"I am glad that I received a favourable response from the HSE where they said they would give this request active consideration", the Deputy said.

illarney is bathed in gold following success in the 2023 Super Valu Tidy Towns Awards. Picking up the title of Ireland's Tidiest Large Town is being widely celebrated by everyone in the Ireland's tourism capital.

Continuing the success of Kerry towns over the past 32 years, there was significant success for the county in the National Tidy Towns Awards, which were held in Croke Park on Friday, 6th October.

Ballyduff, who were named best Village and Small Town Category winner in the Climate Action Award category, while Castlegregory were Highly Commended and Sneem were honoured as the South West & Mid West winners in the Small Town Category of the All Ireland Pollinator Plan-Local Authority Pollinator Award. Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr Jim Finucane paid tribute to all of the Tidy Towns Committees across the county and praised their efforts in keeping Kerry clean and green.

"As a county, we pride ourselves on our natural beauty and from North to South and East to West, we have some of the most beautiful scenery in the world," he said. "The work that communities and voluntary organisations do, in collaboration with Kerry County Council in helping to keep our county clean is invaluable and helps us show off the very best of Kerry to our many visitors from all over the world.

KERRY STAR PAUDIE proves a major attraction

brief Taking verv break from Kerry championship senior duties with East Kerry preparations and for the intermediate championship final with Fossa, Paudie Clifford didn't get much time to relax at the opening of a new JD Outlet in Killarney on Saturday morning.

HECTIC SCHEDULE helps counter Croke Park upset

The pressure has been persistent and the physical demands considerable but Paudie Clifford insists that the almost non-stop action he has experienced with Fossa and East Kerry since the All-Ireland final loss to Dublin has one major advantage.

Apart from the already success laden playmaker's hunger to win even more honours, Fossa's run to the Kerry Intermediate Championship final and East Kerry's bid to retain the senior championship crown have helped him to overcome the bitter disappointment experienced with Kerry in Croke Park on the last Sunday in July.

"It has been a long season but it helps to go back to the club and, with so many games to play, it helps to take your mind off the All-Ireland and get over the disappointment," he said.

But he conceded: "It will be a long time – if ever – before we fully forget".

"There have been a huge amount of games at club and district board level but the managers with both East Kerry and Fossa have been very good and there's no problem if you need a night off or anything like that so it hasn't been overly taxing.

"Whether it's training once or twice a week depends on whatever way the body is feeling". Speaking at the official opening of the new JD Outlet in Killarney Outlet Centre, the versatile Fossa man acknowledged the fact that the East Kerry management team has allowed his brother David and himself to sit out the SFC campaign to date, apart from a late cameo appearance against Templenoe in the last round.

With the championship now reaching the business end, however, they are both expected to feature from the start in the quarter-final clash with St Kieran's at Tralee's Austin Stack Park on Saturday next.

"The rest definitely helped. The club matches in the intermediate championship took a lot out of us with five games in quick succession and extra time in a number of them but we're ready now for the senior quarter-final with East Kerry next week," he said.

Clifford said Fossa's ability to drive on and improve significantly from their All-Ireland

Junior Championship win last January, to make an impact at Intermediate level, has been really encouraging but it can only be classed as the highlight of a busy season if they manage to beat Milltown/Castlemaine in the final scheduled for early November.

"We have nothing won yet. It will only matter if we get over the line," he said.

Clifford – who is shortlisted for a third All-Star award this year – insists Fossa's rise to prominence as a force to be reckoned with could never be branded an overnight success as the groundwork was laid some years ago when manager Adrian Sheehan, former Kerry boss Eamonn Fitzmaurice and the other mentors involved put a plan in place.

"The breakthrough last year obviously gave us a lot of confidence. We stayed in a hotel together the night before the semi-final and the final and that helped to bond us together. "You don't always get those opportunities at club level and it really brought us on this year," he said.

"That journey we embarked on last year gave us great confidence and a real bond was formed that has helped us big time this season".

"In addition to that, the lads got a lot stronger due to the strength and conditioning programme put in place by Chris Myers which really gives us the edge".

While he and his Fossa teammates would obviously relish an opportunity to play in the senior championship, against some of the marquee clubs and players in the county, the swashbuckling centre forward said it is too premature to even think about that as they must concentrate on the task at hand.

"We have to try to get through Milltown/ Castlemaine in the final and we'll analyse where we're at the end of the year. If it's senior or it's intermediate again we'll build towards that."

