





Killarney Guides earn Guiding's highest award



Two young Killarney women have reached the pinnacle of Guiding after hiking 60km in Co Waterford while carrying all their camping and cooking equipment, food and clothes, and surviving on €3.50 a day.

Irish Girl Guides (IGG) members, Sarah Canavan (22) and Sarah Kenny (22), also completed eight projects and kept a log book of their experiences during the five-day Chief Commissioner's Award. They partnered for the adventure challenge in which participants take part in teams of two or three.

The girls didn't know the location of the event in advance either so they couldn't prepare

for the projects. They were delighted to find themselves in the Ancient East, however.

"Neither of us had been to rural Waterford before and it far exceeded our expectations," said Sarah Canavan. "Everybody we met was so welcoming, which made the whole challenge a thousand times easier. The first night we slept in Kilbrien graveyard, which, to our surprise, wasn't as scary as it sounds!

"During the week we had many high points – from tasting our first blaa to meeting the whole parish of Kilgobnet and walking the Greenway but my favourite part was just meeting the people of Waterford and discovering how welcoming they are. Every single person we met asked us what we were doing and offered their help. Our biggest challenge wasn't the usual blisters (surprisingly we didn't get any), getting lost or the mileage. It was the food. I'm vegetarian and Sarah has a nut allergy and is coeliac and the first shop we came across – a tiny corner shop – didn't exactly cater for our needs."

Sarah Kenny said the people they met along the way were intrigued and were welcoming and helpful. "I really enjoyed the experience; we had many laughs along the way and got to meet so many lovely people. The award ceremony was quite nerve-racking as we didn't know whether we had made the miles and if we would get the pin."

The two Sarahs were thrilled to receive the Chief Commissioner's Award pin at the end of the 60km challenge. This followed an assessment of their projects and log-books and a debriefing interview with the organisers. The Award – a silver Celtic knot pin - is presented only to those who enter wholeheartedly into the spirit of the challenge.

Legendary singer Dermot Flynn laid to rest

Killarney said goodbye to one of their favourite entertainers this week as the legendary Dermot Flynn was laid to rest in Aghadoe Lawn Cemetery.


Known the length and breadth of the county Dermot passed away on Saturday last after a brave battle with Leukemia.

A native of Currow, Dermot married his wife Kathleen 54 years ago and settled in Ardshanavooly where they reared their family of five.

Speaking at Dermot's Requiem Mass on Tuesday, Dermot's eldest daugher Maria regaled stories about her dad.

Often compared to Joe Dolan, Dermot's talent was first spotted by his primary school teacher who entered him in competitions all over Ireland.

He began his music career with The Radiant Showband with his brother Ned and the late David Stone. The group were resident performers at the Danny Mann where locals and visitors alike loved his show.



Dermot performed all over the States on a reguar basis and even met with Michael Jackson who he offered to teach a verse of a Joe Dolan classic in exchange for a lesson in the moonwalk.

He performed at the White House, sang for austronaut John Glenn, performed in Dubai and Canada and recorded his hit record "Memories of Killarney" in the early 1970's.

A miniature crane, representing his 44 year career in Liebherr and a microphone, representing his career in music were brought to the alter by his granddaughters.

Dermot's popularity was evident and on the night of the removal as thousands queued to sympathise with the family, a CD of Dermots songs was played.

As the funeral cortage made its way down the aisle of St. Mary's Cathedral Grace Foley and the choir sang "You Raise Me Up" while outside Mark Leane (AKA Elvis) was singing "Goodbye Venice" the Joe Dolan Classic that Dermot sang so well.

Following the burial at Aghadoe Lawn Cemetery, the family organised to have Dermot rendition of "Now the End is Near" play for the congratuation gathered.

Dermot is survived by his wife Kathleen, daughters Maria and Ann, sons Gerard, Alan and Kenneth, daughters in law, sons in law, grandchildren and a wide circle of friends.

Following an anxious few days, the Lynch Family from



COUNCIL WELCOMES DELEGATION FROM ZHEIJIANG PROVINCE OF CHINA

Adelegation from the Zheijiang Province in heastern China visited Kerry on Friday. The province has a long-standing relationship with Kerry following the establishment of cultural and educational links in 2012 and a Cultural Festival hosted in Tralee in 2015.

