





SADNESS AT THE PASSING OF ELLEN CLIFFORD

Tributes have poured in from all over the country following the untimely passing of popular Fossa woman, Ellen Clifford.

Ellen, the mother of Paudie, David and Shelly and wife to Dermot, lost her courageous five year battle with cancer on Saturday last.

Originally from Ballymacelligott, Ellen was an avid GAA supporter and was the Number One Supporter of her boys Paudie and David as they excelled at the sport they loved.

The brave brothers took the decision to play the Munster Final on Sunday in their mother's honour, knowing that is what Ellen would have wanted. Speaking after the match where a minutes silence was observed in Ellen's honour, Kerry Manager, Jack O'Connor said it was a family decision that the boys would play.

Speaking on RTE's The Sunday Game, he said "I spoke with the boys and I spoke with Dermot and they were adamant that they wanted to play the game, that's what their mother would have wanted", he said.

Colm Cooper also paid tribute to Mrs. Clifford before the game started. "It's very sad for Paudie, for David, for Shelly, and of course her husband Dermot. Ellen was a fantastic Ballymacelligott lady, the whole family is steeped in GAA.

"It has been a tough couple of months for them. Only a couple of months ago, she was above watching Fossa winning the junior All-Ireland title with the family. They are wonderful moments. "There is huge sadness around. It's going to be tough for the boys, because you've only got one mother. It'll be a tough day for everyone in Kerry, but especially those two boys and the family.

Following what was one of the biggest removals seen in Killarney on Monday evening, Requeim Mass for Ellen Clifford took place at The Prince of Peace Church in Fossa at 2pm on Tuesday.

The Mass, which was concelebrated by seven priests heard of Ellen's faith and her love of her family.

Following her daughter Shelly's reflection, in his eulogy, her son Paudie said that Ellen was like all GAA moms all over the country and always said

before every match "no fighting and stay on the field", something Paudie said " didn't always go to plan".

"She did everything for the three of us, we're not good at cooking and emptying the gear bags, we will have to do that ourselves now".

Ellen adored the GAA life and in recent weeks attended a game in Renard, even though the boys weren't playing.

"I can't imagine playing for Fossa and not having her there", Paudie said. Adding that himself, David and Shelly were so happy that

Ellen was their mom. "I can't believe we won't ever see your smile again. Thank you Mom.

Ellen's husband Dermot thanked everyone for their massive support during Ellen's illness, saying that it was the prayers of the community that ensured that Ellen spent the last six weeks of her life at home.

He also addressed Paudie and David saying "I've never said this before and I'm only saying it the once – we were just so proud of what you did on Sunday, the way you went and the way you played.

Symbols from Ellen's life were brought to the alter including a presentation from the Irish Blood Bank which she received after donating blood 100 times in her life, GAA jerseys to mark her love of the game, Holy water from Tubrid Well to represent her faith and a family photos. Following the Requiem Mass, Ellen was laid to rest in Aghadoe Lawn Computery.

She will be hugely missed by her family, husband Dermot, Sons Paudie and David, daughter Shelly, her adored grandson Ógie, the boys partners, Orlaith and Shauna, along with her heartbroken family, father Pat, sisters Mary (Reidy), Margaret (Fitzgerald), Joan (Wharton), Anne (Black) and Teresa (Gilroy), brothers Michael, Tom, Con, Pat and Dominic, brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, aunt, nephews, nieces, relatives, neighbours, work colleagues in the Department of Justice and her many friends including from the GAA community.


Chamber thanks Donal Grady for years of service

Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly reviewed progress on two key projects for community healthcare in Kerry – the construction of a new 130-bed Community Nursing Unit (CNU) in Killarney and Castleisland Primary Care Centre. He also paid a courtesy visit to Columbanus Community Hospital.

Minister Donnelly met with contractors and HSE staff involved with the Killarney CNU site (located off the bypass) before travelling to Columbanus Community Hospital, where he met a number of residents in two wards. Residents from Columbanus Community Hospital will move to the new CNU once it is completed, in approximately two years' time.

Minister Donnelly said: "The developments in Killarney and Castleisland are both important advances in the provision of healthcare for, and within, the Kerry community.

"Primary Care Centres like Castleisland and the Enhanced Community Care Programme will deliver more and more services closer to where people live, by enhancing and increasing community health services. Co-locating services in a centre like Castleisland Primary Care helps to co-ordinate and integrate services, and support collaborative working. "The new Killarney Community Nursing Unit is a very significant project

for Killarney and the surrounding areas and represents a significant capital investment. It will give future residents a very high standard of comfortable, single-room accommodation, matching the high standard of care provided by staff."