The three different managers Clifford plays under, with Kerry, East Kerry and Fossa, all have different expectations of the strong-running, no nonsense playmaker but rather than being confused by different tactical approaches and allotted responsibilities, it is something he really cherishes.

"I love having the opportunity of playing under three top class managers. They are all great man-managers and that helps big time. I get on very well with all three of them and that's important".

Prior to that intermediate championship showdown with Milltown/Castlemaine, there's the small matter of the senior championship to tend to and, despite being raging favourites to retain the Bishop Moynihan Cup, Clifford knows the other seven teams remaining would love nothing more than to crush East Kerry aspirations of another title.

District Board manager, Jerry O'Sullivan, has had to plan without the influential services of the Rathmore contingent who have since pulled up their own chairs to the top table but the squad is certainly not short of quality with the battle for places on the first fifteen quite intense and that can be seen in the no compromise training sessions.

"It's a challenge losing top class players but you just have to get on with it. It's all about adjusting at the start of the campaign and, as it happens, Jerry and the lads have a very strong squad again this year," he said.

Away from his own involvement, Paudie has watched several county championship games on Clubber and he was impressed by what he saw when he tuned in to watch next weekend's opponents St Kieran's in action.

"We've done a decent job so far but they are a good side and they will provide a bigger test. There's a lot of shadow boxing going on in the group stages so it will get more intense now that it's knockout," he said.

The 2022 All-Ireland winner reckons Kerry boss Jack O'Connor will be keeping a very close eye on the latter stages of the championship in the hope of unearthing a new player or two who could give an extra edge on the inter-county scene.

"This is probably the time for players to stand up," he remarked.

A big fan of the split season, Clifford said it allows players to put everything into the intercounty season and to do the same, later in the year, at club level rather than having to mix both.

More balance needed in Kerry politicians stance Middle the on East?

Though far from the seat of Irish power, it seems we are never far from international Pa Daly affairs in Kerry. Tralee in



2019 became the first town in the whole of Ireland to twin with a Palestinian town.

A memorandum of understanding allowing the twinning with Beit Sahour to go ahead was signed in March 2019 in Tralee, with the mayor of the West Bank, mostly Christian town near Bethlehem and the Palestinian ambassador to Ireland both present.

The now Sinn Fein party justice spokesman Pa Daly was behind the twinning. Pa refused to condemn the Hamas attack on Israel this weekend, telling me he will not get into 'the politics of condemnation'. But there is no justification for the killing of civilians, by either side, he also said.

There hasn't been much cultural exchange activity since the twinning, I am told. But our Kerry TD has raised the annexation of further lands by Israel around Beit Sahour in the Dail, asking for diplomatic intervention by the Irish Government, after a plea by the Palestinian mayor.

Some Kerry politicians seem to have extraordinary interest in Palestine.

In 2017 a move by Sinn Féin to fly the Palestinian flag over county buildings failed and two Sinn Fein councillors walked out. There was the attempt to run the blockade

of Gaza by Kenmare Fianna Fail Senator Mark Daly in 2010 as part of the free Gaza Flotilla.

What am I missing here? Hamas which controls Gaza - it was elected in 2006 - has a stated aim of annihilating Israel. Yes, there were strong links between Yasser Arafat's PLO and the IRA. But treating with Isis-like Hamas? The attack and the sheer brutality of their actions on Saturday might lead us to sit up and think there are two sides to the story in Palestine/ Israel. And we may wish to reflect and update our attitude. Someone somewhere must surely ask how much a missile and a hang glider and a rocket costs thousands of missiles are being fired off each night from a Gaza that can't afford hospitals and schools while getting hundreds of millions in Irish and international aid.

Perhaps the barbaric events in southern Israel, and the existentialist threat to the State of Israel last weekend will give us pause for more sober reflection. We seem to be feeding off only one side of the 'humanitarian' story. Is it time for a motion to twin with a southern Israeli town in the interests of balance and greater understanding? Maybe Killarnev councillors who are overwhelmingly elected as independents would consider this.

Commercial contracts for Ukrainians being refused on foot of Kerry County Council intervention.

Killarney and south Kerry are 'at capacity' when it comes hosting further commercial numbers of Ukrainian Refugees, Kerry County Council has advised IPAS, the international protection accommodation

service of the Department of Children.. New intake in south Kerry should be limited to existing centres where there are vacancies, the council has told them..

Applications by a number of hotels and large houses seeking to host numbers of Ukrainians for the winter period in and around Killarney have been declined by IPAS in recent weeks.

