CHAMBER LUNCH WELCOMES MINISTER FOR FINANCE

Afull house is expected at a lunch at the Killarney Plaza Hotel today. The Inaugural Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President's lunch will welcome the new Minister for Finance, Michael McGrath, TD as the keynote speaker for the business organisations first gathering of 2023.

SEAMUS HAS LEFT US WITH A MUSICAL LEGACY

One of Ireland's finest musicians Séamus Begley has died at the age of 73.

The news broke on Monday evening that the talented West Kerry man had passed away following a short illness.

One of Ireland's most famous traditional musicians. Séamus comes from a strong muscial background, growing up in the parish of Baile na bPoc in the West Kerry Gaeltacht. Born in 1949, Séamus Begley learned his music at home and began playing at the local céilí at the age of 13. He released his first album, An Ciarraíocjh Mallaithe, with his sister Máire in 1973. Begley and his sister joined up again on Planxtaí Bhaile na bPoc in 1989, the same year he played at the Glastonbury Festival with Steve Cooney. He later collaborated with Cooney on the album Meitheal in 1992. He later partnered with the likes of Jim Murray, Mary Black, Sharon Shannon and Tim Edey, producing further albums. In fact he first met Sharon Shannon at his home in West Kerry while she was at the Gaeltacht at the age of 17. They began a life long friendship and speaking on Morning Ireland this week, Sharon said he was like a father to her.

President of Ireland, Michael D Higgins led tributes to the talented musician.

"It is with sadness that lovers of Irish music across the world will have heard of the death of Séamus Begley.

Séamus will be remembered as one of Ireland's finest accordion players as well as a beautiful singer. Growing up in a family rich in traditional Irish music in Baile na bPoc in the west Kerry Gaeltacht, his recordings and performances captured not only the music of his upbringing but also a knowledge of music far beyond these shores", President Higgins said.

Sliabh Luachra musican Bryan O'Leary spoke to the Killarney Outlook this week about his memories of the great musician.

"I first became aware of Séamus at my grandfather Johnny O'Leary's funeral, himself and his brother Breandáin spent the day at the house", Bryan said.

"My first time playing with him was when I was about 12 years old in Milltown Malbay. I was a student of Brendáin's and after lessons

we would head into The Westbridge for a trad session and were joined by Séamus.

"He was not only a fantastic musican, but he was also a wonderful singer and when he sang a song whether it was in his native Irish or in English, he captured

the audience and you could hear a pin drop - such was the beautiful, soothing tones", Bryan added.

There was a fun side to the great man who was always up for a bit of craic but was also a most generous side, Bryan told Killarney Outlook. "We were trying to develop Tureencahill Community Centre into a bit of a venue and I asked him would he play the first concert there, he was in Donegal, feeling a bit under the weather with the flu, but drove down the length of the country to Tureencahill to perform - such was the generosity of the man. Of course the night ended in a trad session in Knocknagree - and this is a memory I will never forget", Bryan said.

"His generosity was such that when he heard I was hoping to start play a C Sharp D Accordian, like my grandfather Johnny, he gave me his to try - "carry it away with you" he said "and give it a go".

"He learnt a lot of tunes from my grandfather and it was often a case that he wouldn't know the name - I remember getting a text about an hour before he was about to perform at a Fleadh Cheoil which was being televised looking for the names of the tunes"quick", Bryan added.

Seamus played for many famous people over the years including at the State dinner held in honour of their Majesties, the King and Queen of the Netherlands in June 2019, on which occasion he was accompanied on vocals by his daughter Méabh and on guitar by Donogh Hennessy.

Everyone who knew Séamus, will remember him for his incredible talent, his genuine

warmth and his great sense of fun. He was a man that left a lasting impression on all those who he met and he will be deeply missed.

The traditional music scene said goodbye to another legend this week, the late Jimmy Doyle from Headford. Jimmy was one of the last of the great Sliabh Luachra Musicians having played with the likes of Johnny O'Leary and Denis Murphy. In fact, it was Jimmy who was instrumental in also teaching Bryan O'Leary at his weekly Sunday sessions in The Arbutus Bar in Killarney.


"Everyone in the trad scene in Ireland would have known or heard of Jimmy Doyle, he was the last link to the old Sliabh Luachra music, having learned directly from my grandfather, Bryan said. "Always so encouraging, he would bring young students along with him on a Sunday and encourage them to play the tunes the knew and accompanied them.

No one could play a jig like Johnny, his old style was synomous with his talent and he will be greatly missed.

MAYOR LAUNCHES COMMUNITY SUPPORT FUND 2023

Perry County Council has this week opened applications for the Community Support Fund for 2023. Community groups across Kerry can now apply to the fund through the Kerry County Council website and the closing date is Wednesday 8th February 2023.

A total of €750,000 is being made available through this year's scheme.

The fund, which is now in its ninth year, has supported over 2,680 projects since 2015.

The 2023 Community Support Fund was launched by the Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr John Francis Flynn who encouraged community groups to apply.

Main Street Misses the Mark in



Litter Report

Main Street misses the mark in IBAL report.

Town centre Killarney gets a bit of a doing in the latest IBAL Irish Business Against Litter survey conducted by An Taisce.

Killarney has not reached the heights of previous years and has been overtaken and is on a declining trend. This is a great pity after all the voluntary and professional effort over the years.

As mayor of Killarney Niall Kelleher put it, " the decline in Killarney over the past 18 months needs to be reversed".

"We have a problem," he told this week's council meeting, which was back in the town hall.

The declining trend in relation to IBAL is a negative and the things raised in the survey have previously been raised by councillors, the meeting was told.

Niall O'Callaghan put it bluntly: "We haven't replaced the workers on the ground," he said referring to retirements and such.

