Killarney family who were enjoying a E walk in the National Park at the weekend have sent out a warning to others. The Doyle's, Christina and Padraig along with their four children Seán, Kate, Zoey & Cora were enjoying the circular loop walk on Saturday when they encountered a Sika Deer.

"The girls had their scooters, so they were a few feet ahead of us as we walked after them", Christina said.

.

"On the lower road we spotted a Sika stag crossing the road so stopped to observe him, soon after he crossed back to the left side of the road but as he did a second Sika stag started to approach from the right hand side of the park. He took absolutely no notice of us on the road and came straight towards the girls who were startled and didn't know what to do", Christina added. "We ran to the girls and pulled them to safety while Padraig, thankfully grabbing Cora's scooter in his hand distracted the stag, who dropped his head and his antlers made contact

The Sika wasn't a bit startled or frightened after

Sika are generally unpredictable and inquisitive in their behaviour towards humans, although they tend to react quickly on the first suspicion of danger by fleeing however this Sika didn't seem one bit afraid of us, perhaps used of seeing people walking through the park or being petted or fed when younger, Christina said.

Deer are interesting to watch because their behaviour changes as the rut progresses but remember that male deer are pumped full of testosterone and highly aggressive; in parks, attacks on dogs are not uncommon, and sometimes people are also injured. So don't get too close.

"We were extremely lucky that the Sika we had a close encounter with was walking towards us, and not running with force or didn't make contact with the girls", she added.

Please take extra care throughout the National Park while rutting season is taking place. The Sika & Red deer are stunning to watch and listen too, but they are wild animals at the end of the day.

"Please mind yourself, children and dogs while out and about", Christina warned.

Its the talk of the town...

With Anne Lucey

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

Giving nurses a fair hearing



Listening to nurses may be one of the few good things to come out of a harrowing maternal death inquest in Tralee last week. The first recommendation by the coroner and jury stated that 'going forward clinicians (doctors etc) need to hear nurses' concerns'. Listening to nurses and to women in general, and allowing them a voice, is not something we excel at in Kerry, but maybe things are changing.

The intense and very trying inquiry into the death of the 34-year-old mother of four Tatenda Makwata gave an insight into the tough working conditions in our acute University Hospital Kerry - better than any ER serial. One of the big failings in the Tralee hospital, I felt, having sat through three full days of evidence, is lack of communication. And poor communication and failures in communication. This was true even of the inquest itself. A number of witnesses, fairly senior in the doctor rankings in UHK it has to be said, had to be asked repeatedly to slow down their scripted delivery and pace it better so the jury and everyone could understand and follow.

I felt coroner Helen Lucey would have every right to lose her patience, but she held her equanimity and simply intervened again and again and again as highly technical evidence was raced through as if a train were leaving the station. I would not have been so patient!

Among the other six recommendations was to have proper communication between the lab and the consultants and to have patient information shared electronically - basically an intranet - across all wards.

I would have added another rider - make sure that those in senior positions can communicate properly and slowly and in basic non-technical English. Good communication should be part of anyone's job and duty.

It is time we listened to nurses, who are the ones who spend time with patients, but perhaps we should also give them a pathway to become clinicians themselves.

New shoots from old stock

Now that the renovation of the Edwardian greenhouses in Mukcross is nearing completion, it may be time to open up the spectacular Victorian Tudor style 'glasshouse' that occupies the lawn area. It is filled with datura, succulents and other heat loving and exotic plants and on a day last week at least one Australian visitor was disappointed not to be able to wander through.

We have an ideal opportunity in Killarney now with the demand for interest based holidays to look at indoor facilities and build on what we have. (I very much regret that the old Presentation Convent in the architectural heart of Killarney could not have been bought by an educational or heritage body and turned into a natural history and education museum and perhaps a town museum. But there we go. The nuns in Kenmare who sold their convent for under the market value for the public good will

have eternal gratitude of Kenmare.)

Like other garden lovers who visit botanical gardens all over the place, I find that invariably, whether in France, Spain, Dublin or Kew, the old hothouse is an architectural gem as well as being of massive interest botanically. The greenhouse in Muckross was built in 1843 for Henry Arthur Hebert and his family. It is described as ' a huge architecturally superb structure with sixty- five rooms that took over four years to build.

A notice near the door recalls how the existing house had benefited from a donation from Peggy Malone, Maryvale, Muckross Road on the death of her husband Peter who 'spent many happy hours working in this glass house. It is important to acknowledge such local philanthropy in a Killarney that is becoming over-commercially driven and where old stock like myself, and much newer stock too, are beginning to feel disconnected.

