HUNGER STRIKE PERFORMANCE PLANNED FOR MUCKROSS SCHOOLHOUSE

Killorglin Drama Group will perform the play Hunger Strike on Sunday September 24th at Muckross Schoolhouse at 8pm.

The play was written in 1926 by Killorglin native Máirín Cregan. and is set in Kerry during the autumn of 1923 in the home of the Grady family. This period is synonymous with the hunger strikes of thousands of antitreaty prisoners, who were interned by the Free State government at that time. The play's action revolves around Nano Grady's attempts to deal with the emotional and psychological strain of her husband Ned's hunger strike in a Dublin prison. The play deals with the reality of the political divisions at the time, as Nano, who supports her husband's stance, comes under constant pressure from family members who insist Ned breaks his strike. Based loosely on Máirín's own experiences of her husband Jim Ryan's hunger strike, the play presents a fascinating glimpse into the realities of the time and familial political divisions. KCC INTRODUCE NEW VOLUNTARY PHONE POLICY

The Killarney Community College have introduced new measures in order to reduce online bullying and general distraction within the classroom by asking their students to voluntarily hand up their phones to their teachers at the beginning of every class. The initiative comes in the wake of new data published this week reporting worrying online trends faced by school goers.

A recent survey by cyber safe kids an Irish online safety charity, carried out research for it's annual trends and usage report and were able to include secondary school data for the first time.

98% of all 12-16 year olds now own a mobile phone with up to 40% of secondary school goers reporting being cyber bullied with girls overall being the most likely victims. Almost two thirds of teachers have reported dealing with online safety incidents. The survey also showed many students reported being unaware of how to best protect themselves online.

Feedback from the student council has been overwhelmingly positive as students noted that notifications and the temptation to look at their phone are now a thing of the past thus maximising teaching and

learning in their classes.

Principal Stella Loughnane has already noted the positive impact it is having on the school "In recent years I've found myself dealing with more and more online issues that have spilled over to the classroom. Incidents of Cyber bullying are worrying and clearly on the rise. Every student has a right to feel safe in school and learn in a distraction free environment. Our teaching staff have noted the ease to which our students have taken to handing up their phones and have noticed a greater focus and improved levels of concentration within the classroom. Students are still free to use their phones at lunch time but we are definitely seeing the benefits of less screen time for our students"

Today, Friday sees the start of the Two Peninsula Cycle Challenge which will raise much needed funds for Crumlin Children's Hospital.

The cycle will be taking place today, Friday 8th and tomorrow, Saturday 9th when a group of people known as the "Breakaway Peddlers" are undertaking the mammoth task of cycling the Ring of Kerry and The Ring of Beara in two days - a real challenge of fitness and stamina.

The cycle is inspired by 14 year old Fionn O'Donoghue Sheehan who received treatment at the hospital in 2021.

Fionn became unwell in December 2021, complaining of a feeling what he could only describe as feeling like he was drowning.

"Mom and Dad got me seen by a doctor and I was quickly referred to University Hospital Kerry. Here is where I meet Dr Kumar an amazing doctor. I was put on a monitor for the night. The following day Dr Kumar explained to us that the monitor showed an irregular rhythm in my heart". Fionn said.

"He said he would be contacting Crumlin and also sending up my information to the cardiologist. Later in the day we were told I was being moved to Crumlin where we stayed for five days. I coud see with just one sentence that my mom and dads lives were turned upside down. I was very afraid of what was to come. I was being reassured by everyone that everything would be ok. I was blue lighted to Crumlin in the ambulance with my mom. We will never forget that journey. It took us less then two and a half hours door to door", the brave 14 year old said.

"Once you enter Crumlin hospital becomes a family. If not for the dedication and care I recieved from Dr Prendiville and Dr Kumar I may have been looking at a very different outcome.I am so greatful to everyone for the wonderful care and attention I recieved from our Crumlin family.

"We are so grateful to so many people for their help in supporting us in this fundraiser", Fionn's mother Lorraine told Killarney Outlook.

"Liam Lynch Skoda in Farranfore is our sponsor and he has been absolutely amazing.

The support he has given us is unbelieveable", she added.

"Fionn also has fantastic support at schoool with St. Brendan's Principal Sean Coffey informing the family that the school now has three defibrillators.

BREAKAWAY PEDDLERS TAKE ON TWO PENINSULA CYCLE CHALLENGE

Last year, Principal Coffey organised that all classes at the schoool were trained up on what to do of something happens in the school, basic life support anhow to use the defibrillator and he is going to continue this training in the school", Lorraine added.

"Conor Gleason in Lissivigeen school, where Fionn was attending at the time he go sick, was also fantastic and a great help to us during the whole experience.

Lorraine is now asking everyone to donate what they can to help raise funds for the hospital.

"People are going through the worst time of their lives this I saw first hand. You have the power to help change the lives of sick children and to support by helping fund essential urgent life-saving and life changing equipment. Every child deserves access to the very best care, facilities and equipment when needed the most. So please come and help the 'Breakaway Peddlers' make a real and impactful differance to as many children as we can", she added.

PLUS CA CHANGE: NO CHANGE IN KERRY CONSTITUENCY DISAPPOINTING

I don't know why I expected more from the constituency review report, but I thought this first ever independent review under Ms Justice Marie Baker might have some fresh thinking. It does not. Even the language is boring, and far too cautious. Take the rationale not to split Kerry and return it back to two three-seater constituencies. The "interests of continuity and maintaining county boundaries" is the excuse.The recommendation is that Kerry "should remain unchanged as a 5 seat (sic) constituency, and continue to encompass the entire county of Kerry with no breaches to its county boundary". Kerry is only a single constituency since the last election. But there is no reference to this central fact and a position abandoned previously as the county is simply too big. The report takes no cognizance of geography either. Very disappointing given there was provision in the guidelines to create an extra seat in geographically large constituencies.

