Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, Johnny Maguire, friend and fellow volunteer member of the Killarney Tidy Towns Association said Yvonne was the driver in bringing home numerous gold medals to the town in the annual Tidy Towns Competition.

"Yvonne captained Killarney to All Ireland National Tidy Towns Final in 2011 and was coordinator of the group who prepared the town for the Entente Floral Competition", Johnny said adding that she motivated every household in Killarney to keep their homes looking good.

"Yvonne knew every inch of the town and in fact her business premises, The Cafe in Plunkett Street was known as Tidy added.

"It is unknow the hours of effort that Yvonne put into keeping Killarney tidy, from litter picking on the streets to visiting local schools to educate the children on the importance of keeping Killarney litter free, she will be a huge loss to Killarney and with the late Fr. Michael Murphy being known as Fr. Tidy, it is only fitting

that Yvonne be known as "Mrs. Tidy, he added. Johnny, who is also a member of the executive of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, who worked alongside Yvonne at the helm of the tidy towns committee, said she was a born leader who inspired the whole community and always led by example.

"Her commitment to the cause brought her into every school and every housing estate in Killarney. Working closely with the late Fr Michael Murphy, her great friend, Kathleen Foley, and others, they really put Killarney in contention for the top awards every year," Mr Maguire said.

"The name Yvonne Quill was known and respected in tidy towns circles throughout the entire country – she really was a legend and everything she turned her hand to, she succeeded. Killarney will miss her," he added.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Niall Kelleher has also paid tribute Yvonne. President Niall Kelleher said she will be very fondly remembered as an incredibly dedicated woman, a strong personality who led by example and spearheaded the town's tidy towns committee with such passion for over 25 years.

He recalled that her proudest day was when, as chairperson of the Killarney Looking Good Committee, she inspired Killarney to the prestigious overall national award in 2011 which had proved so elusive prior to that.

"Yvonne led by example and she never asked anyone to do something she wouldn't do herself.

You would seldom see her without the yellow bib, playing her part and showing us all what needed to be done to give Killarney the edge," Mr Kelleher said.

"While winning the overall prize was something special, Killarney has never been far from the top and it has won a gold medal almost every year which is testament to Yvonne's great ability to organise, her steely determination and her unrivalled ability to rally the troops," he added. The Chamber President also remembered her as a great businesswoman, a master baker and confectioner whose café on College Street was a must-visit for a whole generation of Killarney people and visitors.

"Yvonne served as Chair of Killarney Looking Good for over 25 years and during that time Killarney always been to the fore in Tidy Towns competitions, winning the overall prize in 2011. "It would be hard to find a better example of community spirit and on behalf of Killarney Municipal District, I would like to express my sympathies to her husband John and her children Peter, Sandra and Sean and her extended family and wide circle of friends", he said.

Following Requiem Mass in Prince of Peace Church, Fossa, Yvonne was laid to rest at Aghadoe Lawn Cemetery.

Yvonne will be sadly missed by her husband John and children, Peter, Sandra and Sean, son-in-law Peter, daughter-in-law Mairéad, grandchildren Anna, Jake, Ted, Abby and Luke, sister Angela Mulvey, brothers-in-law, sistersin-law, nieces, nephews, relatives and many wonderful friends.

Killarney Needs a College

Killarney will not be left behind, Further and Higher Education Minister Simon Harris said about the prospect of a third level / training and apprenticeship college in this town.

The minister who is the first ever to hold the portfolio in education was in Tralee to announce 8.5 million in building programmes for the north Kerry towns of Tralee and Listowel.

Killarney " badly needs a college like Tralee like Listowel" but it has none; and it has industry specific needs including language training unlike the north Kerry towns, I put it to him at MTU in Tralee

"Delighted you brought up Killarney," was the affable response. He has been to Killarney earlier this year and is very supportive of developing a campus in Killarney, he went on, referring also to representations from FG TD Brendan Griffin who accompanied him.

He had met Kerry College bosses and those in the training board and "I am very supportive of developing a campus in Killarney," he said.

"Without preempting anything I know Kerry ETB are working on applications," the minister elaborated.

He had met with businesses owners in March and had "a very good conversation" with industry reps, he said.

He could not get ahead of himself on Monday but "there are different funding pots more funding announcements to come in the weeks and months ahead," the minister said. .

"Let's just say Killarney is very much in the mix," he said.

