

# WOMAN RESCUED FROM CARRAUNTOOHIL DURING TREACHEROUS CONDITIONS

Kerry Mountain Rescue Team were tasked to assist a female climber who got into difficuty on Hag's Glen on Carrauntoohil this week.

The rescue took place during a nationwide weather alert for ice and snow and weather conditions were so severe that it was unsafe to send a helicoptor to bring her to safety. The woman was part of a group of six climbers who undertook the climb in treacherous conditions.

Following the call out at approximately 5pm on Wednesday evening, she was eventually brought to safety in the early hours of Thursday morning at approximately 1.30am. The resuce took place in extremely challenging conditions by the brave members of Kerry Mountain Rescue team. The woman did not require any medical assistance following the rescue.

# HOTELS STEER A COURSE FOR FURTHER TOURISM RECOVERY

Securing a long-term sustainable recovery in tourism is centre stage today as hoteliers gather in Killarney for the Irish Hotels Federation's (IHF) 85th Annual Conference. Speaking at the opening of the conference today, IHF President Denyse Campbell said that tourism has witnessed unprecedented upheavals over the past three years with a number of challenges still remaining.

"While we saw a welcome uplift in tourism activity during the last 6 months of 2022, significant uncertainty persists this year in relation to the global economy – particularly given the challenges we face around the cost of doing business, high levels of inflation, increasing interest rates and an ongoing cost-of-living crisis across key overseas markets", Ms. Campbell said.

A particular concern for hoteliers and the wider tourism industry is the outlook for bookings from Great Britain given the very challenging economic environment this market is facing. Traditionally Ireland's largest source of overseas visitors, Great Britain continues to face very significant economic headwinds, and this is having an impact on the outlook and levels of forward bookings. According to recent industry research carried out by the IHF, 60% of hoteliers report that forward bookings from Great Britain are still down on pre-Covid levels. The rest of Europe is also challenging while the prospects for North America are brighter this year. Despite lingering economic uncertainty, hoteliers remain focused on

recovery and building on progress made in the second half of 2022 with 54% of hotels and guesthouses planning to increase employment levels this year. Ms Campbell says: "At the heart of every successful hotel and guesthouse are its people, and supporting and developing them is key to our long-term success. We are encouraging people of all ages to consider a career in the hotel sector. There are an enormous variety of career paths and training opportunities that are constantly evolving in our sector. It is an ideal time given the wide range of exciting options available for people at every stage of their working lives."

Ms Campbell notes that, since the lifting of restrictions in 2022, the industry has achieved a remarkable restoration in employment with over 250,000 livelihoods now supported by tourism businesses throughout the country including 60,000 employed directly by Irish hotels and questhouses.

Meanwhile 85% of hotels are planning to invest in refurbishment and additional capital expenditure over the coming year – making up for lost ground since the beginning of the pandemic in 2020. Ms Campbell noted that sustainability is a major focus for the sector with 67% of hotels planning to invest in sustainability initiatives this year while a further 25% are actively exploring options for potential investment in this area. Key priorities include renewable energy and heating, energy efficiency, retrofitting of buildings, waste reduction and water conservation.

work. In 2022 the Department of Health commissioned a "Menopause in the Workplace" survey which revealed one third of women in Ireland have considered quitting their jobs during menopause. To avoid this exodus of highly

skilled staff real solutions needed to be put in place and Dr Mary Mc Caffrey is leading this change in the workplace.

Gynaecology services at the Scotia Clinic support women throughout their reproductive life, this can be from the early years if someone is experiencing heavy periods, with many teenagers being helped with this condition or those who are experiencing pelvic pain. Dr Mc Caffrey truly believes when it comes to women's healthcare no one should be suffering or have their everyday life disrupted by pain or discomfort. For too many years women suffered unnecessarily in silence, but by taking control of your health and working with

the expert team at the Scotia Clinic this will give you the reassurance you have been seeking.

# Mayor of Killarney - still chasing that great title

The possibility of a mayor of Killarney rather than the official title 'chair' or 'cathaoirleach' has again been raised.

Donal Grady, at the quarterly meeting of Killarney MD - thankfully back in the town hall - said it was 'a disgrace' Killarney has not been given the status of mayor, given its importance internationally. Killarney's population has also increased hugely.

'The only mayoral status is Tralee. It is time we changed that,' Donal said.

