RELIEF AS UKRAINIAN RESIDENTS CAN STAY IN KILLARNEY

here was a huge sense of businesses. relief for the Ukrainian residents at Hotel Killarney when the news broke that the government had decided to reverse the decision that they were moving 135 mostly women and children from their new home in Killarney to Westport to facilitate the arrival of 200 male asylumseekers from City West in Dublin.

The residents received notification on Monday at 3pm that they were to move to Co. Mayo in 48 hours and were distraught with the news.

There was widespread outrage at the announcement with Mayor of Killarney Niall Kelleher calling for an immediate reversal.

Families staying at the hotel have integrated into life in Killarney, with the children attending school and many of the women working locally in the hotel and in town centre

Cllr. Kelleher was joined by other communithy leaders including principals of the local schools where the children attend, with Principal of St.Oliver's National School, Colm O'Suilleabhain saying that the move was "wholly unjust".

The families were the some of the first to arrive from Ukraine and huge work has gone into welcoming them and helping them to integrate into school life in Killarnev.

"We have already made friends here, not just in the work and at the school but with lots of Irish people", one of the residents said on the RTE News on Tuesday night.

On Wednesday morning the government reversed the decision much to the delight of the residents and all those who worked so hard to keep the new Killarney families in their new home.

Hotel Killarney where residents were told this week that they could stay after a decision to move them to Westport was reversed.

THE RUT IS ON

Hundreds of snappers have gathered in Killarney to watch the deer rut in what is now a great mini-festival each year in the shoulder season.

Dozens of people these days occupy slots in front of the entrance to Muckross House, the Mangerton Road, the foot of Mangerton and of course Cotter's field in the Demesne. Long time promoter of the rut and great friend of Killarney Damien Hannigan of the Irish Deer Commission has led small sunrise walks from the Lake Hotel.

Of the larger rut watch last Sunday, Damien said he has never had so much interest and had to turn away hundreds in the online registration this year.

People arrived from Meath, Galway and Co. Mayo. Those lucky enough to be included got a front seat while two big stags fought in the Demesne. "The weather was too warm last year and the stags were subdued," Damien remarked of the fight.

Everyone was well beyond the 150 meter minimum safe distance for deer watching and long-lensed photographers got some great shots.

Meanwhile, Countrywide with Damien O'Reilly on RTE Radio One will feature the Killarney rut this Saturday with some great interviews with Damien and Peter O'Toole whose pic of the Grand Master last year went viral. The 21-point Grand Master has not appeared so far in this year's rut but he was spotted in the off-season "hale and hearty", this column understands. A number of events are planned too by the wildlife rangers attached to the park.

The rut and the stags roar will be heard until late October or early November so there is plenty of time yet to see Killarney at its mightiest.

KILLARNEY STANDS UP

There are huge kudos for this town in standing up to the "brutal" and "inhumane" removal of women and children from schools, businesses and the friends they have made in Killarney with just hours notice.

When Killarney wants to do something, it can. But as Sheila Casey, chair of Kasi, and one of the key figures involved in the campaign asked of the last minute reversal the Department of Children and Equality asked: "Why did it have to go down to the wire?"

Minutes before the buses were to arrive to take the Ukrainian community at Hotel Killarney to Westport in Co Mayo, news came through of the reversal.

Neighbours, school teachers, and others had gathered in solidarity with the pleas for the women and children to remain in the town which has become their home.

The women had been told on Monday afternoon they are being moved to Co. Mayo and they would have no choice other than to find their own accommodation.

However IPAS the agency in charge of refugee accommodation, and Green Minister Roderic O'Gorman's department underestimated Killarney. In particular, they underestimated local Fine Gael TD Brendan Griffin, mayor of Killarney Niall Kelleher, along with school principal Colm O'Súilleabháin of St Oliver's National School and Sheila Casey among others.

With only hours to go, they were able to put on the minister's table the names and addresses of IPAS approved accommodation in Killarney where the women and children could go. Still, it took until the eleventh minute for the minister to change his mind.

Sheila Casey, speaking at the hotel on Wednesday morning said: "What has shocked us all big time is to think there was accommodation, already registered with IPAS, in Killarney and this was brought to the attention of IPAS and the Department by Brendan Griffin T D and yet it had to go down to the wire."

Principal of St Brendan's College Seán Coffey also at the hotel said the issue for schools was one of trust.

The decision to suddenly remove the pupils had "undermined the relationship" between refugee students and teachers in all schools, not just in Killarney, he said.

"I'm delighted this has been reversed," he said.

Mayor Kelleher who worked closely with Brendan Griffin on getting the decision reversed said : "I hope lessons have been learned.What happened was a huge mistake especially as there were solutions." "Brutal" was how Rev Simon Lumby, Church of Ireland, described the letter to the residents of the hotel.

And indeed what was so shocking for most was the cold and callous way the news was delivered by the Department of Children and Equality, of all bodies.

Unfortunately, the Department is not alone. I have come across an increasingly cold and dare I say it "robotic attitude" by far too many authorities at all levels in this State now.

Humanity and people power must be put back into the picture in Ireland. And selfpraise is no praise, but I was so proud of the raw journalism which got to tell this story and show up the lack of heart at the centre of this decision. Because despite all the lip service about helping refugees from the Taoiseach and the Tanaiste down, and all the political parties, and all the State money being spent on the large private accommodation providers, the people helping refugees in this country are the local people.

A PLAN FOR THE PRESENTATION

Undoubtedly the 26-bedroom Presentation Convent in Killarney which is now on the market is an opportunity for business.

And Michael Coghlan, auctioneer, is right in saying it has "unrivalled potential" as an exclusive apartment development or as a boutique hotel/wedding venue with an amazing private chapel.

