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

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

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A Killarney woman who has been to the forefront of the tourism industry throughout her life is to be inducted into the Order of Inisfallen – the highest honour the town of Killarney can bestow.

Margaret O'Donoghue of The Gleneagle Group will be honoured at a reception in the historic Muckross House and she will join a very elite list of previous recipients who have been recognised by Cairde Chill Áirne.

Margaret was one of 10 children born to Hannah and John O'Sullivan in Shanara, Beaufort. She attended school in Kilgobnet and Killorglin Community College and she began her working life in Killarney's Great Southern Hotel.

She first met Maurice O'Donoghue, who was then studying to become a pharmacist in Dublin, at a dance in Tralee in 1961 and they were married in 1964.

Maurice's parents, Sheila and Paddy O'Donoghue, purchased Flesk House – a Georgian House sitting on four acres – and in 1957 they opened it as The Gleneagle Hotel.

It had 12 bedrooms at the time but, together, Margaret and Maurice set about developing The Gleneagle into an all-inclusive holiday destination. From modest beginnings, it has flourished to become one of Ireland's largest and most popular hotel groups.

The entrepreneurial O'Donoghue family went on to develop the incredibly successful Gleneagle INEC Arena – one of the flagship entertainment, conference and events facilities in the country – as well as the very popular Brehon Hotel, the Killarney town centre Scott's Hotel, The Maritime Hotel in Bantry and a number of other key tourism properties.

The Gleneagle Group is now operated by a third generation of the O'Donoghue family, under the direction of Margaret and Maurice's eldest son Patrick who is the chief executive officer of the Gleneagle Group.

The Cathaoirleach of Killarney Municipal District Council, Cllr Brendan Cronin, described Margaret O'Donoghue as the matriarch of a very iconic family that has been to the forefront of the tourism industry in Killarney, Kerry and Ireland for decades. "Margaret has been the guiding hand in all that the family has achieved and, given her enormous contribution over so many years, it is wonderful that she is being officially recognised with this very important award," he said.

Margaret O'Donoghue said it is an honour to accept the Order of Innisfallen on behalf of both herself and Maurice, who passed away in 2001.

"The Gleneagle wouldn't be the success it is today without the support of the incredible staff that have worked with us down through the years, the many regular guests, families and friends who have always supported us and my own family who have taken over the reins," she said.

The Cairde Chill Áirne Order of Inisfallen awards scheme is a joint initiative between Kerry County Council and Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce. It was established in 2005 to recognise outstanding contributions by people to the economic development of the town and its tourism industry. Those selected for the honour are invested as Members of the Order of Inisfallen. Previous recipients include former Taoiseach Enda Kenny, actor Michael Fassbender, Charles, the King

12 NIGHTS OF NIGHT NURSING FUNDED

AS COFFEE MORNING RAISES ALMOST €4,500

There was a fantastic turnout at a coffee morning held in Killeen House Hotel on Saturday last in memory of Linda Lucey Eviston and in aid of the Irish Cancer Society Night Nurses.

Friends of Linda, including Stephanie O'Callaghan, Jacqui Koskhan, Joanne Pierce and Aisling Crosbie, along with Patrick and Alannah Eviston were joined by Linda's sisters, Karen, Sandra and Aine who were all on hand to help out on the morning.

"We were delighted to welcome Night Nurse Nancy Dineen who supported Linda during her final days", Patrick said. He went on to thank everyone for attending, including the amazing sponsors who provided over 70 spot prizes for the raffle.

To date almost €4,500 has been raised and this will provide 12 nights of night nursing.

The Irish Cancer Society's Night Nursing service provides endof-life care for cancer patients, allowing them to spend their final days at home surrounded by family and loved ones. As well as providing the highest standard of nursing care to the patient, Night Nurses also offer much-needed respite for family members caring for their loved ones.

The service operates across the country and in 2022, Night Nurses provided over 6,500 nights of care supporting over 2,000 cancer patients to fulfil their wish of dying at home surrounded by family and loved ones.

In 2022, the Irish Cancer Society's Night Nurses provided 982 nights of care across the Munster region, including 168 nights in Kerry. So far this year, as of the end of September 2023, the Irish Cancer Society has delivered 656 nights of care across Munster to cancer patients to spend their final days at home and 107 nights in Kerry.



Wide lenses on the Rut

The rut seems to attract worldwide attention and still photographers are not the only ones flocking to what is one of the most accessible wild deer herds in Europe.

Killarney National Park is the focus international filming yet once more this autumn/winter. Disnev and National Geographic Channels are among the visitors. A documentary under the heading Red Deer, Landscape and People is expected to go out in 2025, I am told.

Wildstar Films, a highly respected wildlife company with several awards under its cap. including an Emmy, has also been in town.

And a Dutch film crew has been using Muckross House, the Abbey and Torc Waterfall as a backdrop for one of their popular celebrity related productions called The Perfect Picture. This is a competition where celebrities battle it out to produce the best photo. It is not clear which Dutch celebrities were around -if anyone would recognize them in the first place.

Weather wasn't great for the second year in a row but that did not stop the cameras.

I have often wondered why we don't pitch for a Lord of the Rings type drama. We could equal New Zealand in woods, mountains and water - in all but the weather. Can you imagine the snow capped Carrauntoohil as a backdrop for the hobbits and elves going over the Misty Mountains?

And they're off....or are they? Serious issue of jarvey licence transfer raised.

New bylaws for town jarveys are being drawn up, the Killarney Municipal District was told at the meeting of the council in Listry on Wednesday. But even before the public consultation - necessary for any set of bylaws - gets off the ground, there is a bit of a Beechers' Brook. European competition law means names are being drawn out of a hat when a jarvey retires or passes away, rather than going to a member of the same family. Now Clir Maura Healy-Rae has asked the council ' to allow the transfer of a jarvey licence from one generation to another.' This is so that when a person retires or dies, the

family tradition and income is carried on. This was a motion and it was seconded and supported strongly by Cllr Niall O'Callaghan. He appealed to council management 'to respect the tradition' of the jarvey business in Killarney.

European competition law was one thing, Niall said.

'But there is also a sense of history in this town,' he said.

Some families had been jarveys for four and five generations in Killarney.

If you have a family history you prove you have a family history, that licence should stay in the family - once it's worked by someone in the family, 'Niall said.

Last time I enquired there were about 36 jarvey licences issued in the town.In 2010



when the bylaws were last revised, the big issue was 'sanitary equine devices'.

This time it is likely to be European company

Currently, Bylaw 5 states: 'In the event that an existing licence holder should cease to hold his/her licence, then it shall automatically revert to the Council", And bylaw 11 states "Where the number of applications for a licence exceeds the number of licences determined by the Council, the allocation of licences shall be determined by lot".

Hence the names being pulled out of a hat. Kerry County Council is not permitted to operate waiting lists for the issuance of Jarvey licences, the meeting was also told. 'Kerry County Council must comply with European Union competition regulations

licences,' a reply to Maura's motion stated. It will be some few weeks or months yet before they go before the public, but the debate has begun.

Dear Politician, we are waiting a long time for these...

Some people are writing their Santa letters this time of year. Local and national elections are gearing up and our politicians are powering up and so is this column.

