, seal – which tasted like pork - "I'm sure they would have eaten anything to survive because that was the world back then." 'Flour, meat, tea, sugar, jam, butter, shoes for the boys, a dress or a bib for the girls, shoes for the old ladies, a present of some kind for everybody in the house' at the portrait of Peig Sayers Centre guide Seili Ann Ni Loinsigh read Peig's listing of the islanders provisions for Christmas. In the Blasket Centre gallery on emigration and evacuation 'Maire wrote to her aunt for the passage money' Muiris O Suilleabhain records in Twenty Years Agrowing. In 'Letters from the Great Blasket' Eilis Ni Shuilleabhain tells of an old woman 'her children are all in America.. imagine her sitting in the corner alone in her house where her grandchildren should be playing.'

Standing by a large portrait of Tomas O Criomthian, looking out on a life-sized statue of Tomas, Tomas O Luing reads the start of The Islandman by O Criomthain 'I can recall being at my mother's breast for I was four years old before I was weaned. I am the scrapings of the pot the last of the litter. That's why I was left so long at the breast.'The Library at the Blasket Centre has a large collection of material on the genealogy of Blasket islanders. Librarian Muireann Ni Chearna also tells of a large collection of Blasket island material bought from Raidio Na Gaeltachta. The library has all of the books written by islanders and the other publications written on the island.

"In the early 19th century people were reaching out for places where they could live, like the Blaskets, because they were evicted. There was hardly anyone living on the island until the 1750s.

The population of Ireland increased exponentially from then. There was nice green land on the island." Blasket Centre Manager for 22 years Micheal de Mordha guoted from his definitive history of the island standing in the Centre's glass conservatory looking out on the Blaskets "Using thoroughly modern technology but age old techniques de Buitlear has depicted island life in a sumptuously colourful and jaw droppingly beautiful" five huge panels - each circa 5mx2.5m - in the stained glass wall at the entrance to the Blasket Centre writes Finola Finlay. On the Saturday Supplement on Radio Kerry from 9 until 11am on Saturday August 5 Frank Lewis visits the Blasket Centre which is open daily from 10 until 5 until the 20th of November.

## **NEW DOCUMENTARY** ON DEVASTATION OF THE HAEMOPHILIA COMMUNITY in the 1980s



A new radio documentary from Kerry producer 'Tainted Blood' lays bare the devastating impact of infected blood products on the Irish Haemophilia Community and is set to air on on Newstalk on Sunday 6th August at 7am.

In 1982 the first case of HIV was recorded in Ireland. By 1985 all people with haemophilia were being tested for the disease. More than one third of them were found to be HIV positive having contracted the disease through infected blood products that were made up of pooled plasma from thousands of donors, much of which had been imported.

At this time there was little or no government response to HIV. Support groups for those affected by the crisis such as the gay and haemophiliac communities were essentially left to deal with this crisis on their own.

This new documentary by Killarney native Kelly Crichton, 'Tainted Blood', is set to air on Documentary on Newstalk on Sunday 6th August at 7am and shares the heartbreaking story of how this community was plunged into desperation and the actions that had to be taken to secure justice. Another Kerry creative Grainne McPolin was consultant producer on the documentary.

Colm Walsh, who has haemophilia, features on the documentary. As a child Colm and his older brother Brendan were treated with the same blood products and, by some cruel twist of fate, Brendan contracted HIV and eventually died of AIDs. Colm did not, but sadly did contract Hepatitis C, another disease which ravaged the haemophilia community in the late 80s as a result of infected blood products.

Colm shares his remarkable story on the documentary, he said, "Despite the fact this happened over 40 years ago some of us are still living with this grief. Not only the grief of losing our loved ones, but for how we were treated and for the lengths we had to go to for the injustice against our community to be acknowledged. This documentary is an important piece of work that shares the heartbreak and distress we went through. We have many reasons for hope today but we can never forget what happened because it can never be allowed to happen again."

Another key voice in the documentary is Brian O'Mahony, Chief Executive of the Irish Haemophilia Society, which became a significant support network, lobbying on behalf of people with haemophilia and their families (which eventually contributed to the collapse of the Irish government in 1989). They set up services to care for the dying, at a time when there was significant stigma associated with the diseases of HIV and AIDs. The documentary shares stories of the torment and shame experienced by those who contracted HIV and AIDs as well as their families, and how, in many cases, they never shared their diagnosis owing to this stigma.

Brian said, "It was like going through a war, it was a cumulative trauma to the whole community. It brought our members very close together



and despite the huge number of deaths our community is hugely resilient. This story is one that everyone in Ireland should know because we can never let anything like this ever happen again. That message has been a big part of our ethos since we first became aware of the plight of so many of our members.