However in this review neither history or geography are of relevance when it comes to Kerry! To add salt to the wound, the illustrative pic is of a Tralee street - which is not very diplomatic in my view. Plus ca

HOW CAN YOU BUY

KILLARNEY? NPWS buying more of Killarney change, plus c'est la meme chose!

There is a lame reference to the increase in population but then we have recourse to the default position of not touching county boundaries. (For a moment I wondered was I reading a report into county football). The report also says the submissions were fairly evenly divided for and against the single constituency. But this is not correct. The submissions to return to two constituencies were much lengthier and more substantive. There was a fairly lively debate on Radio Kerry but I thought it a pity TDs Daly and Griffin did not really touch upon the disappointment many in Killarney feel. Again one wonders how relevant Killarney is going forward even in Kerry politics.

Speculation now is it will be a Ferris, Deirdre the co-opted councillor, who will be on the ticket with Daly.

The single constituency suits Sinn Fein and the Healy-Raes. But it is a difficult one for Fine Gael who have a poor party structure outside of Kerry North and no obvious candidate to run alongside Aoife Thornton, should she decide to run.

It is a real blow for Killarney as we have little chance now of having a Government TD or minister from our own backyard.

Prediction for 2024 election is status quo but with a gain for Sinn Fein at expense of Fine Gael or a Healy-Rae and with the power remaining in Kerry North.

TIGER MOSQUITOES TO PLANTS: INVADERS COME IN ALL GUISES

Fighting invasive species means looking at insects too. There was startling news in Paris last week that whole suburbs were being sprayed to get rid of tiger mosquitoes. This was after a number of cases of dengue fever. The tiger mosquito which spreads deadly disease is on the move north west and has been found north of Paris.

Asian Hornets are another species marching towards our shores and already ports in Ireland are being monitored for the presence of these deadly devils which wipe out native honey bees.

Then in California dog ticks are spreading Lyme and other diseases and there have been cases along the Mexican border of children dying of a thing called Rocky Mountain spotted fever, spread by dog ticks, the Washington Post reported this week.. Dogs have not been cleaned of ticks during the pandemic and rising temperatures mean the ticks on deer and dogs are multiplying rapidly at an alarming rate.

In Killarney we have some of the most important plant and animal species in Europe from oak to deer to moths, but we are also on the front line with invasive species. Rhododendron ponticum, fringed water-lily and ticks spreading Lyme disease are only some of the invaders threatening us and our biodiversity. And those are the ones we know about.Here in Killarney we need to be particularly vigilant. We have far too many deer and we also have many dogs and both animal species are perfect hosts for disease spreading ticks. We have been very slow to recognize Lyme disease and its debilitating effects and I was witness to Maura Healy-Rae and other councillors ' relentless campaign to get the council to have warning signs erected at the entrances to the national park. Now, tick infestation in Killarney makes Trip Advisor, I notice.

The upside to all of this is people are reaching out when they see something unseasonal and out of character.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service have confirmed a further land purchase, as forecast in this column some weeks ago. Further purchases are on the cards too, I hear. The lands being snapped up are what used to be called the buffer zone and fire prevention as well as tackling invasive species may be factors.

Just before Christmas the NPWS confirmed the acquisition of 70 hectares at Derrycunnihy, a site surrounded by Killarney National Park.

This latest purchase is in the Black Valley and is adjoining the park.

In a statement the Department of Housing said "the NPWS has, in recent weeks, purchased SAC land at Geahameen. The land in question approximately 302 hectares in size (122.29 hectares), is situated beside Killarney National Park and forms part of the Magillycuddy reeks, Killarney National Park and Caragh river catchment Special Area of Conservation. It is mountainous in nature and the mosaic of natural habitats on site present a very positive conservation opportunity for the NPWS."

Pressed about further purchases, all the spokesman would say was that "the NPWS occasionally purchases land for strategic and conservation purposes. Such acquisitions are considered on a case by case basis."

For many reasons, not least commercial sensitivity, the NPWS does not comment on any individual site that is offered for sale, he also said.

My understanding is nowhere near the Euro 7,000 an acre being sought by the American owner of the mountain land on the Conor Pass is being paid. Birdies tell me it is nearer one seventh of that.

"The report clearly identifies the importance of a connected local leadership, harnessing local support but also adhering to a national clinical blueprint. As a service, we will continue to build on these important pillars as we work with the community to plan future developments."

Dr Sheahan added:

"Working in collaboration with Kerry Hospice Foundation, a series of engagement meetings will take place in communities across Kerry to discuss the next steps in the development of the service."

Future plans under discussion for the strengths in the KSPCS model, by Cork Kerry Community service include five additional beds at

the Tralee inpatient unit; an additional consultant post; and an outreach service in Killarney.

Kerry Hospice Foundation chairman Jack Shanahan said:

"Kerry Hospice Foundation is proud of what we have achieved for our community. The partnership we have forged with the HSE has delivered a world-class palliative care service. We have shown how a motivated community organisation, working with an engaged HSE, delivers. We strongly believe that this will continue to be the best model for our plans to enhance and expand our palliative care service."

Kerry Hospice Foundation volunteer Michael Fitzgerald said:

"The report is significant in underlying the progress that has been made in Kerry through the HSE developing specialist palliative care services, in collaboration with Kerry Hospice Foundation and the public who have been of such support to the service over the decades. I look forward to this collaboration continuing, to the development of an additional five palliative care inpatient beds shortly and planning a comprehensive clinical service base in Killarney."

