
Deputy Griffin is encouraging all eligible organisations in Kerry to apply for funding under the CLÁR Programme.

"Almost €8 million for community and sports facilities nationwide has been announced under the 2023 CLÁR

Programme, which will support hundreds of projects with a particular focus on areas that have experienced significant levels of population decline," Deputy Griffin explained.

"Under the initiative, grants of up to €50,000 will be provided to support the development of community and sports facilities, youth clubs, playgrounds, sensory gardens, walking tracks and much more.

"In addition, for the first time under the CLÁR Programme, funding will be provided to carry out upgrades and improvements to spectator : kerrycoco.ie/community/rural-grant-schemes/ he concluded



"I welcome this funding, which, since its inception in 2016, has supported the development of remote rural areas through small-scale capital projects involving

collaboration between local authorities and communities, as well as for other community-based organisations," Deputy Griffin continued.

"This programme has played a vital part in delivering high quality community and sports projects that have enhanced towns and villages across Kerry.

KILLARNEY STUDENTS HONOURED AT THE CERTIFIED IRISH ANGUS AWARDS

CERTIFIED IRISH ANGUS SCHOOL COMPETITION HOSTS ITS LARGEST EXHIBITION IN CROKE PARK IN NINE YEARS

Three students from St Brigids Presentation Secondary School, Killarney, were celebrated at the annual Certified Irish Angus Schools competition awards ceremony in Croke Park. The students Katie Donoghue, Abbie Daly, and Alanna Brady attended the prestigious grand final in the Hogan Suite after successfully completing a research project and rearing five Angus calves for 18 months.

The Certified Irish Angus Schools' Competition in association with ABP and Kepak is an initiative that challenges students to rear five Irish Angus Cross calves for 18 months until their slaughter which aids their Leaving Certificate Agricultural Science curriculum. It aims to promote the Certified Irish Angus brand while communicating the care and attention required to produce quality beef for consumers.

The Killarney students researched methods of "Improving Farm Outcomes Through Education." The study focused on how local farmers can effectively apply educational resources from industry experts to their own farms. By sharing their knowledge at local discussion groups, the farmers were able to review new farming practices and share honest assessments with their peers. The groups targeted were experienced and young farmers which proved to be vital to successful discussions around environmental beef farming practices.

Competition growth

The Certified Irish Angus Schools Competition is setting up for its tenth and biggest year yet. In 2022, over 170 groups, nearing 600 students took

part in the competition with 23 counties represented from all provinces. Currently, farming industry experts are judging this year's 42 shortlisted projects and will select five finalists from their biggest pool of shortlisted projects ever. The judges include representatives from right across the agri-food industry ABP, Kepak, Tesco, Hilton Foods, Teagasc, Bord Bia, Agri aware, IASTA, Certified Irish Angus Producer Group, NPA, JM Foods, Irish Farmers Journal, ICBF, The Glasshouse Hotel Sligo, and previous competition winners.

The five schools that best demonstrate an understanding of the project along with innovative ideas will be announced in September and will receive their calves at the National Ploughing Championships in September 2023. Each of the finalists receives the financial benefit involved in the selling of the animals to the processors on completion of the project which amounted to an average \in 7,500. The winning students also receive an additional grant of \notin 2,000 for their further education. Number of older people aged 70+ on the social housing waiting list crosses 2,000 for the first time

ALONE, the national charity that enables older people to age at home, has called for urgent action to combat the growing housing crisis among older people, as the Summary of Social Housing Assessments 2022 figures are released.

Figures released by the Department of Housing show that the proportion of households with a main applicant over 60 years of age has been growing year on year since 2016. There were 6,901 older people aged 60+ on the waiting list in 2022, making up 12%

of those on the social housing waiting list. The number of people aged 70+ on the social housing waiting list in 2022 increased to over 2,000 for the first time, reaching 2,023 people.

"These figures are extremely concerning and reflect what we are seeing on the ground," said ALONE CEO Seán Moynihan. "We are currently



working with older people who have received notices to quit their rental accommodation and others who are sleeping on sofas, living in cars or caravans, and in other unsuitable situations, because they have not been able to find alternative housing."