Council road staff were praised by all councillors for their efforts historically and over at Christmas.

Brendan Cronin asked for consultation with bar and shop owners on cigarette litter.

Marie Moloney said the staff in place were doing their utmost "but they are under severe pressure and I can't understand we are not back up at levels of recruitment."

The bins in the Glebe were "a disgrace" she said and cars could hardly pass them, she added.

Temporary staff should be taken on full-time, Donal Grady said.Bins should not be put out at night and this would reduce litter, he also said.

Approach roads and the Killarney Leisure Centre, far outside the town centre, garner great praise. But overall, Killarney "just holds on to its clean status," comes the assessment. The report does not put a tooth in it:

"It is a shame that the Main Street in this important tourist town just missed the top litter grade, not much effort is required to rectify this. By far the most heavily littered

area was the 'Bins at Glebe Car Park' site – clearly better management of commercial / industrial waste is required here."

Surely the Glebe Car area which has been an eyesore with some time can be tidied up? A simple solution would be a timber railing and protective area to corner off the Glebe bins while preventing casual dumping.

I am amazed neither the Tidy Towns earlier this summer, or An Taisce/IBAL do not stress the issue of chewing gum stuck to the pavements on New Street and elsewhere. Cigarette butts are far easier to pick up. By the way, "the long deep ruts" on many of the roads, mentioned in the Tidy Towns have also yet to be addressed.

Kerry County Council management and engineers have pledged a doubling of efforts.

Town manager Angela McAllen insisted there are enough resources but says the council is taking on board the negatives "as well as the large number of positives" in the IBAL report. "Our standards are and remain high in this town," the manager said.

Guests of the Nation

One of the most disappointing aspects of the most talked about subject in Killarney, a huge increase in population, has been the deafening silence from our own Government TDs Norma Foley and Brendan Griffin. Main opposition TD Pa Daly of Sinn Fein has also been silent other than to condemn a protest outside the direct provision Hotel Killarney last weekend.

There is real anxiety now in a town hosting thousands of extra people with no plan for the future and no supports.

Local residents feel overwhelmed by the volumes being placed, as the result of what are private commercial deals between the State and individual property owners. And all this in a town where housing, health and other services were stretched already.

Yes, on Monday night on TV, Killarney got a pat on the back from Tralee based Minister and former teacher Norma Foley for being so welcoming. Tanaiste Micheal Martin, a former teacher too, has also given Killarney the same pat on the back as indeed has Higher Education Minister Simon Harris during his visit to the town. It's beginning to feel like gold stars from the primary school teacher! But the problems and anxiety in the relatively small tourist dependent town need more than gold stars on our copy book. And we citizens are entitled to answers from our political leaders.

How long is this to continue? How many contracts are being renewed? Are there new contracts? Can Norma or the former deputy Government chief whip Brendan tell us how a town filled with traumatised people can

at the same time present a light-hearted, carefree holiday atmosphere.

What will happen to all these people and their children as well as men if the contracts are not renewed? There is also the thorny problem of different treatment, something I and others are increasingly uncomfortable with. A two-tier system, encouraged by the EU, has been created with regard to refugees that is downright discriminatory, as several have already pointed out. Those in direct provision in Killarney get Euro 38.80 a week while those in temporary protection are entitled to several times this, support organisation Masi points out. Access to education and language support and medical are also speedier, Masi also says.

Is it too much to ask that our Kerry TDs could insist on consultation with the wider community in Killarney before any more private contracts with B&Bs and hotels are signed by the State. Could they seek to end the stark discrimination between classes of refugees that is reinforcing division. Could they ensure we get our rightful allocation of gardai, GPs, postal workers, social workers, administrators, houses, educators, traffic police etc in accordance with the dramatic increase in population numbers. Finally, could they also seek that all refugees are identified properly before being placed in communities?

Local Hillwalking may have "Peaked"

There has been noticeable downturn in numbers of hillwalkers in Killarney this Christmas. Some of this may be down to weather. But I have a sneaking suspicion much of it is post-Covid.



For almost three years there was nothing to do but walk! And walk again. And with the Macroom bypass there was an expectation of more walkers than ever.

Grey skies do not help of course, but all things have cycles and it may well be the case hillwalking "peaked" during Covid lockdowns. That said, there was an extraordinary call-out on Christmas Day on my doorstep and you would wonder why we are still at the stage of not demanding some financial penalty from lost walkers who drag volunteers away from the Christmas dinner table. Something else to consider for the New Year!



Killarney man Connie O'Sullivan was instrumental in making the event


such a huge success, along with tremendous support from our MC David Joyce from Cork and of course Pat Eviston of the Eviston House Hotel, who kindly hosted the event

CALL FOR FALLEN TREES TO BE MADE AVAILABLE FOR THE VULNERABLE

At this week's Killarney District Municipal meeting, which was held in the Killarney Town Hall, Cllr. John O'Donoghue put forward a notice of motion that in the event of the NPWS having wood from fallen trees in excess of that required for re-generative purposes, it would



consider donating that supply to a local charity shop for distribution to appropriate households e.g. pensioners to help them cope with the rising energy costs.

"I am well aware of the argument from an environmental perspective for allowing fallen trees regenerate their own ecosystem, and I am not looking to interfere in the process. I am asking that if the powers that be in the NPWS deem it a possibility due to having an excess of this fallen timber, that they would consider making it available to suitable households e.g. pensioners due to the ongoing energy crisis. The cost of heating our homes has exploded in recent months, and this is being felt by the vulnerable more than most, and I feel that due to the extraordinary circumstances we find ourselves presented with, every possible avenue for easing the burden should be explored. It makes me very uncomfortable to think there are elderly people and struggling families within our MD who are too worried about their bills to heat themselves properly. If the NPWS were to acquiesce to my request, I would not be looking to set a permanent precedent, but as mentioned earlier, these extraordinary times call for extraordinary measures", Cllr. O'Donoghue told the meeting.