South and including a line between Rathmore, Killarney and Killorglin is 'at capacity' and does not have the services to accommodate further commercial contracts (commercial contracts involve a minimum of 15 beds), Eamon Scanlon, the senior engineer in charge of the special unit responding to the Ukrainian crisis in Kerry, said.

There are not enough services 'to enable proper integration' of further numbers,

The council is a lead partner in the community response forum for refugees, made up of the council, the HSE, partnership and development bodies, integration agencies and the Kerry Education and Training Board and others.

Primary, secondary schools, and GP services now at their limit, in Killarney and south Kerry. The council is conscious and is concerned about ensuring there is not 'displacement' of locals when it comes to access to GP, health and other services, Mr Scanlon also said.

Numbers of refugees in Kerry are likely to be 9,000 and more, hundreds more than official figures, the council also believes.

'The Department does take the views of the local authority into account when making a final decision on whether to contract for a property, ' it said.

Congratulations Rob and Laura!



This is the only service of its kind in the country, and it is funded entirely from public donations.

The IMNDA is calling on all communities across Ireland to get walking this October, whether going solo or joining family, friends or neighbours to continue what Fr Tony started six years ago.

You can be forgiven thinking that the majority of this is used for domestic purposes like drinking, washing, cooking and flushing the toilet, but a large portion of it is used on site to carry out life changing medical procedures like dialysis, surgery and oncology.

As part of the pilot project, hospitals in Cavan, Louth, Tullamore and Kerry will go through a programme that will support acute hospital facilities with strategic water risk resilience and management training across the four pillars of Water Stewardship; quantity, quality, environment and governance, to enable these facilities reduce water consumption on-site and mitigate against critical waterrelated risks.

In addition to the core water efficiency and monitoring regimes and identifying areas where "quick wins" can be

HIGH DROP-OUT RATES OF 1ST YEAR STUDENTS FROM 3RD LEVEL COURSES ARE A CAUSE FOR CONCERN



DATA

Recently published data by the Higher Education Authority (HEA) has revealed that non-progression rates for first year college students into second year has climbed to a national average of 12% or just over 5,000 students. The figures, which cover the 2020/2021 academic year are up from about 3,600 students or 9% from the 2019/2020 academic year. All third level colleges recorded an increase in the non-progression rates from first year to second year although the patterns differed. More male students than female students did not progress to second year on a ratio of 3 to 2. The non-progression rates were highest in institutes of technology and technological universities.

ONE IN FIVE

More than one in five students or 21% didn't make it to second year in both South East Technological University (SETU) and Dundalk Institute of Technology (DIT). The Royal College of Surgeons (RCSI) at 3% had the lowest nonprogression rate in the CAO system. RCSI was closely followed by Dublin City University (DCU), Limerick's Mary Immaculate College of Education (MICE) and St. Angela's College, Sligo, all of whom had a drop-out rate of 6%. LOCATIONS

As regards the Munster based third level colleges which are popular locations for Kerry's CAO applicants, University College Cork (UCC) had a non-progression rate of 8%, University of Limerick (UL) had a non-progression rate of 10%, while Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) and Munster Technological University (MTU) each had a drop-out rate of 17% or one student in every six.

REASONS

There are many reasons why first year students drop-out of their courses. The much higher drop-out rates in the new technology universities, ranging from 21% to 17%, compared to the much lower non-progression rates of 12% to 6% in the long-established universities, namely University College Cork

(UCC), University of Limerick (UL), University of Galway (UG), Trinity College Dublin (TCD), Dublin City University (DCU), University College Dublin (UCD), Maynooth University (MU) is worth analysis.

PERFECT STORM

It's also worth remembering that the HEA data reflets the perfect storm of the devastating covid pandemic years and the very limited access by freshers to in-person student supports. Pandemic-related disruption and online learning led to a surge in isolation, loneliness and disconnection among first year students. Many freshers didn't fell any sense of belonging to a college and had difficulty in engaging with a totally unfamiliar teaching style.

CHALLENGE

The return of in-person exams during 2020/21 was also a big challenge for many students. Back in 2020, CAO allocated college places on the basis of predicted grades rather than the traditional Leaving Cert exam. The 2020 Leaving Cert Class didn't have the exam experience of study management nor the level of discipline required for a traditional exam.