Director of Nursing at Columbanus Community Hospital, Breda Delves, said that residents and staff are excited about the development of the new unit, which is being developed through a public private partnership. Construction began last December.

"This project is significant, as regards the HSE plans to replace outdated community hospital buildings across both Kerry and Cork, but it's also an exciting one for the town of Killarney and for our residents.

"Staff are looking forward to the move to a modern new building but, for our residents, it is a move to a more comfortable, modern home which affords them the privacy and dignity that they deserve. All residents will have single ensuite rooms and we will also have a 30-bed dementia unit. This new development will allow us to continue to provide the highest quality of care for older people in the region," she said.

Minister Donnelly later visited Castleisland Primary Care Centre, where construction work is complete and plans are underway for the extensive internal fit-out needed for a wide range of HSE community services.



"HE'S GOT KILLARNEY AT HEART"

Last Wednesday was a day of mixed emotions for Councillor Donal Grady as he stepped down after 24 vears service. first ลร ล Killarnev town councillor and then as a county councillor.



The meeting took place

appropriately in the Killarney Town Hall. Back in the day, the council chamber was upstairs and it was occupied by the town clerk who sat on the Main Street side of the huge polished table with documents and phone. I thought the symbolism of that elevated upstairs chamber perfect: before officaldom was the balancing reminder of the meeting table and then when they met, councillors were reminded they were in a hall of business and administration.

Donal will have many memories and indeed a storehouse of family memories. He sought reassurance that the mayoral chain of office with his own name, that of his brother Sean O'Grady and his late father John would be restored. The third generation will be Martin, Donal's son.

Donal is not the only one with memories: I covered his first election and in the run up noted how Donal was running as Donal Grady and how this put him ahead on the ballot paper of his brother who was an O'Grady. The then Kingdom ran a colourful piece of mine with the headline "O Brother", after a popular tv show. You could have lots of robust fun in journalism in those days and people would still talk to you!

The town council was tight race and it was always easier to get elected to the European parliament than to either Killarney Town Council or the Killarney ward of the County Council.

In 2009 Lynn Boylan who was living in Beaufort and she failed at the county council hurdle. Lynn later topped the poll in the Europeans in Dublin. Our own Sean Kelly also failed in a bid for a county council seat but glided into Brussels.

So it was an enormous achievement for Donal that two brothers got elected onto Killarney Town council in 1999. The Quota that election was 470.

Tributes flowed from fellow councillors to Donal not least from sometime rival Niall O'Callaghan who summed it all up.

Niall said that while Donal could be "abrasive"

at times in the heat of debate: "He's got Killarney at heart."

HOUSING FOR LOCALS

Speaking of Donal, his last contribution was a passionate appeal for housing and for something to be done for locals facing homelessness and eviction.

I was struck this week by the cabinet meeting urgently about a successful High Court case taken by an Afghan man left homeless when he arrived in the State. Is it not about time some local family took a case about not being able to find a home where their children attend school and where they work? Surely there is some solicitor in this town who would take on the challenge probono?

Pressure from accommodating tourists and refugees means the council in Killarney "cannot get their hands" on emergency accommodation for local families facing eviction, the meeting of Killarney MD heard. That means there is now no emergency accommodation locally.

The town has among the highest number of tourist beds in the country. But the traditional accommodation available to the council was simply no longer available to the council. Families facing homelessness were being told they would have to remove to Tralee.

Councillor Brendan Cronin had asked where families facing eviction in Killarney can be accommodated so their children can be close to schools and employment.

"In the case of Killarney specifically there is a difficulty with the availability of emergency accommodation," Brendan was told by way of written reply.

The overall accommodation has proved "extremely challenging". Senior Housing Officer Gerard O'Brien told the meeting "it's not for want of trying" but the council was competing with the pressure from the "tourism and the refugee perspective" in Killarney.

"We just cannot get our hands on emergency accommodation (in Killarney) at the moment," Ger O'Brien said.

But the headline should not go out people were on the streets, he added.

Donal said a lot of people in Killarney did not want to go to Tralee.

"We are not doing enough for our own people, for people born and raised here in this town," he said.

GAME OF THRONES

I watched some of the coronation while doing the ironing Saturday and I wondered at times if I were not watching the Game of Thrones. The event was spectacular but there was something not quite real about it. I wondered if the world has not passed

by this sort of pomp and circumstance in the 70 years since the last coronation and the first televised one. And has it not been undermined by television itself and period drama?

