### KILLARNEY MOURNS THE PASSING OF

## **PADRAIG HARTNETT**

Shock, sadness and disbelief surrounded the town of Killarney when news broke late on Thursday evening that Padraig Hartnett had passed away.

The popular Killarney man was a constant in the sporting world in the county and beyond and will leave a void that will be difficult to fill. Padraig was a major cog in the wheel at Killarney Celtic having held many roles in the club including former Chairman, Secretary and PRO and the club paid tribute to him following his untimely death.

### Killarney Celtic was deeply shocked and saddened last evening to learn of the untimely passing of club stalwart Pádraig Harnett.

Former Chairman, Secretary, PRO of both the Club and the Kerry School Boys and Girls League Pádraig was a hugely influential and knowledgeable figure who dedicated his life's work to the sport he loved. He was popular affable and a mine of information . Widely respected as a broadcaster, freelance journalist and supporter and activist on behalf of all sports in Kerry and beyond he will be greatly missed . # History repeats itself with THE CLEENEY CONNECTION

ast Sunday saw East Kerry claim their tenth Kerry Senior County Championship. It was a huge occasion for all involved, but it had a particular poignancy for one family whose roots stretch far back in the annals of Kerry GAA.

The Lyne brothers of Cleeney gave an incredible contribution to Kerry from Canon Mikey's debut in 1937 to Jackie Lyne managing Kerry to All Ireland glory in 1969 and 1970.

Fr. Mikey Lyne won All Irelands at minor, junior, and senior before serving as PP in Glasgow, where he became famously synonymous with Glasgow Celtic FC. Donie and teak-tough Teddy played club only, but were hugely dedicated to Legion. Tom was hugely talented but sadly passed away at a young age. Denny famously played corner forward in the 1944 All Ireland, he subsequently played cornerback in the 1946 and 1947 finals. The latter, of course, was the famous Polo Grounds Final where Cavan staged a great comeback to defeat Kerry, with the great Micheál Ó hEithir pleading for more broadcast time on the airwaves to finish the game. Jackie Lyne was arguably the most talented of the talented family. He played for Kerry as both a forward and a defender and won practically every honour in the game, was a highly respected inter-county referee, and trained Kerry to two All Irelands. Con, the youngest brother, did not play football himself but was a noted judge of good football.

Of course one could argue that their sister Maura's contribution to Kerry GAA was even greater. She married Tom Spillane, who had boarded in St. Brendans' College and subsequently helped Legion to that County Championship and her sons Pat, Mick, and Tom and grandsons Adrian and Killian claimed senior All Ireland medals of their own.


Arguably the greatest day for the Lynes as a sporting family arrived, not in Kerry colours, but in the green and white of Legion on April 13th, 1947 (the 1946 County Championship, unfortunately, suffered delays because of appeals and counter-appeals) when Killarney Legion beat John Mitchels by 0-7 to 0-5 to win their first and only County Championship as a club. That Mitchels' side included Joe Keohane, Frank O'Keeffe, Cavan great and All Ireland referee Simon Deignan, and Bill Bruddy O'#Donnell. But Legion had Tommy Cooper, Jimmy Fleming, John Joe Sheehan, Mixie Palmer, Tom Spillane, Gerald O'Sullivan.... all known men. And, of course, the four Lyne brothers from Cleeney, Denny, Jackie, Mikey (the team captain) and Teddy.

Legion: Tommy Cooper, Dinny Lyne, Jimmy Fleming, Jimmy Wade, John Joe Sheehan, Mixie Palmer, Denis Bailey, John Murphy, Tom Spillane, Jackie Lyne, Gerald O'Sullivan, Mick Baker, Fr. Mikey Lyne, Teddy Lyne, Timmy Hurley. Teddy O'Sullivan, Michael O'Connor, and Donal Brosnan also played for Legion in that campaign.

Last Sunday saw the Lynes well represented in East Kerry's triumph over a brave Mid Kerry. Jonathan Lyne, Denny's grandson, played minor, U21, and senior for Kerry and his display against Mayo in 2014 was pivotal to Kerry winning the All Ireland that year. Ironically, Jonathan's minor career with Kerry had been ended by Mayo in a replayed All Ireland semifinal. Mayo's Aidan O'Shea had played a key role that day as well. Jonathan hadn't won a County Championship before last Sunday, although he had been instrumental in getting Legion to the 2015 County Final, where they succumbed to South Kerry. A decade after Jonathan had first pulled on a Kerry jersey for the minors, his cousin Darragh did the same and starred in the Kerry minors successful 2018 campaign that completed Kerry's historic five in a row at the grade. He has since played for the Kerry U20s and his displays in the County Championship make him likely to follow Jonathan into a senior jersey before too long.

2014 Footballer James O'Donoghue was also integral to East Kerry's success. James' own father Diarmuid had won a County Championship with Killarney in 1983 and his grandfather Jameso, who chaired both Killarney Legion and East Kerry with great success, won a County Championship himself with Killarney in 1949 beside the Lynes of Cleeney.

They say that history repeats itself. It certainly seems to be true for one of Kerry's greatest sporting families!

### National Highly Commended Tidy Towns Award for CASTLEISLAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Castleisland Community College received a National Highly Commended Award in the Tidy Towns Circular Economy Category. The efforts by both students and teachers to promote a sustainable lifestyle were certainly rewarded with this acknowledgement along with 500 euros prize money.

The school had undertaken various projects to win this award. A bicycle collection was organised by fifth year students and their religion

teacher Annette Steinborn for Ukrainian refugees residing in the Earl of Desmond, Tralee. Children's scooters, bicycles, helmets, tractors and adult bikes were donated by parents and students. Jack Griffin in fifth year drove his tractor and trailer after school accompanied by fifth year student Eoghan O Connor. They collected bicycles from homes that couldn't fit into cars. Motar Factors located at Church Street, Castleisland, donated supplies for repair and cleaning bikes. Students then helped to

clean up and fix bicycles. Halfords in Tralee also donated extra helmets. Annette and her husband Karl, then delivered the greatly anticipated bicycles to the Ukrainian women and children.

