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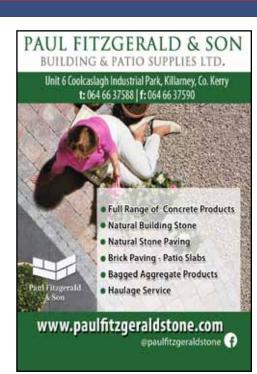

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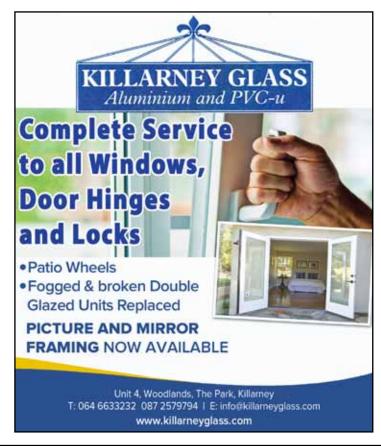

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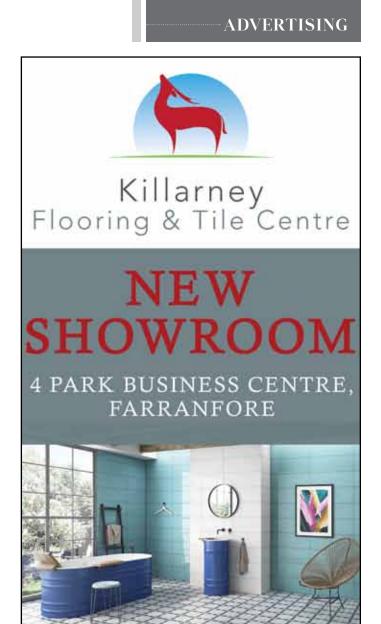

aving raised an incredible €500,000 to date for Pieta House, the family of the late Nathan Carroll are asking everyone to come together by staying apart for Darkness into Light walk this year.

The sunrise event is going ahead on May 8th and everyone can take part in their own bubble and join Pieta and Electric Ireland for a special Darkness Into Light sunrise. This will give the gift of hope to those impacted by suicide and self-harm.

You can join in any way you can – walk, swim, bike or simply share your sunrise moment in your own unique way on 8th May in your own area in your own bubbles.

Nathan's Walk - Darkness Into Light is organised every year by the O'Carroll family from Killarney, Denis and Marie O'Carroll with their family, Aaron, Killian, Ryan, and Damien in memory of their son and brother Nathan who tragically gook his life at just 14 years of age in 2007.

Since the inception, the O'Carroll family have raised over half a million euros for Pieta House. In Killarney the annual 'Darkness into Light' walk is known as 'Nathan's Walk.

"This year again, due to Covid-19 restrictions, we are inviting everyone to show community and solidarity awareness with those impacted by suicide by getting up at 5:30am on 8th May to share their sunrise moment and donate to www.darknessintolight.ie" Marie Carroll told Killarney Outlook.

"We would ask participants to re-use t-shirts from previous Darkness Into Light events, where possible, to reduce waste", Marie said.

"This year more than last, we need your help, so when you are registering, select Kerry and select Nathan's Walk so the money we raise together stays together in Kerry," Marie said. Research revealed that 1 in 5 Irish people

are suffering from depression. And the need for Pieta's lifesaving services has never been greater as COVID-19 impacts not only on the nation's physical health but its mental health too. "We are so grateful to everyone who has supported Pieta over the years, and are very grateful for all your donations, which have now reached over €500,000, Marie told the Killarney Outlook.

THE LATE DR VERONICA DUNNE

resident Michael D. Higgins, led tributes to the late renowned opera singer, Veronica Dunne who passed away last week. "News of the death of Dr. Veronica Dunne, renowned opera singer, teacher and instigator of the Veronica Dunne Singing Competition, will have deeply saddened all those who love the power and beauty of music", the President said in a statement.

Throughout her life, Dr. Veronica Dunne captivated millions with her singing. The legacy she leaves lies in the talents of those scores of others whose talents and performances she unlocked with her enthusiasm, energy and commitment as a teacher and friend", he added.

Among those who Dr. Veronica Dunne trained was Killarney soprano Mary Culloty O'Sullivan.

Speaking to the Killarney Outlook this week, Mary said she had four great years with Dr Veronica Dunne.

"She was an amazing iconic lady who brought out the very best in me and all of her many students! "To study with her was like winning the Lotto for any singer! She accepted only the best and you had to go through an audition process. I sang How Beautiful Are the Feet from Handel's Messiah and she accepted me straight away", Mary said.

"Her vocal exercises have been passed to all of my own students over the years and they have benefited greatly, as have I.

I am truly honoured to be a small part of her wonderful legacy. She will be truly missed by everyone throughout Ireland and beyond", Mary added.

Also paying tribute to the late Dr. Veronica Dunne were the members of the Hugh O'Flaherty Society who were deeply saddened to hear of the passing of their friend and Patron, Veronica "Ronnie" Dunne.

"Veronica was a dear friend of Msgr Hugh, -becoming acquainted with him in 1946 when she travelled to Rome for classical voice training at the young age of 18 years. At the request of her parents, Msgr Hugh undertook to look out for her safety and well-being in a post-wartime city, populated by thousands of allied troops and Italians trying to rescue their society from the disastrous fascist regime of Mussolini", Jerry O'Grady from the Society told Killarney Outlook. She recalled fondly of meeting Msgr Hugh at the

foot of the airplane steps as she arrived in Rome – whereupon while welcoming her to Rome, he also issued a stern warning to her as follows - "I will have you back on the plane to Dublin in the blink

of an eye if you don't behave yourself while in Rome". He ensured that she was introduced to all of the appropriate people in Rome who might help her in her chosen career, bringing her along to the many society receptions and events to which he was regularly invited. Veronica also recalled a sad occasion when

Veronica also recalled a sad occasion when Msgr Hugh brought her to visit the scene of

the terrible wartime atrocity at the Ardeatine Caves outside Rome, where on March 24th 1943 the Nazis executed 335 Roman citizens, in retaliation for the killing of 33 German Military Police in an Italian Resistance attack the previous day. The 335 victims had been selected at random from civilian prisons, suspected resistance supporters as well as those suspected of supporting the Rome Escape Line. On what was to be his first and only visit to the site, she said that Msgr Hugh wept openly at such a tremendous loss of lives, including many of his Escape Line associates.

When the Hugh O'Flaherty Memorial Society was officially launched at a lunch in Killarney in the Spring of 2008, Veronica travelled down from Dublin to be with us, and she generously made a substantial donation towards our Memorial Fund, and so became our very first Patron. Over the subsequent years, she continued to take an interest in our Society, joining us at events in Dublin and she used every opportunity presented to her on Radio, TV and in the Print Media to increase awareness of the incredible story of Hugh O'Flaherty. Veronica will be greatly missed by lovers of Classical Music around the world and by her many friends in the Hugh O'Flaherty Memorial Society. We extend our deep Sympathy and Condolences to her family. May she Rest in Peace.