The 1875 three storey building is on a1.5 acres or thereabouts. It is a protected structure with many original features both internally and externally intact.

And it has planning for a revamping for apartment style living.

But wouldn't it make a fantastic education centre? Or a natural history museum or a Killarney town museum?

Already this part of Killarney is the Latin Quarter. It has a drama school, secondary schools and Church.

We badly need a third level institution in Killarney and given there is no movement on St Finan's why not here?

Killarney now is practically the only town in Kerry not to have a third level university type institution.

Yet it is the Diocesean capital and its great history of learning and education goes back to Aghadoe and Inisfallen Island.

Could the great powers that be in education in this county and indeed in this State be prevailed upon to snap it up? Elsewhere in this column we have seen what Killarney can achieve when it puts its mind to it....

Following years of research... NOEL LAUNCHES NEW BOOK

Following years of research, Killarney historian, Noel Grimes has launched his new book.

The book, entitled "An Gorta Mór 1845 - 1850 and its effects in the Killarney area", is the result of many years of research by Noel into how this famine impacted the people of Killarney. His interest began when he was asked to lead a group of schoolchildren on a tour of famine related sites in the town. By studying local newspapers from the 1840's and minutes of workhouse Board of Guardians meetings, he saw just how the poor struggled to survive.

The research did not end with the tour but continued for many years resulting in this book.

From exploring the origins of the Killarney Workhouse, now St. Columbanus's Home, to the desperate conditions in the town's laneways, An Gorta Mór tells



the story of the ordinary people of Killarney.



LEAVING CERT SUBJECT CHOICE IS VERY IMPORTANT. **BUYER BEWARE!**



SENIOR CYCLE

LINK MODULES

Students study one of three Leaving Cert programs at senior cycle. The majority prefer the traditional Leaving Cert (LC). The Leaving Certificate Vocational Program (LCVP) is similar to the traditional Leaving Cert, except that students also take three Link Modules (Enterprise Education, Preparation for Work and Work Experience). The Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) is strongly vocational. The subject areas are more practical than academic.

SUBJECT SELECTION

Subject selection for Leaving Cert is very important because the subjects you choose will influence your further study and career. Give this process serious consideration and decide what senior cycle subjects suit you best. Leaving Cert students usually take seven subjects. Mathematics, Irish and English are compulsory. It's advisable to study a modern language, which some third level courses have as an entry requirement.

OPTIONAL SUBJECTS

Your task is to select three optional subjects four if not taking a third language. Make sure that your subjects fulfil the entry requirements for your courses of interest. Many colleges also impose additional subject requirements which are course specific. It's also worth knowing that a number of third level courses use criteria of selection, such as art portfolio, interview, audition and suitability test, in addition to Leaving Cert exam points.

SIX SUBJECTS

Six subjects are used from any one sitting of the Leaving Cert exam to calculate total points' score. The potential maximum points' score in the Leaving Cert points' scale is 600 or 625 if Higher Level Maths is one of the six subjects counted as 25 bonus points are awarded for Higher Level Maths for H6 or above.



Students studying the LCVP may include the points awarded for the Link Modules as one of the six subjects used for calculating points - 66 points for a Distinction (80% to 100%), 46 points for a Merit (65% to < 80%) and 28 points for a Pass (50% to < 65%).

FLAIR

Keep the following criteria of subject selection in mind when making your choice. Firstly, if you have a flair for a particular subject, you will get tremendous personal satisfaction from studying that subject.

ACHIEVE

Secondly, note the subjects in which you are achieving good grades. The Leaving Cert exam is a test of achievement. Grades and points determine entry to higher education. Points' potential at higher (H) level is far greater than at ordinary (O) level. For example, H3 is worth 77 points while O3 is worth only 37 points. Study as many of your subjects at higher level as you can handle.

INTEREST

Thirdly, select subjects you are interested in because you will work harder at those. Of all the variables that determine success at school, at college and in your career, interest is the most critical. It's likely that the subjects that interest you at school will influence your college course choices in two years' time.

REQUIRED

Fourthly, be aware of subjects that are required for any particular career interests you may have. Each college has a system of general and specific entry requirements which you must satisfy before you are considered for a place in a particular course. For example, the minimum general entry requirements for UCC are 2H5 and 4H7/O6.



FAIR CHOICE

The task facing you, therefore, is to select a subject grouping that will satisfy the four criteria of Flair (aptitude), Achievement, Interest and Required. It may help you to remember that you need to make a FAIR choice of subjects. Study the information carefully, give careful consideration to your subject choice, think about your course options and the related careers. In the end choose wisely as this is the first step on your path to college.

CHECKLIST

- Leaving Cert appeal results were released on Friday, 7th October

Dates announced for cost of living lump sum payments

he Minister for Social Protection, Heather Humphreys, and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform, Michael McGrath, have announced the payment dates for the €1.2 billion cost of living supports introduced as part of last month's Budget.

The Social Protection budget - the largest in the history of the State will assist pensioners, carers, people with disabilities and families with the cost of living through a mix of lump sum supports and increases to weekly payments.

The lump sum payments announced as part of the Budget include: - A doubling of Child Benefit on 1 November, which will support 639,000 families in respect of 1.2 million children

0 An Autumn double payment next week, benefitting 1.4 million people - A €500 Disability Support Grant will be paid next month to people with

disabilities

- Also secured as part of the Budget was a €400 Fuel Allowance lump sum payment. This will be paid on the week commencing 14 November to 370,000 households

- During the same week, a €500 lump sum Working Family Payment will be paid to 44,000 households

- There will also be a €200 lump sum payment to the 234,000 people in receipt of the Living Alone Allowance

- A €500 Carer's Support Grant will be provided to the country's carers during the week commencing 21 November

- A Christmas Bonus double payment will be paid on the week commencing 5 December



As curate in Tralee (1907-1914) he became actively involved with the Volunteers with the result that Dublin Castle insisted on his being transferred from the County capital. En route to his Castletownbere Parish "Small" Jer O'Leary presented him with a rifle in Killarney's Railway Station. He did so on behalf of the Tralee Volunteers as their parting gift to their leader.