The current 'chair' Niall Kelleher referred to the threshold of towns with a population of 20,000, but said that any town / district with a population of over 15,000 should be considered.

Just a fortnight ago the Senate was told a new bill for the direct election of a mayor of Limerick would open the door to 'a directly elected mayor of the administrative area of any local authority.'

That provision has since been rowed back upon - but we will keep an eye on that chamber too.

The question of the mayoral title for Killarney was raised by Bobby O'Connell, then incoming chair of Killarney in 2015.

"A town of Killarney's international standing in tourism needs a mayor to welcome visitors and attend the many important and formal functions in the town," he said. "I believe visitors expect to see a mayor and the term, 'chairman', does not have the same impact," Bobby said.

Bobby is correct. Mayor, an international title means greater or leading citizen. Those from Germany and France, not to mention the more literal-minded US citizens may well expect to be greeted by four legs and a cushion when they are told 'the chair' of Killarney will meet them.

# Killarney Housing: Crokes' Old field briefly eyeballed in frustration

The housing crisis in Killarney is beyond comprehension. This column openly asks why housing cannot get the same attention history or even far off wars do? If we could only harness the energy and passion of the past two weeks about the Civil War in Kerry, then we might end the greatest scandal of our own time. I have no doubt the stress being endured by decent people, their children and indeed their parents is leading to serious ill health.

This is as much an atrocity as any war anywhere.

In frustration at the lack of progress, the Dr Crokes' Old Pitch itself was in the mix for

Legion, but it won't work,' Niall shot back.

On a more serious note, placing the football field into the mix, even half seriously, was a measure of the frustration in Killarney.

The glaring example of the empty St Finan's was used by Maura Healy-Rae to slam the lack of action. 'It would be unthinkable that St Finan's should slip through our hands,' she said.

Maura was tired of soundbites and pictures in papers and nothing following, she said.

Finan's has been offered to the council by the HSE, Housing Director Martin O'Donoghue confirmed. But the listed building would cost too much - Euro 100 million plus fees of many millions.

The housing chief and the chief executive Moira Murrell are now meeting with the Land Development Agency on it.

The council are also likely to be offered the District and Columbanus buildings when they are vacant.

Meanwhile, any family being evicted in Killarney now is being told to go to a hostel in Tralee for the homeless . Because there is nothing in their hometown where their young children are at school and where they have jobs.

I spoke with the mother in one Killarney family with three young children who has this week been asked to do just that - go to Tralee. I can't help thinking if these were refugees in Killarney with five months being moved we would all be out protesting at the injustice of taking children out of school. And the cameras would be there and there would be marches!

# Very Moving Commemoration at Countess Bridge

This column last week thought it might be the end of the mention of the very painful Civil War and felt there was too much attention

particularly on one event in Tralee. But the very moving commemoration at Countess Bridge Killarney that took place last Saturday afternoon deserves full credit.

The dignified remembrance began with concelebrated mass at the Church of the Resurrection, attended by around 250 people.

Prayers were for the repose of the souls of the four killed at the bridge, Jerimiah O'Donoghue, New Street, Stephen Buckley, Tiernaboul, Daniel Donoghue Lacka, Kilcummin and Tim Murphy, Kilbrean, Kilcummin and also for the sole survivor Tadgh Coffey.

Chief celebrant of the mass which was mostly in Irish, Canon Tom Looney prayed also said for 'the Tailor Sugrue from Tralee' who had been kind to the badly beaten men during their ordeal in the Great Southern and was shot the following day.

'We forgive, but we do not forget,' Canon Looney said, recalling the words of John Joe Sheehy at Ballyseedy in 1959.

Eilish Coffey who works in Bricín, reflected on how if her grandfather had not escaped then she would not be alive.

A wreath was laid by Mary O'Donoghue, relative of the deceased.

Oliver Daly, grand nephew of Dan Donoghue sang 'Sean Treacy' while a great grand nephew Tomás Houlihan played the national anthem on the accordion.

Later a wreath was laid at the Republican plot.Refreshments were afterwards in the Great Southern Hotel which had been the national army headquarters and from where the men had been removed to their deaths.