Transition Year students of 2021/22 decided to enhance the river walk in consultation with Castleisland Tidy Towns and their teacher Aidan Joy. They created a fairy trail for children to enjoy using pieces of wood, left over from Junior and Leaving certificate projects during Woodwork class. The wood cut offs were shaped and painted into various doors. In Home Economics class the students also studied the world of Fast Fashion and they decided to undertake a project promoting upcycling clothing. They bought items of clothing from Sue Ryder Charity shop in Castleisland town and they upcycled the clothing, under the guidance of their teacher Joe Mc Grath, into items that they would wear themselves. They then organized a fashion show for junior classes where they modelled and promoted the upcycling of clothing.

The school will be invited to receive its award and prizemoney at a ceremony organised by Tidy Towns in December.



## Welcome to Long-Awaited Works at Muckross Gardens

The huge work underway in Muckross car parks is long sought after and long awaited. At least some of the credit must go to outgoing chairman of the Trustees Donal Hickey for finally getting it over the line. The relationship between Muckross and the various Government Departments has not always been easy. At times it has been downright antagonistic with little leaning at departmental level with the departments themselves changing over the years.

There appears to have been a smoothing over, particularly in the past 18 months to two years. Car parking is an issue this column and many users have tried to have addressed. But even the potholes are going to be filled now.

Around Eur 2.5 million of Government money is going into the car park and drainage works at Muckross alone.

Down the road too we may see much needed bicycle parking, is the word. But one of the most cheering of all the projects underway as we head into winter is the work on the lean-to Edwardian greenhouse. This is a separate project and the Department of Housing is not revealing the costs but it will be expensive, I hear.

With huge potential, the greenhouse has been an eyesore.

Just short years ago as it fell into disrepair such work had been ruled out completely as far too costly.

The damage caused by winds earlier this year was making it an all out embarrassment. So no ill wind perhaps!

The importance to Killarney of this Edwardian dining area and walled gardens cannot be overstated. All that remains now is to tackle the crows. There is a bit of the seagull Stephen's Green about the marauding crows in Muckross when it comes to stealing food from diners. Under the revamp of the garden

area, coverings are planned for the outdoor tables which should clip the crows wings a bit. Really short of a crow banger that is probably all that can be done about the crows. For now!

Meanwhile, with all the work underway, Donal is leaving on a high note after what must have been a trying two years during Covid. Incoming chair of the Trustees is Marcus Treacy and we look forward to further projects in Muckross over the next two years or so.

## Tidy Towns, a lot done and much to do

Killarney's achievement in increasing marks and getting gold against raised standards in the Tidy Towns Competition huge achievement for everyone involved from volunteers to council employees, businesses, locals, and respectful visitors.. Especially welcome is the overall comment on how it was "a pleasure to visit Killarney". But some of the remarks in the report need highlighting. In particular, the judges noted "long deep ruts are evident in many of the roads around the town." This was caused by the jaunting cars which were a feature of Killarney, they said. This was something to be addressed by the area engineer it was suggested in most diplomatic language:

"We can look forward in anticipation to the development of a new link between these two greenways as well as the development of the South Kerry Greenway and the linking of the various routes which will enable users to enjoy the county's beautiful landscape," they said.

Minister of State Hildegarde Naughton said: "We have allocated approximately €60m for Greenways alone this year as well as over €285m in walking and cycling infrastructure around the country to enable people to safely choose to walk or cycle instead of using the car. The opening of these projects in Kerry today are just some of the many infrastructure schemes we are committed to progressing over the lifetime of the Government.

Peter Walsh Chief Executive TII stated: "The Tralee to Fenit Greenway, the N70 Brackaharagh 'Active Travel' project and the N69 Listowel Abbeyfeale to all Greenway deliver sustainable active travel transport options for residents and providing a safer environment for all road users."






## Killarney Camera Club LAUNCH 21ST ANNIVERSARY EXHIBITION



## MICK CUD REMEMBERED 100 YEARS ON

One Hundred Years ago this week on November 2nd 1922, IRA Volunteer Michael O Sullivan (Mick Cud) of Headford was killed at Knockane after a raid by free state soldiers in Barraduff where local Volunteers were attending a wake. He was one of a number of local Volunteers known affectionately by their O/C as "wild garsúns." Although wounded in his right arm and having broken his rifle, Captain "Tiny" Lyons from Dublin, a notorious murderer of unarmed Republicans

shot him dead. He was 24 years old.

When waste items like wet wipes and sanitary items are flushed, they can reappear in the form of frightening fatbergs much to the horror of our environment. 


## ONCE UPON A ROAD HITS THE BOOK SHELVES

A road trip through the past, best describes a new book just hot off the press. 'Once Upon a Road' was written by Lyreacrompane native, Joe Harrington, and its 364 full colour pages and 315 images, maps and photos carry an account of the very first Butter Road from Kerry to the Cork Butter Market. Joe describes the book, which took five years to compile, as a "search for the olden days on a sixty-mile journey through 275 years of time.".

The subject of the book is the road from just south of Listowel through Castleisland, Millstreet and Vicarstown, to Kerry Pike outside Cork City with a spur from Shinnagh Cross near Rathmore to Killarney. Joe Harrington discloses that it was built under a 1747 Act of Parliament by a Castleisland man, John Murphy, who had the right, for 61 years, to place six toll gates at different points on the turnpike road. The passage of the Act through the Parliament was funded by Killarney based Viscount Kenmare.

