



5 DAYS 5 NEW WAYS FOR PRES GIRLS

As part of the Green School Initiative, St. Brigid's Secondary School Killarney are tackling a new travel campaign called 5 days 5 New ways. The main aim of this campaign is to encourage alternative means of travelling to school in order to reduce congestion outside the school entrance. We are truly blessed to live in the wonderful surrounds of Killarney and surrounding valleys and mountains, we do appreciate every moment of its natural beauty. This renowned 'heaven's reflex' has been celebrated, in prose, verse, painting, and its location has been the inspirations for filmmakers and photographers.


As a tourist destination the signage for trails, walks and paths in Killarney National Park, leaves a lot to be desired, actually leaves a lot to the imagination.

The most obvious is the lack of sign posts for Torc Waterfall and Torc Mountain. With the help of Google maps and Eircode, it has enhanced our sense of direction. However confusion is heightened at the road that leads to the 'Old Kenmare Road' where visitors are sent by Google Maps to Torc Waterfall! - 3km off course! to 'Upper Torc Car Park' or Cloghereen Upper. The road itself is one continuous pothole, not fit for purpose, when the visitor and local arrive, after swerving to avoid enormous crevices. The visitor looks around aimlessly at the map which indicates, red, blue and yellow dots! There is no signage for Torc Mountain, the most accessible and trail friendly mountain in the Park, neither are there proper signposts for Torc Waterfall, Cardiac steps loop or the many lovely loops of Barr na Currane.

It's hard to believe the Kerry Way Ultra, run by Eileen Daly, is the toughest ultra marathon in the Country, a 200km race, that sees athletes traverse all the ancient trails, highways and byways some in darkness, along the Iveragh Peninsula. The biggest obstacle is the final leg of the journey from Torc to Muckross Abbey, the lack of signposts is inadmissible.

This is just one example of what hundreds

of wayward and confused visitors endure. Surely it must be a safety requirement to position signposts either made of recycled products, wood, or simple finger posts, so that visitor and local alike can enjoy a memorable experience our of National Park, which we treasure and hold dear to our hearts.

Over €26,000 raised for the IMNDA in Kerry & North Cork

The Killarney Plaza Hotel was the venue for a presentation of money to Motor Neurone. Christy Lehane, Chairman of Kerry Friends of Motor Neurone, made the presentation of €26,500 to Marie Reavey, Regional Development Officer of the Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association (IMNDA). This amount was raised through various fundraising events and donations made in Kerry to support the work of the IMNDA.

These events included Flag Days in Killarney in 2017 and 2018, Cheque Presentations from Tralee Lions Club for 2017 and 2018, Killarney Soroptimists, Ring of Kerry Charity cycle, Ballinagree Vintage Club and numerous ceili's and coffee mornings to raise awareness and funds for Motor Neurone.

Marie Reavey, IMNDA said, "We cannot thank everyone from Kerry and North Cork enough for their fantastic support. Kerry Friends of Motor Neurone have been tirelessly fundraising for the IMNDA since 2011. We would be lost without their continued support as over 83% of our income comes from fundraising and donations. Without support such as this, we would be unable continue providing vital services for people living with Motor Neurone Disease."

Motor Neurone Disease (MND) is a progressive neurological condition that attacks the motor neurones, or nerves, in the brain and spinal cord. This means

messages gradually stop reaching muscles, which leads to weakness and wasting. MND can affect how you walk, talk, eat, drink and breathe. MND is often referred to as the 1,000 day disease as most people die within 1,000 days of symptom onset. 1 person dies every 2 days from MND.

The national charity is the primary support

organisation for those affected by Motor Neurone Disease. The IMNDA provides specialised services for people affected by this debilitating disease such as equipment on loan, financial assistance towards home help, advice and home visits by MND Nurse. There are currently over 360 people living with MND in Ireland, 11 of which are from Kerry.



SHERRY BUILDS A NEW LIFE IN KILLARNEY

Having suffered immense loss during the war in Sierra Leon, a Killarney resident has turned her life around and this week travelled to Dublin to receive an award for her accomplishment in Education.


