



"Our walk goes through Killarney National Park and it's very special as it brings our community together to show that there is hope and support

for those who need it. We walk in solidarity, to remember all those lives lost to suicide and to show support for anyone in our community who might be struggling", she added.

Go back a generation and the Munster Football was always the highlight of Killarney's sporting calendar. A generation before that, the Regatta was the unmissable event every year, even for those not into rowing. The Races have always, well before living memory, been huge. These events are like market fairs with a bit of extra adrenaline thrown in for the craic.

The Rally has come to inhabit that place in Killarney's popular culture. You don't actually have to be into cars to appreciate it, especially with the approachability and friendliness of the dedicated participants and supporters. This year's Rally was quite possibly the best ever. Mind you, there was a touch of the bittersweet about it, with two enormously

popular characters in local legend Johnny Hickey and international star Craig Breen.

The organisers did a magnificent job, and the fact that it was action-packed all the way through added to the excitement. And let's be honest, having Kerry and Killarney drivers right up there with the best of them makes it even better.

Our own Rob Duggan and Ger Conway in their VW Polo set the tone with blistering displays. Rob opened the most of a ten second gap on Robert Barraway and Gordon Noble over Moll's Gap – really stunning driving – and then held it all through the daunting challenge of the Healy Pass (the likes of yours truly are wary of that one on a bicycle!). Callum Devine and Noel O'Sullivan (Muckross) lost ground due to a puncture – this is a sport where luck counts for a lot and milliseconds matter.

It all turned on the Cods Head stage, where Callum and Noel made all the running and, astonishingly, trimmed the gap back to a mere 2.5 seconds. After Ardgroom and another run through the Healy pass, Callum and Noel had 5.6 seconds on Rob and Ger, with Robert and Gordon another 3.3 behind. All to drive for yet!

The gap was over 12 seconds heading into Sunday, with Rob and Ger well behind in third place. They rallied superbly (pardon the pun, but there was no way I could resist) to get back to second and he was still there after Rathmore West. Callum Devine and Noel O'Sullivan had a fairly comfortable lead by then though, 27.3 seconds ahead. One mistake can wipe that out instantly, of course, but this pair simply don't make mistakes. It was all rendered moot when Rob Duggan and Ger Conway hit a bank and damaged the steering. That's how cruel rallying can be, no matter good you are. In the end it was Devine/O'Sullivan with their second title, Barraway/Noble in second, and Josh Moffet/Andy Hayes in third.













KILLARNEY STUDENTS WIN AT SciFest

with "My Carbon Buddy"

Over 100 post-primary school students from 12 schools across Kerry took STEM to the next level at SciFest@MTU (Kerry Campus) 2023 this week.

There was a win for Killarney students Keira Geaney and Abbie O'Sullivan from St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School when they won the coveted Business Excellence Institute Award for their ground breaking app "My Carbon Buddy".

"The app, once downloaded, can track your daily carbon usage and you can start logging your activity", Keira Geaney told Killarney Outlook.

The app focuses on the personal responsibility when it comes to making a change in the world.

The girls sought the experience of Programmes Manager at the RDI Hub, Niall Larkin, last summer following their success at The BT Young Scientists Awards, when they won the Technology Category Display Award,

"Following an invite from Mr. Larkin to oversee a day of presentation of start-up in the local area, we then spoke to developers to create a first app prototype and to solicitors to ensure we wouldn't lose ownership of our idea", Abbie O'Sullivan said.

"We are so grateful to everyone for the support we have received", Pam told Killarney Outlook. The amount raised will enable Colin Bell to help 3 families in similar circumstances.


"His incredible support, advice and understanding is so comforting at such

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

TOWNS MUST RETURN TO THE CORE OF POLITICAL ORGANISATION

The motion by Councillor John O' Donoghue before this week's Killarney Municipal District seeking clarity on the latest situation with the tourist letting fiasco pinpointed the real problem: the fact there are no longer town boundaries.

The restructuring of local government into Municipal Districts under the Fine Gael and Labour Government of 2014 got rid of small towns as political entities. The so-called reforms made rural townlands equivalent to the high streets.

John's motion, seeking to allay anxiety in the tourist industry stated:

"Following the recent EU intervention, that the Council would advise on where the proposed boundary will be in the MD for areas which will be exempt from having to apply for planning permission to short term let their properties due to the population being less than 5,000."