"We are also seeing that older people are struggling more to access social housing that is equipped to their needs. We are working with several social housing tenants, for example, that cannot manage the stairs in their apartment complexes and are essentially

trapped in their own homes but cannot be transferred due to lack of availability."

Why do we celebrate Holy Week? The purpose of Holy Week is to re-enact, relive, and participate in the passion of Jesus Christ. In Holy Week we relive with Jesus his road the Cross: the triumphant entry into Jerusalem; the institution of the Eucharist and the ministerial priesthood; his loneliness and agony in the garden as he is betrayed by the disciple Judas; his trial before the Romans and the Jews; his once and forever sacrifice upon the Cross; the emptiness of a world where Christ appears lost; and his glorious Resurrection on Easter. Christians have been observing Holy Week since the earliest days of the Church. Early Christians would travel to Jerusalem at Passover to re-enact the events of the week leading up to the Resurrection. The earliest accounts of Holy Week were recorded by Egeria in the 380s A.D. From her accounts we know that on Palm Sunday, crowds of Christians waved palm fronds as they processed from the Mount of Olives into the City. She also details how the community gathered on Good Friday at Golgotha to honour the wood of the True Cross and to remember the Crucifixion. Customs spread from Jerusalem to around the Christian world. And we do it this year in pray and participate in the Lord's suffering, death and resurrection

€750,000 ALLOCATED TO COMMUNITY GROUPS AND PROJECTS ACROSS KERRY UNDER COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND

Kerry County Council has announced details of the allocation of 5750,000 in funding support for community groups and projects across the county under the Community Support Fund for 2023. A total of 198 groups and projects received grant aid worth 6256,000 this year while a proportion of the fund, totalling 6494,000 is being retained to leverage funding from other funding streams for strategic projects at Municipal District level.

Since 2020, over \in 40 million was leveraged from other national grant sources as a result of the strategic allocation of resources under the Community Support Fund.

The fund, which is in its ninth year, has now supported 1,974 projects since 2015 to the value of \leq 6.256m. As occurred in previous years, some of the Community Support Fund will be used this year to target strategic

projects in the five municipal districts and to co-fund projects which are in receipt of grants from other sources.

Councillors in the five Municipal Districts met during the past week to decide on the allocations and unanimously welcomed the provision of support to the recipients. Councillors congratulated all the community groups and acknowledged the tremendous voluntary work that these groups do.

For 2023, the fund will build on this and target funding under four categories of support:

Rebuilding and Reconnecting Communities

Community Tidy Town Initiatives and Amenity Projects Community Economic Innovation

Community Based Tourism, Festivals and Events

DIGGING KILLARNEY

Cnoc na Chúig – the hill of the meeting or assembly just north west of Tralee may be the original town of Tralee, where people held meetings and gatherings and traded. It is to be dug up for the second year running. Archaeologically that is. There is great demand for volunteer places on Dig Tralee' which is rightly dubbed 'n exciting community archaeology project.

"The aim of the project is to explore this ancient monument and uncover what role it might have played in the origins of Tralee. The dig will be led by a team of professional archaeologists with the support from community volunteers. We're looking for people who have an interest in archaeology and history, like working outdoors, and are keen to learn new skills by working alongside experts. Open to all over 18 years of age,' the County Museum says.

Speaking with Michael Connolly, the county archaeologist, Dig Tralee with supervised volunteers is the way forward, he thinks.

Digs are expensive and the big cost is labour. But where you dig, you invariably find stuff, says Michael in reference to the fact that discoveries are usually attached to big developments that get underway.

I was asking him about my own doorstep on Mangerton and again I mentioned how I strongly suspect the mounds there are not natural at all but are built, a bit like those in Newgrange.

He did not dismiss the idea but said we don't know because it has never been excavated. There's 'a lot of stuff' on Mangerton, he suspects.