Sherry Jimoh arrived in Killarney two years ago from the war torn country and has since immersed herself into the local community. She has completed courses in Care of the Elderly, Community Development and an introduction to Third Level Education. Currently Sherry is studying a pre-nursing course in Tralee and hopes someday to train as a nurse.

Sherry is an active member of Killarney Tidy Towns Association and a choir member in the Church of the Resurrection as well as volunteering in a local nursing home.

Safe Crossing ahead for Countess Residents

Cllr Brendan Cronin has made an allocation of €6,000 from the Councillor Specific Municipal District Operations Fund towards a new table top pedestrian crossing and associated works at the Countess Road junction to 3 estates in Killarney. Kerry County Council have recognized his allocation towards the cost of the provision of a pedestrian crossing, as this pedestrian crossing is vitally important for the residents of Countess Grove, Muckross View and Dromhale Close housing Developments. The estimated total cost of undertaking this project is €20.000 and if the balance is made available from the **Councillor Specific Municipal District Operations** Fund, arrangements will be put on hand to have the job undertaken. Cllr Cronin has said "I am sure that other Killarney MD Cllrs will allocate money towards this work so that it can be undertaken in 2019. Killarney Municipal District roads Department are due to publish the statutory Section 38 public consultation along with drawings and layout plans in the coming weeks and I look forward to seeing this important work completed."

KERRY HOTELS FEEL BREXIT EFFECT

usiness sentiment amongst hotels and questhouses in Kerry and across the country has deteriorated sharply year on year, representing a stark change in outlook compared with 2018 according to the Irish Hotels Federation (IHF). An industry survey undertaken by the IHF ahead of its annual conference in the Gleneagle Hotel & INEC, Killarney, Co Kerry, reveals that only 40% of hoteliers nationally now have a positive outlook for their business over the next 12 months. This compares with 79% who reported a positive outlook at the start of 2018.

Major concerns for the sector include the continued risk of a disruptive Brexit and reduced competitiveness due to the hike in tourism VAT, increases in the cost of doing business and growing economic uncertainty internationally. In particular, the higher VAT rate is putting investment in additional hotel capacity at risk, with 75% of hoteliers stating they are now reassessing plans to increase capital investment as a result of the increase.

Performance so far this year has been mixed, with 39% of hoteliers across the country reporting a drop in overall business levels compared to this time last year while 48% report an increase. This has largely been driven by growth from North America and Europe, which is masking continued poor performance of the UK market. Almost two thirds of hoteliers (65%) say advance bookings for 2019 from the Great Britain are down while almost six in ten (57%) are seeing a fall in advance bookings from Northern Ireland.

With the vast majority of hoteliers (91%) concerned about the impact Brexit will have on their business over the next 12 months, Niamh O'Shea, Chair of the Kerry branch of the Irish Hotels

Federation says growth in recent years cannot be taken for granted. "With the prospect of a disruptive Brexit looming, the sharp fall in business sentiment amongst hoteliers is not surprising. Our fear is that regional tourism businesses risk being hardest hit, especially those operating in areas that are heavily reliant on seasonal and UK markets." Tourism currently supports 15,700 jobs in Kerry and contributes some €533m to the local economy annually.

Ms O'Shea states: "Tourism plays a vitally important role as an engine of growth and regional economic balance. However, this could be put at risk if the Government does not take decisive action to mitigate the impact of Brexit and address the other serious challenges we now face such as the high cost of doing business in Ireland."

"Tourism is an exceptionally competitive activity. We compete daily for business at both a domestic and international level and every tourism Euro spent by overseas and domestic tourists in Ireland is hard won. Maintaining our competitiveness is absolutely vital to sustaining the growth of the industry, which supports jobs in every country and town."