"We were a tiny, volunteer-run organisation before this crisis and now, following years of trauma and campaigning we can proudly say we have one of the best haemophilia treatment systems in the world. Out of the darkness has come some light. I would encourage anyone to take the time to listen to this documentary and understand what happened to our community because all those deaths cannot be in vain."

Kelly Crichton, documentary maker, said "I was incredibly moved when I first encountered these stories and knew there was a whole generation of Irish people out there who would know nothing or very little about this. I wanted to share this story because it's hard to fathom just how abandoned this community was and yet, in banding together they overcame so much.

"The Irish Haemophilia Society went above and beyond in their support - risking prosecution by handing out condoms to members, which were illegal at the time. They set up palliative care and worked with undertaker services because of the stigma and protocols associated with death of those infected with HIV or AIDs. Families could then follow traditional funeral arrangements without the fear of their loved one being outed as a HIV and AIDs victim. It truly beggars belief what they had to go through without government support.

"I'd like to thank everyone who I spoke to for the documentary. These are some of the bravest people I have ever met and it was a privilege to record their stories."

Other voices from the haemophilia community share the heartache, shame, stigma, fear and hurt they experienced. It is a story of fear, isolation, empathy, heart-breaking selflessness and triumph through adversity.

'Tainted Blood' will air on Documentary on Newstalk on Sunday 6th August at 7am and Saturday 12th August at 9pm. It will also be available to listen to as a podcast.

The documentary was funded by the Broadcasting Authority of Ireland with the television licence fee.

## Hotel Pays Tribute to George Bernard Shaw

Ireland's Muckross Park Hotel & Spa in Killarney has celebrated the life of legendary playwright George Bernard Shaw on his 167th birthday.

A unique palette knife oil painting of George Bernard Shaw, by Co. Donegal artist Mark McFadden, was unveiled at the Muckross Park Hotel & Spa in Ireland to commemorate the playwright's 167th anniversary.

Crafted over a 12-month period and standing at an impressive 5 feet 6 inches tall, (167cm), the piece was carefully brought to life by selftaught artist McFadden, who hails from the small Irish-speaking Gaeltacht town of Falcarragh in north-west Co. Donegal. The painting is a tribute to Bernard Shaw, who was born in Portobello, Dublin on July 26th, 1856, and who is strongly suggested to have written the world-famous play Pygmalion at Muckross Park in the picturesque town of Killarney - capital of the ancient Kingdom of Kerry.

"Shaw is one of only two people to have been awarded a Nobel Prize in Literature in 1925 and an Academy Award in 1938," Mark McFadden said. "A triumph at the Oscars for an adapted screenplay of his play Pygmalion was a personal victory of immense significance. Thus, he remains an enduringly inspiring and legendary figure, not only to me, but also for future generations." Master of palette knife oil painting, McFadden

employs a distinctive colourful and textured layering technique which has catapulted his work into the private collections of Monaco's Prince Albert - the son of Princess Grace Kelly singer Julian Lennon, and the Levett Family Trust. McFadden's portrait of Irish writer James Joyce – part of his Irish Literary Greats collection – was sold to Prince Albert of Monaco. His eye-catching 6 feet 6 inches, (200cm), portrait of Oscar Wilde has also been acquired by private collectors. The series includes the likes of Behan, Yeats, Kavanagh, Kerry's own John B. Keane and many more. The inclusion of Bernard Shaw brings the collection to an end, as it takes up residence at Muckross Park from July 26th.




The C Final will see Donegal up against Waterford, and that fixture will have a 2.30pm start in Kinnegad.

## VOLUNTEER MEDICAL RESPONDERS TO JOIN CRITICAL CHARITY NATIONWIDE



CRITICAL, the emergency medical response charity, has announced a partnership with the National Ambulance Service (NAS) that will see NAS Staff Off-Duty Responders being able to volunteer with the charity whilst responding to potentially life-threatening emergencies in their local communities.

As part of the partnership, CRITICAL will provide vital equipment to off-duty EMTs, paramedics and advanced paramedics who are tasked to incidents such as road traffic collisions, cardiac arrests, farming accidents and other medical or traumatic accidents. They will respond to these taskings as part of the NAS Staff Off Duty Response Scheme which has been in operation for almost 20 years. It will cost the charity €1,500 to equip each volunteer, all of which is being funded by CRITICAL. Each responder will be provided with an Emergency Backpack containing a defibrillator, a resuscitation kit and a medical diagnostic kit.

Working closely with the National Ambulance Service, CRITICAL is now focused on establishing a network of Volunteer Emergency Medical Responders in every county in Ireland over the next two years.