Which brings me to the idea of a supervised community dig for Killarney: It's a long way off. Certainly not for now, anyway, as the county and the museum can only really run one at any time and the Tralee project will take a few years yet, Michael says.



THE SHOPPING NEWS

It is so refreshing to see a new shop in Killarney and especially in the lovely Killarney Outlet Centre. And particularly so at Easter. That whole outlet centre was built at a time when a serious study had identified a dearth of shopping in Killarney. That was over twenty years ago.

The excitement outside new shop Born this



week - the fashion giant is to take 4,734sq ft was added to with the shutters half open so we could all get a peek of the bright things and the roomy display.

But it is also a sign that we badly need more shops in Killarney.

Outlet Centre Manager, Paul Sherry, said Born sees "the huge potential in the town and it will give locals and visitors a whole new retail experience based on quality, choice and value." This is encouraging. Especially since we need more shops in Killarney and mundane shops that are service driven. I know people who go to Tralee to get a heel on their shoes these days! Once upon a time we had three town centre cobblers.

We are 'down at heel' in more ways than one in Killarney when it comes to the potential we have for more shops. Thirty years ago there were architect drawn plans for the Milk Market / Slaughterhouse Lane. Then it was owned by the council. It was to have included craft shops where the pottery and leather and all the rest would be manufactured and sold directly. I still think a tourist town has room for this kind of craft market . A lot of council property including the old town hall was sold off in the grim late 80s. But there is still much public land and if we could get wheels moving on a multistorey or out of town car park with shuttle buses, then Bob's your uncle and there would be a reimagining of Killarney town centre which we all love.

Meanwhile it is time to repeat the study on exactly what retail Killarney needs right now.

TIME TO KNOCK ST FINAN'S?

A birdie has been chirping about an idea that is worth looking into - that it may be time to look into knocking St Finan's / St Finian's. The situation is this: that huge grey 19th century

Victorian architect pile is costing a fortune to maintain, empty. No one is very interested in it as it will take tens of millions - Euro 115 million is the estimate - to do anything with it, because it is a preserved structure. And because it is a preserved structure, the (autilage) or a wide swath surrounding it can't be touched either. So do we want such a greying folly overlooking our town and falling into even more dereliction before our very eyes as the country cries out for housing?

There is also this inescapable fact: the history of the place. Years ago, before Killarney became so synonymous with tourism, being sent to Killarney meant only one thing. I had not realised the prevalence of that attitude until I went to UCC and found that people from Tralee and north and west Kerry associated Killarney most strongly with the mental hospital.

So outside of those who worked there and who are grateful for their good jobs there, the wider association is not that good.

I have now got wind that Cllr Brendan Cronin, former mayor of this town, has bravely stepped into the fray. He has submitted a motion for the next council meeting that will at the very least put the protected status on the agenda.

Brendan is asking the planning Department of Kerry County council to consider removing the "Protected Structure" designation in the current County Development plan from St Finian's Hospital in light if the following facts:

'This is a strategically important site and the protected structure designation is a major impediment to any development or use of the building and adjacent lands; the building has been left empty and idle since closing in 2012 and taking on the burden of well over €100 million renovations has proven to be financially toxic.'

Ultimately as time moves on, he says, it will become a derelict eyesore like similar buildings in other counties and cities.

'A change needs to be made in the current designation to lift the obstacles blocking the potential of this important site,' is Brendan's motion. I think it is well worth consideration. I will stick my neck out further - remove the status, knock it and use the stone to front new houses.

There will be debate and battle lines will be drawn. But Brendan's courageous motion is sure to test the mettle as

well as the sentiment of councillors and all others in Killarney.

WHAT IS A TRAINING PLATEAU?

A plateau in our training is when our body gets used to the demands we are placing on it and our progress can stagnate. CONTACT LENSES

Most people who need to wear glasses can wear contact lenses. There are two main types of

contact lenses:soft lenses which mould to the

shape of your eye

• rigid gas permeable lenses (RGP lenses) which are fitted closely to the shape of your eye and are less flexible.

Most contact lenses fitted in Ireland are soft lenses. They are available as single-use daily, fortnightly and monthly disposable lenses, and more specialist lenses that are designed to last for longer.