"With 70 per cent of tourism jobs based outside of Dublin, tourism's wide geographic distribution is critical to sustaining regional economies, and addressing the rural imbalance. And, as the biggest investor in Irish tourism, the hotels sector is playing a critical role. Hotels and guesthouses not only provide local employment opportunities, we buy local services, source locally produced food and provide a vital infrastructure in support

of local business and communities," she added. Welcoming the Government's commitment last year to introduce a Tourism Satellite Account within the Central Statistics Office (CSO), Ms O'Shea called for it to be implemented as a priority. "This account will provide a full analysis of the economic activity in the tourism industry and show how much it contributes to each county throughout the country to inform future taxation and economic policy," he said.


From Russia with gra

Letting go and letting be!

WHAT IS A CATARACT?

A cataract happens when the lens within your eye becomes cloudy. It can happen to all of the lens or just part of it. There are different types of cataract, but the most common is agerelated cataract, which is more common in people over 65. It can be found to some degree in almost all older people.

Risk factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for developing cataracts. Apart from age, smoking increases the risk of cataracts and often causes the cataract to develop earlier and more quickly. Excessive exposure to sunlight and ultraviolet light can increase the speed at which cataracts develop. In some cases, people are born with cataracts. Symptoms

Symptoms

Cataracts can cause your vision to become cloudy and less clear. You may notice that you're more easily dazzled by vehicle headlights, or that objects appear less colourful. Cataracts don't cause eye pain or make your eyes red TREATMENT

At first following a sight test we may be able to prescribe new glasses that will help with changes to your vision caused by the cataract. When this no longer helps you to see well enough, the only effective treatment is surgery. Surgery is usually only recommended once the cataract is causing problems with everyday activities, such as driving, watching television and reading.

Cataract surgery improves the vision of nearly all patients and has one of the highest success rates of all surgery. If you experience blurred or cloudy vision you should have a sight test.

I am not exaggerating when I say that I was very anxious in the beginning but I now treat my visits as a social outing. From the moment I walk through the door of the Bon Secours and meet the staff at Reception, Admissions, the Day Ward and the Laboratory, I am instantly made to feel at ease".

People often feel under pressure when they enter a hospital but Paudie has always felt a sense of welcome.

The way the staff are so friendly and people focused is a credit to the Hospital. I couldn't say enough about them'' says Paudie.

Paudie has a fantastic outlook on life, he is feeling great and enjoys a swim most mornings. If you are worried, a simple blood test taken when you are fasting, is the best way to confirm if you have too much iron in your blood.

Protein With the above in mind, comes Rule 3b, don't deprive yourself! Be honest, can you completely give up XYZ? If not, don't. Remember though, if you feel you must, or deserve to eat some junk every day, maybe you need to try and change the way you think. However, can you limit your consumption of XYZ to 1-2 times per week forever? If you honestly can, great, that is what you need to do in your nutrition plan. We use the term nutrition plan when we mean something sustainable and sensible, when we say diet in this article we mean something idiotic like the Cambridge diet, maple syrup diet, lighter life, weight watchers, Tony Fergusson and any other out there, robbing people of their health and hard earned money. Sounds dramatic but, in our line of work these are the stories we see and hear every week

DON'T LOSE WEIGHT QUICKLY

Rule 4 – Don't lose weight too quickly *for you*; If it didn't go on quickly – so is it sensible to lose it quickly? Although, If it went on quickly, losing it quickly and going back to maintenance could be an appropriate option. If you want to lose fat on your own without guidance, and for it to stay off, it needs to be slow, sometimes horribly demotivatingly slow in fact. Have you ever been guilty of saying 'great week this week, lost 4lbs!' with an unknowingly naive smile? It sounds boring and repetitive but 1-2lbs per week is a great speed to lose weight for most of us. The more naturally active you are the closer to 2lbs you can be. These figures relate to being in an energy deficit of 500-1000kcals per day. However, remember the body is not an engine, it is not a simple case of kcals in and kcals out otherwise we'd have hungry people everywhere with great abs! Sustainability is the key. Similarly, a slowed metabolism is a very real thing but is only one consequence. So, as an example, a person who sits at a desk most of the day for work and can only commit 2-3 hours per week to exercise may only be able to lose 1lb per week to allow them to eat enough to keep the body functioning properly, to avoid plateaus and to probable prevent weight regain.