The political and economic delegation met with the Cathaoirleach and Chief Executive of Kerry County Council as well as a number of local industry and business representatives. The group was led by the Chairman of the Zheijiang Provincial Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference, Ms Ge Huijun. The Chairman and Cathaoirleach exchanged gifts and pledged to further develop links between Kerry and Jheijiang. The Chinese group also visited IT Tralee and Kerry Group.

A return visit was made by representatives of the Council in 2013 and that delegation was led by our County Manager at the time, Mr Tom Curran. During that visit, a Memorandum of Understanding was signed, formalising the links between the regions.

Following on from that visit in 2013, the Confucius Institute at University College Cork were contacted regarding a Chinese language and cultural programme for interested schools and Kerry schools were contacted with a view to linking them with schools from the province and building long-term relationships. Six Kerry second-level schools participated, and students not only learned some daily Chinese, experienced the differences between Chinese and European language, but also got to know Chinese society and culture.





JOINT WINNERS OF THE 2018 HUGH O'FLAHERTY INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN AWARD ANNOUNCED

he Irish Coast Guard including : The Irish Coast Season Community& Local Rescue Services, The RNLI Royal National Lifeboat Institution) and the KMRT (Kerry Mountain Rescue Team) are the joint recipients of the 2018 Hugh O'Flaherty International Humanitarian Award. This year marks the 75th Anniversary of the formation of The Rome Escape Line and the 11th year of the Memorial Commemoration of the Monsignor. It is organised annually to raise awareness of the Humanitarian work carried out by the Monsignor, when during WW2, together with his colleagues in the Rome Escape Line, he saved over 6,500 people from the clutches of the Nazis who had occupied Rome at the time. On October 30th, 2013, on the 50th anniversary of the Monsignor's death a permanent memorial to the Monsignor was unveiled in Killarney town centre. The memorial is a life-size sculpture of the Monsignor by Valentia based artist Alan Ryan Hall. On May 8th, 2016, a Plague commemorating the Monsignor was unveiled at the German College, Vatican City, Rome where he lived from 1938 until

1960 and from where he organised the WW2 Rome Escape Line. Earlier this year, a "shortlist" of seven Nominations was submitted to the Independent Award Panel for consideration as potential recipients of the 2018 Hugh O'Flaherty Humanitarian Award. The Award will be presented by Killarney Mayor John Sheahan at the Award Ceremony in Killarney on Saturday November 3rd during the 11th Annual Hugh O'Flaherty Memorial Weekend.

The 2018 Award is very different from previous Awards. Since its inception in 2009, although open to individuals and organisations, the Hugh O'Flaherty Humanitarian Award has always been presented to individual Humanitarian recipients, - the 2017 recipient was Loreto Sr Orla Treacy from South Sudan. This year for the first time, the Humanitarian Award does not go to an individual nor indeed to one humanitarian organisation, but to a collective of three Humanitarian Organisations under the heading of Ireland's Rescue Services. The three organisations to receive the 2018 Humanitarian Award are:

Local Rescue Services).

•The RNLI (Royal National Lifeboat Institution).

• KMRT (Kerry Mountain Rescue Team).

•Irish Coast Guard (Including Community&

Chair of the Hugh O'Flaherty Memorial Society Jerry O'Grady said, "This was unquestionably the most unusual nomination we have received over the last 10 years - It brought into focus the incredibly selfless humanitarian work done by the members of these organisations, the great majority of whom are unpaid volunteers". The key point of the original nomination read, "Be it windswept high mountains, dangerous shorelines or stormy seas, when called upon, at a moment's notice and without regard for the race or creed of those in need, they put their lives on the line to help others. Over the years, members of these rescue organisations have lost their lives while attempting to save others".

Reacting to the news that they were to receive the Award,

Sean Dillon (RNLI Lifesaving Manager) said, "To receive the Hugh O'Flaherty Humanitarian Award in recognition of the work the RNLI does on the island of Ireland is hugely humbling but to receive it alongside our colleagues in the Irish Coast Guard, Community Rescue Boats of Ireland and Kerry Mountain Rescue makes it particularly poignant. The RNLI has proudly operated in Ireland since 1824 and its mission and values have never changed. Rooted in communities, serving communities and making them safer is at the heart of what the RNLI does and has done for generations. The men and women who volunteer and work in the RNLI could not do so without the support and acknowledgement of the public and are very grateful for it. RNLI volunteers go out in conditions that have others returning to shore but they do so in the knowledge that they are bringing loved ones home or peace of mind when it is needed".