As part of St. Brigid annual school trip, 5th year students who have chosen to study Spanish as a leaving certificate subject, got given the opportunity to take part in an abroad culture trip to Madrid, Spain. We left on August 30th and took an early flight from Dublin airport into the capital city of Spain. Our Itinerary was full of great activities and kept us busy from the moment we landed. To begin with, we had a guided tour of Madrid, we had the opportunity to learn about the great city and its history. Wegot to see the Atocha train station, Bullfighter Stadium, Plaza Castillo, Obelisco de Calatrava, Plaza España and

the Royal Palace. The next stop was for the true football fans, Bernabeu Stadium, which is home to the Real Madrid football club. We enjoyed a unique tour of the museum from start to finish and then proceeded to see the football pitch. On the first full morning in the city of Madrid, we got up exceedingly early and set off to Segovia, a northwestern historical city, in central Spain's Castile and León region. Its centuries of settlement have resulted in a rich architectural legacy, including medieval walls, Romanesque churches, a formal Royal palace, a Gothic Cathedral, and an ancient Roman aqueduct which stands above Plaza Azoguejo in the heat of the city. We had great fun throughout the day. Weparticipated in a scavenger hunt where we had to identify different historical sites in the town and find out information about the culture. Finishing off the exceedingly warm day, we made our way to The Monastery of El Escorial where we spent some time exploring the renaissance buildings and courtyards. To complete an enjoyable day, everyone got the opportunity to go to the Plaza Mayor where we got to have a bit of free time, visit different shops, and get a few bits for ourselves.

We began our third day in the city of Madrid incredibly early and had no time to waste. Our first stop was the Prado Museum where everyone got to have a close look at all the sculptures displayed and all sorts of paintings created by the great European masters such as Velázquez, Goya, Raphael, Rubén's, and Bosch. To finish off the afternoon we were then taken to Parque Warner-MovieWorld. The park had 36 attractions which were distributed in six big theme areas: Hollywood Boulevard, Movie World studios, Cartoon Village, Dc Superheroes World, Old West Territory and Parque Warner Beach. We enjoyed several hours in the park where we got to spend quality time with our friends, enjoy delicious meals, go on numerous rides, and even face our fears. The day ended with a gorgeous meal in one of the local restaurants 'Trattoria Pinocchio.' On the final morning in Madrid city, the first destination was Madrid Zoo Aquarium. It is ranked among the top zoos in Spain and has open enclosures allowing you to almost touch the animals. As well as a wide selection of animals and birds, the zoo offers special displays of reptiles such as iguanas and chameleons. We enjoyed free time at the zoo and got to visit and learn about many different species. Subsequently, to finish off the trip everyone got the opportunity to go to the PleniLunio shopping centre where we enjoyed dinner and had many hours to do some shopping. After a great shopping spree, it was time to fly back home that evening.

Hickey's Centra Rathmore has achieved a 49% carbon reduction since implementing sustainable initiatives over the last year.

Simple water saving tips include:

Checking your water consuming appliances such as washing machines and dishwaters for any

Keep a jug of water in the fridge rather than letting the tap run cold and save six litres a day Making sure the tap is off while brushing teeth can save 84 litres of water a week

250 litres of water a week can be saved by fixing any leaking or dripping taps in the garden

THE NEW TERTIARY EDUCATION PROGRAMMES – AN ATTRACTIVE ALTERNATIVE PATH TO A DEGREE

One of the priorities of Simon Harris, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science is the creation of a unified tertiary system providing pathways for progression across and between different institutions. The National Tertiary Office (NTO) has been established to coordinate further and higher education progression pathways from Further Education & Training (FET) courses to Higher Education Institutions (HEI).

There is a links scheme between Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses and HEI's already in existence. However, the number of places available to PLC graduates in the links scheme is limited and there is no guarantee of success, particularly in sought after courses, such as nursing.

The new Tertiary Education Programmes (TEP) developed by HEIs and Education and Training Boards (ETB) offer guaranteed pathways from further education to higher education, which are driven by an applicant's career interests rather than points achieved in the Leaving Cert exam. TEP's look beyond grades and points. They provide a definite path to a third level qualification where progression from further to higher education will be completely seamless, through the development of shared curriculum, teaching collaboration, programme co-design and co-delivery within shared space and shared student experience.

This year MTU is collaborating with ETB Cork and ETB Kerry to provide four TEP courses, three of which lead to an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8) and the fourth to an Ordinary Bachelor Degree (Level 7). Other Technological Universities participating in the TEP scheme for the new academic year are SETU, TUS and ATU as well as the Institute of Art, Design and Technology (IADT). This is a wonderful development and will, no doubt, continue to expand in the years ahead.

Applying for a third-level tertiary course is uncomplicated. An applicant can apply directly through the course information page of the

NTO website, www.nto.hea.ie. The website also provides a full list of courses for 2023. The TEP allows an applicant to start a degree at an ETB college and complete it at a university. Alternatively, an applicant can get in touch with the appropriate contact person detailed in the course information section. Any applicant, who has any difficulties with any of the above routes, can contact the ETB Adult Education Guidance and Information Service. www.etbi. ie/fet-guidance.

A tertiary course is a joint further and higher education degree programme. Students commence their third level experience in further education with the ETB but will complete the remainder in higher education colleges. It varies from one year to two years studying in the FET college, depending on the course. Twenty-three tertiary courses commence this September across 11 locations and 5 fields of provision, Business, ICT, Arts, Engineering, Manufacturing & Construction and Health & Welfare. It's fairly certain that additional degree programmes will be added each year.