The Council will bring this to matter to the NPWS for their consideration.

STILL CLEAN, BUT MORE WORK NEEDS TO BE DONE

The latest litter survey by business group Irish Business Against Litter shows Tralee and Killarney retaining their 'clean' status in 2022. In 21st and 28th place respectively in the ranking of 40 towns and cities nationwide, neither came close to challenging Naas for the title of cleanest town. In all, three quarters of Ireland's cities and towns were deemed 'clean' in 2022, compared to just over half in the previous year.

The An Taisce report for Killarney stated:

While not reaching the heights of previous years, Killarney just holds on to its clean status. Top ranking sites included the approach roads and Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre – the latter was exceptionally well presented and maintained. It is a shame that the Main Street in this important tourist town just missed the top litter grade, not much effort is required to rectify this. By far the most heavily littered area was the 'Bins at Glebe Car Park' site – clearly better management of commercial / industrial waste is required here.

Pike Road: Grade A. A clean a fresh impression of Killarney was created along this route. The recessed area with seating was a nice feature.

Woodlands Industrial Estate: Grade A. Apart from a few minor items, including dog fouling, this was a clean site. Apart from very minimal planting, this was a very functional environment.

Killarney Sports & Leisure: Grade A. An exceptionally well presented and maintained environment with a complete absence of litter throughout. Car park surface and markings were in good order and the extensive planting looked great. Well done to all concerned!

Park Road: Grade B. (from junction with N22 and Countess Road). Some parts of this road were much cleaner than other parts. As well as a wide variety of food and alcohol cans, there was a pile of discarded clothing and some construction related materials.

Aldi: Grade B. This freshly presented environment was let down by noticeable litter at all the pedestrian entrances, on the grass area, next to the bin and trolley bays. As well as typical food related items, there were

shop receipts and promotional related materials.

Main Street: Grade B+. Excellent streetscape with lovely paving, road surface, bollards, ornamental tree planning, planter boxes and well presented shop fronts. With a little extra effort on behalf of smokers and shoppers, this could be a top ranking site.

Bohereencael: Grade B+. The brick paving along this narrow laneway looks great and the ornamental tree is a welcome addition. Cigarette butts were the most obvious litter item, with lower levels of food related items. There didn't appear to be any litter bins / cigarette butt units.

Bins at Glebe Car Park: Grade C. This area was by far the most heavily littered site surveyed in Killarney. Many of the large commercial bins (with locks) were full /overflowing, the contents of which were spilling onto the ground. As well as a wide variety of food related items, there was cardboard and industrial wrapping. The overall impression was a poor one.

Bus Station: Grade B. The Bus Parking area was clen but the covered seating area harboured litter – mostly cigarette butts with lower levels of food items e.g. sweet papers, mineral cans, coffee cups and plastic bag. This took away from an otherwise well presented environment with attractive paving, seating and litter bins which were in good condition.

Port Approach Road: Grade A. Road surface / markings / signage were in very good order and area was enhanced by some nice paving and stainless steel bollards. It was excellent with regards to litter.

Sick Leave and Sick Pay



Sick leave

Q. This is also the time of year when a lot of people are getting colds and flus and may have to take time off work. Today we are going to look at what support is available if you find yourself in a situation where you have to take time off work due to illness.Can you clarify what rights to paid sick leave that employees have?

It may surprise some of your listeners to hear that until this year, 2023, you had no legal right to be paid while you were on sick leave from work, no matter how long you had worked for your employer. However, this has changed.

Since 1 January 2023, you have a right to 3 days' sick pay a year. This is called statutory sick pay (that means the legal minimum). Sick pay is paid by your employer at 70% of your normal pay up to a maximum of €110 a day.

The entitlement to paid sick leave is being phased in over 4 years:

- : 2023 3 days covered
- : 2024 5 days covered
- : 2025 7 days covered
- : 2026 10 days covered

Sick days can be taken as consecutive days or non-consecutive days. The sick pay year is the calendar year, so it runs from 1 January to 31 December.

Q. Is every person who is in employment entitled to sick pay?

To qualify for statutory sick pay you must be an employee and have worked for your employer

for at least 13 continuous weeks before you are sick – that's about 3 months. You must also be certified by a GP as unable to work

Q. Does this mean that the employee needs a medical cert to get sick pay?

Yes - under the sick leave legislation, you must be certified by a GP as unable to work to qualify for statutory sick pay. You should be certified from day 1 of your sick leave.

You have a right to SSP from the first day you are off sick. Your employer cannot apply 'waiting days' before you get sick pay.

Q. How is the sick pay calculated?

Your statutory sick leave payment must be paid at your normal daily rate. You are entitled to 70% of your normal gross pay, up to a maximum €110 a day.

Q. Some employers may already have a sick pay scheme – how does this new scheme impact on those situations?

Yes, some employers already pay sick leave and may already offer their employees more generous sick pay arrangements than the new statutory scheme. These would normally be outlined within your contract of employment. However, the important point to note is that any company's sick leave scheme can't be less than the statutory amount.

Q. What are my options if I experience problems getting sick pay?

If you do not get statutory sick pay, contact your employer to try to resolve the issue informally

first.

If you cannot resolve the issue directly with your employer, you can make a formal complaint to the Workplace Relations Commission (WRC). Contact your local Citizens Information Centre for information on how to make a complaint to the WRC

You must make your complaint within 6 months of the dispute. The time limit can be extended for a further 6 months if there is reasonable cause for the delay.

