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Killarney's impressive leap from 28th position in the Irish Business Against Litter league table this time last year to 14th place at the start of 2024 has been lauded by the town's Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

The business organisation said it was a "fantastic achievement" in a short space of time and that great credit is due to Killarney Municipal District Council, its outdoor staff and the elected members for being the guiding hand in the push for great improvements.

"The council has turned the ship around and ensured Killarney is heading in the right direction and it augurs well for our ambition to become Ireland's tidiest town once again," Chamber joint presidents Johnny McGuire and Pádraig Treacy said in a statement.

There was a real air of disappointment this time last year when Killarney finished in 28th position in the Irish Business Against Litter (IBAL) league table. The town had climbed to 20th position by midsummer and now it is in 14th place and edging towards the top ten once again.

The Chamber said in addition to the work of the municipal district council, great strides have been made by the tidy towns committee and the reintroduction of the Killarney Looking Good Competition has given the town a real boost.

"It was really encouraging also to see the IBAL adjudicators praising the Killarney coffee cup initiative through which Killarney is setting a nationwide example.

"It is to be hoped that the Government will now work on introducing the required legislation to introduce the long-awaited latte levy so that the initiative can be rolled out nationwide," the Chamber stated.

For the second year running, the IBAL adjudicators were critical of the commercial bin storage area in the Glebe car park and that problem, once again, has cost Killarney a much higher ranking in the league table given that the grade awarded was just a C+.

"We look forward to this issue being resolved as an immediate priority and we would encourage the business community to work closely with the council and its staff to find a practical and workable solution," the Chamber said.

"Killarney is very proud to have been declared Ireland's tidiest large town in the national Tidy Towns competition and our sights are now set on winning the prestigious overall award for the first time since 2011. Working together, we can achieve that goal," the statement from the joint presidents added.

The An Taisce report for Killarney stated:

Overall, a very solid result for Killarney in IBAL 2023 league – there were seven top ranking sites this time around, a very strong result. The Commercial Bin area in Glebe Car Park was still a poorly presented one, generating considerable amounts of litter. It was by far the most heavily littered site surveyed in Killarney. It's very encouraging to see Killarney town take the lead on banishing single use coffee cups – a great initiative which has clearly had the 'buy in' from enough cafes / restaurants in the town.

TEAM WORK can make the dream work

wo of Kerry's most successful tidy towns committees are working together to exchange ideas and enable them both to improve their individual performances with the ultimate aim of creating a better Kerry.

The hugely successful Killarney Looking Good project - which returned last year after a long absence - was hailed as one of the reasons for the county's tourism capital winning the prestigious title of Ireland's tidiest large town in the keenly contested nationwide competition.

And it has made such an impact that the tidy towns committee in Kenmare is now planning to introduce a similar project to create more awareness in the community and to encourage locals to make an even greater effort.

The Kenmare committee members sought a meeting with representatives of the Killarney Looking Good Committee to discuss their plans, to get ideas on how the competition is run, tips on how best to promote it

but with the potential to grow.

"It's great that we can share our ideas with our neighbours in Kenmare and it's wonderful to see this

cooperation and team-work which will have the end result of creating a more tidy and attractive Kerry," said Johnny McGuire of the Killarney Tidy Towns Committee.

Killarney and Kenmare have both had the honour of winning the overall title of Ireland's tidiest town with Kenmare winning in 2000 and Killarney achieving to top accolade in 2011.

The common link was the late Archdeacon Michael Murphy who was parish priest in Kenmare when it won and had retired to Killarney at the time of its success 11 years later.

He was the driving force behind both victories and he also led Sneem to the ultimate glory in 1987 when he was based in the village.

Killarney was just a single point behind overall winner Abbeyleix in the 2023 national tidy towns competition with a total of 375 points in Category F - an impressive 14-points improvement on 2022.

The competition adjudicator's concluding remarks said: "Killarney is a beautiful town with much to offer residents and visitors in terms of visual and recreational amenity, nature activities and heritage.

"Our congratulations in particular to the traders of Killarney for the fantastic presentation of so many premises. All in all, a super showing by Killarney this year".

Kenmare, which was in Category D, achieved 371 marks which was a whopping 15 points more than the previous year.

The adjudicator said: "Kenmare is a beautiful town with a wonderful natural setting, magnificent heritage buildings and history. The tidy towns group has been successful in capitalising on these assets.

"As busy and all as it was, the town was again litter-free on adjudication day, a tremendous achievement, well done".







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Let the records show... A TOTAL OF 75 INCHES

OF RAIN RECORDED IN MUCKROSS FOR 2023

Horticultural Supervisor, at National Parks and Wildlife Service, Gerry Murphy has been measuring rainfall for 80 years - records began in 1943 - when the Park was known as the Bourne Vincent Memorial Park recording rainfall at Muckross. In that year it recorded 63 and a half inches of rain, (63 I/2 inches) handwritten results were sent to the Meteorological Station in Dublin.

Every morning at 9.00am dedicated staff - 365 days a year, would measure the rainfall, at the weather station.

Gerry took over the task when the late Bill Carson retired in 2000. Automation of Muckross weather station began in 2019 with data transmitted directly to Met Eireann.

Using the old method of gathering water from the funnel together with the automated system, Gerry has been keeping records both manually and by computer.



The driest year recorded in Muckross was in 1971, with a total of 48 and a quarter inches (48 1/4 inches)

The total result for Muckross ending 31st December 2023 has recorded a total of 75 Inches of rainfall.

Over the years there were substations at St. Finan's Hospital - which was always drier, the highest levels were recorded on Mangerton Mountain and Muckross Peninsula, which has its own microclimate with the proximity of the mountains and lakes, making it much wetter. Gerry is still waiting for a new record for the driest year since 1943.

NEW ROAD SURFACING WELCOMED

The new resurfacing work has resulted in a road surface much more befitting the volume of traffic it carries into the town. I know it was a particular source of angst for bus tours operators and they will be in for a treat when they return during the tourist season. I'm equally sure all the hardy souls returning returning after completing the annual Ring of Kerry Cycle will be delighted with the lovely new smooth road surface which awaits them on their return towards the town. The part of their anatomy in contact with the bicycle saddle will be particularly relieved!

Great credit is due to the road crew who are completing the work, their engineers and our own Council and TII engineers and design teams.

ACTION NEEDED ON "NUGGET HILL"

Following the rejection of a motion by Cllr. John O'Donoghue calling for a footpath to be provided on the was rejected, he is now asking that the council would consider installing public lighting from the Golden Nugget up as far as the turn off for Aghadoe at the Abode Apartments, as there is a greatly increased volume of pedestrian and cyclist traffic now using this stretch of roadway and visibility is quite poor, particularly on dark evenings

"As I mentioned in previous Notices of Motion, this stretch of roadway from the Golden Nugget up to the turn off for Aghadoe where the old German Butchers were located, is a stretch which is widely used by pedestrians and cyclists. Visibility is quite poor here, particularly on winter evenings, and there have been several near misses in recent months. Given the volume of Active Travel on the road, any accident could prove fatal and I ask that improving the lighting along this stretch be examined. Active Travel is a priority of the current Government and it should be encouraged, where feasible. My previous Notice of Motion calling for a footpath was rejected, and I accept there are constraints involved in putting a footpath in place, but adequate lighting would help alleviate the danger somewhat", Cllr. O'Donoghue said.