Even in the short few years since Harry and Meghan's wedding the whole thing struck me as bizarre and out of place in this post-Covid post-Brexit, post-Mexit world.

I am more open than most to royal watching and I enjoyed the few hours I spent shadowing Charles and Camilla in Muckross in 2018. I think they are fine people and curious people and have no airs and graces much and they went about their task professionally and politely and patiently which is all we are all asked to do in whatever way of life we walk.

But that coronation was bizarre! I couldn't take seriously how poor Camilla's head nearly fell off her with the weight of the crown and she was obviously uncomfortable and kept trying to put her hand up to save her head. I felt myself wondering about Queens who had been beheaded and if there was a fracture in her neck bone who would pay for it or who would find out. And what if she trips?

And then there was the medievally named Penny Mordaunt who was straight out of a film studio in that theatrical costume keeping a straight face and going around with a heavy sword!

But while game of thrones was one side of things, the 4,000 military parade was the real and serious thing for Charles now as head of the armed forces. This was perfectly timed and this is really the essence of the Brits: military might. It is also their origin. They were Germanic tribes brought in by the Romans as paid mercenaries and native Celts were shoved to the most extreme edges and then the military minded Brits invaded us and everyone else.

But Long live King Charles and Queen Camilla and given their connections with Killarney it would be nice if they used their new influence to hand us back stuff like the Annals of Innisfallen.





Call for young people to pray at the Shrine of Blessed Carlo Actuis

Carlo Acutis was an English-born Italian Catholic youth and website designer, who is best known for documenting Eucharistic miracles around the world and cataloguing them onto a website which he created beBr Br. Pat Lynch OFM Guardian at the Friary is inviting everyone, especially young people, to come and pray a the new new banner (shrine) at the back of the Friary with the photo and prayer to Blessed Carlo Acutis.

Born in London, Carlo's Italian parents moved back to Italy, to Milan when he was a child. He was an amateur website designer, is best known for documenting Eucharistic miracles around the word and cataloguing them onto a website which he created before his death from leukemia on October 12th 2006.

"He had a great love for St Francis of Assisi and his tomb is in the church of Santa Maria Maggiore, Assisi. Blessed Carlo was beatified in Assisi on October 2020 on behalf of Pope Francis. He is the patron of youth and Computer Programmers. We pray that he will soon be canonized. Perhaps you might encourage young people to come pray and venerate his image", Br. Lynch told Killarney Outlook.

As a teenager, Carlo was diagnosed with leukemia. He offered his sufferings for Pope Benedict XVI and for the Church, saying ""I offer all the suffering I will have to suffer for the Lord, for the Pope, and the Church." He died on Oct. 12, 2006, and was buried in Assisi, at his request, because of his love for St. Francis of Assisi. His cause for canonization began in 2013. He was designated "Venerable" in 2018, and was designated "Blessed" October 10, 2020.

CARLO ACUTIS

From a young age, Carlo seemed to have a special love for God, even though his parents weren't especially devout. His mom said that before Carlo, she went to Mass only for her First Communion. her confirmation, and her wedding. But as a young child, Carlo loved to pray the

rosary. After he made his First Communion, he went to Mass as often as he could, and he made Holy Hours before or after Mass. He went to confession weekly. He asked his parents to take him on pilgrimages — to the places of the saints, and to the sites of Eucharistic miracles. His witness of faith led to a deep conversion in his mom, because, according to the priest

promoting his cause for sainthood, he "managed to drag his relatives, his parents to Mass every day. It was not the other way


around; it was not his parents bringing the little boy to Mass, but it was he who managed to get himself to Mass and to convince others to receive Communion daily."


He was known for defending kids at school who got picked on, especially disabled kids. When a friend's parents were getting a divorce, Carlo made a special effort to include his friend in the Acutis family life. He was also a programmer, and built a website cataloguing and promoting Eucharistic miracles. On the site, he told the Eucharist, the more we will become like Jesus, so that on this earth we will have a foretaste of heaven."


Carlo loved playing video games. His console of choice was a Playstation, or possibly a PS2, which was released in 2000, when Carlo was nine. We know he only allowed himself to play games for an hour a week, as a penance and a spiritual discipline, but he wanted to play much


Initially, there were reports that the body of Carlo Acutis was found to be incorrupt. A spokeswoman for Acutis' beatification told CNA that the entire body was present when it was exhumed, but "not incorrupt." He, however, lied in repose in a glass tomb where he was venerated by pilgrims until Oct. 17, 2020. He was displayed in jeans and a pair of Nikes, the casual clothes he preferred in life.