A stark difference between TDs in Tipperary and TDs in Kerry emerged this week on the hottest issue in town: numbers of refugees. Tipp's Mattie McGrath has managed to achieve a pause in the placement of 74 asylum seekers/refugees in a hostel for the homeless in historic Cashel. It seems Mr McGrath, a mere independent back bench TD, quickly organised public meetings in support of local people and the homeless and quickly got a pause commitment from Minister for State Joe O'Brien.

Killarney is 'bursting at the seams' as reported in The Kerryman this week. Our is still outstanding - though the town engineer

councillors - not all of whom are engaging with the subject - are not able to influence national policy. Our famous five TDs include a minister who you might expect could wield power. But if the TDs and some of our councillors are reluctant to interfere with the highly profitable business that the refugee industry has become, we have five other items that are long outstanding.

First on the list this Christmas is the N22 Killarney to Farranfore Road. We are waiting 20 years and we hope Santa turns out this Christmas.

Then there is the famous Mission Road crossing - could Santa finally see to the pedestrian crossing at Beech Road? (On this note, Mayor Brendan Cronin's slip road idea this week said there is to be a design). We are asking too for a park and ride system

to free the town from choking traffic - again a decade old challenge in Killarney.

A natural history museum for Killarney perhaps negotiate the purchase of the old Presentation Convent from the private buyer. (I am reliably told the Department of Education were willing to back the Kerry ETB and put up funds, but were too late).

And there is the long standing new or revamped court facilities for Tralee and in Killarney - it must be 20 years since these were first put on the list.

Something to concentrate the minds of our politicians in the run up to Christmas.

RANGERS CONDEMN DUMPING IN RARE HABITAT

Conservation staff in Killarney National Park were dismayed to come across a large pile of garden waste that was deliberately dumped in the Reenadinna Yew Wood this week. Reenadinna, in Muckross is the largest yew woodland in the European Union and is a rare habitat that is protected by EU legislation. Garden waste can contain seeds, fragments, bulbs and roots of invasive plant species that spread and form dense colonies in any area it is discarded. Such species smother, outcompete and prevent the regeneration of our native plants and trees and are costly to control and eradicate. The careless dumping of garden waste in Killarney National Park poses a serious threat to its special and protected habitats. The National Parks and Wildlife Service ask that people to dispose of their garden waste responsibly. The innovator of the targeted Kick out Shane won 3 successive Kerry SFC medals in his first three seasons with Dr. Crokes. He became one of the top shot stoppers in the championship as well as becoming one of the first keepers have the ability to read the play before he launched his pinpoint kick out to players in space. Shane also won two Munster Club SFC titles before claiming an All-Ireland Club SFC medal after a defeat of Slaughtneil in the 2017 final.

2. STEPHEN O'SULLIVAN

Charged with marking oppositions top forward in the finals of 2004,2005,2006, O'Sullivan took no prisoners as a no nonsense old school defender whose first job was always to defend. The Skellig Rangers player picked up an All-Ireland medal with Kerry in 2000 and won his FOURTH County Senior Championship medal with South Kerry in 2009 when he captained the side to victory over Dr. Crokes in an epic final

3. MIKE MALONEY

One of the most consistent County Championship Full backs of the last 22 years. Played his first final in 2005, a defeat to South Kerry, played his last final 14 years later in 2019 a defeat to current champions East Kerry but what he did in between defines a phenomenal career, 6 county titles, two Munster titles and 1 all-Ireland club final win and he done it all with a smile.

4. KILLIAN YOUNG

Won three county titles in 2006, 09 and 2015, losing one along the way. Of course, also a great career with Kerry winning 4 All-Ireland's, 9 Munster titles and 2 national leagues. Perhaps his performances in the 2015 win were the greatest of all. Tasked with the man marking job of James O'Donoghue. Young's leadership saw him pop up for a late equalizing point before SK went on to win the 2015 final in Extra time.

5. DENIS'SHINE'O'SULLIVAN

Behind all the great names of South Kerry players from 2004 to 2006, one shone brightest of them all. From Picking up player of the game awards to picking up breaking ball from the midfield battles the diminutive figure always wore his heart of his sleeve. One of the all-time great county championship defenders who did not go on to play for Kerry but his career is far from over as he still plays with his club Dromid Pearses along with his with his son and Kerry minor footballer Donnagh.

In fact, he hopes to add another South Kerry Championship medal to his haul in a few weeks' time. In 2006 won an All-Ireland Junior title with Kerry defeating Roscommon.

6. EOIN BROSNAN

A brilliant 18-year career playing county championship football from 2000 when he won his first county final to 2018, coming on as a sub to win his last, winning eight titles with Dr. Croke's in total, what a man. He also has a Cork Senior County Championship medal but just the one. Eoin of course picked up some silverware too with Kerry along the way. He Morphed from a talented forward into a talented centre back later in his career with Dr. Croke's, one of the most versatile players ever to play with the club.

7. SHANE MYERS

Shane Myers was another unsung hero until today perhaps of that great Dr Croke's team of the 2010's. Mostly at left half back, he played in four finals and won four finals in a row from 2010, '11. '12, 13. Defeating Mid Kerry, Dingle and Austin Stacks twice along the way.

8. BRYAN SHEEHAN

A Brilliant career with Kerry with a haul of five All-Ireland's, 9 Munster titles, 3 national leagues, 1 all-star but today's it's about the county championship performances and at midfield he was masterful, taking home five county titles with South Kerry. Popped up in the 2015 final to score the all-important goal to earn SK victory over Killarney Legion. A clubman who never left his district down.

Bryan is still playing for St Mary's and yes Still kicking points from all over the field to a new legion of social media fans.

9. JOHNNY BUCKLEY

Maybe it was the red head, the big hands or the ability to battle to the end but Johnny Buckley lorded midfield for Dr. Crokes during their epic journey of the 2010's. He has a whopping 7 Kerry County championships. He has also won 5 Munster club titles between 2006 and 2018 as well as a distinguished career with Kerry.

10. KIERAN O'LEARY

Another Dr. Croke's legend, Kieran O'Leary beats nominees Denis O'Dwyer and Darren O'Sullivan to win the number 10 jersey of the

We all know a legend of Kerry football winning five all-Ireland's, but he was equally passionate when it came to club and district. After garnering minor and under-21 county titles with South Kerry, he went on to become a star at senior level, hauling four county titles in total at centre forward. It was his fisted point that was the difference in the 2009 final.

12. BRIAN LOONEY

Has there been a more consistent county championship player in the last 20 years than Brian Looney. The first name on the Dr. Crokes team sheet, his longevity down to his superb fitness. Brian played with the Kerry minor team in 2004 and won an All-Ireland at under 21 in 2008. He was the winning captain of the 2010 championship side and went on to collect half a dozen more medals. Still playing and now described as a veteran – Scored 1-2 in his teams last game of this season's championship. Still going strong.

Colm Cooper

Eight senior county titles from our next player who started life as a small 17-year-old in 2000 winning his first medal and winning his 8th, 18 years later in 2018. But what a journey in between for club and county. Far too many accolade to read out but more importantly it is the memories of Colm the Gooch Cooper that will live long in the memories and the inspiration he passed onto the next generation of players.