Q. This new statutory sick pay scheme provides sick pay for a limited number of days e.g. 3 days in 2023. What happens if I am off sick for more than 3 days?

If you are off work sick for more than 3 days, and you have enough PRSI contributions, you can apply to the Department of Social Protection (DSP) for a payment called Illness Benefit.

If you do not have enough PRSI contributions, you should contact the DSP's representative at your local health centre. They will assess your situation and you may have entitlement to Supplementary Welfare Allowance which is means-tested

For anyone needing information, advice or have an advocacy issue, you can call a member of the local Citizens Information team in Kerry on 0818 07 7860, they will be happy to assist and make an appointment if necessary. The offices are staffed from Monday to Friday from 10am to 4pm. Alternatively you can email on tralee@ citinfo.ie or log on to www.citizensinformation. ie for further information.

SECOND BOOSTER AVAILABLE TO 18-49 YEAR OLDS

Cork Kerry Community Healthcare is reminding all adults aged between 18-49 that they can now avail of their second COVID-19 booster vaccine with appointments available at clinics in Cork and Kerry this week.

From Wednesday January 11th clinics in Cork and Kerry will offer a second COVID-19 booster vaccine to all eligible adults aged between 18-49.

Dr. Anne Sheahan, Area Director of Public Health for Cork and Kerry says:

"We strongly encourage people aged 18-49 to avail of the vaccine. It is a very safe vaccine and will offer added protection at a time when we are seeing very high levels of COVID-19 in the community. And people can still become very sick with the infection"

Adding that: "Our best ammunition against COVID is vaccination"

Vaccines take 14 days to be effective. The new

adapted vaccines will be provided as a booster vaccine for this group. You can book a booster appointment online at HSE vaccination clinics on www.hse.ie. Booster vaccines may also be available at participating pharmacies and GPs.

While some people in the 18-49 years age group may have already received their second booster if they are a healthcare worker or have

had an underlying health condition, the HSE also strongly urges people who have not yet received a COVID-19 booster vaccine to check their vaccine status and to do so as soon as possible. You can do this by contacting HSELive on 1800 700 700.





COLLEGE HOPEFULS CAN APPROACH THE 2023 CAO COLLEGE APPLICATION SEASON WITH CONFIDENCE AND OPTIMISM



As a new year begins with renewed hope and exuberance, college applicants must focus on the CAO form as the deadline looms large. Indeed, it's shaping up to be a very promising year for the 80,000 plus applicants – about 2,500 from Kerry-seeking a third level college course. In 2022, 67,075 applicants received at least one offer from the CAO. The net applicant acceptance figure was 49,459 – 43,207 at Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) and 6,252 at Level 7/6 (Ordinary Level Degrees/Higher Certificates). More than 50,000 college places will be available next August. Applicants have until 5pm on 1st February to submit a completed application form. So, use the remaining weeks wisely. Carefully consider your course choices. Follow your heart but keep an eye on the jobs market.

Since the new Leaving Cert grading system and CAO common points scale were introduced in 2017, points' requirements for many courses have stabilised. As the 'calculated, accredited and enhanced grades' considerably inflated course points requirements during the past three years, it might be wiser to consult the 2019 cut off points as a guide to likely points requirements in 2023. But keep in mind that points' requirements for courses fluctuate from year to year, so predicting cut off points is an inaccurate science. Each Leaving Cert candidate should aim to achieve her/his best possible result in that exam. Points' requirements for courses will take care of themselves in due course.

The CAO processes applications for admission to undergraduate courses in third level colleges in Ireland. Every public sector university, college and institute in the country, as well as a number of private colleges, participates in the CAO system. An applicant may choose from the entire range of courses in the CAO Handbook 2023. The courses are categorised as 'Level 8' or 'Level 7/6'. The 'Level 8' category contains the Honours Bachelor Degrees while the 'Level 7/6' category contains Ordinary Bachelor Degrees/Higher Certificates.

All you have to do is submit a single application to compete for one of the available third-level places. The interactive online application system, 'Apply' has made the process very straightforward. 'Apply' is easy to follow, particularly as the CAO provides an 'Interactive Demo' to enable you make a trial application. The CAO Handbook 2023 also contains detailed easy-to-follow information on how to apply for the courses on offer. The interactive online application service will remain open on the CAO website, www.cao.ie until 5pm on 1st February. The fee is €30, if you apply by 20th January and €45 thereafter until the 1st February.

Before you apply, study the CAO Handbook 2023 – PDF format or Personalised - which explains how to apply for a third level college place. The colleges in the CAO system are listed in alphabetical order by location. The courses in each college are listed directly under the college title, with 'Level 8' courses being listed separately from 'Level 7/6' courses. Select your personal preferences from the entire range of courses in the Handbook. Each course is assigned a code, which you enter on the application. You may apply for up to ten courses in each of the two categories, listed in order of your preference.

As the CAO Handbook 2023 doesn't contain information about general academic requirements, specific course requirements nor content of courses, consult the colleges' Prospecti and/or websites for that

information. Consider the potential career value of each course for which you are applying. Play to your strengths as you do your course research during the next few weeks. Jot down your personal career profile, including such variables as ability, achievement, application, aptitude, ambition, values, interests and personality (5AVIP). Select courses that suit you in order to have a fulfilling and successful college experience.

KILLARNEY MUNICIPAL DISTRICT MEETING

Ameeting of the Killarney Municipal District took place on Wednesday, 11 January 2023 at 10.00am at Killarney MD Offices/Killarney Town Hall.

A number of notices of motion were put forward by Cllr. John O'Donoghue

That the Council would examine the repeated ponding of water on Mill Road at the turn off for South Hill and put in place measures to resolve the issue.