Micheál Sheridan, CEO of CRITICAL said, "Community-based and medically trained first responders are an integral part of how we as a society respond to emergencies and traumatic accidents. This partnership with the

National Ambulance Service will initially see 150 off-duty NAS personnel also volunteering with CRITICAL, starting treatment while an ambulance is on its way and increasing a person's chances of survival or improving their outcomes. Every second counts in medical emergencies. For example, in the case of cardiac arrest, a person's chances of survival decrease by 10% for every minute that elapses. Initially, we are committing €220,000 in rolling out volunteer Emergency Medical Responders to communities across Ireland. Every cent that we spend on advancing a communitybased response to medical emergencies has to be fundraised or donated. We rely 100% on fundraising to achieve our mission 'To Save Lives'.

CRITICAL already has a strong network of Volunteer Emergency Medicine Doctors in Mayo, Donegal, Dublin, Wicklow and Waterford and will be expanding to additional locations in the coming months. These are physicians and consultants with experience in Emergency Medicine or anaesthesiology and General Practitioners with an interest in Pre-hospital care. They have been tasked to more than 1,800 calls by the National Ambulance Service over the last two years.

The charity needs to fundraise to kit out its volunteers so they can continue their life saving work. It costs the charity  $\leq$ 1,500 to establish a new Emergency Medical Responder in a community. The cost to establish an Advanced or Critical Care Volunteer Doctor in the community can be between  $\leq$ 25,000 and  $\leq$ 120,000.

The Killarney Cardia Response Unit is a vital service in Killarney and surrounding areas.

The Killarney Cardiac Response Unit is a voluntary Unit of approximately 40 volunteers, from all sectors of society, who respond to 999/112 emergency Cardiac Phone calls. We are activated once a Cardiac call is made to Ambulance control and cover an area of 6km from the center of Killarney Town.

The Responders have a Pager/Radio on them which is linked in with a control phone through the National Ambulance Service. They work alongside and under the control of the National Ambulance Service by providing care and utilising those vital few minutes as every second counts, until The National Ambulance Service arrive on scene.

An out of Hospital Cardiac arrest has the worst possible outcome for survival, mainly because resuscitation is often delayed or not given. It is Vital that resuscitation is started as soon as possible following a cardiac arrest.

## Life as a Farmer -Work to Live or Live to Work

#### A Chara,

My husband loved his job when he was younger but it gets harder and harder everyday so now it is like the saying live to work or WORK TO LIVE. Him having covid a few times has not helped.

Why would the next generation want to go dairy farming - Long hours, everyday, 7 days a week and 365 days a year in all weather. There are no paid holidays, sick days, no parental leave, no days off (like some jobs) in lieu of attending course days which are compulsory, no team building days, no Christmas breaks, no Saturday and Sunday lazy mornings or weekend breaks, no human company as working alone most of the time, no chats on a Monday morning catching up on everybody's weekend activities. You may meet the milk lorry driver or the Postman sometimes. The day starts at 7.30am everyday and you don't finish until 8pm 'ish' and sometimes much later (remember NO days off). In the busy season during calving you get up during the night and sometimes this can be a few times to check on the expectant moms, during silage season you start even earlier and go to bed much much later and still no days off.

Anything can happen at any time with the animals so you never know how your day will turn out. There is no team around you to share the workload. We have made plans with friends and last minute have had to cancel due to some emergency. Not everybody understands we cannot just lock up and walk away and say we'll deal with it tomorrow. There is lots of admin - form filling and online work for the Department of Agriculture. There is time getting ready for inspections, pricing feed and other necessities. There are HUGE costs involved. Everything (animal feed, fertiliser, diesel, electricity, insurance, water charges etc etc etc etc) has increased in price to keep the show on the road but income is not increasing accordingly.

If you are sick you have to keep going doing the bare workload and then when you get better you have to do all the catchup work so you never win. To get somebody to cover you when you have to go somewhere (eg. medical appointment, funeral or the odd wedding, or when you may like to take a rare break - very rare - costs a huge amount for the bare jobs that HAVE to be done and none of the extra jobs (remember NO paid annual leave!!!). That is IF you can even get somebody to come as not many relief workers available and those that are there are usually overbooked.

I often think I would love if we could do one of those programmes where you swap lives with some other family and live their life for a week or two. It would be a shock to some people. For us anything would be a break. My hubby would not know how to stop after 39 hours. He has this number of hours done in just a little over three days. Am I painting a good picture of farming? Doesn't it just sound like you would be living the dream? Work to live or live to work?

As someone who has been diagnosed with advanced breast cancer, I am writing to draw the attention of your readers to a survey of women in a similar position to myself, with the aim of improving the services and supports available.

Supported by Cancer Trials Ireland, the survey is seeking the views of women whose breast cancer has spread, also known as metastatic or stage 4 breast cancer, on their cancer journey experiences.

When it comes to a diagnosis of cancer, there can be so many questions, from "how serious is my diagnosis?" to "how do I tell the kids?". Unfortunately, answers to such questions and access to information often isn't so straightforward. This survey will help determine a range of recommendations to help address these gaps. The survey covers various topics, from discussions with medical teams to conversations with family and children, from sexuality and fertility issues to financial stresses, from coping with mental health challenges to engaging with palliative care.