14. DARA O'CINNEIDE

From a small club in West Kerry that dared to dream big this man came to centre stage at the start of the 21st century. Winning two out of three county finals with An Ghaeltacht in 2001 and 2003 beating Austin Stacks and Laune Rangers. Dara O Cinnede starred at full forward and helped to bring his club almost to all-Ireland glory in 2004, losing out to Caltra.

15. MAURICE FITZGERALD

They say things are worth waiting for and at a young age of 35 Maurice Fitzgerald who had won every accolade there was finally won a Senior County Championship medal helping SK in 2004. At that stage he had togged out for his district for 17 seasons. He went on to win two more in 05 and 06. His leadership, his modesty, his willingness to show example from the front inspired a generation of footballers to wanted to be the next Maurice Fitz and apparently, he was a pretty good free taker as well. An Iconic figure of our game in the Iconic number 15 jersey.

An Appreciation

From Killarney Golf & Fishing Club

It was with profound sadness that members' learned of the passing of the late Victor Mulcahy, on the 17th October last.

A life-long member of Killarney Golf & Fishing Club, Victor's first introduction to golf coincided with his late mother, Peg's Captaincy of the ladies' Club at Killarney, back in 1959.

Remembered fondly at the Club, and in particular as an administrator, he did however, have some notable on course successes, and won the Killarney Cups in the company of his friend, Taal Burke in 1977. This success was made all the more special, as his sister Marguerita, was Captain of the Ladies' Club at that time. He also tasted success in the Club Foursomes Championship with Fr. James Hegarty, also achieved during the 1970's.

He was also a keen Billiards and Snooker player and was King of the green baize in Killarney in his day, winning the famous Bishop Moynihan Cup on two occasions at St. Mary's Parish Hall. A man of many talents and interests, Victor served on many voluntary Committees' at home and abroad, and was a member of the Trustees' of Muckross House, who were instrumental in bringing the Annals of Innisfallen back to Killarney in 1983, on loan from the Bodleian Library at Oxford. This was a hugely significant event locally, as the Annals pre-date the Book of Kells. He was also actively involved, and had long associations with the Lions Club, serving as President on a number of occasions during his years in Southampton and Glasgow. Victor also took a great interest in history, and in particular local history, fine arts, antiques and

There was no doubting that Victors' favourite golfer was one of our own Irish International players, Michael Guerin, and they remained lifelong friends. He often spoke fondly and

had a great love of classical music.

proudly of Michael's successes, particularly his successes at the South of Ireland Championships. Indeed, his brother Brian, had caddied for Michael in the famous 1963 final, the third instalment in Michael's three in a row, at the famed Lahinch course, and this was something Victor was extremely proud of.

Victor joined the Mens' Committee in 2014 in Mike Daly's year as Mens' Club Captain and served as the Club's GUI Liaison Officer during that period. He went on to serve in various roles on Committee over the next five years, and as only he could do, managed to excel in all of them. His reports in the Killarney Advertiser and Outlook Magazines while P.R.O. were much anticipated by members' each Friday, and he really engaged with his audience, producing a fabulous synopsis of the preceding week's happenings both on and off the course, in each of his brilliantly produced articles.

He played a major role in the Club's 125th Anniversary Committee in 2018 and indeed, was key note speaker at one of that year's calendar of events which was held at Killarney House. Here, he chronicled in great detail, the Club's move from Deer Park to our current location at Mahony's Point, and highlighted the leading role that Lord Castlerosse, resident at Killarney House, had played in making the move possible, and how he had envisaged Killarney Golf Club & Fishing Club, becoming the Augusta of Europe.

Victor, through his keen interest in history went on to become Club Archivist, and his first project was to research the entire history from the early days at Deer Park up to date. After many months of painstaking research, this venture came to fruition, and he uploaded the Club's history, in its entirety, on a touch screen computer



which sat in the fover at the Club, something he was rightly, very proud of. He then went on to secure funding to build a trophy cabinet in the foyer and here he displayed Cups, Trophies and artefacts belonging to Michael Guerin, Dr. Billy O'Sullivan, Bridget Gleeson, Lionel Munn and many other luminaries of Irish Golf. The cabinet, which stands testament to Victor's work, has been beautifully curated by the man himself, with informative notes explaining the significance of each item contained within. Many of the items within the cabinet had been thought to have been lost over the years, but Victor, like Killarney's answer to Indiana Jones, had an uncanny ability to unearth historic golfing treasure from often obscure places, and put it centre stage once again.

A man with a great love of Killarney Golf & Fishing Club, Victor will be sadly missed by those who were fortunate to have known him, and have had the pleasure of his company over the years.

HOUSE REBUILDING COSTS HAVE INCREASED BY AN AVERAGE OF 12% NATIONALLY OVER THE LAST 12 MONTHS

The latest House Rebuilding Guide published by the Society of Chartered Surveyors

Ireland (SCSI) shows that national average re-build costs, which include demolition and site clearance, have increased by an average of 12% over the past 12 months. This is down significantly on the 21% increase recorded in the previous 12 months.

This year's SCSI House Rebuilding Guide shows a consistent increase in rebuild costs across the country with the majority of regions recording an average increase of 12% to 13%.

Material prices have started to stabilise marginally but certain products such as insulation, windows and plumbing are still experiencing price increases.

From an insurance perspective this instability has huge consequences for homeowners.

Firstly your property should be insured for the reinstatement cost and not the market value. In other words the cost of rebuilding the house excluding the site value. Bear in mind that currently the rebuild cost could be higher than the market value.

The base rebuilding costs in the Kerry region are running at an average of €246-€260 a square foot (or €2775 per square metre for a 4 bed detached house of 119 square metres) in the most recently published guide.

The rebuilding rates quoted by SCSI are for estate type homes and not one-off homes. The calculation should account for the most recent building regulations, professional fees, demolition costs and VAT, and should make provision for higher than average fittings, built in wardrobes, fences, walls, and garages.

It is very important to note that "under insurance" can have a serious effect on any

future claims settlements. Most policies include an "Average Clause" which means in the event of "under insurance" any claims settlement can be reduced in value in proportion to the degree of under insurance. Where the Sum Insured is only 75% of the total reinstatement cost, you will receive 75% of the agreed cost of reinstatement, whether the claim is made for partial reinstatement or total loss.

I would recommend that you undertake a review of your reinstatement sum insured. Some insurers have begun applying index linking to existing home insurance renewals at a rate of between 7% and 25%. In order to get a definitive individual reinstatement value on your house you should contact an independent qualified surveyor.

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All you need to know about the NFQ the 10 steps up the ladder of Irish Education



With the 2024 CAO third level online application facility available since last Monday, 6th November, the college application season is officially up and running. Therefore, it's important for those progressing to further and higher education to have a clear understanding of the qualifications, for which they can apply. Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI) is the state agency responsible for further and higher-level qualifications in Ireland. QQI takes responsibility for quality control and standards in further and higher education. It ensures that students achieve qualifications that are valued nationally and internationally. It provides reliable information on the qualifications included in the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ).

The NFQ is a ten-level framework used to describe qualifications in the Irish education and training system. It lists the main qualifications awarded at each level and the pathways from one NFQ level to the next. The NFQ classifies the level, class of award and type of qualifications in Ireland from Level 1 right up to Level 10

BASIC NFQ AWARDS

Level 1 & Level 2 Awards: These awards cover basic literacy and numeracy. They are used for a wide range of people, including the young, the old, and people with intellectual or other disabilities. Adults returning to training, or learners with few or no previous qualifications may also study for Level 1 and Level 2 awards.

