



17 Years of the **National Schools Blitz**

erry football star David Clifford launched the 17th Annual National School Blitz at Killarney Garda Station yesterday, Thursday, June 9th.

This is the 17th year of the tournament and we are delighted that David has launched it for us" Garda Eddie Walsh, organiser of the event told Killarney Outlook.

The cup that will be presented to the winners is in memory of the late Tadhg O'Sullivan and will be presented by his son

The Corn na nÓg will honour Tadhg's commitment to the promotion of Gaelic football in primary schools. This perpetual trophy will go to the winners of the Killarney Garda National Schools Blitz. In 1954, Tadhg founded the

first national schools' competition in East Kerry. The Killarney Garda National Schools Blitz carries on that tradition.

Tadhq, from Knockeragh, always felt indebted to Gaelic football. As a young lad he was extremely shy, but found he was good at football. This gave him the confidence to take on life's many challenges.

In 1935, at the age of 20, he was selected to play for Dublin in the Leinster Championship while a student in St Patrick's Teacher Training College, Dublin.

The following year he played at right half-back on the Kerry team that played Mayo for the prestigious opening of the Fitzgerald Stadium in Killarney, lining out alongside such Kerry greats as Danno Keeffe, Murt Kelly and JJ Landers.

1936 also saw him winning a Senior Munster Championship medal. Kerry lost the All-Ireland semi-final to the Mayo team that went on to claim Mayo's first All-Ireland.

Tadhg returned to Kerry in 1953, as Principal of Lissivigeen National School. In 1954 he established the first national schools' competition for young footballers in East Kerry.

The rural schools in Killarney Parish (Lissivigeen, Tiernaboul, Loughguitane and Loreto National Schools), combined successfully as Naomh Muire with Tadhg as trainer.

The East Kerry teams that won the first All-Ireland club championship in 1971, as well as four Kerry County Championships, all had players that started out in that schools' competition. In 1963, Tadhg, together with founding members of the Club, revitalised the Spa GAA Club, which had become dormant a few short years after its founding in 1948. The initial focus was on juvenile and minor teams.

David Clifford launches the 17th National School Football Blitz at Killarney Garda Station on Thursday with representatives from the National Schools taking part and sponsor Tom Spillane, representatives from An Garda Siochana, Supt. Flor Murphy, Kerry GAA Chairman Patrick O'Sullivan Garda Eddie Walsh, Organiser and Sean O'Suilleabhain, Cup sponsor.



Tadhq trained the Spa team that won the O'Donoghue Cup in 1966, their first year as a senior side.

As well as training the team to further O'Donoghue Cup successes, Tadhg was Club Chairman from 1966 to 1982. He was instrumental in the Club acquiring its own grounds in Tullig in 1974.

Today, Spa is thriving, catering for players of all ages. It is one of only eight senior clubs in Kerry. The Killarney Garda National School 7 A Side tkes place on Friday 16th June at 9.30am. with 16 schools taking part including Rathmore, Scoil Mhuire Killorglin, Kilcummin

Coolick, Loreto, Barraduff, Rathmore, Kilmurry, Gaelscoil, Loughitane, Lissivigeen, Glenbeigh, Kenmare, Faha, St.Olivers Fossa, and Monastery.

Good Start to the State Exams

C tudents at the three secondary schools in Killarney gave the Ithumbs up on Wednesday following their first exam in the Junior and Leaving Certificate State examinations.

With the exams currenty underway the HSE are encouraging students to spot the signs of stress and to know how to manage anxiety related to their exams. Stress levels can be higher than usual around exam time. While a bit of stress can help you to stay motivated and focused, too much can be unhelpful.

Mark Smyth, Senior Clinical Psychologist, HSE says, "Exam time can be an anxious, stressful and potentially overwhelming experience.

Remember, test taking anxiety is normal, and because anxiety is an emotion it will pass if you give it time. The more you fight it the longer it will last. As the phrase goes, "If you see a wave coming, grab a surfboard." He has also provided some tips on how best to manage exam stress: SLEEP: Getting a good night's sleep is the best thing you can do to help you perform well in exams and stay focused during study. EAT: Try to eat regularly and stay hydrated. Continuing the car analogy, a car won't run without petrol.







EXERCISE: Regular exercise can help to relieve some of the stress buildup and improve your mood.

DOWNTIME: Make time for some fun, it's not only allowed, it's recommended.

POST-MORTEMS: Dwelling on what has already happened will only mess with your head.

Remember exams don't define you as a person - we're all more interesting and important than a grade on an exam.