I would encourage as many women who find themselves in these circumstances to take part so that we can get as comprehensive a view as possible as to what they have encountered.

Thanks to advances in treatments, we are living longer. We need to ensure that health and psychosocial services are adapting to support us, and to make life that little bit better for those who may follow in our footsteps.

## DIABETIC RETINOPATHY

Diabetic retinopathy is a : • have high blood pressure complication of diabetes. It's caused by high blood sugar levels damaging the back of the eye (retina). It can cause blindness if left undiagnosed and untreated.

The retina needs a constant supply of blood. It receives this through a network of tiny blood vessels. Over time, a high blood sugar level can damage these blood vessels in 3 main stages:



The decider was another tight affair between two players who played together in the doubles in Kerry's National U16 Inter-County team win last year. A Jay had led by one after the first 18 holes of the 36 hole match but Brian stole a march in the middle of the second round in going three ahead. He went on to record a 2&1 win to become not only Kerry and Deerpark's first winner of this event but also create a personal family milestone.

19 years ago his father Derry won the 2004 National Mens Matchplay decider on home turf in Deerpark and interestingly that was the closest time until last Sunday that we came to an all Kerry National Matchplay final as Tralee's Jason O'Regan was defeated in the semi-finals on the other side of the draw that year. We also very nearly had a second all Kerry final last Sunday in the Boys Plate event.

Deerpark's Ronan Bennett followed on from

Nathan Cronin's win in this event last year with a 2&1 win over Westmeath's Billy Buckley in the decider. Ronan had a big 10&8 win over Gowran's Eoghan Morrissey in the semi-final as Listowel's Daniel Leahy went to seven playoffs holes with Buckley in determining a winner of their semi-final before Buckley won at the 43rd hole of play. Gavin Carroll was next on eight under as the final two senior spots were claimed by Castleisland's Aidan O'Connor and Jake Shine with seven under. In the Intermediates Daniel Broderick Jnr and John Fitzgerald lead the way on seven under on their home course as Deerpark's Erin Moloney was next on six under par. Listowel's Bobby McCarron and Tralee's Keith O'Brien were next on five par as Padraig Hobbart shot three under par with another Tralee player Michael Creagh on one under par. Deerpark's James Fleming and Listowel's Ger Guerin claimed the final spots on offer here with level par.

In the Junior A John Clifton from the host club led the way on three under par, Mark O'Shea from Deerpark had two under while both Tralee's David Hobbert and Alan O'Connor shot one under par. Jerry Lee from Tralee was the county's sole Junior B qualifier meanwhile with 10 over par.

LATE HEARTBREAK AS DUBLIN SURGE TO VICTORY All Ireland Final: Dublin 1-15 Kerry 1-13

There is nothing that can be said the morning after a losing All Ireland Final. Of course we are proud of this team and these players. How could you not be? Incredible talent allied to honesty of effort. There was no stone left unturned. The same is true of the backroom team. Kerry came within inches of toppling Dublin for a second year in a row. Be honest - expectations in Kerry always run a little bit higher than everywhere else (our history demands it), but anybody suggesting that Jack O'Connor et al would win one All Ireland and lose another within two years of taking the helm would have snapped your hand off at it. Kerry did nothing wrong here. In fact, our defensive match-ups were impeccable. Midfield was a bit of a problem area, we had to switch to short kick-outs soon enough, but there's no midfield out there that's going to thrive against Fenton, McCarthy, and Howard.

I'm glad to say that I haven't heard much guff about the referee after the game. David Gough was outstanding. If referees could get the man of the match award, he would have been in the discussion. For me, there were four slightly guestionable decisions, and two of those went our way. Dublin could and should have had a scorable free in the first half in the 15th minute and I thought David got a soft enough free in for our last score, I suspect that it looked like far more contact than actually happened. That said, I thought that Cormac Costello should have been booked early in the second half and I thought James McCarthy, while having a fine game overall, should definitely have been booked early on for dangerous head challenges. Had that happened, he would either have walked later on or had to temper his influence on the play. But look, those are tiny margins; ultimately the better team won

and it wasn't through luck and it wasn't because of refereeing errors. For me, Gough made four slightly questionable decisions out of around a thousand (don't just consider all the times he blew the whistle, add in all the times that he had to think about it but didn't). One of the very few things that disappointed me was Kerry supporters booing the referee during the presentation. Part of our long tradition is dignity in defeat and no pettiness, so the next time you head to Croke Park (and we will), leave those spoiled children (regardless of actual age) after you. That's not Kerry. I remember travelling with the great Jerry Savage and Jerome McEllistrim from Ballymac on the Kerry Supporters Bus; there's people who set the standards for Kerry GAA off as well as on the field. I know it wasn't just Kerry supporters - the Hill was once testing but not malevolent, that may have changed - but enough Kerry supporters did for it to deserve being called out.