Which type of contact lens is best? Contact Lenses

The type of lens that is best for you will depend upon several factors. These include how often you want to wear your lenses – for example do you want to wear them just for certain activities such as sport, or do you want to wear them most of the time, instead of glasses?

As soft lenses are initially more comfortable than RGP lenses, they are ideal for people who only want to wear lenses occasionally. RGP lenses are a little more uncomfortable than soft lenses at first, so they take a bit more getting used to

Are contact lenses safe?

Modern contact lenses are very safe, as long as you follow advice

about how to wear and look after them, and have regular check-ups. It is possible that anything that touches your eye could introduce an infection.

I need to wear different glasses for distance and reading – can I have bifocal or varifocal contact lenses? When you reach your forties it is common to find that you need a different prescription for reading than you need for distance.

There are three main options to correct presbyopia with contact lenses:

 You may choose to have contact lenses to correct your distance vision, and wear reading glasses over the top when you need them.
 You may have multifocal contact lenses.

 You may wear lenses to have one eye corrected to see in the distance and one eye corrected for near vision. This is called monovision.

The former Treaty United and Limerick Footballer is the son of Deirdre Lucey from Glenflesk and Dublin man Dermot O'Connell.



The race for Sam kicks off in earnest very shortly. To be fair, Kerry have a few weeks yet - being in a six county province has always been a big advantage to us, that's the plain truth of it - and even then, it would be a big shock if Waterford beat Tipperary and an even bigger one if either of them beat us. Waterford are firmly ensconced in Division Four and Tipperary are joining them. I don't see Kerry struggling to get into a Munster Final. If we win that, we should be in a fairly manageable group for the quarterfinals, especially with three teams emerging. After that, well, you are going to run the table and hope to avoid injury, because the schedule is fairly merciless. Topping the group would take us straight into a quarter-final. Coming in second or third would take us into a play-off for a quarter-final spot. That feels a little bit greedy by the GAA, to me. Instead of that extra and unnecessary game that just saps energy, just make it top two group teams gualify for the quarters, first seeds against second seeds, and leave it at that. 'Preliminary guarter-final'. When it comes to human bodies and championship formats, either can only be stretched so far before it starts to tear.

The latter stages of the National League are always a bit of a cagey affair, especially so close to championship. I'm one of those who feels that League Finals have become a lame sideshow, especially for the likes of Ulster teams who are facing do-or-die games against tough competitors within a fortnight. That's not a criticism. Where the likes of Kerry can fit a League Final nicely into the calendar of their championship build-up, a lot of teams would simply be very foolish to do so. I'd never knock winning silverware, it lifts a team hugely, but you need to keep your eye on the main goal, and that's Sam.

Look,we all know the National League was a mixed bag for Kerry. I'd have liked to see more of the likes of Dylan Casey. I'd have definitely liked to see broader attacking options than lamp the ball into David. I'd like a more stable midfield. David Moran



is gone and Joe O'Connor is unavailable. That's the reality. Barry Dan has done very well – he's a worker, a scorer, and gives an added 'big man' option switched into full forward, a tactic Dingle used to great effect last year. Jack Barry doesn't get the credit for a lot of the work that he does, nor does Adrian Spillane. Graham O'Sullivan and Gavin White (what a return to action he made!) supplemented our attack brilliantly, helped by Paudie Clifford's energy as he dropped deep. A slight worry for me is that teams are deliberately (and quite rightly) forcing Tadhg Morley to man mark instead of that outer shield role he performed so brilliantly last year. Still, for me, it was more our lack of scoring options than concession rate that cost us in the National League.

The League is still only a benchmark. Given the amount of injuries we had during that period (and I think those players getting a proper break might stand to us later on, frankly I'd have liked to see the likes of David Clifford, Seán O'Shea, Jason Foley, and Tom O'Sullivan get more of a break. We already know what these lads can do), I'm delighted to have stayed in Division One. That's all I wanted. As for the growing myth about Kerry struggling away from home in both the McGrath Cup and League? Ah lads. That's adding two and two and getting twenty seven. Look at the experimental nature of the teams that Kerry had out. The McGrath Cup. Lad's, I'd swap ye four McGrath Cups for a mars bar any day of the week.