From day one of a tertiary degree course, students are registered at both the ETB where they are commencing their course and the partnered university. This provides the student with access to dual supports and services including libraries, sports, and other campus facilities as well as academic, health and wellbeing supports.

You do not need the same leaving certificate points for a tertiary course as a person applying for the same degree via the CAO. Different tertiary course programmes have different entry requirements. An applicants may be required to submit proof from other agencies to show s/he is eligible and meet the entry requirements for the course s/he is applying for. Refer to the course information section in the course page of the NTO website for those details. The course provider will be able to advise you of any additional paperwork which is required for your application. The contact details for the course coordinator can be found in the course page.

Tertiary courses are a new pathway to a Bachelor's degree, at Level 8 or Level 7. The course information section in the course page of the website details the qualification available. Applications for the courses are open since July. There may still be places available on some courses so check for updates on the NTO, ETB or HEI websites.

COUNCIL ISSUE ALGAL WARNING



Kerry County Council has identified an increase in algal growth at a number of locations around Lough Leane in Killarney.

Members of the public are advised not to bathe or paddle in water if there are visible signs of algal growth in the vicinity which can be identified by a green, blue or brown colour in the water or along the shoreline.

They are also advised to ensure that they keep their dogs under control as such algal accumulations can be harmful if ingested by small animals, particularly dogs. In addition, water from the lake should not be used for cooking, drinking or washing.

Advisory signage has been erected at a number of locations on the lake shoreline.

The situation is being monitored closely on an ongoing basis by Kerry County Council, particularly during the current spell of warm weather and conditions in which this phenomenon is known to occur.

Met Éireann, along with the national weather services of the UK (Met Office) and the Netherlands (KNMI), has released the list of new storm names for the 2023/2024 storm season, which starts on Friday 1st September.

Storms are named when they could cause 'medium' or 'high' impacts in one of the three partner countries. This enables consistent, authoritative messaging to support the public to prepare for, and stay safe during potentially severe weather events. Each of the three meteorological services contributed seven names to this season's list. Met Éireann chose names of eminent Irish/Northern-Irish scientists, to honour their important contributions to science and benefits for humankind. The full 2023/24 list is:

Storm naming happens in conjunction with orange/red weather warnings, which could be for wind, rain or snow or a combination of these conditions. Those warnings are issued based on a combination of numerical criteria and the potential impacts foreseen.

Calls on Road Safety : HSE & CAMHS Authority (RSA) **TO EXAMINE ALL POSSIBLE FACTORS IN ROAD FATALITIES**

Deputy Michael Healy Rae TD is calling on the Government to ensure the Road Safety Authority (RSA) look beyond the data and explore all possible factors when tackling the ever-increasing number of road fatalities in Ireland.

Last year saw an increase of 14% of fatalities on 2021 with 156 recorded deaths from 150 road collisions and already this year the RSA have confirmed 100 deaths on the road (as of August 1st, 2023) A worryingly increase of 11

fatalities compared to the same date last year.

"We are now heading into the winter months, which is well regarded as the most dangerous time of the year. Last year 45 people lost their lives on Irish roads between October -December 2022, with 17 road deaths recorded in November 2022 alone.

"Over the years we have seen the increase on the deterrents for speeding, alcohol and substance use while driving and even a doubling of penalty points, but the RSA must look beyond that data and find what other contributing factors are out there. I think it is time to look at road structures, dangerous junctions, lack of road signage and warnings as other factors in road deaths.

"Data made available from a Preliminary Analysis of Road Traffic Fatalities by the RSA (as of 26 July 2023) highlighted a number of worrying trends.

Deputy Michael Healy Rae TD said his heart has gone out to the families in the most recent tragic road traffic fatalities in county Tipperary and said we needed the RSA ensure they spread their net wider when tackling road safety.



FAILURE

"The Health Service Executive has failed children and adolescents who require Mental Health Services, for many years now, throughout Ireland and particularly in the Cork/Kerry region" stated Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill.

A number of recent reports have detailed the crisis in our Children and Adolescent Mental Health Services that exists in 17 counties. The CAMHS service suffers from a lack of governance, failure to reduce preventable harm to patients, and inadequate funding and recruitment of key staff, according to the reports by the Inspector of Mental Health Services, Dr Susan Finnerty. Dr Finnerty recommends that CAMHS should immediately be independently regulated by the Mental Health Commission due to it being "inefficient and unsafe".

"This is a scandal of our times and it would appear that the urgency of the crisis that exists is not being dealt with as an emergency. Young lives and those of theirs families have been

destroved bv an inadequate HSE that I have already said,



Councillor Cahill.

"I am bringing this to the public notice of the Ministers with responsibility for Health, Mental Health and Children and if their is not an immediate effective response from each of them, I will bring a delegation to the offices of the Taoiseach and the Tanaiste, to ensure the voices of those affected are finally heard" said the Kerry Councillor.

"Every man woman and child should be up in arms to learn of this diabolical treatment that has been served up to some of the most vulnerable people in our society. I will liaise further with the representatives of the patients and their families and a schedule of actions will be drawn up and I can assure you, their voices will be heard" added Councillor Cahill.

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT **ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?**

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

FLASHES AND FLOATERS

When should you be concerned about flashes and floaters?

Tiny spots, lines, flashes or shapes in your vision are known as flashes and floaters. Lots of people experience them and they usually aren't cause for alarm.

What are flashes?

Sometimes the jelly inside your eye shrinks a little and tugs on the retina (the light-sensitive layer) at the back of your eye. This can cause flashes of light at the edge of your vision. This is different from the disturbance of vision that can happen with a migraine.