COMPARISON

The higher dropout rated in technological universities compared to the traditional universities is surely down to the fact that they offer courses at Level 6 (Higher Certificates), Level 7 (Ordinary Bachelor Degrees) and Level 8 (Honours Bachelor Degrees) whereas the traditional universities offer entry at Level 8, thereby attracting students at higher points levels. The technological universities have a remit to enrol students at all three levels so their points range is much broader than the traditional universities. The technological universities have a much greater regional intake and also serve the needs of students in some of the most disadvantaged regions of the country.

INFLATED

There is also anecdotal evidence that inflated grades led to students securing courses that

they wouldn't normally have qualified for. The level of difficulty of the course content led to a substantial number of them to drop-out and to reapply again in the following academic year. **BELIEF**

While data for the 2021/22 year has yet to be published, it is widely believed that dropout rates crept up to or beyond pre-pandemic levels. This was despite a return to more in-person classes and less remote teaching. Nonetheless, many students continue to struggle because of accommodation difficulties and long tedious daily commutes.





and floods for three years. He is now working with 400 volunteers to oversee the earthquake response for the Jesuit Refugee Service in Syria. The webinar will be held at 7.30pm on Thursday 19th October at 7.30pm.

The aim of the webinar is to promote awareness, deepen our understanding and spread the message of Mission Sunday, as we support those who dedicate their lives as overseas missionaries. All are invited to participate. Missio coordinates activities in relation to Missions worldwide. Missio Ireland is the Irish branch of the Pontifical Mission Societies. They are the Pope's official charity for overseas mission. Wherever the Church is present, Missio is there, meaning they reach out across five continents to support over 1,100 mission dioceses. Each Missio is headed by a National Director, appointed by the Pope. www.missio. ie. Our webinar is timed to take place just before Mission Sunday when prayers are said, and a collection is taken up in all parishes for overseas mission. The funds collected are, in essence, a solidarity fund to enable missionaries, often in remote areas devastated by conflict or climate change, to continue their dedicated work.

The participants were invited to bring their stories to completion and submit them to a 500-word fiction competition. The winners attended a prize-giving last weekend.







EXHIBITION OF KILCUMMIN CHILDREN'S ARTWORK marks final event of Pride in our Peatlands project








YOUR BROWS SHAPE YOUR FACE!

WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?

As well as an eye health check, a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

Glaucoma

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise.

Diabetic retinopathy



LAKERS SCOTTS LAKERS ST PAULS 98 LIMERICK SPORT EAGLES 89

A power packed fourth quarter display gave Scotts Lakers their opening win in this season's InsureMyVan.ie Men's Basketball League as they brought the high flying Limerick Sport Eagles back down to earth. The Eagles came to Killarney in great form, no doubt bolstered by their own monumental finish against the Galway Titans. Central to that was their American duo of Da Kquan Davis and Keelin Coats who combined for 68 points in that win but tonight it was their turn to feel the heat in the final period as the Lakers hit a match winning 32 points in the last ten minutes. The game had been delicately poised at the three quarter stage, 66-63 to the Lakers, but a real concerted push by the entire squad saw them seal the points.

But that's what Coach Brian Clarke, who has seen and done it all himself, will be drumming into his young side. It takes a full squad effort to win at this level and provided the commitment to train and perfect your skills is present, then anything is possible for the promising group. He will be at pains to emphasise this at training during the week as the Lakers look to the visit of the Galways Titans at the weekend.

The final flourish was started by captain Paul Clarke, who had the key to the Limerick back door all evening, as he pushed the Lakers 68-63 clear. Terion Moss went 1/2 from the line. then added a basket before Jack O Sullivan hit a three and all of a sudden the Lakers led by 10, 74-64. O Sullivan was particularly influential in the final guarter, scoring freely but also bursting a gut in defence . Braden Bell, now fully recovered from a bad fall in the opening half, and Moss helped to make 87 -70 before Limerick fought back through the aforementioned Davies and Coats, They helped to cut the gap to 11, 89-78 but a couple of well timed baskets from Mark Sheehan helped to steady the ship again. Moss and Bell helped to steer the ship home and put the seal on a 98-89 win.

