Killarney soccer star Brendan Moloney has signed to Northampton Town for a three and a half year contract.

The former Killarney Athletic player has spent the month of January on loan at the Cobblers, making five appearances for the club.

Speaking to BBC Sport, manager Chris Wilder said "it was an easy decision to sign Brendan on a permanent contract. He has been really impressive since coming in and has played his part in the recent good run".

"Not only has he been a big asset over the past few weeks, he has an important part to play in the rest of the season and beyond that as well". "He has an excellent attitude both on and off the field, he has settled in well to the group in the dressing room and we are really pleased Brendan has become a permanent addition, he added.

WEEK THREE: This week saw some changes as the couples really pushed themselves and me in the process which was fantastic and music to my ears. "We'll do a lift", "Can we put this step in", "How about we try this", these were just some of the phrases I heard that week as each other couple shrived to make their routine the best it could be. I was thrilled. Now my group of 24 novices were turning into elegant and energetic ballroom and Latin dancers.

WEEK FOUR: It was time to get tough. Fame costs and here is where you start paying. Paying in pointed toes, excellent sequences and proper transitions. There were all terms that my dancers had to come to terms with. From the outset I was very clear what I wanted from Strictly Come Dancing Killarney and that was a

polished and classy show with fun, smooth and stylish dance routines. And my couples did not let me down. Outside of their hours with me, they had been putting in an enormous amount of work and it was clearly showing as each couple become more and more in tune with the music. This week while at practice as I watched my group of dancers who now are dancers I thought back to that cold January evening and to how far we had come. My dancers had learned so much, from style and grace to rise and fall and it dawned on me. I had been taught so much more. They made me remember, remember back to when I first started to dance. The love that built inside me from learning new steps and nailing a routine. To see that again was so heartened and gave me a new found love for my old passion. Dancing. Strictly Come Dancing that is.



OUTLOOK ON THE What CAO courses are likely to be popular in 2015?

(By Billy Ryle)



A number of considerations influence applicants' CAO choices. Some base their course choices on their favourite subjects. Others apply for courses, which

suit their interests and personalities. A surprisingly large number of students prefer to attend a particular college than to do a particular course. Statistics indicate that the jobs market is never far from CAO applicants' minds. It's also evident that applicants focus on courses from which the job prospects are good at present rather than projecting four or five years ahead.

Because of the cyclical nature of the economy, change is the only constant. When 2015 CAO applicants graduate onto the jobs market the skills and qualifications needed in the economy may have totally changed. Be that as it may, the courses that were popular last year will be equally so this year.

The record number of applicants to CAO in recent years is keeping points' requirements up across the board. Huge interest in nursing and teaching, which are seen as passports to secure jobs, despite the severe cutbacks in public service employment, has kept these courses very competitive. For example in 2014, an applicant needed 465 points for Primary Teaching in Mary Immaculate College Limerick. One of UCC's Nursing courses reached the heady heights of 525 points, putting the course beyond very capable students.

Applicants are opting in a major way for science and computer courses as disciplines which they feel are employment friendly. The Government is strongly advocating STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) courses as essential for the expanding "smart economy." Science is enjoying its highest level of popularity for years. Science in UCD required a staggering 515 points last year. Science and computing courses will retain their popularity and offer plenty of choice. Courses in health sciences, as always, will generally require well in access of 500 points while courses in agricultural and food science will retain huge appeal.

In recent years, construction was the least popular discipline in the technology category. The collapse of the building boom during the recession resulted in applicants deserting property based courses, causing a massive slump in points' requirements. Points for almost all degree course connected to the building industry hit a very low base. These included courses in architecture, quantity surveying, valuation surveying, property management and auctioneering. The green chutes of economic recovery revived interest in "build environment" courses last year. With a further increase in applicants for these courses in 2015, points' requirements will further increase, though from a low base.



HEALTHY OUTLOOK



At SouthWest Counselling Centre we are meeting more and more elderly people who are feeling isolated and alone. What strikes me is that whilst there is a lot of emphasis on help and support for younger people there is less awareness of the availability of supports for older people. As we all know, life is an on-going journey that can present challenges at any stage along the way. Bereavement, loneliness, declining health, fear of crime and loss of loved ones through emigration are issues that many older people are dealing with. Counselling can provide a clear space to do this and offers support and gives us a fresh perspective on things.