Killarney Artist Taking Part in Incognito 2021



Kerry artist, Tina Reed is among 19 Kerry artists who are taking part in this year's Incognito online art sale in aid of the Jack & Jill Foundation. A total of 19 artists from Co. Kerry are among the Who's Who of Irish and international artists taking part in this year's Incognito 2021 online art sale in aid of the Jack & Jill Children's Foundation.

The Incognito art collection is now live at www.incognito.ie with the online art sale taking place on Thursday April 22 at 10am sharp.

What's so incredibly fun and exciting about Incognito compared with any other art sale is that the identity of the artists behind the paintings – for sale at €60 each – is kept top secret until the sale has closed.

The Incognito collection is made up of 3,000-plus original postcard-sized artworks in a range of mediums, from oils and pastels, to glass and metalwork, in a sale that is usually a sprint to the checkout. Everything sold out

last year in just 15 minutes!

Among the Kerry artists taking part are Tina Reed from Killarney, David Morrison from Ballybunion, and Yunjee Kim, Ber Earley and Kate Plum from Tralee. Some of the famous national and international faces taking part this year are U2's The Edge, rock star Bob Geldof, fashion designer Paul Costelloe, comedians Jason Byrne and Tommy Tiernan, artist Don Conroy and Nobel prize winner Dr William Campbell. So, whether you're an art collector or a bargain hunter, there's something for everyone at Incognito 2021.

In the five years since its inception, Incognito has raised almost €450,000 for Jack & Jill's home nursing care for children with highly complex medical conditions, including end-of-life care. This equates to more than 28,000 hours of specialist home nursing care provided by Jack & Jill nurses and carers the length and breadth of the country, including 12 families in Kerry.

Kerry Local Creative Youth Partnership (Kerry LCYP) at Kerry Education and Training Board has announced two strands of funding available to community based organisations, youth service providers, preschools & early years settings, youth groups and creative practitioners who wish to develop creativity projects for children and/or young people in their communities. Applications are being sought under the Creative Youth Grant Scheme and the Youth Theatre Grant Scheme for projects that are child and youth led, that are

highly creative in nature, and can be realised in 2021. In 2020 Kerry LCYP worked with more than one thousand six hundred and fifty young people experiencing disadvantage or exclusion. The intention is to support many more children and young people in 2021.





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SUPPORT FOR SAFE TOWN CENTRE CAMPAIGN

he campaign to provide a safer town centre environment has received support from Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce. Kerry County Council's Safe Streets - Safe Town - Safe County campaign which is necessary to ensure proper social distancing measures is in place during the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic.

The campaign is designed to provide a safer town centre environment - particularly for vulnerable and older people - while at the same time supporting the reopening of local businesses when that opportunity arises.

Chamber acknowledges that the safety measures introduced last year worked really well when pedestrianisation was implemented, footpaths were significantly widened and age friendly parking zones were introduced.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Cllr Niall Kelleher, said: "Kerry is doing exceptionally well in terms of keeping infection rates down but we all need to give it a little more time to enable the vaccination programme to be fully rolled-out before we make further plans".

Chamber notes that Plunkett Street, from its junction with Main Street to College Square, and the slip road at Kenmare Place will both

remain closed to traffic until October 31 next : and that alternative routes will be available.

"The impact of these closures, as well as the other measures, are to be subject to further

review at that stage and, in the meantime, Chamber fully supports the Safe Streets project," Cllr Kelleher stated.

EER LODGE SCORES 100% COMPLIANCE



Deer Lodge, the purpose built residential mental health recovery unit in Killarney has scored 100% compliance. This week, The Mental Health Commission (MHC) published announced inspection reports on three of the country's 66 approved inpatient mental health centres.

Deer Lodge opened in 2017 and is situated on St. Margaret's Road, Killarney. The approved centre provided mental health care, psychiatry of later life, and mental health rehabilitation. The centre consisted of four households - Mountain View, River View, Wood View and Lake View. All were connected by a central thoroughfare.

The centre achieved 100% compliance on the inspection, an increase of 18% over its 2019 inspection, with no non-compliances recorded. There was one condition attached to the registration of the centre at the time of inspection relating to staffing, but the centre was not in breach of the condition and was compliant with the associated regulation.

The report noted that within each of the four households, each resident had their own en suite bedroom with access to a sitting room, dining room, quiet room, kitchenette, and an internal landscaped garden area. The centre was kept in a good state of repair externally and internally and was clean, hygienic, and free from offensive odours. Recreational activities included arts and crafts, gardening, newspaper groups and music sessions; community outings in the centre's own bus; use of an electronic tablet; and cinema, using a projector. Recreational activities were provided on weekdays and weekends.

Geraldine told Sheree that she moved "down the corridor" rather than to a different house/location when she got married to her husband Tony and had her three kids, Cathal, Tomás, Orlaith and not forgetting Lucky the dog.

S: Hi Geraldine so what year did you graduate from St. Brigid's?

G: The year 1991 Sheree. My three sisters before me also went to St. Brigid's Hannah, Mary, and Noreen but they saved the best for last in me!!!!

S: *Laughs* Were you involved in any extracurricular activities in school?

G: I was involved in the school basketball at lunchtime. I played it all the way up, not very well let me tell you though!!! The training was always a bit of crack as it used to be held outdoors. The basketball courts were over by the Sem wall, so we used to talk to the boys over the wall. The basketball matches were then held inside the gym hall, they weren't as fun being held inside!!!

S: Did you have any favourite subject in school?

CALL FOR REMEMBRANCE GARDEN AT KILLARNEY HOUSE

The stunning surrounds of Killarney House and Gardens has been suggested as a tranquil space where people can visit to remember loved ones lost during this Covid-19 Pandemic.

"Due to restrictions, we have all been deprived of our traditional practice of grieving loved ones by way of a wake or funeral and many cannot find closure as a result" stated Councillor Michael Cahill.

"I strongly believe that the provision of a Remembrance Garden, where people could find peace and quiet in a scenic setting, specifically in memory of those who passed away during the Pandemic, would contribute greatly to the mental health of our people" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"A small investment in a project such as this would pay huge dividends for the well being of all bereaved people in Kerry, and would also serve as a memorial to those friends and relatives, whose passing we were unable to mark adequately" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"I believe Killarney House and Gardens would make the perfect location for this county project, as it already has peace, tranquility and beauty in abundance, with parking available in the town" added Councillor Cahill.