Immigration policy rudderless

Refugee and immigration worries are hotting up around the country. No pun is intended. Killarney's dignified silent protest last November is a model for other communities. Mind you, those who wrote to the Department of Children looking for a meeting are still waiting. A court case this week heard Kerry County Council has 'very serious and grave' concerns over fire safety at the Kingscourt Harmony Inn in Muckross Road. Yet 67 men and three staff were packed in there. This does not inspire confidence.

The lack of consultation with local constituencies is a huge issue. Silly arguments and redundant rhetoric by senior ministers and MEPs is another problem. The Taoiseach's stance that you can't veto who lives near you is not strictly correct. The planning process ensures you have a voice. Every citizen - even bats - has an input into our statutory planning process.

The other argument - and I have heard this from Sinn Fein - is that health and housing were bad anyway in Killarney before the thousands of refugees arrived. So a bad situation makes it acceptable to make matters worse.

The third leg of the stool is that Ireland has plenty of room. This is true. Geographically, Ireland, like Australia, has plenty of land. But much of Australia is uninhabitable. And much of Ireland is now uninhabitable to a decent standard because it does not have basic services - shelter, health and education.

So while Sinn Fein and the Government parties and our MEPs advocate an open arms policy, there is little common sense. None is providing a single house or a single extra nurse or converting the likes of St Finan's

into a refugee centre.

Instead, taxpayers' money is being handed over by this State in truly scandalous amounts to private operators - none of whom is refusing.

The unvetted financial supports to Ukranians 'fleeing war' - Ukraine is a vast country and much of it is unaffected - has made us a laughing stock, something the Government is realising.

Politicians' duty is surely to ensure the delivery of services and the wise spending and distribution of Irish people's money. Twenty years ago when immigration to this country first started, political debate was more robust and the Irish did not feel overlooked and discriminated against.

Batty or what?

The Lesser Horseshoe Bat has a strong say in who is allowed to live near him in Killarney. A planning application for a three-storey apartment block in the Port Road has been turned down because of concern for 'the commute' of the Bat.

It is the second residential application in the area of the Port Road/Demesne to have failed at the Beechers' Brook of An Bord Pleanala. And all because of concern about how artificial lighting might disturb the highly protected bat on its way to and from its roost (Deenagh Lodge) in the Killarney National Park.

We recall how in August 2022 the board refused 228 residential units also on the grounds of how lighting might disturb the bat during and after construction on a 15-acre infill site off the Port Road

Kerry County Council had supported that application too because of the shortage of



all housing types in Killarney.

Housing shortage continues in Killarney and there isn't a single affordable development under construction.

And here we have a refusal for a bat. Things have gone too far entirely.

The proposed development would result in increased artificial lighting generated at both the construction and operational phases of the development which would impact 'on Lesser Horseshoe Bats that commute along routes to the west of the Port Road/Deenagh River', the board said in its written decision. I had to read it twice.

There was also not adequate consideration on the protection and retention of mature trees and hedgerows on and adjacent to the site boundaries which may support foraging bats, the board felt.

Surely conditions could have been attached to mitigate the effects? Elsewhere I have referred to how Fine Gael leader Leo Vardakar is so out of touch with this country he has forgotten the basic legal principles underlying the planning process. Might I suggest our Taoiseach do a refresher course in Killarney? That's if he can get a room at an inn.

Weather station at Muckross

The recording of ten inches of rain at Muckross during December comes as no surprise. The rain in Muckross has been faithfully set down since the 1940s and congratulations to all concerned. However outside of science there is another kind of weather lore. On the shortest day of the year I was speaking with the great traditional forecaster T.P. O'Conchúir in west Kerry. I hadn't spoken with him for some time and I was trying to firm down a basis for the many rainbows I had seen in 2023. Science in the guise of Met Eireann was of little help. All Met Eireann could tell me was rainbows were in the eyes of the beholder .

There was so much caution in what Met Eireann said, I wondered afterwards about the timidity of science if all it could do was raise doubts about observable phenomena.

Recording rainbows is not objective and 'it is not done'.

However, a person could 'possibly' have seen more rainbows in the southwest in 2023, the weatherman said, stressing the 'tenuous' connection between higher rainfall this year and higher sunshine.

So I turned to the west. In his inimitable way, T.P. captured the wonder of the rainbow. He had seen a rainbow like he never saw before in early December. It was while he was waiting for the funeral of a local woman in Dunquin on the sea's edge. The 'huge rainbow' was about five miles out to sea and 'as high as a cathedral'.

'It was exceptionally wide and it stayed for around ten minutes,' he said.

It has been wet non-stop since 'the turn of the year', the 21st of June, he said as the year turned again on the 21st December.

I could have talked to him all day. The point of all this is to congratulate Muckross on their precise measurements, but also to remind people measuring inches is not the only way of telling the weather.

Event will showcase 'WORLD CLASS' KERRY

onfirmation that Tralee has been given the green light to host a stage of the World Rallv Championship, pending government funding and approval of a calendar slot by the promoter, has been described as a fantastic boost for the county by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce. Munster Technological University in Tralee will play a central role if, as expected, Motorsport Ireland's bid to stage the WRC proceeds with Kerry confirmed as one of three chosen locations, along with Limerick and Waterford.

The proposal is that they would alternate as host locations for Rally Ireland between 2025 and 2027 under the terms of the proposed combined three-year deal.

The funding decision is currently under consideration by the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media.

Killarney Chamber noted that the event, said to be worth over \in 300 million in the three-year period, is watched by a global television audience of close on 250 million people and the promotional opportunities for the entire county of Kerry would be immense.

In addition, it would attract thousands of people to Kerry, including crews, their back-up teams, families and rally supporters from all over the world. The MTU North Campus, which incorporates the Kerry Sports Academy, has been identified as one of the preferred locations that meets the very strict WRC criteria.

Hugely impressed Motorsport Ireland officials described the state-of-the-art Tralee venue as "world class".

The announcement was expected to be the selection of one location to host the WRC and the decision to rotate three venues came as a big surprise.

Killarney Chamber congratulated everybody involved in the successful Tralee bid and said their determination and powers of persuasion are a great advantage to the county.

"This is possibly a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to promote Kerry to a very loyal audience who love the sport and relish the spectacular terrain over which the drivers compete".

"The event will showcase Kerry in the best light and, now that this crucial hurdle has been cleared, all our fingers are crossed that it will be ratified and funded," said a statement issued by Chamber joint presidents Pádraig Treacy and Johnny McGuire.

It is anticipated that some of the stages incorporated in the rally would include iconic Kerry rally locations such as Moll's Gap, Caragh Lake and Ballaghbeama and that would really help put the beauty of the county on the world map, the Chamber added.