Many older people are feeling lonely and isolated due to a lack of social contact and connection. Social isolation has been shown to have a detrimental effect on health and well-being. It is vital therefore that we stay connected, and whenever possible reach out to others and remain actively involved in life. As social beings, most of us feel the need for social contact and relationships. Therefore I would encourage someone who is feeling lonely to establish what opportunities for social connection already exist in their community. It doesn't matter initially whether they get anything out of the actual activity, as they may meet someone of like mind and it is a great opportunity for social connection.

There are many activities in which they can join. Adult education classes can be a great way to meet like-minded people whilst also acquiring new skills. They can also help to boost our confidence and make social interaction more pleasurable. Getting involved in Community Action Groups, Local History Groups or Sporting Activities can all be very enjoyable. Participating in local church activities, organised outings or book clubs can also help to feel more connected to others. Treating ourselves to massage or reflexology can also help to relieve loneliness. Another useful activity is letter writing, perhaps for a worthy cause - such as Amnesty International. Technology forums such as the internet may provide relief from boredom and loneliness. Perhaps you could enlist the help of a young person to learn these skills. If you are feeling lonely, reach out and talk to someone today.


WHATISTHETREATMENTFORBRONCHIOLITIS?

Bronchiolitis is a self-limiting illness. This means it will normally go as the immune system clears the virus. There is no medicine that will kill the virus. Antibiotics do not kill viruses and are not usually prescribed. The aims of treatment include the following:

- To make sure the baby does not dehydrate (become low in body fluids). This may occur if the baby does not feed or drink well.
- To help with breathing if this becomes difficult.
- To be alert for possible complications.

Symptoms do not become severe in most cases. It is usually a good sign if your baby is drinking and feeding well. Breathing may be easier for your baby if he or she sleeps with the head of the cot slightly raised. Consult a doctor if your baby appears to get worse. In particular:

- If your baby does not feed or drink well.
- If the number of breaths each minute increases.
- If your baby is struggling to breathe.
- If your baby loses a good pink colour and becomes pale or blue.

MAYO GAIN REVENGE ON KINGDOM SOIL

ALLIANZ NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE DIVISION 1 KERRY 0-10 MAYO 2-11

Kerry O'Shea reports from Fitzgerald Stadium

Mayo's new joint management of Noel Connelly and Pat Holmes got their 2015 Allianz National Football League campaign off to a flying start when they defeated a lethargic Kingdom side in the opening round clash of the day at Fitzgerald Stadium last Sunday afternoon.

In doing so, they gained some measure of revenge for the defeat they suffered at the hands of the Kingdom in last Augusts' epic All-Ireland Semi-Final Replay in Limerick and consigned the Kingdom to an opening day defeat for the third consecutive season.

Kerry fans in the 8,123 attendance knew not to expect too much from this opening round fixture.

Only six of the side which won the county's 37th All-Ireland title last September were available for selection. Kerry were ring-rusty and lacked cohesion, a point conceded afterwards by manager Eamonn Fitzmaurice.

Despite being disappointed with the overall result, Fitzmaurice was very happy with the work rate and commitment shown by some of the newer lads on the panel and in particular the contribution of Tommy Walsh.

Fitzmaurice is expecting that Walsh will ease back to Gaelic football as the league progresses and he has the potential to play in several different positions.

Walsh, playing his first inter-county game with Kerry since his return from the AFL, was one of three players from the Kerins O'Rahilly's Club to line out with the County side, was introduced to the fray just after half-time for an out-of-sorts Bryan Sheehan at midfield and made one or two brilliant catches which pleased the large home support. However, he had to depart the scene early as he suffered what Kerry manager Eamonn Fitzmaurice afterwards described as 'dead leg to his lower limb.'

"Tommy did very well. He contributed very

well and I was very happy with him," admitted Fitzmaurice afterwards.

2014 Allstar David Moran was outstanding at midfield throughout and scored two wonderful points, one of which was a superbly-struck '45.

The third Kerins O'Rahilly's man in the starting line-up Barry John Keane had another productive day, scoring 0-4, three of which came from play. Kerry got off to a good start and led 0-3 to 0-1 after 20 minutes. Mayo, who lost forward Evan Regan to a broken bone and concussion, which necessitated a five-minute stoppage period at the end of the first half, pounced for a goal through Alan Freeman which pushed them 1-7 to 0-4 clear at the interval.

Kerry rallied somewhat in the second half and cut the margin to 1-8 to 0-8 with 12 minutes gone.