The story of the road first appeared a couple of years ago in a song by Joe entitled 'The Road John Murphy Made' which won the Sean McCarthy Ballad Competition. "The ballad was about one man's trip on the road in the 1750s and the book broadens the story", Joe explained. He went on; Every mile on 'The Road John Murphy Made' tells its own tale and along the way we will meet Whiteboys and Hedge Schoolmasters, Freedom Fighters and Moonlighters, Famines and Natural Disasters, Mass Rocks and Wedge Tombs, Bronze age hoards and Bog Butter, Lost Estates and Evicted Tenants – and the part played by the road in the slave trade". 'Once Upon a Road' dips into the local history of the townlands, towns,



Joe Harrington, on the old Butter Road, with his newly published book 'Once upon a road. villages, and settlements through which the road passes including a detailed account of the Whiteboy uprising between Killarney and Millstreet in 1822 – the 200th anniversary of which was remembered at Shinnagh Cross with a wreath laying ceremony earlier this year.



## Killarney still has that golden

killarney's remarkable gold medal performance in this year's national Tidy Towns competition should be a source of great pride to everybody in the town and to increase the overall mark by nine points, to 361, was a wonderful achievement, the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has said.

President Niall Kelleher thanked and congratulated all the businesses, residents' associations, community groups and individuals who have played their part in ensuring Killarney is presented in the best possible light and he noted that the competition judges were more than impressed by the high standard of upkeep and presentation in the town.

Mr Kelleher thanked all those involved in the local Tidy Towns committee for volunteering their services for the weekly clean-up work throughout the year and, he said, it made all the difference when the adjudicators paid their annual visits to the town during the busy summer months.

The Chamber President said everybody in the town should be particularly grateful to the management and staff of Kerry County Council for the investment they have made in keeping Killarney looking good and for having the vision to implement a number of projects which have helped enormously in Killarney achieving its stated goals.

"The outdoor staff in the Killarney Municipal District Council area, led by Noel O'Leary, are a real force to be reckoned with when it comes to polishing the jewel in the crown of Kerry tourism. "They work that they do on a daily basis has to be seen to be believed. They are a tremendously dedicated bunch of workers and Killarney owes them an enormous gratitude," Mr Kelleher stated. He said it was particularly gratifying that the Tidy Towns adjudicators observed the importance and impact of events like the Christmas in Killarney and the St Patrick's Day festivals, both of which were another great collaboration between the council and the Chamber.

The Chamber President said it was encouraging that the judges acknowledged that a busy town like Killarney, with its many daily visitors, is difficult to keep clean yet they were very

It is an also endorsement of the work being put in by the council and its outdoor staff but, just as importantly, it is an endorsement of the great effort being made by the businesses and the people of Killarney for whom pride of place is so critically important".

### THE ADJUDICATORS REPORT:

In this week's Killarney Outlook we look at some of the highs and lows of the Tidy Towns Adjudicators Report

Your committee of 18 has a recent addition from the Ukrainian Support Group and with a volunteer cohort of over 400 you are certainly an active group. Having members of new immigrant communities as part of your team will bring additional skills to your already talented group – a Horticulturalist, Photographer, Social Media Expert, Conservationist, Artists & Building Contractors. We are delighted to see that in addition to Facebook and Twitter you also have an Instagram account as this will target the younger generation in Killarney.

Killarney's centre is quite compact and we enjoyed walking around the many streets with their back lane links. You have some very impressive buildings – the Pugin designed St. Mary's RC Cathedral and St. Mary's Cofl church both set in parkland, the Town Hall, the Great Southern Hotel, the Bishop's Palace, the Presentation Convent etc. There are also many fine hotel buildings which are well maintained and add to the streetscape – the Arbutus, the Fairview, Killarney Royal, Killarney Towers etc.

The Killarney Trails which we downloaded from the internet is excellent and we complement the creators.

The mural on the Flesk Cycleway and Walkway is quite beautiful. Is it planned to continue the mural along the remainder of the wall?

The discrete signs relating to the history of the streets are very interesting e.g. Gléib an Bhóithrín Chaoil, Lána and tSeanmharoaidh etc. The ladies at 'Dúirt bean liom go ndúirt bean léi' were noted ...... hopefully the fun doesn't go unnoticed. There are many pieces of sculpture dotted around the town - including one which town has certainly added to the streetscape.

### **Green Spaces and Landscaping**

It's always encouraging when trees are planted and we read that the Rotary Club planted quite a number at Killarney Burial Ground selecting a Weeping Mulberry to be planted in the mediation area beside the Columbarium wall. We look forward to seeing photos of the crocuses planted by the students and also of the biodiversity planting at Mission Road in next year's application form. Many of your planters were in full bloom and we also like the grasses which give additional interest. We noted however that some planters were empty – ask for these to be removed as they detract from the streetscape.

Nature and Biodiversity in your Locality

The proximity of the town to Killarney National Park is of unquestionable benefit to the

inhabitants of the town as well as to the visitors. What an amazing natural facility to have right on your doorstep! There are numerous guided walking tours – who organises these? The release of

### Sustainability - Doing more with less

An interesting project is being undertaken by Tricel – it will be thought-provoking to chart this progress. Killarney Urban Farm is an exciting concept – unfortunately access was not permitted so we couldn't see all it has to offer.

We did, however, spend some time in the KASI community garden which is very impressive and where great crops of vegetables, fruit trees and fruit bushes are grown beside stunning floral displays. We also popped into the Going Green café for a cuppa to have a break in our visit to your town.

The installation of the water station at the Courthouse was noted and hopefully you plan to install others around the town. The sheltered bus stand at the Secondary School was noted

### **Tidiness and Litter Control**

Clean up Kerry is going from strength to strength and this year the date was April 2nd when 5,000 volunteers took to the streets in their communities. A busy town like Killarney with its many daily visitors is difficult to keep clean and so we were very impressed at the small volume of fresh litter that we saw. Compliments to the many volunteers who obviously work hard to keep it litter free. Weed growth is a problem for all communities and in Killarney it is no different. We recommend that your many volunteers are asked to not only litter-pick but also to removed weed growth – along wall edges, kerbs, pavements etc. You have installed addition 'Bee Friendly' signs throughout the town ....don't overdo the installation of signage as remember it's the streetscape or natural area we want to see not signage and their associated poles!