The Rossbeigh based Councillor said the traditional method had served us well in dealing with our grief in the past and he now felt that we need to put in place something suitable to replace it. "I am proposing that we develop



a meeting place where bereaved people can visit, sit, walk, stand and honour and remember those who passed on." "A place of Peaceful Remembrance, a place of contemplation, a place of beauty and peace that is accessible to all" said Mr Cahill.

Councillor Cahill said the obvious site that springs to mind, would be in Killarney House and Gardens which is very accessible from the town and admired by all for its charm, beauty and peace. The Fianna Fail Councillor again called on the Council to write to the OPW and ascertain if a site can be secured, otherwise we

will have to look at other sites. Councillor Cahill pointed out that the Council own a number of sites throughout the county that may be suitable for such a project.

"This small gesture to all our loved ones that passed away during a particular difficult time, a Global Pandemic would honour them and help us all to heal," stated Mr Cahill. Councillor Cahill also confirmed that he had written to the CEO of Kerry County Council, Moira Murrell and the Minister for the OPW in regard to his proposal.

CALL FOR EXTENSION TO FUEL ALLOWANCE PAYMENT



There is a distinct need to repeat this year, the extension granted in 2020, of the Fuel Allowance paid to Social Welfare recipients in the State according to a Kerry County Councillor

"This is an essential payment for many, particularly our elderly and more vulnerable"

stated Councillor Michael Cahill.

"Many of them, due to age and underlying conditions, need to continue cocooning for up to three weeks following receipt of their second vaccine" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"That is some way off on the horizon for most and we all know from experience the need for heating in the month of April, and more so, if one is confined to the house" said Councillor Cahill.

"Last year, the Minister stated that 'At a time where me wish people to stay at home to stay safe, it makes perfect sense to extend the Fuel Season for existing eligible customers, on a once-off basis, by four weeks' and this applies even more so today" stated Councillor Cahill. "A one month extension would go a long way to ease their health worries into the summer months and hopefully to a return to normality for all of us" added the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

TENANT PURCHASE SCHEME

At a recent meeting of Kerry County Council, Councillor Michael Cahill called on the Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O Brien TD to expedite the ongoing review of the Tenant Purchase Scheme. The Fianna Fail Councillor called on Minister O Brien to take into consideration the circumstances of Pensioners who wish to avail of the Scheme and the circumstances of tenants with a Disability who wish to buy out their homes. The Rossbeigh based Councillor said that the circumstances of tenants living in Single Rural Cottages in the middle of farms should be given favourable consideration in the review. Councillor Cahill also said that the necessary changes should be made to allow tenants living in Part 5 Houses the opportunity to buy out their homes. Following Councillor Cahill's proposal, it was agreed unanimously to write to the Minister on the matter. The outcome of the review is due to be announced in the coming weeks.

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IT'S TIME FOR LEAVING CERTS TO TAKE STOCK AND THEN GIVE IT THEIR ALL FOR THE LAST TERM

The Easter Holiday break provides every Leaving Cert student with a timely opportunity to relax and take stock of her/his personal situation before returning to school for the final term. In what has been two very disjointed academic years for the 60,000 plus candidates, who have signed up for the Leaving Cert exams, there is now more clarity and certainty.

When the Candidate Self-Service Portal (CSSP) closed on the 16th March, 57,182, Leaving Cert students, about 95%, had signed up for SEC-accredited grades and/or written exams, while 3,033 LCA students, or 91%, had registered. In late April/early May, candidates will be able to access the CSSP again in order to confirm their choices. Candidates will also be able to elect to sit an exam in a subject, which is already on their subject list, if they didn't already do so by 16th March.

It's very encouraging that such a high percentage of students has signed on for SEC-accredited grades but it's essential for all of them to stay focussed on their school work until the end of term. Students should appreciate that the SEC-accredited grades will be initially awarded by their subject teachers, who will estimate the percentage marks awarded to students. The marks will subsequently be subjected to an in-school alignment process and later a national standardisation process.

In all, there are four in-school phases (listed below), so every student should make sure, by working diligently, that the best possible set of accredited grades is sent to the SEC on her/his behalf by the school. The SEC-accredited grade system recognises student achievement across the two years of Senior Cycle, and the student's expected performance in the Leaving

Cert exam. Learning during the school closure period of January-February-March 2021 is being taken into account as is, with caveats, learning during the 2020 school closure. Learning and outcomes from March right up to 14th May is also being taken in to account. So, even if a student is not sitting the exam in a particular subject, she/he should fully engage with the subject to keep the teacher sweet.

Phase One: Teacher's estimation

Teachers will use their professional judgement, drawing on existing records and available evidence, to arrive at a provisional estimated percentage mark for each student.

Phase Two: School alignment of marks

Subject teachers together will review the teachers' estimated percentage marks for students who are taking that subject.

Phase Three: Oversight of the alignment process by the school Principal

The oversight of the alignment process will be undertaken by the school Principal.

Phase Four: Transmission of estimated marks for national standardisation

The finalised data sets will be submitted by the Principal with the assistance of the examination aide no later than 3rd June 2021.

The traditional Leaving Cert exam begins on 9th June, which allows students nine weeks of focussed study. Students will achieve a grade in each subject they sit for in the traditional Leaving Cert exam. Some students will more than likely sit the written exam in all of their subjects. More may just sit for their strongest subjects. Complete statistics on this matter should be available after the CSSP has reopened and closed again in late April/early May. The icing on the cake is that the student will ultimately be awarded the higher grade in

each subject across both options.

So, it's all to play for. Enjoy the remainder of the Easter Holiday period. Decide what you need to do during your last few weeks at school. Aim to give it your very best so that you get the best possible outcome in terms of your grades.

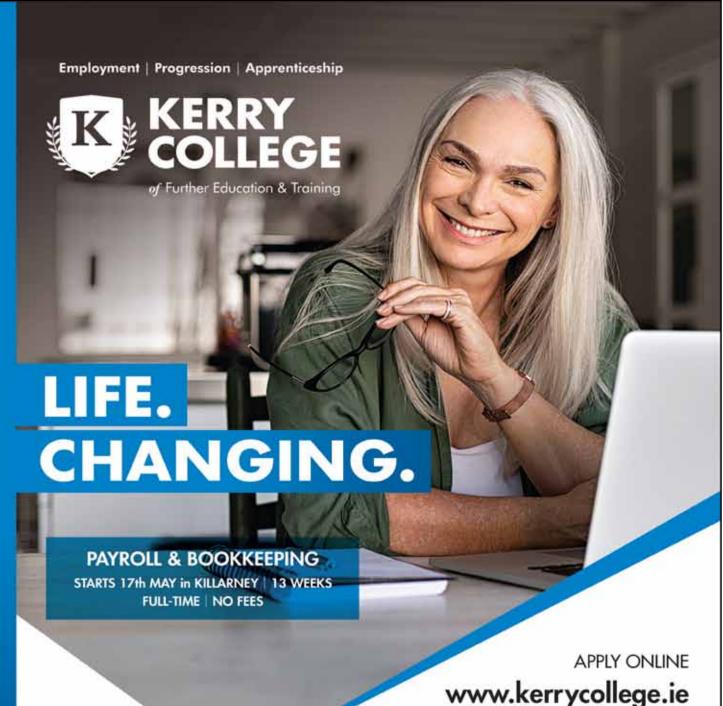
Castleisland Community College student Kevin Keane awarded UCC Scholarship