Coast Guard Director, Chris Reynolds said, "We are delighted on behalf of the Coast Guard to be included in the Hugh O'Flaherty Humanitarian Award along with our sister volunteer rescue services. Service to protect and saving life was Hugh O'Flaherty's guiding principle and is carried on through the rescue services. The Coast Guard wishes to take this opportunity to promote a safety message directed towards recreational boat users, our highest risk group.

The Coast Guard would encourage recreational boat users to download the excellent booklet, The Code of Practice: The Safe Operation of Recreational Craft which is available free on Safety on the Water website (www.safetyonthewater.ie)."

Colm Burke, PRO Kerry Mountain Rescue said, 'We are delighted to be receiving the 2018 Humanitarian Award along with our other colleagues from the Rescue Services. We would like to sincerely thank the Hugh O' Flaherty Memorial Society for this great honour.'



EDUCATION OUTLOOK

Goal setting and good planning will bring exam success in 2019



(By Billy Ryle)

September marks the beginning of an important academic year for exam candidates. The key to success is good planning and consistent study. Set attainable target grades in each subject. Clear goals will focus and motive you. Then efficiently manage your time, your study and your personal fitness.

Time management means having a regular and disciplined study routine, based on short, medium and long term planning. Commit to a number of hours study each night. Regularly review the quality of your work. The medium term plan is to complete a targeted body of work over a longer period, such as a school term. The long-term plan is to be totally prepared for the exam at year's end.

The first term is primarily about completing course work. Do nightly homework of a high standard. Develop the habit of revision early in the year. Organise your copies of past exam papers. Consider how the exam is structured. Understand the format of each exam paper, the style of questions asked and the topics examined. Know how the marks are allocated and how much time should be spent on each question.

Use a conventional or electronic diary to record each homework assignment. Develop your own study plan, but prioritise, with deadlines in mind. An efficient system is to follow the subject timetable for the following day's classes. This approach gives you variety each night, it keeps you working to deadlines and it provides a safeguard against beginning with your favourite subject each night and relegating a disliked subject until last. Commit to about four hours work nightly, to include homework and some revision. Work in two-hour sessions and take a half hour break between the two sittings. In an exam year, Friday night must be included in the study schedule. Do six or seven hours revision over the weekend.

Revise only after you have completed your homework assignments. Try to include all your

subjects in your weekly revision plan. Revise in small manageable self-contained units. Study and revision can be tedious. Stay interested by using a reward system to maintain your momentum. The aim of doing well in the exam is the ultimate motivator, but short-term rewards give you an immediate incentive.

Good working conditions are vital for effective study. A comfortable study environment at home is essential. Study on your own in a room where you have peace and quiet. A table and a hardback chair are basic requirements. Make sure the heating and the lighting in the room is satisfactory. Organise your books and materials at the beginning of each study session. Avoid unscheduled breaks and beware of "time thieves" such as excessive TV watching and long telephone calls.

Listen actively in class. Participate in class by asking questions, by showing enthusiasm and passion for knowledge. The best information is available at school so attend all your classes punctually and be determined to learn.

Organise your practical materials, such as calculator, books, writing pads, etc. Well-documented notes are an invaluable organisational aid. Ensure that your handwriting is legible, that your diagrams are detailed and intelligible and that your presentation is neat. If you are saving material on your desktop or laptop computer file it carefully for easy access.

Concentration is a by-product of routine and organisation. By arranging it for a set time each day you reinforce your commitment to study. The more focussed and determined you are then the more your concentration will improve. To aid your concentration during study, develop the habit of doing mild forms of exercise, perhaps a short breathing exercise, or simply close your eyes momentarily to allow your mind and body to relax.

Concentration is considerably aided by a positive attitude, so be confident in your ability. Keep a good thought about yourself and be

success orientated. Self-confidence and positive thinking lead to success. Be single minded and passionate about your objectives. Keep an eye on your personal targets and avoid mental fatigue by taking exercise. With an organised and disciplined approach to your study you will do very well in your exam. Have a good and successful year.



Top tips for school lunchboxes

t's hard to believe the new school year is here again – seems like only yesterday children were starting their summer holidays and enjoying that great weather. Between buying uniforms and organising school essentials, most parents will want to have easy and healthy lunchbox ideas to hand. Because children's lunchboxes provide around one third of our children's daily nutritional needs, it's important to put some thought and planning into food and learning some good food habits along the way. To help parents, safefood have some helpful tips for a healthy, tasty school lunchbox.

To get the most from school lunchboxes, try to include the following foods every day.