What are floaters?

Often, people who have healthy eyes see floaters. They appear as spots, lines or cobweb effects, usually when you look at a plain surface such as a white wall, screen or a clear blue sky. They are usually caused by cells clumping together in the clear jelly in the main part of your eye and casting shadows on your retina. The sudden appearance of new floaters is different and may be caused by the jelly shrinking and can sometimes mean there is a tear in the retina.

When should I be concerned?

If you suddenly notice a shower of new floaters, or floaters along with flashes or a dark shadow or a 'curtain' in your vision, you should take urgent action.

What will happen if the retina tears?

The retina is the light-sensitive layer at the back of your eye which receives images and sends them to your brain. If the retina tears, it may come away from the back of the eye and can lead to a retinal detachment which can result in you losing part or all of your vision.

How is retinal detachment treated?

A tear may be treated by using a laser. If treated quickly you may have a better chance of full recovery. However, if your retina has become detached, you will need surgery. The operation may restore most of your vision.

What to do if your symptoms change

- Look out for the following:
- Flashes or floaters getting worse
 A black shadow in your vision
- A sudden cloud of spots
- A curtain or veil over your vision
 Any change in vision
- If you notice any of these symptoms seek immediate professional care.

KERRY CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS SENIOR SEMI-FINALS Dingle 2-18 Spa 1-12

The truth is that one side dominated this from start to finish. Dingle were at their absolute best. They lost Barry Dan O'Sullivan to a bad injury from the throw-in and his brother Dara shortly after (the amount of injuries is becoming a huge concern and I genuinely worry that with so many games coming so fast and hard, it is going to be the driving narrative this year. We need to reduce the number of games somehow). It never gave them pause. With Paul Geaney moving out to midfield and my god but what a display by Paul. If any fool suggests that he should maybe retire from inter-county football, clip them over the ear for being so daft - Mikey led the line. They had 1-2 each (both penalties), Cathal Bambury had 0-4, Dylan and Conor Geaney had 0-3..... Dingle were threading ball neatly through the lines and their accuracy from distance was just phenomenal. They pretty much took every chance and made them look easy. A tough night for Spa, but if Dingle can maintain this kind of display, I don't know how many teams could live with them, even nationally. Spa got 1-3 late on, Cian Tobin with the goal, but it was scant consolation by then. Barry Dan is a huge loss, but with a certain Mark O'Connor back in Kerry environs...

Crokes looked the form team coming into this one while Kenmare had made hard work of qualification from the weaker side. In fairness, though, take Gavin White and Tony Brosnan out of any team and you'll feel it. Micheál Burns did everything he could in their absence - Burns has been the best player of the championship this year for me, outstanding in every game. But Kenmare had talismanic Seán O'Shea to execute the scores but it was their driving ball-carries that did most of the damage. David Ciuciu picked off an early goal in exactly that fashion. Austin Stacks 1-18 Glenflesk 0-12 It's fair to say that Austin Stacks have not been the force of old in recent years. I know they have been brutally hit with injuries, it really is decimation, and county commitments do them no favours (I think we need to have a look at the toll the U20 campaign takes on players) but they also haven't had that kind of 'townie' confidence with scoring opportunities. They have looked very forced, whereas Glenflesk have brought through an array of outstanding young talent. But it was the Rockies of old who showed up here. Direct, purposeful, hungry. Seán Ouilter lofted over two early scores and Michael O'Donnell began a tour de force from the middle. Glenflesk were pretty much always in touch and they were a bit unlucky when a ball brilliantly batted away by a defender happened to fall to Shane O'Callaghan – the one player you really don't want to see with it. O'Callaghan goaled and picked up the man of the match award - I have to say it was O'Donnell all day for me. A late second yellow card didn't help Glenflesk's cause, but it was drifting away from them by then anyway and Stacks reeled off five more points. I haven't seen this from then in quite a while

Killarney Legion 0-13 Beaufort 0-10

Legion were one of the few Killarney area clubs to win last weekend – all four intermediate quarter-final winners were away from home – but won't have been thrilled with the display. Beaufort were shorn of at least six starters. Fair enough, Legion were without the talismanic James O'Donoghue, but in the circumstances it looked like an opportunity for Legion to fill their boots and lay down a real marker. That they didn't isn't really the forwards' fault, though, Legion were that bit too cautious in possession and a little too slow to get it in, meaning that Beaufort always had their defence set up in plenty of time. I thought that putting in a big man to target with long ball, with the likes of Will Shine and Ryan O'Grady hovering, might have been a route to go. Finbarr Murphy was probably the pick of their forward line; he has been doing very well of late, while Rob Leen and Cian Gammell both did very well driving forward. Beaufort themselves were happy to send long ball into a very effective Jack O'Connor or Darragh O'Connor, both of whom looked dangerous. Legion always seemed to have a one point lead but struggled to expand it. Nonetheless, they fully deserve their semifinal spot but I imagine they will be hoping for James back sooner rather than later.

Hard, yes, plenty of hard but fair hits on both sides, fast, direct....brilliant scores and, most joyously these days, players on both sides clearly encouraged to have a go. Éanna O'Connor and Gary O'Leary hardly missed a free - Cillian Burke up front won a lot of those for Éanna. Gavin Horan gave a phenomenal display in the middle - jaysus, in the blazing heat I was tired just watching him. Milltown led by 0-8 to 0-7 at half-time, having had a penalty skin just wide but Kilcummin denied a clear point by an umpiring mistake. Milltown pulled three clear in the last guarter and had chances to close it out but maybe tried to take too much out of the ball - sometimes just fist it over the bar and work the flag. It came right down to the wire. Two good sides with very little between them, but Annascaul just shaded it – Dromid were always a team batting well above their population size for many years, but like a lot of South Kerry clubs, there's a real pinch of rural emigration starting to take its toll. Annascaul have produced some very good young players to shoulder the burden of the Hicksons. They deserved to take this one, but I respectfully can't see them going too much further.

