





MANY TRIBUTES PAID TO JACKIE HEALY RAE

KERRY O'SHEA LOOKS BACK AT THE LIFE AND TIMES OF JACKIE HEALY RAE

Colourful, charismatic, and larger than life are just some of the many terms being used to describe the late Jackie Healy-Rae whose death at the age of 83 occurred last Friday, December 5th.

The late Thomas P O'Neill, who was Speaker of the US House of Representatives once, said that all politics began at the parish pump but for Jackie Healy Rae it was much more than parish pump politics.

Jackie was shrewd political operator. He believed in doing things his way. He had the common touch and was of the people and for the people at all times. As far as Jackie was concerned, South Kerry and Kerry always came first.

Aged 83, he was one of the most iconic figures to emerge on the Kerry political scene over the last fifty years and a man of many parts. He was a true son of Kerry who loved his native county, parish and people.

Jackie immigrated to the United States for a short period in 1953 but found it difficult to settle down and eventually came home.

Jackie always loved machinery. When he returned to Ireland in the early 1960s, he set himself up in business as a Plant Hire Operator and an Agricultural Contractor.

The business boomed and very soon Jackie became a household name throughout the county. In 1969, Jackie purchased a Public House in Kilgarvan which he named 'The Jackie Healy Rae Lounge Bar and this was the name he used from then on.

He developed a strong interest in politics and quickly got involved with the Fianna Fail organisation. Jackie worked for Fianna Fail during the 1966 South Kerry by-election, which led to the election to Dail Eireann of John O'Leary.

Jackie soon became known the length and breadth of the country as he canvassed for Fianna Fail in by-elections from Cork to Donegal. Jackie was co-opted to Kerry County Council in 1973 following the death of Michael Doherty.

Jackie served as Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council on two occasions, from 1980-1981 and 1995-1996, a role he carried out with diligence. Jackie himself had for a considerable time, harboured an ambition to run for Fianna Fail in a General Election. He saw his chance in 1997 when the party's long-term TD for South Kerry, John O'Leary announced his decision to retire, but his ambitions were thwarted as he was rejected at the Fianna Fail South Kerry Convention, when John O'Leary's son Brian pipped him at the post.

Jackie was subsequently told by FF Headquarters that he would be added to the ticket but he was bitterly disappointed when FF Party Headquarters failed to keep their word. It was with much reluctance that Jackie finally decided to leave Fianna Fail and throw his hat in the ring and run as an Independent candidate in the 1997 General Election.

Jackie was elected on the fifth count, polling a respectable 7,220 first preference votes.

As an Independent TD, Jackie Healy-Rae worked ceaselessly for his constituents. He ensured that many sports clubs in South Kerry and beyond received lottery grants which helped to ensure they had better facilities for their members and spectators. He ensured that those who were entitled to Medical Cards had them, that sick people were treated properly in hospitals that pot holes on country roads in his constituency were filled, and that those who were entitled to council houses had somewhere decent to live. In 2003, Jackie was succeeded on Kerry County Council by his son Danny. His son Michael was first elected for the Killorglin area in 1997, joining his father at Aras an Chontae.

In 2008, Jackie announced his decision to step down from the Dail, he was succeeded by his

son Michael in the 2011 General Election.

When Michael resigned from Kerry County Council following his election to the Dail, he was succeeded by his nephew Johnny which meant that three generations of the Healy-Rae family had represented South Kerry on Kerry County Council, something which Jackie was very proud of. Jackie loved the buzz of an election, and was a familiar figure at the election count in Killarney. He kept himself up to date on the national front by listening to his faithful radio. Despite his ill health, he followed this year's County Council Election count very closely from his hospital bed which he left the day before to vote for his grandson Johnny.

A very talented musician, and champion whistler, a rare talent indeed, Jackie formed his own band, playing the saxophone and accordion. He was friendly with musicians such as Johnny Carroll and Paddy Cole, and on one famous occasion, he played on the Late Late Show with Johnny Carroll with whom he made a CD. Jackie had a pragmatic outlook on life. When talking to a friend recently about his illness, he said: "I'm in the waiting lounge, I have my ticket, but it's one way only."

Kerry people from all over will miss the 'The Mighty Healy-Rae'.

Jackie Healy-Rae is survived by his partner Kathleen, his sons John, Danny, Michael and Denis, daughters Rosemary and Joan, their mother Julie, his sons-in-law, daughters-in-law, adored grandchildren and many friends and supporters.