Time for Norma to get off the fence and start singing for legal Kerry



The composers have left Tralee,' was the lament from one familiar face at the courthouse in Ashe Street last week where I hadn't been for a while.

He was referring to the fact that both Chopin's and Mozart's cafes where I and others have spent many hours on either side of the courthouse over the past 15 years, waiting for cases and typing up reports have now both shut shop.

There is a huge feeling in Ashe Street the courthouse has been left in limbo, if not abandoned. And the street is suffering.

We hear the deeds are to be transferred to the courts service for a half acre in the Island of Geese old bacon factory site well west of Ashe Street for a new courthouse. I am no longer convinced that the Geese site which is far from what was first envisaged is now the right place for a courthouse.

That there is no real progress on either doing up the old courthouse or building a new one is very serious, not just for Tralee but for our county. It is time for Kerry's only minister, Norma Foley, to come out and lay her cards on the table on the matter. Kerry needs every bit of clout it can wield. Norma is our only show in town. People tell me they have approached her about the courthouse in Tralee but have had little feedback. Certainly not the kind of intervention they expect. It is time this minister, who has played a blinder in her own education brief, looked at other areas of such vital interest for Kerry. A good rump of old Tralee does not support the move from a Palladian building to a bacon factory site, it has to be remembered. And Norma will lose votes if she comes out swinging for the new site. But wth the composers in Ashe Street Tralee now both silent, she must start singing one way or the other. We are not expecting a rendition of Casta Diva, but we are expecting a stance.

Sweet as Honey...

LOCAL FAMILY WIN GOLD AT BLAS NA HEIREANN

Regan's Family Apiary in Killarney won Gold at Blas na hEireann in Dingle over the weekend for the tastiest honey in Ireland. "We are delighted to be the first Kerry Beekeepers to win the Gold award at Blas na hEireann having won Silver in 2022", Tim Regan told Killarney Outlook.

"The bees will be buzzing when I tell them that they are producing the tastiest honey in Ireland. I am confident that more Kerry honeys will feature in the final in the coming years", he added.

"Just as the proof of the pudding is in the eating so too the proof of the honey is in the taste. Being awarded the tastiest honey in Ireland by Blas na hEireann is indeed special.

All honeybees bring in nectar to make honey. The nectar the bees bring back to the hive is 80% water and bees must fan this with their wings to evaporate the water and make honey. The forage i.e. wild flowers in the surrounds gives the honey from each apiary its own unique taste. Kerry is blest with a vast variety of wild flowers which makes Kerry honey taste so much better.

"Our honey is harvested from the hives in early September. It is then capped, spun and sieved to remove big pieces of wax and pollen before jarring. It is 100% pure and natural and unfiltered. The honey still contains small particles of wax and pollen which are not visible to the naked eye and these help to combat allergens.

"People are recently much more interested in natural foods and the health benefits they possess and are willing to pay more for 100% local honey than imported blended honey. The Regan Family apiary is located in a

traditional farm 3 km from Killarney town. It comprises of twenty acres of farmland with a variety of bee loving hedgerows, e.g. Blackthorn, Gorse, Oak, Rowan, Sycamore, and Whitethorn. There is a Bee Meadow which comprises of 2.5 acres of flowers for pollinators along with wild flowers to attract bumblebees, butterflies and insects with a pathway around the Bee Meadow with information posters to assist you identify the birds, butterflies and bumblebees. Due to the poor weather we had in July the amount of summer honey harvested is down by over 40%, this will lead to a shortage of local honey this year. "We sell our honey to 5 star hotels and from an honesty box at our house V93D7W0. It is also available at the Blacksheep hostel and café in New Street and Noelle's at the Milltown market", he added.

From the moment the issue first became a topic of debate, I, along with the teacher unions, took the firm stance that teacher-based assessments of their own students would fundamentally damage the relationship between teacher and student. The bond of friendship, the unity of purpose, the trust, the collegiality in the classroom would be lost and gone forever.

DEVELOPMENT

On the other hand, curriculum development, subject syllabus revision and multiple objective assessment methods are part and parcel of an education reform, which is supported by all stakeholders. The introduction of new subjects

that meet the needs of contemporary students has been widely welcomed. Allocating 40% of Leaving Cert marks to project work, orals and practical components is very progressive. There was a collective sigh of teacher relief when it was recently announced that the entire Leaving Cert exam will continue to be assessed impartially, objectively and externally by the State Examinations Commission (SEC).