His heart, which can now be considered a relic, is displayed in a reliquary in the Basilica of St. Francis in Assisi. His mother said that his family had wanted to donate his organs when he died, but were unable to do so because of the leukemia.

battery, instead of wearing out your brake pads. In addition many EV drivers experience less tyre wear.

- Driving distance. Hybrids do not have any issue for overall driving range. However pure battery electric vehicles come with a variety of driving ranges. Typical EV ranges go from 100kms up to 500kms. According to the sustainable energy authority 80% of car journeys in Ireland cover distances of 20km on under.
- •There are grants available of up to €5,000 if you as a private buyer purchase a new BEV or plug in hybrid.

The Student Enterprise programme offers students the opportunity to take a business from idea stage all the way through to production, marketing selling. Over 25,000 students across the country participated in this year's programme.

National Title - Modern Posture Modern Posture, made up of Aisha Pabon, Grace McGovern, Niamh O'Donnell and Aoibhinn Walsh, team design and manufacture portable, sustainable lightweight mobile phone stands, upcycling old wooden floorboards in the process. The aim of their enterprise is to prevent what has become known as 'tech neck', strain on the spine and neck from students leaning forward and slouching while using their electronic devices. The team won First Place in the Intermediate Category in the Kerry County Final in March and represented Kerry in the All-Ireland National Final in Croke Park. The students made excellent presentations to the judges on their business and deservedly won a title for Best Display Stand. Enterprise Teacher Mr. Clarke added "Congratulations to the students involved, they developed a business in pursuit of a solution to a real world problem. This makes it six years in a row where Presentation Castleisland has won a title at the National Final."

County Titles

The success in the All-Ireland in May followed on from the success by students in Presentation Castleisland in the County Final held in March in the MTU. The

First Year team of FoldemGoals, made up of Millie Hughes, Molly Moran and Frankie Maguire were awarded Runner-Up, for their design of foldable and portable GAA and soccer goal posts. The enterprise encourages more young people to practice sport.

Healthy Heat, comprised of Colene O'Callaghan, Jasmine O'Sullivan, Amber Foley, Blaithin McBride and Emily Walsh, were awarded Runner-Up in the Senior Category for their innovative pet jacket providing heat therapy to animals. The focus of the team is to provide heat therapy to isolated areas of a dog or cat, for example, hips of a dog in the case of arthritis. The team upcycled old fabric materials for the jacket, and developed pouches of flaxseed which, after being heated in a microwave, can be inserted inside the jacket.

Pen Locket, made up of Nell Hartnett, Ella Greaney, Leah Griffin and Muireann Hickey, developed a business to make stationary armbands for the storage of pens, pencils and markers by teachers and students. The students won the award for Best Stand at the Kerry County Final, with their giant rubber, colouring pencils and overall display capturing the imagination of the judges.

Mr Clarke added "It was wonderful to work with enthusiastic and creative young students this year who applied their learning in Enterprise to develop real world mini businesses. This programme complements student learning in the classroom and gives students an opportunity to make pitches to business professionals. It was brilliant to see Modern Posture enjoy a day out in Croke Park, and we hope other teams from our school can follow in their footsteps in future years as well."





































WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.







OCULAR MIGRAINE

Retinal migraine (ocular migraine) is an eye condition that causes brief attacks of blindness or visual problems like flashing lights in one eye.

These episodes can be frightening, but in most cases they're harmless and short-lived, and eyesight goes back to normal afterwards.

people Some retinal get migraine every few months, although the frequency can vary.

Retinal migraine is a separate condition and should not be confused with headachetype migraine or migraine with aura, which usually affects the vision of both eyes.

The symptoms of retinal migraine may include:

- partial or total loss of vision in one eye - this usually lasts 10 to 20 minutes before vision gradually returns
- headache this may happen before, during or after the vision

It's unusual for an episode of vision loss to last longer than an hour. The same eye is affected every time in almost all cases.

Vision may slowly become blurred or dimmed, or there may be flashes of light. Some people see a mosaic-like pattern of blank spots (scotomas), which enlarge to cause total loss of vision.