The council could not clarify. They had not been informed how the necessary tweaking was to be introduced by central Government. The real reason of course is the daft reorganisation that ignores towns.

The eradication of town councils was strongly opposed by John's uncle Councillor Michael Gleeson. But no one in the higher houses in Dublin paid heed. Especially deaf was Phil Hogan, then Minister for Local Government.

And those nonsensical changes in local government is why rural farms were recently being targeted by Kerry County Council planners as much as lanes and byways!

The council enforcers had no choice but to include the whole rural hinterland from Rathmore to Ballyhar and Listry and go after anyone letting anywhere because there is no town boundary politically and the whole Killarney MD is all a designated rent pressure zone.

Whether Kerry County Council needed to be so enthusiastic in the first place in the crackdown is debatable. And they may well care to reflect and review their eagerness to implement this kind of half-baked and locally very unpopular central government "legislation" going forward.

One of the other lessons learned from the fiasco must be a look at reform of local government again, and bring back towns as political entities.

MAY THE BLUE AND WHITE MONTH

The National Parks and Wildlife Service said it is continuing for the second year to root out the invasive Spanish bluebell from the woodlands in Killarney. A number of woods



are affected now. it seems.

The tall Spanish Bluebell introduced by the horticulture industry is a serious threat to the scented native bluebell and there are whole woods now in the North of Ireland where there are no more native bluebells.

"The NPWS is aware of the presence of the Spanish Bluebell in a small number of locations within Killarney National Park. Staff members actively and carefully pick them when in bloom, and will continue to do so this year," they told this column.

The presence of this non-native plant is not significant enough to warrant setting up a programme of eradication as NPWS staff continuously seek it out and pick it, they also said.

Biodiversity Ireland also seeks to map invasive species and is inviting those sure of their facts to report sightings of the varieties. The National Biodiversity Data Centre has a species profile for the native species on the following link:

In the meantime, The NPWS said the wonderful spectacle of the bluebells in the wood near Muckross Post Office alongside the N71 at Muckross Killarney "is enjoyed by all"

"In spite of this wonderful spectacle, we would also advise that the non-native Spanish bluebell is now found in this wood so to issue a word of caution that some bluebell pulling by NPWS staff might be observed this year," they also said.

There are few spectacles as wonderful as the bluebell aligning magically to the month of Mary and I wonder if anyone anymore has May altars. I know in our house in Lismongane , half a century ago now, May was a favourite month and my mother Mai would be particularly proud of her blue and white May altar in the porch.

RALLYING AROUND REFUGEES

I have great sympathy with the officials in the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth who are trying to cope with a tenfold increase in refugees and asylum seekers. In February 2022 we had over 8,000 and we now have over 83,000. Some 63,000 of these are Ukrainians seeking accommodation.

It is an impossible task. The whole tourist

accommodation base in places like Cahersiveen has been eroded trying to meet it. And so it is remarkable and admirable that the town this week came together and resisted attempts to "swap" 80 Ukrainian women men and children for more newly arrived direct provision applicants.

Some 40 Ukrainians were to be uprooted altogether and sent to a premises in Pembroke Street Tralee, others to Renard near Cahersiveen.

Local Councillor Michael Cahill asked why could "the newcomers" - his term - not be sent to Tralee and allow the settled Ukrainians remain where they are?

It is a reasonable and a key question but it is one that no-one has the courage to address. The reality is we have a two-tier refugee system and some are more welcome than others. Officials will tell you privately that while they can get plenty of commercial offers for Ukrainians, this is not the case for the mixed direct provision applicants. There was an element of this about the stance in Cahersiveen too, when people spoke off record to me. There was shock when it emerged that the premises, the former Skellig Star, was returning to its former role as a Direct Provision Centre. It's not Pullitzer prize journalism. We experienced something the same in the case of Hotel Killarney but no one wants to talk about it publicly. Certainly not official Ireland.

Above and beyond this underlying current, the people of both Killarney and Cahersiveen have to be admired for the way they immediately stood up to disrupting the particular group of strangers they are sheltering.

It is something that has to be learned centrally: Refugees sent to small towns become part of the community.

Elsewhere in this column we refer to the importance of local government. Cahersiveen this week showed us an example of local councillors at their best and most effective: Fianna Fail councillors Michael Cahill and Norma Moriarty were courageous and tenacious. They stepped forward publicly, they lobbied the correct Minister - party colleague Norma Foley; they called out the inhumanity of the proposal. The community and Education Minister Foley rallied and the relevant Government minister Roderic O'Gorman backed down.