CASTLEMAINE FAIR DAY WILL REMEMBER JOHN

'astlemaine Events Committee will host Castlemaine Fair Day on Sunday October 16th in memory of the late John O'Donoghue. The location of the Sheep Fair will be in Griffin's Car Park and it will get underway from 10:00am. After a very successful revival of the old fair day in Castlemaine in 2021 which saw blue skies galore, huge crowds gather and over €40,000 raised from the event, the decision was taken to make it an annual event which will not only raise invaluable funds for the wonderful services which Kerry Hospice offer but it is also a means of keeping John's memory alive for both his family and friends.

All proceeds will once again be in aid of Kerry Hospice for the 2022 staging. There will be an auction on the day like last year where the donation of animals is most welcome. Funds raised from the auction will go towards The Palliative Care Unit at University Hospital Kerry who provide exemplary care and attention to their patients. A raffle with some wonderful spot prizes on offer courtesy of sponsorship, bucket collections and kids' entertainment will also be in operation throughout the day. As an addition to this year's event there will be a pet show in the afternoon.

John O'Donoghue who was known all over resided in the heart of Castlemaine Village and was born on January 21st, 1965 which ironically happened to coincide with a staging of the old Castlemaine Fair Day so it felt appropriate to mark John's lifetime love of attending fairs and being an integral part of the farming community by bringing back the old fair day in his honour and with it celebrate old traditions, customs and beliefs in the locality.

Speaking about the event, John's daughter Cathy said: "The fair day was an annual event in Castlemaine, but it died out in the 90s. This event is very important as it keeps my father's memory alive as we approach the 3rd anniversary in January 2023.

John was known by many particularly for his work ethic, humour, and honesty. When people mention any dealings, they had with him, it is always with a smile on their face, and they will all tell you that it was always a good deal they had with him.

John loved to attend the fair days throughout the county and was well known as the custom Eacebook page.

of attending the fairs was passed onto John from his father Denis. Attending the fairs was not only enjoyable but also important to my father as he liked to keep up traditions. You would always be sure to get a bit of traditional luck back in the form of change from my father too with a deal.



I along with his good friend Pat O Keeffe felt a fair day was a lovely way to celebrate John's life whilst also raising money for Kerry Hospice due to his passion for farming and his love of a fair day.

It was a huge shock to John, his family, and friends when he was diagnosed with terminal bowel cancer in May 2019. His life was cut short as 7 months after that he died in the Palliative Care Unit on the 13th of January 2020.

Almost everyone has been affected by cancer in some way or another and are familiar with the Kerry Hospice in UHK. The care and support provided from the palliative care team was so amazing that it feels very right to give something back and I hope that we can raise as much money as possible on the day for such a wonderful service here in the heart of Kerry.

It is great to have the Castlemaine Events Committee on board to help with the planning of the event. We are very lucky to have such a team in a small village. The support from the farming community and local community is truly heart-warming and the community spirit is magnificent.

The national fuel allowance scheme for the 2022/23 season will help many households in Kerry with their winter heating costs, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Minister for Social Protection, Heather Humphreys TD, has announced the start of the National Fuel Allowance Scheme, which will be paid over 28 weeks.

Deputy Griffin has confirmed the Fuel Allowance will be paid for 28 weeks to 14,086 people in Kerry, with many more people in Kerry to qualify this year.

"14,086 people in Kerry who are entitled to the Fuel Allowance will now be able to avail of it as we approach the winter.

"The payment is made at the weekly rate of €33 or, by way of two lump sum payments if people prefer.

"In Budget 2023 my colleague Minister Humphreys also ensured a \in 400 additional Lump Sum payment for all households in receipt of the Fuel Allowance Payment. This will be paid the week commencing 14th November 2022. This will bring the total value of the Fuel Allowance to \in 1,324 per household.

"In addition, as part of Budget 2023, Minister Humphreys secured funding for the largest ever expansion of the Fuel Allowance scheme. This expansion will bring an many more Kerry households (81,000 more nationally) into the scheme. This will be of particular benefit for older people with a new Means Test taking effect for Over 70s from January.

"Under this new over 70s means test, a single person can have income of \in 500 per week and a couple can have income of \in 1000 per week. In the case of a couple where one person is under 70 and one person is over 70,

they will be assessed under the Over 70s Means Test criteria.

"The weekly means threshold for those aged under 70 will also be increased by \in 80 per week, from \in 120 to \in 200 above the weekly rate of State Pension Contributory.

"We in Fine Gael know that times are tough and we are ensuring we put more money in your pocket to help reduce the impact of the higher cost of living."

The Department of Social Protection is now working on developing the necessary IT systems and application forms to give effect to these changes from January.







CLLR. O'DONOGHUE ALLOCATES FUNDING TO SORT LIGHTING AT BRIDGEFIELD

Clir John O'Donoghue has raised the issue of the provision of lighting at the entrance to Bridgefield Estate in Killarney at the recent Killarney Municipal District meeting. In his notice of motion he requested "That the Council would provide an update of the provision of lighting at the entrance to Bridgefield Estate, Killarney".

"This issue is on foot of a Notice of Motion I brought before the Council previously where agreement was given to provide the required lighting. There is a section of walkway in between Lewis Road and Bridgefield Estate which is in complete darkness at night time, and is unsafe for residents

walking home at night as they cannot see who or what awaits them at this section. With the evenings now closing in quickly due to the onset of Winter, I hope that the work can be expedited and completed before the Winter sets in", ClIr. O'Donoghue told the meeting.