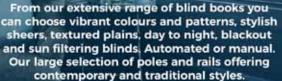




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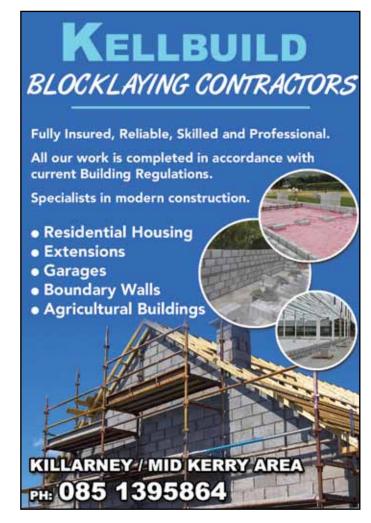




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Virtual Easter Marathon Challenge for Muckross Rowers

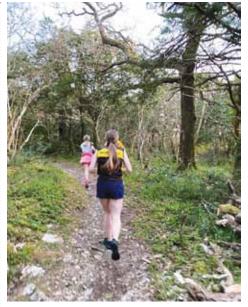
From beginners to seniors, members of Muckross Rowing Club took part in a virtual Easter Marathon Challenge

LOCK FREE LAURA RAISES OVER €5000

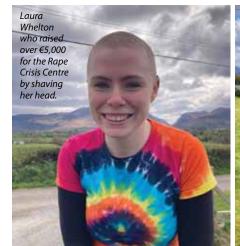

DAIRY MILK CHEESECAKE

A great way to use up left over Easter eggs

Ingredients

For the base
180g melted butter
400g digestive biscuits
For the cheesecake mix
263g dairy milk chocolate
1 teaspoon of vanilla extract
100g of icing sugar
2 /180g cream cheese
284g double cream

Method

- 1. Mix the melted butter with the mashed digestive biscuits and pour them into a spring form tin and flatten down with wooden spoon
- 2. Melt the chocolate slowly in a microwave or in a bowl over simmering water when melted leave to cool for a few minutes, be careful not to burn the chocolate,
- 3. Whip the double cream in a bowl and set aside 4. In another bowl mix the cream cheese, vanilla and
- 4. In another bowl mix the cream cheese, vanilla and icing sugar until fully mixed together
- 5. Pour in the melted chocolate and mix together
- 6. Next fold in the whipped cream into the mix and mix together
- 7. Pour the cheesecake mix over the biscuit in the tin and smooth the top with a spoon
- 8. Place in the fridge for 4 to 6 hours or overnight Drizzle some melted chocolate over the top

280g Firm Tofu cut into bite size cubes and marinaded in marinade mix below for at least ½ an hour, preferably overnight Marinade

4 tablespoons dark soya sauce

3 tablespoons Mirin (White rice vinegar)

1 tablespoon golden syrup

1 tablespoon Sesame Oil

2 garlic cloves crushed

1 teaspoon freshly grated ginger

When Marinaded, fry your tofu cubes In a flat based pan, on a high heat put a little oil in the pan and place the cubes of tofu in it fry for about 3 minutes (turning heat to medium after a minute of so) then flip the cubes of tofu to do the other side. Fry for another 3 minutes or so being careful not to burn them. Set these aside when done. (Top tip is not to move the tofu around while frying, leave it sit in the pan so that it will be nicely browned and crispy, if you move it around it will break the tofu up)

Method

Put your Sesame Oil in a wok and heat to high temperature add the spring onions and pepper and fry for about 5 minutes stirring often. Then add your soya sauce, mix week then add the beansprouts and mix it all together fry for another 4-5 minutes. Add the tofu chunks above and mix together. I served garnished with some fresh coriander. This is so delicious and high protein too so a win win.

So, I went and got qualified with I.M.S.T (Institute of Massage & Sports Therapy) so after doing a year or so I decided to go full time with the Therapy and haven't looked back since. I work with Fossa GAA, Killarney Celtic so the transition to move into full time was made easier as I was getting more referrals for one-to-one sessions aswell. Then, I had a conversion with you and Edele to see could we bounce referrals and I moved into a Therapy room here at Bwell.

Neilus: As we know, covid hit so how did that affect your business, as your job is essentially hands on profession?

Stefan: Well, similar to most places, I had to

close my doors so then I got the opportunity to qualify as a Personal trainer and work with Bwell as we moved online and offered free classes in the first lockdown. So, then I made a connection or bridged the gap from my own profession to working with people in a Personal training session about how people's bodies move differently in certain exercises and what restrictions they may have doing an exercise. I always want to keep educating myself and bridging the gap was important.

Neilus: That is something we always talk about, bridging the gap from your profession to working with people in an exercise routine. Any advice for people that train a few days

Stefan: Well, recovery is hugely important as the body needs to recover properly so stretching and foam rolling should be a part of every person's exercise days off. The body gets stronger in recovery so that would be on bit of advice I would certainly give people.

Neilus: I know from talking to you here privately, you really enjoy what you do when people enter your Therapy room.

Stefan: To be honest, I don't really call it a job as I love doing it and it can be a challenging to find the root cause of where the pain is coming from when dealing with people that are in pain. Sometimes a person might have back pain but the cause could be coming from a different area of the body so its great that people put their trust in me to help them to get pain free and find that root cause as we mentioned. And from working on the personal training with people I really enjoy getting people to their intended goal of maybe from weight loss to getting stronger.

Neilus: As mentioned you were involved with teams like Killarney Celtic, talk to me about your sporting background and achievements?

Stefan: Played with Celtic all the way from underage to seniors so won few trophies along the way. Actually, underage Celtic had a pitch near St. Finnian's Hospital and we used to get hammered the first few years but we progressed and got better. Senior level we won leagues and cups so was great to be involved with these teams. Played a bit of football but soccer was always my sport.

Neilus: I know you a long time, and I know that you aren't boastful of what you have achieved in your soccer days so I'm bringing it up, you represented your country?