# FIFTH YEAR EXAMS DEFERRED AS EDUCATIONALLY UNSOUND

# **DEFERRED**

The plan to examine Leaving Cert Paper 1 in Irish and English at the end of 5th Year from 2024 has been deferred following vociferous opposition from teachers, subject associations and students. On the 29th March last year, the Department of Education announced ambitious plans for a reformed senior cycle curriculum in a document called "Equity and Excellence for All." In order to get the reforms up and running as soon as possible, it was felt that having Paper 1 in both subjects examined in 5th Year would lessen the work load in Leaving Cert year.

# **REFORMS**

The Department of Education saw this as the first step in introducing more ambitious reforms with 40% of marks in all subjects to be awarded for projects or continual assessment marked by teachers. From the outset, the holding of exams in Paper 1 in Irish and English at the end of 5th Year was opposed by the stakeholders.

# **REJECTED**

The ASTI, TUI, Irish and English subject associations were up in arms about the change from the get go. They were loud in their rejection of the plan, which they believed to be flawed, educationally unsound and would increase student stress. They maintained that the syllabi in both Irish and English were designed to be assessed in a student's final school year. They were annoyed that the decision was taken without any consultation with stakeholders. They said it was change for the sake of change, without due consideration for the unintended consequences for students. They demanded that the proposal be withdrawn before it caused stress to students.

# **DISADVANTAGE**

There was concern that the change was retrograde, regressive and would have a detrimental impact on the acquisition of language skills for students. It would particularly disadvantage the roughly 25% of students who either do not have access to,

or who choose not to take up the option of Transition Year. They said that best international practice for learning a language is that oral language, writing, reading and aural skills be taught in tandem. The proposal meant that some of these skills would only be assessed in 5th Year, while other language skills would be assessed in 6th Year. That would adversely affect students and severely hinder language learning.

# **INTERWOVEN**

Language and literature, they said, have been interwoven into teaching and learning by teachers. Integrating these aspects contributes to the development of students' critical thinking and writing skills. For example, English Paper 1 requires that students express themselves through writing, having been exposed to a variety of literature which is assessed in Paper 2. The reforms treated writing and critical thinking as stand-alone courses. There was no evidence that the Department had considered whether this new exam arrangement benefits learning in any way.

# **CONSECUTIVE**

If the proposals had gone ahead, it was likely that Transition Year would have become a pre-5th Year thereby undermining the aims and objectives of that program. Students who went directly from Junior Cycle to 5th Year wouldn't have had a level playing field. They would also be facing into state exams on three consecutive years – Junior Cycle, 5th year and 6th year.

# **MARKING**

The question of when the Irish and English papers would be corrected was also a concern. Would the papers be corrected immediately and results issued to the candidates or withheld for a full year? Either way the whole process would have been very stressful for the young people concerned.

# HOLISTIC

A holistic approach to the Leaving Cert exam is best practice. Build in 40% in for projects and practical exams. Retain 60% for the June exam at the end of 6th Year and forget about written

exams at the end of 5th Year. The Leaving Cert exam has stood the test of time and why fix what isn't broken.

# **WISELY**

The Department of Education has acted wisely in deferring the proposal for Irish and English exams at the end of Fifth Year. The psychological and educational evidence makes a compelling argument for abandoning the proposal altogether.




In the past the connections were left out for the houses so they could connect easily at a later time but this is not going to happen with the Kilcummin scheme unless they agree to the connection fee.





#### **SMOKING AND EYE HEALTH**

Why stopping smoking is one of : central part of the lens. the best steps you can take to protect your vision.

Smoking, and exposure to smoke, significantly increases your chances of developing eye disease and suffering sight loss. It's never too late to benefit from stopping. But the sooner you stop, the better the outcome is likely to be.

#### 1. Age-related macular degeneration (AMD)

AMD is the most common cause of sight loss in Ireland and mainly affects older people. Smokers are up to four times more likely to develop the condition.

#### SUPPORT FOR ST. PATRICK'S DAY PARADE'S

ianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill has welcomed grants in excess of €19,000 to help support and organise St. Patrick's Day Parades in a number of towns and villages around County Kerry. "These Parades are organised by volunteers who put in long ours year after year to make St. Patrick's Day a special occasion for their communities and visitors to their respective areas" said Councillor Cahill. "I am delighted that Kerry County Council has played it's part

by making these allocations through the 2023 Community Support Fund" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor. "This funding is hugely important to all the organising committees and will help ensure that this year's St. Patrick's Day Parades are better than ever" added Councillor Cahill.