Concern is working with the most vulnerable families in 27 of the world's poorest and most neglected countries. Whether they are caught up in poverty, war, conflict or even the deadly Ebola virus, our teams are there on the ground providing immediate assistance and helping people get back on their feet. And this work is only possible because of the support of people in Ireland such as the readers of the Sliabh Luachra Outlook, who through their extraordinary generosity have supported our work over the years. At our peril can we take that support for granted. For every euro Concern receives, 90.4 cent goes directly to the work in the field. In early December we won two awards in excellence in financial reporting in Ireland. I am conscious that many people have little spare cash and yet they are willing to support the poorest of the poor in the countries where we are working. For that I say thank you and wish you a joyful and happy Christmas and New Year.





THE TWELVE SAFETYTIPS OF CHRISTMAS:

- 1. Drink alcohol responsibly. Wherever the celebration Everyone should promote safe behaviour.
- 2. Plan your night out, tell someone where you're going and when you'll be back.
- 3. You, your family or friends should never walk home alone, remember safety in numbers. If you have no other option, walk in well lit areas.
- 4. Take care when carrying your handbag, smart phone or tablet in crowded areas. Keep them in a safe location, within view.
- 5. Watch out for pick pockets in crowded areas. Keep handbags zipped and don't put your wallet in your back pocket. In bars and restaurants take care about where you store coats and handbags.
- 6. At ATMs only take out as money much as you need. Cover your pin number and call the Gardaí if you believe the machine has been

compromised.

- 7. Take care of your Christmas Shopping and never leave it unattended, especially in your car.
- 8. Park and lock your car in secure, well lit areas keeping valuables including bags and coats hidden.
- 9. Secure all doors and windows of our home and use your alarm when the house is vacant and when home at night.
- 10. Don't leave Christmas presents in view from the outside of your home.
- 11. If you're expecting deliveries, always make sure someone is there to collect it or arrange for a trusted neighbour to take it in.
- 12. If you're going away for Christmas, make your home look occupied, leave a light on and get a trusted neighbour to check on your property.

For many of us November is an annual month of recollection. It is when we specially remember our forbears who have gone before us and when, as a mark of respect and gratitude, we visit their graves. We often come prepared with rake and spade to do some annual repairs in order that their final resting place may replicate as far as possible the standards by which they lived.

Imagine then the disgust or worse felt by a relative on observing that a loved one's grave has become the repository for a passing dog's dung. And worse still the upset at realising that a neighbour's lack of respect allowed this despoiling to occur.

Very recently, as November bade us farewell, a lady phoned me to express her sadness and distress at finding the grave of her late brother soiled with dog faeces. Her sadness was compounded by the fact that the deceased had been an animal lover and would always have ensured that his horse or dog would not have

in any way diminished or despoiled any public or private place, least of all a grave.

While in the graveyard she met a visitor with dogs and suggested to her that the graveyard was not a suitable place in which to exercise her pets particularly as she did not have a pooper-scooper with which to clean up after them. The dog owner's riposte was less than kind and was certainly most inappropriate in a hallowed place.

I realise that erecting signs requesting people not to bring dogs into graveyards - with the exception of guide dogs - may have little impact on those who seem to have little respect for the living or the dead. However, I intend at the earliest possible opportunity proposing to Kerry County Council that it would erect such a sign at the entrance to each graveyard in its ownership.

As the season of good will approaches maybe all who love their dogs would try to ensure that they would show equal respect for others who wish to walk without having to confront dog dung on footpaths, parks and graveyards.



DIOCESE LAUNCHES THE CRY OF THE EARTH

Kerry Diocese launched The Cry of the Earth, A Call to Action for Climate Justice on Wednesday December 10th in St Brendan's College, Killarney.Bishop Ray Browne launched this call to action following a short dramatic presentation and readings by Transition Year students in St. Brendan's College. Representatives of environmental groups, public bodies and local parishes will be present.

The Cry of the Earth, A Pastoral Reflection on Climate Change first issued in 2009 by the Irish Catholic Bishops' Conference was updated and re-launched recently and presented as A Call to Action for Climate Justice in light of the most recent scientific evidence.

December 10th was Human Rights Day, an appropriate date for this launch as climate change will, and indeed is, bringing change for all of us but especially for the poorest and most vulnerable people and for future generations. This also coincides with The United Nations Climate Change Conference, COP20 or CMP10 taking place in Lima, Peru, from December 1-12, at which the delegates will continue the negotiations towards a global climate agreement.

The Cry of the Earth issues a call to everyoneindividuals, parish communities, religious

congregations and all people of good will to action now and to let a "shaft of hope break through the heavy clouds" Pope Francis.

All parishes have received a copy of the Reflection and an accompanying pastoral resource called "Glas" prepared by Trocaire and are being encouraged to measure their own current carbon footprint over the coming months and then devise ways to reduce their

use of carbon by a specific amount per annum. Kerry Diocese promotes an annual Earth Week across the diocese and became the first Catholic diocese to receive an Eco Award in 2013 .The Diocese wishes to encourage action at all levels towards a responsible stewardship of the earth , one of "service, of responsibility and care" The Cry of the Earth. This Diocesan launch is one part of that action.