"This ponding of water has been ongoing for years now, and in really inclement weather it renders the road virtually impassable. The road is extremely busy, but also quite narrow, and it causes traffic to back up when half of the road in impassable. Due to the close proximity of the River Flesk, I cannot imagine it would be impossible to put in a drainage system at this point which would carry away this surface water and alleviate the ponding and I ask that the Council examine possible solutions to this problem".

The Council have cleared out a roadside gully at this location and will monitor the situation. If required, further drainage works will be carried out.

That the Council would examine the pedestrian crossings within Killarney, with a view to making them constant flashing lights, rather than pressing a button resulting in a red light which is leading to serious traffic congestion, particularly on Railway Road by the Outlet Centre

"Traffic in the town is a perpetual issue due to the town being a victim of its own success and I would consider it a far bigger issue if there weren't people coming to the town at all. The placement of some of our pedestrian crossings, and in particular their proximity to roundabouts I know is under review and I welcome that. However, at other locations around the town I feel there is also room to tweak the current systems, and I am in particular thinking of the crossing on Railway Road by the Outlet Centre. Far too often traffic is stopped here at a red light without any pedestrian in sight, and I feel that were it to be replaced with a flashing amber light instead, it would ensure traffic flowed much more smoothly. I believe this was the case previously and ask that the Council consider reverting to this system, even on a trial basis to see how it goes". The Council feel that the current situation of a button with a red light is the most suitable type of pedestrian crossing for this area, but are going to upgrade the signal and control units of these crossings with a view to making traffic flow more freely.

That the Council would repaint the lines at the top of Ross Road as they are quite faded, and currently the cycle lanes are often used for parking impeding the progress of those on bicycles. If these lanes could be clearly identified as cycle lanes, it would greatly alleviate the problem.

6. "These traffic markings on Ross Road have become quite faded, both at junction at the top of the road, and in particular the cycle lanes further down. They road markings have faded to the point where they are almost illegible and it has resulted in cars parking in them, unwittingly I would say. This causes cyclists, and in particular children cycling to and from school, to have to leave the cycle lanes and move out into the road, which immediately places them in danger. I ask that the Council repaint

these lines, clearly indicating the cycle lanes as well as touching up the lines at the junction at the top of the road".

The Council have agreed to refresh the road markings on Ross Road.

With increased levels of dog ownership within our country, that the Council would consider the creation of a dog park in the town or its immediate surrounds.

"This may seem an unusual request, but is one which I feel would be a most worthwhile venture. Dog ownership has soared since the pandemic lockdowns, and part of the responsibilities surrounding owning a dog is that you follow the rules and keep them on a leash in the required areas. For those living in urban areas, this can make giving your pet proper exercise problematic. Dog Parks are a way around this problem and they are growing in popularity here in Ireland with several now in place in Dublin and other cities to great acclaim. They are beginning to spread to other counties, with one opening recently in Westmeath and I feel that in a town such as ours, which prides itself on being welcoming to visitors, ensuring that those who bring their 4 legged friends are also catered to is a must. There are a growing number of businesses around town now, from cafes to bars, which now advertise themselves as being dog friendly indicating the increasing demand for such places, and I feel it is time the Council stepped up to the mark in this regard. The beauty of dog parks is they do not require colossal infrastructure, really it is an enclosed space where dogs are free to socialise with other dogs and get their exercise. As part of this enclosure, a dog run should also be included to allow the more active breeds a long space to run through. I feel it would also bring the added benefit of reducing instances of dogs being off the leash in public areas, particularly in the National Park, which some people can find unsettling. I ask the Council to please identify a suitable tract of land, possibly in conjunction with the NPWS, and put this in place before the summer as once the land is identified it would be relatively simple to set up".

The Council have agreed to look into the matter and have said it is a matter for the Environmental SPC, on which I sit, to look into. I will pursue the matter further there.

Tenants Purchase Scheme

Fianna Fáil's Councillor Michael Cahill has stated at a recent meeting of Kerry County Council that the recent changes to the Tenants Purchase Scheme as announced by the Department of Housing and Kerry County Council, need to be totally redrawn, if this scheme is to be useful for tenants and successful for all.

"The change to allow people in receipt of Pension payments to be eligible, is a very positive step and one that I have been pressing for for some time now, as is the reduction in Minimum Income requirements from $\leq 15,000$ p.a. to $\leq 12,500$ p.a." stated Councillor Cahill.

"But the increase in the period of time tenants will be required to be in receipt of social housing support, to be considered eligible under the scheme, has been increased from 1 to 10 years and this will apply to both parties in a joint tenancy. That is absolutely crazy and will rule out a very large number of tenants from purchasing their own home "said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The purpose of the scheme is to encourage tenants to purchase, not to rule them out of doing so. This requirement must be reviewed immediately to ensure the scheme does not implode" said Councillor Cahill.

"I am also urging that disabled tenants, tenants in one bedroom houses and those in Part 5 housing be allowed enter the Tenants Purchase Scheme as a matter of equality" said Councillor Cahill.

"The increase in the length of time that one has to be in receipt of Social Housing Support so as to qualify for the Tenant Purchase Scheme is discriminatory as is not allowing disabled tenants, tenants in one bedroom houses and those in Part 5 housing from entering the Scheme" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I have called for an urgent deputation to meet with the Minister and his Officials at the the earliest possible date so that these important issues may be addressed" added Councillor Cahill.

WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?

As well as an eye health check, a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.