MINIMUM WAGE IN IRELAND 2019

The Minimum Wage in Ireland was increased on January 1st 2019. It went up by 25 cent per hour, from €9.55 to €9.80.

New laws were introduced on March 4th 2019 - which mean that minimum wage rates are now based purely on age and not on previous work experience or training.

These are the Minimum Wage Rates that apply in Ireland from 4th March 2019. Aged under 18 – €6.86 per hour

- Aged 18 €7.84 per hour
- Aged 19 €8.82 per hour
- Aged 20 or more €9.80 per hour

New rules also mean that if a casual/part time employee is called to work and sent home without receiving the hours expected, the employee is entitled to a minimum payment of three times the national minimum wage.

These are the minimum wage rates that applied from Jan 1st 2019 to March 3rd 2019

Experienced adult worker €9.80 per hour

 Over 19 and more than 1 but less than 2 years since began first job €8.82 per hour. (90%)

- Over 18 and less than 1 year since began first job €7.84 per hour. (80%)
- Aged under 18 €6.86 per hour (70%)

(An experienced adult worker - for the purposes of the National Minimum Wage Act - is an employee who has an employment of any kind in any 2 years over the age of 18.)

Strong finishes have been the hallmark of Peter Keane's Kerry teams this year and the trend continued at the artic Fitzgerald Stadium, Killarney where the home side earned a hard-earned victory over Monaghan. As a result of this win, Kerry are now almost certain of a league final place later this month as they have full points from their five games and a superior scoring average of +13.

Tommy Walsh turned in another Man of the Match performance, scoring four points, including three marks, while Paul Murphy, Tom O'Sullivan and Stephen O'Brien also put in solid shifts. Tomas O'Se made another notable impact on his introduction, winning two frees, both of which were converted by Sean O'Shea, who finished the game with eight points including one monstrous effort from a sideline kick at the very death.

The heavy snow showers which fell throughout the preceding hurling clash between Kerry and Meath led to some speculation that the game might be postponed but thankfully the elements eased considerably ahead of the throw-in, which was delayed for 10 minutes, due to the late arrival of the Monaghan team,



who were held up in traffic and required the assistance of local gardai to get to the stadium. Monaghan, who are in the throes of a relegation battle, showed glimpses of the type of form that brought them close to the All Ireland final last year. Malachy O'Rourke's side were hoping to maintain their winning sequence on Kerry soil, having won on their two previous visits, but Kerry were keen to set this record straight. The Farney men, who had to close out the game with 14 men following the dismissal of midfielder Dessie Hughes on a second yellow card in the 67th minute, had the better of the exchanges in the first-half and led 0-9 to 0-7 with Conor McManus, who finished with 0-8, providing the bulk of their scoring returns.

Sean O'Shea scored three points, while Man of the Match Tommy Walsh chipped in with a brace.

Monaghan continued to hold sway for much of the second half and with 20 minutes remaining were leading 0-12 to 0-10. In the final twenty minutes (there were four for stoppages at the end of the second half), Kerry outscored their opponents by 0-7 to 0-1 and this was enough to seal their fifth straight win of the campaign.

Also considering that the game was well out of reach of Tolka in the second half, perhaps some of his teammates could also have facilitated him with the ball on more occasions to try and create a new three-point scoring record. The chances of a similar opportunity arising again to earn a permanent place in the record books is unlikely to happen too often. Greene had 13 attempts from outside the threepoint arc missing just four on the night. This is quite low in terms of missed shots and his 9-13 record gave an impressive scoring return of over 69%. In the NBA, Golden State's Klay Thompson holds the current record of the most threepointers scored in one match with 14 converted from 24 attempts giving a return of 58%. The Irish national league and the NBA are worlds apart and should never even be compared but the stats figures do raise the 'what if' question if Mark Greene had actually attempted another 10 or 11 more three-point shots in this match.

Basketball Ireland records and scoring archives over the years aren't readily accessible or available. While some American players have hit double digit thre-pointer returns, it is unclear if any Irish player has ever scored more than nine three-pointers in a national league game.