Mad Max on a collision course with the Bees

Killarney's Bee Aware campaign by the council got a bit of a doing this Bikefest weekend - just days before the new national 'Leave no Trace campaign to protect public green areas.

Kerry County Council is 'aware of the issue and will be raising the matter with the organisers' they have stated in relation to the extensive campaing and caravaning that took place on the public green area of the N71 this weekend.

The carefully protected stretch between Flesk Bridge and all the way to the Lake Hotel to allow ox-eye daisies, clover, orchids, and other insect friendly plants in the central long grass had all been flattened by Friday late afternoon.

Dozens of camps, cars, tents, campervans, vans and motorbikes were parked up onto the green area, missing the trees by inches. Some of the camps and vans extended onto the pedestrian/jarvey road for the whole weekend.

It was like a scene out of Mad Max.

And not a council sign in sight!

The 1979 Mad Max Movies with its motley crew of clapped out trucks, vans, and bikes as the world ran out of oil had a cult following. But the world has changed radically since the days of Mad Max. Many of us have fallen out of love with the combustion engine, no matter how custom made.

Most of us now have a renewed sense of the value of wild flowers and of reigning in the carbon in a desperate last ditch effort to save what is left.

It is not just the farmers who have to change the way we do things - we all do. Even the tourist industry.

The question has to be asked too: can tranquil Killarney, which promotes itself more and more on the national park and conservation and biodiversity efforts, continue to devote the nicest two weekends of the year - May and Whit - to sucking diesel and roaring engines?

Aside from that, it seems a shame that all that effort for the bees and the environment on such a key road in Killarney on the way to the national park is not policed by Kerry County Council on weekends like this.

Tribute to Michael Viney from Killarney gets prominence

Sticking with appreciation of the environment, a letter from former Killarney councillor Michael Gleeson and his wife Kathleen was given prominence in The Irish Times last

week. It attributed a love of nature and of gardening to the late journalist Michael Viney, whose Another Life column in the Irish Times ran for half a century and whose death occurred on May 30th.

'As we observe our 2023 vegetable garden progress, we



are grateful to our almost acre,' the Gleesons wrote, detailing their wildflower section, and the buzzing of bees in neighbours' hives.

'His weekly column has inspired us and many more to try and live in harmony with bountiful nature,' they wrote.

It was a lovely tribute and was doubtless selected for publication from hundreds submitted.

British born Viney was one of a wave of people who flocked to this country in the 1970s, many of them settling in the remotest parts - especially Kenmare in Kerry, west Clare, deepest Mayo and south Galway. They came here in horror of the monoculture which had swept over most of Europe since the end of the second world war. Ireland shortly after it joined the EU still had mixed farms and a love of nature. We have lost so much since. But now Europe is returning to its senses and on any occasion I visit France

I see nature returning in force. In the most agricultural of areas, there are and more wildflowers from cowslips to red clovers; the hare crosses the stubble and the cuckoo calls loudly and the swift has returned in strength. We have done the reverse and we seem to be hell bent in continuing on this route, judging by the resistance to rewetting. Viney's was a lone and a very brave early voice which saw value in what we had

Who may sit where in the new outdoor dining area in Killarney?

Who sits where in the new dining out area? The public is confused.

There is no doubt the Kenmare place is now 'the' area in Killarney. A Mediterranean

ambience has been created. It is like the Cours Mirabeau in Aix en Provence. And it is packed to the rafters. It should be, as it is beautiful and it cost enough - probably up to Euro 700,000 all in.

From the off, the council conceded there was a lot of tweaking to be done. The new plants in front are a great addition. There is need now for shade on sunny days.

There may be more to be done around the seating particularly.

It may be time to get the message straight that while this is an area for the public - they can't really sit where they like.

Many people thought that if we bought buns from High street and coffee from Plunkett and a beer from College Street we could sit wherever we want in the new outdoor dining space paid for by the public. But actually the council tells me this is not the case and we can only do this on the yellow seats in the centre where there is a kind of no-man's land.

This all arises after one couple who bought a drink in one premises on Saturday night were told by a waitress from another they really shouldn't be sitting where they were. The couple didn't budge and rightly so. Apparently the yellow seats are public, the other colours are premises specific. There are stickers on some tables. It all sounds a bit too complicated.

Maybe more signage or division is needed.

JOHN HEALY FROM HEALY INSURANCE ON WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT INSURANCE FOR EVENTS

It's the time of year when festivals, concerts, fun days and a variety of other summer events take place around the country.