DEFERRED

The new Leaving Cert assessment system, including the 40% teacher assessed components, was to be introduced in two years, but that has now been deferred to allow time for teachers to train in the use of Artificial Intelligence and social media platforms like ChatGPT. The SEC is accelerating the development of new and revised specifications in nine subjects and the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA) is developing the 40% externally assessed components in each subject.

ROLL-OUT

There will be a national roll-out of the revised subject specifications for seven existing Leaving Cert subjects, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Business, Arabic, Latin, and Ancient Greek from September 2025. A second tranche of revised subjects will roll-out in schools in 2026, with others due to follow annually after that. Two new subjects, Drama Film & Theatre Studies and Climate Action & Sustainable Development, will be introduced on a phased basis from September 2005.

PRESSURE

The new Leaving Cert assessment methods will reduce pressure on students and ensure their results will not be exclusively determined by a terminal exam in June. There is no doubt that current exam students want and are entitled to a broader range of exam assessment methods. However, I, for one, am relieved that teachers will have no role in marking any component of their own students' exam performance.

HSE'S AUTUMN WINTER VACCINATION PROGRAMME BEGINS

.....

The HSE's Autumn Winter vaccination programme got underway this week with the roll out of the free Flu and COVID19 vaccines to recommended groups.

The COVID19 Autumn Winter booster vaccine is recommended for people aged 50 and over. The Flu vaccine is recommended for people aged 65 and over. Both vaccines are recommended for health and care workers, anyone who is pregnant or has a long term health condition.

Both vaccines will be available from participating GPs and pharmacists and can be given at the same time. Health and care worker vaccination clinics will also take place in many workplaces across the country.

HSE vaccination teams will also provide both vaccines for people living in residential care facilities including nursing homes as well as to housebound patients.

The significance of the vaccination programme in saving people from serious illness and death from Covid19 is highlighted by recent research undertaken by the Health Protection Surveillance Centre (HPSC) on the impact of the COVID19 vaccine programme in Ireland on reducing deaths and hospitalisations.

Between December 2021 and March 2023, the study estimates that the vaccination programme prevented 87% of deaths, 81% of hospitalisations and 89% of ICU admissions that would have been expected to occur in the absence of vaccination.

The pneumococcal vaccine (PPV23) which

protects against pneumonia, septicaemia and meningitis is also available free of charge from participating GPs for people aged 65 and older. The vaccine can be taken at the same time as the Flu and COVID19 vaccines.

The children's Flu vaccine (a nasal spray) will also launch on 9th October and will be available from participating GPs and Pharmacists for children aged 2-12 years. An extension of this year's programme will see the vaccine offered to children in Senior Infants and all children in Primary Age Special Schools this year.

CHARITY WANTS SINGLE CIGARETTE TO COST €1 BY 2025

A single cigarette will cost €1 by 2025 if the Government adopts health recommendations in the next two Budgets.

The Irish Heart Foundation is insisting on the price increases to confront a rise in the number of youth smokers.

Chris Macey, Director of Advocacy and Patient Support with the national charity, said studies show hikes in tobacco tax are the most effective way to reduce tobacco smoking levels.

"The Irish Heart Foundation is calling for a commitment from the Government to increase the price of a packet of 20 cigarettes to \in 20 by 2025," he said.

"This would require a Budget increase of €2.10 for the next two years. "When Ireland introduced the workplace smoking ban, other



countries followed. "But we have lost ground, and smoking rates in the young are on the rise. "The biggest weapon the Government has to deter children from smoking is tax, but they're not using it effectively."

In its pre-Budget 2024 submission, the charity also recommended price hikes for electronic cigarette liquid - but not to overly penalise those using vapes as a cessation method.

The charity, which campaigns on public health issues for heart and stroke patients, is also calling for the introduction of a national heart failure registry, a five-year hypertension national awareness campaign, and a high-level review of taxation to incentivise a reduction of high amounts of fat, salt and sugar in food.

The Ballydribeen Community Development Plan 2023-2028 was officially launched on Thursday evening the 28th September in the International Hotel in Killarney by Mayor Brendan Cronin. The Residents Association commissioned plan was received by a very good turnout of residents, councillors and other interested agencies.

This plan details the priority actions for the development of the area over the coming years and is based on in-depth consultation with the community and key agencies and organisations. The plan was prepared by independent community consultants Paul O'Raw and associates, Dr Brendan O'Keeffe and Dr Hrishi Balall. The process also included a Geodesign workshop with local residents and stakeholders. The Resident's Association is now keen to strengthen its working relations with all stakeholders to implement the strategies in the plan, to meet the needs of this young, growing and dynamic community.

According to the survey the vast majority of the residents enjoy living in Ballydribeen which has a lot of natural advantages such as being close to the river Deenagh as well as within walking distance to shops, schools and medical facilities.