Mayo responded and a second goal from Kevin McLoughlin effectively shut the door on the Kingdom who now face a potentially tricky assignment in Derry next weekend.

Regan was treated on the pitch by medical personnel in Killarney for suspected concussion and was taken to Kerry General Hospital in Tralee, where it was confirmed that he had sustained a fractured clavicle (collarbone).

The Mayo County Board expressed their thanks to the medical staff who treated Regan and said he will now work with medical personnel in Mayo to ensure he returns "as soon as possible". Regan reassured supporters on twitter last night that the injury was not as bad as the pictures on television suggested, tweeting.

SIX MONTH RULE

How long you need to hold a learner permit before you can apply for a test What is it

First-time learner permit holders (in certain categories) must wait six months after the date of issue of the particular licence category before they can sit their driving test. In the past, some people took the test shortly after getting their first learner permit and research has shown that the more practice and experience a person gets, the better a driver they become. This is particularly important if you have added

a licence category to your permit as it is the date the category was added that is relevant not the date that your permit was issued.

It is your responsibility to ensure that you have checked your permit details and that you are eligible to sit the test.

If you apply and turn up to sit your test and you are not eligible then you will lose your fee and have to re apply.

ABOUT YOUR CAR

Why the NCT exists, which vehicles it applies to, and the benefits of having vehicles tested Looking after your vehicle and maintaining it properly is a good habit anyway, but it also means it has a much better chance of passing the National Car Test (NCT).

Introduced in 2000, the aim of the NCT is to ensure that vehicles, particularly older ones, using Irish roads are in sound working order. All EU Member States are required to test the roadworthiness of motor vehicles.

Cars in Ireland must be tested four years after registration and thereafter every two years. Since January 2010, under new regulations approved by the Department of Transport, cars over 10 years old must be tested annually, rather than every second year, which had been the requirement previously.

The weather plays a huge role when it comes to an outdoor sport, especially rowing. Due to recent storms and strong winds, I have spent nearly an entire week

indoors. Inniscarra lake on which we are training is very open and stretches for over 15 kilometers in length. It is a great training venue complemented by the National Rowing Centre – our boathouse and gym in one.

This week my training consisted mainly of bike work, which varied from 75' to 120 minutes straight. These sessions require a lot of patience, but in turn they build a huge aerobic base which will make me faster in the summer. I did some fartlek (interval) pieces as well, which gave me an anaerobic kick. The purpose behind these sessions is to prepare us for the fast approaching national trials, which are held at the National Rowing Centre in two weeks' time. I have also spent some more time on the ergometer (rowing machine), making great progress after nearly a month of no erging. I also did some onwater preparation at the weekend – significantly improving my speeds from the previous week.

The training week ended on a high as I have been privileged to be nominated for the 2014 Renkotil Initial Kerry Sports Awards which were held in Malton Hotel in Killarney on the 30th of January 2015.

I am honoured to be the winner of the Kerry Sports Award in rowing and I am delighted to see the support network behind me. Without all the help and support over the years, I would not have achieved so much, so everyone can feel a part of my success. I truly believe it's a joint effort.

A special thank you however goes to Michael G Fleming, the Killorglin Rowing Club Head Coach who believed in me and got me started on my journey to Rio. As much as I wish to say I'm naturally talented and gifted at rowing, it

is not true. Without the hours of hard work and extreme patience that Mike has shown over the years, I would not be receiving this award. It is a pleasure to row for Ireland and represent people of Kerry and Killorglin on a local, national and an international level! Once again thank you.

time he started working in Beaumont Hospital where the hours were extremely long and the weekend work was just too frequent, which gave him no choice but to end his days in a legion jersey. Brian being the keen sportsman that he was wanted to stay playing football and joined Ballymun Kickhams where he played midfield for them until 2011 when he left for lowa . With a rueful smile he says that he still gets slagging that the fact that, without him, it was the following year that Kickhams went on to win the Dublin County final and the Leinster final and getting to the All Ireland club final on St. Patricks Day wasnt just a coincidence.