What kind of insurance cover should be in place?

If you are organising a public event you should have Public Liability Insurance in place. Public liability Insurance covers your legal liability in the event that you are negligent and required to pay compensation for bodily injuries or damage to third party property in the course of the event. The limit of indemnity options would usually be €2.6 Million and €6.5 Million. All state owned lands or events in conjunction with local authorities will insist on the limit of €6.5 Million.

Volunteers can be included under your liability. Employers Liability Insurance covers your legal liability in the event that you are negligent and required to pay compensation for bodily injuries to a volunteer and/or employee.

Cancellation Insurance would cover the loss of revenue should the event be cancelled due to for example; non-appearance of a major act. Directors and Officers cover may be advisable for larger events.

The level of insurance cover recommended will

depend on the event taking place. A festival over a few days or with varied entertainment options will be underwritten differently to a coffee morning or a quiz.

A robust risk management structure is crucial. This structure should include health and safety statements and risk assessments, induction for stewards, first aid measures, manual handling, personal protective clothing, liaison with local authorities and Gardai, cleaning plans, car park plans, fire safety procedures, and of course managing movement of people. Any third party sub-contractors should have their own insurance policies in place with specific indemnities provided to the event organisers.







MAKE THE MOST OF THE OPPORTUNITY TO DO WELL IN THE 2023 STATE EXAMS



RFLIFE

After a long wait, there is tangible relief that the state exams are finally underway. Like many important milestones, the anticipation is often worse than the event itself. The first morning was the most nerve racking as it involved some formality. However, once the question papers were distributed and the candidates warmed to their task, the tension of the morning quickly evaporated.

COMPULSORY

The exam timetable mainly prioritises compulsory subjects during the early days of the exam. As the exams progress into the second and subsequent weeks, the optional subjects are nicely spaced out allowing for study days. But, as they continue until Tuesday, 27th June, it's important to treat the state exams more like a marathon than a sprint. After sitting a few subjects, candidates now realise that exams test not only your knowledge but also your concentration and ability to utilise every available minute. So, stay in exam mode until you leave the exam venue after the very last subject.

FOCUSSED

Depending on the subjects being sat, the entire exam will conclude reasonably early for some candidates. Others will have to stay focussed until the very last subject on the final day. Irrespective of when you are due to finish the exam, keep in mind that you have prepared diligently for the exam. This is what you have been waiting for. Make the most of the opportunity to do well. Reap the rewards of years of study by performing to your optimum ability in each subject.

REVIEW

After three busy days of exams, the coming weekend will bring welcome relief and give candidates a chance to relax a little, to take

stock and plan ahead. Spend as little time as possible on post-mortems. Review your tactical approach over the first week. If you are totally satisfied with your strategy before, during and after each subject then you need change very little. Focus on next week's subjects and forget about the subjects that have already been examined. Your entire concentration must be on the subjects still to be examined.

LEISURE

The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries for the second week and to do some subject revision. Take some active leisure to burn off the residual tension of the first week. It will help you to sleep soundly and to maintain the levels of stamina, endurance and staying power needed for the challenges ahead. Avail of a few good nights' rest, which is essential for alertness. Resist the temptation to study late into the night. Confine your study to daylight hours, enjoy your period of exercise and go to bed early. Defer any latenight socialising until your exam is over. Keep your fluid intake high to avoid dehydration but be moderate in your use of artificial stimulants such as tea and coffee. Keep a clear head by abstaining from alcohol during the exam period.

QUALITY

Concentrate on subjects being examined next week. Prioritise your revision according to the timetable. Go over the tips and predictions that have been made for the subjects you are sitting during week two. Use your study days well and study wisely by not cramming. At this stage the quality of your revision is more important than the length of time you spend at it. On the evening before each paper spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts are fresh in your mind.

POSITIVE

You are off to a great start after the first week.

Maintain your discipline during week two. Keep a good thought for yourself and stay positive. Have confidence in your ability to do well in your second week's papers. You are now well settled in and rising to the challenge. Deal with each subject as it comes and by this time next week it may all be behind you.

CHECKLIST

- Stay in exam mode until all of your subjects are completed
- Reap the rewards of years of study by performing to your optimum ability
- During the weekend, review your tactical approach to the first week
- If you are satisfied with your strategy, then you need change very little
- Focus your attention on next week's subjects
- Prioritise your revision according to the timetable
- The weekend provides an opportunity to revise for second week papers
- Get out for a few hours of active exercise
- Defer late night socialising until your exam is over
- Keep your fluid intake high to avoid dehydration in warm weather
- Keep a good thought for yourself and stay positive

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.