"My 6km walk would have taken me approx two hours before I lost the weight, however now I am down to just over one hour', he said. Ian also enjoys being apart of his local walking group and spends weekends in the national park

with Linda and the dogs.

"Hayley's support at the group was fantastic and now a friend of mine has joined and he has lost over 2 stone. • Shower vs. Bath: The average bath uses 80 litres of water compared to an average shower using 49 litres in seven minutes. Switch your bath to a shower for a massive water saving

• Less time: With the average shower using 7 litres of water per minute by turning your five

minute shower into four minutes, you could save up to 7 litres of water per day!

• Fully loaded: Always ensure your dishwasher and washing machines are fully loaded. A modern washing machine uses approximately 65 litres of water per cycle while a dishwasher uses 20 litres. 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2024 CAO COLLEGE HOPEFULS CAN APPROACH THE APPLICATION SEASON WITH CONSIDERABLE OPTIMISM

PROMISING

As a new year dawns with fresh hope and radiant enthusiasm, college applicants must focus on the Central Applications Office (CAO) form as the deadline looms large. Indeed, 2024 is shaping up to be a very promising year for the 85,000 plus applicants – about 2,500 from Kerry - seeking a third level college course. In 2023, 67,839 applicants received at least one offer from the CAO. The net applicant acceptance figure was 51,228 - 45,206 at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) and 6,022 at Level 7/6 (Ordinary Level Degrees/Higher Certificates). More than 52,000 college places will be available next August. Applicants have until 5pm on 1st February to submit a completed application form. So, use the remaining weeks wisely. Carefully consider your course choices. Follow your heart but keep an eye on the jobs market.

GRADES & POINTS

The calculated, accredited and enhanced grades have considerably inflated course points requirements during the past four years and that is likely to be the case again in 2024. Consult the 2023 cut off points as a guide to likely points requirements in 2024, but keep in mind that points' requirements for courses may fluctuate from year to year, so predicting cut off points is an inaccurate science. Each Leaving Cert candidate should aim to achieve her/his best possible result in that exam. Points' requirements for courses will take care of themselves in due course.

CAO ROLE

The CAO processes applications for admission to undergraduate courses in third level colleges in Ireland. Every public sector university, college and institute in the country, as well as a number of private colleges, participates in the CAO system. An applicant may choose from the entire range of courses in the CAO Handbook 2024. The courses are categorised as "Level 8" or "Level 7/6". The Level 8 category contains the Honours Bachelor Degrees while the Level 7/6 category contains Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/ Higher Certificates.

All you have to do is submit a single application

The fee is ≤ 30 , if you apply by 20th January and ≤ 45 thereafter until the 1st February.

STUDY THE 2024 HANDBOOK

Before you apply, study the online CAO Handbook 2024 which explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with Level 8 courses being listed separately from Level 7/6 courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

STRENGTHS

Consult the online CAO Handbook 2024 for information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements and content of courses. Similar information can also be found on colleges' websites. Consider the potential career value of each course for which you are applying. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few weeks. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability, achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling and successful college experience.

LACK OF SUPPLY OF HOUSING - an issue for 2024

The price of the average second-hand three-bed semi in County Kerry is predicted to increase by 3pc in 2024, according to a national survey by Real Estate Alliance.

Three-bed semi-detached homes in the county now cost an average of €302,500, up 3pc on the December 2022 average of €292,500, the Q4 REA Average House Price Index shows.

County agents reported that first time buyers made up 65pc of the market in Q4, with 10pc of sales coming from outside the county, and 25pc of sales attributed to landlords selling properties.

Average Killarney prices increased by 2.9pc in 2023 to \in 360,000, while Tralee prices rose by 4.3pc to \in 245,000.

"There is a battle going on at present between lack of supply with no new building and rising costs such as interest rates and cost of living," said Donal Culloty of REA Coyne and Culloty, Killarney.

"It is hard to predict which will win out, but the continuing lack of new houses for sale is the biggest issue facing buyers in 2024."



Guidance for Irish Consumers Ahead of February's Deposit Return Scheme Introduction

Ireland's Deposit Return Scheme goes live on 1 February 2024. From this date onwards, when consumers purchase a drink in a plastic bottle or aluminium can that features the Re-turn logo, they will pay a fully refundable deposit in addition to the price of the drink.

The operator of the nationwide scheme, Return, has some useful guidance for consumers as we approach this date.

When will I pay a deposit?

From 1 February onwards, drinks in plastic bottles and cans with the Re-turn logo will start to appear in shops and supermarkets nationwide. These drinks containers will require the purchaser to pay a fully refundable deposit in addition to the price of the product. When finished your drink, you can return your empty undamaged container to any participating shop or supermarket nationwide.

To prevent waste, for a limited period, from 1 February there will be some stock of plastic bottles and cans without the Re-urn logo. As consumers will not have paid a deposit on these plastic bottles and cans, they can be placed in recycling bins.

What will I pay?

A deposit of 15 cents will apply to each container from 150ml - 500mls and a deposit of 25 cents for containers over 500ml to 3 litres. Where can I return my bottle and cans?

The majority of retailers across the country have now registered for the Deposit Return Scheme and have set up their deposit return points. Consumers can return their empty undamaged plastic bottles and cans to participating shops and supermarkets nationwide. either through a Reverse Vending Machine (RVM) or manually, over the counter.

From 1 February our website www.re-turn.ie will feature a map that indicates where to find deposit return points.

How will I get my deposit back?

Consumers receive the deposit back when

they return the plastic bottle or can with the Re-turn logo that is empty and undamaged to participating shops and supermarkets nationwide. If through a reverse vending machine, consumers will be issued a voucher that can be redeemed at the till against store purchases or as a cash refund. If over the counter, retailers must check the drinks container features the Re-turn logo and is undamaged and then provide a refund.

Consumers are advised not to crush or squeeze the plastic bottles and cans.

When can I return?

From the beginning of February, this scheme will be live. Consumers will start to be charged the refundable deposit on drinks containers with the Re-turn logo and when finished, these drinks containers can be returned to participating shops and supermarkets nationwide for a full deposit refund.

Re-turn is asking consumers not to store drinks containers before the Scheme goes live as these bottles will not have the Re-turn logo and are therefore ineligible for any deposit refund as no deposit has been paid.

Can I still use my own recycling bins to dispose of plastic bottles?

While all consumers should use their recycling bins for mixed dry recyclables, we would ask that consumers return their plastic bottles and cans with the Re-turn logo to local participating shops and supermarkets to redeem their deposit.

The separate collection of these plastic bottles and cans guarantees a high quality recyclate material is returned and recycled and there is no cross contamination. The introduction of Deposit Return is a proven method of increasing recycling rates, with great success in a number of other European countries.

What is not included in the scheme?

Not every drinks container is eligible for Deposit Return. Only drinks containers in PET



plastic bottles, aluminium & steel cans from 150ml to 3 litres are included in the Scheme. All containers included in the Scheme will feature the Re-turn logo.