Highlighted areas include: The entrance to and from the estates; Lack of facilities, for such a big housing area, which is made up of 7 separate estates that includes 320 houses, there are no amenities e.g., childcare, playgrounds: No access to a Community Garda.

The overwhelming negative issue with regard to the estates is the entrance junction with the very busy main Tralee Road. There is only one entrance /exit for about 320 houses. It is a major concern and an ongoing issue. This dangerous situation has already caused several accidents and will continue to do so unless something is done immediately. Residents live in fear of further accidents.

The full implementation of the plan which includes improved community facilities and extra resources will help the residents association's goal in making the Ballydribeen area one of the best places to live in Killarney. This Community Development plan was made possible through funding from the Rural & Community Development (Leader) and SICAP.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options: **Tax Free Cash:** Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. LENGTHY DELAYS IN DRIVING TEST NOT ACCEPTABLE

Deputy Danny Healy Rae has raised the issue regarding the lengthy delays with getting driving tests in Kerry where many young people are waiting up to a year now and it is not acceptable. Mr Brendan Walsh, Chief Operations Officer Road Safety Authority was at the Committee meeting.

" I am making the strongest case possible, even to the Minister, to take some urgent action to deal with the emergency that exists at the present time. When you are young, you need to get a chance to go on the road. They have done the 12 lessons and to be waiting for so long is



not fair. I call on the Minister to do something drastic or to take emergency action to help these people who have done the 12 lessons. God almighty, that is like the story, live horse until you get grass. It is not good enough. If Mr. Walsh cannot not do something urgently about it, about people waiting for three and six months, and is telling me that it will be the middle of next year, then he had better get out of it all together. On behalf of the people who have done their 12 lessons and who have already been waiting for nine months, or for 12 months in many instances, I am calling on the Minister to enact some emergency legislation to give them a licence until the NDLS can give them a test. What is there now is not acceptable."

ROSSBEIGH
EROSIONUnderstand

The beautiful sand dunes at Rossbeigh Beach are under constant pressure from erosion from the elements and are in danger of being wiped out, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill.

"Everything possible must be done to save the sand dunes at the famous beach from being wiped out" said local resident and Councillor, Michael Cahill.

"The dunes in Rossbeigh have been breached on a number of occasions in recent years by the Atlantic Ocean, and further damage will occur if steps are not taken to protect them and to protect homes all along the coast from Kells through Incherea, Dooks, and Cromane. The residents of these areas deserve to know when works will start to protect their homes and the general public deserve to know if Rossbeigh Sand-dunes are going to be totally wiped out by the tide" stated Councillor Cahill.

"As the owners of the beach, I would be anxious that Kerry County Council would get involved in a major marram grass project. I know there is plenty of interest locally. I think it would be a fabulous project" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"I would ask the Council to do everything possible and help us in every way before it's too late. The spit at Rossbeigh protects all the lowlying areas. A project needs to be put in place at an early date" added Michael Cahill.

Kerry County Council have confirmed to Councillor Michael Cahill of Fianna Fáil that

their Biodiversity Officer will engage with any interested local parties in Rossbeigh with a view to ascertaining what works can be undertaken, having regard to habitat designations in the Rossbeigh area. Rossbeigh beach and dunes have been severely affected in recent years by erosion and storms, and ten million tons of sand have been relocated from there.

"Rossbeigh sand spit is an enormously important outdoor habitat for wildlife, vegetation and plants, as well as being used by walkers, swimmers, surfers etc, as an amazing outdoor playground. We have a responsibility to protect it in whatever way we can and I would like to see a local grouping formed, to plan for its future" stated local Councillor Michael Cahill.

"People come from far and wide to avail of Rossbeigh's fresh sea air and beautiful scenery, but I fear if left to its natural cycle, it may disappear altogether. The 100+ year old Navigational Tower collapsed there in 2011, which is not a good omen" said Councillor Cahill.

"I believe there is significant local interest and that a number of schools in South Kerry will be interested in forming a group to help protect Rossbeigh beach and dunes for future generations and we will be liaising with the Kerry County Council Biodiversity Officer" added Councillor Cahill.



DANNY HEALY RAE SUPPORTS EARLY CHILDCARE PROVIDERS

DeputyDanny Healy Rae has called onMinister O'Gorman and the Government to respond and address the issues facing Early Childcare Providers. Following the early childcare providers protest outside

Leinster house on Tuesday it has been made very clear that the present model is no longer sustainable as so many creches have closed and there are many more will close if Minister O'Gorman doesn't respond in the budget.