Retinal migraine is caused by the blood vessels to the eye suddenly narrowing (constricting), reducing the blood flow to the eye. It may be triggered by:

- stress
- smoking
- · high blood pressure
- oral contraceptive pill
- exercise
- bending over
- high altitude
- dehydration
- low blood sugar

excessive heat

Retinal migraine tends to be more common in:

- women
- people aged under 40
- people with a personal or family history of migraine or other headaches

Treatment for retinal migraine usually just involves taking pain relief for any headaches and reducing exposure to anything that might be triggering the retinal migraine.

If you experience any sudden changes in you vision it is important to have a sight test to rule out more serious causes.

ALL TOO EASY FOR **EXCELLENT KERRY**

Munster Final: Kerry 5-14 Clare 0-15

Kerry were slow enough picking up speed in the National League. A few teams will feel that maybe the All Ireland champions were there for the taking. Certainly Tipperary didn't force Kerry to answer hard questions; Tipperary are not the force that they were. I thought that Clare would ask harder questions. I didn't expect them to beat Kerry (frankly, this year's provincial football championships have had all the twists and turns you'd expect of an episode of 'Peppa Pig') but I did think that an somewhat obdurate Clare would put it up to us. They certainly gave the likes of Cork and Dublin hard enough games before being unluckily relegated from Division Two - again, that's not hard currency when the ground starts to firm up. I expected a massed defence and that we would struggle against it, as has been our wont recently. Certainly our ability to get goals against such opposition has been a worry – we scored the grand total of three goals in last year's championship.

There were good omens on the road. Let's be honest, Adare is one of the most beautiful towns in Ireland (lovely olde world architecture and immaculately clean always) but most Kerry/Limerick travellers spend a good half an hour wishing for it's non-existence. And don't be telling me about that famous 'shortcut'. Do you mean the one that everybody else knows about as well, so you join a queue of twenty cars to get back on the main road? Last Sunday, having travelled early, I was through Adare in ten minutes.

There was a disappointing enough crowd for the camogie; that was a very good game and went all the way to the wire.

You could tell, even in the warm-up, that Kerry meant business. There was a shadow hanging over the day in the circumstances; of course there was. I'm not going to speak too much on that; I consider grief to be a personal and

relatively private matter. I will only say that I had the privilege of knowing the lady, and it truly was a privilege, and it is no surprise to me or anyone that her children have turned out to be the people that they are.

Kerry, as I have said, were unconvincing enough during the League. This was a different animal entirely. Clare are no bad team, but they were dismissed almost with ease. Kerry had hunger, pace, and power. They didn't let up, either, and that was important. Playtime is over. This is where you start hunting games from start to finish. There's always some-one behind you who would love to be wearing that jersey, and that's how it should be.

Dylan Casey popped over Kerry's opening score – a defensive Clare didn't put too much pressure on him at the Kerry end so he had no hesitation in driving forward. Dara Moynihan added another. David Clifford raised a huge cheer by swivelling for a superb goal, but it was called back for a free. Should advantage have been played? Arrah, not worth an argument. David slotted the free with ease.

Kerry were on top everywhere. Clare's main threat was Keelan Sexton as a lone spearpoint. I genuinely rate him, but Jason Foley won a tough duel. Diarmuid O'Connor was superb at midfield. Maybe - and iot's early days - but maybe David Moran's loss won't be as keenly felt as I feared. Jack Barry got through an amount of work. He's not a headliner and that's not what we need from him. Another player who isn't working the scoreboard as much as yore but is actually a very key component of our open play is Seán O'Shea. He's no longer encroaching into goal-scoring territory. I think it's because he understands that Kerry have scoring forwards inside and overlapping players like Tom, Gavin, and Graham, so that's not what Kerry need from him. Ogie Moran was one of the greatest centre forwards of all time (famously, we never lost a final with him on the forty) but people forget now that he didn't actually score all that much; that wasn't his primary job. Himself and Mickey Need were always comfortable inter-changing. That's how Seán is playing now and it's working really well.

Stephen Ryan ended up having a tough day in goal, but I don't think the keeper could be faulted in any way. In fact, it was his long free that opened Clare's account, but the writing was already on the wall. Kerry were simply swarming them. Gavin White split the posts. Tony Brosnan played a one-two with Dylan Casey and dummied the hapless Ryan for Kerry's opening goal. You already knew there would be more coming. I'm much happier with Tony inside; I've always considered him more of a predator than a distributor.