Items that are not included in the deposit return scheme include:

Any dairy drinks products in plastic containers or cartons e.g. milk, yogurt drinks

Steel and tin cans that contain foodstuffs Containers for cleaning supplies

These items should continue to be disposed of in a recycling bin.

Glass drinks containers are also not included in the scheme and should be recycled as usual and brought to a glass and bottle bank.

Why is Ireland launching a Deposit Return Scheme?

The Deposit Return Scheme is a practical circular economy initiative that aims to create a closed loop recycling system guaranteeing the material is returned and recycled. The EU has set Ireland a target to separate and collect 77% of plastic beverage bottles by 2025. This target will rise to 90% in 2029. We currently recycle between 60%-70% of drinks containers and Deposit Return is a proven method of increasing recycling rates, with great success in a number of other European countries.

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MANAGING SICKNESS ABSENCE ISSUES IN THE WORKPLACE

Where the absence consists of short but persistent and apparently unconnected absences then, after suitable investigation, disciplinary action may be appropriate. However, this is not a suitable course of action in relation to longer-term sickness.

THE IMPORTANCE OF SHORT-TERM ABSENCE PROCEDURES

There are a number of key steps in managing short-term absence.

· Establish a clear procedure that employees must follow, for example, the use of a return-to-work interview with line management and completion of self-certification forms even for one day of absence. This will ensure that everyone is aware that monitoring takes place and there is a complete record of absence.

· Establish a system of monitoring absence and regularly review this for emerging trends. Tangible statistics can provide useful warning signals to prompt early action and avoid problems in the future.

· Return to work interviews should always be undertaken by the individual's immediate line manager, which will ensure that clear reasons for taking time off from work emerge. This will give managers the opportunity to get to the root cause of an absence which could be a symptom of a deeper problem

. If the issues are personal and not work related, the employer should decide on the amount of flexibility he or she is prepared to give to enable the individual to address their issue.

. If there may be an underlying medical condition the employer should consider requesting a medical report to support the level of absence; there may be a hidden underlying condition and links to disability discrimination may not be immediately apparent.

· All employees should be made aware that any abuse of the sick pay provisions will result in disciplinary action.

. If there is no good medical reason for the absences the employee should be counselled and told what improvement is expected and warned of the consequences if no improvement is seen.

· If there are medical reasons for the absence, consider any links to the Equality Act 2010, for example, does the absence relate to hospital appointments or treatment required; if so, the employer is required to make reasonable adjustments which includes allowing time off for treatment.

. If the situation reaches a stage where the employee is to be dismissed and there is no defined medical condition, it may be on the grounds of misconduct. Here the employer must be able to show that a fair procedure has been followed taking into account the nature and length of the illness, past service record and any improvement in the attendance record.

. If the employee has a recognised medical condition that is not a disability but the absence rate is unacceptably high, it may be possible to dismiss fairly for some other substantial reason after following the due process. Again, length of service and the availability of suitable alternative employment are relevant factors to consider before reaching a decision.

WINTER EYE HEALTH

Here are some of the ways winter can affect your vision, or worsen an eye condition, and tips for prevention.

Driving in winter

In winter you may have more difficulty seeing clearly because of darker evenings .When it is dark your pupils become larger to let in more light. However this can results in your vision becoming more blurred. This is why you may be more reliant on your glasses at night.

The glare of a low-lying sun can also make it more difficult to see, so make sure your windscreen is clean, both inside and out. It is useful to have a pair of polarised sunglasses in the car to help with the glare from the sun, even in winter.

Dry eyes

If you already have dry eyes, central heating may make them worse. Here are some simple steps you can take to minimise the discomfort caused by dry eyes in winter:

- Lower the temperature in rooms when possible.
- Blink more often.

• Use a humidifier. Opening windows for a few minutes on cold days will also help.

• Lubricants. Certain lubricating eye drops may be helpful for you.

Increased screen time People tend to stay in and watch more television and spend more time using computers during the winter. Using a screen will not damage your eyes but prolonged use can make your eyes tired and drv.

Remember to take breaks and operate the 20:20:20 rule; every 20 minutes, take a 20-second break and focus your eyes on something at least 20 feet away.

Watery eyes

In cold and windy conditions, many people complain that their eyes water more than normal. Wearing glasses will provide protection against the wind, even if you don't usually wear them outdoors. **Winter sun**

Snow and ice are reflective, so the sun's damaging UV rays can reach your eyes from below as well as above. UV exposure is cumulative, so although you may not feel any immediate effects, you could be putting yourself at risk of long-term damage and risk cataracts and age-related macular degeneration (AMD) if you don't wear good quality sunglasses or goggles.

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TOP 10 SAFETY TIPS' FOR DRIVING IN SNOW AND ICE

When temperatures dip below freezing driving conditions can become treacherous, the risk of ice or snow on the roads increases. The Road Safety Authority (RSA) has, the following 'Top 10 Safety Tips' for motorists driving in snow and ice:

1. Get a grip.

Remember your only contact with the road surface is your tyres so it's vital that they are up to the task in icy and snowy conditions. Check tyres, including spare wheel, and replace them if the tread depth falls below 3mm. Check that tyres are inflated to the correct tyre pressure. Lack of grip can occur even on treated roads so drive slowly in the highest gear possible, manoeuvre gently and avoid harsh braking. Replace tyres if necessary.

2. Make sure you can see.

Clear your windows and mirrors before you set out, carry a screen scraper and de-icer. Do not use hot water on the windscreen as it can crack the glass. Replace windshield wiper blades if necessary. De-mist the inside of your windows thoroughly. Make sure your windshield washer system works and is full of an anti-icing fluid. Remember too that heavy snowfall will reduce visibility! Watch out for grit/salt spreaders and snow ploughs. The glare from the sun can be dazzling in the winter when the sun is low in the sky, so wear sunglasses in these conditions.

3. Check & use your lights.

Use your dipped headlights so that others will see you. Make sure your headlights and taillights are all in working order, replace broken bulbs. Make sure lights are clear of snow.

4. Gently does it.

Manoeuvre gently, slow down and leave extra distance between you and the vehicle in front. Too much steering is bad and avoid harsh braking and acceleration. Use the highest gear possible to avoid wheel spin. Select a low gear when travelling downhill especially if through bends. Falling snow, fog, rain, or hail will reduces visibility. Do not hang on to the tail lights of the vehicle in front of you as it can give a false sense of security. When you slow down, use your brakes so that the brake lights warn drivers behind you.

5. Watch out for "black ice."

If the road looks polished or glossy it could be, "black ice" one of winter's worst hazards: Black lce is difficult to see! It is nearly transparent ice that often looks like a harmless puddle or is overlooked entirely. Watch out for black ice, especially in sheltered / shaded areas on roads, under trees and adjacent to high walls.