KERRY SCHOOL STUDENTS TO DESIGN REVOLUTIONARY CLOTHING AND SPORTSWARE

Kerry Primary and Secondary students are being given the opportunity to become involved in anano science project. AMBER, the Advanced Materials and Bio Engineering Research Centre in Trinity College Dublin, has launched its 'Design your nano gear' competition, allowing students to decide how they think nanoscience will impact our sports and clothing in the future. To enter all Kerry students have to do is draw a picture of a new sports product, or item of clothing (sports or regular clothes), inspired by nanoscience. The top two winning entries (one primary, one secondary) will be brought to life by a professional illustrator and displayed at the Irish Science Teachers' Association Annual

Conference in March 2015.

The aim is to offer students the opportunity to learn more about nanoscience, and to use that knowledge in a creative way – by designing their own 'nano gear'. Nanoscience is the study of materials on the nanoscale or 1000 times smaller than a single human hair. It is leading to the revolution of materials and manufacturing, with application across a range of industries including energy; medical devices; pharmaceuticals; technology and bioengineering. 'Nano in my Life' and 'NanoWOW' resource packs, aimed at TY and senior primary pupils, are available for teachers and students looking to learn more about nanoscience.

Images should be at least A4 in size and can be either digital or non-digital. The design should contain clear drawings / images, including a name for the new product / technology and a description (maximum of 200 words) of the aspects of nanoscience that inspired it. This text should indicate a clear understanding of how nano or materials science has impacted your design. Entries will be judged on demonstrating a clear understanding of nanoscience and the application of it to the design. Innovation and creativity will also be considered.

The closing date for entries is Friday 6th February 2015.


ST VINCENT DE PAUL APPEAL





SELF ESTEEM

Last week we looked at the many ways we can raise our selfesteem and begin to feel better about ourselves. We also identified how these patterns of low self-esteem can start very early in life – and thus it makes sense that we think about developing and promoting self-esteem in childhood. Parents and caregivers can promote positive self-esteem in their children by encouraging their children and making sure they feel loved, secure and competent.

Children who are scared to try new things and speak negatively about themselves may have low self-esteem. They tend to give up easily or wait for someone else to do the task for them. They can also be overly critical and easily disappointed in themselves. They tend to view temporary problems as permanent and can be pessimistic.

In contrast, children with healthy self-esteem are comfortable in social settings and enjoy interacting with others. They enjoy working independently as well as interacting in groups. They work towards finding a solution when faced with a challenge and don't put themselves down. They are generally more optimistic and know their strengths and weaknesses.

To help build your child's confidence, encourage your child to take healthy risks. Allow them to take (age-appropriate) chances, make choices and take responsibility for them. When children make their own age-appropriate choices this empowers them - and gives them a sense of control over their bodies.

Children also need opportunities to demonstrate their competence and feel that they make a valuable contribution. This can mean asking them to help out at home – by setting the table or dusting. Encouraging them to take on tasks that they show particular interest in is a great way to boost their confidence. Teach your child to set goals and take pride in their accomplishments. It is important to ensure that their goals are within reach and at an appropriate level for their ability.

However, if your child tries and doesn't succeed, this is a fantastic opportunity for you as parent to help build their selfesteem. Let them know that no matter what the result, your love is unconditional. Encourage them to try and try again.

Overly praising a child is not the way to develop their selfesteem and confidence. Confidence comes from them trying, failing and trying again. If we tell them they are doing a 'terrific job' whatever they do, this confuses children and they learn not to trust their own instincts. However when praise is appropriate, specific and earned it is a valuable self-esteem builder.

WHOOPING COUGH

Whooping cough (pertussis) is an infection caused by a bacterium called Bordetella pertussis. It is spread to others through contaminated droplets in the air, produced during coughing and by close contact with an affected

The illness typically follows a pattern:

Early stage (catarrhal phase)

At first there is often a sore throat followed by a dry cough. You may have a mild fever and feel slightly unwell. Over a few days the cough may become more productive with some sputum - but at first it still seems to be an ordinary cough.

Main coughing stage (paroxysmal phase)

After several days, often as many as 10-14 days from the start of the illness, the cough gets worse and comes in bouts (paroxysms) of intense choking coughs. Symptoms such as fevers should settle at this stage and in between bouts of coughing you are likely to be well.

The bouts of coughing can be very severe and occur many times throughout the day (average 15 times). It can be very difficult to breath during these attacks and they may be followed by an attempt to draw breath (thus causing a 'whooping' sound in about 50%). It is also common to vomit after a bout of coughing.