Gough certainly got the two biggest calls right. Did Paul Geaney double hop for the goal? Nope. Watch it again, he controlled the second one with his foot. And the one that he changed a free in for David Clifford to a hop ball and booked both players? I was nonplussed at the time but I saw the replay after, it certainly was one of them, two of them. Good refereeing.

Cold comfort. Like I say, on days like this, everything is cold comfort. It's actually harder to lose a tight one that be well beaten. You can't help replaying key moments in your mind repeatedly; that's as inevitable as it is unhealthy and it's a million times worse for the players.

We'll rise again. Of course we will. The age profile is in our favour. We have too much talent not to, that's a great Kerry team. But when the chips were really down in 2023, we have to live with the simple fact that there was a better one. Stephen Cluxton, Mick Fitzsimons, and James McCarthy become the first gaelic footballers to win nine All Ireland medals, and I hope that every Kerry supporter has the grace to salute those great warriors. In the 1970s and 1980s a great Kerry team went head to head with a great Dublin team and wrote themselves into history as the greatest gaelic football team of them all. Today, nigh on fifty years later, the positions are reversed. So be it.

Look, we had three small ones of my own kith and kin brought to Croke Park for their first All Ireland Final. They'll have that memory for life, and it won't be a bad one (for the record, there wasn't a single Dub supporter say a cross word to them all day). For them, this wasn't the end of anything. It's the start.

#### THE GAME

Sineád O'Connor's iconic 'Nothing Compares To U' rings out to get us going, a nice touch by the GAA. Kilkenny in for Dublin – that's a real worry for me. No offence to Niall Scully, a tireless link man, but Kilkenny is one of the best playmakers of all time and he scares me. His inclusion is no real surprise to anyone, though. Miserable enough weather, but that's not bothering anyone in the stands. It does affect the football early on, though. The handling isn't quite precise and it's taking that extra fraction of a second to pick the ball up. Kerry with the first chance but it's short. Brian Howard has Dublin's first chance, a good one, but he misses it.

Very dangerous ball in by Dublin, we are caught one on one inside. Thankfully our one man is Tadhg Morley, he does really well to knock it away for a '45. Cluxton converts; we know only too well that he doesn't miss those.

Paudie Clifford finds Paul Geaney, who steps inside and shoots from a tight enough angle, Howard clears it off the goal-line. He should have maybe given it to a free Diarmuid O'Connor. Ah well, if wishes were horses, I'd be riding (or possibly eating horse burgers – don't tell anyone). Good turnover by Stephen O'Brien on Mannion, on to Dara Moynihan, and he finds David Clifford. Fitzsimons is sticking to him like glue but David feints lightly and shows fabulous technique to clip it over. Basquel drops an effort short but Dublin win it back and Mannion gets all the time in the world to shoot from distance – you can't give the likes of him a free shot.

Both sides are not contesting outfield possession. They are both getting back into

their defensive shape when the opposition has the ball. Turnovers will obviously be key. Gavin White makes a great one and gets the ball up the field. Paudie Clifford is fouled late by James McCarthy and Seán O'Shea points the free. 0-2 apiece.

Brian Fenton gets a lot of time to look at the posts. Again he's not a player who misses those. Seán O'Shea is fouled, again it's James McCarthy and a fairly reckless one. I'd have been showing a yellow at that point – I did actually think at the time that James had been booked. Seán kicks the free.

Seán fouled Ciarán Kilkenny, who is having as much influence as I feared. Both teams have players working hard backwards. Cormac Costello points it. I thought Dublin should definitely have had another free in straight afterwards, but the referee didn't double check with me (I'd have lied anyway) and we got away with it. Dublin launch in a high ball – Lee Gannon collides hard with Shane Ryan. He's booked for his trouble – I know he had his eyes on the ball during the impact, but he was looking at Shane a second before; he knew full well where he was. Mind you, in the same circumstances, I'd have tried it myself and hope the ball bounces in.

Paul Geaney hits the post and wide, unlucky. Mannion again gets time to pick his spot after a Dublin turnover and puts Dublin two clear, 0-5 to 0-3. Dublin get another one on one inside, those are worrying me. Again, Tadhg Morley does very well but truthfully, Con O'Callaghan should have done much better. He seems to have a strange aversion to taking a simple mark. I don't like the rule, but I'd certainly be taking advantage of it.

Colm Basquel gets a yellow for fouling Paul Geaney. Seán O'Shea's turn to get space from a bit out and he doesn't miss those shots. One point game again. Paddy Small sends a high ball into test Shane Ryan; the Kerry keeper passes with flying colours as he fists clear.