Kerry will be fine. In fact, I'll contravene Kerry's longest established tradition and tempt all the gods with hubris - I honestly have Kerry as favourites for the All Ireland. I'm not for one second suggesting that it will be easy, and you always need the bit of luck to fall your way, but I look at the other teams out there. Plenty of fine teams, but is there any that we would really fear when we hit top gear? I expect us to win the Munster Final - Cork's results have belied their very strong improvement, but I just don't see our defence conceding enough against their attack. That will have us as top seeds in a group where the second seeds are the Connaught runners-up, and that will surely be the weak side of the draw. Wew should come out of that group. Frankly, we should top it, and that would put us straight into a guarter-final against a team that had to play an extra game (any follower of Munster hurling or football's back door will know that the extra week's rest at that stage is a colossal advantage). No, I'll break with all longstanding 'poor mouth' traditions, sacred though they are, and I might be jinxing us, but I fancy Kerry this year.

Look, I'm only rambling a bit. There's an element of man proposing and God disposing about all my speculation. For one thing, injury is the bugbear that's hovering over every team – there are certainly three key players in crucial positions that Kerry can't do without and I'd say the same is true of every other team in the mix. But for the very little that it's worth, these are the teams that I see in the final hunt for Sam this year.

MAYO

Mayo are the big winners of this year's National League, and not just because they literally won it. There's a sense that this Mayo team have filled the jigsaw correctly. I was very sceptical of Loftus to centre back and Diarmuid O'Connor to midfield, but both have played very well in their new roles (I still wonder if Loftus has the defensive instincts to know when to hold and when to go). They have hit a high gear early on, but I don't blame them with Galway and Roscommon on that side of the Connaught draw. Aidan O'Shea up front has been a revelation. Personally I'm delighted for him. That big honest lad has taken far too much flak from attention-seeking pundits over the years. I never saw him give less than his best, even on the hard days, and a lot of the lads sniping at him have been shooting from the gentlemans' lounge, not the trenches. For years Mayo had an over-reliance on one scoring forward, whether it was Moclair, Langan, Mortimor, McDonald, or Cillian O'Connor. Cillian is still there - not guite the force he was, but still dangerous from play and placed balls. But they now have Ryan O'Donoghue to pick up any slack. Jordan Flynn has been tremendous so far. I didn't really rate James Carr earlier on; I'm happy to admit that I was wrong. Mayo are real contenders - they bring an awful lot of muscle to the table as well But as I said, they are going strong very early and there's a long year ahead.

ROSCOMMON

They haven't quite broken into the elite ranks, but they are hovering on the brink of it. They will be quietly happy with their National League. Frankly, I like them. I have for quite a long time. Always Connaught underdogs, but with sharp teeth and plenty



of hunger. They'll work all day and they don't make mistakes. You'll earn any score that you get off them. After a slow start (and that's happened in a few of their games so far, though it may just be coincidence) they gave us plenty of it. They also have scoring forwards in the likes of Lennon, Murtagh, Cregg, and of course Conor Cox.

But you have to beat Mayo and then face Galway just to get to a Connaught Final? That's a tough road right from the start. Even if they do get through that, I think it will take too much out of them and again (I know I harp on this point a bit, but I believe it will be crucial) the schedule is very tight.

Look, I'm not disrespecting the other side of the Connaught draw, but they are simply not in that category. Sligo look like the pick of the bunch, and not just because Pat Spillane Jnr. is playing well. They have a consistency to their displays and no-one will beat them easily.