Stefan: Cheers for bringing that up. Yes, I played for the Irish Juniors where I travelled on a tour of Europe where we played teams from Belgium and Holland and was a fantastic tour as we were the first Irish team to travel Europe. I also played for Kerry on the Oscar Traynor teams and we had some success. I did go for trails with Cork City and played pre-season games against Man City and Southampton. That was a brilliant experience as I saw up close how good these full-time pros were. The likes of Matt Le Tissier, Francis Benali and Alan Ball who was manager at the time, and he won the world cup with England. So was brilliant and great to have the memories of them games.

Neilus: What memories to have playing against those teams, so let's go back a bit, where did you do to school?

Stefan: Primary school I went to St Oliver's National school or Ballycasheen as it known better as. When I finished primary, I went to the Sem for secondary from 1986 to 1991 and then I went to college in Tralee RTC as it was known then.

Neilus: To finish up, what does the future hold for you Stefan?

Stefan: When this covid passes and life gets back to some sort of normality, open up my business again and get people moving more freely and help them to get pain free. I always open to learning more about my own profession and keep educating myself with my Therapies and when I personal train people.

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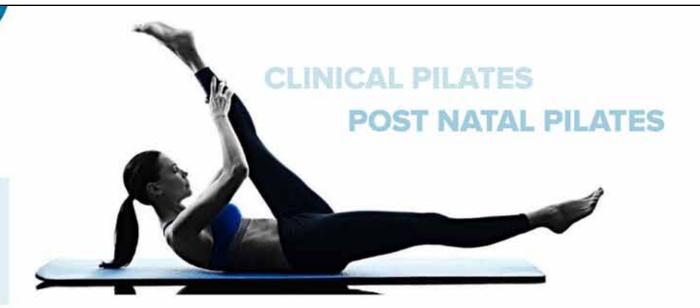

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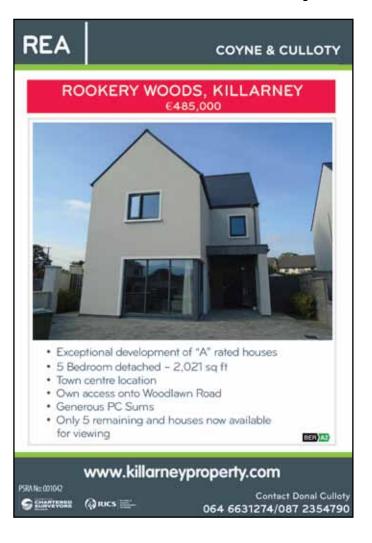
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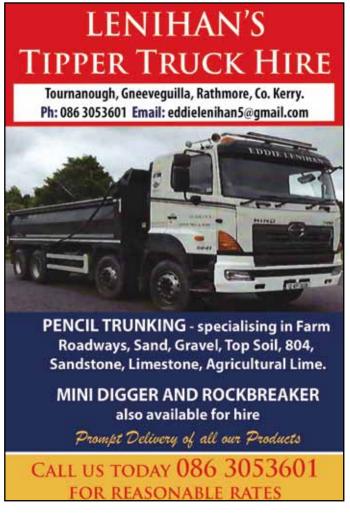

When Can You Access Your Pension & What Are Your Options When You Want to Retire?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. 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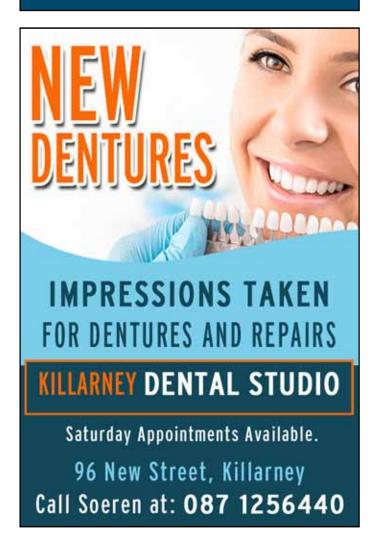


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When was your last Sight Test?

As well as an eye health check, a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.

Diabetic retinopathy

People with diabetes are at a high risk of developing retinopathy and possible blindness if untreated. Attending regular sight tests allows signs of developing retinopathy to be identified

Risk of falls

Uncorrected vision in older people also increases the risk of falls. Falls are the leading cause of disability and death from injury among people over 75 in the UK

Risks for children

Undetected conditions such as amblyopia (lazy eye) have been shown to affect reading ability and therefore may impact on future educational attainment.

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

Driving risks

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.

>LATEST GOVERNMENT UPDATE

In the latest national address, Taoiseach Micheál Martin announced a gradual easing of restrictions over the coming weeks. The main points are outlined below, with good news for the GAA as inter-county training resumes from April 19th and juvenile training (under 18) can resume from April 26th. The main points are as follows and full details as always are available on www.gov.ie:

From April 12th: The 5km limit will be extended to county-wide travel; Members from up to two households can meet outdoors; There will be a phased return of the construction industry, starting on April 12th for those involved in the construction of housing & childcare facilities; All school classes at primary and secondary level to resume

From April 19th: Senior level inter-county training can resume (with National Leagues expected to start in May); Training for elite athletes approved by Sport Ireland can resume

From April 26th: Outdoors sports training for juveniles (under 18) can resume; Golf and outdoor tennis can resume

Outdoor visitor attractions such as zoos and wildlife parks can open; Up to 25 mourners can attend a funeral; Two people who have been fully vaccinated can meet indoors or outdoors

At the end of April and into May there will be a review on the phased reopening of other sectors - non-essential retail, personal services, all non-contact sports training, religious services, museums, galleries and libraries - and additional freedoms for those who are fully vaccinated.

Towards the end of May, and depending on progress, there will be a review on the re-opening of hotels, B&Bs and guesthouses in June and all hospitality sectors to be opened in the summer.

From there, and with the rollout of the vaccine in its advanced stages, they hope to look at the re-opening of all remaining sectors.

There are now 4 different vaccines in use in Europe and despite the delays in supply, the vaccination program is well underway in Ireland. The good news is that the vaccine supply is set to increases dramatically in April, May and June. The walk-in test centres in areas with high numbers have been well received, and antigen testing is expected to be introduced shortly. By the middle of April, it is expected that all over 70s will have had their first dose and by mid/late May, all over 70s will be fully vaccinated.

By the end of next week, it is expected close to 1 million vaccines will have been given out. By the end of May, close to 3 million doses of the vaccine will have been administered, that number will increase to 5 million by early July, and 6 million vaccines administered by the end of July.

Next update, including a decision on return of GAA at club level for U20 and Senior, is due on April 26th.

>GAA RESPONSE TO THE NEW GOVERNEMENT ANNOUNCEMENT

Statement from GAA on 30.03.2021 following latest aovernment announcement:

A chairde, I know you will be aware by now of the positive announcement

by the Irish Government this evening that non-contact underage training in pods of 15 will be permitted from April 26th and that full contact Inter-County training at adult level can re-commence from April 19th.