Kerry are on top now but not making use of it on the scoreboard. Stephen O'Brien wins a free, with Paddy Small getting booked, but the angle is too tight even for Seán O'Shea. David Clifford goes on a fantastic run but eventually runs into too much traffic in the danger area. Dara Moynihan, playing very well, hits a far too ambitious effort that was always curling well wide. David hits one with his left leg but it's outside the post. It's actually Cluxton who hits the next score from a free. Dublin by two, not undeserved.

David gathers near the corner flag and turns Fitzsimons on the endline (I'm not being churlish when I say that Fitzsimons is overpraised in the aftermath for a good manmarking job on Kerry's danger-man – a slightly off kicking form David still did a lot of damage). David he sends it across to Paul Gaeney, who dummies the defender but fumbles slightly, regathers, and calmly drills home. Cue euphoria among the Kerry fans, myself included.

#### Half-time Kerry 1-4 Dublin 0-6

Kerry a point up and four Dublin players already booked (my mistake, think that McCarthy had been booked. It was actually three). Positive for Kerry but there's an awful long way to go yet. Kilkenny with a good turnover and Brian Howard levels matters. Tom O'Sullivan is fouled by Cormac Costello, who is lucky enough not to be booked. David slots the free with ease.

Mannion uncharacteristically misses a good chance. Good play by Lee Gannon, great pass to O'Callaghan, an absolute rocket....crossbar! Again, I'd have taken the mark, but he did well to create and very nearly execute a great goal. You'll never score the ones you don't go for, so who am I to be second guessing him?

Kerry's response was perfect. An All Ireland that had felt more tense and controlled than exhilarating burst into life. Paudie Clifford with a fine point. Paul Geaney cleverly fists over, wise choice. Colm Basquel, after a quiet first half, is starting to have an impact and picks off a point in reply off his left.

David Clifford picks off a beauty. 1-8 to 0-8 in Kerry's favour. We have been here before; I'm thinking of 2015 especially. Drive on and don't hold the horses. McCaffrey on. Another player I fear, his searing pace is a serious weapon.

#Disaster. Kerry clearing their lines and Gavin White is deftly robbed by Colm Basquel, leaving a two on one and Paddy Small shoots. Even then, Shane Ryan is alert and looks like he'll save the initial shot, but the fates mock us as Tom O'Sullivan makes a full length dive....only to divert away from Shane and into the net. You can call it luck, but on days like these, the great teams make their own luck.

Big deal. It's only a momentum changer if we lose momentum. We don't. Kerry are made of tougher steel, these aren't garsoons anymore. Stephen O'Brien is fouled and Seán O'Shea clips over. James McCarthy eschews a point chance and Gavin White clears brilliantly. Paudie Clifford on the run fists over from a very tight angle. Shane Ryan emerges from goal as a ball-carrier – I'm old-fashioned enough to hate it, but the tactic works perfectly on this occasion, stretching Dublin's shape and Paudie shoots over. 1-11 to 1-8.

Jack McCaffrey is not the force that he was (nor do teams yield that kind of space for him to hare into anymore) but he's still a good footballer and he wins a free for Paul Mannion. Basquel adds another.

Free in to Kerry! Fitzsimons is called for holding onto David Clifford. David Gough is speaking into his mic, presumably to the umpire. He's quick, he's decisive. Booking for both players and a hop ball that's cleared.

Paul Mannion with a point – we let him in to shoot far too easily. That was careless by Kerry. Level pegging.

David with a good chance....curled wide. Kerry are running their bench now. Both sides are feeling the strain in their legs, little mistakes are creeping in.

David with another wide. Brian Fenton steadies himself and splits the posts. Killian Spillane, barely on the pitch, shows the reason for his insertion as he picks off a great point.

Paul Mannion nudges Dublin back in front. They are fractionally the better side now and getting their scores that tiny bit easier. They are denied another, though, Diarmuid O'Connor effecting a very good turnover on James McCarthy. David bursts in but his shot blazes left and wide – called back for a foul. I genuinely thought it was soft enough. Seán O'Shea points the free and, with minutes remaining, it's 1-13 apiece and right back in the melting pot.

Mannion went for an over-ambitious attempt and puts it wide. Basquel looks certain to score but Micheal Burns makes a truly brilliant block on him. Dublin look like they have scored but Shane Ryan rises high to bat it away. Kerry are lurking though, and Paul Mannion clips it over. Dublin in front and two minutes of injury time left. Kerry have to go for broke. David with another wide. He had to go for it, but it's that sort of day. Dublin are experts at closing it out from here and do exactly that, Colm Basquel winning a tap-over free for Dean Rock to finish it off.

Kerry are back in an All Ireland Final for the second year in a row, and this achievement may even be greater than the mens' team. It isn't that long ago that Kerry were only so-so in Division Two and certainly weren't listed among the All Ireland contenders, and facing much bigger obstacle in Munster than their masculine counterparts in a Cork side that are always up among the elite. Nowadays, in fairness, so are we.