He received the following response: "Kerry County Council's Public Lighting Department have investigated the request and has found

it satisfies the Council's Public Lighting Policy. The Killarney MD has prepared a complete cost quotation, including the cost of civil works and are seeking a potential source of funding for these proposed works". "I am delighted with the response and have allocated the entire funds required, in the region of €7,500 from my personal Councillors allocation and I hope that the works will be completed before long", Cllr. O'Donoghue told Killarney Outlook.

FUEL ALLOWANCE TO BE PAID FOR 28 WEEKS to 14,086 people in Kerry

The national fuel allowance scheme for the 2022/23 season will help many households in Kerry with their winter heating costs, Deputy Government Chief Whip, Brendan Griffin TD has said.

Minister for Social Protection, Heather Humphreys TD, has announced the start of the National Fuel Allowance Scheme, which will be paid over 28 weeks.

Deputy Griffin has confirmed the Fuel Allowance will be paid for 28 weeks to 14,086 people in Kerry, with many more people in Kerry to qualify this year.

"14,086 people in Kerry who are entitled to the Fuel Allowance will now be able to avail of it as we approach the winter.

"The payment is made at the weekly rate of \in 33 or, by way of two lump sum payments if people prefer.

"In Budget 2023 my colleague Minister Humphreys also ensured a \in 400 additional Lump Sum payment for all households in receipt of the Fuel Allowance Payment. This will be paid the week commencing 14th November 2022. This will bring the total value of the Fuel Allowance to \in 1,324 per household.

"In addition, as part of Budget 2023, Minister Humphreys secured



funding for the largest ever expansion of the Fuel Allowance scheme. This expansion will bring an many more Kerry households (81,000 more nationally) into the scheme. This will be of particular benefit for older people with a new Means Test taking effect for Over 70s from January.

"Under this new over 70s means test, a single person can have income of \notin 500 per week and a couple can have income of \notin 1000 per week. In the case of a couple where one person is under 70 and one person is over 70, they will be assessed

under the Over 70s Means Test criteria.

"The weekly means threshold for those aged under 70 will also be increased by \in 80 per week, from \in 120 to \in 200 above the weekly rate of State Pension Contributory.

"We in Fine Gael know that times are tough and we are ensuring we put more money in your pocket to help reduce the impact of the higher cost of living."

The Department of Social Protection is now working on developing the necessary IT systems and application forms to give effect to these changes from January.

NEW PLANNING PERMISSION EXEMPTIONS FOR ROOFTOP SOLAR PANELS ON HOMES AND OTHER BUILDINGS IN KERRY

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien, TD, has signed into law revised planning exemptions for the installation of solar panels on the rooftops of houses and certain non-domestic buildings. The exemptions are aimed at increasing Ireland's generation of solar energy and combating climate change. The changes take immediate effect.

Houses, regardless of location in Kerry, may now

install unlimited solar panels on their rooftops without any requirement for planning permission (subject to certain conditions). Exemptions also apply to rooftops of industrial buildings, business premises, community and educational buildings, places of worship, health buildings, libraries, certain public utility sites and farms. Certain restrictions continue to apply, including developments near certain aviation sites and protected structures and Architectural Conservation Areas.





WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?







COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP QUARTER-FINALS

Feale Rangers 1-12 Austin Stacks 0-12 I remember how horrified Kerry supporters were at the relentlessly negative football played by Tyrone in 2003 when they simply swarmed all over us. And Kerry weren't alone in being horrified. Well, we may as well douse the torches and put down the pitchforks, because a lot of Kerry teams have converted with religious zeal to that former heresy of the blanket defence.

I like that Feale Rangers have bucked the odds in the County Championship. I'm one of those who predicted that they wouldn't get out of their group – instead they have won every single game. Humble pie doesn't taste that bad at all. Now, I still think that a North Kerry amalgamation between Feale and Shannon Rangers is the way to go, with either the return of Kenmare District (should the club lose the relegation final) or a split of East Kerry (I believe that Eoghan Ruadh would be plenty strong enough to compete at senior) but that's a discussion for another day.

Look, I genuinely have northing against either of these teams. But this game was genuinely hard to watch. 13 man defence on both sides. Scores were rare and precious. Feale Rangers went ahead by two points - Stacks were trying to kick long ball into their forwards, and it was getting turned over every time. Shane O'Callaghan opened Stacks' account (their best forward) and Conor Horan and Mike O'Donnell nudge them ahead. Feale Rangers were playing the better football, but had five wides on the trot - they were shooting from awkward angles and under pressure, shot selection was poor. Barry O'Mahony, who was very direct, was an honourable exception. O'Callaghan and Wayne Guthrie with a free (I disapprove of keepers roaming out as a passing option, especially when the opposition aren't contesting any ball outside their massed defense) to a Martin Stack free gave Stacks a 0-5 to 0-4 lead at half-time. The O'Mahony brothers levelled matters on the restart, but both sides were quilty of some very poor shooting – again, it's hard to get clear chances in a thicket of bodies. I cannot stress it enough; this was very poor entertainment. Feale Rangers, with Barry O'Mahony and Aaron O'Connor excelling and an impressive subs bench coming into play, showed the better football but couldn't get it onto the scoreboard. Admittedly the last ten minutes were a big step up in football as both teams showed more willingness to attack. Nonetheless, 0-9 apiece and extra-time.