Ironically almost 14 years ago to the day on the first weekend of March 2005, another Killarney player Colin O'Reilly sank nine three-pointers in a massive personal haul of 53 points for Gleneagle Lakers in a 117-107 loss to Waterford Crystal in a superleague clash at the Inec, Killarney. Hotshot American Keith Friel scored ten three-pointers for Gleneagle Lakers in a pre-season tournament against Tralee in September 2003.

One of the standout performances and great shooting displays in Irish Basketball history was ten three-pointers in a 50 point total from American John Carson for St. Declans Dublin in a televised national cup finals match in January 1988. Dan Trant, a former Boston Celtics draft pick in 1984 and sadly a 9/11 Twin Towers victim in 2001, played for Marian Dublin in the mid 1980s and scored 11 three-pointers in one game. From these stats figures, Scotts Lakers captain Mark Greene is clearly in good company when it comes to three-point shooting records. His shooting streak also extended beyond the game on Saturday night when he participated in a half time blindfolded free throw competition to raise funds for the Irish Cancer Society. Mark's mother Karen is competing in the Strictly Come Dancing event at the Inec Killarney on March 8th and her fundraiser is the 'Fill Me Up Milk Bottle Challenge'. Supporters at the basketball match last Saturday night contributed generously to the fundraiser while Lakers captain Mark Greene and coach Cormac O'Donoghue were blindfolded during the novelty free throw shoot-out.

KILLARNEY ON TOP IN HARD FOUGHT WIN

Killarney had many opportunities to run at Killorglin but, between the demands of the wet and cold and ball-handling, the half was not going according to Killarney's plans. Entering the second part

Each of member involved had their own reasons for taking part, Fiona said "I raised a total of €960 myself, one of the lads John Quirke raised €173 and wanted to do the challenge for a good cause." Another participant Angela Kerrisk said "I did it to challenge myself ,as I've never ran before and also being thankful that I could having only just got my fitness back after years of inactivity made me realise how lucky I was that I get to do this when so many others would love to but through injury or sickness cant so I did it for them."

Damien Brown was also one of the participants. "I did the challenge because it was 10 years to the month since I was diagnosed with cancer. I thought it would be a good marker to show how far I have come since then as well as raising money for other patients that are sick in hospital. I have raised just under €500 but Im hoping that goes up in the next 2 days when I collect some more money from family", Damien told the Killarney Outlook.







MARGARET'S RAMBLINGS

TODAY IS INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

The roots of International Women's Day can be traced back to the struggles of women workers in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century's:

In 1857, thousands of women working in the New York garment industry took to the streets to protest unfair wages, a 12-hour work day, and sexual harassment in the workplace.

Conditions for working women did not improve. In 1907 the women held a "Hunger March" in New York in protest at the dangerous working conditions and very long working periods, calling for a ten-hour working day and improved wages. The police attacked the march, and the following year on March 8th 1908 a commemorative march was held, which became a milestone in women's history. Female garment workers called for fair treatment at work, an end to child labour and votes for women.

In 1910, 100 women representing 17 countries voted to establish an International Women's Day. This took place at an International Conference of Socialist Women in Copenhagen, Denmark.

On March 25, 1911, a fire in a sweatshop owned by the Triangle Shirtwaist Company in New York killed 145 female garment workers. Unsafe conditions contributed to the high death toll. Many of the fire escapes were locked to prevent women from slipping out, even for a moment's break. Eighty thousand workers marched through the streets to attend the mass funeral for the victims.

A year later, 14,000 textile workers went out on strike. With a rallying cry of "Better to starve fighting than starve working," the women stayed out for nearly three months.

The United Nations formally proclaimed March 8 International Women's Day in 1975 to mark women's efforts over the years to attain justice and equality for themselves and their children. International Women's Day is a time for women around the world to commemorate their struggles and celebrate their achievements.

2019's theme is "Think equal, build smart, innovate for change" which will focus on innovative ways in which we can advance gender equality and the empowerment of women, particularly in the areas of social protection systems, access to public services and sustainable infrastructure.