6. Give yourself a brake.

If you get into a skid, you need to know if your vehicle has ABS (Anti- Lock Braking Systems). After you "Step" on the brake the ABS begins cycling — you will feel pulses in the pedal or hear the system working. It's easy to properly use antilock brakes: Remember - Step, Stay and Steer. Step on the pedal.

Stay on the pedal. Steer around the obstacle. (A warning: A little bit of steering goes a very long way in an emergency).

For vehicles without ABS, you'll have to rely on the old-fashioned 'Cadence Braking' system: Push the brake pedal until the wheels stop rolling, then immediately release the brake enough to allow the wheels to begin turning again.

Repeat this sequence rapidly. Your goal is to have the tyres producing maximum grip regardless of whether the surface is snow or ice. **7. How does your vehicle help?**

Check in your owner's manual and find out if your vehicle has any safety assist technology like Electronic Stability Control (ESC) or Anti Lock Braking System (ABS) and know how they assist your driving in severe weather conditions. But remember technology offers no miracles. Don't let these lull you into overestimating the available traction.

8. Be Prepared!

In prolonged icy or snowy driving conditions it

- is advisable to carry the following in the boot of the car
- a. High Visibility Vest
- b. Tow rope
- c. Spare bulbs
- d. Spare fuel
- e. A shovel
- A shovel
- f. Appropriate footwear in case you have to leave your vehicle ie boots
- g. A hazard warning triangle

h. Spare wheel (with tyre at correct pressure and tread)

i. Check that your spare wheel is in good condition and is fully inflated. Some cars may have an inflation repair kit instead of a spare wheel. Make sure that you know how to use it.

j. De-icing equipment (Both for glass and door locks)

k. First aid kit (in good order)

- I. A fire extinguisher (fully operative)
- m. A working torch

n. A car blanket, additional clothing & some food and water

In preparation for driving you should also ensure:

o. The vehicle is properly maintained, serviced and engine oil viscosity is

suitable for cold conditions.

p. Have the strength of coolant/antifreeze measured.

q. Ensure vehicle has adequate supply of fuel for journey.

r. Consider carrying some salt or sand. And

s. Give someone an estimated time of arrival at your proposed destination.

Carry a mobile phone and spare, fully charged, battery (if you don't have a car charger

9. Get informed.

Listen to local weather and traffic reports. The RSA has prepared a helpful guide 'Severe Weather Advice for Road Users' which you can download from the RSA's website. It has lots more useful advice on dealing with the difficult road conditions.

10. Stay at home.

The best thing to do in extremely bad weather is to stay off the road.

Take heed of warnings not to go out. This leaves the emergency services free to deal with real emergencies instead of rounding up stranded motorists.

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JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY takes a look at all things sport...

TAKING A SPORTING TRIP DOWN
MEMORY LANE TO 1974....50 YEARS AGO

CAOGA BLIAIN Ó SHIN

It's that time of year where I like to settle back a bit. There are contemporary sports stories happening. Basketball, rugby, soccer...,plenty going on, but nothing that really captivates me as yet. McGrath Cup and Munster Senior Hurling League? My pulse isn't exactly set racing. Anyone trying to read Kerry's form in the first week of an extremely, extremely long year would do just as well by reading the prophecies of Nostradamus. All Ireland Club semi-finals? Loads of drama, not so much football. And anyone judging the Crokes Glen contest had to be using sonar instead of sight with all that dense fog. More ridiculous than sublime. Hard luck to Tralee Warriors in their semi-final; you won't see a better basketball game this year. So I could write about all of these things.

But I'm not going to do that. It's wet, it's windy, it's cold. I'm going to sit here by the fire and type up a bit about days of yore. Fifty years ago, to be more precise. 1974.

IRELAND IN 1974

The lingering reluctance to co-operate fully with England in trade and the emphasis on maintaining rural traditions and a strongly catholic ethos had held Ireland back for at least a generation. The innovation of the sixties under progressive Governments and a more open-minded catholic hierarchy had completely changed and transformed Ireland. especially in terms of education, tourism, and urbanisation. It brought tremendous benefits, but by the early seventies it was wearing a bit thin. Young people, many of whom still had to emigrate to build a future, were disaffected. Personally - and I haven't researched this -I believe that the motor car and television meant less interaction with neighbours and less of a communal feeling. The oil crisis and big international increases in inflation had taken a huge toll economically. There was a strong reaction to the increase in the cost of a pint. 23p for one pint? People had warned about this newfangled 'decimalisation' that had come in in 1971, and obviously they were right.

Politically the Troubles were at fever pitch, and would get even worse, an awful lot worse, before the year was out. It was a tough situation for Taoiseach Jack Lynch, and for President Cearbhaill Ó Dalaigh, who would be replacing Erskine Childers towards the end of the year. The power-sharing agreement in Northern Ireland of the Sunningdale Agreement would collapse in May.

It wasn't all doom and gloom, far from it. It was a great year for movies. Chinatown is on my alltime list. The Godfather II is considered the best of the series but I prefer the first one. It's still good. Horror fans were engrossed (or possibly just grossed) by 'The Texas Chainsaw massacre'. Mel Brooks 'Blazing Saddles' is ridiculous but it's also ridiculously funny. Roger Moore's James Bond faced off against Scaramanga, the deadly man with the golden gun. Lame enough, in fairness.

You had a decent range for RTE as well. Wanderly Wagon for the younger ones, The Riordans for older ones, Hall's Pictorial Weekly (tame by today's standards, but hard-hitting for its time), The Late Late Show, Sports Stadium.... In terms of the music charts, the likes of Big Tom and Brendan Shine had big followings, but dance halls were rapidly being replaced with discos. Slade, Mud, Gary Glitter, David Essex, Terry Jacks....nobody that was going to start a riot. But young people were finding voices of their own in the likes of Rory Gallagher, Van Morrison, and Horslips ('Dearg Doom' was a much bigger hit in England and Germany than in Ireland. Let's be honest, we all thought they were mad – and in a glorious way, they were). But as always, sport was the main pastime for most people. Blue Demons became the inaugural winners of the Irish Basketball Superleague this year.

Currow has provided Kerry with a lot of good footballers, and one of them had three Sigerson Cups with UCC and had played for the county at both minor and U21 as a full back. Big Moss Keane, surely the wittiest Irish sportsman of all tie, made his debut for his country this year in rugby against France in January and would go on to become a legend in the game.

Soccer was in serious decline in Ireland outside of Dublin, not least because we could watch better soccer on the television and English soccer was becoming a much bigger topic in Irish households than the League of Ireland, which was badly underfunded by the FAI. George Best did make a few cameo appearances for Cork Celtic, but the move reeked of desperation on both sides. Bohs, runners-up last year to Cork Celtic, pipped Athlone to the title this year, while St. Brendans Park won out in Kerry. West Germany won the World Cup, beating the Netherlands 2-1. It wasn't a popular result; people adored the 'total football' approach of Cruyff's Netherlands. Muhammad Ali would knock out George Foreman and regain his title in the 'Rumble in the Jungle' in Zaire. Eddie Merckx was dominating cycling to an incredible degree. The ongoing oil crisis did work in Kerry's favour, as the Circuit of Ireland Rally had a full stage all around the Dingle peninsula for the first time.