Ardfert 2-10 Churchill 1-6

Rob Monahan may be a massive loss (I would have called him to Kerry's senior panel next year with an eye to the future) but Ardfert are a very good side even in his absence and will have a bit to say yet – their conversion rate didn't quite match their creation in recent years, but they have gotten more clinical and consequently more dangerous. Wily John Egan had two early goals and Éarnan Ferris, latest scion of that football family, another and Churchill were always chasing after that.

Seán Teahan, Jack Riney, Conor O'Leary, Donagh Quinlan, William Galvin...who do you concentrate on closing out? Cordal are a very good side in their own right – Philip O'Connor is a phenomenon and Brian Reidy and Sean Brosnan are serious threats – it says a lot about Renard that they were always in control here.

Tarbert 3-12 St. Michaels/Foilmore 2-10 lan O'Sullivan gave an exhibition for St. Michaels/Foilmore but Tarbert always stayed with them and really burst into life in the last quarter. John Coolahan kicked two goals, the first one a real gamebreaker, and Patsy O'Connell fisted home another. They did need a fantastic save from Pa Carmody to deny O'Sullivan, while Alan Goggin's goal threw the game right back into the melting pot, but Tarbert held their nerve to see it out.

Beale 1-12 Moyvane 0-11

Beale goaled in the first quarter and needed it. The lead exchanged hands several times all the way through and even when Beale did manage to put a bit of distance between the teams, Moyvane just would not go away. In the end Beale will be glad to have come through a testing encounter with their North Kerry rivals.

RUGBY

I'm a bit superstitious about these things. Ireland rugby have been brilliant at being underdogs for years now. When the odds are hugely stacked against us, Irish players absolutely relish it. When it's a dogfight, we fight. When it shouldn't be is when we seem to falter. So going into a World Cup as favourites is not our thing traditionally. In fact, we have generally fallen below expectations and never got past the quarter-final. Let us not speak of Japan.

We've won thirteen games on the bounce. Six Nations champions and that was a very good Six Nations. Good to see Scotland getting back to some bit of form and Wales look a bit more purposeful after some bad stumbles in recent times. England may be having ructions at the moment – I can't understand what's gone wrong there because it all seemed to just fall apart almost overnight.

Pool A

France, New Zealand, Italy, Uruguay, Namibia

This is the group I am most afraid of. And, probably for the first World Cup ever, it's not New Zealand. I do think the All Blacks are better than they have looked and are coming in under the radar. As far as I will always be concerned, tours are just international friendlies and New Zealand are a different side at the business end of things. They have gone poorly but they are still deadly on the attack. They'll get out of the group and after that they will be gathering momentum. They are a long way from home, though.

Which brings me to my tournament favourites. Go back to that Six Nations game between ourselves and France. That was an absolute edge-of-the-seat thriller. France are at home – and that's a colossal advantage. They have the strongest domestic league in the world at the moment. Fair enough, they are missing Ntamack but they have Dupont. And they have Dupont in the way that people used to say "Ireland have Brian O'Driscoll". That tackle in the Irish game – I am actually going to watch that game back again now, just for that moment. Honestly, I've seen nature documentaries where they show a bear hooking a salmon out of the water. This was that.

Another advantage for France, in my honest opinion, in that New Zealand is their only real do-or-die battle in the group. Italy are dogged and game enough but no way are they holding them for eighty minutes and France should see off Uruguay and Namibia fairly comfortably without – and I think this will be key -drawing too deep into reserves that will be badly needed in the knock-out stages.

Pool B

Ireland, South Africa, Scotland, Tonga, Romania

If anything, South Africa have a little more muscle than us (few teams can say that) but I really think that the likes of Lowe and Hansen give us that bit more width and options. I genuinely don't care if South Africa want to have all forwards on their bench - like, there's a reason the same lads aren't starting and frankly. I'd put Doris and Furlong up against anyone. I can see lads like James Ryan on our bench too. So yeah, obviously power is their thing and they are really, really good at it, but I see Ireland doing enough. That will be a thunderous battle, and my worry is that you'll lose players to injury. Unfortunately, as that forward-packed subs bench indicates, muscle and durability is likely to overshadow skill and guile in this World Cup. Scotland are a force once again. But are they going to send us homewards to think again? I like watching Finn Russell - I think he has fantastic imagination as well as ability, but we should be able to win the pressure battles around the pitch. Look, if we maintain our composure (which this team seems to be mentally very good at) then I just can't see it. Tonga have always had great players. The trouble is that they were usually playing with New Zealand. I do think they are a coming side – put it this way, New Zealanders think Tongans are fanatical about the game – but not for some time yet.

If Romania were to sneak one win, it would be a great World Cup for them.

Pool C

Fiji, Australia, Wales, Georgia, Portugal

Fiji aren't a traditional big power in the game (like Tonga and Samoa, I suspect that they never had the financial ability to keep their best players domestically). I haven't really seen too much of them but they sound like there or thereabouts.

Eddie Jones might feel that he has something to prove. I certainly don't see Australia stopped at the group stage but whether they have the panel to go all the way once attrition kicks in is another matter.

Wales need to throw everything they have into the early games. One won against an antipodean side and it will have been a very good campaign for them.