SECOND LEVEL NFO AWARDS

Level 3 Award: This is awarded to students who successfully complete the three-year Junior Cycle. It's a prestigious award as a public exam of the State Examinations Commission (SEC), the statutory body with responsibility for the operation of the state certificate exams. Very few students now leave school at the end of Junior Cycle, with the vast majority progressing on to study for the Leaving Cert exam. This year, Junior Cycle exam results were issued by the SEC on Wednesday, 18th October to 70,727 candidates nationwide, including 2,148 (1,095 female/1,053 male) from Kerry. The number of candidates who sat for the Junior Cycle exam in 2023 was about 3,592 or 5.35% up on the 2022 figure of 67,135. This is the first time ever that a junior cycle exam has exceeded 70,000, clearly indicative of population growth in Ireland.

Level 4 Award: The Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA), a Level 4 Award, is a distinct, self-contained two-year Leaving Certificate programme, which is strongly vocational. The subject areas are more practical than academic. It's a public exam of the SEC.

Level 5 Award: Both the traditional Leaving Certificate and the Leaving Certificate Vocational Programme (LCVP) are a Level 5 Award. Both awards are a path way to the world of work but more commonly used for entry to further and higher education. They are public exams of the SEC.

THIRD LEVEL NFQ AWARDS

Level 6 Award: This a two-year Higher Certificate at third level education. It can be applied for through the Central Applications Office (CAO). Level 7 Award: This is an Ordinary Bachelor Degree at third level. Its available as a three-year ab initio option through the CAO or may be added on to a Higher Certificate.

Level 8 Award: This is an Honours Bachelor Degree at third level. Its available as an ab initio option of four years duration – some Honours Degrees last for 3 or 5 years – through the CAO or can be built up from Level 6 and/or Level 7, usually known as the 'ladder system.'

Levels 9 and Level 10 Awards: Having obtained an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8), some students progress to postgraduate studies for a Masters Degree (Level 9) or a Doctoral Degree (Level 10), but that is a matter for a few years

FURTHER EDUCATION NFQ AWARDS

Level 5 & Level 6 Awards: Colleges of Further Education & Training (FET) throughout the country offer Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses leading to awards at Certificate (Level 5) & Advanced Certificate (Level 6). PLC courses in the Further Education and Training (FET) system provide a connection between 2nd level education and 3rd level education. Each year, a quota of places is reserved by CAO for applicants from the PLC sector. CAO provides a link to FET options available to post-second level applicants on the "Further Education and Training & Apprenticeship" hub on the CAO website.

THE NEW TERTIARY EDUCATION PROGRAMMES

Earlier this year, The National Tertiary Office (NTO) was established to coordinate further and higher education progression pathways from Further Education & Training (FET) courses to Higher Education Institutions (HEI). The new Tertiary Education Programmes (TEP) developed by HEIs and Education and Training

Boards (ETB) offer guaranteed pathways from further education to higher education. This is a wonderful development and will, no doubt, continue to expand in the new academic year.

ACTION NOW REQUIRED FOR EMPLOYERS WITH MORE **THAN 50 EMPLOYEES**

NEW WORKPLACE WHISTLEBLOWING LEGISLATION

The Protected Disclosures (Amendment) Act 2022 - the legal landscape of protected disclosures, often referred to as 'whistleblowing'. From 17 December 2023, the Act expands the scope of the protections for those who make protected disclosures and places new and enhanced obligations on organisations with more than 50 employees to have processes in place to facilitate workers in making protected disclosures.

INTERNAL CHANNELS FOR MAKING REPORTS AND PROCEDURES FOR DEALING WITH REPORTS

From 17 December 2023, there will be a requirement for employers with more than 50 employees to facilitate the making of whistleblowing reports with a duty to "establish, maintain and operate internal reporting channels and procedures."

PENAITIES

Compensation awards of up to 5 years pay can be made by the WRC where a worker is penalised for making a protected disclosure. Where a worker is not in receipt of remuneration, for example a job applicant, or volunteer, the WRC can make an award of up to €15,000 to these individuals.

ACTION ITEMS FOR EMPLOYERS

- Employers need to review & update their existing policies and procedures now to ensure that any protected disclosures can be properly channelled and progressed in line with the new measures before 17 December 2023.
- Employers must appoint a designated impartial person(s) who is trained to enable them to undertake that role.
- Wider awareness for line managers as to how to address, handle and channel disclosures also needs to be considered.



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
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Killarney Memory Tree

NEW MEMOIR OF TIMOTHY 'CHUB' O'CONNOR

to be published this month

Story of well-known Killorglin TD was written by his late son, Patrick

The first ever account of the life and times of the former Fianna Fáil TD, county councillor, greyhound owner and successful businessman, Timothy 'Chub' O'Connor will be published in his native Killorglin later this month.

The book, titled 'Chub: The Life and Times of a Remarkable Kerryman' was written by his son, Patrick 'Chub' O'Connor, who passed away in May 2022, and is being published posthumously by his family.

The book, which documents the many aspects of the life of one of Killorglin's most famous sons, will be launched by the former minister, Gerry Collins at a special gathering in Killorglin on Friday, 24th November.

'Chub' – as he was always known – was born in London in 1906. Orphaned at a young age, he was raised by his grandfather at his home at Meanus near Killorglin. He fought against the Black and Tans during the War of Independence as a member of Fianna Éireann and the IRA before studying at the London School of Economics.

Returning to his native Killorglin, he established several successful businesses including the importation of coal at Ballykissane Pier as well as a busy quarry, timber mill and hardware store. His many businesses created significant employment in mid-Kerry in difficult economic times during and after World War II.

Timothy 'Chub' O'Connor was a long-serving

county councillor and was a Fianna Fáil TD for Kerry South from 1961 to 1981, serving under Taoisigh including Seán Lemass, Jack Lynch, and Charles Haughey. He was also a member of the Council of Europe and was instrumental attracting investment, industry employment to Killorglin and Kerry.

'Chub' owned some of the most successful greyhounds in Irish history including Spanish Lad and the record-breaking, three-time Irish Greyhound Derby winner, Spanish Battleship.

This new memoir of his father was substantially written by his son, Patrick, before he passed away last year and the book has been supplemented by additional research and edited by historian and author, Owen O'Shea.

With a foreword by Gerry Collins and including a large selection of images, 'Chub' is an important family, social and political history which offers fascinating insights into the life and times of a remarkable Kerryman.

'Chub' will be launched by Gerry Collins at '10 Bridge Street' in Killorglin on Friday, 24 November at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome to join the O'Connor family on the night for this very special occasion. 'Chub', published by Laune Press, is priced €14.99 and will be available at the launch and in local bookshops later this month.

With the completion of a steady European tour, done and dusted, I sign off my season with a top 10 placing in the world rankings list for golfers with a disability in the stableford category", a delighted Tom said.

There is also a number of nationwide golf outings throughout the year organised by the "disabled and inclusive golf association of Ireland" in conjunction with golf ireland.