The most popular sports figure in Ireland in 1974 wasn't a person. It was a horse. Red Rum was carrying a twelve stone handicap crossing the line for his second English Grand National win, beating l'Escargot.

John Joe Sheehy, who had stepped down from the Munster Council alongside Br. Murray (for whom the Corn Uí Mhuirí is named) last year after almost fifty years of service each, commenced his Presidency of that body.

NATIONAL FOOTBALL LEAGUE

Kerry had been utterly and absolutely hammered by Cork in the 1973 Munster Final. There is no dressing it up. It was our worst beating since 1952, and there were no Cronin brothers or Ned Roche to recruit from other counties this time. Kerry had a serious point to prove in the national League.

Tosach maith. By the New Year we already had comfortable wins over Wicklow, Roscommon (a young Mikey Sheehy made his debut), Longford, and Offaly (Tony O'Keeffe made his debut) in the bag. Just one defeat, and that by a single point – but it was to Cork. Manager Johnny Culloty had blooded young lads like Jimmy Deenihan, John Egan, Ger Power, Ger O'Keeffe, and Mickey Ned O'Sullivan in 1972 and there was a good blend of youth and experience.

In February we beat Tipperary by 3-14 to 0-10. Highly rated youngster Páidí Ó Sé started at

wing forward against Galway. Frank Russell, father of a certain Mike Frank, started at centre forward but was replaced by the eldest of Tom Spillane's sons. Tom, like his in-laws the Lynes of Cleeney, had been a great footballer and young Pat had the makings too, he kicked two points. Kerry had to be content with a draw though. The truth is that Galway should have won free-taker John Tobin missed a few chances and hit the crossbar with a penalty. We were in a League semi-final, but we had ridden our luck. Away to Tyrone, who were not the power that they would become. Kerry supporters were confident heading to Croke Park. It was a tough battle, but Mikey Sheehy was simply unmarkable, and his 2-6 saw Kerry win with a good bit to spare.

Roscommon in the final. That was a serious Roscommon team. Dermot Earley, John Donnellan, Mickey Freyne, Harry Keegan....this was going to be tough.

It was. Again, for the third game in a row, Kerry were wide open for the taking, but John Egan darted through a sliver of space late on to fist an equalising goal. 1-6 to 0-9. A second bite at the cherry.

Dublin were playing Wicklow in the opening round of the Leinster Championship before the replay. Not that too many Kerry supporters left their pints behind to make the curtainraiser. The odds of either Wicklow or Dublin being any kind of threat to the top teams was preposterous. Offaly and Meath were fearsome sides. Dublin? Having to go back to Kevin Heffernan to take the reins once more was a bad sign. Jimmy Keaveney, watching from the Hill, would have agreed. Heffernan would persuade him back for the next round. It wasn't any avalanche yet, but the pebbles were starting to roll....

We had our own business to take care of. And that's what we did. Mikey Sheehy kicked 0-7 out of our 0-14. Roscommon put up 0-8 themselves, but Kerry were always the better side. It was our fourth National Football League in a row.

MUNSTER CHAMPIONSHIP

We played Waterford in the opening round of the Munster Championship. The likes of the recently retired Mick O'Dwyer (he had first been elected selector while still playing) would have been warning and cautioning Kerry about Waterford's famous 1957 victory over the Kingdom. On this occasion, it wasn't needed. Kerry could afford to win in cruise control. Seamus Mac Gearailt and Mikey Sheehy had 2-3 each, Mickey Ned had 1-3 from the forty. The final score was Kerry 7-16 to 0-8.

Kerry faced Cork in the Munster Final. Cork were the reigning All Ireland champions and expected to dominate for years to come after big underage success. Billy Morgan, Frank Cogan, and Jimmy Barrett were starring for a Nemo Rangers side who would win Munster but lose to UCD in the All Ireland semi-final. UCD would go on to win the All Ireland club, with John O'Keeffe and Jackie Walsh in their ranks.

Kerry had good young lads coming themselves, but it was to the proven old guard that Kerry supporters were looking.

Some people wonder now how the 1975 Kerry team was so under-estimated in the final against Dublin. The media was certainly Dublincentric, but this 1974 Munster Final justifies their opinions. We were miles off the pace. Billy Morgan was on fire and Humphrey Kelliher was lord of all he surveyed. We led by two points at half-time, but it never looked like being enough. The second half was a disaster. Mickey Ned O'Sullivan got Kerry's only score of the entire half in the 39th minute. Andy Molyneaux, the popular County Board Treasurer, persuaded Mick O'Connell to come off the bench late in the second half. Too late, that horse had already bolted, and O'Connell just hadn't the speed or stamina any more. One Cork player teased him with the ball - some Kerry supporters were incensed, but they were easily offended on a day like that. It was O'Connell's last game. Same with Paud and Eamonn O'Donoghue (still young men), Derry Crowley, Seamus Mac Gearailt, and Donie O'Sullivan (Donie did win an All Ireland in 1975, but on the bench).

Johnny Culloty stepped down as manager, being replaced by Mick O'Dwyer. His legacy was very under-rated at the time, but he had built a transformed Kerry team who knew about winning matches (four National Leagues doesn't count as hard currency in Kerry, but young players got good lessons in those games) and he blooded some players who would soon become known as the best in the history of the game.

Paudie Lynch will end up as Kerry's only All Star. KERRY U21S

Kerry were the reigning All Ireland champions and a lot of that team had advanced straight to the Kerry seniors. Pat Spillane and Mikey Sheehy were on both the senior and U21 panels. Tim Kennelly was among those showing serious promise. Two lads, Denis Ogie Moran and Seán Walsh, were actually playing minor and U21 at the same time

Kerry opened their campaign against Waterford in Dungarvan on May 28th. It was a mismatch, with Kerry winning by 3-12 to 0-5. Midfielders Ger O'Driscoll and Pat Spillane had 1-1 and 0-3 to their names, Mikey Sheehy on the forty had 1-4 himself. No real benefit to either side.

Cork. The bulk of Cork's 1973 Sam Maguire winners had come from their 1970 and 1971 U21 All Ireland winning teams. Kerry would

get a lot from their 1973 team (and more from their 1975 side). There is a remarkably strong correlation between U21 and senior success, much more so than minor. Whether the U20 competition is as statistically significant is too hard to tell, but personally I doubt it. Kerry had beaten Cork in the last two years – the 1973 Munster Final where Cork were caught by surprise in Skibbereen must have been a motivating factor a year later.

Kerry were good. Again, though, Cork were simply better and their penchant for scoring goals was becoming something of a bugbear for Kerry at all grades. Paidí Ó Sé, who was starring with St. Michaels Listowel in colleges football (they would beat the Sem, from where he had been expelled, in this year's O'Sullivan Cup Final) blazed a penalty so wide that, in his own recollection, it ended up going through the window of Batty Burns' shop. It probably wouldn't have made much difference. People came away with memories of Cork's Tom Creedon, Seamus Coughlan, and Jimmy Barry Murphy.