I met with creche owners, childcare workers and parents with their young children who came in their droves from all over the country to make their point. Already parents everywhere are struggling to find creches and if more creches close many parents will have to expose themselves to more financial hardship as many more parents will have to stay at home if they can't find childcare. It's clear to everyone that one person working won't have enough income to support a household.

I am calling on Minister O'Gorman and the Government to respond and address this serious matter in the budget.

FLASHES AND FLOATERS

When should you be concerned about flashes and floaters?

Tiny spots, lines, flashes or shapes in your vision are known as flashes and floaters. Lots of people experience them and they usually aren't cause for alarm.

What are flashes?

Sometimes the jelly inside your eye shrinks a little and tugs on the retina (the light-sensitive layer) at the back of your eye. This can cause flashes of light at the edge of your vision. This is different from the disturbance of vision that can happen with a migraine.

What are floaters?

Often, people who have healthy eyes see floaters. They appear as spots, lines or cobweb effects, usually when you look at a plain surface such as a white wall, screen or a clear blue sky. They are usually caused by cells clumping together in the clear jelly in the main part of your eye and casting shadows on your retina. The sudden appearance of new floaters is different and may be caused by the jelly shrinking and can sometimes mean there is a tear in the retina.

When should I be concerned? If you suddenly notice a shower of new floaters, or floaters along with flashes or a dark shadow or a 'curtain' in your vision, you should take urgent action. What will happen if the retina tears?

The retina is the light-sensitive layer at the back of your eye which receives images and sends them to your brain. If the retina tears, it may come away from the back of the eye and can lead to a retinal detachment which can result in you losing part or all of your vision.

How is retinal detachment treated?

A tear may be treated by using a laser. If treated quickly you may have a better chance of full recovery. However, if your retina has become detached, you will need surgery. The operation may restore most of your vision. What to do if your symptoms

change Look out for the following:

• Flashes or floaters getting worse

- A black shadow in your vision
- A sudden cloud of spots
- A curtain or veil over your vision

MOTORWAY SAFETY

Irish Road Safety Week taking place from Monday 2 October to Sunday 8 October

As part of Irish Road Safety Week this week, the RSA are reminding road users of the Rules of the Road when driving on Ireland's motorway network.

The key rules of the road when it comes to driving on a motorway include:

The maximum speed limit on a motorway is 120km per hour unless: There are signs indicating another speed limit, for example due to roadworks or bad weather.

You are driving a vehicle that is subject to a lower speed limit such as a bus (100km/h) or truck (90km/h), or if you are towing a trailer, caravan or horse/cattle box (80km/h).

You should always drive in the left lane unless you need to overtake a slower vehicle, or the lane is blocked. Once you have finished overtaking, move from the right lane back into the left lane as soon as it is safe to do so. On a three-lane motorway, there is an extra overtaking lane, but you should still keep left as much as possible. Check your mirrors on a constant basis, as the situation around you will be changing all the time. Before overtaking or changing lanes, remember 'mirror, signal, mirror, manoeuvre'.

Remember that you must leave enough room in front of you to allow you to stop safely.

Road users are reminded that it is an offence to stop on the hard shoulder of a motorway unless it's an emergency (i.e. a breakdown). If this occurs, you should call for help using your mobile phone or one of the emergency roadside phones, and wait at a safe place, behind the crash barrier. Additionally, under no circumstances should anyone ever walk or cycle on a motorway.

If you find yourself driving against the flow of traffic, pull in immediately to the hard shoulder and stop. Contact the Gardaí by dialling 999 or 112. Do not attempt to turn your vehicle. Wait for help in a safe place.

Goalkeepers – Shane Ryan (Kerry), Stephen Cluxton (Dublin), Rory Beggan (Monaghan). I must say that I am surprised that Derry's Odhran Lynch isn't nominated, given his penalty heroics. I genuinely didn't think that Stephen Cluxton (easily the greatest football goalkeeper of all time) actually had his best year, and I expect Shane Ryan to take this one, especially after his phenomenal display against Mayo in the group stage.

Defenders - Jason Foley, Tadhg Morley, Tom O'Sullivan, Gavin White (all Kerry), Michael Fitzsimons, Lee Gannon, Brian Howard (all Dublin), Gareth McKinless, Conor McCluskey, Eoin McEvoy (all Derry), Pádraig Hampsey (Tyrone), Brendan McCole (Donegal), Conor McCarthy, Karl O'Connell (both Monaghan), Seán Kelly (Galway), Aidan Forker (Armagh), Brian Stack (Roscommon), Rory Maguire (Cork). Mick Fitzsimons and Conor McCluskey are pretty much sure things. I think Jason will battle it out with Seán Kelly to get in at two and I expect Lee Gannon to just pip Tom O'Sullivan for the other corner. Hampsey shone for Tyrone in a tough year for them. I'd just about give the nod to Karl O'Connell, Gareth McKinless, and Eoin McEvoy to battle it out for the other two spots - but I suspect that James McCarthy will be shoehorned into the half back line somewhere for sentimental reasons.