Georgia have gone way back and Portugal still aren't likely to beat Georgia. It would be an absolutely massive shock if either were to be in contention.

Pool D

England, Japan, Argentina, Samoa, Chile

England are in real trouble. In a way, you could argue that adversity is opportunity, and they have a lot of opportunity. Farrell out for the first two games is worse than Sexton for us. Look, I like Farrell, but of course that was a suspension and how they mucked it up the first time is beyond me – in fairness, that looked like a shambles. Can England get going? Honestly, I think they are well up against it. On top of that, the English media are already on their backs and will only add to the pressure. In Ireland, in fairness, there's certain amount of reciprocity with the press without lowering professional standards and I think it works for both sides.

It's a bad group to be drawn in anyway. Japan have dropped way off the force they were when they shocked the world, but they aren't going to be brushed aside. Argentina will fancy themselves here, they have been quietly building and will be hoping to at least rattle the latter stages. They qaren't going to say it aloud, but they'll be sensing scalps. Once upon a time (2007) they came third in a World Cup. They aren't going to win this one out, but they could well match that achievement this time out.

Samoa. Essentially, while I do realise that they are separate and proud cultures, everything I said about Tonga applies equally to Samoa. Big, strong, fast, love the game. Again, well capable of qualifying.

I know next to nothing about Chilean rugby, but I imagine that they will be up against it all the way.

There's a bit of a tizzy about a bit of clickbait going around called "Is rugby now the most popular sport in Ireland?". I'm not going in to delve into it because frankly, I'm reluctant even to mention that kind of nonsense and give it oxygen. However, it gives me an opportunity to mention a very simple maxim that sounds like a witticism but is actually literally true. It's called Betteridge's Law and it really is worth knowing. It states "Any headline that ends in a question mark can be answered by the word no." It really is that simple. If the journalist had actual news he would tell you. People sometimes say that 'news' is actually an acronym for 'notable events, weather, and sports'. Of course it doesn't. When newspaper pamphlets were first produced (1605 in Germany, as printing became much more affordable and literacy increased) people called them 'new things' (i.e., things that had recently happened, almost always involving the aristocracy) and it became shortened to 'news'. Rugby is popular in Ireland and we have a fantastic team right now, but the most popular?

SOCCER

Vera Pauw

Until recently, the FAI had a senior team manager who managed the team for 34 games, winning fifteen and drawing five. Took the team to their first ever international finals.

Theyalsohaveanotherseniorteammanager.23competitive



matches, four wins. Qualified for absolutely nothing and doesn't look like it'll be happening any time soon.

Guess which one the FAI decided to get rid of? Now, let's be fair. Vera Pauw came in at a time when the misogynists in the FAI had finally had to stop treating the womens' team as a joke. Literally changing in the toilets at airports because the tracksuits were needed for other teams. In any kind of decent sports organisation, that nonsense wasn't tolerated as far back as the sixties. She got a real break because the Womens' World Cup was expanded to 24 teams; the reality is that we would not have gotten within a sniff of qualification under the old system even if we had Napoleon Bonaparte and General Zhukov on the sideline. Stephen Kenny, on the other hand, came in to a system where England had expanded its scouting worldwide and was less likely to take in talented Irish youngsters. In short, we had always relied on them to develop our players because we had no foundation of doing that. A much neglected League of Ireland had seen spectator numbers drop to just over a quarter of what they had been within a single generation. Meanwhile, the rank cesspool that was the FAI Executive under John Delaney was exposed, along with a colossal hole in the declared funding. Funny, FIFA are great at talking about this rule against Government interference and how strictly they take that, but they are grand at taking bailouts.

ALL THINGS...SPORT

For me, the question isn't whether the players were happy with Vera Pauw's conservative system. Yes, Katie McCabe, unquestionably our best player, wanted a switch late on in our last game. Too bad about her. Either a manager is managing or they shouldn't be there. I think Katie is a convenient scapegoat for a decision that was already made. The fact would appear to be that the FAI stalled on renewing Pauw's contract until after the World Cup, and weren't expecting the Irish public to react so unfavourably now. There is this old myth floating around Irish soccer that we are secretly Brazil in disguise and would devastate teams if allowed to go all-out attack. Remember all the flak that Jack Charlton used to take from the RTE panel? That was in the days when we had English First Division players on the bench - imagine that luxury now. The Senior Ladies, by the way, was a vague myth - to say that their efforts were unrecognised is to understate the case

It was an incredible World Cup for us, because being there was phenomenal;. It was an opportunity to grow the game among a traditionally bypassed demographic. Yes, we only got one goal and that was fluky enough to be honest, but we actually got to a World Cup. Unfortunately, the public perception now is of a complete mess of media leaks and belated justifications that look utterly without foundation – I will say that I like Cathal Dervlan's writing, but having some-one working as an analytical journalist and head of media for the organisation at the same time is preposterous. A poacher can become a gamekeeper, but you cannot do both at the same time.

We got lucky, in the way that ladies soccer all over the world most certainly didn't, because after the most watched and attended Womens' World Cup of all time, all the headlines internationally have been about blatant misogyny with the Spanish Federation and FIFA themselves. Otherwise Ireland would be a much bigger story, and not in a good way.

Look, Tyler Toland is likely to come back into the Ireland set-up, and she has a bit of cutting about her. Amber Barrett may get more playing time up front – to be blunt, Barrett is very good for her age, but she is very, very raw. I wish her well, but I'm not seeing the high volume goalscoring potential people are talking about. Ireland Women had a huge amount of new fans with this World Cup. How long will they stick around?