Since returning to Dublin from the States in December, his local club is now St. Brigids of Castleknock where he hopes to get involved once his children start to play. As we chatted, Brian reminisced about his earlier years in Killarney where he started playing juvenile for Legion in 1984 as an eight year old and he really enjoyed his football at all age groups up along the way, contesting quite a few championship finals, he says, but unfortunately coming out on the wrong side of most of them but he remembers that at minor level losing 4 or 5 of their better players and this totally decimated that team for a few years. Brian also had a great interest in rowing and was also a member of the Workmen Rowing club until he was 18, by which time he smirks, he had more rowing medals than football ones. While still a minor, Brian was drafted into the senior side by manager Sean Counihan in 1994 who were after winning the club championship that year and the county league division 1 the previous year. Sean saw great potential in Brian even at that young age and that vision was justified as Brian went on to become one of the finest midfielders the club has produced in the modern era. Whilst playing senior, Brian reckons Seamus Moynihan, who he lined out with for Kerry in the McGrath Cup, was the best footballer around and within his own club, he reckoned that Peter O'Leary, the

Culloty brothers and John K e a n e were the standout players. B r i a n,



being the gentleman that he is was reluctant to answer when I asked him who was a big influence on him in his playing days, as he didnt want to leave anybody out as there were a lot of great club people at the time but after constant badgering by me, he admitted that along with Sean Counihan, he reckoned Connie Carroll, Diarmuid O'Donoghue and Johnny Culloty all left a positive impression on him. I also asked him what if any change he saw over the years in the way the game of football has changed and he says that from the early nineties to when he retired a couple of years ago, that there has been a dramatic increase in the level of professionalism with strenght and conditioning programmes, increasing time commitments, increased number of backroom staff with dieticians, staticians, etc. And finally, when posed with the guestion of whether he would ever like to return to Killarney on permanent basis, he says that now that he is finally settled down back in Ireland, that he definitely intends to get home much more regularly, as he still has very good friends here and he really misses the homely atmosphere, the personable people, the sense of community, oh and of course, the occasional summer night lock-in. But as far as a permanent return is concerned, due to work commitments, unfortunately our future senior team will have to look elsewhere for a fullback line

Tommys Farming Week

There was a time when a preoccupation with the weather was the preserve of farmers and

fishermen, that day is gone. Growing up on a farm you quickly understood that no two years were the same, that weather is not predictable and that an average annual temperature really is akin to having your head in the oven and your feet in the fridge. A farm had to function at both extremes and all points in between.

The reaction to natural weather eventsathomeandabroadinthelast few weeks has been extraordinary. We closed the nations schools for a storm that was never going to threaten the nation and then the unthinkable happened, New York shut down for a threatened snow

storm. The media extravaganza which surrounded that announcement was straight out of an apocalyptic movie. Here at home we were told lives were saved because of the closure of our

schools. Melodrama had reached the weather room and we all had to suffer it.

Early warning systems are vital, the number of people dying from natural disasters has fallen like a stone over the last century and these systems are a factor in that success but we need to keep a balanced perspective. Colour coded warnings should mean more than a windy day. A storm, gale or frosty day should be described just as they are, not by a code designed to instill

fear in the minds of the audience. The concept of codes is a good one but they are in danger of being put into the same category as the boy who cried wolf.

It is an unfortunate sign of the times that all weather news must be melodramatic. In these last weeks our state broadcaster headlined a story classifying 2014 as the warmest year ever. In order to achieve the headline it used a report qualified by its authors as only 38% reliable. A study limited in its accuracy by the number and location of sites used to gain data.

If this was the best data we had then it would be acceptable but it is not on both counts. We have had access to satellite data since 1979. Global temperatures measured constantly by numerous satellites crossing the atmosphere. The results of that data is then compiled by two independent bodies, RSS and UAH. Until 1998 satellite data showed that the atmosphere was warming, since then technically a slight cooling. Until 1998 satellite data was the darling of climate hysteria since then an unmentionable embarrassment. Without a constantly warming atmosphere the global warming theory, in its current form is baseless, misrepresenting the facts

for whatever motive serves only to fuel the sort of paranoia we have witnessed this last month.

The warmest year ever, at least in this interglacial, occurred around 7000 years ago, during the





€5,000 FINES FOR CARRYING CHILDREN IN TRACTORS

The HSA has confirmed that it will prosecute farmers if children under seven years of age are found in tractors. A spokesperson for the HSA said that it will take such incidents on a case-bycase basis but, if visual a inspection on farms show that children under seven are in tractors it is a breach of regulations and the inspector will inform the farmer that they may be prosecuted.

"It's a case for the District Court judge to determine the prosecution, but fines of up to €5,000 can be imposed at District Court level."