Midfielders – Brian Fenton, James McCarthy (both Dublin), Conor Glass, Brendan Rogers (both Derry), Diarmuid O'Connor (Kerry), Diarmuid O'Connor (Mayo).

Brian Fenton and Brendan Rogers are nominated for Player of the Year. If they aren't the midfield pairing, then somebody is trying way too hard to generate headlines. It happened in 1994 when Offaly's Brian Whelehan was the Hurler of the Year but not an All Star. It was a split vote – but absolutely preposterous regardless. The only worse one I have seen is when manager Brian Cody was awarded the 2008 man of the match in the All Ireland Final. They were, thankfully, called out for that nonsense and have never repeated it. Mayo, who were the best team out there for the first four months but then slipped off the precipice, will have Diarmuid O'Connor in real contention.

Forwards – David Clifford, Seán O'Shea, Paudie Clifford (all Kerry), Cormac Costello, Con O'Callaghan, Colm Basquel, Paul Mannion (all Dublin), Shane McGuigan, Paul Cassidy (both Derry), Conor McManus (Monaghan), Darragh Canavan (Tyrone), Andrew Murnin (Armagh), Ronan O'Toole (Westmeath), Damien Comer (Galway), Jordan Flynn (Mayo), Ben McCormack (Kildare), Oisín Gallen (Donegal), Enda Smith (Roscommon).

David and Paudie Clifford, Shane McGuigan, and Colm Basquel are surely nailed on. Paul Mannion didn't have a great year but he did have a great final, and that tends to sway the All Star votes an awful lot (too much, if truth be told). I honestly thought Enda Smith had a great year. Cormac Costello must be in with a good shout – he was actually Dublin's go-to forward for the earlier games

Player Of The Year - Brian Fenton (Dublin), David Clifford (Kerry), Brendan Rogers (Derry). There's a lot of surprise that James McCarthy isn't nominated - if he was, the popular poll would surely carry the icon over the finishing line. But actually, while he showed incredible leadership and I rate him as just behind Donegal's Michael Murphy as the best of his era, he wasn't actually the force of old this year. He did have a very good final, but I thought he danced on the wrong side of the disciplinary line on a few occasions. I hope and think that isn't subconscious bias; I had no problem on the day or now with saying that Dublin were the better overall team that day and fully deserved their win. The surprise absentee for me has to be Shane McGuigan. Brendan Rodgers was a force of nature this year but the selflessness of Conor Glass played a big part in that, while McGuigan was defensive Derry's main scoring threat and a potent one, finishing as championship top scorer. Brian Fenton has already won this award twice and, while he wasn't the model of consistent excellence he

has been in previous years, he did always step up when Dublin needed him. I think David is in with a very real shout here.

Young Player Of The Year – Eoin McEvoy (Derry), Conor Carroll (Roscommon), Ethan Doherty (Derry)

Eoin McEvoy surely. Conor Carroll was a link in a Roscommon collective rather than individually brilliant (I'm not disputing that he played his role really well). Doherty was excellent but I thought McEvoy was even better.

The competition favourites haven't shown their full hand yet, nor have they been forced to show their full hand. However, Templenoe gave them a fair rattle of it. It was point for point in the first half, Darragh Roche and Darragh Lyne excellent for East Kerry but Killian Spillane on fire for Templenoe. East Kerry led by a point at half-time, 0-7 to 0-6. Aidan Crowley levelled levelled with a superb score but Mark Griffin, as indomitable as always, replied before Patrick Darcy struck for a great goal. Playmaker Darragh O'Connor really caught my eye here, really solid player. James McCarthy brings a bit of fire and dash. But one players scores 75% of all their scores in every game. Rathmore, even without Chrissy Spiers, always carry a multiplicity of threats. John Moynihan is deadly for goals and obliged here once again after a good burst by an impressive Mark Ryan. Rathmore were always on top in general play - all three brothers were superb and Alan Dineen and Brian Friel had great games in defence. Friel got on the scoresheet and also denied Stephen O'Brien with a great block late on when a goal would have salvaged a draw. Towards the end of both halves, Rathmore looked to play possession football and kill the clock. Absolutely the right thing to do in the first half, less so in the second, with Seán O'Shea kicking three late frees to put just a goal between them. Frankly, I'd be doing the same myself. Paul Walsh goaled in the 4th minute and, while Feale Rangers' resistance most certainly didn't evaporate (in all fairness, they deserve credit for their battling qualities in these circumstances) a second one that was fortunate enough from the Brosnan hitman in the 17th minute had them flatlining. Eddie Horan notched the third and at half-time St. Kierans led 3-6 to 0-4. Cormac Dillon and Darragh Lynch ploughed away for Feale Rangers St. Kierans could keep the tempo low in the second half and always stay comfortable, Niall Collins impressing with 1-2 off the bench.