It was the steadiness of the Lakers performance in the other quarters that lay the foundation for the win. Jamie O Sullivan opened the scoring and with Paul Clarke being picked out regularly at the back door, Moss and Bell getting their mojo going it was the Lakers who led 21-17 at quarters end. Davies and Coats were doing their bit to give the Eagles lift off and they got good support from Nik Ivkovic and Reece Barry. Ignacho Folgueiras was being used as a pivot for the Eagles offence and alongside Ivkovic he drew the visitors level early in the second. Ronan Collins and Jack O Sullivan both hit threes as the Lakers forged ahead but seemed to lose a bit of momentum following a foul on Bell. Bell was driving for the basket, got tackled in mid air, landing awkwardly and visibly shaken. The resultant intentional foul call yielded points but Limerick pounced on Bell's temporary absence to seize control. Bell returned to hit the Lakers final basket of the half, closing the Eagles lead to one, 41-40.

One could sense a slight shift in momentum in the third quarter, likely triggered by Jamie O Sullivans determined efforts. He hit some big scores in the guarter as the Eagles turned to Reece Barry and the towering Ronan Cregan. He was starting to be a handful for the Lakers defence but crucially Paul Clarke was still popping up on the blindside for pivotal scores. Moss was also superb in this quarter, his ball handling defying logic at times and when he moved the ball at speed the Lakers looked a different side. Ronan Collins gave the Lakers a bit of extra breathing space with a basket to make it 66-63, setting the scene for that impressive finale.

So the Lakers grab their maiden win in the League but Coach Clarke will be keen to impress on his young squad that a journey of a thousand miles begins with one step.

For the Lakers Braden Bell had a triple double hitting 27 points, grabbin 20 rebounds and having 11 assists, Terion Moss had 25, Paul Clarke 17, Jack O Sullivan 13, Ronan Collins 6, Jamie O Sullivan 6, Mark Sheehan 4, Oisin Spring, Chris Healy.

Keelan Coat had a game high 32 points, Da Kquan Davis 26, Nik Ivkovic 9, Ronan Cregan 6, Reece Barry 6.

Assuming there is a clean bill of health following this game the Lakers should be further boosted by the return of Eoin Carroll who missed this win. Long term absentee David Gleeson is also inching closer to fitness but on the negative side Mark O Shea picked up an injury on GAA duty and he will probably spend another period on the sidelines. They are at home again next weekend when the Galway Titans travel down from the West. The Titans are making a return to the National League stage after a brief sabbatical and there will be a familiar face behind the scenes for them. Joe Coughlan is a regular visitor to Killarney for many years and coached St Pauls in the mid 90s. Previous to that in the 80s he spent a year as a novice in the Friary and played with the club. Joe's sons Eoin and Joseph are mainstays of the current Titans squad who are searching for their first win in the league. But they have been ultra competitive in their games with Limerick Sport Eagles and Moy Tolka Rovers with Deontae Robertson,

Jackson Soper, Viktor Tashev and Samuel Mensah scoring freely. At the time of writing the game is fixed for 7.30pm in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre on Saturday evening but the Club is conscious of the big rugby clash between New Zealand and Ireland. Attempts are being made to find a solution suitable to everyone and the advice is to keep an eye on the Club social channels and Radio Kerry for possible updates.

This Saturdays game vs Galway Titans will now tip off at 6.10pm this Saturday October 14th in the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre, to facilitate those who wish to watch the Rugby.



Kelly applauds move to end hidden baggage fees for air passengers

European Parliament bid to eliminate hidden baggage fees imposed on air passengers. Mr Kelly voted in favour of a new parliamentary resolution adopted in Strasbourg this week, which reflects the strong concerns of citizens who have long struggled with inconsistent rules on airline carry-on luggage and the hidden costs that can significantly impact the final flight fare.

The resolution urges the European Commission to present concrete policy measures against hand luggage price supplements and define the scope and specific requirements for "reasonable" carry-on baggage weights and dimensions. "This will contribute to simplifying the booking process and making it easier for people to compare prices without the uncertainty of additional hidden costs", Kelly said.

"Revisions to the existing EU legislation on air passenger rights are necessary to better protect consumers. The European Court of Justice (ECJ) has ruled that airlines should not charge extra fees for hand luggage that meets reasonable requirements and safety standards. MEPs have called on the European Commission to fully implement this ruling, and with the ECJ we obviously have a strong legal basis to expect swift action", Kelly continued.

One of the key objectives of these reforms is to regulate the composition of the final ticket price, ensuring that hidden fees do not catch passengers by surprise. In addition to these changes, MEPs have urged EU member states



to ensure the enforcement of the ruling and called for the disclosure of hand luggage fees when providing fare information and schedules, enhancing consumer protection.

"With hidden fees and varying airline policies on hand luggage, comparing flight prices has been a challenging task for passengers. Transparency in pricing not only benefits consumers but also strengthens the aviation industry in the long run by fostering trust in fair and consistent pricing", MEP Kelly added.