Easing stage (convalescent phase)

The bouts of coughing then ease gradually over a period which can last up to three months or more. (In some countries whooping cough is known as the cough of a 100 days.) As things seem to be easing, you may still get the odd bout of severe coughing.

Children

In countries with no immunisation, most children develop whooping cough at some stage. Before immunisation was available there was an epidemic every 3-4 years. About 8 in 10 children had whooping cough by the time they were five.

Adults and older children

Whooping cough is not just a childhood illness. Adults can get whooping cough. Indeed, because of immunisation, most cases now occur in older children and adults. This is because some adults have not been immunised. Also, the protection from whooping cough immunisation may wane over the years in some people. So, even if you were immunised as a young child, you may still get whooping cough as an older child or adult. If you have had whooping cough in the past you are unlikely to develop again.







NEW PENALTY POINT OFFENCES & PENALTY POINTS

ADJUSTMENTS

INCREASED POINTS FOR 9 OFFENCES WITH 14 ADDITIONAL OFFENCES NOW ATTRACTING POINTS **NEW OFFENCES FOR LEARNERS AND NOVICE DRIVERS**

The Minister for Transport, Tourism and Sport, Paschal Donohoe TD, has announced a number of adjustments to penalty points and new penalty point offences which took effect on Monday last, December 8th under the Road Traffic Act 2014.

Penalty Points will be increased for 9 offences, and a further 14 offences will now attract penalty points for the first time. In addition, 2 offences which previously involved a court appearance have now been brought within the fixed charge notice and penalty points system. The new penalty point offences include learner permit holders driving unaccompanied or



failing to display an L Plate, and failure by novice drivers to display an N Plate. For each of these offences, the points will be two on payment of a fixed charge or four on conviction in court. Among the offences for which the penalty points have increased are dangerous overtaking, failure to stop a vehicle before a stop sign and failure to obey traffic lights. The offences brought within the fixed charge notice system are using a vehicle without an NCT and parking in a dangerous position. It will now be possible to pay a fixed charge fine for these and receive lower penalty points than applicable on conviction in court.

The penalty points system was first introduced in 2002, and deliberately focuses on offences which can have a direct impact on road safety. The Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport carried out a review of the penalty points system in 2012 and the adjustments being brought into force today result from this review. They were given legal effect in the Road Traffic

THE DANGER OF MIXING WINTER AND SUMMER TYRES AND WINTER DRIVING!

The footprint of a tyre is the size of a postcard on the roads surface so therefore it is critically important to have some tread grip of over 3 mm for winter driving.

At this time of the year we encounter all types of weather and visibility is of the greatest importance. With cold morning starts and fogged up windscreens it is important to start your car 10 minutes before driving off, to have all systems warm and a clear windscreen. Ensure that your car is in a secure place to do so. If this is not possible then it is important to get the mirrors, windscreen and rear view clear as quickly as possible. A good quality wiper blade is also essential to having a clear windscreen and wipers nowadays are reasonably priced.

Road surfaces in winter driving can be hazardous and a driver needs to make allowances for different conditions. Shiny tar or extra smooth surfaces will not have the same grip as a new asphalt motorway. Under trees is also a caution and it can be slippery in wet conditions. Always be cautious if road surfaces appear different in misty conditions as sometimes less rainfall is more dangerous. Ensure to allow plenty of distance between other vehicles. Always be cautious when driving behind a truck, note that the truck will take a far greater distance to stop while loaded and in wet weather.

The use of winter tyres is promoted by all tyre manufacturers in temperatures below 7 degrees. There is no question that winter tyres will give better performance below 7 degrees than summer or all season tyres. It is important to note that winter tyres require frost or rain also to perform properly.

There is a major danger with mixing winter tyres with summer or all season tyres. The casing of winter tyres is constructed different than summer or all season but also has a soft compound tread with many fine lines or grooves. The purpose of the soft compound and the many fine lines is to create heat buildup far more quickly for better performance in very cold temperatures. If the temperature goes above 7 degrees and the roads are dry, then the winter tyre has fewer grips than a summer tyre or an all-season tyre and can have extended braking distances with lateral movement which is highly dangerous.

Mixing winter with summer and all season tyres is an accident waiting to happen. It is questionable when we hear of accidents with young drivers that fail to take a bend and cross over to the opposite side of the road with devastating results. When winter tyres are mixed and they overheat, grip is reduced and lateral movement on bend taking is a



possibility.

This is a word of caution and a strong opinion expressed by the team at Tyrestop. It is documented on many websites not to mix winter tyres. It is also important to question the percentage of bad weather in Ireland to warrant the purchase of winter tyres. It is also important to note that in many EU countries the use of winter tyres is restricted from April to October approximately.