These are hugely welcome developments and allow us finally to begin

planning on-field activity for the remainder of 2021. However, it should also be noted that these dates are conditional and will very much depend on what happens in terms of the overall COVID-19 picture in the coming weeks. For that reason, it is more important than ever that no collective training sessions are held between now and the Government indicated return dates. Breaches in this context will not only be dealt with under our own Rules but would likely put the broader plan to return to activity in serious jeopardy. As you will appreciate, we need to receive further clarity on aspects of what was announced today before finalising our plans for a return to training and ultimately games. We also need to finalise competition structures and dates for the up-coming inter-county season, as well as ensuring advice is provided for all clubs in relation to how they can safely recommence underage activity (and in the case of the 6 Counties, adult club training from April 12th). At this point, we can only confirm that Senior Inter County teams both North and South are likely to be permitted to return to collective training from Monday, April 19th. We hope to be in a position to confirm the fixture calendar and competition structures for inter county by the end of next week.. We also hope to have finalised updated versions of our Return to Play documents for both intercounty and club activity ahead of the stated dates for resumption North and South of the border. In the interim, we would ask for your patience while we complete this work and we look forward to communicating in detail with you all again next week in relation to the resumption of GAA activity. CONTRADICTIONS

When there are two sets of facts or ideas or pictures that conflict but maybe true. When science has proven something, and then we hear that another scientist has disproved this, what do we believe? Contradictions can also be of a personal nature, when we experience the mental discomfort or anxiety when we have conflicting beliefs or values or emotions within ourselves. Often to cope with this we use protective measures, or psychological defense mechanisms to help reduce that internal or external anxiety. These measures can help us manage the situations better, and what is most important is to find your ways, guided by the ideas or thoughts of others, e.g. this article, but finding your

One of the tasks of developing into an adult is to be able to tolerate contradictions. We all remember the times in our life when we needed things to be "either" "or", and that it was too hard for it to be both! As we mature, usually, we begin to be able to accommodate differing opinions and these contradictions are less challenging to us. There are many ways to cope with contradictions, and the key elements are to tolerate difference, managing ambiguity and to be flexible. In examining traits mentally strong people poses it is their ability to live with contradictions that strengthen them, it is their ability to be vulnerable and yet strong. So putting down that mask or shield we have to protect can be a rewarding risk to take, allowing us to live more openly and honestly. Another wonderful contradiction to integrate and practice living with is that life is precious and fragile at the same time. Live in the here and now, but never lose sight of the past nor forget to look where you are going. Otherwise we trip over the same obstacle every time we walk on the path of life!

The ability to trust people and at the same time be wary of them is another contradiction that can build resilience emotionally. This helps us understand that people can let you down, no-one is perfect but with healthy wariness we learn to choose relationships which arte more trustworthy, and to confront those that are not. The celebration of difference, which is part of managing contradictions is the cornerstone of tolerating diversity and requires flexibility. The metaphor of "if the branch does not bend then it will break" is useful for us to learn from nature.

The emerging positivity that will grow with tolerating contradictions is beautifully captured in the idea that by recognising your limitations you are able to find the endless possibilities. In not hiding your limitations, you are then open to possibilities that you never noticed before, allowing you to seize the opportunities that are possible. Go for it!!!

COVID UPDATE

I know you will be aware by now of the positive announcement by the Irish Government this evening that non-contact underage training in pods of 15 will be permitted from April 26th and that full contact Inter-County training at adult level can re-commence from April 19th. These are hugely welcome developments and allow us finally to begin planning on-field activity for the remainder of 2021. However, it should also be noted that these dates are conditional and will very much depend on what happens in terms of the overall COVID-19 picture in the coming weeks. For that reason, it is more important than ever that no collective training sessions are held between now and the Government indicated return dates. Breaches in this context will not only be dealt with under our own Rules but would likely put the broader plan to return to activity in serious jeopardy. As you will appreciate, we need to receive further clarity on aspects of what was announced today before finalising our plans for a return to training and ultimately games. We also need to finalise competition structures and dates for the up-coming inter-county season, as well as ensuring advice is provided for all clubs in relation to how they can safely recommence underage activity (and in the case of the 6 Counties, adult club training from April 12th). At this point, we can only confirm that Senior

At this point, we can only confirm that Senior Inter County teams both North and South are likely to be permitted to return to collective training from Monday, April 19th. We hope to be in a position to confirm the fixture calendar and competition structures for inter county by the end of next week.. We also hope to have finalised updated versions of our Return to Play documents for both inter-county and club activity ahead of the stated dates for resumption North and South of the border.

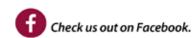

extension of Injury Fund cover has been ratified by Coiste Bainistíochta. This will now take the 2020 cover term up until 31 May 2021.

This means that the GAA Injury Benefit Fund cover remains in place based on existing 2020 team registrations. Units do not need to register or pay for their 2021 teams until re-invited to do so. Details with regards to registering and payment for the 2021 GAA Injury Benefit Fund will issue once we have more clarity from Government as to what the coming months may look like.

It is a condition of the extended 2020 Injury Fund cover to 31 May 2021 that in advance of any permitted return to train or play in either April or May, "All players will still be required to be individually registered for the 2021 season on the new "Foireann" membership system." 2020 player registrations will "NOT" carry over into 2021 and cover will be declined if a player is not fully registered for the 2021 season in advance of any return to train or play in 2021.

Pause on "Loss of Wages cover" from 1 January 2021 Following discussion at a meeting of Central Council on Saturday 20th March last, it was agreed to review the following two options as alternatives to the current pause that has been applied to the loss of wages cover that forms part of the wider Player Injury Benefit Fund.

1. Offer all our playing members who may feel that loss of wages cover is a prerequisite for participation in GAA activities for 2021 to individually subscribe to a stand-alone GAA endorsed personal injury cover plan for 2021.

2. Review the 2021 Injury fund premium payable by each of the 1,500 units and potentially increase this premium by 25% to partly cover €1.3m of the forecasted €3m fund deficit to May 2022 if loss of wages cover is to be reinstated during this term. The funds ongoing deficit is primarily due to the absence of gate receipts during this term which ordinarily sub-vents the shortfall in the fund annually.

General In a general context, while there are undoubtedly some challenges ahead for the Association, there is also plenty of hope that with the availability of vaccines and the roll out of the inoculation programmes North and South of the border, a summer filled with Gaelic Games activity lies ahead.

In the meantime, we await the upcoming government announcements and will continue to communicate regularly with all units. We also request that you keep yourself updated with all communications given the fluid situation that we now find ourselves operating in. Finally, we want to remind you all of the importance of personal responsibility for our actions in relation to Covid-19 as we work together to ensure the safety of everyone in our community.