Celtic Steps Reel In The Years With Sensational Celebration Event



This year marks ten years of Celtic Steps The Show and the Irish Music & Dance Show kicked off their season in style with a sensational Launch Party on Friday the 28th of April at their home of the Killarney Racecourse.

The event was attended by a variety of local businesspeople and politicians as well as media and some of Kerry's most popular personalities. Their Guests were treated to a lively trad set by the Celtic Steps Band while mingling and enjoying some drinks and canapes.

commenced in the summer of 2012, in the Mangerton Suite of The Gleneagle Hotel "in more hope than certainty that there was space for another Irish Dance & Music Show". What transpired was a show that combined the best of Kerry's culture and folklore through song and embodied a strong belief in displaying all styles of Irish dance, not just the more commonly accepted examples in many shows nowadays. It quickly became apparent that

both locals and tourists were engaged by the natural, raw and live synergy that the dancers and musicians brought to the stage.

With its core ethos firmly honed on employing local talent, currently numbering 40-50 employees, Celtic Steps exploded through its first few very successful seasons in its new home at the INEC, Gleneagle.

As tourism grew even bigger up to 2019, the Show kept up its side of the bargain and partnering with some of the world's biggest inbound operators continued to trend upwards in audience numbers to where it regularly plays to four hundred people nightly in the high season, in a state-of-the-art theatre at Killarney Racecourse which has been home since 2017.

In 2019, the Show opened a second nightly performance at the Brandon Hotel Conference Centre, where now Celtic Steps runs both during the period from May to October, doubling staff numbers and offering visitors to Kerry, an experience unsurpassed in visitor attractions.

Post pandemic, the Show has now repositioned itself as one of the top visitor and local

night-time entertainment options throughout a long season performing just under three

hundred concerts in County Kerry and now travelling internationally, back to Holland for a full month of Christmas shows in December 2023 on the back of a hugely successful 2022 tour

Throughout the twenty-one shows in The Netherlands this year, they will personally sell to over 15,000 Dutch attendees nightly, playing in twenty-one different venues across the country.

"It has been an amazing journey to do something that you love nightly, however it would

The evening's celebrations continued with guests being invited to a very special performance of Celtic Steps to commemorate and toast to the Show's continued success.





SHOULD I USE SPF 50 WHEN IN THE SUN?

A higher factor like SPF 50 will give you more protection against sunburn but not unless you reapply it every 2 hours while in the sun.

Factors 15 - 50 offer similar protection against UVA rays and DNA destruction but factor 50 blocks out 98% of UVB rays while spf30 blocks out 97% and spf15 blocks 93%.

SPF (Sun Protection Factor) is essential to prevent your skin aging and skin cancers. You should look for a "Broad Spectrum" Sunscreen to protect against UVA - Aging rays and UVB - Burning rays and protection from HEV – High Energy Visible light. This is blue light emitted from sun, screens, laptops



and phones.

Apply your sunscreen 20 minutes before going in the sun and reapply every 2 hours after for full protection. Remember to use water resistant sunscreen if you are in water or sweating from exercise.

Do not just rely on your SPF wear a wide brimmed hat and sunglasses with UV protection. Clothing with built in sun protection is great with sunscreen especially for children.

EYES IN THE SUN

Too much sun can damage the : eyes. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems. There are two types of UV rays: UV-A and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems.

UV-A

Can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye. UV-B

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

What Eye Problems Can UV Rays Cause?

Macular Degeneration

UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people.

Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea. Eventually, the growth may block

vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind

Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

Corneal Sunburn

Corneal sunburn, called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

Protecting your eyes from the sun If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunlight.

Group 1

Munster Winners (Kerry or Clare), Leinster Losers, Mayo, Cork

Look, let's not kid ourselves, it'll be Louth coming out of Leinster. And the harsh truth is that I can't see Louth beating Kerry at a neutral venue, not even with the great Mickey Harte on board. But the other two? I'd say Jack O'Connor was not whooping with glee. Mayo in Killarney....the venue counts for an awful lot (it's also great for the town). But Mayo have looked a different proposition in this year's League, I know, we've all said that before, I'm still not fully convinced by their defence and Aidan at full forward may be too unsubtle to unlock summer defences, but they are still as hard and hungry as ever. I think we still have that little bit too much firepower for them, but it'll be tougher than last year's quarter-final.