GALWAY

They gave us a fierce rattle in the All Ireland Final, and they haven't really gotten any worse. They gave us the runaround in the League and asked hard enough questions of Mayo in that League Final. But there's a certain

conservatism to their play that I don't think suits them. I don't want to be reading too much into a League Final, but they made Colm Reape look like a superstar with his kick-outs. Reape had an excellent game (although I honestly thought he was lucky to stay on the pitch, that tackle was way too late and way too dangerous for me) but Galway kept allowing Mayo to build fast from the back. Shane Walsh out around midfield? I have always, always, always believed that the hardest part of the game is putting scores on the board and it's scores that win games. Ergo, you have your main scorers in the scoring zone. It's not rocket science. Do Galway do that? They stayed back a lot, clearly prioritising defence over attack, and I genuinely think that it cost them. To be fair, Comer still looks a bit rusty to me, gave away some fairly clumsy fouls. He's better than that, and he will be for the championship. But Galway have a tougher road to face this year than last year. Have they the innate talent to get back to the All Ireland Final? Sure. Seán Kelly is one of the best defenders in the country. We all know what Conroy can do in midfield, but honestly, John Maher has been phenomenal throughout this League. To get over the line? I would need to see them go for the jugular a bit more.

DUBLIN

Well, ye all knew that this one was going to come up. Dublin are there or thereabouts and have been every year for the past fifteen. They are a hard team to



read. The seamless flow of successful U20s into the senior team seems to have slowed. There has been much debate about bringing back the older players. Look, I'd have Jack McCaffrey on my starting fifteen any day of the week. His searing pace on the overlap won them at least two All Irelands and people forget that he is actually a very good defender as well. Mannion I can understand to spring from the bench late on. He's not a seventy minute player anymore, but it's not a fifteen man game anymore either. Cluxton? An absolute shoe-in on the greatest GAA team of all time. I'm not disrespecting Danno or Charlie or Geraghty or Morgan, but Cluxton as the best keeper is beyond dispute as far as I am concerned. But I think Dublin were expecting that his presence would be a huge influx of energy and enthusiasm. Instead it just raises questions. It says that we have no real prospects as young keepers in all of Dublin and must leave Darragh O'Hanlon looking over his shoulder a small bit - O'Hanlon has impressed me, by the way. Now, Con O'Callaghan's return adds serious impetus, physical presence, and a goal threat to their attack. Brian Howard will bring a lot of power to the table too. But Dean Rock is no longer the player that he was. Still a great free-taker (I have always rated Seán O'Shea and Michael Murphy higher, but Rock has been very reliable always) but is he as potent from open play?

Dublin won Division Two, but I have to say that I had expected that they would be a lot more convincing in doing so. They could easily have lost to Clare, Cork, and Derry. They didn't; there is still a steely resilience in there, but displays have not been convincing The aura of invincibility - and let's be honest, they truly did feel invincible for a long time) is gone. Dublin ran us to within a point last year, but I thought we lost our way and let them back into it in the second half and I thought we left a few scores behind us in the first quarter. McCaffrey and that Kilkenny/O'Callaghan axis scare me, but are they stronger than last year? If so, they are keeping a lot of powder very dry so far! Mind you, like ourselves, Dublin aren't facing the deadliest of provincial championships. I have huge, huge admiration for Colm O'Rourke, but I just don't think that Meath have the innate talent to face down Dublin. Kildare are the proverbial riddle wrapped in mystery etc. On paper they can go head to head with anybody - look,. Flynn and Hyland should be in All Star conversations, but Kildare just can't seem to put it together on the field. Louth lost their opening two League games but won four of their next five, including Meath and Kildare, and are heading into Division One. But they face Westmeath in the Leinster quarterfinal and that's a tough opener – the Taillteann Cup has really invigorated Westmeath.

No, I don't see anyone stopping Dublin getting to at least a preliminary quarter-final, and as I said already, from there you can run the table.

TYRONE

A very difficult team to read. They had a fair League – again, I don't think there was any handle being thrown after the hatchet. McCurry is playing out of his skin and Darragh Canavan is growing into that burdensome



surname. Tyrone seemed to implode after winning a covid All Ireland, with a suspiciously high number of panel departures, but they seem to have steadied the ship. Ulster is always and ever a minefield, though. There's never an easy game in it, and Tyrone have a humdinger of an opener in an Ulster quarter-final against Monaghan. Conor McManus demonstrated in the last League match that he is still one of the best forwards of this generation. He is in the same bracket as the likes of Mattie Forde or Declan Browne, but he has better players around him. Monaghan are a tough outfit. I think Tyrone have slightly more scoring power, but I wouldn't be calling in to any bookies before that particular clash, and the road won't get any easier for the winner.