HOW TO TREAT EYE ALLERGIES

Allergic conjunctivitis is commonly : caused by sensitivity to grass and tree pollen, dust mites or animals. It is far more common in those with a history of allergies or those who have a family history of allergies.

Allergic conjunctivitis usually causes pink or red itchy eyes. The eyes are normally watery and other allergy symptoms such as sneezing and a runny nose may be present.

The seasonal type of allergic conjunctivitis will vary with the time of year and weather conditions. Those with more general allergies, such as an allergy to dust mites, will most likely have symptoms throughout the year.

TREATMENT

You can treat allergic conjunctivitis bv:

- Avoiding the cause of the allergy (if possible)
- · Using cold compresses (such as clean cotton wool balls soaked in cold water) to soothe the eyes

Avoiding rubbing your eyes as this will make the symptoms worse There is also a range of medicines that may help. Some are available over the counter at the pharmacy and other stronger medicines need a prescription.

Mast-cell stabiliser eye drops such as sodium cromoglicate (Opticrom) do not work straight away. Instead, they take a few days to start to work. These drops are good if you know when you are likely to develop an allergy and so you can use them to prevent symptoms

Antihistamine eye drops such as antazoline sulphate (Otrivine-Antistin) provide a more immediate effect. They won't prevent an allergic reaction, but instead treat the symptoms once the allergy has started.

Antihistamine tablets work in the same way as the eye drops, but will also treat other allergy symptoms such as a runny nose and sneezing that is caused by the allergy.

You should not wear contact lenses if your symptoms are severe or if you have been told that your cornea is affected. Do not put drops in your eyes while wearing contact lenses.

Remember:

- · Avoid rubbing your eyes, as this may make your symptoms worse
- Use a cold compress to soothe your eye Wearing glasses or sunglasses may help to shield your eyes from pollen







KERRY SEE OFF CORK BUT DON'T SILENCE DOUBTERS

Group Stage Game Two: Kerry 1-14 Cork 0-15

A good result, and we needed it. A good performance? Decent in patches, but you'd have to say unconvincing overall. Cork were actually slightly the better team at most things, with just one fatal flaw - conversion rate. Quite simply, they left too many good chances behind them, where Kerry scored fifteen out of eighteen. Brian Hurley is a superb forward who finished with 0-6, but he left at least four decent chances, ones I've seen him kick before, after him. Cork kicked nine points from play, the bench provided four of them late on. Kerry didn't miss much; that was the difference.

Seán O'Shea, much maligned after a poor display against Mayo, got the ball rolling with an early free. David Clifford had Seán Powter dropping back as a screen in front of him (a mistake by Cork to me, robbing forward Peter to pay defensive Paul), but it didn't stop the big man slotting over after a good pass from Paul Geaney. Chris Óg Jones kicked Cork's opening score neatly but faded out of things after that; I was surprised that Cork didn't look to the quality of their bench sooner. Seán O'Shea made a nice overlap run to pick off his second score after another great Geaney pass. There were a few calls for Paul to lose his starting jersey after last year's final and the early rounds of this year's league - Lord, what fools these mortals be. Brian O'Driscoll replied for Cork.

Diarmuid O'Connor made a superb catch and sent in to David Clifford, who diverted it (probably accidentally) into Adrian Spillane's path. Adrian isn't known as a high scorer, but he is never going to refuse an invitation like that either. David Clifford was being....well, he was being David Clifford, and Cork couldn't handle him. He popped the ball out to his brother and Paudie swung over a beauty. Gavin White made a trademark burst and Seán O'Shea kicked his fourth point.

Powter, now working as a focal point for the forwards, made an incisive run and pulled the trigger. It took a wicked deflection but went just over the crossbar - it could have gone under. David Clifford replied from the '45 metre line. There are only a tiny handful of players who would even take on a shot like that in modern football, and football is the poorer for it. Brian Hurley slotted his second free before a great catch by Dara Moynihan saw Paudie Clifford notch his second point.

Half-time Kerry 0-9 Cork 0-5. Kerry were good value for their lead, but Cork had been a bit wasteful.