He said that the HSA will not tolerate excuses such as 'minding the kids' anymore for children being found on tractors. "We are not interested in excuses. Too many children are being killed on farms. "Hopefully the message will go through, that it's not acceptable to have children on tractors." He also said that farmers would be prosecuted if unguarded PTO shafts or unguarded lagoons were found.

FARMING OUTLOOK

CASTLEISLAND MART PART OF THE FABRIC OF THE LOCAL COMMUNITY

For some it is a livelihood, for more it is a way to spend an afternoon and for the town of Castleisland it is a vital part of its fabric since 1958. Donal Barry went along to Castleisland Mart for the day to see what exactly happens in the world behind the gates.

It is early and there is already a queue forming at the office. Farmers with paperwork. It is something you are not supposed to believe but the check in process is the most vital part of the day's work.

Cards or passports at the ready, which will be scanned by office staff to clear them with the Department of Agriculture in order for the sale to go ahead. The process is simple but very effective. Cards are handed in, scanned and lot numbers are handed out. Next mission to load the cattle for sale and match the lot numbers. Its tractability at its best and as they enter the ring, the clerk is busily entering the information to show on the screen for the buyers to check weight and dates of birth. The auctioneer is called into action, within moments of nodding, winking, waves of the finger and at times, some tension the hammer is dropped, and the sale is completed. "They don't all go as easily as that, sometimes there is no sale but prices are good today," Joe tells us before he heads for the box to see what is in store for his cattle today.

While Joe heads to get the best price for his cattle, the staff "down the mart" are working overtime to get the numbers in the right order. "It's something were we used of doing now at this stage" one of them is happy to tell. Asked if people are likely to queue hop, the instant reply is one you should expect "people will try all sorts but we have two good full backs on duty today, even James O'Donoghue won't get passed"

It might seem a simple process but in truth, it will continue for hours with cattle ushered in and out through pins. To a novice it seems completed, to the expert it looks easy and to the children it is an amazing way to spend a few hours.

One person who is not a novice is Mart Manager Richard Hartnett. After a long day, he retires to the "back room" for sanctuary. "It was a very busy day, the sale was good and there was not too many problems, that's always a good day" he smiles as he heads to the seat behind the desk.

Hartnett from originally from Moyvane has been "part of the furniture" since 1982 when he took over as

Manager of Castleisland Mart. Having spent time "exiled" in Laois during his school days he has been back in the Kingdom ever since.

Over the years he has seen the different trends of farming and is not shy when it comes to talking straight "A lot of small dairy farmers who went out of milk changed over to suckling and they were doing a great job with it until 2009 when the bad weather set in and



sucklers went bad with a reduction of sucklers ever since then." He reflects as he is beginning to get warmed up. The passion of his job is plain to be seen. "There have been huge changes too in the development of the farms all for the good, excellent buildings, pollution and health controls. However with this we now live in a life of constant inspection and people are happy to have it that way but they would much prefer not to have as many inspections without notice, we are entitle to have inspections but they should get notification for it."

When it comes to the thorny questions of prices, he is firm in his belief that there is always more to be had

"We should get better paid for our produce diary or beef. The primary producer is not passed back a sufficient price for the efforts, time and costs he puts into producing the product and that came to a head last year in the beef. With the cost of production, they would want to get every cent per kilo that they are getting. The opening of the US market should see some positive signs. The beef bought out of here is moved up the country to be fattened and I believe that they will take out the better cuts like Fillet and sirloin steaks. With Americans at their lowest amount of livestock since the 1930's. Again that is because they were getting badly paid for their product so that is why they reduced it."

The mart is owned very much by the local community. It has 240 shareholders who elect a committee of 12 and then they are charged with the running of the business and would meet monthly. Its secretary is Ger Carmody who role "could be anything" by his own admission. Carmody speaks about another aspect of Mart life that is sometimes seldom seen. He is conscious of their social responsibility to the community. The Mart has played a prominent role in many things throughout the local community.

"We are extremely proud of the fact that we hand back almost €20,000 to the local community every year, through sponsorship and the likes. We have been with St. Kieran's district from the start, we are the main sponsors of the County Intermediate, Junior and Novice championships for the GAA and we are never found wanting for a local cause either. We would support a lot of local shows as well," Carmody adds

Therefore, what is the successful ingredient for a Mart that has lasted 57 years in a very competitive market? Hartnett offers his shortest answer of the day with conviction "hard work and good staff" he proudly announces. While it may be just five simple words over the course of the day it was evident from the office staff, to the readers, to the pinning staff all the way from the clerk to auctioneer that they certainly rings true.