A total of €19,150 has been allocated to this year's Parades with Killarney receiving €8,000.

#### "Don't drive Airbnbs out of the market"

Tourist accommodation in Ireland is made up of a mixture of types, that suit different categories of visitors to the different areas of the country. There are Hotels, Guesthouses, Bed & Breakfasts, Houses, Apartments, Hostels, etc, and more recently, Airbnbs.

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill believes that all of these accommodation options are essential to the success of our Tourism Industry and that there should a level playing field for each type of business.

"These are all legitimate business operations, adding value to our tourism product, different potential customers preferring a particular option for themselves, depending on their circumstances. Some may wish to avail of the many additional facilities of a hotel, some less so, without pools, bars, prepared meals etc," stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"I don't agree that different regulations should apply to any option being made available to our visitors, as long as everybody is on the same hymn sheet, providing safe, comfortable accommodation and are complying with the present laws. Tourism provides employment and income for our people and tax returns to the Exchequer" said Councillor Cahill.

"Here in Kerry, it is more visitor accommodation that is required, not less and we should welcome new entrants to a market which I see growing enormously with the opening of facilities, such as the South Kerry Greenway and indeed the North Kerry Greenways. In the case of the South Kerry Greenway it is a widely known fact that a substantial increase in accommodation will be required to service the anticipated hundreds of thousands of additional visitors to the region on an annual basis" said Councillor Cahill.

"Not everyone can afford to get involved in Tourist Accommodation with the traditional forms of Hotel or B&B for example, but the Airbnb model does offer an opening to people to rent one or two rooms or a renovated cottage, etc., Airbnb for most people is just a small additional income of €5,500 to €6,000 per annum, offering flexibility to hosts and visitors" said the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

"The more varied offerings and options we here in Kerry have for our potential visitors, with different levels of holiday budgets, the more people will visit here to sample the delights of our county" said Councillor Cahill. "I believe we must be very careful here in Kerry and that we do not drive Airbnbs out of the market as there will always be a need for short-term lets" added Councillor Cahill.

## Waiting lists continue to grow as Government accused of turning a blind eye to people in need

Despite the promise of more money and better policy making by the Government through the 2022 Waiting List Action Plan, waiting lists continue to grow for Kerry people who are seek cataract surgery and ophthalmology care as was revealed by Deputy Michael Healy Rae TD following a parliamentary question to the Minister for Health.

The Kerry deputy who pioneered the "Bus to Belfast" for cataract surgery in Northern Ireland some five years ago has said,

"This Government has totally turned a blind eye to the people who are in dire need and despite facilitating a bus trip every 6-8 weeks we are making no real difference when it comes to tackling the waiting list despite making a real difference for each individual patient. It is about time that the Minster for Health opens his own eyes to see that there is a way to help people if they even make it better known to people that they can receive cataract surgery in Northern Ireland.

"Of course, we should be looking at our own house first to help the situation but until such time that we catch up, Government need to be more flexible in helping people get treatment and if that means heading to Northern Ireland, than so be in" Deputy Michael Healy Rae commented.

Figures revealed to Deputy Michael Healy Rae show that 837 people from Kerry are waiting for Ophthalmology outpatients (as of the 26th January 2023) with a further 123 waiting for cataract surgery.

"I have been asking the Government for years to look into this with no luck, so I've continued to take buses up to Belfast with the past 5 years. It is a fright that we have to facilitate a bus in the first place but as long as it continues to help people, we will continue the services and appeal to people to let more people in need know about it" Deputy Michael Healy Rae concluded

### **SPORT IRELAND**

This bit might be boring for some of you, sorry about that. But it's important to acknowledge it. I love sport. Judging by the viewing figures, so does pretty much everybody else. There are record attendances at the GAA's National League matches. Over 15,000 people went to Austin Stack Park on a cold and miserable Saturday night to watch Kerry take on an Armagh team with a well-established reputation for defensiveness. Most of them would have watched the Irish rugby team earlier in the day. The League of Ireland believes that for the first time over, over one million people will attend a League of Ireland matchThe biggest watercooler conversation topic last weekend was Liverpool's absolute hammering of a seemingly resurgent Manchester United. I suspect that some of the increased popularity of sport is a deeper appreciation of community activities after lockdown during covid, but that's just a personal theory.