Brian Hurley trimmed the gap on the restart. Ruairí Deane and Brian O'Driscoll combined to tee up Killian O'Hanlon – his piledriver skinned over the bar. Back came Cork again, but this time Shane Ryan rose high to stop a point. A direct run by Dara Moynihan saw Seán O'Shea open Kerry's second half account - Seán was much quieter overall in the second half. Seán Powter finished a good move with a score and Brian Hurley added a free after Chris Óg Jones was fouled. Kerry fluffed a kick-out, but Jones fouled Shane Ryan to give us an outlet. Cork were getting very much on top, hurting Kerry by direct running - did the substitution of Adrian Spillane after a knock give them that bit more room? I'm not sure. Our tackling wasn't great either - David Gough awarded 29 frees to Cork and 16 to Kerry over the course of the

Then came the game's defining moment. Was it controversial? If you listen to all the commentators and pundits and the Cork manager afterwards, it was the most contentious decision since Seamus Aldridge awarded a free against Paddy Cullen almost a half century ago. If you ignore all the slightly desperate attempts to add a bit of sulphur to the conversation and instead actually look at what happened with a little bit of cop on, then no. It wasn't controversial in the slightest. Paul Geaney gathered after a good run by Tom

O'Sullivan and was bearing down on goal when Sean Powter unceremoniously reached out a hand and basically clotheslined him. Was he outside the square? Yes. But that doesn't matter - since 2021, the rule is that the sanction is the award of a penalty and a sin binning when a player deprives an opponent of a goal-scoring opportunity by committing a black-card foul in football. Did Seán Powter clearly and intentionally pull down Paul Geaney? Yup. 100%. Was it a clear goalscoring opportunity? Absolutely. There were two other defenders, but they were not reaching Paul in time to stop a close range shot, and he had the option of squaring it to a completely free Paudie Cliford as well. It's not a guaranteed goal by any means, but it is quite obviously an opportunity that was denied by the commission of a black card offence. Correct call.

Sean initially looked like he was going to take it, but instead David stepped up, sent the keeper the wrong way, and sent it straight to the bottom corner. 1-11 to 0-10. David Clifford kicked another score. Dara Moynihan picked up a yellow card - it could have been black. Cork left two scorable chances from frees behind

Brian Hurley and David Clifford exchanged frees. Four points in it. David from play. Eoghan McSweeney brought instant energy for Cork and landed a point with his first chance. Brian Hurley added a free and there was just three points between them again. Sherlock, like McSweeney enervated the Rebels on his introduction, and kicked a point. Should they have started? Most of the Cork supporters seemed to think so, I'd expect them to start against Mayo. Two points in it again. I'm sure some people were thinking about 2020 and an antipodean Mark Keane. My memory goes back a little further. I was thinking of a certain Seamus Darby – that particular story still comes with an R rating.

David Clifford - who else relieved the pressure with a score. Sherlock came racing back in, though, and launched a rocket that flashed over the bar. Another let-off.

Tom O'Sullivan restored the goal gap. Eoghan McSweeney pulled one back, well-executed but not the right decision. Cork needed a goal but ran out of time. I'd have worried if there was more sand in the glass. It has to be said. Take out the Cliffords, and we are starting to look like a very ordinary team.

MUCH IMPROVED MINORS LIFT MUNSTER CROWN

Munster Minor Final: Kerry 2-10 Cork 0-11

Kerry reversed their earlier defeat to Cork with a decent – not spectacular, but very decent display in Austin Stack Park last Friday night. There was quite a decent crowd in the circumstances, considering that Dr. Crokes, Rahillys, Killarney Legion, and Kilcummin all had county league games at the same time and Kerry FC were away to Finn Harps. A bit awkward, but basically unavoidable, given the crowded sporting schedules these days, mostly motivated by monetisation but also, I suspect a reaction to the enforced activity of the covid pandemic.

The best thing about this victory was the marked improvement in performance. Essentially Cork were much faster than Kerry out of the blocks on their last meeting, with Darragh Sheedy in particular proving to be a real thorn in our sides. It was a phenomenal display by the Bantry Blues man. This time, although he played his heart out and gave it everything, he never really got away from Gearóid Evans long enough to do real damage. Kerry's defence in general were rock solid and Cork couldn't really thread any inroads. Instead, it was Kerry's full back, Austin Stacks' Ben Murphy, who got time and space to slice through Cork's rearguard repeatedly, and that paid big dividends as the game went on. At the other end, Kerry were a bit too reliant on Paddy Lane to finish off moves early on but, as has been the pattern in their previous games, grew into the game and were

well on top through the second half.

Darragh Clifford picked off an early Cork score. Dara Sheedy made a good steal and found Denis O'Mullane, but he over-carried in the danger zone. Timothy Cullinane fired over point number two.