GAA

Dublin Training Session

Look, we all know that one particular story dominated sports this week, and that was a training session by nine Dublin players that included some of the most high profile players of all time. Gods with feet of clay. Moreover, it was very obviously not their first time - do you really think that a photograph happened coincidentally to be lying in wait?

I have no sympathy. None. What they did was nothing short of a disgrace. I criticised Cork's Ronan McCarthy and Derry's Paddy Tally for breaching restrictions, but this was worse - the GAA had literally warned teams not to go back training less than 24 hours previously. Dessie Farrell quickly put his hands up and the Dublin County Board acted promptly (and very cutely) in imposing a 12 week ban - I would assume in the hopes of avoiding player punishments, I assume. No, I'm sorry, but these are grown men. They knew full well they weren't allowed to train and they did it anyway. Frankly, I would sit those boys down for the National League (which is a kind of a cobbled together thing anyway this year and will be played off in a rush). This was ranked stupidity and reeks of arrogance - something that I would never have expected. How in anam an diabhal did they expect to get away with this?

Aussie Rules

Six Irish women have made the last four in the AFLW. Aisling Sheridan and Sarah Rowe from Cavan play with Collingwood, who beat a North Melbourne team that included Mayo's Aileen gilroy. They will now face Brisbane Lions in the Preliminary Final, who include Tipperary's Orla O'Dwyer in their squad. Dublin's Lauren Magee played for Melbourne Demons (Sinead McGoldrick was injured) in their win over Fremantle. They now face the Adelaide Crows, who include Clare's Ailish Considine in their ranks.

SOCCER

Guardiola Criticises Scheduling

You'd feel sorry for Pep Guardiola all the same. This week he came out strongly against UEFA and FIFA for the fixtures scheduling. His poor players haven't had a midweek rest so far this year. In fairness to Guardiola, he has received some questions about his rotation policy, and of course he has to rotate. But equally, the reason your schedule is so crowded is because you keep winning. You're competing on all fronts. Against Leicester, you were able to start a team that cost £253 million – without including Ilkay Gundogan, Bernardo Silva, John Stones, or Raheem Sterling.



You've got first world problems, Pep. Have a chat with Stephen Kenny and you'll get some perspective.

Champions League Proposals

Actually, with the new proposed and nonsensical format for the Champions League in 2024 (36 teams in group stages and loads of meaningless games), the scheduling is about to get a lot worse (as are the games - it's designed to protect the moneyspinners).

Basically, the prestigious clubs will be protected from failing to qualify by having 'historical co-efficients' applied i.e. who you are, not what you do. These 'historical coefficients' will also determine your share of the revenue. In other words, the big boys are protecting their investment. The group stage is replaced by a giant league of 36 teams, who play a determined number of games against opponents based on seeding. Obviously, a lot of these games will be meaningless. The total number of games overall will be increased from 125 to 225 games.

Obviously, this is going to place enormous pressure on clubs and players. Squads will have to be increased. Domestic competitions are bound to suffer - as it is, a lot of teams field understrength teams in the likes of the Carabao Cup. But the problem is that in UEFA meetings, it's the money that does the talking, and the big clubs have the threat of breaking away to form a superleague of their own (exactly how the Premiership was first formed). It's an unfortunate truth that the majority of the tv audience only want to watch the glamour games, the brand names. More people watch Liverpool versus Man United than watch Bolton versus Ipswich. It's not hard to see who has the greater bargaining power.

The only hope is if the audience have the cop on to switch off from the meaningless games. Andrea Agnelli, Chairman of Juventus (who have lost out on the Champions League despite the huge purchase of Cristiano Ronaldo,

despite his gret league form and Man United Chief Executive David Gill are two of the main proponents of the proposals, and they have the numbers to bring this through. Unfortunately.

Is Haaland Worth it?

One issue for Guardiola where he really can worry is the lack of an out-and-out striker with the imminent departure of Sergio Ageero. The Argentinian has been the most consistent goalscorer in the Premiership for a long time and famously got the goal that won the title in the dying seconds - Murt Murphy had the game on his laptop in Mounthawk Park.

There's one striker definitely on the market at the moment. He's easily the hottest property in world sport at the moment. Erling Haland was actually born in Leeds (Roy Keane famously fouled his father Alfe Inge and ended up in court)

Borussia Dortmund was E150 million for their star player. There's €20 million to be paid to Mino Raiola (Erling's agent), €20 million to be paid to Alf-Inge Haaland, and a wage package of €30 million net per season to be paid to Erling Haaland.

Is he worth it? I'm actually not sure. Yes, he's young, fit, fast, strong, and a confident finisher. He's genuine quality. But if you look at German soccer, the teams play with a high defensive line, leaving space for a fast player like Haaland to exploit. Tim Werner was the top striker in Germany; he can hardly buy a goal in the tighter confines of the English game. For that matter, despite Haaland's scores, his team are actually seven points off the Champions League places. Fore E220 million outlay, I'd be looking for a lot more. Frankly, I'd try to buy Lewandowski that's a goal machine (admittedly, with better quality around him).

Barcelona, Real Madrid, and Man City (despite the antipathy between Guardiola and Raiola, these are businessmen first and foremost) are all expected to be in the hunt for the Norwegian.

ALL THINGS...SPORT

I suspect that Manchester will be his destination – I don't believe that Barcelona or Real (both look like losing to Atletico Madrid and Luis Suarez for La Liga) can afford that kind of money. City need a striker and have the money (let's not mention the myth that is 'financial fair play').

Whether it proves to be good value is another question.

FAI in Union Dispute

It's like a bottomless pit. Every time you think that the FAI can't get any worse, they manage to do so. Trade union Siptu has come out this week with a hard-hitting statement, saying that the FAI "is being overhauled in a less than transparent manner' and that "while progress had been made in several key areas over recent years that constructive relationship has unfortunately deteriorated". The FAI CEO, Jonathan Hill, informed Siptu last month that he doesn't recognise the union. The matters, including pay deferrals, have been referred to the Workplace Relations Commission.

Treaty United Claim First Win

Limerick side Treaty United picked up their first LOI win ever in a 1-0 victory away to Wexford. One of the best players on view was Matt Keane, with two spectacular runs early on had Wexford in real trouble before Anthony O'Donnell got the game's only goal. A worry for the team, though, must be their discipline, with another red card in the second half (their third in three games) that made for a close finish.

GOLF

Back in Action

The welcome news was announced this week that golf, pitch and putt, and other outdoor pursuits can resume on April 26th, although indoor facilities must remain closed.