The thing is that there are an awful lot of nuts and bolts that go into making sport happen. From juveniles in every sport in every community, primary and secondary schools all the way up to inter-county and, for the most part, to semi-pro and eventual professional ranks. It takes a lot of volunteerism (something which unfortunately appears to be slightly on the wane). And, frankly, it takes money. That's the hard reality.

Now, government investment in sport is hugely beneficial, even when measured in purely financial terms. People who participate in sport, whether individual or team sports, cost far less money and resources on health services, including being provably in better mental health. Sport brings more tourists, both domestic and foreign, than music concerts. Horse and greyhound racing are huge industries in their own right. Let's take Kerry GAA as the most obvious example. They spent €1.45m on their inter-county teams in 2022. Without spending that money, Kerry wouldn't have seen the inside of Croke Park much. But they did - and sales of Kerry sportswear alone rose over fourfold from €133,000 to €547,000. Commercial income doubled. There is a reason

why teams bring out new jerseys so often – that's a phenomenon that was actually started in tennis in the US but it is now a massive global industry.

The Irish Government, thankfully, don't need to be told any of this and they have not been found wanting. Sport Ireland has announced a multi-annual funding package, which sees historic levels of investment (up €4 million on last year's €20 million) in high performance sport. The announcement, which is supported by increased Sport Ireland funding intended to support the implementation of High Performance Strategy, comes on the back of a hugely successful Tokyo Olympic cycle for Irish athletics which saw Irish athletes achieved thirty (30) medals in targeted championship events from 2017 to 2021. This compares favourably with the twelve (12) medals won across the Rio cycle from 2012 to 2016. The investment commitments of the National Sports Policy 2018-2027 continue to be delivered for high performance sport. Under its multi-annual funding commitment for 2022 to 2024, €10.8m in High Performance Programme Funding will be provided to 19 National Governing Bodies to support the delivery of their performance programmes in 2023. A further €950,000 has been allocated to the Olympic Federation of Ireland (€500,000) and Paralympics Ireland (€450,000) for operations and administration support.

Multi-annual funding is extended to the International Carding Scheme which provides financial support to athletes for their training and competition programmes. Athletes that have achieved criteria for funding in 2022 will be on the International Carding Scheme for 2023 and 2024. This will allow athletes to focus on training and performances as they seek qualification for the Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris 2024. In 2023, Sport Ireland will invest €3,486,500 under the International Carding Scheme. This will support 127 athletes and three relays / pool funding in 14 sports.

The additional €4m of investment provided by Government for 2023 will be directed to specific initiatives within high performance sport. Sport Ireland will be prudent in its expenditure

of this additional funding throughout 2023. Coaching, Paris 2024, athlete supports, and High Performance Strategy activation are priority investment areas for Sport Ireland. In 2022, Sport Ireland allocated €1.9m in High Performance Impact Funding, and this funding stream will be again available in 2023. It will address one-off costs for high performance programmes and give recognition to the increased costs of doing business in high performance sport.

The levels of investment for 2023 are substantial and see Sport Ireland tracking to invest over €67m in high performance sport between 2022 and 2024.

The athletes to get the highest level of €40,000 are Ciara Mageean and Mark English from Athletics; Ronan Grimes from Para Cycling; Rhys McClenaghan from Gymnastics; Kellie Harrington, Aoife O'Rourke, Caitlin Fyers, Aidan Walsh, Michaela Walsh, Amy Broadhurst, Lisa O'Rourke, Christina Desmond and Dylan Eagleson from Boxing; Finn Lynch from Sailing; Jason Smyth from Para Athletics; Ellen Keane, Nicole Turner and Roisin Ní Ríain from Para Swimming; Paul O'Donovan, Fintan McCarthy, Fiona Murtagh, Eimear Lambe, Afric Keogh, Emily Hegarty, Tara Hanlon, Natalie Long, Sanita Puspure, Zoe Hyde, Margaret Creman and Aoife Casey from Rowing.

Another 32 have been awarded World Class funding which has risen from €18,000 to €25,000. They include Rhasidat Adeleke, Thomas Barr, Israel Olatunde and Kate O'Connor from Athletics; Liam Jegou from Canoeing Ireland; Lara Gillespie and Richael Timothy from Cycling and Para-Cycling; Adam Steele and Eamon Montgomery from Gymnastics; Mona MacSharry and Daniel Wiffen from Swimming and Carolyn Hayes from Triathlon.