- ✓ Starchy foods like 2 slices of bread, a bread roll, bagel a tortilla wrap, a pitta bread, 4-6 crackers or breadsticks. Where you can, choose wholemeal varieties. You can also try cooked pasta or rice as a change from bread.
- ✓ Include one or more fruit like apples, oranges, bananas, berries or salad vegetables in a sandwich or wrap. Chopping fruit into smaller pieces makes it easier for little hands to eat.
- ✓ One portion of dairy foods like milk, cheese or yoghurt.

- ✓ Small amounts of high protein foods like deli meats, fish, like tuna or salmon, or vegetarian options like hummus or
- ✓ A small bottle of water or milk instead of juice drinks or fizzy drinks
- ✓ If you want to introduce any changes, try to gradually do these over time so that your children get used to them. Many primary schools are Health Promoting Schools and have developed healthy eating policies that encourage parents and children not to put certain foods in the lunchbox. So it's also worth finding out what they allow.

Some fun ideas to keep your children interested

While it might seem great to have a ham sandwich five days a week, it's not very appealing eating the same food day after day. So here are some helpful tips to make it more interesting:

Theme your lunchbox on a different country, e.g. Italian - try a pasta salad, Mexican - soft tortillas with filling. Straws and brightly coloured drinks bottles can make milk and water more fun for younger children

Talk to your kids about what kinds of

lunches they would like to bring with them and try to make them together. The following weekly lunchbox planner shows you the potential variety you can have.

Monday - Chicken sandwich with some salad on brown bread; a piece of fruit, a small bottle of water and a yoghurt. (Some kids may not like salads to begin with so maybe just start them off with

5 SIGNS YOUR PET MIGHT BE ILL

•If your pet refuses to eat for more than a day, this is a serious reason to take them to the vet. Even more so if they are lethargic, vomiting, and refusing to drink. This lack of appetite may indicate an infection, parasites, or mouth or gastric diseases.

•If you notice that your pet is drinking more water than usual it could indicate diabetes or kidney disease. The average volume of drinking water for dogs is 20-70 ml/kg of their body weight per day, while for cats it's 60-120 ml plus the moisture in their food.

•When your normally friendly pet starts going off and hiding by itself, it's a bad sign. This desire to hide might be related to them feeling unwell, especially if they refuse to eat, have toilet issues, or other symptoms. Another reason might be because they are severely stressed out. Also, if a cat tries to hide somewhere high it might be because it's being attacked by fleas.

•If your usually affectionate pet suddenly becomes aggressive, one of the reasons might be because it's in pain, and you're hurting them every time you touch them. This pain could be induced by infections, injuries, or arthritis.

•If your pet struggles to breathe without taking part in any serious physical exercise, take it to the vet as soon as possible. This could be caused by liquid in the chest or heart issues.

THE SEASON OF CREATION

Plastic pollution is when plastic has gathered in an area and create problems for plants, wildlife and even human population. Every time one of these items gets thrown away or washed down a sink, the toxic pollutants have more of a chance to enter the environment and do harm.

Next time you go shopping, don't forget to carry a paper or cloth or a reusable bag. Also, try to avoid purchasing items with too much of plastic packaging. This way you can help in contributing towards the environment in the form of reducing plastic pollution whose ill effects are irreversible.

ANCIENT EUROPEAN STONE INSCRIPTIONS REVEALED BY LOW RIVER LEVELS CARRY GRAVE WARNINGS

The record-breaking heat wave throughout Europe this summer caused widespread drought, and river levels, such as along the River Elbe which begins in the Czech Republic and flows through Germany, reached critical levels so that many large river stones that have been underwater for centuries were exposed, and many of them are inscribed with grim, dire warnings.

Known as "hunger stones, "one reads "If you will again see this stone, so you will weep, so shallow the water was in the year 1417." The stone is also

chiselled with "the years of hardship and the initials of authors lost to history," and expressed that drought had brought a bad harvest, lack of food, high prices and hunger for poor people. Before 1900, the following droughts are commemorated on the stone: 1417, 1616, 1707, 1746, 1790, 1800, 1811, 1830, 1842, 1868, 1892, and 1893."

A study compared recent droughts in Europe to droughts over the last 250 years. The scientists found that the 21st century droughts were indeed extreme, but not as long-lasting or as massive as the worst of the historic ones it was also noted that the more recent droughts are also linked to record-breaking temperatures that appears to be causing "unprecedented drying trends" for the soil, which hurts crops.