Castleisland Mart holds two marts each week on Monday and Wednesday with a third on Fridays from November to May.



FOCUS ON HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

What we mean when we call a plant an Herbaceous Perennial is that in most of the them the stems are soft, succulent and green as opposed to being brown and woody. With most Herbaceous Perennial they will sprout growth from ground level in Spring and will grow and flower right through the Summer and into the Autumn. With most Herbaceous Perennials in late Autumn and early Winter they start to look a bit ragged. But depending on the severity of the Winter some will hold on until the first real cold snap. The maintenance for most Herbaceous Perennials isn't a lot really. During late Autumn early Winter cut the majority of them down to ground level and mulch over with some compost. Some Herbaceous Perennials such as Lupins and semi hardy Fuchsias will have woody stems because of the milder climate here so when pruning back cut right back to just a couple of inches above ground level.

ground level. Herbaceous Perennials are a valuable plant in the garden for a number of reasons.

1. Because of the length of time they flower for.

2. Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread.

When planting a Herbaceous Border always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant that you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Perennials flower from April until October/November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. The secret to having a good flowering Herbaceous Border is every few years in the Winter to lift and divide the plants that are suitable for this. *Next week I will focus on Roses.*

Know Your Rights: PART-TIME WORK AND PRSI

FEBRUARY 2015

QUESTION

Next week I start working part-time on a schedule that involves working one week on followed by one week off. I have been told that this could cause problems with social insurance records because of when the tax year starts. Can you explain why this is?

ANSWER

Each year, the Pay Related Social Insurance (PRSI) contribution week starts at the same time as the tax year on 1 January. This means that the PRSI contribution week can differ from the usual Monday to Friday working week. In 2015, 1 January fell on a Thursday. This means that the PRSI contribution week this year starts each Thursday and ends on the following Wednesday.

As you work part-time, you need to be aware of how this may affect you, particularly in the area of social welfare entitlements. If your working week is the same as the PRSI contribution week, starting on Thursday and ending on Wednesday, and you work every second week, then you will not have a PRSI contribution for each week that you are not working.

This could affect your entitlement to social welfare payments including the State Pension (Contributory) which is based on the average number of annual PRSI contributions you have paid since starting work. To make sure you have the full 52 PRSI contributions you must work at least one day in each contribution week of the year.

For example, if you work Monday to Friday every second week in 2015 then you will be working when the PRSI contribution week starts on Thursday and so will have a contribution for that week. You will be off work when the next contribution week starts on the next Thursday but will be working again before it ends on the following Wednesday, so you will have a contribution for that week also. Because you are working at least one day in each contribution week you will have all your PRSI contributions paid. Any work pattern where you work at least one day in each Thursday to Wednesday period will ensure that you do not miss paying a PRSI contribution.

MARGARET'S RAMBLINGS



DID YOU GUESS THE ANSWER TO LAST WEEKS RIDDLE?

If you have me, you want to share me. If you share me, you haven't got me. What am I? A Secret.

DOES YOUR SURNAME DESCRIBE YOUR ANCESTORS PROFESSION?

In ancient Ireland the population was much smaller than today and the mass movement of people was uncommon. It was usual therefore for a person to be known only by one name: Niall, Eoin, Art, etc. Once there was no one else in the locality with the same name then this was not a problem.

This single name system began to break down during the eleventh century as the population was growing and there was a need for a further means of identification. The solution was to adopt a prefix such as Mac (Mc is an abbreviation) or Ó. Mac means 'son of' whilst Ó means 'grandson of'.

At the time of the English invasion and colonisation of Ireland in the seventeenth century it became a disadvantage to have a Gaelic sounding name.

The Penal laws that were enforced by the English attempted to completely subjugate the Gaelic way of life. About that time many Gaelic names changed to their Anglo equivalent or translation. Many of the names were misinterpreted or misspelled, the conversion of names beginning with Mac and Mc was even more difficult because the removal of the M sound from the name often completely changed the sound of the name. Mac an Thomáis for example was converted to Holmes, Mac Giolla Íosa to MacAleese, etc.