This column will hold him to that, he can be assured, especially if he moves portfolio to something like enterprise and industry.

He has done well as the first higher education minister.

There was "a real need" to take education out "beyond the walls of the universities, he also said. I am at a stage now where I think universities have got too big and too impersonal and too entitled and feel they pay little attention to the students only to attract them in numbers to attract funding. Mr Harris appears to share these views and went out of his way to express them. Developing apprenticeships and training was something he was committed to doing, and "a personal ambition", Mr Harris said.

But culturally, a huge job of work was required in getting the message across there were so many well paid and decent jobs in the trades, Mr Harris also said.

He was quite sure that some people in the (university) sector were "sore" that not every penny was going into the universities now, he also said.. For every penny he was putting into the universities matching funding was going into apprenticeship and further education training programmes under his insistence.

At the Tralee Kerry College Monavalley campus a new 21,000 sq foot apprenticeship training building will allow for an intake of 350 learners every year in carpentry, joinery, electrical and solar and other renewable energy installation courses.

If the necessary cultural change did not happen there would be a shortage of skills including house building and retrofitting skills, Mr Harris said.

The range of apprenticeships was being expanded to include areas like accounting technician and farm management, he added.

"Education is the great leveler, " Mr Harris said. There was a real need to take education out "beyond the walls of the universities" and into the communities and industry, he said..

Killegy House sells

The mountain mansion associated with Jackie Lavin and her partner Bill Cullen has sold and has gone beyond the asking price of close to a million euro, it has been confirmed.

Killegy House and Hunting Lodge, with six bedrooms and seven bathrooms at the foot of Mangerton, an expansive house with detached guest lodge and 34 acres had an asking price of Euro 950.00.

Killarney's Tom Spillane, joint seller with Savills of Cork said he was "very pleased with the level of enquiries".

He conducted many viewings of the property and there were four to five serious bidders in at the last. The final price went over the asking price, he said.

The 1990s house in the middle of the national park is accessible from the Queen's Drive, a challenging uphill road in spite of its grand name.

During the heyday of the Celtic Tiger, helicopters would regularly ferry the great and the famous

to and from the lodge, flying along the foot of the mountain.

Architect designed, the house is partly thatched and the grounds were fully landscaped and are stunning with an artificial lake.

It had gone to seed but work is already underway there and a new entrance gate has been erected.

Tom is not revealing who bought it but this column understands it is a Killarney family.

The house was built in 1995 and is constructed of local stone with slate rooves, extensive oak double glazed windowsThe guest cottage is of similar stone construction with a thatched roof which is currently in need of repair. The cottage has a large south facing terrace on the upper floor off the main bedroom.

Outside a pathway leads from the large courtyard to the tennis court and various garden seating areas on stone slabbed patios with dry stone walls, a strong feature of the lands immediately surrounding the property.

Playgrounds need serious attention

Killarney Councillor Donal Grady is calling for shelter for playgrounds in Killarney. Across Kerry councillors are seeking better ancillary facilities around these hugely popular gathering points for families and for children, visitors and local.

At the last meeting Cllr Donal asked that "a section" is covered.

Thai would provide " shelter from the rain and protection from the sun," Donal said.

It would also mean the playgrounds at Knockreer and elsewhere could be used all year round, he said.

But, management in the council said the design in Knockreer made exposure to the weather "essential" for maintenance.

Apparently the rain washes the equipment and the sun's UV rays sterilise the surfaces.

Only four of the county's 41 playgrounds have basic toilet facilities it has also emerged after councillors in Castleisland gave out stink about the lack of facilities for children at the playground there.

With climate change, roofing playgrounds is something we need to think about urgently and this is a sensible and timely suggestion by the Killarney councillor.

WAR OF INDEPENDENCE AMBUSH THE FOCUS OF NEW STAGE PLAY

The dramatic story of the IRA ambush of members of the Crown Forces near Milltown in 1921 is being presented as a new play in the local Community Hall this November. Ballymacandy is based on the bestselling book by local historian and author Owen O'Shea and involves a cast of almost thirty locals, all of whom live near where five RIC and Black and Tans were killed on 1 June 1921, just six weeks before the end of Independence.

Tickets for the highly anticipated play which is written by Owen O'Shea and directed by Mike O'Halloran are now on sale and can be booked online at www. owenoshea.ie. The play will run for five nights during the first two weeks of November on 3rd, 4th, 5th, 11th and 12th, all at 8.00pm.