McGRATH CUP Cork 5-11 Kerry 0-14

Look, I never in my life broke sweat over the McGrath Cup, any more than I would over the East Kerry Superleague. I am not knocking those competitions, but they are not so much any barometer of progress so much as a chance to get a bit of football back into players after the (these days imaginary) rest period and a chance for new players to raise their hands for selection. There's no waiter or waitress in Kerry would thank you for leaving a McGrath medal as a tip.

That said, when you are All Ireland champions, there are sharks in the water sniffing for blood from a long way out. Kerry were well beaten by Cork - well beaten? Hammered. Shipping five goals is a hammering. Like I say, I'm not worried about what it says about Kerry. We are missing a lot of starting bodies through club championships (great to have Kerry teams there, so that doesn't bother me), niggling injuries (I expect that to be a running theme this year at all levels, given the amount of games), and just players resting. We also took a well-deserved break and a holiday, so we are a good bit behind Cork in that regard. I expect that we are in the early phase of heavy training (I have no expertise of any kind here, so I'm guessing) and consequently a bit heavy-legged in comparison. That's January ground that we will be making up, but we are very close to the start of the National League and the calendar is a lot more merciless than it used to be. None of that is a big deal. But look at the message that Cork are taking away from that game.

I've always admired Cleary as a manager. Frankly, I thought he should have been appointed to the Cork seniors several years ago, he seemed the natural successor to Conor Counihan to me. Bringing Kevin Walsh on board is a good move as well. I think Walsh has an undeserved reputation for negative football after his time with Sligo and Galway; I thought even then that he was playing the hand he was dealt very well. He didn't have a Clifford, O'Shea, Geaney, Brogan, Murphy, Canavan....he adjusted to get the best out of the players he had and to me, he succeeded. Looking at Cork's set-up the last day, they were fearless. Yes, they would retreat into a covering shell without the ball (so do we, and pretty much everybody else as well) but they attacked with speed, ambition, and, dare I say it, real flair. They played great football. Powter for me was the perfect link in attack and instrumental in those goals. I'm less worried about O'Callaghan picking off 2-4 on the overlap, that's a door we have shown we know how to close later on. Cork went with a full hand - if a weakened Kerry had beaten that team, it would have sent an awful message. Instead Cork emerged brimming with confidence. Kerry were bailing water early on. We were

down 3-7 to 0-6 by half-time, at which stage we brought on seven substitutes. The reason I say that Cork wanted to send out a strong message to their own players is because, with the game already wrapped up comfortably, John Cleary only brought on his first substitutes after 50 minutes. Kerry kicked seven late points, but the horse had already bolted from that p[articular stable long before then. No, there's a sense in Cork football after their minor successes, U20 progress, and Corn Uí Mhuirí progress this year that they have been in the doldrums footballwise for long enough. They went tooth and nail here, and it wasn't because of any hunger for a McGrath Cup. That's not the takeaway from this one at all.

Again, not a good display, and still not something I'd worry too much about. Something that would worry me is the loss of Diarmuid O'Connor to injury. David Moran has proven that he is one of the greatest midfielders in the modern game and I know he will be crucial to us later on, but I don't remotely want him coming back straight into a hard training slog with Kerry after just finishing out a great season with Rahillys. Give the man a chance to take some bit of a break. Clare could and should have won this. Sure, they were extremely negative, but they won't be the only team we play this year that will feature that style. They were the better side for the vast majority of it. But with Joe O'Connor already out and a long trip pretty much only a fortnight away....well, Barry Dan, Greg, Barry Mahony....there's a definite place up for grabs if ye want to grab it. Tony Brosnan and Darragh Roche have both made firm statements for the inside forward line, and Micheal Burns and Dara Moynihan have shown that blend of positive aggression and work-rate for the half forwards. Mike Breen has put up a very strong claim for a half back berth, he's looking as good as ever to me. Has anyone else really told Jack O'Connor that they are not so much asking for a starting jersey as demanding one? Not to me. But again, I'd put a lot of that down to the training cycle. We are comparing the starting players on a cold and miserable January (because let's face it, we don't exactly get tropical Januaries, do we?) to the memory of the likes of Graham O'Sullivan and Gavin White in full flight on summer ground. I'm not sure that the comparison is fair.

But it is far to point out that scoring three points in the first half isn't what we were hoping for either

That's not to take away from Colm Collins or Clare. That's a Division two team, the same as Cork, Dublin, and Kildare. Yes, they'll probably struggle without the remarkable David Tubridy (a player who deserved more credit than he ever got). But Keelan Sexton is now fulfilling the potential that he showed as a minor (he was on the Clare senior panel as a Leaving Cert.) and the likes of Cian O'Dea, Jamie Malone, and Podge Collins would walk onto any team out there. Clare will be very disappointed at letting this one slip. In fairness, iot wasn't that they dropped in intensity. It's just that we had triggermen when it really came down to it, especially Tony Brosnan. That was a serious winner by Darragh Roche as well; Clare were very quick to close down both space and time but Darragh Was composed enough. It was an element of playing a 'get out of jail free' monopoly card in a way, but it was about composure at crunch time, and that's a very different thing to mere luck.

GOOD EFFORT BY KERRY HURLERS MUNSTER SENIOR HURLING

League: Cork 2-30 Kerry 2-17

The hurlers went down to Cork within 24 hours of the footballers' defeat to the same opposition, but this was a completely different type of display. The hurlers were far, far sharper and obviously have hard work put in already. The fact that Stephen Molomphy had a strong team out is a great sign to me; it implies a certain

amount of hunger and ambition. That said, it's very early days and I imagine Cork were keeping a bit of powder dry – they'll certainly know that they will need to be physically stronger and sharper, especially in their speed of transition. Quite simply, Kerry were able to get in among them, not least because Kerry's touches were good. There were a few things I was curious about. Mikey Boyle was a feared full forward in his early days, moved out to the forty, went back to centre back three years ago (much to my consternation – but his physicality worked there and his long range homing missiles were a powerful weapon. Now he's in at full back, with Seán Weir having more freedom to use his speed from the half back line, and Mikev is as sharp and durable as ever. His brother is no revelation at full forward, we all know what Podge can do at this stage. Shane Conway on the wing really worked for me, I thought he was isolated last year in the corner. Daniel Collins played there against Cork, and arguably more conventionally than I personally would prefer again, Daniel is very accurate from long range. He started as a centre back and I always prefer him there, despite his shooting stardom with Kilmoyley.