No doubting the star of the show, and it's not a name that will surprise too many either. Louise Ní Muircheartaigh is very much the heartbeat of this side and she was at her absolutely brilliant best last Saturday in Thurles, ending up with 1-10, and especially taking the game by the scruff of the neck when Mayo were threatening to stage a dangerous comeback.

Mayo still had a kick in them, the outstanding Ciara Needham teeing up her twin sister Tara, with Ciara Butler getting down for a superb save. Sinead Cafferky kicked a point to make it 1-9 to 0-3 and had another effort drop short. Kerry were still dominant, though, Hannah O'Donoghue drawing an equally brilliant save out of Laura Brennan and Louise pointing a free to stretch the lead to double digits. Ciara Needham did kick a good Mayo point before the break.

#### Half-time Kerry 1-10 Mayo 0-4

Given the wind, we already knew that the second half would be a dogfight – this Kerry team have been building big leads and watching them get whittled down in a lot of games this year. Rachel Kearns opened the second half scoring, but Mayo had a let off when Niamh Ní Chonchúir's attempted pass to

We didn't exactly look like world beaters and were never expected to. In fairness, I think we did as well as we could. A bit tentative against Australia, perhaps, but we gave them a fair battle. That said, I thought Australia hesitant to really go for our jugular (their goal was a penalty given needlessly away), while talismanic Katie McCabe was fantastic. The Australia media, never exactly known for their fairness or sportsmanship, sent a fair bit of criticism her way afterwards. Too bad about ye. I'd be fine with her hitting ye a lot harder. Nigeria being fourth seeds remains absolutely mystifying to me. I have no idea how the ranking points are assigned, but Nigeria are a top class side, second pot at least, and it was no surprise to see them qualify from the eponymous 'group of death'. They started strongly here and had early chances, but I suspect that the knowledge that a draw would do them was preying on their minds a little bit. Fair intensity in the play, though, and Ireland were matching it. In fact, Ireland started taking control in the second quarter, but again without much of a cutting edge. That's definitely something that we need to find; our finishing simply doesn't match the quality of our build-up play.

The second half was a replica of the first, Nigeria making the early running – Courtney Brosnan made a truly spectacular save – before Ireland took control of the play but without a threat.

Three games against quality sides. Three goals conceded, one scored. I thought Ireland did quite well in what has been a fairly underwhelming tournament overall so far. I certainly wouldn't say that we are out of our depth.

Rumours abound that the FAI are considering Vera Pauw's position. In fairness, the FAI are possibly that stupid (it's the FAI, we all know they are that stupid) but I sincerely hope not. What is more likely, though, is that other countries with higher ambitions are looking at the Dutch woman and prepared to make her offers.

Cruel, and an unseemly melee didn't help matters as Kerry lost Lee Axworthy to a second yellow card, leaving Billy Dennehy with a headache for the long and tough road to a Waterford side who are fully expected to gain promotion this year.

four points each so took the top two spots in Group One.







# RING OF KERRY ROAD SET FOR NIGHTTIME CLOSURE THIS AUTUMN

It has been confirmed by Kerry County Council, in a reply to local Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill, that due to the nature of the works required to be done on the road at Gleensk Viaduct in Kells and the heavy plant required, a night time closure will be required there, from late September to mid December 2023.

"This proposed closure will be an enormous inconvenience and interference with the lives of all those living in Cahersiveen and South Kerry, from Kells to Bolus, Knightstown to Cillian Liath. I am seeking further details of access for emergency vehicles, deliveries and public transport and what alternatives are to be put in place" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Many people travel in and out of South Kerry, in the early hours to attend their places of employment and such a closure would pose gigantic difficulties for them, not to mention the additional costs involved. Accessibility for Emergency crews must be maintained to the highest level and lives cannot be put at risk. Further details must be and will be provided. The difficulties involved in this repair work are obvious of course, but we must not lose sight of the daily requirements of all the people of South Kerry" said Councillor Cahill.

"The Ring of Kerry is vital to the local economy in South Kerry and this decision will come as a major shock to the general public and business

community and it is critical that Transport Infrastructure Ireland carryout these works in the speediest possible timeframe" stated Councillor Cahill

"It is hugely important that the people of Cahersiveen and Iveragh are informed fully at an early date so that any alternative arrangements can be put in place" added Councillor Cahill.

Councillor Cahill also sought clarification on whether or not the road may be closed during the daytime. In response, Padraig Teahan confirmed that it was planned to close the road only at night time and that Emergency Vehicles will also be accommodated.

# €759,809 allocated for upgrade works on rural roads and laneways in Kerry - Griffin



An additional sum of €759,809 has been allocated to Kerry County Council for repairs and improvement works on rural roads and laneways, Deputy Griffin TD has said.