"As with the book, the play attempts to portray these events from all of the different perspectives, those of the IRA and Cumann na mBan, the RIC and Black and Tans, as well as the perspectives of local civilians in Milltown and Castlemaine who were caught up in the events. The ambush involved IRA men from the locality as well as from Tralee, Castlegregory and Keel so we hope the play will have a wide appeal," said Owen O'Shea.

"Rehearsals have been going now for months and the cast, most of whom have never been on stage before, have put an enormous amount of work into the preparations. They have really embraced the story and have been moved to portray events based on the evidence we have about what actually happened."

Owen said that after the pandemic, there is also a great sense of excitement about a local community initiative which will bring people together again, in this case, to present our local history in a new way.

Among those killed in the ambush was RIC sergeant, James Collery, who lived in Milltown and left a wife and eight young children, and whose story is portrayed in the play. Also told is the story of the local IRA members like Jack Flynn and Dan Mulvihill and the members of Cumann na mBan, many of whom were on the receiving end of the violence of the rampaging Black and Tans.

"Writing the play was a challenge because these were real people and not fictional characters," said Owen, "but thanks to the directing skills of Mike O'Halloran and the professionalism of such a great cast, I think we will do the story great justice."

LIKE THE CURATE'S EGG, **BUDGET 2023** IS GOOD IN SPOTS BUT A **MISSED OPPORTUNITY TO ABOLISH THIRD LEVEL FEES**



BUDGET 2023

Hard pressed students and parents, no doubt, kept a close eye on last week's Budget 2023 in the hope of getting some badly needed financial relief. While there was some good news in the package, a great opportunity was lost to eliminate student fees, which are euphemistically referred to as 'student contribution.'

REDUCTION

On a positive note, all third-level students will see a once-off reduction of \in 1,000 in their college fees this year, as part of Budget 2023. At first reading, it looked as if college fees were being permanently reduced from \in 3,000 to \in 2,000 but the devil is in the detail. The \in 1,000 reduction applies only to the 2022/2023 academic year.

FEES DOWN

However, in recognition of the cost-of-living pressures faced by students and their families, Tuesday's Budget provided funding in 2023 to reduce the student contribution fee by €500 on a permanent basis for eligible families earning between €62,000 and €100,000. Students in this category will pay €2,500 in fees as and from the 2023/2024 academic year. The income limit to qualify for a €1,500 reduction in contribution fees will be increased from €55,240 to €62,000. Students in this category will pay €1,500 in fees from the next academic year.

CONFUSION

Similar to the technical formula which was recently used to calculate contributory old age pensions for those who continue to work between ages 66 and 70, the approach to the fee reduction is confusing. In short, many students who pay €2,000 in fees this year will face a bill of €2,500 or €3,000 next year unless Minister Harris keeps it simple by permanently retaining the €1,000 reduction for all students. DOUBLE PAYMENT

All students who have gualified for a Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) maintenance grant will receive a double payment next month, November. Students will also welcome the announcement that all SUSI maintenance grants will be increased by between 10% and 14%. To further confuse the issue, these increases won't kick in until the beginning of the next academic year in September 2023 even though they are badly needed at present in a period of spiralling inflation. Meanwhile, €8 million will be available in the Student Assistance Fund which provides financial support for students who are experiencing hardship. That fund will be in strong demand as students struggle to make ends meet.

SKILLNET

Next year, €3.9 billion will be allocated to the Further & Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science sector. €150 million will be provided in additional funding over this year and next year to strengthen the financial position of the sector. In order to deliver on the Housing for All policy and climate action plans, funding was provided for 4,800 additional apprenticeship places. 11,000 upskilling and reskilling opportunities were provided for the sectors most impacted by Brexit and 2,000 Skillnet Ireland places were provided in sustainable finance, green technology and climate change. Skillnet Ireland, www. skillnetireland.ie, is the Government agency which helps Businesses of all sizes to identify and develop the skills they need to succeed.