Kerry made a poor enough start after Shane Copnway's opening point. There were a few signs of rust (nothing wrong with that at all) and Cork were gradually and effectively picking off neat scores. It took twenty minutes before Kerry got their second point of the game and I was beginning to really fear a collapse - Cork could have gone hunting goals if they had really wanted to and John B Halloran had to deny Shane Kingston with a great save.. By half-time it was a twelve point deficit, 1-16 to 0-7, and Cork having the breeze wasn't the only factor. But Kerry showed an awful lot more griot and steel. Podge Boyle's first goal had a strong element of luck about it, one of those awkward long range frees that he hits so well, and Cork won't be happy at their failure to deal with it, but Kerry got enough bodies inside to compete for it that in a very real sense they forced their own luck., His second was trademark, a good ball in and a great finish. I grew up in an era when Cork would dispose of Kerry by twenty point margins at their ease; we always had heart and battlers but just not enough quick hurlers. We aren't up to Cork's standard yet, not when the chips are really down (we were annually hammered at minor and U20 in Munster A competitions and a bit too good for B level) and Cork themselves won't be in the closing stages against the sheer physical power of the likes of Limerick and Galway. But this was a very decent showing by Kerry, and I came away feeling much more confident that I had entered.

Last year Kilmacud Crokes were denied an All Ireland in the cruellest possible fashion. This year they have been favourites from a very long way out, especially with the addition of Galway's All Ireland superstar Shane Walsh to their ranks. Facing them were Kerry senior club champions Kerins O;'Rahillys, who were given odds of 14-1 against by some bookies. That was a little bit ridiculous. I know that Kilmacud are a very good team, I did expect them to win, but Rahillys were there for a reason.

They didn't get over the line, and that's fair enough. They can honestly feel that they gave it everything, and by God but they did rattle a fine team. They could leave Croke Park with their heads high, none more so than David Moran and Tommy Walsh. Both were simply magnificent, genuinely awesome.

David Moran's first great catch set up Barry John Keane for the opening score. Craig Dias went for a goal that was never really on and Shane Horan had another more dangerous effort skim narrowly wide before Cian O'Connor opened Kilmacud's account and Shane Cunningham added another. They did look more dangerous, even if Rahillys were doing well off kick-outs. An industrious Gavin O'Brien won a free neatly picked off by Jack Savage. Dara Mullin put Kilmacud back in front but Tommy Walsh won a free for Jack to level again. Tommy was dangerous every time that the ball was sent into hi9m and in fairness to Kilmacud, they realised fast that they had to put extra cover there. They were finding their feet and choosing better attacking options now, especially with Shane Walsh drifting out as a playmaker. Hugh Kenny, Shane Horan, and Shane Cunningham made it double scores. They could have goaled as well after a good pass by Cunningham to Hugh Kenny, but Shane Foley made a great save (I thought the angle was a bit too tight; he should maybe have settled for a point). I suspect that they might have snatched at a few of those early chances. Kerry clubs are more used to watching games at this level, given our success in the Intermediate and Junior competitions (and I don't deny that our county championship format and the inclusion of divisional teams is an advantage) but it's rarefied atmosphere for a Wexford side. Whatever the reason, Fethard had five decent scoring chances early on....and couldn't raise a single flag. Mark Ryan showed them how it's done with a fine score before his older brother slotted a goal. Mark was breaking forward at every opportunity and quickly added his second point. We are now real players on the world stage (unfortunately, boxing's administration on the world stage means that we won't see them at the next Olympics - no harm, some of those cages needed rattling). Womens' boxing has absolutely thrived since a quiet-spoken Bray girl abandoned playing up front for Ireland's Womens' team and concentrated on her first love.When they talk about Ireland's greatest sportsperson, both Katie and Sonia O'Sullivan must be right at the top of the pile. It sounds like Katie's rematch against Amanda Serrano will go ahead in Croke Park this summer. Frankly, they served up one of the best boxing matches I have ever seen - Serrano is brilliant as well - and that should be unmissable.



The other one I'm watching out for is Kevin Cronin. The affable firefighter is the real deal. Mind you, so is Limerick native Jamie Morrissey, whom he fights on February 4th in Belfast for the BUI light heavyweight title. Like any boxer starting off, Kevin has had to chase fights and there have been some frustrating cancellations - that's the nature of the game - but if he has a belt around his waist, future opponents will be looking for him. The last senior boxing champion I can remember from Kerry was Ballyduff hurler Garry O'Brien back in 2000, and that was amateur. I'd say you are going back to the days of Joe Christle, who trained the likes of Mick Finucane, for Kerry professional champions

RIP PELE

I used to go to a fair few table quizzes. I always enjoyed the camaraderie, and they invariably raised funds for good causes – Cathal Walshe is probably best known for the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle, but that man has done more good around this town than practically anyone else. The St. Pauls quizzes were always great craic.