Beating Waterford easily and coming a cropper to Cork was a theme for Kerry GAA in 1974. The minors, who w2ere coached by Sem teacher Fr. Hegarty, suffered the same fate as the seniors and the U21s, hammering the Deise by 4-18 to 0-0 but going down to Cork by 0-13 to 1-6. Denis Ogie Moran, Kerry's mascot in the 1962 All Ireland Final, was the best on show, kicking some powerful frees against the wind, while Tommy Doyle from Annascaul and the big young goalkeeper Charlie Nelligan left markers as well, but Cork were the better side on the day.

Cork had won eight out of the last nine Munster Minor Finals and would go on to win their third All Ireland in that period. Any idea that Kerry were a rising power rather than a declining one was ludicrous.

KERRY HURLING

These were good years in general for Kerry hurling. Kerry had famously won the All Ireland Junior hurling title in 1972. A year later they were the only county in Munster to opt to play intermediate hurling. A new rule by the Munster Council that meant that a county could only play in three grades in either sport saw all counties with draw from junior football and all but ourselves abandon intermediate hurling. Kerry lost out to London on a 3-6 to 2-6 scoreline after a gripping contest. Louth beat us in the Junior Hurling Championship, again by just a goal, 4-11 to 3-11. Omens were good for 1974.

The omens were wrong for the most part. Kerry had a disastrous National League campaign, not really coming close to a positive result in any game and being relegated from Division 1A. It's like a snapshot in time to see the teams in 1B back then – almost all those counties (except Dublin, who won promotion to 1A) compete in the McDonagh Cup now).

Waterford added the U21 Munster title to their senior win, easily dismissing Kerry along the way. Kildare agonisingly beat us in the first round of the B hurling by 3-4 to 1-9 and would go on to win it. Pat Moriarty, Tom Kenny, James McGrath, and Paschal Nolan were among Kerry's best players on the day.

In the County Hurling Championship, an Austin Stacks team that included the likes of Gary Scollard lost out to Abbeydorney, who were ending a 61 year wait for the title. Goalkeeper Paddy Walshe was inspirational for the new champions, while Jackie Condon scored a sparkling hat-trick at the other end.

KERRY LADIES

Camogie was well established as a sport and there was a growing feeling that ladies could play gaelic football as well. Unthinkable in an earlier era, but quite natural in a more confident and modernising Ireland. In 1973 Mick Fitzgerald and Alex Rintoul had selected a Kerry team to play Cork. It was a cracker - Bridie Brosnan scored 1-10 for Cork but Mary Geaney scored 2-6 for Kerry. Suddenly mutterings of interest were magnified. A County Board was formed, with Richard Williams from Fossa as Chairman and Killarney's Joan Kelliher as Secretary. A county league was formed. Given the growing confidence, Kerry put a team into the newly formed All Ireland Championship. Kerry beat Cork and then Waterford to qualify (it was a league format) for the Munster Final, where they lost out to Tipperary by a single point, 2-6 to 2-5. Tipperary would go on to beat Offaly in the first ever Ladies All Ireland Final. The Cup presented by Offaly captain Agnes O'Gorman to Tipperary captain Kitty Ryan does not commemorate Brendan Martin's support of Ladies GAA. It was simply presented by the Offaly and Dublin volunteer and his name became attached to it simply by word of mouth. For the record, the Kerry team that lined out against Tipperary that day was Kerry: Sue Moloney, Josephine Dillon, Marion Quill, Eileen O'Shea, Mary O'Connor, Sheila Donnelly, Bernie Donoghue, Marie Murphy, Esther Murphy, Mai Lombard, Mary Geaney, Margaret Lawlor, Jenny Mason, Margaret Doherty, Helen Slattery.

MUNSTER SENIOR CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Nemo were a very strong force at the time and they saw off a young Austin Stacks along their way to a provincial title. Nemo would meet Stacks again next year, this time in the final, and would only prevail by a whisper in a second replay. Stacks were edging closer all the time. Nemo beat Clan na Gael after a replay to reach the All Ireland Final but lost out to UCD, who had a number of Kerry players in the final.

SENIOR COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Killarney saw off a talented but wasteful Laune Rangers in the opening round by 1-11 to 1-4, Donie O'Sullivan majestic at centre back and Pa Mannix scoring the crucial goal. Just for the record, Killarney lined out as follows Killarney: Paudie O'Mahony, Tony Nolan, Eamonn Fitzgerald, M. Foley, C. Healy, Donie O'Sullivan (0-1), Sean O'Sullivan, Pat Casey, Pat Healy (0-2), Connie Doolin, John Joe Tangney (0-2), Niall Brosnan (0-1), Mike Gleeson, Pa Mannix (1-0), J. Murphy (0-4). Sub: Michael Myers (0-1) for Connie Doolin (inj.).

Kenmare beat John Mitchels by 4-9 to 0-4 and that should have been a marker laid down by a young side. Most public attention, though, was going to the brilliant contests between Shannon Rangers and South Kerry, with Shannon Rangers prevailing by 3-8 to 1-12 in the second replay.

Feale Rangers saw off Austin Stacks in the quarter-final - Stacks were not quite the power they would become, but they were well on the way, as their 1973 county title attests, and the hard work of the likes of Micheál Hayes and James Hobbert on the juvenile side was about to bear very rich fruit in the next couple of years. Rahillys, after a couple of lean years, beat Killarney by two points to advance to the semi-final. They would face Shannon Rangers, who looked impressive against a fancied Na hAghasaigh (basically West Kerry) winning by 1-15 to 2-7. Nobody needed to be told about the likes of Eamonn and Paud O'Donoghue or Jackie and Barry Walsh, but the headliner was the three year Kerry minor starring in midfield. Young Ogie Moran would be a good one yet! Kenmare, who hadn't really been in the reckoning earlier in the Championship (they

had won the 1973 senior county league, but that was still a new enough thing in itself), were getting faster and more fluid with every game. They had a terrific battle with Feale Rangers but prevailed by two points thanks to goals from wing backs Mickey Murphy and 17 year old Mick Spillane.

Shannon Rangers, who had lost last year's final to Stacks, were strong favourites but they never got out of the starting gate. By half-time Kenmare, who always looked the faster and hungrier side, were in front by 2-8 to 0-2. Captain Michael Murphy and Paul O'Sullivan scored the goals. They slowed down in the second half but they could afford to, winning their first ever County Championship by 2-12 to 1-5, all fourteen of their scores coming from play.

INTERMEDIATE COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP

Spa won their first ever Intermediate title, beating Mick O'Dwyer's Waterville on a 0-11 to 1-7 scoreline. Heavy weather meant that underfoot conditions in Tralee weren't great. Donie McSweeney opened Spa's account but Michael Moran replied. Points from John and Paudie O'Mahony (the Kerry goalkeeper lined out in midfield) had Spa in front, with a Mick O'Dwyer free trimming the gap back to one at half-time. It was only entering the final quarter that Spa' greater spread of scorers began to tell, with Donie O'Sullivan, Connie Doolan, Michael Greene, and John O'Mahony giving them a strong lead. Mick O'Dwyer had one last tremendous burst in the final minute before laying off to Michael Moran for a simple goal, but it was already too little and too late.