National Garda Youth Award for Castleisland Community College students

An Garda Síochána held its annual National Garda Youth Awards, Saturday 4th November, which recognise exceptional young people aged 13-21 who have positively contributed to their community. This year's event took place at the Midlands Park Hotel, Portlaoise and acknowledged the remarkable contributions made in a number of Garda Divisions which included Offaly, Dublin, Kerry, Cork, Sligo/Leitrim, Mayo/Roscommon, Longford and Donegal. There were 25 awards presented and The Upcyclers from Castleisland Community College won a Group Award.

The Upcyclers promoted sustainability whilst also doing good in their community. A citation about the Upcyclers was read out prior to the award being presented by Deputy Commissioner Anne Marie Mc Mahon:

'The outbreak of war in Ukraine in February 2022 displaced millions of people and continues to threaten the lives of people in the region, leaving families forced to flee for safety. We can be proud that many of these people felt that Ireland would be a comfortable shelter for them.

Communities all around Ireland have been coming together in the hope of helping the Ukrainian refugees feel welcome and supported during what must be a traumatic and deeply unsettling time.

A teacher (Annette Steinborn) and a number of students from Castleisland Community College began to notice on their way to and from school that some mothers and children were having to walk the long distance from their refugee accommodation into Tralee town. From a place of great compassion, these students put their heads together to find a helpful solution, and sought the donations of second-hand bicycles from their school and local business community.

Up to 60 bikes were donated and these students serviced and repaired each one outside of school hours. They then went to great lengths to deliver the bicycles to those in the local refugee accommodation so that they could travel in and out of the town, go to their place of work or get out for recreation.

The same students have also contributed to the local community in other ways too like the Children's Fairy Trail created along the river made from their scraps left over from their woodwork projects.



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



WINTER EYE HEALTH

Winter sun

Snow and ice are reflective, so the sun's damaging UV rays can reach your eyes from below as well as above. UV exposure is cumulative, so although you may not feel any immediate effects, you could be putting yourself at risk of long-term damage and risk cataracts and age-related macular degeneration (AMD) if you don't wear good quality sunglasses or goggles.

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



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

phenomenal display of shooting, particularly in the first half, saw SETU Carlow claim an easy win over a shell shocked Scotts Lakers and duly put a halt to any thoughts the home side had of a National Cup gallop. The statistics show that SETU Carlow like to shoot from outside, but their success rate on the night was a lot higher than their usual efforts. The home side opened brightly with Moss cutting to the basket to great effect and Eoin Carroll getting an early basket to take an early advantage. Arriaga (2) and Kevin Donohue hit early threes, but Jack O'Sullivan hit five on the spin to tie it up at 11-11. Puff Summers was the next to hit from three point land soon, followed by Irish U18 International Jack Kehoe, but Jamie O Sullivan replied in kind. Bell opened his account with two quick fire baskets before Arriaga struck again. Moss and Jamie OSullivan kept the Lakers in touch at 27-22, Summers netting again from beyond the arc.

A Braden Bell three cut the gap, and one wondered if the Lakers weathered the Carlow storm. They were well in the game at the stage, but Michael Wallace, Arriaga(3), and Summers were at it again, and in the blink of an eye, the gap was out to 17, 44-27. Bell and the O Sullivans, Jamie and Jack, had the lead whittled down to 11, 48-37, but Kevin Donohue and Gary Morrissey joined the three point party to inflict more damage. Terion Moss had the last word in the half to leave it at 58-43 at halftime, but ominously, he also picked up his third foul.

A quick start was what was needed by the Lakers to get back in the game, but Carlow through Summers, Arriaga, and Kehoe, with another three , widened the gap. Moss was now on four fouls, and his influence was bound to dwindle with the risk of being fouled out. Bell picked up the baton at this stage, and his ten points sandwiched a Paul Clarke three-pointer. But all the while, Donohue and Arriaga hit threes as Carlow changed tack, going inside and still finding a way to extend the gap to 30, 86-56.

With the game decided, it at least afforded Coach Brian Clarke an opportunity to give youngsters Cian Forde, Chris Healy, and Daniel Carroll some game time, and they acquitted themselves well Carlow didn't let up with Kehoe hitting their nineteenth three-pointer of the game, and Donohue and Summers are still chipping in. Bell carried the bulk of the scoring burden for the Lakers . He hit 17 points in the final quarter as Elvis (Omorusi) entered the building for Carlow. His physical presence allowed him to furnish eight points, and by the final buzzer, it was the Lakers fans who were all shook up, given the unprecedented display of shooting they had witnessed by the visitors

In the end, SETU Carlow was victorious on a 111-78 scoreline, and the form book certainly didn't write this scoreline. For the Lakers, they have two home games in the coming weeks, and it's back to the gym as they will attempt to get this cup tie out of their system.

"It was an exhibition of shooting from SETU Carlow. I can recall playing Neptune on a Wednesday night for the GlenEagle Lakers in the INEC and everything we hit went in, we scored something like 140 points", Coach Brian Clarke said following the game.

"We can learn from it though. The way which they moved the ball and the crispness, care and speed of the pass allowed them that extra time to take and ultimately make the shot".

He added "we have three home games in a row starting with the Dublin Lions this weekend and we'll work on things in training. Hopefully we'll get some of the lads healthy and bring some of our work in training to the games."

Braden Bell had a game high 43 points, Terion Moss and Jamie O Sullivan had 10 apiece, Jack O Sullivan hit 7, Paul Clarke 5, Eoin Carroll 2 and Daniel Carroll 1.

For SETU Carlow, Xabier Arriaga had seven three pointers in his 27 point total, Puff Summers shot 21, Kevin Donohue 19, Michael Wallace 15, Jack Kehoe 12, Elvis Omorusi 8, Gary Morrisey 5 and Conor Byrne 4.

So a disappointing exit in the National Cup and it's back to the bread and butter of the National League. The Lakers sit comfortably in mid table and the fixtures list has thrown up three home games in a row. First up this Saturday, November 11th is the visit of the Dublin Lions. The Lions have yet to roar with one win and four losses from their five games. But a drill down into their results will see that three of their four defeats have only been by single digits while their solitary win has been against the fancied UCD Marian. They will be looking to bounce back from their last league outing where they put in a disappointing display against Moy Tolka Rovers. Cian Tiernan, Tiernan Howe, Brendan Trapper and Mo Sabc would be their leading lights. Tip off in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre is 7.30pm. The Limerick Celtics are in Killarney on November 18th with Malahide making the trip from the capital on Saturday December 9th.

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

When John Lennon was shot, in the hall of the Dakota, This callous murder, engendered world-wide trauma. His songs entertained millions, all around the globe, As the Twist and Shout man, with Liverpool's Fab Four. The Beatles were without a doubt, the best band that ever was, Writing timeless melodies, devoid of any flaws. 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

EAST KERRY CLAIM BISHOP MOYNIHAN IN TIGHT FINISH

Senior County Final: East Kerry 2-10 Mid Kerry 0-15



The East Kerry Team

East Kerry's fourth title in five years looked inevitable for most of this year's County Championship (about which more anon) and a lot of this game felt tepid enough for a lot of the early stages – in contrast to Austin Stack Park, which was cold and lashed by a couple of savage showers. Not a nice day for football at all, and it did affect the game, although the skillset and handling on both sides was a real credit to the players. Little did we know at that stage that the game would finish in an epic whirlwind that would grace any pitch in any county, or even Croke Park itself.