Both North Kerry sides gone in the group stage, and that's going to generate more talk about amalgamation, but I'd be holding off on that until the successful North Kerry minor players get a bit of senior experience under their belts.

They showed plenty of courage and enough football to show that they will be a tricky enough proposition once they get a bit of game time under their belts, with centre forward Darragh O'Keeffe, full forward Mikey Galvin, and a roving Luke Sheridan showing why underage football in North Kerry has advanced so much since the amalgamation of Shannon Rangers and Feale Rangers at underage. The Sem were simply a different level, though, with star of the show Alex Hennigan notching a first half hat-trick to

MOYNIHAN CUP

Corn Uí Mhuirí side Sliabh Luachra went into this one as favourites and won out by 1-17 to 2-9, but this was a much tighter and more entertaining game than I had expected. They led by 1-12 to 1-4 at half-time, with centre back Pádraig Moynihan, James Doyle, John Hughes, and Darragh O'Keeffe outstanding. They opened a three point lead before Causeway struck for a great goal, Pádraig Kenny finishing a great pass by Dylan Costello to the net. Causeway came flying out of the blocks in the second half, with Jack Moriarty winning a penalty that was adroitly finished to the top corner by Dylan Costello. Their possession play and especially their passing, which had at times been slightly injudicious in the first half, saw them add two points from Jake Segal and Callum Carey Sheehy (very nearly a goal) trimmed the gap back to just a goal. However, Sliabh Luachra responded in style, Doyle and O'Keeffe again the main marksmen, pulled away again with four points on the trot. A testing game like this will stand both teams in very good stead going forward.

THE RYDER CUP

It's an odd sort of a hybrid competition. A team championship in an extremely individualistic sport. Basically the crème de la crème of the best golfers in Europe and the US, plus 'wild cards' captain's picks but minus the players who signed up to LIV before being thrown under the bus by them (and no particular harm in that, take on each other. Basically, the home side usually win. You're going back to the 'Miracle at Medina' in 2012 for Europe's last win on European soil, while the US last won in Europe in 1993. In recent years, since the ill-tempered 'battle of Brookline' in 1999 there has been an increasing amount of eejitry masquerading as patriotism among supporters, and this year in Rome unfortunately was no different. A US caddie may have made the headlines, but plenty of European supporters demonstrated that they don't understand golf, or actual patriotism either.

I suppose I'm just not passionate enough about it to understand the fervour. To be truthful, I don't actually sit and watch the Ryder Cup. I follow updates on social media (the BBC tend to be best, as they are in most things) and check out the occasional highlight clip.

Europe dominated straight from the start, winning the morning foursomes by 4-0, two of them by a whopping 4 up and 3 to play. Shane Lowry (with Sepp Straka) and Rory McIlroy (with Ricky Fowler) won 2 & 1. Europe won 22 holes to USA's 10. Respectfully, that's not a defeat; that's a hammering.

The evening session was a lot closer. The first match was halved. Mcllroy and Matt Fitzpatrick (who was on fire) won 5 & 3, with 8 birdies and an eagle. The third match was halved after Rahm and Hojgaard won the last two holes (with Koepka complaining about Rahm's 'petulance' afterwards) and the fourth was also halved. Europe led by a historic 6.5 to 1.5 lead after Day One. It was the first time ever that the US had finished a day of the tournament without winning a single game.

The US had to come out storming to on Saturday to realistically get back into this. They had a bad start as McIIroy and Fleetwood won 2 & 1. It got a whole lot worse when Aberg and the excellent Hovland won by an incredible 9 & 7. That can be done against the likes of you and I, sure. Against Scheffle and Koepka, of all people? It's like some-one lapping the field in the 800m in the Olympics. Homa and Harman beat Lowry and Straka to keep some little flicker of a candle burning against the hurricane, but Rahm and Hatton notched another point for the Europeans. 9.5 to 1.5. In soccer terms, one team were leading 5-0 at half-time.