Finally, it is difficult for the consumer to be aware of all these facts and associated dangers, currently the law is the consumer should know which tyres they should use. It is our intention at Tyrestop to make all consumers aware of such issues and more for the safety of all road

Know Your Rights: DISCRIMINATION IN EMPLOYMENT RECRUITMENT

DECEMBER 2014

OUESTION

I recently applied, unsuccessfully, for a job. I was asked in the interview how many children I had and how I would manage childcare if offered the job. I feel the way I was treated during the recruitment process was discriminatory. What redress do I

ANSWER

Ireland has legislation prohibiting discrimination in a wide range of employment areas including recruitment. Discrimination is defined as 'less favourable treatment'. A person can be discriminated against if he/she is treated less favourably than another person is, has been or would be treated in a comparable situation on any of nine grounds, as follows:

- Gender: this means man, woman or transsexual.
- Civil status: includes single, married, separated, divorced, widowed people, civil partners and former civil partners.
- Family status: this refers to the parent of a person under 18 years or the resident primary carer or parent of a person with a disability.
- Sexual orientation: includes gay, lesbian, bisexual and
- Religion: means religious belief, background, outlook or none.
- Age: this does not apply to a person aged under 16.
- Disability: includes people with physical, intellectual, learning, cognitive or emotional disabilities and a range of medical conditions.
- Race: includes race, skin colour, nationality or ethnic origin.
- Membership of the Traveller community.

If you think that you have been discriminated against during recruitment on one of these grounds you can bring your case to the Equality Tribunal under the Employment Equality Acts 1998 to 2011. You should use the online complaint form (available by selecting 'Make a complaint in relation to employment rights' on workplacerelations.ie). You must lodge your complaint within 6 months of the alleged act of discrimination.

The Irish Human Rights and Equality Commission can provide information on employment equality legislation. It can also, at its discretion, provide legal assistance to people who wish to bring claims to the Equality Tribunal.

Fossa won the East Kerry Minor Division 2 Championship Final, sponsored by The Tatler Jack, after an exciting sporting game in Listry last Sunday. Fossa got off to a strong start with three points (Paudie Clifford) and a goal in the opening quarter to three points from Rathmore (Dean Fitzgerald 2, Donnacha Mc Carthy) . The goal came eight minutes into the game, when Paudie Devane put the ball into the net, from a cross by Paudie Clifford. THE WEEK IN FARMING

January the 1st, 2015 will see the end of the Irish Brucellosis testing regime which has existed since 1965. In its early years the disease was tackled very successfully, falling from a high of 15% of the national herd to only .2% of the herd by 1986. The disease remained active only in the area of North Cork, Limerick and Tipperary. It should have disappeared with one final push and be confined to history by the early nineties. Instead it was spread, unscrupulously, back into the surrounding countryside. Kerry farms succumbed in the early nineties and it was not until 2006 that we finally saw the last of Brucellosis, A decade later we will finally reap the rewards. It is important to remember the stories of Trojan bovines, innocently bought, introduced to healthy herds and the abortion storms that followed. The devastation caused inside the doors of many homes when family members succumbed to the illness. It must also be said that shoddy bio-security was a major factor in the spread.

It could very well be ironic that the AHI initiative to remove BVD from Irish herds moves into a new phase in 2015. Progress over the last two years has been good. Over 99% of the 1.9 million calves born in 2014 were tested in 2014. The level of infection falling by 40%, from .67% in 2013 to .44% this year. Not bad for an industry run initiative, in only its second proper year of operation. There the good news ends unfortunately, the limitations placed on the scheme by lack of state involvement means that a cohort of farmers have refused to dispose of infected animals. This reservoir ensures that the virus has a host in the mist of the community and the opportunity to spread wherever these farmers and those who work with their animals go after they leave their holdings. The virus can live for up to 3 days on

clothing and footwear, every ml of mucus, urine, faeces contains up to a million virus particles. Animals infected will see their immunity seriously compromised, leading to illness and possibly death, infection between months 3 and 5 of pregnancy leads to calves becoming persistently infected. We all know this information or should: still 400 PI calves were born to animals introduced to herds, when already pregnant, in the first nine months of 2014. That's 400 potentially clean herds compromised by the simple act of buying a replacement. Transporting animals in unclean lorries, allowing unnecessary visitors onto your farm, through your herd, buying animals without proof of BVD status, all the measures spoken of when Brucellosis was a problem must be avoided. There will inevitably be hard luck cases but the onus is on all of us to ensure that once we are clean we do all we can to remain so. Dealing with this defiant reservoir has to be a priority, at the very least AHI should provide conforming farmers with a certificate of compliance. How farm bodies react to the lack of such a certificate should then be open to debate.