The revival of Gaelic consciousness in the later eighteen hundreds saw many Irish families reassume the Mac, Mc, Ó or other Irish form of their names although this was reduced in a number of cases depending on the sound of the name (Kelly is still much more prevalent than O'Kelly, Murphy more prevalent than O'Murphy, etc.) There are many different origins for Irish names today but the vast majority can be broken down into either of three categories: Gaelic Irish, Cambro-Norman, and finally Anglo-Irish. In Britain last names weren't widely used until after the Norman invasion of 1066, but as the country's population grew, people found it necessary to be more specific when they were talking about somebody else. Occupational names identified people based on their job or position in society. Calling a man "Thomas Carpenter" indicated that he worked with wood for a living, while someone named Knight bore a sword. Other occupational names include Archer, Baker, Brewer, Butcher, Carter, Clark, Cooper, Cook, Dyer, Farmer, Faulkner, Fisher, Fuller, Gardener, Glover, Head, Judge, Mason, Page, Parker, Potter, Sawyer, Slater, Smith, Taylor, Thatcher, Turner, Weaver, Woodman, and Wright (or variations such as Cartwright and Wainwright) — and there are many more. This kind of name also gave a clue about whom a servant worked for. Someone named Vickers might have been a servant to Mr. Vicker, and someone named Williams might either have served a William or been adopted by him.

Some names, were based on nicknames that described a person. They may have described a person's size (Short, Long, Little), colouring (Black, White, Green, or Red, which could have evolved into "Reed"), or another character trait (Stern, Strong, Swift). Someone named Peacock might have been considered vain.

A last name may also have pointed to where a person was born, lived, worked, or owned land.

It might be from the name of a house, farm, hamlet, town, or county. Some examples: Bedford, Burton, Hamilton, Hampshire, Sutton or London.

People were also given their last name from a geographical feature of the landscape near where they lived a few examples are, Bush, Fields, Greenwood, Hill, etc.

Surnames that come from a male given name include Benson ("the son of Ben"), Harrison, Jackson, Nicholson, Robinson, Simpson and so on. Surnames derived from a female given name, include Madison (from Maud) and Marriott (from Mary).

Scottish clan names make up one set of ancestral surnames. These include Armstrong, Cameron, Campbell, Crawford, Douglas, Forbes, Grant, Henderson, Hunter, MacDonald, and Stewart.

WOULDN'T IT BE WONDERFUL IF THE COUNTRIES OF THE WORLD RESPONDED THIS WAY TO ALL MAJOR DISASTERS?

At time of writing, good news has been coming out of West Africa's hardest hit areas. The Ebola virus, the World Health Organization (WHO) is saying, is on its last legs. Cases have dropped substantially from around 200-300 new infections per week to 21 suspected and 1 confirmed in Liberia. Sierra Leone has seen a similar drop in cases, but their infection rates there remain considerably higher.

The outbreak began in December of 2013 in Guinea. At first it was a small contained outbreak, similar to the various flair ups we've seen in the DRC and Uganda in the past, most of which burnt themselves out quickly and stayed within their particular district. However, this time, due to regional trade and a misunderstanding of the virus, cases started jumping from town to town, city to city and slum to slum.

Within the span of a few months, the virus shot up to unprecedented rates, becoming the worst outbreak of Ebola in history. To date, it has killed more than 8,600 people, and infected tens of thousands, crippling the already weak health infrastructure in Sierra Leone, Liberia and Guinea.

However, last fall, during the height of global awareness surrounding the pandemic, a worldwide response was led that is now being seen as crucial to Ebola's decline. The United States sent troops, supplies and aid, the EU and World Bank followed suit, helping to mobilize healthcare centres. China sent medication, troops and aid money, and Cuba sent a large deployment of doctors over to West Africa.

Stamping out Ebola is far from over, but we should look at the data and realize that with a global response to the pandemic, death rates and infection rates have plummeted. Getting health care centres set up, enforcing travel bans, spreading education and working with local populations does make a dramatic difference. Yet because new infections are still popping up, experts are telling us to look at the drop as an indicator to keep going, rather than stop caring.

GOOD NEWS:

No one could blame Amaranth Yadav for not remembering his wedding day. After all, he was just 7 years old and still half asleep.

What he won't forget are the years that followed - the anger he felt because his wife, who was also a child, was never allowed to go to school. He resented how fast he had to grow up and all the pressure placed on him to succeed. And most of all he resented being forced into a life he didn't choose.

But as the groom, at least Amaranth got to go to school and get a college degree. Today, at 27, he's using his education to fight against child marriage by working with CARE's Tipping Point - a project addressing child marriage through advocacy - and he now lives with his wife and children in Nepal.