The Fáinne Geal an Lae sculpture is very discoloured and it is virtually impossible to make out the poem. Maybe the discolouration is intentional – corten steel? We doubt however that the stone plinth under is supposed to be so discoloured.

The bin storage units at Chapel Lane with the colourful murals make the area bright and inviting.

Electric cables were always unsightly and detracted from our villages and towns and we are delighted to read that little by little those in

Killarney will be put underground when road works are undertaken.

A fresh coat of paint was applied to bollards, bins, railings and kerbs and as a result all were very presentable.

### **Residential Streets & Housing Areas**

Close to the main shopping streets of the town we find two and three storey residential streets interspersed with local shops and businesses. This makes for a vibrant town in the evening when the main shops and businesses have closed their doors for the day. We met family groups, groups of teenagers, dog walkers and joggers along these streets as we wandered around in the evening. Some of these houses had hanging baskets or window boxes which made a huge contribution to the streetscape - we would encourage others to do likewise. We admired the nameplate for Cahernane Meadows beautifully set in a high random stone wall. Take care not to let the ivy encroach on the wall.

The new simple and clear bilingual signs are excellent. We need to be able to clearly read the name of an estate and these new signs are perfect. We admired the row of dormer cottages of St. Mary's Road and particularly the one with the beautiful yellow roses in full bloom. Holy Cross Gardens have great displays of colourful pollinator friendly flowers please compliment the residents. The new social housing schemes are almost devoid of planting and are badly in need of comprehensive planting schemes. Some individuals have made wonder attempts and have evergreens and pollinators friendly flowers planted. More, however, is required and we must assume that landscape plans exist which will be implemented shortly. Ballyspillane resident's association is extremely active and is a positive influence on the community.

#### **Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes**

The approach road from the south which skirts Killarney National Park is extremely pleasant with its great canopy of trees. As with all towns, your streets, roads and pavements are well used and need constant maintenance and upgrade. Killarney needs work undertaken throughout the town and in residential estates where edge breakup, uneven footpaths, damaged kerbs etc are evident. We note that you have additional damage to your streets that is unique to your town. Long deep ruts are evident in many of the roads around the town caused by the jaunting carts which are a feature of Killarney. We have no doubt that the area engineer has a propriety list of all of these works.

#### **Concluding Remarks**

It was a pleasure to visit Killarney and stroll around your very busy streets and back lanes. We were delighted that you made reference to the Sustainable Development Goals in the various categories in your application.

### **Second Round Adjudication**

not strictly While litter-free adjudication day Killarney came very close to being so, with only a few stray items noted (e.g. in car park near tourist office). Indeed, staff were seen busy keeping the town centre scrupulously clean in a number of areas during the visit. Our thanks to them. A few tidiness issues remain for your attention. Watch out for signs and sign poles that need cleaning or painting. The sign frame in front of the Methodist Church is looking care-worn at this stage. On the plus side, the bottle banks at the Mission Road car park were spotless. So too were the public conveniences at the other large car park off St Anne's Road. The GAA grounds could be better presented, it is felt. Would the club consider murals for the extensive walls here?

Well done to the many businesses that have once again come up to the high standard of upkeep and presentation. There are too many to list here but suffice it to say that all of the hotels looked splendid on the day with some great efforts from hanging baskets to exacting landscape planting at entrances. The Anam Centre looked really well with gorgeous wooden planters and an adjacent planted area complemented. On the planting and other floral decorations, again there are too many examples to describe here. However, some stand-outs were the oval bed on the green in front of the Avenue Hotel which had super variety, the display of annuals at the Ha-Ha and the monument to the Munster Fusiliers. Superb work was as ever on show at Killarney House Gardens. This spectacular and pollinator-friendly display is really remarkable.

## WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

**Tax Free Cash:** Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

**Taxable Cash:** You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

**Annual Pension:** This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

**Approved Retirement Funds:** You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.







#### **Should you File or Clip Nails?**

A nail clippers can create invisible cracks or tears in your nails that result in peeling, cracking or broken nails. It is better to file your nails, it makes them strong, healthy and more resistant to chipping. If your nails are too long clip the tip first but finish with a file to keep your nails in the best shape and condition. Filing is important for nail polish preparation too as it prevents chipping so your polish will last much longer. Use a nail file with a fine grit(180+) and move in one direction. Do not move your file back and forth as this can cause splitting



and weaken your nails. File the sides straight toward the tip of the nail. Move your file around the side to the tip of the nail to create a curve. File your toenails straight across. Apply cuticle oil and massage into your nails and fingers if not applying polish. File your nails once a week to keep them well groomed, neat and tidy.

#### **PRESBYOPIA**

#### What is presbyopia?

Presbyopia is the normal loss of near focusing ability that occurs with age. Most people begin to notice the effects of presbyopia sometime after age 40, when they start having trouble seeing small print clearly.

Presbyopia is caused by an age-related process. This differs from astigmatism, myopia and hyperopia, which are related to the shape of the eyeball and are caused by genetic and environmental factors. Presbyopia generally is believed to stem from a gradual thickening and loss of flexibility of the natural lens inside your eye.

These age-related changes occur within the proteins in the lens, making the lens harder and less elastic over time. With less elasticity, this means the eye has a harder time focusing up close and we may have to hold material further away to see it clearly.

#### What is the treatment for presbyopia?

Presbyopia is a natural part of ageing and there is no cure for it. The solution is generally to wear glasses for reading

Contact lenses are also available for presbyopia if you do not want

Are there exercises I can do to stop needing reading glasses? Will I make my eyes worse by wearing glasses?

No. As presbyopia is caused by the lens stiffening, and not the muscles weakening. Wearing glasses will not make your eyes worse and there are no exercises that can help this. However, you may notice that when you take your glasses off, things appear to be worse without them than before you had them. This is simply because you are noticing how clear and comfortable vision should be. Before you had the glasses, you were unaware how blurry your vision really was because it changed slowly over the years.