The third level of International funding has also risen from €12,000 to 18,000 and is being made available to 63 athletes in total.

Killarney athletes Jordan Lee received €25,000 and David Kenny received €18,000 in the allocations.



### HARD LESSON ON THE ROAD **FOR KERRY**

National League: Tyrone 1-15 Kerry 2-9

Ouch. That one stung a lot. It looked to me like Kerry were beginning to take shape with that victory over a defensive Armagh. In fact, I reckoned that with players coming back into the fold, we had a great shot at a League Final, almost certainly against Mayo. Not that I or anybody else will be rating the Division One League Final too highly this year - it's too close to the provincial championships. We've seen a few one-sided League Finals in recent years for a very obvious reason. Mayo weren't throwing any handle after the hatchet in last year's final. The truth is that Kerry do have an advantage in hailing from a six county mainly hurling province (although Cork are rising fast). An extra game at the end of the league rounds actually suits our schedule nicely.

A moot point at this stage, I would think. I know it's still mathematically possible if we win both our remaining games, but frankly we haven't been good enough.

Donegal was just a bad game and a bad day. We should have taken something from that one, but I didn't see it as a general malaise. One of those days. Monaghan was simply not a stern test; it wasn't hard to look good that day. Armagh....that was a dog rough and defensive game. We ground it out, and on days like these I actually like to see that kind of solidity rather than dash or flair. Show me the framework of a team; we can do the decorations later on in the year.

Then this. To be honest, Tyrone schooled us. And no, it doesn't bother me that it's Tyrone. All that guff about a rivalry and puke football and team of the nineties....spare me the histrionics. Let's give up the pretense of football purism and catch and kick. It sounds great - but we play sweepers as much as anybody else now and we recycle possession (ad nauseum on a few occasions in this game). What bothers me is that we did it so poorly.

There were problems all over the field. Jack Barry is honest around the middle, but not dominant. I was very sceptical about Stefan Okunbor on his return from Australia, and I'd still like him to get more club football, but I like his energy and his physicality. But the absence of David Moran is being very keenly felt. We need Diarmuid O'Connor back asap, and Adrian Spillane is looking more valuable in absentia than he was appreciated.

We were poor in attack in the first half, and completely outclassed in the second. Kerry were running into blind alleys and a packed Tyrone defence, which was especially disappointing because there are places up for grabs there. Tyrone did play very deep and burst with pace, but that can't be considered any surprise. They were also physically stronger and it stymied too many of our forwards. Seán O'Shea did his best to lead the line. David Clifford was surrounded by two and often three men. For that matter, I thought he was fouled a few times where the referee gave frees out for over-carrying. Don't mistake that as me suggesting for one minute that the referee cost us that game – our

problems were of our own making all the way. We simply weren't good enough, and could and should have been beaten by more. For that matter, I felt that at least one Kerry player could have picked up a black card for a pull down.

Darragh Roche gave it everything, but was confined among the strong Tyrone defenders. Paudie Clifford worked like a trojan outside, but couldn't penetrate. He's a strong runner, but there was no space to run into. Ruairí Murphy found the same on his introduction, although he did bring fresh energy. Tyrone shut off the gaps rapidly after Seán O'Shea got too much early space and scored a great goal. We were 1-3 to a point up early on. And we scored a grand total of 1-6 to 1-14 for the rest of the game. 1-2 in the second half. Tyrone were more accurate, made better decisions faster than we did, and were stronger. Quite simply, they looked far hungrier. I've been excusing Kerry based on their late return to heavy training, but we are past that now. You want to play summer football for Kerry? Sorry, but you have to earn it in spring. There is a ruthless pragmatism in these things.

Tony Brosnan played too deep for me. Kerry seem to be persisting in using Tony as a playmaker – and he is a fantastic kick-passer - but I believe that there is a reason why Dr. Crokes have him as an out-and-out predator. Again, though, he needs the muscle of a player like Donal O'Sullivan or Barry Dan to feed off against a packed defence. O'Sullivan's strength made a big difference on his introduction sometimes you need a bludgeon more than a rapier; the Kilgarvan man can be both. Having Tony out in the half forward line is like giving Michelangelo a paint-roller. Dara Moynihan was again in his element - Dara is exactly the kind of player you want in games like this, and I thought he was excellent again. All of that is fixable. Paul Geaney was my player of last year's County Championship and he can mix it when the waters get choppy. He would have made a difference here.