DAIL QUESTION ON MILK PRICES ANSWERED BY MINISTER

Simon Coveney The Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine responded to Tom Flemings question about the Teagasc statement regarding dramatic reduction in milk prices in 2015.

Dairy Prices are a function of global market dynamics, with supply and demand issues in markets across the globe affecting prices across different dairy commodity groups in domestic markets. Price volatility is a continuing feature of dairy commodity markets, and it is clear that managing the price peaks and troughs in a way that allows farmers and others to plan ahead is a significant challenge for the sector.

After two years of extremely high prices, the combination of strong production in key dairy producing countries, including the USA, New Zealand, Australia and the European Union, driven by good weather increased cow numbers in the US and strong cereal harvests, has seen the emergence of a surplus in dairy products on international markets coming into 2015. Furthermore, with Russia and China accounting for 27% of the traded world market in the dairy sector, the effect of surplus stacks in the Chinese market along with the displacement effect of the Russian ban can be seen as critical factors in setting the context for price evalution in the sector.

The anticipated decline in 2015 largely

reflects the impact of the aforementioned developments on global dairy markets. Teagasc expects that average Irish milk prices in 2015 will fall to 27 cent per litre, a reduction of over 10 cent per litre on the average for 2014, However it should be noted that this follows several years of very good incomes on dairy farms. Furthermore, Teagasc are clear that these negative effects are expected to be temporary in nature.

Under the new Common Agriculture Policy there is a range of tools available to mitigate the worst impact of downward price volatility, including Aids to Private Storage, Intervention and Export Refunds and I have called on the EU Commission to deploy these tools as appropriate. The Single Farm Payment will also provide a measure of income stability during this difficult period. I have also asked the banking sector to tailor their financial products to allow for the kind of price volatility that will be a feature of international dairy markets, and of course co-ops have a role to play in ensuring that their contractual arrangements with suppliers provide a measure of stability. A focus on innovation and the production of added value products will also have a role to play in mitigating the impact of volatility, and a greater use of futures markets may also feature among the tools deployed

RETAILER DISCOUNTING OF FRESH PRODUCE WILL HAVE REPERCUSSIONS - IFA

IFA President Eddie Downey has warned retailers that farmers will not tolerate a repeat of the savage discounting of Irish potatoes and vegetables which occurred in the runup to last Christmas, where growers were the victims in a vicious battle over market share. He said, "Pricing decisions will be made in the coming days by the retailers for the run-in to Christmas. In 2013, some items were sold at one tenth of their production cost. This action has the consequence of undermining local growers and sending a misleading message to consumers regarding the inherent value of what is essential and healthy food".

Eddie Downey said claims by supermarkets that they bear the entire cost of these 'giveaways' are disingenuous and not borne out by the facts. "In the last 12 months, we have seen some retailers impose average reductions of 10% in the farm gate price. This continuous downward pressure on fresh produce is threatening local growers that are part of an indigenous sector which is worth over €350 million per annum to our economy. Growers are now at breaking point with some returns below the cost of production."

He said the new Competition and Consumer Protection Act introduced this autumn totally neglected to address the issue of below-cost selling, and Eddie Downey said that Minister Coveney could not simply stand by and let the retailers repeat last year's behaviour.

The IFA President also challenged the Competition and Consumer Protection Commission to monitor the activities of the retailers. The fresh produce sector is in ongoing decline and we will not allow the industry to be decimated by crude pricecutting tactics, which give the illusion of value to the consumer".





COMMITTING TO **ENDING MODERN SLAVERY BY 2020**

In the 19th century, the international community came together to declare slavery an affront to our common humanity.

The International Day for the Abolition of Slavery, 2nd December, marks the date of the adoption in 1949, by the General Assembly, of the United Nations Convention for the Suppression of the Traffic in Persons and of the Exploitation of the Prostitution of Others.

The focus of this day is on eradicating contemporary forms of slavery, such as trafficking in persons, sexual exploitation, the worst forms of child labour, forced marriage, and the forced recruitment of children for use in armed conflict.

Today, 21 million women, men and children are trapped in slavery all over the world.

For the first time in history leaders of the world's largest faiths have come together. Their goal is to end slavery. The Global Freedom Network (GFN) brought together leaders of the Catholic, Anglican and Orthodox, as well as Buddhist, Hindu, Jewish and Muslim faiths who have jointly declared one common humanitarian endeavour: to eradicate modern slavery by 2020 throughout our world and for all time as a crime against humanity.

These faith leaders from all walks of life, all around the world signed a declaration to end modern slavery - this is a game changer in collective efforts to free the world of this evil once and for all.

CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

On December 8th, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, virtually all schools in Ireland are closed for the day. It is traditionally the nation's number one day for Christmas shopping. Long ago, farm families cleaned and then whitewashed every building on the farm in December. They were covered in white paint or lime wash, to symbolically purify them for the coming of the saviour. The tradition traces back thousands of years, not just through Celtic culture, but through other Central European cultures as well.

The children went out to find holly bushes and ivy to decorate windows, doorways, mantles and pictures, and the father would carve out a turnip in which would be placed a large red candle. This would go in the window to light the way for the Holy Family on Christmas Eve. Only in relatively recent times did an Irish family have a Nativity scene in the house. Holly was also used because it allowed poor people to decorate their homes in the same way as

those who were better off. The bush was so common in Ireland in winter there was plenty for everyone.

As Christmas trees are a relatively new phenomenon in Ireland children were accustomed to finding presents left by Santa in their bedrooms, often in a sack at the foot of the bed. In later times an occasional big gift was left under the Christmas tree, but was usually unwrapped.

"Little Women's Christmas," on January 6th, is a traditional day for Irish women to leave their housework behind and go out with each other to have fun.

USEFUL HINTS

Open fires are used for longer periods during the Christmas period as people spend a lot more time at home. Electrical items and extension leads are used more. Add in flammable decorations, candles and alcohol and it becomes apparent that the risks increase during the festive season.

- Before buying a toy or allowing your child to play with a toy that he has received as a gift, read the instructions carefully. If the toy is appropriate for your child, show him how to use it properly.
- Follow recommended age ranges on toy packages. Toys that are too advanced could pose a safety hazard for younger children.
- To prevent both burns and electrical shocks, don't give young children (under age ten) a toy that must be plugged into an electrical outlet. Instead, buy toys that are battery-operated.
- Children under age three can choke on small parts contained in toys or games.
- Children under age 8 can choke or suffocate on uninflated or broken balloons. Remove strings and ribbons from toys before giving them to young children.
- Watch for pull toys with strings that are more than 12 inches in length. They could be a strangulation hazard for babies.
- Hot fat, boiling water and sharp knives make the kitchen one of the most dangerous places during the holiday. Try to keep other people (especially children) out of the kitchen. Avoid alcohol until you've finished cooking, and wipe up spills as soon as they happen, so that people don't slip.
- Clutter, alcohol and tiredness make the stairs an accident hotspot during Christmas. Keep the stairs well lit and free from obstacles, especially if you have guests who could be going up to the bathroom during the night.
- Typical Christmas Day accidents include parents accidentally stabbing themselves with scissors, which they've used to assemble toys, instead of using a screwdriver. People often cut themselves with knives when they're opening presents too quickly. People also trip over toys and electric cables while rushing to try their new computers and other appliances. Keep screwdrivers handy and clear up the packaging and wrapping paper as you go along, and remember to recycle.

EGYPTIAN ART HELPS CHART PAST EXTINCTIONS OF BIG MAMMALS

Life in modern Egypt clings to the Nile River. This crowded green strip within the desert supports more than 2,300 people per square kilo metre (6,000 per square mile). That doesn't leave much room for wildlife. Jackals, foxes, hyenas, ibex, and a few other large mammal species manage to eke out an existence. But 6,000 years ago, all of Egypt was green and vibrant, teeming with life but over time, this rich ecosystem fell apart.

The earliest pieces, dated by archaeologists to 6,000 years ago, depicted 38 large mammal species including giraffes, lions, elephants and hippopotami. A thousand years later, as the climate began to shift from humid to arid, animals began to vanish from the artworks. Two other large sets of disappearances matched further climatic shifts about 4,200 and 3,000 years ago. Today's desert ecosystem was the outcome.

A fourth massive extinction occurred about 150 years ago as Egypt began to industrialise.

WELL DONE **TO** STUDENTS OF KINGSLEIGH PRIMARY SCHOOL

A video made by students at Kingsleigh Primary School in England has made headlines around the world and is now being featured on the website for People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA). The children's goal is simple: to save an elephant that has been confined to a small pen at a Manila zoo for 35 years. The work these children have done and the compassion they have shown is incredible and deserves our gratitude. Mali the elephant was taken from her habitat in Sri Lanka as a baby in 1974, and has spent 35 years in a small concrete pen in Manila Zoo. She remains the only captive elephant in the Philippines and, because of her isolation and inability to interact with other elephants, suffers from a variety of complex medical and mental health issues. Mali is so lonely that she constantly holds her own tail. Young elephants will hold the tails of their mothers for security. In the video, the children speak as though they are Mali, telling her story and describing how she was taken from her home and endured decades of torture and suffering. Descriptions include, "The more I move, the more I am beaten, even though I have done nothing wrong. With tears in my eyes I lay in pain, as the days drag on." Finally, the children ask "Are you going to leave her there?" while showing a haunting image of Mali holding her own tail. Holly Graff, a teacher at the school, said, "The children are so excited to see a real outcome from their writing. It shows the children that their writing can have power and that they should stand up for things they feel strongly