Presbyopia will get worse as you age until you reach your late fifties, when you will have no natural focusing ability left. Unfortunately there is nothing you can do to stop it.

For any vision changes it is important to have a sight test to determine the cause.







#### COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP FINAL

East Kerry 1-16 Mid Kerry 0-10

Mid Kerry did nothing wrong. They are a fine side, peppered with serious talent in the likes of Pa Kilkenny, Mike Breen, Éanna Ó Conchúir, and Liam Carey alongside young and impressive tyros like Seán Coffey, David Mangan, Keith Evans, and Kieran Dennehy, they can expect to be back at this level again before too long.

They never landed a punch. East Kerry can't exactly be said to have stuttered and stumbled their way through the championship, but they had never really matched the (admittedly fairly unrealistic) expectations of wholesale devastation either. The simple fact is that teams are too well organised at this level nowadays, and no team is naive enough to go toe to toe with the likes of David Clifford, Dara Roche, or James O'Donoghue in a shootout. Winning this championship was always going to be a grind at the coalface rather than a procession.

But at the last, when it counted, then we saw this East Kerry team rise up and cast off the shackles. I repeat, Mid Kerry did nothing wrong. But at times here they looked like christians trying to fend off lions in the Colliseum in days of old. East Kerry brought that kind of power and panache.....and that hunger.

Just for a moment early on there was a brief flare of hope for them. David Clifford went down with a knock (he quickly shook it off) while an electric Kieran Dennehy loosed the first shot in anger – it curled wide, but it wasn't far away. Then East Kerry went to work. Dara Roche threaded a lovely pass to Ruairí Murphy for the opening score. Paudie Clifford sent an even better pass to his brother for the second one, and then neatly clipped over the third himself. 0-3 to 0-0.

Mike Breen and Pa Kilkenny were two of Mid Kerry's best performers, and they combined for Kilkenny to open the Mid Kerry account after ten minutes. They turned over the kick-out and Keith Evans picked out Éanna Ó Conchúir for point number two. This was starting to shape like a great contest.

Both sides, especially East Kerry, left a few

chances behind them. Both Éanna Ó Conchúir and Dara Roche, two of the most reliable kickers in this year's championship, were uncharacteristically wayward with scoreable frees (David Clifford and Pa Kilkenny having won those opportunities). Chris O'Donoghue did set up Darragh Lyne to double East Kerry's lead, but Kieran Dennehy won a free for Fiachra Clifford to trim it back to one again.

East Kerry were worth all of it and more. They were lording the middle, with Ronan Buckley especially industrious and the likes of Jonathan Lyne, Cian Gammell, and Dan O'Brien snaffling up loose ball. Jack Sherwood was well on top in his duel with dangerman Liam Carey, while Éanna Ó Conchúir was struggling to find the space that he thrives in. Mid Kerry's biggest threat was Kieran Dennehy; Kerry U20 manager Tomás Ó Sé will have been taking notes. Up front for East Kerry Ruairí Murphy again brought ferocious energy. James O'Donoghue had come out alongside Paudie Clifford to direct traffic - all of East Kerry's passing was crisp, but that pair were sublime. Dara Roche always had a whiff of sulphur about it. As for the newly crowned Footballer of the Year? Well, let's just say that you could pick him out of the crowd....

It wasn't like a fox in a henhouse. It was more like a tyrannosaurus rex in a henhouse. East Kerry's main modus operandi was to hit long ball into David, and his positioning is too good, his reflexes are too fast, and his prodigious strength is too unshakeable to be dislodged of possession. And once he has it....well, that's game over. David won a free converted by Dara Roche and a good turnover and pass by Ruairí Murphy saw him shoot over himself. 0-6 to 0-3. It could have been more, as Dara Roche neatly sliced through the defence (helped, admittedly, by a lucky bounce off Mike Breen) only to be denied by a fantastic save from Seán Coffey – far from his first in this campaign. James O'Donoghue and David Clifford combined to set up Paudie Clifford for his second point this was football with pace and precision by masters of the art.

Mid Kerry were refusing to go down quietly, though. Eoin Clifford picked out livewire Kieran Dennehy with a fantastic pace and Dennehy's blistering snapshot went over the crossbar – it could have gone under. There were a couple of bookings on either side now – nothing dirty, just a bit of law being laid down by a very good referee when passions were at their height. Ruairí Murphy won a free neatly converted by David – the man just wasn't in the mood for missing. Kieran Dennehy made a great mark to trim the gap back to a goal, but David had the final say off the half with a monster score after more good work by Ruairí Murphy.

Half-time East Kerry 0-9 Mid Kerry 0-5

East Kerry could, and probably should have put the game to bed in the third quarter. James O'Donoghue was denied by another great Seán Coffey save after a superb team move had sliced Mid Kerry open. Play was called back for a foul on James O'Donoghue, though, and David did slot over before adding a point from play. That was just two scores out of eight clear scoring chances, but it was still two more than Mid Kerry could muster. At 0-11 to 0-5, there was a certain sense of inevitability creeping in about proceedings, to be honest. Like the famous viking King Cnut in English history, Mid Kerry were helpless against the tide.

They did pick off a point through a Fiachra Clifford free, once again won by Kieran Dennehy. In response, though, James O'Donoghue sent in a pinpoint radar pass to David Clifford, who offloaded to Dara Roche for the kind of score that looks simple in retrospect – but most certainly isn't.

Mid Kerry were still hanging on to hope. Keith Evans picked off a nice point. Gavan O'Grady, only just introduced after struggling with injury this year, won a free after a great Mike Breen turnover, and Éanna Ó Conchúir converted. 0-12 to 0-8, a fair bit of daylight between them but far from a yawning chasm.

Whatever brief flicker still remained was snuffed out with clinical ruthlessness in second. It was another whirling move of precise passes through an alert but outclassed

defence. Jonathan Lyne, Ruairí Murphy, James O'Donoghue, Paudie Clifford....Mid Kerry were still swatting at shadows where the ball had passed as David Clifford was putting his brother's pass into the net. The simplest score he took all day....and the most effective.