Mid Kerry drew first blood, Éanna O'Connor coolly clipping over a free. East Kerry didn't take long to reply, though, a double-teamed David Clifford on the end of a great team move to lay off to Donal Down O'Sullivan for their opening score. East Kerry looked the better side, but Mid Kerry were defending well. Nathan Breen denied David Clifford with a stupendous block and Darren Houlihan with a well-timed and hard should discommodated Paudie Clifford just before he could pull the trigger. Mid Kerry had two wides themselves – and, unfortunately,

shooting was to become a bit of a bugbear for them. Gavan O'Grady did nudge them in front in the 13th minute.

A foul on Donal Down O'Sullivan allowed Dara Roche to shoot over a free and level matters. Mid Kerry's Mike Breen and Gavin Horan combined brilliantly to set up Gavan O'Grady, but the shot curled just wide. Darren Houlihan and the outstanding David Roche had wides as well but Keith Evans profited from a great turnover to put his side back in front.

David Clifford kicked his first point, showing good strength to ride the tackle and swing over at his ease. Cillian Burke, always a handful for Jack Sherwood, replied, but East Kerry's engines were warming to their task now. In fairness, Mid Kerry lost Nathan Breen, one of the best players in this year's County Championship, to an unfortunate injury that didn't help their cause. A foul on an industrious Ronan Buckley saw David Clifford square things. An absolutely superb pass by Buckley to Dara Roche saw him time his lay-off perfectly to Paudie Cliffordand the East Kerry captain gave Seán Coffey no chance with a close-range rocket.

Niall Donohue set up David Clifford for another point and, after a very uncharacteristic miss from a close range free by Gavan O'Grady, Dara Roche fired over a beauty. East Kerry had just scored 1-3 without reply to go five points in front, and that's a huge gap on a day like this. Éanna O'Connor did pull back a free before Paul Hayes sounded the half-time whistle.

Half-time East Kerry 1-6 Mid Kerry 0-5

Dara Roche and Fiachra Clifford exchanged frees at the start of the second half. Mid Kerry were starting to take control now, with Seán O'Brien particularly prominent around the middle. They still left three good chances to work the scoreboard behind them - that tally was mounting up - before Éanna O'Connor pointed a free won by Cillian Burke, who was really starting to make his presence felt inside. Éanna quickly added another one, a real stunner of a kick this time. Daire Cleary was on the pitch by now and, as has been his wont all through the championship, immediately seemed to energise Mid Kerry. A turnover by him led to Gavin Horan splitting the posts, 1-7 to 0-9. East Kerry were beginning to feel the

pressure now.

Dara Roche calmed any nerves with a well-executed free. Then came a moment of magic and the pivotal score of the game. Ronan Buckley made a brilliant full length block, with the ball coming back out to end up in the hands of sub Luke Crowley. 25 years ago his father was the key player for East Kerry as they won a second Bishop Moynihan on the trot. Sometimes history really does repeat itself; young Luke didn't lick his football off the stones. He darted forward like lightning, exchanged a quick one-two with an alert Donal Down, and supplied the finish himself. 2-8 to 0-9.

And still Mid Kerry absolutely refused to buckle. They deserve enormous credit for the character they showed. Cillian Burke won another free for Éanna O'Connor, and the Milltown/Castlemaine was in no mood for missing. Paudie Clifford teed up Dara Roche for his fifth score. Gavan O'Grady fired over but Donal Down replied with East Kerry's final score.

It was all Mid Kerry now, with East Kerry desperately defending with their backs to the wall. Mike Breen, who played a captain's role throughout, kicked over a point. Liam Carev struck a great shot and peoples' hearts were in their mouth, but Brian Kelly somehow managed to get an arm out to block it. The ball was still spilling loose almost on the goal-line, but an alert Finbarr Murphy snatched it to clear. Gearóid Hassett won a free and Éanna O'Connor converted another beauty – it is impossible to calculate the value of a free-taker like this to any team. Seán O'Brien kicked a fantastic score, and there was just two points in it. Mid Kerry sent a dangerous ball in to Gavan O'Grady, but Jack Sherwood managed to get a hand in to knock it away - Sherwood was back in the full back line now and was an iconic leader in the trenches. And this was trench warfare now, a real 'fix bayonets' world war I situation. Every second was crucial now. Liam Carey kicked a point. Down to the bare minimum.

One last attack, but Cian Lynch dived full length to snuff out the danger. The final whistle meant euphoria for East Kerry and heartbreak for a Mid Kerry side who had probably played slighter more football overall but can only look back with deep regret at the chances they left behind them. This is the top level of football in Kerry, and those tiny margins add up to a lot. They eventually add up to an eighth County title coming the way of East Kerry almost half a century since their first one back in 1965.

A watching Jack O'Connor will have been disappointed for his son, of course, but he'll have seen some potential good tidings in terms of the Kerry team for the next year or two. It's not a secret that the likes of Dara Roche, Donal Down O'Sullivan, Cillian Burke, Mike Breen, or Seán O'Brien are already under consideration to various degrees. Both Dara and Donal Down acquitted themselves very well in last year's National League and their displays here, where the Glenflesk man in particular gave a man of the match performance, won't have hurt their chances. Kerry are temporarily losing a midfielder as Jack Barry travels abroad (and he is absolutely right to take the opportunity to do so) and that opens the door for Ronan Buckley or Darragh Lyne (either of Rathmore's Ryan midfielders is worth a look as well; I thought Cathal was outstanding this year). Cian Gammell had a great game, driving forward from wing back. David Mangan has guietly and efficiently built up a reputation as a sticky nononsense defender. I'm not saying he'll make it. I'm just saying that I'd give him a look. Cian Lynch, Luke Crowley, and Keith Evans won't make it next year, but they wouldn't hurt any training panel. I imagine (and of course, this is all just my imagination) Jack will keep a close eye on young Robert Stack of Beale as well.

Prospects are only that; unfulfilled potential as well. But other counties are gleaning acres to find a few loose grains. Kerry, despite all the negativity (and I am as guilty as anyone too often in that) is doing a lot better than too many of us think.

POTENTIAL REFORMS OF THE **COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP?**

been a lacklustre enough County Championship overall, and the reasons why are many and varied. The split season - and I am an ardent supporter of it, the previous system had become unwieldy long before the finish and it wasn't fair on county players or on club players - has condensed the club fixtures too tightly. There's too many games, anyway. A group stage in the club championship, which hasn't even concluded before teams begin their county championship, followed by a group stage in the county championship. Lads, give me and my wallet a small break here, alright? For that matter, give the players a break. Austin Stacks had a huge injury list when they slipped down to Intermediate. Kerins O'Rahillys only had the bare remnants of the team that went all the way to an All Ireland semi-final just last year. Dingle certainly seemed to get caught by fatigue in the last twenty minutes of their clash with Mid Kerry, and have a Munster campaign to work towards now. There must come a time when it feels like as much of a chore as a privilege. You can only go so hard for so long.