Emmet McMahon and David Clifford exchanged frees, sandwiching a cracking goal from a lively Dara Moynihan. Clare just couldn't deal with the multiplicity of threats. It took 23 minutes for them to score from play, with Sexton for once managing to get away from Jason Foley and fire over. It took Kerry about 23 seconds to reply through David Clifford. Eoin Cleary, a solid performer, added two frees. 2-6 to 0-5. One-sided, but not a mauling. Not yet, anyway. Tony Brosnan clipped over a point. David Clifford added another point. Some of Clare's kicking was fairly wasteful - they were outnumbered inside - and a bad enough turnover saw the Clifford's swooping in, with David sublimely finishing goal number three. Stephen Ryan and Emmet McMahon put over Clare frees, but we all knew that this one was over.

Clare supporters near me were accepting their fate with graceful resignation and good humour, tinged with genuine sympathy for the Cliffords. Trailing by 3-8 to 0-7, it was already a clear case of how much rather than whether Kerry would win. I have to say, €35 was enough to be paying for it.

Clare rang the half-time changes and actually opened the second half scoring through McMahon. Then Paudie Clifford sent another great ball in to his brother, and David did what David does. 4-8 to 0-8. He added a point, and then it was Paudie's turn to gather from Sean O'Shea and race in on goal. I'm surprised there hasn't been more mention of the actual finish. I thought it was brilliant technique; he almost

curled it in with his left leg past Ryan, who hadn't given him any easy angle.

Ciarán Russell and Paul Geaney (his unselfish passing was a crucial element in a lot of Kerry scores) exchanged points. Keelan Sexton and Eoin Cleary and Eoin Claery added Clare points. Look, in the circumstances, we did cough up more scores than we should have; the likes of Galway, Mayo, and Dublin will have taken note. David Clifford and Eoin Cleary exchanged frees. The game basically petered out from there, Sean O'Shea with two points and Killian Spillane another just before the finish.

Job done, and done in style. Kerry have lifted a gear and are in championship mode. Dylan Casey and the Cliffords made the GAA Team of the Week, but nobody's counting that kind of promotional accolade now. It's all about results from here on in.

Look, I don't want to be that guy. Nobody wants to be that guy. But I really think someone has to say it. Every team has played at least five games, depending on your province. And somehow, we have managed to reduce a sixteen team competition down to a mere.... sixteen teams. All the remaining teams will play another three games each to reduce it to.... twelve teams. The acrid smell of cheese and onion taytos; salt and vinegar was too exotic for us. Yes, that was Kerry v Cork and everything on the line. But us kids would be a week coming down from all the excitement. Last Sunday I saw kids on their phones in the second half. Sure, I half wished I had brought a book to read myself; that's the cold truth of it.

Jason Diggins pulled one back, a fine score, and we needed it.Michael Leane and Gavin Dooley added two more. Eogahn Cahill and Fionán Mackessy closed out the scoring.

Half-time Offaly 1-10 Kerry 0-10. The scoreline didn't flatter the Faithful County.

Eoghan Cahill stretched the lead with a '65. Eoin Ross and Pádraig Boyle (f) cut the gap to two points. Brian Duignan responded with two for Offaly. Pádraig Boyle slotted another free. Kerry were running their bench now, but Offaly looked the fresher team. Adrian Cleary and Eoghan Cahill (f) made it 1-15 to 0-13. Cahill, a thorn in our side all day long, clipped over four more (3f). Killian Sampson added another. Offaly were well on top and making it count. Shane Conway with a free and a '65 briefly swayed the momentum but Cahill promptly steadied the Offaly ship once more with three more points. Joey Keenaghan added another. Shane had one last free for us; you couldn't even call it a gesture of defiance at that stage. Offaly were good, very good. There's no begrudging. They are guaranteed their place

begrudging. They are guaranteed their place in the final and deserve it. The question, and it has to be asked, is whether this was just a blip or if this is where we are as a team. Because I genuinely think that we are better than that.

As things stand, Kerry absolutely have to beat Laois this weekend and hoper that Offaly can beat Carlow. That's far from certain; Offaly are bound to rest players, just as I would in their position. If Carlow get a win, or we don't, then Offaly will face Carlow in the final. If we win and Carlow lose....well, we'll have a chance to make amends for this fairly poor display.