Liam Carey tried for goal at the other end, but Shane Ryan was more than equal to it (he should in hindsight have settled for a point at that range). At the other end Dara Roche gathered another great long ball from James O'Donoghue and split the posts. David added another - neither the result nor the man of the match award were up for debate by this stage. Gavan O'Grady did pick off one last Mid Kerry point, but it was realistically a cameo role in The David Clifford Show. The man himself took a mark from his brother's pass and fired over before taking his personally tally to 1-9 with one last majestic effort.

There were brilliant players all over the fieold on both sides. You'd have to single out Mike Breen, Pa Kilkeny, and Kieran Dennehy for Mid Kerry, while Jack Sherwood, Paul Murphy, Ruairi Murphy, and James O'Donoghue excelled for East Kerry. But when they talk about this final in years to come, they'll talk about one man. And with very good reason.

Look, this isn't remotely meant to be definitive. Obviously I didn't attend every single game bilocation is a skill that continues to elude me. I saw a good few, though, and this is the team that I would pick. There are obvious injustices link men like Paudie Clifford or Jonathan Lyne don't get the headlines that their contribution deserves. Leaving out both Barry O'Mahony and Martin Stack from Feale Rangers feels like a gross miscarriage of justice - except that I look at the players in my selection, and I don't see who I could drop for them. Roibaird Ó Sé could make a strong case for Barry Dan's place in midfield - after all, Barry played between the midfield and forward lines rather than a traditional role, but Barry Dan was incredibly consistent whereas Roibaird, through no fault of his own, departed early. Rob Monahan, like Barry O'Mahony and Ruairí Murphy, caught everybody's eye as a future prospect, but doesn't dislodge either of my midfield pairing, likewise Liam Kearney of Spa. Tony Brosnan of Crokes and Killian Spillane of Templenoe are two of the best hunter/gatherers in any forward line - but I'm not taking Kieran Dennehy out of my team and the other two in the full forward line....literally the two best players of the whole championship for me.

#### 2022 FOOTBALL ALL-STARS

I tend to be a little bit sceptical about All Star Awards. To me they are something that has become devalued over time. The fact that the entire football team this year is selected from the semi-finalists, twelve of them from the All Ireland Final, doesn't help their credibility to me. I honestly think that a player's whole contribution over the year, including at club level, should be a factor. Quite simply, what player in that position would you choose to go to war with? I'm not questioning the calibre of any of these players, just the criteria for their selection.

There aren't too many talking points this year - thankfully. Too often in the past we've had suspiciously newsworthy controversies around the All Stars. Given how little games he actually played, should Con O'Callaghan have received a nomination? I'm not too sure - frankly, I wouldn't factor in either the Leinster or Munster championships in the awards; they just aren't competitive enough at the moment. I do think, and genuinely hope, that Cork are on the way back as real contenders. Maurice Shanley, Seán Powter, and Steven Sherlock didn't really stay around long enough to be in the All Star conversations, but they weren't far away. There's no question that O'Callaghan is a serious talent at both football and hurling, but there seemed to be some sort of an invincibility myth built up around him by pundits because of his absence against Kerry in the semi-final. I know that we only one by a bare point, but I honestly don't think O'Callaghan would have won it for Dublin. No arguments with Ciarán Kilkenny picking up his sixth All Star. Yes, part of that is because he has played on a powerpacked all-conquering Dublin team - but he's one of the big reasons why they used to be allconquering, and he was as impressive this year in adversity as he was in days of triumph.

Ethan Rafferty of Armagh was considered a genuine contender in goal. Not for me. He's a good keeper, and Armagh's use of him as an auxiliary defender almost redefined the role - but the obvious failing in that strategy was badly exposed subsequently. I don't even know how Evan Comerford got a nomination - he was badly exposed by a very frail defence during the National League.

Tom O'Sullivan can feel very hard done by. For me he wasn't just nigh on a cast iron certainty for an All Star coming into the All Ireland Final, he was a genuine contender for Footballer of the Year as well. Then he ran into an on-fire Shane Walsh, and that was that. In fairness, I don't think anyone could have held Walsh that day. Even as an opposition supporter, you had to admire him. Another Kerry player who can feel hard done by is Graham O'Sullivan; I thought he stood very tall when the chips were down. Derry were always going to be rewarded after emerging from the wilderness as real contenders (the collapse of Tyrone and Donegal poses questions for me) and Chrissy McKaigue was the beneficiary, no complaints, but McCluskey was just as good. The player who is hard done by there is Brendan Rogers. John Daly was a certainty, I really thought he was understated excellence for me. Seán Kelly was fairly unlucky, I think I'd have given him the nod over Silke, but it would be a close-run thing. Incidentally, I'd have had Tadhg Morley

as a Footballer of the Year contender; I thought he was the linchpin of our new resilience in defence.

Lee Gannon has grown hugely into his role, but not to All Star level just yet. Lee Keegan could feel a bit hard done by, but I don't see whose spot he would have taken.

I remember the Hogan Cup Final of 2016 – David Clifford of Kerry and Conor Glass of Derry were the two most talked about young footballers in the country. It wouldn't have taken Nostradamus to figure that they would share All Star podiums in the future. Shane Walsh had a brilliant final, but Comer was a more consistent threat throughout the year to me. I don't think there's any real debate about Glass or Cillian McDaid in midfield – Glass was more a traditional expionent of the midfield arts, but McDaid was a revelation this year.

David Clifford didn't actually loom over the full year as much as people might think. He was relatively quiet by his standards against Cork and didn't feature against Limerick. He struggled with an early knock against Mayo before turning on the style later on. But when the chips were down....oh boy. I'm going back to Seán Cavanagh's displays for Tyrone in 2008, Seamus in 2000, or Maurice in 1997 for that kind of dominance on the biggest stage. Sean O'Shea was quietly more consistent, but he was always going to win it after that free - and don't bother pretending, you know full well what free I am talking about. The recognition of Paudie's contribution to Kerry in terms of dynamism is good to see - Donnchadh Walsh was unrecognised for years for doing the same linkman trenchwork (albeit at a slightly lower tempo).