An intercepted kick-out by Martin Stack saw Rory O'Mahony put Feale Ranges in front. Minutes later a rare lapse by Stacks saw Feale rangers string a great move together for Darragh Lynch to fist home a goal. That was the

crucial score – try as they might (and did) Stacks just couldn't claw that back. They tried the desperation tactic bringing Kieran Donaghy to the edge of the square – he was close to every ball, but never close enough. In the end the champions bowed out with their heads high – it's worth noting that they were missing Joe 'Connor, Dylan Casey, and Brendan O'Sullivan. The fairytale of Feale Rangers continues, and fair play to them for that....but you wouldn't get a long highlights reel out of this game.

Dingle 1-18 Dr. Crokes 0-11

I have to give Crokes a lot of credit. They were missing as many top guns as Stacks (Gavin White, Micheál Burns, Fionn Fitzgerald, Gavin O'Shea) but they came out and played football. This game was one-sided on the scoreboard, but I have to say that it was a much better spectacle to watch.

Dingle were awesome. Easily the best team I saw this weekend. The quality of their long ball in to dangerous forwards, especially Paul Geaney, was just fantastic. Markl Cooper had to save an early goal chance off his own goal-line. Cooper, John Payne, and an outclassed but game Neil O'Shea (Geaney on song has outclassed a lot of footballers) acquitted themselves well. Mikey Potts in the half back line has been one of the players of the championship, and showed why. Paul Geaney had two early points before David Shaw opened Crokes' account after ten minutes. Potts and Mark O'Shea picked off two more in rapid succession and it looked as if Crokes were firing up the engines. Ten minutes later it was 0-5 apiece, with Dylan Geaney forcing a brilliant save out of Shane Murphy. The biggest cheer of the night came from a superb Mark O'Connor point in front of his Geelong team-mates. O'Connor returned to the round ball with accomplished ease; he was excellent Tom O'Sullivan was enjoying something of a free role, picking off two points, while Dylan Geaney completed a mark and Paul Geaney forced Shane Murphy to clear a dangerous ball under pressure. 0-8 to 0-5 at half-time, and great football to watch from both sides. Paul Geaney gathered from Mark O'Connor to slot over (his third assist from distance, real precision missiles). Another perfect pass into Paul saw him tee up Dylan Geaney for a simple goal, and the writing was on the wall. Tom O'Sullivan notched two more points and the effective Barry Dan O'Sullivan added another in response to a Tony Brosnan score - Tony was well marshalled throughout. Tom Doyle, who worked hard, kicked a point. Cian McMahon won two frees converted by Tony to make it 1-12 to 0-9. Paul Geaney took two more points while Mikey Potts won a free converted by Tony. Dingle were as fit as they were strong, kicking five more points before the by-now inevitable finish. Tom O'Sullivan, Barry Dan, Mark O'Connor, Dylan and especially Paul Geaney...the last club side standing have some real aces in their hand.

Mid Kerry 0-13 Templenoe 0-11

I think we all had Mid Kerry down to win this one, and the early script seeme to confirm that as they opend up a 0-5 to 0-1 lead through Éanna O'Coor (he was outstanding), Keith Evans, Darren Houlihan, and Ciarán Kennedy. Brian Crowley had Templenoe's only score, but then they kicked into gear and Patrick Clifford and Stephen O'Sullivan hit a brace each. Éanna had another free to nudge his side into a 0-6 to 0-5 half-time lead. Tom Spillane opened the second half scoring and Killian Spillane gobbled up a loose kick-out to win and convert a free. Adrian and Killian added two more and Templenoe were in driving seat at 0-9 to 0-6. Jack O'Connor and Fiachra Clifford reeled that in, but Brian Crowley restored the two point lead – Brian looked fully fit for the first time this year. Darren Houlihan, Kieran Dennehy, and Éanna O'Connor nudged Kenmare in front, but Aidan Crowley landed a long distance free to restore parity, 0-11 apiece.

In the end Mid Kerry had enough to get over the line – in fairness, they had a deeper subs bench than Templenoe, and I felt that it did

count in the finish, with Liam Carey and Fiachra Clifford notching the winning scores. I don't think Templenoe will be too unhappy, though – Adrian Spillane, Brian Crowley, and Cian Hallissey all showed well after carrying various knocks, and Gavin Crowley has a good chance of featuring next weekend – that Senior Final is Templenoe's main goal for the year.

East Kerry 0-13 Kenmare Shamrocks 1-7

East Kerry had a very heavy favourites tag thrust upon their shoulders before a ball was kicked (with very good reason by the way) and it seems to be weighing them down. They certainly haven't cut loose since their opening game against a fairly tame Rahillys. Spa profited by playing defensively against the champions-elect, and I suspect that every other team will adopt that strategy - I certainly would. You aren't going to win a shootout with these guys, so Kenmare wisely didn't try to. An early penalty from Paul O'Connor after David Hallissey was fouled put them in the driving seat. Paudie Clifford opened East Kerry's account and also forced a great save out of Kieran Fitzgibbon. Ronan Buckley, Dara Roche (f) and David Clifford levelled matters, but it was notable that Kemare had four wides on the trot and would add another two. Against East Kerry's quality, you need to execute every chance. Seanie O'Shea and Stephen O'Sullivan did put them ahead, but David Clifford hit the crossbar from distance before kicking a free. 1-3 to 0-5 at the break, and Kenmare could have been further ahead.

David Clifford slotted a free from massive range and then made a brilliant catch for Dara Roche to slot another. Dara Roche clipped over a great point himself - Kenmare's tight defending meant that East Kerry could only get good scores, but they can do that. Sean O'Shea kicked a free and a '45, but Dara Roche slotted another beauty. 0-9 to 1-6. Two great scores from David Clifford put a little bit of daylight - he also set up Dara Roche for a goal chance, but Dara Crowley made a brilliant last-second tackle. David Hallissev fisted over. David Clifford added two more points, a free and a mark. Kenmare can rue their luck, though. Seán O'Shea had what looked like a legitimate penalty call, while Dan McCarthy fisted a great effort off the post and wide. Kenmare bowed out with their heads high. East Kerry won and are into the last four.... but the questions remain.