DONEGAL

No. I just can't see it. Michael Murphy was always simultaneously their best forward and their best midfielder and his absence leaves an absolutely gaping hole. McBrearty, even when back from injury, isn't going



to replace those scores and scores are even more precious currency in Ulster football than anywhere else. Factor in their off-field travails – c'mon lads. Changing your management team just before the championship? - and I just can't see them lasting the long road. They are still a strong team, they will not be going quietly into that good night (I expect them to beat Down with a bit to spare), but I can't see them lasting the distance.

ARMAGH

I'm not having a dig at Ethan Rafferty, but this goalkeeperas-playmaker nonsense doesn't help their cause. I know possession is king in modern football, every team does that, but Armagh take it to an extreme. Ye have great



forwards, but ye don't feed them enough. Ye break with fantastic pace, and ten years ago it was considered an unstoppable tactic for swarming teams who had left gaps. Nowadays those gaps simply aren't there, because every team is ready with their defensive shield and Dublin showed the way with crossfield ball to their designated shooters. Armagh have bundles of talent, but they don't utilise it fully. They also need to sharpen up on their discipline. They were a bit unlucky to be relegated from Division One and they gave eventual finalists Galway a fantastic battle last year, but have they added that extra one or two per cent? They'll reach the latter stages, but I don't think they will conquer them. That said, I wouldn't want to be facing them in the last eight.

LEAGUE OF IRELAND LONGFORD TOWN 2 KERRY FC 0

Look, hard luck stories abound in sports and scorelines are a blunt but honest metric. Kerry FC have been playing better than their results. They are a much stronger team than the fledgelings who set out on this adventure and are actually turning into an entertainingly fearless team to watch. Essentially, they aren't afraid to make mistakes. They have tightened up considerably on set pieces into their own box. The likes of the Guthries, Matt Keane, and Seán Kennedy bring experience and cool heads. Leo Gaxha is becoming a real star; the likes of Ronan Teahan clearly belong at this level.

But Longford, winless coming into this one themselves, just showed sharper attacking instincts. The game was just three minutes old when Joshua Giurgi drew a save out of Wayne Guthrie - to be honest, I thought he should have done much better with the chance, and I wasn't remotely happy with the defensive marking. Just seven minutes later he was in again, a brilliant ball neatly slipped between two defenders by Aodh Dervin, and this time he weaved closer and gave the keeper absolutely no chance. I won't say that goal deflated Kerry; they still had plenty of possession, but it definitely enervated Longford, who did most of the attacking thereafter. Kerry were keeping it tight at the back and going long, but Longford were always comfortable with it. Dervin and Giurgi combined again in the 18th minute - once again, Wayne Guthries' reflexes saved us.

On the restart, Leo Gaxha sent in a beautiful ball and an alert Ryan Kelliher at full stretch just couldn't direct it into the goal. I honestly believe that a Kerry goal at that stage would have unnerved Longford, but it just wasn't to be. The fine margins...

Kerry were playing with a bit more ambition now after that cautious first half. Longford always looked that little bit more dangerous, though; they should have doubled their lead early on the restart through Gary Armstrong but he directed the shot narrowly wide. It wasn't his lucky night; he did get the ball into the net in the 63rd minute but it was ruled out for offside. Seán McGrath did have a long range shot for Kerry in the 74th minute – worryingly, their first real shot on target – but Brady dealt with it comfortably. Late on – so late it didn't really make much difference, Giurgi nailed his second with a slice of good fortune as his shot took a deflection in a crowded square and ended up in the net.

2-0. Tough night, and a long road home, but Kerry Fc really are getting closer and closer to that elusive first win that would kick start their season in earnest.