One last small quibble. Actually, a big one for me. Rian O'Neill grabbed my attention – and I do mean literally grabbed it – when I sat down to watch Armagh face Dublin in the opening game of the National League on tv. And he hardly put a foot wrong since. Again, a Footballer of the Year contender for me, and he should have been a definite All Star. RTE, for some bizarre reason that I won't even speculate, put this most predatory of predatory forwards in their Team of the Year as a midfielder. I have no idea what that's about, but I don't think it did him any favours when the All Stars were actually selected.

Arrah, like I said, there isn't much call for too many arguments. Certainly, with seven All

Stars, Kerry can't exactly complain too much.

Football is far from the sum total of what he is – that notion would be ridiculous to apply to anyone, anywhere – but it is a natural part of his being, and he has the work put in to hone that seam of talent into diamond. Is he the best I have ever seen? Maybe. There's no doubt that both Seamus and Maurice would be in that conversation, I saw both of them hold games in the hollow of their hands, but there's a definite conversation.

## YOUNG FOOTBALLER OF THE YEAR

Jack Glynn (Galway)

The funny thing is that this award hasn't gone to Kerry all that often. Mike Frank Russell in 1997 (he had minor, U21, senior and club All Ireland medals by then, plus a Hogan), Killian Young in 2007 (he was so composed on the ball in full flight), Tommy Walsh in 2008 (Kerry's 'twin towers' went within inches of an All Ireland), David Clifford in 2018 (the obvious choice – only Jason Sherlock in 1995 with Dublin had attracted so much attention so soon) and Seán O'Shea in 2019 (championship top scorer – the focus on David made some people forget just how good the Kenmare man was and still is).

I have no problem with Jack Glynn getting it. Tight, tenacious, tough but clean....this guy plays football as it should be played. But I will say that there were very few realistic candidates. I came to greatly respect Lee Gannon as a

footballer by the end of the campaign, but let's be honest – he was caught wide open several times in the National League when Dublin were there for the taking. Yes, he played great football once Dublin switched on the power in Leinster, but would he really have stood out with a weaker team? Ethan Doherty was a viable candidate, he was the ultimate utility player in covering massive amounts of ground and he's clever along with it. But Glynn was the standout amid a surprisingly sparse amount of contenders.

Football has changed. The likes of David, Seánie, and Diarmuid O'Connor with Kerry, Kilkenny and O'Callaghan with Dublin, Ryan O'Donoghue and Opisin Mullin with Mayo mask the fact that modern football is so physically demanding that very few players are ready for it for a couple of years. Miko Doyle of Austin Stacks famously had four All Ireland medals at the age of 21, all of them won on the field of play. You won't see that again.

#### O'SULLIVAN CUP FINAL

St. Brendans 2-8 Mercy Mounthawk 0-6

The O'Sullivan Cup traditionally plays a preparatory role in the Corn Uí Mhuirí, but it's an important competition in it's own right. This one wasn't a great game by any stretch of the imagination - the Fitzgerald Stadium was immaculate as always, but weather conditions were not kind. The Sem were also lining out without Cian Lynch or Luke Crowley, arguablybtheir two best players. Personally, I fancied Mounthawk to win this; I think that they will be hurt at how their array of talent just never really fired in the conditions, they are a much better team than they showed here. The Sem were that bit technically superior on the ball in conditions that tested that trait and were simply more clinical with their chances.

Rob Monahan, one of the stars of the Senior County Championship with St. Brendans, opened the scoring with a long range free. Monahan is a real talent, but so is John Kelliher, and the Ardfert man had to give second best over the hour – Kelliher was outstanding, as was playmaker Aodhán O'Neill. The Renard man's effort at goal was rebuffed early on after Jamie Moynihan's free had dropped short, but Kelliher was on hand with a superb volley to the net.

Goalkeeper Michael Tansley kicked a good

EP for Ireland South and leader of Fine Gael in the European Parliament, Seán Kelly, welcomed a group of Transition Year students from Ireland South, including from Killarney, Co Kerry, to the European Parliament in Brussels this week.

The group of transition year students were the winners of MEP Kelly's annual 'Meet Your MEP' essay competition. Those that travelled wrote winning entries on the question 'How will the EU adapt to the effects of climate change?".

The students had a busy three days, learning about the work of an MEP, the functioning of the European Parliament and Ireland's place in the EU. Their programme included information sessions, tours and briefings at the European Parliament and the Irish Representation to the Council of

Speaking in Brussels yesterday (Thursday), Mr. Kelly made the following comments:

## KILLARNEY STUDENTS VISIT **BRUSSELS AFTER WINNING** MEP KELLY'S ESSAY CONTEST

"I am very pleased to have had the opportunity to welcome such engaged and enthusiastic students to Brussels to learn about the inner workings of the EU institutions and my work as an MEP.

Approximately 70% of Irish legislation originated from EU law. The work we do here in Brussels has real impact on the day-to-day lives of Irish people, and as we deal with more shared challenges - like climate or health for example - decision-making at EU-level will become even more important.

For this reason, I am passionate about engaging young people in the EU. This trip was an opportunity to show students first-hand what it means to be an EU citizen, and it has proven to be extremely successful."

During their tour of the Parliament, the students were asked what they hope for the future of the EU, Aoibhin Kelly, St. Brigid's Secondary School, Killarney, hoped for "peace across the EU" while Brian O'Carroll, Colaiste Choilm, expressed his hope that "Ireland takes advantage of green energy and technology". When asked to sum up the EU in one word, Ellie Burrows from Gaelcholáiste Chairrig Uí Leighin answered "inclusivity".