WERRY U20S FALL TO SLIGO U20 All Ireland Semi-Final:

Sligo 1-8 Kerry 0-9

It's no secret that Kerry have struggled at this grade for quite a while now. Our last All Ireland title was in 2008. That's too long for a county like Kerry. Dublin, Mayo, and Tyrone have all tasted success at this level since then and I don't believe that it's a coincidence that they have been among the top contenders at senior. There was a strong correlation between U21

and senior success. Whether that translates to U20 remains to be seen. Once upon a time we were holding players for senior, a practise I disapproved of (I think underage success brings other players on). That's not the situation now; there is no current U20 player ready to step into the Kerry senior squad. There's potential, but nobody's there yet. It's time to stop blaming managements. Jack O'Connor, Declan O'Sullivan, Tomás Ó Sé....these lads are not neophytes in the game. There was no shortage of effort put in, by either management or players. But the simple fact remains that we are not successful at this grade and it's a problem. Kerry were a mixed bag this year. We were poor against Clare and very lucky (plus a master class from William Shine) to get over the line. We looked much better against Cork, but that may have been their failings more than our improvement. We certainly coughed up enough goal chances to lose that game on another day.

We knew Sligo were good. They won their first Connaught title just last year and the grass hasn't been growing under their feet since. Summerhill beat the Sem fair and square in the Hogan Cup semi-final. Sligo met and beat good teams in Connaught this year, better opposition than we faced.

To be honest, I didn't even think that Sligo were great. I thought they looked eminently beatable, but we didn't do it. Our engine basically spluttered and died with twenty minutes left and I don't know why.

Robb Monaghan, restored to the line-up, kicked the first two scores. Monaghan is a real talent, even if he took a few wrong options later on. Sligo lost midfielder Canice Mulligan to injury but opened their own scoring with a Ronan Niland point. Luke Crowley, who looked very sharp early on, made a great steal and split the posts.

Daire O'Boyle made a great run along the endline (was there a foul in the build-up? I thought so, to be honest) and laid off to Ronan Niland for a great goal. We defended very well in general, but that one was down to a lack of pace in the corner exploited very well by Sligo.

Cillian Burke made a fantastic burst to score a magnificent goal himself in response, but was pulled for over-carrying. Great bit of skill by the Milltown man, but the referee was absolutely correct, I'm afraid.

I wasn't worried. Kerry were well on top in the possession stakes. But as I realised why we weren't working the scoreboard, I started growing uneasy. Look, there's a scene in Blackadder where General Wellington is telling the what he thinks is the Prince Regent (it's Blackadder) that he plans to move England's navy to the North Pole because Napoleon won't expect it, and Blackadder diffidently suggests moving it to....maybe Trafalgar? This felt like that. Sometimes the obvious thing is obvious because it's right. Look, if you have the ball and you have predators like Shine, McMahon, and the promising Jack Clifford in your inside line, why not just kick it into them? Seriously, why work over-time outside when all you need to do is send the ball in? Unfathomable to me. I know Sligo had a two man shield in front of

their full back line, but just hit the corners. At least try it once or twice.

Will Shine got us back on level terms with a good long distance free. Luke Marren replied in kind after Joshua Flynn was fouled. Cillian Burke laid off to Keith Evans for a fine score, but Luke Marren replied with a free. Evans won a free in turn for Will Shine to close out the first half scoring.

Half-time Kerry 0-6 Sligo 1-3

James Donlon opened the second half scoring but Cian McMahon replied and Will Shine nudged Kerry in front. I thought Kerry would open the throttle now.

Instead, we would only score once more before the final whistle. Sligo weren't gr4eat. In fairness, the Kerry defence stood up well to pressure. Luke Marren dropped a shot short. James Donlan picked out Mark McDaniel with a great ball but Dara O'Callaghan got back to clear the danger at the expense of a '45 converted by Dillon Walsh. Luke Marren added a free and Sligo were in front. Kerry were snatching a bit at chances where a bit of composure might have served them better. Daire O'Boyle found Brian Byrne for an important score.

Will Shine pointed for Kerry with five minutes left. Everything to play for. Sligo were one point up but the gap felt bigger. They were hungrier for every loose ball. Kerry did win possession a few times but spilled it in turnovers; I thought we were a little bit too frantic. Easily said by an armchair general, I suppose.

Daire O'Boyle's final point saw Sligo celebrate as though they had just won the All Ireland. Hard to blame them. Sligo football, despite their senior defeat to Galway, is very much on the rise.