The sense of a foregone conclusion was diluting attention on world media, and the Ryder Cup is big business. There were rumours of division in the US camp because of money concerns. This is literally a multi-million euro enterprise and the players get to each nominate a charity to receive €200,000. Patrick Cantley not wearing a cap that had an image of a sponsor's logo was supposedly some sort of gesture of protest. In the absence of what looked like a viable contest, media were happen to jump on this supposed firestorm and eagerly fan the smoke in hopes of seeing fire.

The US won the first two evening matches to make a contest of it. Rose and Straka won the next for the Europeans. Then came the headliner. As Rory McIlroy was lining up a difficult enough putt, Patrick Cantley's caddy Joe La Cava stayed in his line as McIlroy was trying to plan out his shot - trust me, it's a lot more nasty than innocuous. There's rules in every sport - there's also an unwritten but basic code of conduct, and that rubbish isn't on in golf. At the same time, this was an overpassionate caddy gettiong carried away; it wasn't Satan arriving from the bowels of hell to gobble human souls. I'm, not saying get over it - this stuiffdoes need to be called out and La Cava will be getting sideways glabnces on any golf course he workks from here on in - but the deluge of hate on social media? This guy id something ignorant and stupid, but he has friends and family who care about him and all the publications and all the online heroes had better never try the hypocrisy of pontificating about mental health. Everyone saw reports and clips of his bad conduct - how many of you saw reports that he did apologise to the European team afterwards? Yeah, I thought so. For that matter, I get where Rory is coming from, but getting into Bones McKay afterwards in a car park was over the top. I'm sure McKay said something, but Rory should simply have asked him the score and walked on. Beacuse it was 10.5 to 5.5 at that stage, and not in McKay's favour

Rant over. I just hate that kind of histrionics. Any sporting event that's god enough doesn't need that nonsense. To be fair, full credit to Rory, and almost certainly ecven more to his PR advisor, because the quotes the following day about relying on Marcus Aurelius''Meditations' to focus his mind properly was stroke of image-repairing genius. Maybe I';m reading his character wrong (I've never met the man) but Rory strikes me as a man that's more likely to guote Eminem than Marcus Aurelius.

Technically, Sunday had the potential for the greatest Ryder Cup comeback in history, but we all knew that it was never going to happen. Rahm and Scheffler halved. Rose beat Morik with a bit to spare and any lingering tension dissipated. Rory beat Burns. Fitzpatrick lost to Homa. 14-9. but Europe's Hatton beat Harmon in response. Koepka, Thomas, and Schauffle won three in a row for the US. Commentators are getting excited. Is it on? Artrah, would ye stop, lads.Lowry halved with Spieth. Fleetwood and MacIntyre won the last two for Europe – but the truth is that Europe didn't even need them.

A good Ryder Cup. No. Too much of the excitement was generated by blown controversy, and not enough by the golf that was played. Hopefully Bethpage Black in New York I two years time will be better. Who knows? The LIV players may be back in the fold by then.

BEECH HEDGING

Beech Hedging is an ideal hedging plant for most situations because of its tolerance of a wide range of soil conditions including well drained soils, soils prone to draughts and soils that can get waterlogged due to heave down pours of rain,

Even though the beech is deciduous when it is grown as hedging and is trimmed regularly around August/September, the brown leaves will usually be retained throughout most of the Winter.

Beech also comes with a purple leaf - copper beech. Copper beech is best planted in a sunny position to keep its leaf colour where as the green retains its colour better if planted in partial shade.

If you can - it is best to plant your beech hedge bare rooted as it will probably establish that bit quicker, so you have plenty of time from now until the end of March to get planting.

Welcome back dear student; ".... but he's not wearing any clothes!". This line comes from 'The Emperor's New Clothes' by Hans Christian Anderson published in 1837. I read it as a child many years ago and it still sticks in my memory. It was a folktale of a foolish, prideful king who was deceived by two gangsters into believing that they would make him new clothes better than anyone ever had. They spent time priming the king and making everyone believe that these clothes were the most spectacular and extravagant, never-before-seen-creation. But it was all a lie! They persuaded the king to parade through the city wearing his 'new clothes'. All the people smirked but said nothing for fear of reprisal. Only one small little boy spoke the truth that he saw – the king was naked and wasn't wearing any clothes!

The book of Ephesians is a wonderful piece of writing where God gives His church clear instructions for right living. The church is not a building - it's God's people - the body of Christ on this earth (church means 'called out assembly'). He has given the Holy Spirit gifts to the church to build up and equip His people for navigating life successfully and righteously. "Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church, apostles, prophets, evangelists, pastors and teachers.