To be honest, I'm more worried about our defence than our attack or midfield. Tyrone broke at speed but, much more worryingly, were able to find shooting space far too easily. Their movement was very good, but there were too many Kerry defenders being taken out of the play with just a simple pass. It wasn't any one individual being beaten. Tyrone came fast and found more holes than swiss cheese. Paul Murphy did fine. Shane Ryan won't enjoy the highlights reel, that was just a one-off error. He made two brilliant saves along the way - I did think Canavan senior would have finished that second chance. He opted for power; the great ones pass the ball into the net. But it still took great goalkeeping to stop it from that range.

Look, I am worried at this point. I know we have players to come in. Gavin White, Brian Ó Beaglaíoch, Gavin Crowley, Dylan Casey, Mike Breen, Dan O'Donoghue, Jack O'Shea...plenty of options. But it wasn't individual lapses or holes that need plugging. It was the entire system. We were devoid of attacking options against Tyrone's massed defence. They found space to thread their way through ours - to be fair, some of their long range kicking was superb. Ours.....wasn't.

We are at home to Roscommon before closing out our league campaign away to Galway. Given that we would lose out on head to head against either Donegal or Tyrone if level on points, we absolutely need to win one and possibly both, depending on other results. Both teams will have watched Tyrone take us apart - and lose any illusions, their margin of victory did not remotely reflect Tyrone's superiority. Neither team will fear us.

It's worth noting that Cavan were without their best player in the talented Niamh Keenaghan, but Kerry lined out without three top guns in Ashbourne Cup winners Rachel McCarthy and Jackie Horgan and talented sharpshooter Amy O'Sullivan. The difference was that Kerry could call on long-serving Michelle Costello, Anne Marie Leen, and Caoimhe Spillane, all of whom acquitted themselves well on the day. At the end of an exciting and evenly matched game in a packed Mounthawk Park, both teams will be happy with their first league points. Kerry were probably slightly the better side overall here, but a draw was a fair result, with both sides leaving chances behind them on the night. Overall, Billy Dennehy and his cohorts can be very happy with their night's work.

Kerry made the better start, and it took an acrobatic scissor kick by Anthony O'Donnell just ahead of Nathan Gleeson to avert early Kerry danger. Treaty had their own chance minutes later when Dean George got on the end of a great Ben O'Riordan cross - an area we have been vulnerable in previous games - but his header flew over the crossbar. ### Road Safety Alert – Weather Warning for Snow

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) is advising all road users to prepare for further cold weather conditions as Met Eireann have issued warning for snow... This will lead to hazardous road conditions and reduced visibility.

Road users are being advised to check local traffic and weather conditions before setting out on any journeys. The RSA has the following practical advice for road users in snowy conditions:

### Drivers are advised to:

- · Remove all snow from your vehicle before commencing your journey. Snow left on the roof will become loose and can drop onto the windscreen during braking, thereby causing sudden and severe restriction to your vision. It can also fall off during your drive and cause injury to pedestrians or a reflex action by another driver.
- · Clear windows and mirrors before you set out, use a screen scraper and de-icer. Do not use hot water on the windscreen as it can crack the glass.
- · In snowy conditions slow down, use all controls delicately and leave extra distance between you and the vehicle in front. Avoid over steering and harsh braking and harsh

acceleration. Use the highest gear possible to avoid wheel spin. Select a low gear when travelling downhill especially if through bends.

- · In snowy conditions, visibility will be reduced. Do not drive on the tail-lights of the vehicle in front (Target Fixing). This can give a false sense of security and you will be too close to be able to brake safely. In heavy snow, use your fog lights, turn off your radio and open your window a fraction, so you can hear other traffic, especially at junctions.
- · Use dipped headlights at all times, and fog lights in heavy snow to ensure you are seen by other motorists (but don't forget to turn them off afterwards).
- · Watch out for vulnerable road users such as pedestrians, cyclists and motorcyclists and allow extra space.
- · Drivers of high sided vehicles like trucks and buses are particularly at risk from both the dangers posed by snow but also from the high winds associated with heavy snow conditions.