COUNTY AND CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP PREVIEWS County Semi-Final: Mid Kerry v Feale Rangers, Austin Stack Park, Saturday, 7.15pm

Mid Kerry have the better shooters, but Feale Rangers play a very defensive game and are consequently very hard to break down. Aaron O'Connor, Ger McCarthy, Niall Collins, Bryan Sweeney....quality players. Up front they rely a lot on Martin Stack and Barry O'Mahony. They aren't going to put up a huge total, but the question is whether they will conceded even less. Mid Kerry made very hard work of Templenoe, but I think that's more due to a very good performance by the club side than any particular weakness in Mid Kerry – Peter O'Sullivan has put together a strong team. Liam Carey has yet to really cut loose this year - we know he's capable of it – while Éanna O'Connor has been a very big addition to their scoring power. Jack O'Connor has been troubled by injuery but has been scoring off the bench in every game, and you have the likes of the Hassett brothers to call on as well. The likes of Darren Houlihan, Keith Evans, and Kieran Dennehy have really impressed me this year. Mike Breen is back as a defensive talisman, while Seán Coffey has been a revelation between the sticks. Personally I think that Mid Kerry will have too much for Feale Rangers in the finish, but they'll have a tough hour of it before the finish.

COUNTY SEMI-FINAL East Kerry v Dingle, Austin Stack Park, Sunday, 2.30pm

Frankly, this game is a must-see. East Kerry were obviously on the radar before the competition even started – they were caught cold in a knock-out first round by Stacks last year, but a tam that has the Cliffords, Dar Roche, James O'Donoghue, Donal Down O'Sullivan, Ronan Buckley. The likes of Patrick Darcy ad Ryan O'Grady aren't even getting a look in. Ruairi Murphy and Darragh Lyne look like players on Jack O'Connor's radar. Jack Sherwood is as good as he ever was. Chris O'Donoghue, Pa Warren, Paul Murphy of course, Jonathan Lyne.... you'll work for every score you get. And yet.... somehow, East Kerry don't feel quite like the sum of their parts. They struggle to break down defensive teams - it took spectacular individual scores from Dara Roche and David Clifford to get them over the line against Kenmare. Dingle have been playing a defensive style all year, with Paul Geaney as a target-man up front and Barry Dan and now Mark O'Connor as the link men. They keep enough numbers back, with Mikey Geaney as the anchor, to allow the likes of Tom O'Sullivan a free role to attack. Frankly, it's exactly the type of team that East Kerry struggle against. Before last weekend, I'd have said East Kerry have too much power and too many options off the bench for any team to stay with them for a full game. Now? This one is too close for me to call. If East Kerry win it, and they will still be slight favourites, it will be at least as much down to their defending as their star forwards.

SENIOR CLUB FINAL Templenoe v Kerins O'Rahillys, Fitzgerald Stadium, Sunday, 3.00pm

A hard one to call. Rahillys have the stronger tradition, but laboured a bit in the County Championship and departed fairly early - that might well stand to them. The availability of Jack Savage, Tommy Walsh, David Moran, and Cormac Coffey is another issue – Coffey has been inter-county quality for me, while Jack Savage does have an All Ireland medal and with good reason. He is a phenomenally consistent scorer - if he's on the field, Templenoe will be up against it. Rahillys have a plethora of big men around the middle, while Walsh is always a massive threat up front, both literally and figuratively. Conor Hayes has been in flying form all year as well. That said, I make Templenoe slight favourites here. Seán Sheehan is a major doubt and he would be a big loss, but Tom Spillane has looked strong in his place in midfield beside Adrian Spillane, who looked his old self against Mid Kerry. Obviously Killian Spillane and Stephen O'Sullivan are the talismen up front, but Aidan Crowley has stepped seamlessly into senior ranks and his long range scoring is a real weapon – I expect that U20 manager Tomás Ó Sé already has his phone number. Gavin Crowley is another doubt - his accurate long passing has been hugely effective. Tadhg Morley was one of Kerry's best

performers for me and he has been doing the same thing with Templenoe. It's a tight call, but Templenoe are the form team coming in to this one.

SENIOR CLUB RELEGATION FINAL

Austin Stacks v Kenmare District, Fitzgerald Stadium, Sunday, 1.15pm Austin Stacks is arguably the cradle of Kerry GAA (Killorglin was the effective birthplace). They top the roll of honour and even in their long hiatus of titles between 1936 and 1973, they were a side to be respected. They were the backbone of that great Kerry Golden Years team of th seventies and eighties. No-one did more to sow that particular harvest than the great Micheál Haves. It would be a somewhat bitter irony if they were to drop down to Intermediate in the year of his passing. At full strength, you'd fancy Stacks here. But Joe O'Connor, Brendan O'Sullivan, and Dylan Casey are big doubts and would be huge losses. Kieran Donaghy, who terrorized defences for the most of two decades, finally looked mortal against Feale Rangers. Stacks have brought in good young guns to supplement the likes of Shane O'Callaghan, Greg Horan, Michael O'Donnell, and David Mannix - Horan and Heinrich are real fnds, while you have the likes of Quilter, Jordan Kissane, and Cian Purcell on the bench. Jack O'Shea is always good for a score out of defence. The trouble is that there's none of them that you could consistently rely on to kick five points in a game. Stacks have taken some flak for playing defensive football, but I'm not sure that they have any real choice in the matter. They have great footballers, but not reliable gunmen in front of the posts.