Every part of this is a complete mess. It didn't have to be this way. In fact, it shouldn't have been. Once again, the FAI have managed to look at a huge opportunity and somehow turn it into a PR disaster.

By the way, I'm writing this before the mens' game against France, but Ireland are lamenting the loss of Coleman, Obafemi, Matt Doherty, O'Dowda....oh, and a lad named Evan Ferguson, who looks like the first young Irish player since Roy Keane who might actually be worth the hype but isn't going to be sold for £150 million. France are choosing between the likes of Mbappe, Giroud (I still rate him hugely, his positioning is easily good enough to get past the slight loss of pace), Griezmann,

Dembele.....arrah lads. I read an article – I think this is hilarious – discussing who was going to mark Mbappe with his pace. They went for Festy Ebosele. Who does have good potential – but literally hasn't started a game for Ireland. Against Mbappe. C'mon. Whoever wrote that is stealing a living. We have to choke off space against Mbappe, which means that we can't man mark him or anybody. Tight at the back and desperately hope to nick one and close them out; we did it against Germany a while back.

I don't expect things to get better against the Netherlands. Possibly not the same siege mentality, but they look organised and compact now. They always had the talent but looked vulnerable.

I can't see Stephen Kenny lasting too much longer in his role. I do think he will finish this losing campaign out. I don't blame Stephen Kenny for anything. Executive mismanagement and failure to invest in any development over several decades meant that he was dealt an awful hand. I'm not sure that anyone else could have done better (Greece was a shambles of a display, though). I wouldn't think anyone is putting their hand up for that poisoned chalice any time soon. We just aren't very good at the moment. I'm not knocking lads. I'm not suggesting that we are playing the wrong formation (let's face it, our three at the back and wingers is just another way of saying five at the back).

The English media are happily lambasting Gareth Southgate these days, despite him producing the best English team in years (twenty years ago, we were well able to beat England. I swear I am not exaggerating). Want to do a swap, lads?

FOCUS ON HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

What we mean when we call a plant an Herbaceous Perennial is that in most of them the stems are soft, succulent and green as opposed to being brown and woody. With most Herbaceous Perennial they will sprout growth from ground level in spring and will grow and flower right through the summer and into the autumn. With most Herbaceous Perennials, in late autumn and early winter they start to look a bit ragged. But depending on the severity of the winter, some will hold on until the first real cold snap. The maintenance for most Herbaceous Perennials isn't a lot really. During late autumn, early winter cut the majority of the stem down to ground level and mulch over with some compost. some Herbaceous Perennials such as Lupins and semi hardy Fuchsias will have woody stems because of the milder climate here so when pruning back cut right back to just a couple of inches above ground level.

Herbaceous Perennials are a valuable plant in the garden for a number of reasons. 1. Because of the length of time they flower for.

Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread.

When planting an Herbaceous Border always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant that you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Perennials flower from April until October/November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. The secret to having a good flowering Herbaceous Border is every few years in the winter to lift and divide the plants that are suitable for this.

Welcome back dear student, continuing on how 'bad news sells.' The Gospel of Jesus is Good News but unfortunately most people don't know much about it (Hosea 4:6). This lack of knowledge of God's Word allows the devil to deceive and groom folks into adopting negative mindsets, causing them to believe and focus on the pessimistic news and sensational social media instead. It's a subtle form of warfare aimed at the destruction of people's joy and mental wellbeing, and ultimately their destiny, completely opposed to the Spirit of God. "Lord, who has believed our message? And to whom has the arm and power of the Lord been unveiled and revealed?" (John 12:38 Amplified Bible). It's often much easier to accept an evil report than it is to believe a good one. God revealed Himself as 'Alpha and the Omega' – meaning He is the Beginning and the End; the First and the Last (Revelation 1:8). The Lord knows the end from the beginning. We stress and worry about what's going to happen – developing and magnifying negatives, but God knows it all. Pressing in to learn His wisdom takes effort and means trusting Him when we don't see the whole picture yet (Proverbs 3:5-8).

When Joshua sent in two men to spy out Jericho they stayed in Rahab's house (Joshua chapter 2). It was a strongly fortified city that looked impenetrable. Amazingly, Rahab revealed to the Hebrew men how the people of Jericho had heard of God's mighty power that defeated Israel's enemies, and that as a result of what they heard, their hearts were melting from fear. Now this was a very different tale to that of the ten spies whom Moses had earlier sent into the land with Joshua and Caleb - twelve men in total, but ten of them brought back an evil report that cost the Israelites forty years in the wilderness (Numbers chapters 13&14). In that situation only Caleb and Joshua believed that God was with them, and that they would succeed in their endeavours because of His power and promise to go with them. The other ten, while admitting that the land looked great, focussed on their human shortcomings, causing all the people to believe their negative account instead! It's amazing how a bad report spreads, and people believe it without question. Later, when they crossed over into the promised land, they saw God's grace and favour defend them and bring them great success. How sad though that it was delayed by forty years of wilderness wandering because they were too stubborn to believe Caleb and Joshua's initial testimony. God is not limited in Power, but we limit His power by our unbelief.

Psalm 112 speaks of one who trusts in God. His active faith brings protection, deliverance and blessing upon himself, and upon his children and future posterity. And he remains rock solid no matter what the circumstances - "he will not fear bad news; his heart is steadfast, trusting, confidently relying on, and believing in the Lord. His heart is secure – he will not fear" (Psalm 1126-8). There is so much fear in our world. People are afraid of all kinds of things. But fight and resist fear we must - because it's not from God! Focus on the good report (Philippians 4:6-8). "What time I am afraid I will trust in You" (Psalm 56:3).