#### Pedestrians are advised to:

· Wear high visibility clothing or carry a torch as visibility is reduced in snowy conditions. Wear clothing that does not restrict your vision.

- · Wear appropriate footwear. Walk on the footpath, not in the street. Walk on the right hand side of the road, facing traffic if there are no footpaths.
- · DO NOT underestimate the danger of snow and ice. Many slips and falls happen in places people regard as safe and secure, typically outside their front door, on the door step, on the path or while getting out of the car. When you approach a footpath or roadway that appears to be covered with snow or ice, always use extreme caution.

### Cyclists and Motorcyclists are advised to:

- Motorcyclists / Cyclists should not compromise their safety by their 'need' to travel in snowy conditions.
- · Visibility is reduced in snowy conditions so cyclists should wear a Sam Browne Bandoleer belt or high visibility vest and ensure the lights on your bike are working correctly.
- · Motorcyclists should avoid wearing a dark visor in any bad light conditions.



"I believe in the principle of a European Health Union, whereby Member States agree



# ROSES

Planting roses this time of the year will give you colour for years to come. Container grown roses can be planted any time of the year but the Spring and Autumn are the best.

Bare rooted roses can be planted from late autumn until around mid March. Bare rooted roses are plants that are dug up straight from the open ground when they are dormant and best planted or heeled into some earth as soon as possible.

Make sure when you are planting bare rooted roses to heel them in well with the heel of your foot to prevent their roots from being moved in the wind.

Roses are hungry plants so make sure when you're planting to add plenty of manure or a rose fertilizer.


Welcome back dear student. "For day after day they seek Me out; they seem eager to know My ways, as if they were a nation that does what is right and has not forsaken the commands of its God. They ask Me for just decisions and seem eager for God to come near them. 'Why have we fasted,' they say, 'and You have not seen it? Why have we humbled ourselves, and You have not noticed?' (Isaiah 58:2-3) Last week we saw the importance of walking in unity and love towards one another and that, though many in the body of Christ fast and pray sincerely petitioning God for answers often we've fasted from food or drink when really it's anger, strife, bitterness or judging others that we should be fasting from to see meaningful transformation. God details what He considers a fast should be.... "Is not this the kind of fasting I have chosen: to loose the chains of injustice and untie the cords of the yoke, to set the oppressed free and break every yoke? Is it not to share your food with the hungry, and to provide the poor wanderer with shelter, when you see the naked, to clothe them, and not to turn away from your own flesh and blood?" (Isaiah 58:6-7) God turned their theories upside down, declaring He is more interested to see His character being demonstrated during fasting and prayer: beginning with a call to repentance! 'Repent' is viewed as a dirty word because sin is exalted as being good, and accountability is a 'no-no' in case it offends someone - but Judgement will come (Isaiah 5:20-23).

The Lord Jesus came home one time to find the house overflowing with people wanting to hear His Words and see Him heal the sick (Mark 2:1-12). Four men arrived afterwards, having carried their friend on a stretcher. He was paralysed and they wanted Jesus to heal him. Imagine how tired and sore they were from carrying his weight - their hands perhaps blistered, their shoulders aching. So they weren't going to go all the way home again just because the place was overcrowded. They climbed up on the flat roof making a hole in it, and lowered their crippled friend down right in front of Jesus! He wasn't upset; rather He admired their faith and perseverance. He looked at the paralysed man and said something most unusual "son, your sins are forgiven" (Mark 2:5). The zealous ones there were horrified - 'who did this fellow think He was: forgiving people's sins - only God could do that' they thought to themselves. Jesus called them out though proving that He had power to forgive sins (because of what He was about to do on the Cross). The result of this man receiving forgiveness was instant healing from what had crippled his body, and they were all

Do you remember the song 'Don't Leave Me This Way'? God loves us too much to leave us the way we were - lost in sin (Ephesians 2:1-5; Colossians 1:13-22). Isaiah chapter 58 concludes with the result of repentance, prayer and fasting - reaping a reward of healing, deliverance, joy, protection and prosperity; "Then your light will break forth like the dawn, and your healing will quickly appear; then your righteousness will go before you, and the Glory of the Lord will be your rear guard. Then you will call, and the Lord will answer; you will cry for help, and He will say: Here am I" (Isaiah 58:8-9). Hallelujah!