MINISTER NEEDS TO STEP UP TO THE MARK

The Minister for Transport, Green Party TD and leader Eamon Ryan, appears to have disowned all and any responsibility for the improvement and maintenance of regional, local and private roads, in a recent reply to a request to meet with members of Kerry County Council by Fianna Fáil's Michael Cahill.

A letter from Minister Ryan's Private Secretary states that "The improvement and maintenance of regional and local roads which have been taken in charge is the statutory responsibility of each local authority, in accordance with the provisions of Section 13 of the Roads Act 1993. Works on those roads are funded from Local Authorities' own resources supplemented by State Road grants. The initial selection and prioritisation of works to be funded is a matter for the local authority.

The maintenance of roads not taken in charge by Local Authorities is the responsibility of the relevant land owners."

"How can any Senior Government Minister make such a claim? All these landowners pay Road Tax, they pay their Local Property Tax and they pay all their other Taxes" stated an angry Councillor Cahill.

Councillor Cahill says that he is appalled at the manner in which the Green Party Minister has responded to his request for a meeting on this extremely important issue of local, regional and private roads, which should be of extraordinary special interest to the Department of Transport.

"Appalled is an understatement. This Minister has refused to meet the Elected Members of Kerry County Council, to discuss the shocking state of

some of our local roads, where citizens of this country have extremely poor or no access to their homes and properties from the public road, including no access for emergency vehicles" stated Councillor Cahill.

"As I have stated previously, there are people living on these roads in certain areas of our county who require lifesaving drugs. It will take up to 40 years to repair these roads at our present rate of funding. The estimated cost of doing all the roads on the Priority List is at least \in 50 million. All the Minister can say is that maintenance of roads not taken in charge is the responsibility of



the landowners. This is not good enough from a Government Minister and I will be taking this further, through my own party Fianna Fáil, a party in Government with the Greens and with a further Motion before Kerry County Council" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"Who else but the Minister for Transport should have overall responsibility for the maintenance and repair of all our roads and I am determined that he will understand and deliver on that. The Minister needs to step up to the mark" added Councillor Cahill.

Danny Healy Rae TD on Budget 24

The carbon tax is totally and absolutely unfair. We have been against it from day one. It will hurt the people who are going to work. It will hurt the people who are taking children to school. It will hurt all those in the transport business. It will hurt those in the agricultural contracting business. It will hurt farmers. It will make life more miserable for all these people.

On agriculture, we got 17 lines in 64 pages from the two Ministers today. Farmers are being vilified and terrorised every day. Why is the Government treating the farmers like this? I am asking the Government to provide a minor injuries unit in Killarney and a separate one in Tralee to help to reduce the waiting times in the accident and emergency department in University Hospital Kerry. Our disability services are severely lacking and the people who operate those services, many of them section 39 workers, are not adequately paid. Residential care is practically non-existent.





Even so, the sheer consistency of Eoin Brosnan in the dominant team of the era definitely makes him an obvious choice.

7. Paul Murphy, East Kerry, Shane Myers, Dr. Crokes, Gavin White, Dr Crokes

Paul Murphy was famously overlooked by the Kerry minors. It's the last time anyone made that mistake. He doesn't court headlines but I've almost never seen him make even the slightest mistake.

8. Bryan Sheehan, South Kerry, Ambrose O'Donovan Jnr., Dr Crokes, Darragh Ó Sé, An Ghaeltacht.

9. Johnny Buckley, Dr. Crokes, Mike Burke, Mid Kerry, David Moran, Kerins O'Rahilly's

I know nothing about the judging, but I assume that any team that doesn't have Bryan Sheehan's name down is simply thrown out. It's certainly what I would do. Likewise, I consider Johnny Buckley to be a major heartbeat of a great Crokes' side.

10. Denis O'Dwyer, South Kerry, Kieran O'Leary, Dr. Crokes, Darran O'Sullivan, Mid Kerry

No Philip O'Connor of St. Kierans or Seán Bán from Mid Kerry? I wouldn't have Kieran O'Leary outside of the full forward line; he was deadly close to goal. I'd give Darran the nod of the three named.

11. Declan O'Sullivan, South Kerry, Paudie Clifford, East Kerry, Mikey Geaney, Dingle

Declan. Let's not even pretend to have a debate about it. It's Declan. Paudie and Mikey are dynamos but Declan was an all-time great.