Significantly, Kerry were already beginning to take control of midfield, and a foul on Daniel Kirby saw Lane open Kerry's account from a free. Kerry won the kick-out and Dara Hogan had a chance, but took a bit too much out of it. Denis O'Mullane won a Cork free but Sheedy couldn't steer it home. A fantastic run by Pádraig Moynihan saw Tomás Kennedy level matters. Evan Boyle was absolutely gobbling up Cork kick-outs - Ben Murphy was subsequently named the official man of the match and certainly was fantastic, but my vote went to Evan Boyle (I thought Odhran Foley was Cork's best player). Seán Ó Cuinn nudged Kerry in front after a great catch by Daniel Kirby, but Darragh Clifford set up Dara Sheedy for an equaliser and the effective O'Mullane won a free kicked over by Billy Curtin. Seán Coakley showed great skill in a confined space to put Cork ahead by 0-5 to 0-3.

Oisín Healy had a shot deflected, with James Hoare's '45 narrowly wide. Paddy Lane slotted a free. Cork chanced a fast and risky kick-out, got turned over on the sideline, and Ben Murphy sent an exquisite pass to the lurking Paddy Lane, who dummied a perfect finish to the net. In fairness to Cork, they responded well with points from Timothy Cullinane and Odhran Foley, who brilliantly caught the kick-out, but Coakley's finish was wide – Coakley had switched with Sheedy in an effort to lift both players. Just before the break, Murphy handpassed neatly to Dara Hogan for goal number two.

Half-time Kerry 2-4 Cork 0-7

Timothy Cullinane launched a high ball down on the Kerry square at the start of the second half, but Gearóid Evans made a salmon leap to fetch safely. Cork came hard and fast at Kerry, most notable with David O'Leary blasting a stinger missile that crashed back off the underside of the Kerry crossbar and out, a lucky escape. O'Leary did pick off a good point. Coakley and Sheedy combined to put in impressive sub James O'Leary, but James Hoare made himself big and saved with his foot. Coakley set up Sheedy for a point and Timothy Cullinane squared matters with his third point. Cork had all of the momentum now; there was only team in it in that third quarter and it wasn't us. Again though, Kerry had taken their two goal chances; Cork had left theirs behind them. Games very rarely have such a simple explanation, but this one did.

Kerry caught a break to reverse the flow of play, a careless foul on Ben Murphy allowing Paddy Lane to kick a handy free. Kerry once again won the kick-out and Tomás Kennedy kicked over a great score. A foul on Paudie Fitzgerald allowed Paddy to extend his tally. Stephen Gannon made a lung-bursting run but took it too far. Cork's Oier O'Callaghan won a free for Dara Sheedy to point, but the tide was really flowing against them now. Paudie Fitzgerald stretched the gap to four points and Stephen

Gannon fisted over to make it 2-9 to 0-11. The clock was running heavily against Cork now. Late on, Aodhna Ó Beaglaíoch sent a long ball into Pa Walsh, who had no-one between him and goal. Frank Hurley got close enough to haul him down, possibly inspired by Munster's recent URC victory - it certainly had more to do with rugby than gaelic football. It was an obvious black card, an easy finish for Paddy Lane. An unfortunate ending to a game where Kerry didn't hit huge heights but showed a lot of progress on an upward curve. They'll need to be sharper against Kildare – certainly that third quarter malaise was troubling - but this win will have given them more confidence. Cork have a tough task against Dulin, but it would not be a huge surprise if Kerry and Cork were to meet again down the line.

STATE OF PLAY

Group One

Mayo saw off Louth by just a single point. That's a small bit flattering to the Wee County, though, as Mayo were five points up late on and never really looked in trouble. They didn't reproduce the intensity of the Kerry game and didn't need to, but a late 1-1 left the door ajar and Louth had a chance to snatch a draw. There's a lesson there. McHale Park looked fairly threadworn. Mayo spent a fortune on a fairly isolated Centre of Excellence; I wouldn't consider it money well spent.

Group Two

At the start of the year, Kerry were my favourites to win the All Ireland. Maybe there was a touch of hubris. Regardless, that pendulum has now swung in Galway's favour. They didn't overexert themselves here but always looked like they were holding a gear in reserve. Fair enough, Westmeath put up a great battle and it was Ray Connellan's dismissal that finally left a gap for the Tribesmen to pull away and they did so in style. The introduction of Comer raised a big cheer – I'm a lot more afraid of Comer than Walsh later on, if Kerry do actually have a 'later

on'.