Cork. I was genuinely worried about them this year, they have a bit more cut about them than previously. I felt that they played better than the results they got in the National League. I'll also point out - and this is worth long consideration - that they were missing Brian Hurley and Cathail O'Mahony against a Clare side who gave Division a fair rattle themselves. No, I was not hoping to see Cork at this stage. Very tough group, but from a spectator point of view, they will be three games worth watching, and that's something of an outlier in inter-county football for me in recent years, the occasional cracker notwithstanding. Look, I have no doubts about us qualifying. But there is a big difference between first and second (I don't want any part of that pre-quarter-final nonsense) and we'll have our work cut out. The Mayo game will tell a lot. All of this arrogantly presumes that we will beat Clare, but to be honest, a flaw in the system is that there would be no particular advantage either way; the loser is in just as hard a group.

Group 2 Connaught Winners (Galway or Sligo), Ulster Runner-Up, Tyrone, Westmeath The Nestor Cup will surely go to Galway. Ulster you never really know, but those two are similar enough in style anyway. Armagh and Galway was one of the best games of last year, not without a whiff of controversy. I thought Galway were the better side for most of it but coughed up goals, but they looked stronger after that game. I think it moulded them a bit. Walsh and McDaid had stunning displays in the final, while Damien Comer is starting to motor really well at that moment.

Tyrone are a serious wild card. I honestly think that losing their provincial championships early on spared them a lot of energy, same as Mayo, without actually making the road any harder. That's an obvious flaw in trying to merge the provisional finalists with a league order of merit. I suspect that Tyrone have kept a lot in reserve

Westmeath were a genuine joy to watch in the Taillteann Cup last year. This is a big jump for them, though. Frankly, it's too big, I don't see them making too many waves.

Group 3 Leinster Winners (Dublin or Louth), Connaught Runner-Up, Roscommon, Kildare

I know I am harping on a theme, but Ulster is the only provincial final without a hot favourite, and Leinster has the hottest of them all. In fact, a lot of people have Dublin as favourites to take Kerry's crown. This group, respectfully, is not going to make it any harder for them. Connaught runner-up is Sligo, and it's an open secret that there was one very tough side of the draw in Connaught, and Sligo weren't on it. Despite their fabulous progress at underage, I wouldn't have expected them to beat Galway, Mayo, or Roscommon. They certainly are not going to land a glove on Dublin. Kildare are the one outfit I honestly can't get any read on. For 45 minutes of any game, they are as good as anyone. And I don't mean grim, hang-in-their dogfights; I mean good entertaining football. But 70 minutes? Maybe its just self-belief, but it ain't there. Roscommon will be interesting.

Group 4

Ulster Winners (Derry or Armagh), Munster Runner-Up, Monaghan, Donegal

I'd be slow to call the Ulster Final. Derry have more overall power and physically strong mass defence, but a more disciplined Armagh with Rian O'Neill back firing on all cylinders would just about get my nod. I obviously expect Clare to come out of Munster (I know that could come back to haunt me!). They are a good outfit these days, but I can't see them scoring enough against Ulster blankets - and it will most definitely be Ulster blankets. I'm not fond of the playing style, but it is effective. Donegal are better, a good bit better, than recent woes on and off the field and I can see them pulling off a surprise despite the gaping Murphy-sized hole in their ranks. Kerry had Colm Cooper step in when Maurice Fitz started to bow out, and David Clifford stepped up when Colm started stepping away, but Donegal do not have that



KERRY MINOR PANEL

The Kerry minor panel has been named this week and I have to say that, looking at that collection of talent put together, I would actually be very hopeful. There are some very serious players in that group. I don't want to be singling out players to watch just yet, I think that is an unfair burden of expectation to put on U17s (although I hope that they and you would have more sense than to put much stock into my rambling. For that matter, the players were named in alphabetical order and I have only surmised at their most likely roles. For example, Ruairi O'Connell was usually named at wing forward for St. Michaels Listowel but usually plays as a third midfielder. Do not pay too much attention to me; I can assure you that Kerry manager Wayne Quillinan is a lot smarter than I am.

Nine of that panel, Ruairi Brosnan, Ronan Carroll, Ryan O'Driscoll, Ben Murphy, Seán Ó Cuinn Aodhna Ó Beaglaíoch, Ruairi O'Connell, Peter Doyle and Kacper Robak are all underage again next year, which bodes very well for the future.