Its that time of year again when we think of putting colour in our pots, baskets and containers and also in the ground, and although Garden Centres are closed, many of the supermarkets are carrying stock. Summer Bedding plants can be used very effectively in the ground for filling gaps between shrubs or border perennial plants as they can cover a lot of ground and add plenty of colour very quickly. When planting Summer bedding plants in the ground the first thing you have to do is to dig over the area and dig in plenty of compost. Most Summer Bedding plants need a nice sunny sheltered position but if you have a shaded area, begonias are excellent bedding plants for this situation and they will give you flowers right through the summer and into early autumn. As an added bonus they will also provide you with excellent coloured foliage from light green to dark purple. Always remember when planting bedding to put the taller ones at the back. If you want to do a summer display of bedding on its own in a bed you will have to choose a centre piece - a good plant for this would be a standard fuschia. Then start with the tallest, such as marigolds or antirrhinums and work your way out to the edge of the bed with some begonias or petunias and finally at the edge of the bed with some lobelia and alyssum. A good idea before you plant would be to position all your plants to get an overall view of what it will look like. And remember to water all plants well in afterwards.


MINISTER FOLEY CONFIRMS OVER €400,000 IN FUNDING FOR KERRY AIRPORT




Welcome back dear student. "What time I am afraid, I will trust in Thee. In God I will praise His Word, In God I have put my trust; I will not fear what flesh can do unto me" (Psalm 56:3-4 KJV). Everyone faces trials and turmoil that can cause us to feel fearful, but when we know and understand the promises of God, even though situations may rock you, yet the seed of God's Word that has been planted in your heart will rise to the surface and bring stability in the same way that the stabilisers on huge cruise ships kick into action in rough seas (Jeremiah 17:7-8). This is what Jesus meant when He said 'the Truth that you know and understand will set you free' (John 8:32). There's that promise again – freedom! "It was for freedom that Christ has set us free" (Galatians 5:1).

This week Jews celebrate the Passover where the body and the blood of an innocent lamb saved God's people from destruction, and death and set them free from slavery (Exodus chapter 12). Not only were the Israelites protected from the spirit of death because of the blood of the lamb on their doorposts but, as they ate the meat of the lamb, their bodies were healed from all disease and infirmity. "There was not one feeble among them" as they left slavery behind (Psalm 105:37). This blemish free innocent lamb was a foreshadow of the real Lamb of God - the Messiah Yeshua, Who would later come to save God's people by giving His sinless body and blood so that we who believe in Him can be forgiven, delivered and set free - saved from the bondages of sin, fear and death (Hebrews 2:14-15) and healed from every disease and infirmity afflicting the body (Isaiah 53:4-5). We meditate upon the suffering the Lord Jesus endured as He was put on trial and found innocent, yet brutally beaten and crucified by His own people (Luke chapters 22, 23 & 24). Jesus taught His disciples as they celebrated the Passover meal together (the last supper), that no longer would they need to hope for Salvation in the first Passover lamb (the ritual), because now the True Passover Lamb of God was here ready to accomplish God's plan of Salvation (redeeming them into relationship). Jesus' sacrifice was once for all time and for all mankind both Jew and Gentile alike (1st Corinthians 5:7-8; Hebrews 10:9-18). Many people focus on the death of Jesus only, but friends - 'Jesus ain't dead' as the song says, for God raised Him from the dead! His disciples testified of His resurrection because they saw Him alive again (John chapters 20-21; Acts 5:30-32). People in every generation since testify that Jesus is alive because they have seen Him intervene in their lives, tangibly felt His Presence, and watched problems that seemed totally impossible change when they prayed and sought the Lord's help by calling upon His Name (Romans 10:13). Those who have felt the healing power of Jesus in their physical bodies can testify that yes, it's true - Jesus is alive and well, and He is still performing miracles today as He always has. "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). This weekend don't let Resurrection Sunday just be about indulging in chocolate eggs or empty ritual friend, for God has so much more for you - a real relationship with the One Who gave it all for you to live free!