Tyrone and Armagh. Jaysus, there's no love lost there! Two genuinely great football teams, and capable of much more flair than they are credited with. But indiscipline is definitely a problem for Northern teams. They would be better off bridling that passion a bit. This game turned on the dismissal of Rian O'Neill, and it was fully deserved. For me, this is one of the most talented players of the modern era (even though I can't understand why Armagh tend to drop him deep behind the shooting lines) and he needs to ignore the indulgence of trench warfare. That said, Niall Morgan was much the busier keeper and Armagh could have had a hat-trick. Both Tyrone and Armagh will be very tough to beat when the chips are down. Tyrone have yet to have McCurry (he was good here) and Canavan hit peak form, and those are cutting edges that I fear. The All Ireland champions will have a Canavan, a Comer, an O'Neill, a Con O'Callaghan, or a David Clifford. I'm not sure that Mayo have one shooter like that, but O'Connor could have a big say yet.

Group Three

Dublin saw off Kildare with relative comfort, with Con O'Callaghan leading the way. Kildare just can't seem to put a full seventy minute performance together. Dublin weren't necessarily convincing themselves, but give McCaffrey and Kilkenny a head of steam and they are starting to look like a serious prospect, especially as they are virtually certain to skip that 'pre quarter-final' energy-sapping nonsense.

Roscommon were much maligned after playing keep-ball for 77 consecutive passes last week against Dublin, 19 of them to their own goalkeeper. Of course I don't like watching it, no-one does, but how different is it from other team's style of play nowadays? Keep-ball and mass defence is crucial, and Kerry do it as much as anyone, so everybody chill out. There's a little element of snobbery detectable that recalls the late nineteenth century when sport was exclusively for the upper classes. Roscommon, those down-to-earth commoners, haven't the firepower of the big boys, but they have the same amount of heart. As you can tell, I have a soft spot for them. They did open the throttle against Sligo, who would realistically be in the Taillteann Cup but for a lucky Connaught draw. As the Sem and Kerry U20s know, though, Sligo could well be a coming force in the next few years.

Group Four

Monaghan saw off Clare in a match being widely praised for long distance shooting overcoming the blanket defence. Look, I only saw the highlights, but it sounds to me that two teams were willing to give each other a bit of space; you won't get that against the bigger guns. Not that it will matter to Clare, who bow out of contention gracefully. Monaghan are a genuine enigma to me, a weird combination of brilliance and mediocrity. You can never be sure which Monaghan will show up. God help us, it must be like raising a teenager.

Donegal showed a bit of the old fire against

the Ulster champions, with Oisín Gallen really making a name for himself, but Derry got in for three goals against a porous defence in the second half and it could have been more. Good to see that Donegal have stabilised from their anarchy during the League, but there is still a gaping Michael Murphy-sized hole. That's the long and short

FAI FUNDING

The FAI have launched an ambitious €863 million wishlist to completely overhaul the football infrastructure of the country, 80% of it from the Government. I say 'ambitious'; I could have chosen other words. This is the organisation that launched an extremely illtimed broadside at the Government recently, outgoing chairman Roy Barrett complaining about the funding to racing, GAA, and rugby. I have a lot of time for Barrett, one of the very, very few to stand up to John Delaney in his time, but if that was an attempt to pressure the Government, it was a disaster. Quite simply, the public reaction to his missive was raised eyebrows. Don't mind outcry; it got absolutely no support, and that's what counts when it comes to Government funding. People haven't forgotten that the FAI, the same organisation that is still a whopping €62 million in debt, had to be bailed out by that self-same Government (as Minister for Sport Thomas Byrne quickly pointed out) once it turned out that their accounts were slightly greater works of fiction than the Harry Potter series. A lot of people read Rowan and Tighe's best selling 'Champagne Football'. Asking now for €690 in government funds, including 20% from local authorities and, bizarrely, health bodies who are already creaking under pressure, is a kite than ain't

going to fly. This was a mistake. I suspect that it's not a coincidence that Sports Ireland have pressed pause on an separate application for €550 million for Womens' National League clubs, following on from the rejection last November of €5 million for a Centre of Excellence in Glanmire that would host Cork City FC (they have never owned Turner's Cross). I don't have a big issue with raising the betting tax from 2% to 3%. I'm fine with it - it was 5% for many years without much issue. But it would only induce a greater switch to online sports gambling (originally spearheaded by our own Paddy Power, copying Asian casino models) and Oisín McConville is one of the many sportsmen who have spoken eloquently about the risks that entails. League of Ireland facilities are in a woeful state, but that's as a result of decades, literally decades, of neglect by the FAI. That's improving, with crowds starting to regularly hit 1500 plus this season and sometimes over 4000 - Shamrock Rovers are pulling home gates of 6000. Cork City and Dundalk could hit that in their heydays almost a decade ago, but other clubs were rarely topping 700. Back in the fifties and sixties, League of Ireland matches regularly attracted crowds of 20,000 plus, but that was in spite of the FAI, not because of them. The Government might, just might, have more sympathy for direct club applications.