USI REACTION

In a reaction to the Budget, the Union of Students in Ireland (USI) said that the Government should have made the \in 1000 reduction in college fees permanent and that the reduction had come too late for students who had already deferred their college places because they could not afford the cost

of college. USI added that it was a missed opportunity not to move towards abolishing college fees for once and for all. USI said that the Budget failed to address the serious student accommodation crisis, which has made college inaccessible or an extreme hardship for many who are living out of cars, sofa hopping or making long daily commutes. So, the USI report card on government performance in the Budget will probably say something like 'doing a little, but must work a lot harder!'

ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

BLURRED VISION

When you have blurred vision, your eyesight is less sharp and objects, images and words seem to be out of focus.

Who is affected by blurred vision?

Anyone can be affected by blurred vision. It could be a sign of getting older and/or needing new glasses, tiredness, or too much sun. But there are many other causes, and it could be one of the symptoms of a range of conditions including: - Short-sightedness (myopia),

long-sightedness (hyperopia), astigmatism and presbyopia - An eye injury which may have scratched the cornea

- Foreign object in the eye
- Eye drops
- Dry eye
- Cataracts
- Age-related macular
- degeneration
- A migraine

Blurred vision can also be a symptom of non-optical conditions such as a diabetes, a stroke and preeclampsia (a condition caused by high blood pressure in pregnancy).

What are the symptoms of blurred vision?

Blurred vision is hazy and unfocussed, as though you were looking through an oily film and you feel you need to rub your eyes to get things back into focus. It can affect your entire field of vision or your peripheral vision (the edges of your vision), and can occur in one eye or both. You may not realise that you have blurred vision in one eye until you do something that requires shutting your other eye - for example, doing your make up. This is because your brain provides compensation.

How do you treat blurred vision? As blurred vision has many possible causes, the treatment will depend on the condition. If the blurring is recurring or ongoing, you should book an eye examination. This will investigate the cause and recommend suitable treatment or refer you to an appropriate specialist.

If you think it may be one of the symptoms of a serious medical condition such as stroke or preeclampsia, you should seek urgent medical help.

BRIAN MULLINS RIP



The late Brian Mullins

If you were to show one picture to encapsulate gaelic football, it would surely be the iconic one of Sean Walsh and Brian Mullins rising skywards towards the football. It captured the game's greatest rivalry. Not the greatest team, that has to go to Dublin's most recent (and possibly current) vintage. But although Kerry and Mayo knocked hard on that door, Jim Gavin's Dublin reigned supreme, always a step ahead of rivals. Not so O'Dwyer's Kerry and Heffernan's Dublin. Kerry's greatest footballers were aging after two All Irelans in '69 and '70. Offaly were dominant, while Cork were very much the rising tide and swept all before them in '73. Kerry were knocking on the door of minor and U21 titles – the likes of Kennelly, Ó Sé, Spillane, Ogie, Mickey Ned, and Egan were underage prodigies. Dublin, always dependent on country imports in those days, were at a low ebb - with cars much more common, a lot of those country players were going back to their home clubs. Manger Phil Markey was in dispute with St. Vincents, who were always the backbone of Dublin football but were getting plenty off Eugene McGee's UCD in club contests. Jimmy Deenihan and Fran Ryder worked together in a Dublin factory - they wouldn't discuss unfashionable GAA out loud in the canteen where overseas soccer was de riqueur. In desperation, Division two Dublin, walloped early in Leinster for several years, turned to an old hand on previous tillers, Vincent's Kevin Heffernan. He coaxed Jimmy Keaveney back into the fold. Hanahoe, another Vincents' man, renewed his vows. Soccer player Kevin Moran was persuaded to have a go. Mickey Whelan, who had transferred to Vincents, was brought on board with innovative coaching learned in America. Hard training - some guys pulled away. David Hickey and his brother Mick came from rugby.

In Kerry, we like to pretend that 1975 was the biggest shock underdog victory of them all. It wasn't – Dublin's victory over All Ireland champions Cork in 1974 was a sensation. Two nineteen year olds were key. Antn O'Toole was so fast and so sure on the ball that the Hill (sparsely populated but growing) christened him the Blue Panther, and a midfielder who looked and played much older than his years. Brian Mullins, another Vincents stalwart who had played U19 rugby for Leinster and cricket for Ireland, was so good and so uncompromisingly dominant that it felt as though he had been there forever, epitomised the Dubs. Nothing flash, nothing exuberant, but just unbreakable. As John McCarthy - a teak tough garda himself would famously observe of a clash with Ulster's Mickey Joe Forbes, Mullins was "the hardest man in Leinster". He was all of that – he was also a consistently excellent footballer. Great hands. Could score with both feet, running into the space so cannily provided by Hanahoe. Wonderful passer, especially those balls into Keaveney. I'd rate Jack O'Shea a fraction higher because of his positional sense, but there was very little between them. Of all our opponents in those halcvon days, Mullins was the man that we feared the most. When he rose, and he always did, so did Dublin.