A regular type of question was real names. Marion Morrison? Nope, not Twink (Adele King), it's John Wayne. Aubrey Graham? Drake. Edward Teach, which sounds remarkably English suburbanite, was the dread pirate Blackbeard. Cristé Colon, amazingly bigoted even by the standards of his era, is celebrated in America every Columbus Day – St. Brendan and Leif Erikson were there well ahead of you, lad. Edson Arantes do Nascimento was an old chestnut, and a very easy one.

Pelé. None of my generation ever saw Pelé play. But we all knew the name. I always assumed that the word had some sort of latin root and was a distant cousin to our own gaelic 'peil'. Apparently not so. It seems that Bilé was his favourite soccer player as a child, and he wanted to be 'Bilé' in childish kickarounds. Like Kerry footballers before him, he played codball - newspaper balled up in twine - on the crowded streets. I have no idea if that's true, it's not like his childhood was recorded for posterity, but only Maradonna, Best, and Garrincha have ever matched him in close ball control, and none had his physical grace. His childhood didn't last too long anyway. He was a senior professional with Santos (he was devoted to the club for most of his playing days) at the age of fifteen. At the time, the best players in the world were South American, and the best league in South America was Brazil. And Pelé? Among a people who know and understand every facet of the game (except, arguably, the financial and political side of it) Pele was immediately recognised as a phenomenon by their standards. He lived up to it at his ease, as well. Within a year, he was a senior international on one of the best teams in the world. In 1958 he scored six goals as Brazil became world champions. In 1962 he was, quite bluntly, kicked out of the world cup - no player, not even Maradonna, got kicked as hard or as often as Pelé; the smiling striker was hard as nails underneath it all. It made no difference - Garrincha, the famous 'little

bird' (he moved awkwardly, like a bird with an injured wing....until he moved faster, slicing in from the wing) led Brazil to the title. In 1966, home team England famously beat Germany in the final. Brazil had been red hot favourites, but selected far too many players, many of them past their best, and played far too many games in the build-up. Frankly, they made a mess of it; they wanted to show how great they could be more than they wanted to actually win any particular game, and were badly caught in the group stage. Both England (who famously eschewed 'fancy dan' wingers) and Germany were far more focussed and pragmatic.

1970. What can be said? In the bygone days when League of Ireland matches could attract a five figure attendance, people were glued to their televisions. To quote Roddy Doyle, "I watched it in black and white (Ireland didn't exactly have a lot of colour televisions in 1970) but I remember it in colour". Mikey Sheehy and Jack O'Shea would take up soccer, and both would be phenomenal. Eoin Liston would become known as the Bomber because of Gerd Muller. Ger O'Keeffe's pace would earn him the nickname 'Gadocha' after the Polish winger. People say now that soccer nearly became the pre-eminent Irish sport after the euphoria of Italia '90, only for the Meath/Dublin saga of 1991 to recapture GAA imaginations. Nonsense, that was never happening, there were no roots or foundation to build on. But it actually could have happened in the early seventies. Television had created a global village and soccer was its universal sport because of Brazil in 1970. Remember that Kerry were a fading force (people didn't realise the potential of young talents like Gormanston Hogan winner Denis Moran, Ballyvourney star Mickey Ned, young Spillane and Páidí following the O'Keeffe's in the Sem, or Deenihan and big Kennelly in North Kerry). Offaly were getting older as well. Dublin? Dublin was very much a soccer town; they were knocked out after just one Leinster game three years in a row. And everyone, absolutely everyone, was glued to a mesmerising Brazil led by the magician that was Pelé. Remember Gordon Banks' save against Pelé? Banks became a legend in that moment. Brazil won 1-0, by the way. Take a look at how many junior soccer clubs were founded in Ireland in the seventies. That was Pelé, and that was Brazil 1970. Had the FAI been competently managed, there was a massive opportunity, but that space was filled by the rise of 'Heffo's Army' in 1974.

Best and Maradonna were famous for dribbling, Diego, the ultimate pibé, could win any match on his own. But Pele, plain and simple, could do it faster over a wider range of ground. His first touch was simply magical, and his second touch invariably took him five yards closer to his goal. His passing, like all of that Brazil team, was instant and unerring. Messi made that space in front of the centre halves his own playground, and every team he has played with has been instructed to supplement his amazing use of that role (famously, Ibrahamovich was reduced to a winger rather than seek his own scores). But Pelé was doing that naturally by the age of seventeen. The difference was his acceleration - he could go from a false ten to an out and out striker in less time that it takes to say it. Genuinely, almost any soccer move that you have heard of – the Cruyff turn, the Rabona, the Elastico, the Panenka, the overhead kick, nutmeg....honestly, Google any one of them and include the word 'Pelé'. They are all there (I did check). He was doing them all, most of them long before they even had names. He was Pelé. He really and truly was that good.

He was the second biggest sporting icon on the whole planet....pretty much ever. Muhammad Ali was first, I don't think that even the most die hard soccer aficionado can argue that Ali's controversial refusal to fight in Vietnam, his adoption of a muslim name and rejection of his slave heritage, his lightning wit and even faster fists...Ali strode the world like a colossus. FOCUS ON EARLY SPRING FLOWERING SHRUBS

as it can give a focal point to any shrubbery all year round with its glossy green plant your Camellia, make sure it is sheltered from cold winds as they can damage the flowering buds, as can frost. When planting your Camellia make sure to mix will tend to root out quicker. Camellias are also ideal for growing in containers. Remember if you are planting your Camellia in the ground, that it might be small initially but most will grow to the size of a small tree, so allow plenty of room around it. There is very little maintenance with Camellias only to prune out old dead wood, clean up old blooms that fall to the ground, and to mulch around the base of plants every spring with some moss peat. 




Her final prayers were broadcast over her Late Husband John Anthony's public address speakers, which were were set up by Timmy and Martin Lucey.