12. Brian Looney, Dr. Crokes, Aodán Mac Gearailt, An Ghaeltacht, Donnchadh Walsh, Mid Kerry

I always had great admiration for Donnchadh and Aodán, but I'd let you debate Declan O'Sullivan's place on the team before Brian Looney's. That's how sure I am of this one.

13. David Clifford, East Kerry, Colm Cooper, Dr. Crokes, Gavan O'Grady, Mid Kerry

I think Gavan will admit himself that even

he – and make no mistake, that is a brilliant footballer in his own right – is outclassed in this company. Right now I think the Ardshan phenomenon takes it, not just for the scores he took or the medals he won, but the sheerr artistry with which he won them. We'll revisit that one in a couple of years.

14. Kieran Donaghy, Austin Stacks, Dara Ó Cinnéide, An Ghaeltacht, Darragh Roche, East Kerry

RUGBY

World Cup: Ireland 36 Scotland 14

There was a bit of tension in the build-up to this one, with an understandable Scottish defiance of their underdogs tag, however warranted, and endless assessment of all the permutations. A much improved Scotland were being written off and Ireland bestowed with the burden of a heavy favourites tag.. I was guilty of it myself, and I make no apologies. The simple fact is that while Scotland have lifted their game considerably, they are somewhat limited and rely on the mercurial genius of Finn Russell for most of their creativity. Of course Ireland were hot favourites for this one. Any other pre-game assessment makes no sense. They still had to do the business, though.

And they very much did. Less than a minute had elapsed when Sexton opened up space, Ringrose skipped around two nowhere tackles, and the transfer to Hansen and on to James Lowe to pounce over the line was an inevitability from there. Johnny narrowly missed the conversion, but Ireland were already 5-0 up and looking superior.

In fairness to Scotland, they came hunting, with Russell kicking to the corner when he could

have taken the points on offer. Right thing to so? Absolutely, go big or you are going home. That it didn't work out was done to absolutely rock solid Irish defending, real bodies on the line stuff. Scotland had the vast bulk of territory and possession, but just couldn't not find any space for scores. Ireland showed them how it's done after a great kick by Lowe put Scotland on the back foot and Mack Hansen was just stopped within inches of the line.

In the 25th minute Ireland struck for another try, and again it was executed in textbook fashion, luring the defenders and spreading wider until Hugo Keenan had the space to dart in and finish. Johnny Sexton converted and Ireland were 12-0 ahead. The third try was just six minutes later, and it was all about power rather than finesse as Ireland simply force their way through. Scotland just couldn't go head to head with the likes of Porter or Doris or Henderson, who finished it off, without paying a price. Sexton again picked up the bonus points.

Just before half-time, Ireland were in for a fourth time. This is a little bit unfair on Scotland, who were actually playing quite well but just not able to show it on the scoreboard. That said, they were badly caught here, with Mack Hansen getting far too much time and space to get over. 26-0 and bonus point secured. Even if Scotland were come back to win and secure a bonus point themselves (and let's not really pretend that a dominant Ireland were going to cough up four tries to Scotland in the next forty minutes), at absolute worst we would have been in a three way tie decided by scoring difference - an appalling notion given the disparity in teams in this competition. Too many developing nations have been slaughtered on the scoreboard already; I'd hate to see that incentivised.

Scotland were hurting, and let Ireland know it very early in the second half. Not in a good way. Look, various commentators have talked about this being 'part of the game' and 'they are men'. What it actually was is bloody stupid. Ireland met them in the pushing and jerseypulling. Jersey-pulling. Let's actually stop and think about this. "I'm not going to throw punch because I would get in trouble, so I'll just pull his jersey"? Seriously, who are you kidding? Ireland were the team who are 26-0 up; they can have this conversation all day. Kill as much of the clock as you want. Pull my jersey a bit more.

Dan Sheehan got pushed over the boarding by Schoeman in what I will kindly describe as a 'scuffle'. Two minutes later Sheehan showed the perfect response, gathering from Gibson Park (who had a stormer in an unorthodox winger role) and going over. Sexton missed the conversion, but his job was done and he went off, with Jack Crowley coming on to see out the game. In fact, Andy Farrell started running his bench, taking off the big guns – they'll all be needed fresh and ready against the All Blacks.