Four All Irelands. The fourth, in 1983, was the most amazing – it took incredible character to come back from a 1980 car crash that would have crippled most men. Did he deserve his sending off that day? Ah, yeah. There's no point in pretending that he was an angel – the big man would have laughed at the notion. Himself and Brian Talty of Galway became great friends after - it says a lot about both men.

Nine Leinsters. Six SFCs in Dublin, three Leinsters, and an All Ireland, where he served as player, manager, and chairman. He managed Derry to a National League and an Ulster title – rare currency for them.

Last Saturday, St. Vincents defeated Oliver Plunkett's to reach the Dublin County Senior 2 Final, with Brian' son Nathan playing a key role until a harsh red card ended his contribution. His father would have been smiling. Ar dheis De go raibh a anam.

Kerry are the 2022 Division two champions (my main hope for the year – we needed to get back to Division One football to keep our talent sharp) and reached the All Ireland Final. Fair enough, that star-studded Meath side had too much for us at that stage, but it was bstill a phenomenal year and that has been recognised in the All Star nominations.

Goalkeeper Ciara Butler, defenders Eilís Lynch, Aishling O'Connell, Emma Costello, and Kayleigh Cronin, midfeilders Cáit Lynch and Lorraine Scanlon, and forwards Anna Galvin, Niamh Carmody, Siofra O'Shea, and Louise Ni Muircheartaigh are all nominated. Welcome back dear student - continuing on being 'trapped'. "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places" (Ephesians 6:12). We have spoken recently of those trapped in the human trafficking industry, but there are many of what we perceive to be regular 'free' people who are actually feeling trapped in their own situations. It can make one feel helpless and forgotten, especially when observing others enjoying their lives. There are numerous circumstances that make a person feel trapped. Chronic sickness or depression, caring for a loved one who needs constant attention; being stuck in a career or job that they were never called to and hate going into everyday, or a financial problem - choked by debts they cannot ever afford to clear. Another example could be where a person is being abused by a family member or friend being subjected to domestic violence, sexual, emotional, verbal or financial abuse being made to feel like they don't matter - by a bully. In all these scenarios it can look like there is no way out - 'trapped'. Sadly, it's what has caused some to throw in the towel and take their own lives, and causes others to turn to alcohol or drugs or some other addiction to ease the pain.

Listen friend, this is not God's plan for your life! And every situation can change. What has been happening yesterday and today does not have to be your tomorrow. I know that it's easy to talk when I'm not the one in your predicament but, in order for change to occur something new needs to happen. We cannot go on doing things the same way we've always done them and expect a difference - we must make a choice to embrace change. Reach out for help - because so often these situations are going on unknown to others. People are struggling in isolation but they don't want anyone to know because of the shame of being viewed as a weakling. Anything that is kept secret or undercover is a trap by Satan. The devil is our enemy who operates in the darkness. His tactics are to steal, kill and destroy (John 10:10). The Scripture from Ephesians above shows that we are in a battle everyday against demonic spirits who try to dominate this world and the people in it. "...the rulers of the darkness of this world"....the word 'darkness' here translates to mean 'ignorance'. So the enemy rules by ignorance - our ignorance of his methods and devices. AUTUMN PLANTING

Now is the time to start thinking about planting bare rooted trees, hedging, fruit bushes, roses and root balled conifers. The bare rooted planting season lasts until March. The reason for this is that the trees and hedging are dormant at this time of year, so you can't really do any damage when you are lifting or planting. When planting bare rooted, as a general rule, plant about three plants per meter, roses can also be purchased and planted bare rooted as can fruit trees and fruit bushes. The main thing when planting bare rooted trees and hedging is that when you purchase them and if you are not going to plant them straight away, you will have to heel them into the ground. By this I mean you will have to dig a hole, place the plant in and cover the roots with earth to stop them drying out.

When hedging plants, roses and fruit bushes, they will usually come in bundles and will be tied together, so you don't have to separate them, just put the whole bundle in the around.