You'll catch more flies with honey than vinegar. Next week will see Stephen Kenny face into the most vital game Ireland have played in years – believe me, the game against Gibraltar is meaningless if we don't take something off Greece. Then you have the Irish womens' team (who have an interesting history with the FAI themselves) playing in World Cup Finals. That was the chance to load your guns and get public support. This most definitely wasn't.

THE OLD ORDER CHANGES...

Time and tide wait for no man. For most of my lifetime, Man City was the poorer side of that city's soccer support. But last week's FA Cup

Final didn't feel like any changing of the guard. That happened long ago, as soon as a flood of oil money came pouring in to the blue moon. That result felt like an inevitability. City are lovely to watch at actually playing the game. Haaland may take all the headlines, and he is brilliant, but no-one, not Shearer, not Cole, not Henry ever had that kind of service. De Bruyne is a genuine contender for the best I have ever seen - neither Ronaldo nor Messi were ever as selfless in play. You can't get away from the 115 charges laid against them, but the idea that soccer authorities who were okay with the World Cup going to Qatar are deluding themselves and we all know it. That will drag on for years before a token fine, just like before. Man United and Arsenal can actually be delighted with their seasons upward trajectories, while Chelsea and Everton are ducking real issues by blaming managers.

Messi has stepped away from PSG, another plaything of an oil sheikh, to actually take a profitable retirement in the Middle East. Man City, in fairness, did invest in community and infrastructure. PSG didn't, I have a certain schadenfreude about the lack of success for Messi, Mbappe, and Neymar there.

Despite Messi's humble demeanour, there was a certain likeable honesty for me about Zlatan Ibrahamovich's arrogance. He always produced the goods for every club he lined out for as well. One of the all-time greats, even if he knew it. Shane Long and Glenn Whelan have also announced their retirements from the game. Two honest soldiers. I had great respect for them. I still believe that Whelan was the underrated midfield glue in a lot of Irish teams.

MIXED WEEKEND FOR KERRY FC

Precious Point On The Road League of Ireland: Finn Harps 0 Kerry FC 0

Kerry FC shipped six goals to Wexford last weekend and hopes can't have been too high with a daunting trip to Donegal to face a team who had a confidence boosting win over a struggling Treaty United. Kerry have more steel in them than is generally acknowledged, though, and came away with a hard-earned and fully deserved point. They had to weather



an early storm, twice clearing off their own line at the last second, but then again Nathan Gleeson was only denied a volleyed goal by great goalkeeping at the other end. 0-0 at the break, and Kerry visibly growing in confidence. Finn Harps were the more dangerous side in the second half, narrowly missing two good chances and Noe Baba (the Cameroon and Mayo native was the star of the 2008 Kennedy Cup, captained Ireland underage, and played professionally in England and Belgium) surprisingly failed to capitalise on a great chance. WHAT TO DO IF YOU'VE BEEN BITTEN:

- Grasp the tick with a tick remover or a fine tipped tweezers as close to the skin as possible.
- Gently but firmly pull the tick upwards.
- Wear white/light coloured clothing to make it easier to spot a tick.
- Wash the bite area and your hands with soap and water and apply an antiseptic to the bite site.

Again there is a large range of different types of window boxes and containers. The most popular ones are the plastic. If it's a plastic window box that you have the first thing you must do is sort out the drainage.

Turn the window box upside down and you will see holes marked out. You can either use a screw driver or a drill to punch out these holes. Turn the box back up and put some small stones or polysterine around the holes. Fill the box with compost and a slow release fertiliser to about half an inch from the top of the box and firm in compost. When choosing the plants for the window box make sure that the taller plants are at the back trailing plants towards the front and medium sized plants for fillers inbetween.

A good example for tall plants at the back of the box would be upright geraniums or upright fuchsias. Good trailing plants for the front of the box would be trailing geraniums or trailing petunias. Other examples of good trailing plants for fillers lobelia, bacopa and bidens.

When you box is planted, water in plants well and don't

put into position for a few days. Remember that all window sills slope so when your trailing plants start to grow you will need something to hold you box in position.