Crowley showed a deft touch at controlling game play himself, spraying a lovely ball out wide for Garry Ringrose has all day to finish. The conversion hit the post but at 36-0, nobody was overly bothered by that one. Scotland finally got on the scoreboard in the 67th minute, Finn Russell doing really well to carve out a chance before spreading it wide to Ewan Ashman and then converting. Nicely done, but way too late to make any real difference. A minute late Ali Price gets in and Russell converts again, but it's worth mentioning that Ireland are less urgent now and have taken off the likes of Sexton, Furlong, Beirne, O'Mahony, Sheehan and Porter. Those concessions won't keep the Irish management awake at night.

Next up is New Zealand. I think we all kind of saw that one coming after their opening defeat to hosts France. Ireland are coming into this one on a high and have handed the All Blacks a few tough lessons in their recent encounters. We will be favourites on paper but I don't know. Ireland's failure to get pasta guarter-final is a bit of a monkey on their backs at this stage and the All Blacks....well, the aura of invincibility may be gone, but take another look at that France New Zealand game. I'm not so sure we would have been coming out of that one with a win. It may be superstition on my part, but the All Blacks are a very different animal when the chips are down. We are good, very good, but I'm yet to be convinced that we are good enough for this one.

ROWING

The golden girl of Kerry's golden generation of rowers has done it again. Monika Dukarska of Killorglin RC returns from the World Coastal Rowing Championships in Baressi, Italy, with another gold medal held aloft. Monika took command of the Womens' Solo from the off, leading at the first buoy and controlling the waves perfectly to steer home with 30 metres to spare over Azerbaijan's Diana Dymchenko. This is her third world title in the event, having also won gold in 2009 and 2016. Coastal rowing is growing hugely in popularity and is set to become an Olympic event in Los Angeles in 2028.

GYMNASTICS

Ireland doesn't exactly have a strong history in gymnastics. It just happens to have one of the best gymnasts in the world right now in a sport that is growing hugely in popularity, especially for children. Ards native Rhys McClenaghan defied all the odds last year to win the world title on the pommel in the World Championships in Liverpool last year and repeated the feat in Antwerp this time around to retain it. It also comes with the bonus of automatic qualification for his second Olympics. With two world titles, two Europeans, and a Commonwealth Games gold, McClenaghan has firmly established himself as one of the top atghletes in the country.

SOCCER

Another good display, but another night of coming away frokm Mounthawk Park emptyhanded as Wexford clinched the victory that guaranteed them a play-off spot for promotion. The visitors started in style, with Reece Webb evading Seán O'Connell to latch onto a nicely

weighted pass from Darragh Levinston and sending a stinging effort well beyond the hapless keeper. Great strike and a deserved goal.

The early days when that would leave Kerry reeling are long gone, and in fact it was Billy Dennehy's side who went on the attack. Man of the match Ethan Kos teed up a lively Seán McGrath but his effort curled wide. Kos, an absolute rock in our defence, was imperious, sending a perfect long ball to Ryan Kelliher. He got a bit lucky when the defender slipped, but Kelliher was sharp enough to pounce instantly on the gap and drive it past the keeper. Both sides played at a high tempo up til half-time but without really penetrating for goal chances. Both sides looked dangerous on the restart, with Wexford having the best chance from a free kick just inside the D. Not a bad effort at all, but it went the wrong side of the post. In trutgh, Wexford looked more likely to score and probably edged the possession stakes, and they finally made it county twenty minutes into the half. Unfortunately, it was the kind of goal that Kerry are all too familiar with conceding. A free kick floated into the back post, an attacker getting too much time on his header to nod it down and Oluwa to fire home from close range. Kerry have had a real problem with that kind of ball in all season and it just doesn't seem to be getting better. Wexford were the better side from there on, although Kerry did manage a few late half-chances.







FOCUS ON **DIVIDING HERBACEOUS** PERENNIALS

If you divide your herbaceous Perennials regularly it will ensure healthy, vigorous plants that will look good and should perform year after year. It also gives you the opportunity to multiply your plants.

Every two to three years should be enough to divide most perennials to maintain good vigor and healthy plants but if you want to divide them for the purpose of propagation, it can be done more regularly.

The best time to divide herbaceous Perennials is when the plants are dormant, so anytime from November to mid March.

A lot of spring flowering plants such as Irises, are best divided in summer after flowering when they produce new shoots.

When you have divided your plant and you have either planted some in the border or in pots, remember to keep well watered until established.

A Word of Victory


Welcome back dear student, God promises His people "...as a mother comforts her child so will I comfort you... but the Lord's fury will be shown to His enemies" (Isaiah 66:10-16). 