7 HOLIDAY DANGERS FOR PETS — AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

Christmas might be the most wonderful time of the year, but it can also be some of the most dangerous for cats and dogs. From deliciously rich holiday fare to enticinaly shiny decorations, the holiday season brings plenty of risky temptations for animals. Even if you are vigilant all year with your pets, it's easy to get distracted with the extra responsibilities and extra people coming and going this season.

1: Don't let your cat turn your Christmas tree into a playground. If possible, set up the tree in a room that can be closed off with doors or create a moat of foil around the base of the tree. Most cats hate walking on foil. And it's a good idea to secure your tree to the ceiling or wall to keep it from crashing down if your cat does decide to climb it. 2: Your guests may not know that feeding rich holiday fare to pets can lead to pancreatitis, a painful and potentially lifethreatening condition most commonly caused by overindulgence in fatty food. Make it clear to visitors that giving leftovers to your animal is not OK, no matter how much he begs. And your guests may think it's harmless to give dogs and

cats leftover turkey, chicken, beef or fish bones, but that's not the case. Meat bones can shatter or splinter and perforate the intestinal tract or cause intestinal blockage. Dogs can also choke on large or oddly shaped bones, like T-bones. It's also a good idea to teach your dog to stop begging at the dinner table, so guests won't be as tempted to give him their leftovers. 3: Keep your animals in mind as you light candles, and luminaries. Never leave your pets unattended with them. Consider replacing tapers and tea lights with flameless candles. Though a battery-operated or plug-in alternative may not be as dramatic or beautiful as a candle, it could prevent a fire or a badly burnt pet. If you must use a real candle to keep your pet safe, place your candle on a stable surface she can't reach and consider securing her in a crate. 4: Besides candles, the other dangerous decorations you need to worry about are glass ornaments, tinsel, ribbon, loose electrical cords and potpourri. Cats are especially attracted to tinsel and ribbon, which can be dangerous if accidentally ingested. If you have a curious and playful pet who tries to bat at or play with ornaments, replace glass or fragile ornaments with plastic or nonbreakable ones. Or, better yet, place them out of reach where they can't be chewed or swallowed. Additionally, secure loose or dangling electrical cords so your animal doesn't bite them. And if you want to fill your home with the scents of the season through potpourri, keep it out of reach of pets. Liquid and dried potpourris can be toxic for cats and, in some cases, for dogs as well. 5: Chances are, you'll have plenty of family and friends stopping by over the Christmas season. Some of your quests may not be comfortable around cats and dogs or won't know the proper ways to pet your animal — especially children. This is a great time to teach kids how to approach and interact with your animal. Supervise each interaction, and watch your cat or dog for signs of distress, such as trying to escape or growling. Family and friends dropping by could overwhelm your dog or cat. Teaching your pet to be comfortable in his crate or securing him in a room until your party is over can help relieve his anxiety.

6: Think twice about decking the halls with boughs of holly and mistletoe. These plants might get you in the holiday spirit, but they can be toxic to pets. Other foliage that can be dangerous includes amaryllis and lilies. Contrary to popular belief, poinsettias are actually not all that harmful, but it's still a good idea to keep them away from pets.

If you suspect your animal has ingested a poisonous plant, call your vet immediately.

7: Your favourite furry companion deserves something special this holiday season, but some toys, even ones created for cats and dogs, can be dangerous. For dogs, avoid toys that are small enough to be ingested, linear objects like strings and ribbons, and toys stuffed with beads or beans. For cats, steer clear of toys that have strings, ribbons or yarn, and take off any plastic eyes or noses on toy mice. When in doubt, follow your instincts and keep a seemingly suspect toy away from your animal.

FOCUS ON HARDWOOD CUTTINGS

Hardwood cuttings are a pretty easy and a very reliable method of propagating a wide range of deciduous shrubs, climbers and fruit bushes,


Most deciduous shrubs are ideal for taking hardwood cuttings, for example Buddleja (Butterfly Bush) Ribes (Flowering Current), Viburniums or Forsythia and the same applies to a lot of deciduous climbers like honeysuckles and Jasmine plus fruit bushes like black currants and gooseberries.

The best time to take hardwood cuttings is when the plant is dormant which is from about mid Autumn until late Winter but the ideal time would be just after the leaves fall off the plant or just before the buds start to burst in early Spring.

These types of cuttings may be slow to roots however it is very successful.