Football tactics have become overwhelmingly negative and defensive rather than attacking. It works, but it works by reducing games to a dogfight of endurance rather than skill, and skill needs to be paramount for a spectacle. The GAA's insistence on no cash at the gate is difficult for a lot of people and has rightly been condemned in many quarters. Why are you putting obstacles in the way of people who are actively trying to give your organisation money? The widespread availability of games on pay-per-view is, in my opinion, affecting crowds a bit. Quite simply, the weather isn't helping these days either.

And with all that said, we do have to address the elephant in the room. The one where East Kerry were practically unbackable favourites for this year's County Championship. That's not their fault, they didn't set up the system, but there does seem to be a definite imbalance. And by 'seem', I'm not offering an opinion; I'm offering it as a statistical reality based entirely upon results. It is a problem.

But the reaction has been a bit over the top. There have been calls to eliminate divisional teams altogether. Can I suggest instead that maybe we throw out the bathwater but keep the baby? That's not a proverb. That was a literal thing in the middle ages. People actually bathed more back then than we usually think. but obviously only one bath of water would be heated and the youngest would be bathed last. There was a genuine risk of the baby accidently getting thrown out in the dirty bathwater. Getting rid of divisional teams entirely? I doubt it will be countenanced, and I certainly hope

I don't go for the argument that players from weaker clubs might be overlooked by Kerry as a general premise. The idea that Donnchadh Walsh, Seán O'Sullivan, Darran O'Sullivan, or Declan O'Sullivan wouldn't have been seen by Kerry selectors is absolutely ridiculous. All of these guys were star Kerry minors long before they shone in the County Championship. That said, it's true in regards to both Tom O'Sullivan of Rathmore and Paudie Clifford, so the argument is not without foundation.

Divisional teams do give players a chance to play at the highest level among peers. It's something of great value. There is a clear problem with the ninth best club in Kerry playing in the provincial and All Ireland intermediate club championship against the 17th best team in other counties and similar at junior (again, the rolls of honour are fairly indisputable) but quite simply, it's not our problem.

I agree with Croke Park about a counties'

senior championship being limited to sixteen teams. It wasn't too much of a problem for Kerry, but some county championships were just running on endlessly and choking off all over competitions. Cork, perhaps surprisingly given that they easily have the most of clubs of any county, actually deserve credit for a good record in that regard.

The promotion/relegation system is hard on clubs, very hard. In fairness, Austin Stacks and Rathmore brought it up at County Board meetings several times over the years. The fact is that relegation is devastating for clubs and it's very, very hard to claw your way back up. Look at next year's Intermediate Championship. Austin Stacks, Killarney Legion, Glenflesk, Beaufort (injuries badly hampered their hand this year but they have great players coming through), either Fossa or Milltown/Castlemaine, Laune Rangers, An Ghaeltacht, Gneeveguilla..... straight up, I found this year's Intermediate Championship absolutely fascinating all through. That's what a championship needs to be and that's what the hunt for the Bishop Moynihan Cup should feel like. Right now, it doesn't.

You can't relegate a divisional team. You just can't. What do you do with their component clubs? Relegate them as well automatically? Do you make a rule that divisional teams can't include intermediate clubs, thereby closing off the county championship to them?

I don't want us getting rid of divisional teams. I think it's an over-reaction, and a bad one. We do need to strengthen the chance of club sides in the county championship, but I genuinely believe that reducing the number of games would help. The old winners and losers in the second round and two strikes puts you out made it tough for divisional teams to find their feet, but too much of the group stages in the championships (including the drawn out

format of the All Ireland Championship) feels like far too many relatively meaningless games to me. Clubs have smaller panels available to them, obviously, and are more reliant on key players. I can see an argument for a separate divisional and club championship and combing the top four from each for knockout county championship quarter-finals. But that doesn't take away from the need to relegate a club.

At the same time, East Kerry is too strong, too dominant. And it was very predictable, given their absolute dominance over a recent period in minor and U21/U20. You have U20 intercounty stars sitting on the bench. That shouldn't be happening. If Fossa wins the Intermediate, it relieves the immediate symptoms but doesn't actually solve the problem in the long run.

Should the North Kerry teams be amalgamated at senior as they are at minor and U20 to great success? I'd give those players time to show what they can do at senior. If things don't improve for Feale and Shannon Rangers, then I think it will have to be looked at. The inclusion of Kerins O'Rahillys should strengthen St. Brendans - with the addition of Austin Stacks, I expected them to be a real force this year but it didn't really happen. St. Kierans are a divisional team made up out of three different districts it's like the stew that you make when you just want to use up all the leftover vegetables. They have a better chance of winning the lottery than getting a decent training programme together in the current timeframe. Could you put the likes of Knocknagoshel and Brosna with Shannon Rangers and move the Fossa, Listry, and Firies clubs to a Castleisland-based St. Kierans? Alternatively, could you have Eoghan Ruadh, a successful underage amalgamation, go senior, thereby splitting East Kerry, and put North Kerry as one team to make up your sixteen? Could you go with ten senior clubs and six divisional teams? That would lower the risk of relegation for clubs.

It needs to be looked at and I'm sure it will be. But I wouldn't be rushing into any changes just for the sake of change and there will need to be a lot of discussion. No matter what, there will be people deeply unhappy at any proposed solution. The one thing we need to do is make sure that the cure doesn't make things worse.

Aodhán O'Neill, who impressed for the Sem and the Kerry U20s last year, slotted a free to put five points between them. Cillian Langan had a free in response but the excellent Seán Teahan closed out the first half scoring.

East Kerry's Fr. James Galvin Cup had a finale that was easily a match in the Fitzgerald Stadium for the excitement in Austin Stack Park a day later. In the end it was Cordal's Jason Cronin who lifted the trophy in memory of Fossa's famous and much loved priest of yore. The Dingle native actually lined out at midfield for the 1936 Kerry minors on their way to the All Ireland Final and also captained the Sem in his day.

He would unquestionably have loved every minute of a great game. The sides were simply unseparable all through. 0-2 apiece after the first quarter, Scart's Eddie Horan with a brace already and Philip O'Connor and Jason Cronin replying for Cordal. 0-4 apiece late in the first half, Eddie Horan and Brian O'Riordan trading scores with Philip and Kieran Enright. Enright soon kicked his second, but Eddie and Shay Walsh gave Scartaglin a 0-6 to 0-5 half-time lead.Seán Horan kicked a brace on his own to join his twin on the scoresheet but Philip O'Connor (2), Seán Óg Ó Ciardubhain, and Daniel Murphy edged Cordal ahead by 0-9 to 0-8. Then came high drama as a Scart goal by Eddie Horan put the cat among the pigeons. Cordal were only hanging on, with Scartaglin with another brace from Eddie Horan edging into a 1-12 to 0-13 lead, with Kieran Enright and Philip O'Connor (2) keeping Cordal in it. A two point deficit is huge on a day like this. Cordal

trimmed the gap. Philip O'Connor swing over a free. At last, Cordal had one last kick to win it late in the game. Very difficult, long distance, testing weather conditions. You'd only be sure of a few free-takers putting that one over. Mikey Sheehy. Maurice Fitzgerald. Mick O'Connell, of course. Yeah, this was very much like that, and with a worse wind. David Clifford is an obvious choice, but Shane Ryan puts those over too. Anybody else leap to mind?

Oh yeah, Seán Óg Ó Ciardubháin. Seán Óg doesn't leave those after him, and he didn't on this occasion either.