GOLDFISH CAN FIND A NEW FOREVER HOME AT PARIS AQUARIUM

The biggest aquarium in Paris has started taking in goldfish that can no longer live with their original owners. With locals surrendering roughly 50 goldfish per month, the aquarium's tank now accommodates about 600 specimens, many of which may have endured a worst fate if they had not been welcomed into their new home.

Upon arriving at the aquarium, the surrendered goldfish are given antibiotics and parasitic treatments to ensure they won't harm the other fish. After one month of quarantine, they are transferred into the tank for public viewing.

The service offers a host of benefits – for starters, it discourages owners from flushing their oceanic pets down the toilet. It also keeps humans from dumping the fish into rivers, as goldfish are an invasive species.

Additionally, goldfish bowls that are smaller than 100 litres can stunt the growth of the fish. The fish that are surrendered to the aquarium will often grow up to 8 to 12 inches after being given the room to swim. They also tend to live longer thanks to their ability to socialize with their fellow fish.



After an absence of nearly a decade, top flight national league basketball returned to Killarney last season and Scotts Lakers attracted record crowds to Killarney Sports Centre for their home games. The Killarney side didn't disappoint in their opening season enjoying a good cup run before bowing out at the semi-final stage to eventual winners Ballincollig and then went on the secure the division one B shield title.

Scotts Lakers travel to Limerick IT Sports Hall this Saturday September 8th for the opening game of the new season against Limerick IT. The first home game of the season will be on Saturday September 15th against Fr Mathews (Cork) in Killarney Sports Centre at 7.30 pm. Team coach Cormac O'Donoghue is in charge of Scotts Lakers again for the new campaign and his squad is boosted with some considerable new signings.

New American signing Sean O'Brien, a native of Lafayette Hill, Pennsylvania, arrived in Killarney this week and will replace Harrison Deneka. O'Brien is a talented and skilful 6'2" player capable of filling a point guard or shooting quard role.

He has just completed four years with Colgate University playing in the top level NCAA Division One. Captaining the side in his final year, he scored 1040 points in his career with Colgate and won the Most Valuable Player Award in 2017 and 2018. O'Brien isn't the first player from Colgate to come to Killarney. Irish-American and former Colgate player Tim Sullivan enjoyed a successful stint with Gleneagle Lakers in the mid noughties.

Another new addition for Scotts Lakers is Dutch power forward Papito Hersisia, who has experience from playing in Holland and Germany. His huge 6'8" frame and ability to dominate under the boards will give Scotts Lakers extra strength this season.

Exciting shooting guard Dailian Mason from Birmingham UK, is back with

Scotts Lakers again after joining the squad during the middle of last season. An outstanding three-point shooter, Mason will give the Lakers that extra outside scoring threat. Cormac O'Donoghue and his squad of players have been in pre-season training for a number of weeks and Mark Greene will captain the side this year. The Killarney native was the Lakers most consistent Irish player last season and will have another huge role to play in the campaign ahead. The squad is also expected to include local players Padraig Lucey, Andrew Fitzgerald, Philip O'Connor, Cian Clernon, Dan Griffin, Dylan O'Sullivan and Irish American Justin Tuason. Scotts Lakers are also delighted to add Seamus Brosnan, who has transferred from St. Mary's Castleisland and former Blue Demons star Shane McCarthy. Both of these players have huge national league experience and will certainly help the Lakers to be more competitive again this season. Marko Bencic, son of St. Paul's Director of Coaching Vojkan Bencic, is also expected to join the squad as a European Bosman player. The Men's Division One league will expand from 14 teams last season to 17 teams this season meaning more fixtures for Scotts Lakers. This growth will see the division split into two conferences - north and south - and sees three men's teams in Limerick: LIT, UL Eagles and Limerick Celtics. It was both certainly a privilege and an honour to be in Croke Park on Sunday to witness the Kerry minor footballers create their own bit of history by becoming the first men's Gaelic football team to win five All-Ireland titles in a

Kerry fans, who travelled to the game, though in small numbers, had to use every contact and outlet available to them to secure a precious ticket.

Thankfully, many were privileged to gain one, even though some got theirs at literally the last minute.

The Kerry Supporters Club did their best to ensure many of their members were catered for and thanks in particular to the efforts of Secretary John King, many members were allocated tickets.

Those travelling with the Supporters Club had an early rise on Sunday morning but for many it was well worth it!