Maguire Shines at ANA Inspiration

Leona Maguire's good form for this year continued as a strong finish at the ANA international saw her tie for 28th. Maguire had opened with a phenomenal round of 67 to be in real contention but a disastrous third round that included six bogeys, five on the back nine, left her in trouble. However, she recovered well in her final round.

Antrim's Stephanie Meadows, who two years ago barely managed to retain her tour card, leapfrogged her compatriot with a 67 in her final round to finish in 19th place.

US Masters

Jordan Spieth is the form golfer right now. Justin Thomas (the bookie's favourite) and Sungjae Im are others to keep an eye on. Bryson deChambeau's form has dipped of late but he's still the big hitter on a long course. Unfortunately, neither McIlroy nor Shane Lowry are consistent enough this year and it's hard to see them being in contention.

BOXING

Carl Frampton Bows Out

Northern Ireland boxer Carl Frampton has announced his retirement after being stopped in the sixth round by Jamal Herring in his bid to become a three weight world champion. Herring, who always controlled the middle of the ring and carried too much power for the Irishman, retained the super featherweight title. Frampton was knocked down in the fifth and sixth before his corner threw in the towel. Frampton was bidding to become a three weight champion, having previously won super-bantamweight and featherweight.

Eir Sport Steps Back

Eir has announced it will not take part in the latest rounds of sports rights auctions, citing fundamental changes to the commercial model for subscription-based sports broadcasters.

In a statement on Thursday evening, Eir pointed to the impact of Covid-19 on live sports across the world, noting that matches and competitions have been postponed throughout the last year, thus limiting the supply of content for the service to broadcast.

"In addition the almost complete closure of licensed premises here in Ireland has fundamentally changed the commercial model for subscription-based sports broadcasters," Eir's statement said. "As we navigate these challenges, Eir has made the decision not to partake in the latest rounds



of sports rights auctions," it added. The company noted however that there is "no immediate change" to Eir Sport content.

Eir's loss is likely to see RTE pick up the Pro14 for the first time in seven years, which will include South African teams next year.

ATHLETICS

Bam and Morton Games Cancelled

The BAM Cork City Sports International Athletic meet scheduled to take place in the CIT Athletic Stadium on Tuesday July 6th has been cancelled due to Covid. This is the second year in a row that Covid has meant the cancellation of the event. After assessing all scenarios available, it has been confirmed that the 2021 editions of both the BAM Cork Sports International Athletics Meet and the Morton Games have been postponed until 2022.

Russian Athletes to Compete as Neutrals

World Athletics has voted a degree of clemency for Russian athletes, who are currently suspended after the country was found guilty of sustained doping offences. The governing body has voted to revive the authorised neutral athlete scheme which can grant individual exemptions from suspension after vetting the athlete's drug testing record. Up to 10 athletes can be given an exemption for the Olympics.

SNOOKER

It was a real blast from the past to see Stephen Hendry lock horns again with his arch-rival Jimmy White. Hendry won it out 6-3, but the glory days look past for both players. Leinster Awarded Victory over Toulon

In the last fifteen minutes Munster began to run out of steam and had no answer to Dupont's blistering pace. A late try for Coombes was scnt consolation and it's the French side who advance to meet Clermont Auvergne in the quarter-final. CJ Stander and Boilly Holland, both of whom are set to depart Munster, gave emotional interviews after the game; both were brilliant servants of Munster and will be remembered fondly.

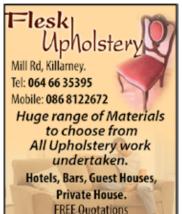

SUMMER BEDDING

Its that time of year again when we think of putting colour in our pots, baskets and containers and also in the ground. Summer Bedding plants can be used very effectively in the ground for filling gaps between shrubs or border perennial plants as they can cover a lot of ground and add plenty of colour very quickly. When planting Summer bedding plants in the ground the first thing you have to do is to dig over the area and dig in plenty of compost. Most Summer Bedding plants need a nice sunny sheltered position but if you have a shaded area, begonias are excellent bedding plants for this situation and they will give you flowers right through the summer and into early autumn. As an added bonus they will also provide you with excellent coloured foliage from light green to dark purple. Always remember when planting bedding to put the taller ones at the back. If you want to do a summer display of bedding on its own in a bed you will have to choose a centre piece - a good plant for this would be a standard fuschia. Then start with the tallest, such as marigolds or antirrhinums and work your way out to the edge of the bed with some begonias or petunias and finally at the edge of the bed with some lobelia and alyssum. A good idea before you plant would be to position all your plants to get an overall view of what it will look like. And remember to water all plants well in afterwards.

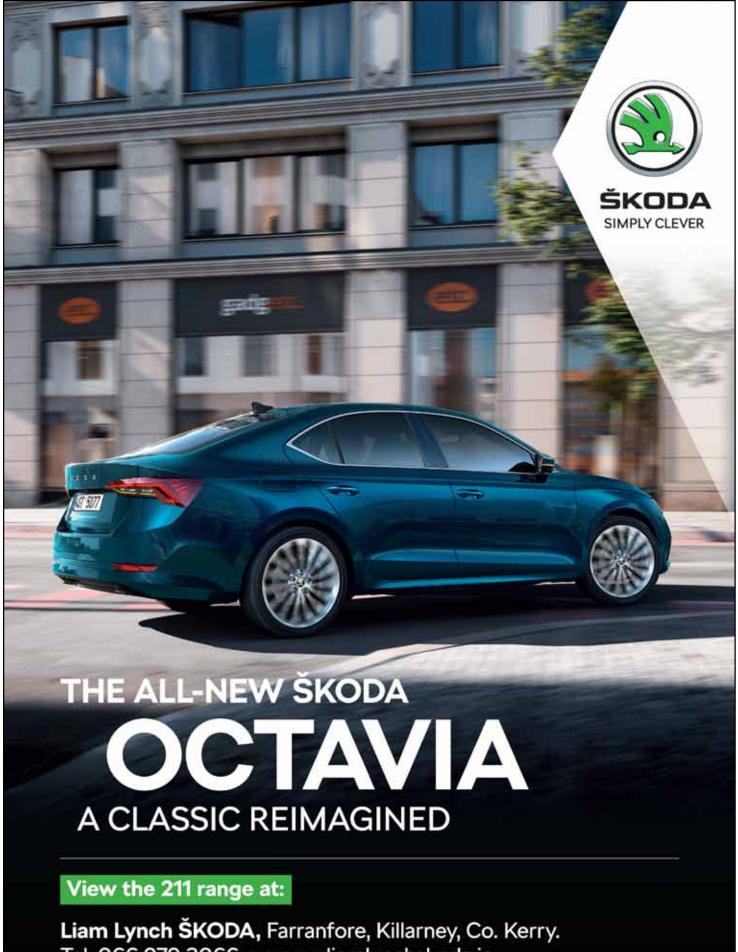