Obviously I wasn't at it, bi-location is a power I use very sparingly and I was in Ennis at the time. I did follow it on twitter and got very good coverage on Radio Kerry (their sports coverage is comparable to anything in the country; I'm not sure we appreciate how good we have it). From the sounds of it, Kerry will surely view this as one that got away. Cork were practically unbeatable for a decade (just as we were once ourselves back in the eighties) and the likes of Juliet Murphy, Breige Corkery, and Valerie Mulcahy were giants (giantesses?) of the game. Over the past two years, Kerry have proven themselves to be up there with any team in the country, while Cork no longer scrape the clouds. But they are still Cork, still steel - remember last year's Munster Final? Or this year's League match? Cork are still the benchmark for Kerry, and this is a huge scalp that got away. Maybe a marker laid down, maybe not. It can be easy to read too much significance into such things. One thing I don't like, in any code, is this messing around with teams in alphabetical order, or dummy teams, or not naming subs. To me, it reeks of both fear and contempt and it's the supporters who suffer. Do you really imagine that at this level players won't know



who is who on the opposition team? The LGFA do a fantastic job of promoting their game and providing great coverage (we are exceptionally lucky in Kerry to have a tireless Paul Murphy at the coalface), Anthony Newman sent an excellent match report to all media outlets; that's how to promote your sport. But as for naming teams? Look, Eamonn Ryan won a whopping ten All Irelands as manager of the Cork Ladies. And he was not only willing to name his team openly and honestly every time; he was proud to do so.

Kerry were good here, very good. That's the big take-away. It's not that long ago that Kerry were labouring to come within touching distance of Cork, so we have come a long way since then in a relatively short period of time. But that late collapse....oh, well. A lesson learnt.

FOCUS ON HYDRANGEAS

Hydrangeas are a very popular garden shrub with delicate heads of flowers that come in shades of white, pink or blue and they flower from late Spring to Autumn. The mophead and lace cap Hydrangeas are well known for the ability to change colour in different soils. Hydrangeas thrive in moist but well drained soil, in the cool, semi shady part of the garden. Try to avoid dry sunny situations and east facing areas. Feeding your Hydrangeas once in late Winter or early Spring is probably enough for the year as too much feeding will only encourage too much soft leafy growth and this will lead to the Hydrangeas not developing a lot of flower buds. Pruning your Hydrangeas is usually done in late Winter or early Spring, although the climbing Hydrangeas should be pruned after flowering in Summer.


Welcome back dear student. God gave Moses the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai (Read Deuteronomy 5 & 6). They are God's directions for living successfully on this earth and they are 'not burdensome' to us like some wrongly believe (1 John 5:3). God gave the Commandments not for His sake, but for ours. They are our 'spiritual compass' if you like. Before GPS came on the scene, people mostly relied on a small tool called a compass to give direction and help them find their way; in times of trouble, it brought hope and protection from danger. Those involved in shipping and airlines still use advanced compasses for navigational purposes today. They are a vital tool, just like the Commands of God are vital to our navigational protection. But now society proclaims that people don't need God or His Word. Education, media, and other cultural 'mountains' are intentionally grooming people to believe in anything other than God and leave behind His Word. "Your Word is a Light to my path, a lamp to my feet" (Psalm 119:105). These are perilous times to live without God's instruction. Let's study what John the Apostle warned....

"This is the message we heard from Jesus and now declare to you: God is Light, and there is no darkness in Him at all. So, we are lying if we say we have fellowship with God but go on living in spiritual darkness; we are not practicing the Truth. But if we are living in the Light, as God is in the Light, then we have fellowship with each other, and the blood of Jesus, His Son, cleanses us from all sin . . . I am writing this to you so that you will not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an Advocate who pleads our case before the Father. He is Jesus Christ, the One Who is truly Righteous. He Himself is the Sacrifice that atones for our sins - and not only our sins but the sins of all the world....and we can be sure that we know Him if we obey His commandments. If someone claims, "I know God," but doesn't obey God's commandments, that person is a liar and is not living in the Truth. But those who obey God's Word truly show how completely they love Him. That is how we know we are living in Him. Those who say they live in God should live their lives as Jesus did!

.... For the darkness is disappearing, and the True Light is already shining. If anyone claims, "I am living in the Light," but hates a brother or sister, that person is still living in darkness. Anyone who loves their brothers and sisters is living in the Light, and does not cause others to stumble. But anyone who hates a fellow believer is still living and walking in darkness. Such a person does not know the way to go, having been blinded by the darkness Do not love this world nor the things it offers you, for when you love the world, you do not have the Love of the Father in you. For the world offers only a craving for physical pleasure, a craving for everything we see, and pride in our achievements and possessions. These are not from the Father but are from this world. And this world is fading away, along with everything that people crave. But anyone who does what pleases God will live forever" (excerpts from 1st John chapters 1&2). Let's resolve to live in the True Light friends.