Kenmare have on of the best shooters in the business in Seán O'Shea, Paul O'Connor and Stephen O'Brien. In fairness, Kenmare would struggle badly if Seán O'Shea were to have an off day, but I wouldn't lose lot of sleep over it when's the last time that Seán O'Shea had an off day? At the back you have players like Dara Crowley, James McCarthy, and Dan McCarthy (I don't understand the effort to turn Dan McCarthy into a forward - that guy is intercounty quality in defence). Stacks' illustrious history is likely to make them favourites, but I can see Kenmare causing a major upset here.

WAYNE QUILLINAN APPOINTED

MINOR MANAGER

Personally I'd have gone with Marc Ó Sé – he did well with An Ghaeltacht, has always done well with Tralee CBS, and has been astounding with Listry. But I have no problem with Wayne Quillinan at the helm. I know that there's talk that he's too defensive, and personally I thought that both the Kerry minors and U20s were a bit too defensive in their approach this year. I know that some people think that Wayne is a very defensive manger, but I strongly disagree. The current Stacks team do play a very defensive style, but I saw Wayne with the Austin Stacks minors and with the development squads - believe me, those teams played attacking football. That said, I think Kerry supporters might have been a small bit spoiled by our five in a row of minor All Irelands. The simple fact is that Kerry organised their underage systems and development squads in 2011 to lay the groundwork and we had a phenomenal run of colleges success around the same time. It was a perfect storm in many ways. Cork have caught us on the hop in the last two years (hindsight shows that our opening victory against Cork last year did us no favours in the long run) and that's our biggest challenge. I hope expectations will be tempered. I'm not sure how strong next year's minors will be, judging by our minor and U15 championships. The 2024 minors should be very strong but as always, minor is an unpredictable grade and there is that ongoing debate about changing age grades.

LADIES MUNSTER **CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Intermediate: Dr. Crokes Monagea

Rheanne O'Shea opened Dr. Crokes' account, but Caitriona David scored a second goal and addeda point. Amanada Brosnan replied, but a Davis free made it 2-2 to 0-2 in favour of Monagea. Crokes hit thre wides before their next score friom Julie Delaney, but Deborah Murphy and Caitriona Davis pointed before Amanda Brosnan closed out the first half scoring with Dcrokes trailing by 2-4 to 0-4.

Tralee CBS are only second to the Sem on the roll of honour. They are always formidable. Colm Browne in midfield and Jerh. Brosnan up front are two players to watch. Add in the likes of Jake Foley, Ciarán White, Ben Hanafin, Darragh Cunnane, and young prodigy Ronan Carroll, and you have serious talent. That said, nobody ever celebrated being drawn against St. Flannans of Ennis. They might be better known as a hurling nursery (the late Brendan Hennessy honed his art up there), but they have reached the knockout stages far more often that not. A bit of a banana skin, to say the least.

Clonakilty CC v SP Sliabh Luachra

Rathmore lost out to Mercy Mounthawk in the O'Sullivan Cup semi-final, but I think the Tralee outfit will beat a lot of teams. Rathmore have plenty of real quality in their ranks. Fionn Murphy is a phenomenal talent. Daniel Sheehan and Pádraig Moynihan are quality

defenders. Up front Dara Nagle, Seán Finnegan, James Doyle, and David O'Leary all know where the posts are. Clonakilty CC have some serious players in the likes of Dan Twomey, Aaron Cullinane, Darren Gough, John O'Donovan, and Fergal Murphy. A tough opener, but I think that having two tough games under their belt already will stand to Sliabh Luachra and I can see them edging a very close contest.

Group B

Mercy Mounthawk v Coláiste na Sceilge

Coláiste na Sceilge lost out fairly tamely to the Sem in the O'Sullivan Cup quarter-final, but they were missing a few players on the day, so I wouldn't read too much into it. South Kerry caused something of a sensation in the County Minor Championship by ending East Kerry's six year reign before losing out in a great battle with Mid Kerry. Jack Clifford is a a key player in the engine room, while the O'Sullivans Ian and Darragh and Emmet Daly are dangerous predators up front. Coláiste an Sceilge gave St. Brendans two great battles Ist year and also gave Tralee CBS a tough test in the O'Sullivan Cup Final.

That said, Mercy Mounthawk look sensational so far. Daniel Kirby, young Ben Murphy, Kerry minors like Niall Collins, Odhran Ferris, Paddy Lane, and Darragh O'Connor, who has kicked 2-18 in two games. Rob Monahan in midfield really made a name for himself playing midfield for St. Brendans in the County Championship. That's the best team I've seen so far this year (admittedly, it's very early days) and they will take a lot of beating.

St. Brendans v Coláiste Choilm Ballincollig The Sem are safely through to an O'Sullivan Cup final. They are the Corn Uí Mhuirí holdrs, but don't have too many of that team left. Cian Lynch at full back is a potential star. John Kelliher played wing forward last year, but has impressed at midfield. Aodhán O'Neill is looking razor -sharp. Charlie Keating and Darren Ryan were reliable options off the bench last year. Add in the likes of Seán Fitzgerald, Maidhcí Lych, Eoghan Kelly, Jamie Moynihan, Timmy Moynihan, and Cillian Courtney, and the Sem are a serious proposition for anybody. That said, the loss of multi-talented Luke Crowley and Alex Hennigan to injury is a big dent in any team and the Sem will very much want them back in harness for the later rounds, especially in a group that's likely to be very tight.

Ballincollig has witnessed something of

a population explosion over the past fifteen years – I can remember when it was a village well outside the city – and that has been paying rich dividends in every sporting code. They'll be tough, but I fancy the Sem here.