Deputy Griffin has welcomed the announcement from the Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, of an additional  $\in$ 16 million for road projects across the country. This means that almost  $\in$ 30 million has been allocated under the Local Improvement Scheme (LIS) this year alone.

And almost €130 million has been invested through LIS since the scheme was re-introduced in 2017 by then Minister for Rural and Community Development, Michael Ring TD. Deputy Griffin said: "I welcome the funding of €759,809 allocated to Kerry under the local improvement scheme. This is on top of the €797,367 that was allocated to Kerry in the first round of funding that was announced earlier this year.

"This money can be used for non-public roads and lanes that are not normally maintained by Kerry County Council, but are critical for rural residents - providing access to homes, farms and businesses, as well as outdoor amenities. "Eligible roads under the scheme include non-public roads that provide access to parcels of agricultural land, or provide access for harvesting purposes (including turf or seaweed) for two or more persons. Also included are non-public roads leading to important community amenities such as graveyards, beaches, piers and mountains.

"I would also appeal to Kerry County Council to utilise the funding to address any backlog of applications that they currently have. The overall funding is more than double the allocation provided last year," Deputy Griffin said.

Since the Local Improvement Scheme was re-introduced in 2017, almost 4,000 roads nationally have been funded for repair works.

Announcing the funding, Minister Humphreys said: "As someone who grew up on a farm myself, I know all too well what it is like when a milk truck cannot gain access to collect the milk. I know too how poor quality roads in rural Ireland can negatively impact on families and businesses.

"That's why the Local Improvement Scheme was re-introduced in 2017 by my predecessor and colleague, Michael Ring. Since its re-introduction, over  $\leq 130$  million has been invested in rural communities the length and breadth of Rural Ireland.

"This funding is all about making peoples' lives that bit easier and ensuring we have good access to homes, farms, businesses and local amenities.

"The scale of this investment is a clear example of Government's commitment to supporting our rural communities through our five year rural development strategy, 'Our Rural Future'.


# A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear student continuing on how true rest is to be found in relationship with God. You Are What You Eat was a popular ty programme years ago bringing knowledge on how foods affect us thus helping people become more health conscious. But no matter how well we eat and exercise, if our spiritual health is not good, the effect of diet is only partially beneficial. It is true to a certain extent that 'you are what you eat', but the Lord says - 'you are what you believe!' Solomon wrote ... "as a man thinks in his heart, so is he" meaning that what I believe in my heart affects all my life (Proverbs 23:7). Earlier, Solomon warned 'guard your heart for out of it flow the issues of life' (Proverbs 4:23). I may control what I eat, strive for a work-life balance, and exercise consistently, but it's my hearts spiritual issues that will affect me the most; for better or for worse. The answer to problems that people are enduring is to be found in heart wholeness - the consequence of peace with the Lord. Peace with God comes from believing in His Son Jesus as Lord, receiving forgiveness for our sins, and being reconciled to God through the sacrifice Jesus made by laying down His life so we could be saved (Romans 10:9-13; Colossians 1:19-20). God told Samuel "man looks at the outward appearance, but God sees into the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7). Whatever situation you are in dear friend - whether problems in relationships, health, addictions, work or finances, the heart of every matter is a matter of the heart. God sees the full extent of everything - He is the Alpha and the Omega, the Beginning, and the End (Revelation 22:13). So, to receive freedom and live in peace we must lay bare our hearts before Him, and as a result of receiving His unfailing Mercy and Love our hearts will then beat in sync with His heart through the study of His Word and the power of His Holy Spirit. We are made in the image and likeness of God our Creator (Genesis 1:27). What an awesome privilege! In Psalm 34 David wrote that those who look to God radiate His Light and their faces are not ashamed (Psalm 34:4-6). The more we grow in our relationship with God the more we glow with His Love, His Peace, His Mercy, His Joy, and darkness must leave. There is a total lack of fear because of our connection to God.

This is the opposite of the religious spirit which looks for another pathway to wholeness. It leads many folks down rabbit holes of performance-based righteousness that bring destruction. Some people say they don't believe in God, yet they are more religious in their activities that those who do. Relationship with God transforms one from the inside out, whereas religion focuses on the outside alone. Knowing the Lord is different from knowing about Him. The Pharisees who taught the laws of God chastised Jesus because His disciples ate without first performing their elaborate handwashing rituals - condemning them as being defiled. But the Lord Jesus exposed their hypocrisy and the shallowness of their accusations. He cut to the heart of the matter, telling them that it's not what you eat that defiles you, but rather defilement comes out of one's heart (Mark 7:1-23). Friend, invite Jesus into your heart – you can trust Him to heal you. "As a face is reflected in the water, so the heart reflects the real person" (Proverbs 27:19).