"Pre-covid-19, I organised the TY essay competition annually", Kelly explained. "I am delighted to have it back up and running. A personal highlight from the trip was meeting with each student and hearing them present their ideas on the future of EU climate and energy policy. I was incredibly impressed with their detailed knowledge on conservation efforts, the EU energy union and renewable technologies."

"Our children and grandchildren will inherit the world we leave behind, it is essential that we give them a voice on such issue. As I told the TY students following their presentation, I will take the ideas that they shared with me to COP27 in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt."

MEP Kelly will attend COP27 as a member of the delegation from the Parliament's Industry, Energy and Research committee in two weeks.

## MEP KELLEHER ASKS CENTRAL BANK TO INVESTIGATE BANKS AND THEIR MORTGAGE SWITCHING PROCESSES

·····

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said it is very concerning that Irish banks are taking so long to process switcher mortgage applications, and that the Central Bank should investigate to ensure that all regulatory requirements are being adhered to, and that banks are not purposely dragging their feet to frustrate the process.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs Committee, was commenting after it was reported in the national media that customers are being frustrated in their attempts to secure lower interest fixed term loans by processing delays in the banks.

"This really is not acceptable. Customers are rightly seeking to find lower interest rate loans for their homes and to reduce the impact of rate rises on their disposable income.

"Every month of a delay is a month of a higher interest repayment. That's money that should be in a customer's wallet rather than being given to a bank for interest.

"We need to find out who or what is slowing down the process. I can't imagine it's the new bank as they want new customers on their books as quickly as possible.

"The Central Bank of Ireland updated its mortgage switching rules in 2019 to try to ease the process and to encourage homeowners to consider mortgage switching. Under these rules, banks are required to give switchers all the information they need and be fully transparent on how long it will take.

"Only this month, the Central Bank announced a further review of these rules. Clearly there is a problem with mortgage switching in Ireland with just 1% of mortgage holders planning to switch this year according to a recent Daft mortgages report.

"Now is the time for a quick reaction from the Central Bank. Our mortgage

market is lethargic and it's costing customers

"I will be writing to the Central Bank of Ireland's Consumer Protection Directorate requesting that they investigate this matter to determine banks whether respecting their duty to be transparent about the process and, more importantly, if they are being reasonable about how long it will take. I would request the Central Bank to remind banks of their obligations and duties to their customers.

"Home owners are under serious financial pressure

right now. If someone finds a better, cheaper mortgage option, they need to have their applications processed and dealt with as quickly as possible. Every month counts in terms of money in people's pockets," concluded Kelleher.



## FOCUS ON NOVEMBER **GARDENING**

Now that November is here, it is a great time of the year for planting bare rooted trees, hedging, fruit bushes, roses and rootballed conifers.

The bare rooted planting seasons lasts from November until March. The reason for this is that the trees and hedging are dormant at this time of the year, so you can't really do any damage when you are lifting or planting.

When planting bare rooted as a general rule, plant about three plants per metre, roses can also be purchased and planted bare rooted as can fruit trees and fruit

The main thing when planting bare rooted trees and hedging is that when you purchase them and if you are not going to plant them straight away you will have to heel them into the ground; by this, I mean you will just have to dig a hole and put the plants in and cover the roots with earth to stop the roots drying out.

With hedging plants, roses and fruit bushes, they will usually come in bundles and will be tied together, so you don't have to separate them, just put the whole bundle in the ground.




Welcome back dear student "Rise up, O God, and scatter Your enemies. Let those who hate God run for their lives. Blow them away like smoke. Melt them like wax in a fire. Let the wicked perish in the Presence of God. But let the godly rejoice. Let them be glad in God's Presence....filled with joy. Sing praises to God and to His Name! Sing loud praises to Him who rides the clouds. His Name is the Lord - rejoice in His Presence! A Father to the fatherless, a judge and protector of widows - this is God, whose dwelling is Holy. God places the lonely in families; He sets the prisoners free and gives them joy. But He makes the rebellious live in a sun-scorched land" (Psalms 68:1-6). For those who seek the Lord and live in obedience to His Word God assures that from His Presence flows joy, protection, provision and relationship.

The apostle Peter reminds believers that we are blessed by God as we are 'spiritually transformed (born again), renewed and set apart to a 'Living Hope' and confident assurance through the resurrection of Jesus Christ' (1st Peter 1:3). We have a Living Hope because Jesus is alive. Our flesh can look to man for help in times of trouble (looking to the mountains) but it's only from God that deliverance comes. "My help comes from the Lord - Who made heaven and earth. He will not allow your foot to slip. He who keeps you will not slumber" (Psalms 121:2-3). God sets the lonely in families. He brings help when we are in trouble. Shirley Valentine talked to the wall; Tom Hanks talked to a football. Neither of them ever got an answer from the object of their conversations. But when we pray to the Lord Jesus, God answers - because Jesus is Alive! God raised Him from the dead after He had taken our sin, sicknesses, shame and guilt as a guarantee that His Word is true and that He has power over sin, death and hell. This is the hope that we have - that God hears us and answers us (Psalm 91:15).


The Lord will deal with our enemies, and He will work out every situation once we hold on to the hope we have through faith (Hebrews 10:35). Jesus is our Redeemer. That means He will bring good out of bad situations. Sometimes it may feel like you are all alone - that there is no hope. Perhaps you have been told by doctors or bankers that your case is hopeless. Listen, "what is impossible with man is possible with God." (Luke 18:27). Others may mock you for your hope and faith in the Lord Jesus. More fool them. They may think your trust in God's love and promises are a fairytale. But they are the ones talking nonsense. And unless they repent on this side of the grave, they will unfortunately find out the truth too late. Friend, people may betray you or let you down, but God will not. When we know that our hope in God is valid, we live differently. Circumstances or disappointments won't rock us, because God is a very present help in trouble, therefore we will not fear (Psalms 46; Psalms 100:5). We can 'be still and know that He is God' and that He is good all the time!