As the bus took off, supporters, including both seasoned campaigners and some who were travelling for the first time, were talking about the games ahead and the questions being asked were would Dublin succeed in their four-in-a-row bid in the senior game and would the Kerry minors make up for what their senior predecessors failed to do back in

Among the many people, we met were Ballymac's Tom O'Donoghue and former Austin Stacks manager Stephen Stack. Before we knew it, Croke Park beckoned on the horizon. The minor match had an earlier than usual 1pm start which did not meet favour with a lot of fans.

Galway came out full of running and after Kerry had raced into an early lead the Westerners got to grips with the situation around midfield and began to eat away at their opponents lead.

Galway were boosted by a Tony Gill goal in the middle of a 1-7 without reply purple patch. Some late scores steadied the ship as the westerners enjoyed a four-point interval lead.

In the second half, Kerry, thanks to some great scores from Paul Walsh and Cillian Falvey in particular, whittled away at the Galway lead and as the second half wore on, it appeared that Peter Keane's side were fully intent on creating their own bit of Gaelic football history.

The senior final which followed between Dublin and Tyrone was interesting in the early Tyrone began as if they would lay an ambush for the Dubs as Mickey Harte's men raced into a 0-5 to 0-1 lead, but Dublin were boosted when Paul Mannion was fouled and referee Conor Lane stretched his arms for the penalty. Mannion took the kick himself and levelled the scores.

After that, there was only one result as the Dubs superiority and Jack McCaffrey's Man of the Match performance was there for all to

The journey home as long and enjoyable. The official Supporters Club singsong got underway with Stella Enright and Dave Buckley leading the way from the back of the bus and this certainly was both enjoyable and shortened the journey.

Monday September 10th was deemed World Suicide Prevention Day. The theme for this year "Working together to prevent suicide"; is a reminder that suicide impacts on us all in our communities.

Suicide is something we hear about thanks to the recent openness which started some years ago. Talking about it has been and is a challenge as previously we did not consider it something we could be up front about due to the associated stigma. This stigma which is still hanging on for some has its roots deep in our psyche and history. In Greek and Roman times suicide was accepted if life had become impossible and the State even assisted by paying technicians who advised on it. In post Judo Chris tian tradition, it was looked less kindly on it and St Thomas Aquinas in the 13th century equated it with rejection of God's love so it was prohibited initially by religious precept and then the legal system. Suicide does not discriminate between people of differing faith and no faith.

Most people if they are honest will have had passive suicide thoughts at some time but more active suicidal thinking and planning to commit suicide is most often encountered when we are depressed or experiencing another mental illness or overwhelmed by the enormity of life. People when completing suicide see death as the only alternative and as they become more accustomed to the thought it may gain more currency as a viable option for them

The evidence is that we can do a great deal to influence people when they are feeling hopeless and if these thoughts are disrupted and the person is facilitated to explore alternative options, the outcome can be different.

People experiencing thoughts of suicide are often withdrawn from friends and family, hopeless and unhappy, they may have disturbed sleep pattern feel unwanted or that believe they are a burden and are unable to access an alternative in the stuckness of the moment.

The priority here is keeping the person safe, allowing them to talk openly without judgement, letting them see you are concerned and want to help and getting them to see their GP or taking them to a place of safety. It's important that they avoid self-medicating with non-prescribed drugs or alcohol as this lessens the natural inhibition and increases risk. People who are feeling suicidal see no point in living but the evidence is that after getting through the hopelessness phase, they regain their previous zest for life.

Thankfully we are inching away from a time when an attempt at suicide would have defined someone moving to a place where we are ready to acknowledge the strength and courage shown by people who talk about

Care of those bereaved by suicide should focus on firstly helping them through the crisis by meeting their immediate needs. Staying available to them for the longer haul is equally important as there can be an awkward bashfulness around knowing what to say or how to sit with their grief. The advice from those who have lived through it is to help them with the practical things if needed, stay close, avoid hollow reassurance, don't ask for an explanation, help them celebrate the life of the deceased, acknowledge the uncertainty and don't be afraid to allow them to grieve openly. That is why the things of God are foolishness to the natural man (the intellect), because we can only understand His Word and His way of doing things as we are filled with the Holy Spirit after we have accepted Jesus as Lord. This is what is known as being 'born-again' (John 3:7). We get a fresh start, another chance with God because of Jesus. God does not remember our sins after we repent. He forgives us, and removes our sins as far as the east is from the west (Psalm 103:12). How far is the east from the west? Immeasurable! Praise God, Jesus loves you friend. 