Coincidentally, this was the first year that Spa hosted the Lily of Killarney.

SENIOR COUNTY LEAGUE

Back in 1971, innovative County Chairman Dr. Jim Brosnan wanted a way to give players more games (he also pushed for a Bórd na nÓg being established). It was an immediate success, and in 1973 on a Rathmore motion it was expanded to three divisions with promotion and relegation. Austin Stacks were pushed all the way by Castleisland Desmonds but ended up top of the table and thus entered the Munster Club Championship as Kerry's representatives (there was no separate Senior Club Championship at that time and County champions Kenmare were a district team). Dr. Crokes were relegated to Division Two - they rebounded in 1977 and have the longest record of any Kerry team in the top division since.

St. Marys won the County Minor League.

COLLEGES FOOTBALL

The 1974 O'Sullivan Cup Final is probably the most famous one of all. A certain Paidí Ó Sé was already featuring for the Kerry seniors. His exploits on the playing field for the Sem alongside a certain Pat Spillane among others had helped cement that relationship. Except that Páidi was much more dedicated as a footballer than as a scholar - and that is phrasing it very gently indeed. He was expelled from the Sem and so attended St. Michaels Listowel instead. As far as he was concerned, he had a point to prove. The sheer idea that St. Michaels would beat the Sem, who were the only Kerry school to reach a Hogan Cup Final at the time and had won it in '69 and lost it in '72 did, was preposterous. Except that the Sem, St. Michaels, and everybody else was about to find that Paidí Ó Sé was, as the late Jimmy McGee would have put it, different class. It remains St. Michaels only O'Sullivan Cup title.

The fact that the Sem went on to win the Corn Uí Mhuirí, beating the realtively new but serious power of lognaid Rís of Cork in the final, says it all about St. Michaels achievement. It was the Sem's third title in a row, beating Tralee CBS in the previous two years, and Tralee CBS would lose again to lognaid Rís a year later.

Cahirciveen CBS won the Dunloe Cup, but needed some brilliant saves by keeper Carl O'Connell to deny Intermediate School Killorglin.

CROWDS ATTEND ANNUAL ROAD RACE

The 62nd running of Farranfore Maine Valley AC annual St Stephens day road races took place with conditions near perfect as it was calm and dry. The 2K run for children under 12 and their parents took place first. Over 40 children and parents took part in this which was almost double last years entry

A very large crowd of 293 runners took to the start line of the 5K event. Oisin Spillane was the clear favourite and he took the lead early.

Climbing up the hill before the 1 K mark he had Tommy Arthur from Kenmare former winner James Ledingham from Kilkenny, Oisin Murray from An Riocht and local athletes David Kenny, Ryan Vickers and Conor McCarthy all in touch. Hannah Steeds was in the lead in the ladies section closely tracked by last years winner Niamh O'Mahony. As the race reached the half way stage the race was still in the balance on the hill before the railway crossing Oisin Spillane started to assert his authority and slowly pulled away to win by 40 metres to cross the line in 14 minutes 44 seconds. This is an improvement of 40 seconds from last years time.

With this rate of improvement Mark Hanrahan's record time of 14.38 will be under serious threat next year. Oisin Murray of An Riocht ran brilliantly to finish 8 seconds behind. Local athlete, Olympic Race Walker David Kenny ran a sensational time of 15.09 to finish in 3rd. This was David's first time running a race in over 7 years so his achievement is all the more remarkable. James Ledingham from Kilkenny finished 4th in a time of 15.18 which would have won last years race. Tommy Arthurs came 5th and was the first Junior across the line.

In the ladies race Bridget Dennehy ran a storming second half of the race to take the title in 16.42 ahead of Hannah Steads with last years winner Niamh O'Mahony having to settle

for 3rd this time round. Tomas Kiely from North Cork win the U 17 event in 16.56. Emma Flynn won the girls U 17 in an exceptionally quick time of 18.32 seconds. THOUSANDS VISIT OFFICE OF PUBLIC WORKS SITES

Visits to the Office of Public Works sites in Kerry in 2022 totalled 482,100 out of total of 15,000,000 visits nationwide, according to figures released recently by the OPW. Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill says that this figure emphasises the popularity of Kerry as a Tourism destination and the importance of continued investment in such facilities.

"Approximately 290,000 people visited Derrynane House, the home of Daniel O'Connell, the Liberator, in 2022, which is a phenomenal figure. We already knew that Kerry was a major destination of choice for visitors from all over the world and these figures support that. Over 86,000 visited Ross Castle in Killarney. Over 43,000 passed through the Blasket Island Visitor Centre, while 12,000 sightseers visited the Blasket Islands and and Gallarus Castle in West Kerry attracted over 19,500 visitors. 14,000 plus people went out to Skellig Michael, which as we know, is very much weather dependent for landing purposes and if it was accessible for longer, these figures would be vastly increased" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Many thousands also travel the Ring of Kerry, the Slea Head route, Killarney's Lakes, etc, and we must be mindful of maintaining and improving facilities and attractions for the good of all. Practically every business, big and small in Kerry benefits from tourism and many family incomes depend upon it" said Councillor Cahill.

"The advent of the South Kerry Greenway in the next couple of years, will easily double the numbers of visitors to Kerry and I will continue to

push for improvements to our roads, footpaths, wastewater systems, etc, to ensure we are fully prepared to deal with the increased footfall, bringing with it, business opportunities and employment" added Councillor Cahill.

FOCUS ON EARLY SPRING FLOWERING SHRUBS

Now is a good time if you are planning a new garden or trying to add some colour to an established garden to plant some early flowering spring shrubs. One of the best known shrubs is the Camellia and these popular shrubs are starting to flower in most places at the moment. The Camellia is a very valuable shrub in the garden as it can give a focal point to any shrubbery all year round with its glossy green leaves and showy blooms from early spring. A lot of people think that Camellias are a difficult shrub to grow, but in fact they are no more difficult than Rhododendrons or azaleas, and most varieties on sale now are hardy. When choosing the spot to plant your Camellia, make sure it is sheltered from cold winds as they can damage the flowering buds, as can frost. When planting your Camellia make sure to mix plenty of moss peat with the earth, rather than on its own around the plant, as it will tend to root out quicker. Camellias are also ideal for growing in containers. Remember if you are planting your Camellia in the ground, that it might be small initially but most will grow to the size of a small tree, so allow plenty of room around it. There is very little maintenance with Camellias only to prune out old dead wood, clean up old blooms that fall to the ground, and to mulch around the base of plants every spring with some moss peat. There are a lot of other good spring flowering shrubs, here is a list of just a few: Forsythia, Cythisus, Corylus, Berberis Darwinii, Ribes, and Skimmia.