Worryingly – and I know that it's not a new problem – South Kerry has no representative at all. The population decline down there has been well flagged. The fact that Kacper Robak of Crokes is the only representative from the Killarney town clubs is a bit new, but certainly not indicative of any trend, given that the Sem won the Dunloe Cup. North Kerry having 10 players is new and very welcome, the amalgamation at minor and U20 of Feale and Shannon Rangers has been a spectacular success so far and seems to have reinvigorated North Kerry football.

IS Killorglin will now face the winners of Tralee CBS versus St. Michaels Listowel for a trophy that the school last won in 1999.



RUGBY

Two great servants of Irish rugby in the golden era of the likes of Brian O'Driscoll and Paul





O'Connell have firmly established themselves as the foremost club managers in European rugby. Leo Cullen, always a natural leader for Leinster, didn't move far away and now manages them in a golden era of their own. Ronan O'Gara made the more diverse journey with different clubs after finishing playing with his beloved Munster (he was the top scorer for club and country back then), including a number of journalistic roles, before taking over an ambitious La Rochelle project and leading them to even better heights than was hoped for. He would most likely be a front-runner is any national positions opened up - and I'm not just talking about Ireland.

Leinster, the most consistent performers in champions rugby for pretty much a decade, sent out a real message with their convincing victory over a fancied Toulouse, 41 to 22. Jamison Gibson Park was named man of the match, while James Ryan can't have been too far away. One to watch out for is Ross Byrne. Johnny Sexton's age and attritional damage have been a regular talking point among Irish fans. No-one has doubted that he is still one of the best players in the world, but there is an hourglass on every sporting career, and the World Cup is likely to be his last fling of the dice. Ross Byrne is looking more and more like his natural successor, just as he himself used to vie with O'Gara for the starting jersey when he was establishing himself.

La Rochelle had a convincing win over Exeter Chiefs themselves, winning by 47 to 28. It sets up a repeat of last year's final and O'Gara will be hoping for a similar result to that game in Marseilles.

SNOOKER

I'm not going to pretend that I knew anything at all about Luca Brecel before last week. When I looked him up, I found that he had been a young prodigy, winning the European U19 title at just 14 years of age. However, he hadn't enjoyed all that much success since then, losing all five of his first round appearances in the Crucible. My prediction for the World Snooker Championship, was of course the mercurial, controversial, but almost always brilliant Ronnie O'Sullivan. Even when Brecel took a lead over Ronnie at semi-final stage, I was exactly jerking bolt upright in my chair. Ronnie had led by 10-6; I assumed that it was him loosening the reins before killing off the contest. Except that the Belgian absolutely showed nerves of steel to reel off seven frames of the trot. In those circumstances, it says a lot about his skill....and an awful lot more about his mental fortitude.

He needed it again against Mark Selby. He looked the

better player, opening up a 16 to 10 lead, but Selby proved his formidable mettle by taking the next five frames. I will say that Selby has shown a lot of character and earned a lot of deserved admiration for his honesty about his battles with depression and his wife's health struggles. Some things are, of course, far more important than mere sport.


In the end Brecel coolly hit a break of 11 to wrap it up and become the first World Champion from the European mainland.

CUS ON CONIF

For colour all year round you can't go wrong with conifers amd there are lots of different types to choose from.

When choosing a conifer they are usually classified under four sections. Dwarf which will grow from 1.5ft to 15ft. Medium 12ft t 50ft. Tall- anything over 50ft and finally ground cover or prostrate growing from about 2ft in height to a spread of anything from 2ft to 6ft.

When choosing a dwarf conifer it is very important to remember that it can mean two things. It may describe a slow growing variety which will grow to about 2 to 3 ft after 10 to 12 years or it may mean that it will grow to its maximum height in a quicker time frame.

An ideal dwarf conifer to choose is Juniperus Communis Compressa which will not grow more than 2 to 3 ft which makes it ideal for a rockery.

There is also a big choice when it comes to medium conifers. So remember before you choose find out the mature height and spreads. Medium conifers are ideal for shrub beds as they will give you a good focal point and colour all year round whether it is green, gold or blue-grey.

Tall conifers speak for themselves and are ideal for a large garden. Prostrate conifers are ideal for ground cover but make sure to remember that there are different varieties, dwarf, medium and large. Conifers are also ideal for centerpieces in pots and containers.






Welcome back dear student, tomorrow across the water the new King will be crowned. I wish him well. Only a few chosen people have got invitations to this huge event in person.