Amaranth was relatively fortunate. The brides don't usually fare as well. Consider:

Girls married before their 18th birthday don't

often complete their secondary education, let alone college. And they're at a higher risk of being physically abused, contracting HIV, and dying while pregnant or giving birth.

But Amaranth is using his experience to help turn the tide. He's teaching his neighbours how dangerous child marriage can be—for the boy and girl—and showing them sustainable alternatives to the practice. He's even teaching his wife to read.

WE ARE SO LUCKY IN IRELAND:

A few weeks ago, residents in Ontario and Quebec were woken up at night from loud booming sounds caused by "frost quakes."

The booms occur when moisture in the ground freezes and expands, putting pressure on ice and rock. This pressure is ultimately released with a loud boom and the rock cracks.

One resident said at least four frost quakes hit his house and described the sounds as a "deep rumbling" that sent windows shaking, and his house "shuddering".

A seismologist with Earthquakes Canada, explained how the "frost quakes" were caused by ice. They are a cracking of ice or two blocks of ice moving one against each other. It happens because ice expands when it gets cold, it often happens when it's extremely cold, like minus 20C or colder and particularly if there's been a sudden drop in temperature, and especially near lakes and rivers. It feels a lot like an earthquake to someone close to it, but Earthquake Canada's instruments don't pick up the shaking since these ice quakes are very localised the seismologist said. Frost quakes have been previously reported in upstate New York, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut and Maine.

WORLD'S FIRST SOLAR-POWERED LOCK PROTECTS YOU AND YOUR BIKE:

Do you have a bicycle lock that you close and go on your way until you get back and insert the key or input the combination, assuming the lock hasn't been cut or jimmied and your bike is gone. Now a keyless, Bluetoothenabled smart lock has been developed by a team of San Francisco-based engineers who named it Skylock and calls it "the world's first solar-powered connected bike lock." An app downloaded on the user's iPhone or Android device is the connection between him and his Skylock-equipped bike. It controls the lock remotely, but it does much more than that. If someone is trying to cut the lock - a difficult and time - consuming process - the lock's triaxial accelerometer will have notified you that your bike is being tampered with before the thief can take off. According to the developers, "Any lock can be cut with enough time and the right tools. Since Skylock requires two cuts to break, this means you have twice the amount of time to respond to a theft alert'

they said. The only drawback is it can send a false alarm if someone accidentally bumps your bike but at least you can go check to see what's going on. The Skylock can also be programmed so that if you are in an accident or get hit by a car it sends an automatic alert to a person or persons of your choice. The system only works if both phone and Skylock get a shock, so nothing will happen if you drop one or the other. What happens if both are in your backpack and you drop it? "The system will ask you if you are ok and take action if you don't reply. The Skylock isn't just convenient and protective, it's also eco-friendly. With its lowpower design and solar-recharged battery, it needs little charging to provide power for up to months at a time. Skylock's developers say you're unlikely to run out of battery power (or your phone runs out) and find yourself locked out of your bike, but "If you are ever running low, just plug in the USB charger and Skylock will be ready to guard you and your bike again," they say. "Skylock also has a built-in capacitive panel. Just type in a key code combination to unlock Skylock if your phone ever runs out of charging. Cycling enthusiasts were excited enough by the Skylock that it blew through its first Indiegogo fundraising goal in a single day and raised double its set goal in the second. Skylock doesn't come cheap and will retail for \$250 but the company is taking preorders at

\$250 but the company is taking preorders at \$159 which will suit some serious cyclists that measure their dedication by how much money they are able to spend.

DID YOU KNOW

• The gastric-brooding frog of eastern Australia incubated its offspring in its stomach. Scientists presume the female swallowed its eggs, and after six to seven weeks, fully formed frogs emerged from her mouth. Unfortunately, the International Union for Conservation of Nature declared this unique genus extinct in 2002. The reasons behind its disappearance remain unclear, but timber harvesting and water quality are suspected.


• The IUCN lists the Ivory-Billed Woodpecker, endemic to the United States and Cuba, as critically endangered. But despite many intensive searches, the last confirmed sighting was in 1987. It was reportedly spotted in the Big Woods region of Arkansas in 2004, but evidence - including a "poor-quality" video remains controversial. (It's debated whether the bird filmed was just another type of woodpecker.) Latest studies contend that the species is likely extinct. The culprits: logging, clearance for agriculture, and hunting.