EGGSHELLS HAVE SO MANY USES

If you love eggs, you probably go through lots of them every week. The eggshells, however, often get discarded with no second thought, like yesterday's newspaper – so here are just 5 ideas to use them up: * Use crushed eggshells and soapy water to clean the insides of containers, as well as pots and pans. Simply put the solution into the container and shake it well.

* Consider keeping some crushed eggshells in your sink's strainer – they'll add another level



of straining, and as they break down, they keep the drain and pipes clean.

* Fill shell halves with soil and add your choice of seeds, place in an egg carton and let it grow. Once the seedlings are ready, transplant them with the shell into your garden to give them fertile ground to start from.

* Sprinkle crushed eggshells in your garden to deter slugs, snails, and even cutworms from eating your plants. If you have deer in the area, you'll be happy to know that they hate the smell of eggs too.

* Eggshells break down rapidly in compost piles, adding some much-needed calcium to the mix.

As a former White House chef, Roberto Mendoza has cooked for Barack Obama, Bill Clinton, George Bush, Donald Trump, and an assortment of royal international guests and he has also served as a chef for the Academy Awards.Since leaving the White House, he has been managing a restaurant and cooking for the homeless in Charlotte, North Carolinabut, thanks to his mother's instincts, he will now be feeding many more homeless communities. Mr. Mendoza's mother recently travelled to the U.S. from Guatemala, in order to visit her son. During her stay, she got a feeling that Roberto was going to win the lottery and despite his aversion to gambling, he decided to listen to his mother's intuition. He bought a \$5 scratch ticket from a local convenience store and was stunned to find that he had won the top prize of a quarter million dollars.

After taxes, he took home \$176,876 and he plans on using all of the money to finish building a kitchen that will feed the homeless in the Dominican Republic on land that he bought three years ago as part of his foundation's work to feed the hungry.

In other words we are born with empathy for others, the recognition that if we see upset in others we will respond with kindness and the concept compassion takes that further by wanting to help alleviate the suffering and pain in the other.

The Dalai Lama captures this beautifully when he says "So long as we are human we need compassion. Compassion brings inner peace and whatever else is going on, that peace of mind allows us to see the whole picture more clearly. So, in our education we need lessons about developing warm-heartedness and finding inner peace. "

We all understand compassion for others, but an essential ingredient for increased mental health is compassion for self. In the same way we recognise someone else's suffering and we want to respond by making it better, the next level is to have compassion for ourselves, to recognise our own pain and to understand our own humanness. A question that is very useful to ask ourselves is if someone else told us this story, the story about being angry or hurt or disappointed would we have compassion for them? Then why not for ourselves? A good question indeed.

Some of the ways to develop compassion for oneself are to literally feel warm to oneself rather than hurting oneself with self-criticism. Remembering the common humanity which means we acknowledge our suffering and personal failure is part of the shared human experience. And lastly, developing self-compassion requires that we take a balanced approach to our negative thoughts without trying to suppress or deny them. The key here is balanced, so if we do have a negative thought about ourselves, we develop the habit to balance it with a forgiving thought, a more compassionate one. Remembering that it is in our mind that we can be developing the more compassionate thoughts.

Welcome back dear reader, continuing on the subject of Peace - where do you feel it most when you are worried and anxious - your mind and head right? But Jesus also knew that it was the will of Father God to make a way for mankind's sins to be forgiven and washed away by a sinless sacrifice one time for all -- and HE was the sacrifice (Romans 5:6; Hebrews 10:8-18). When you ask Jesus into your heart and make Him Lord over your life you are accepting all the benefits He won at the Cross, where He became cursed so that we could be blessed as a result of His sacrifice (Galatians 3:13). Jesus defeated every curse. torment, fear, anxiety and worry for you and me there - He endured a death that no one has ever experienced and came out the other side victorious (Hebrews 2:14-15). You may be going through hardship and torment at the moment but listen friend, Jesus knows what that is like and He wants you to be delivered from it, and give you His Peace because He already paid the price to set you free. All you have to do is come to Him, and call on Him as Lord (Acts 2:21) and receive His Peace. "Come to Me all you who are weary and carry heavy burdens and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28).