Eddie Horan was the man of the match, and rightly so, but the day belonged to Cordal. It only got better for the club as the news filtered down from Mallow that the club's U14 team had beaten Ardfert by 2-7 to 1-6 to win the Munster Interclub 10 A-Side Blitz to bring a first Munster trophy back to the club.

LEAGUE OF IRELAND

Chances are that by the time you read this, either Cork City or Waterford will be playing in next year's Division One along with Kerry FC. I do expect Kerry FC to improve; I thought that we finished the season very strongly and several of those draws could have been wins. But Cork City, despite how hugely they have fallen from their glory days of six or seven years ago (they only won one title, a double in 2017, but the rivalry between themselves and Stephen Kenny's Dundalk gave the LOI more public attention than anything the FAI have ever done for it) still have a home venue with a capacity of over 7000 for good reason. Mind you, Turner's Cross, like Pairc Uí Caoimh, is simply in an awkward location, too far for walking distance from the city and too off the public transport network. That said, Tallaght is simply much worse, and I'm a bit sceptical

about taking this game to Tallaght. Cork and Waterford....oh well, let's take them to Dublin. I don't see much choice, though. Cork City would surely fill a lot of St. Colman's Park (Cobh Ramblers home ground, capacity 4000) for this

Cork City has a tradition and a fanbase. Said fanbase have definitely not done themselves proud this year, though. Some of the remarks by a so-called fan in regard to Shamrock Rovers manager Stephen Bradley's son back in May were disgraceful. Credit to the club for banning two of these so-called supporters for life. The lack of a guard of honour for Shamrock Rovers as champions....supposedly it energised the fanbase. I have no time for it (of course I am not drawing any comparison with the earlier incidents, which were infinitely worse). But to me, that wasn't disrespectful to the champions. It was disrespectful to the championship, which is a very different thing. And anyway, any manager, at any level, who lets the fans dictate his approach isn't going to last long. The likes of Mick O'Dwyer, Kevin Heffernan, Brian Cody, or Tom McKieranan respected their support base. But they never held any referenda, and would have rightly laughed at the notion. So would John Caulfield. But to me, very much from the outside, Caulfield was four years as Cork manager and longer as a player when he led them to the double. Cork City have had three different managers already this season, and that's never a healthy sign.

Waterford have the top striker in Division One by a mile. Ronan Coughlan has been scoring goals with the enthusiasm of a toddler eating sweets. So much so that it's hard to know much else about them without close analysis, and I haven't done that. There is a definite disparity between the Premier and Division One in the League of Ireland and Cork City should probably have the advantage here, but I truly don't know and I don't particularly have any dog in this fight. I'm just looking forward to a good game.



Motion passed on IVF Funding




Cllr. Martin Grady had successfully had a motion : passed at the recent KCC Meeting that Kerry County Council would write to the relevant Ministers seeking to broaden the eligibility for those who wish to avail of IVF funding.

The criteria in place is making it difficult for couples to avail of the scheme. With funding available for only one cycle of IVF with a BMI of 30 or below and a maximum age of 40, this is restrictive in comparison to other European countries, if a woman is in her late 30's with a BMI of over 30, the passage of time here while she tries to achieve the required weight loss, often by means of an unhealthy crash diet will further decrease the chances as there's a race against time to avail of the funding.

Other countries that offer funding up to 40 will extend the age limit, where all other criteria's are met with a common sense approach.

The funding isn't available to couples who already have a child or if they've already tried one round of IVF even if it was at their own expense, this is unfair as IVF may often take 2 or 3 rounds, couples have struggled financially over the years self-funding treatments, some having to take out loans with high interest rates. Of those that present themselves to clinics in Ireland that would be considered

suitable self-funded nearly 50% of those aren't able to avail of the scheme due to the tight restrictions.

HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

What we mean when we call a plant an Herbaceous Perennial is that in most of them the stems are soft, succulent and green as opposed to being brown and woody. With most Herbaceous Perennial they will sprout growth from ground level in spring and will grow and flower right through the summer and into the autumn. With most Herbaceous Perennials, in late autumn and early winter they start to look a bit ragged. But depending on the severity of the winter, some will hold on until the first real cold snap. The maintenance for most Herbaceous Perennials isn't a lot really. During late autumn, early winter cut the majority of the stem down to ground level and mulch over with some compost. some Herbaceous Perennials such as Lupins and semi hardy Fuchsias will have woody stems because of the milder climate here so when pruning back cut right back to just a couple of inches above ground level.

Herbaceous Perennials are a valuable plant in the garden for a number of reasons.

- 1. Because of the length of time they flower for.
- Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread.

When planting an Herbaceous Border always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant that you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Perennials flower from April until October/November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. The secret to having a good flowering Herbaceous Border is every few years in the winter to lift and divide the plants that are suitable for this.


Welcome back dear student "In the beginning was the Word, the Word was with God, and the Word was God...through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made.... In Him was Life, and that Life was the Light of all mankind. The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it...The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His Glory, the Glory of the One and Only Son, who came from the Father, full of Grace and Truth" (John 1:1-5 & vs 14). John the apostle clearly revealed that Jesus is the Son of God and is the One through Whom everything was created - the Word of God in Person! Now, with that in mind, let's continue our study from last week - looking again at this verse in Hebrews "...for the Word of God is living and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it pierces even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow. It exposes the thoughts and intentions of the heart. Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight; everything is uncovered and exposed before the eyes of Him to whom we must give account" (Hebrews 4:12-13). Because we know that Jesus, the Word of God was raised from the dead, this verse can be read like this ... Jesus is alive and active. Jesus is sharper than any double-edged sword - piercing even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow. Jesus exposes the thoughts and intentions of the heart. Nothing in all creation is hidden from Jesus, everything is uncovered and exposed before His eyes, and we are accountable to Jesus.

Last week we studied the soul and the spirit. Now let's look at the joints and marrow, and the innermost thoughts and desires of the heart. The Word of God – Jesus – knows you inside and out – both good and bad. He was there as you were being knit together in your mother's womb (Psalm 139:13-16). Jesus understands you. The joints and marrow are intricately linked. The soft marrow is made in the inner part of the bone producing the blood cells for life, the hard joint holds the bones together so the body can move. Nothing is hidden from Jesus. People can project one image but what goes on inside their hearts behind closed doors can be quite different. Yet none of our pain or mistakes are news to the Lord Jesus. He knows it all and still He loves us and has already forgiven us, paid for our healing and longs for us to receive His transforming Love (Proverbs 3:5-8; Proverbs 4:20-22). Many people resist, foolishly thinking that once no one else knows then God doesn't either. But the Scripture is clear - we are accountable to God's Word — the Lord Jesus!

Jesus told His disciples that He had come to seek and to save the lost not to judge sinners, but to save them (Luke 19:10; John 3:17-21). But there is a day of judgement coming when we each will stand before King Jesus alone, and give an account of how we lived, how we handled His Word, and what we did with it (Romans 14:7-12; 2 Corinthians 5:10). The devil - the 'accuser of the brethren' knows this too (Revelation 12:10-11). He accuses us where we have broken the commands of God from the Word (Colossians 2:13). But the Good News is that Jesus paid for us to be forgiven and restored to God with His Life, taking our sins and giving us His right standing with the Father - Hallelujah!