Group C Skibbereen Cs v Pres. Milltown

Milltown won the Dunloe Cup three years ago, beating the Sem comfortably in the final. They also won the Moynihan Shield and, arguably more significantly, the U15 Brendan O'Shea Shield that year as well. They have very much been on the radar ever since and have some great quality in their ranks, guite a few of whom really impressed for the Mid Kerry side that took North Kerry to a replay in the County Minor Final. Dara Hogan, Joshua Coffey, Liam Evans, Harry Kelly, Shane O'Connor, and Fionán Griffin are players who have more than proven that they have what it takes to thrive at this level. Mind you, they are stepping into the lion's den a bit here. Skibbereen reached the semifinal last year before bowing out to Tralee. This is a very tough opener, but it was never likely to be any different. If Pres. Milltown come out of this one - and I certainly think they have the scoring power and the teamwork to do it – they will rattle some cages along the way.

St. Francis Rochestown v PS Chorca Dhuibhne Back in 2015, Rochestown had one of the best Corn Uí Mhuirí teams I have seen, but dual commitments saw them lose out in both the Corn Uí Mhuirí and Harty finals. They haven't reached those heights since, but they are never an easy proposition and are always very competitive. PS Chorca Dhuibhne, of course, won four Corn Uí Mhuirí titles and two Hogan Cups in an era of almost unprecedented dominance - that dspite drwing from a comparatively low population base. Can they reach those heights again? Look, that might be asking a bit too much. Corca Dhuibhne lost out to Mercy Mounthawk in the O'Sullivan Cup quarter-final, but they scored 3-8 against them, with goals from Cian Ó Cinnéide, Cathal Ó Dufaigh and Sean Ó Fianachta. That's a great sign against a teak-tough Mounthawk defence and a great omen going forward.

Things were bad enough already. Then Greece came out in the draw. The real test will be if we can finish above Greece - we are higher than them in the rankings, but I'm not sure that I'd agree with that. If we finish fourth, I can sympathise with the inevitable calls for Stephen Kenny's resignation, but I'm not sure that there will be a big queue for the job.

IRISH LADIES FOOTBALL TEAM QUALITY FOR WORLD CUP

Let's go back in time just a little bit. 2017, to be precise. The FAI spent more on John Delaney's birthday party than they were willing to commit to the womens' soccer. Players literally had to swap jerseys at airports. There were plenty of platitudes but the womens' team were treated as second class citizens on the good days.

Except these were a tough breed. The likes of Niamh Fahey, Louise Quinn, Megan Campbell, and the talented Katie McCabe had enough of this – they were used to different standards in professional club environments. They just wanted the basics – the FAI, being in more dire financial straits than anyone supposed at the time, tried to make a public fight of it. And lost, big time. They acceded to demands that had never been more than reasonable. But the unspoken statement is always going to hang in the air after a moment like that – alright then, show us that ye were worth it.

Last Tuesday night in Hampden Park, the Irish womens' team gave the ultimate in emphatic answers.

Vera Pauw has to take a lot of the credit. Ironically, the first coaching job of the former Dutch international was with Scotland, then Russia, then South Africa, before being appointed to the Ireland job in 2019. It was a perfect pairing. Ireland had always had talent, but now there was professional application. Pauw could and can be ruthless in team selection – at this level there isn't room for sentiment on the field. Standards were rising anyway, driven by players with real ambition, and Pauw has shown how to harness it properly. There was a discernible lift – Ireland only lost out on qualifying for the Euros by a fraction (I doubt Stephen Kenny will come a close, to be honest).

The World Cup qualifying campaign had a good few ups, but a couple of downs as well. The truth is that our mens' and womens' team have the same problem, a lack of consistent goalscorers – McCabe is the closest we have.

In the end, it came down to ourselves and Scotland. It wasn't pretty, by any means. It was a relatively dour game, to gloss over that reality would be a patronising disservice. Ireland knew full well that they were going to have to dig this one out, so they metaphorically brought shovels instead of ballet shoes. We played a long ball game - Heather Payne up front did the best she could with limited service. We were happy to concede a lot of possession to Scotland – more than I liked, to be honest, I felt sure that our unwillingness to play through midfield would ultimately cost us. We hit everything long, mainly through Megan Campbell; we never really looked like scoring. Aine O'Gorman did go close and we had more shots on target than Scotland, but ours were hit-and-hope, Scotland were playing high percentage balls. We were composed at the back, though - Quinn, Fahey, and Diane Caldwell showed experience and composure. Our first touch control has improved massively (Pauw's influence?), even if our passing is still a little bit too slow. We hung on as Scotland pushed for an early goal - and I do mean barely hung on. Then Niamh Fahey coughed up a penalty and personally I felt a sense of impending doom. Once Scotland scored, we'd have to come out of our shell and concede



gaps to the more ambitious Scottish side. Except that Courtney Brosnan made a great save. It didn't feel like any pivotal moment to me, I still expected Scotland to score before the break, but they didn't. And the longer the game went on, the more Ireland grew into it and Scotland seemed to be tiring of running into that relentless green wall of defiance.

Amber Barrett came on in the 65th minute, more to replace tired legs than any strategic move. I still wasn't hopeful. But Niamh Fajhey broke up another attack and Ireland get the ball out to Denise O'Sullivan (my player of the game, by the way) and she hit an absolutely perfectly weighted ball for Barrett to run on to and finish with her left foot – that wasn't any simple finish. It was against the run of play, but that was a superbly worked and executed goal, it really was. Barrett's emotional tribute to Creeslough, a place and people that she knows well, only enhance it in the aftermath. Class on all counts.

It wasn't over. Scotland were never going to bow out easily and hurled absolutely everything at us. But somehow, almost as much by force of will as technical ability, Ireland defiantly hung on to carve their names in Ireland's sporting history. Irish soccer hasn't had a lot to celebrate recently, but this is a big one.







FOCUS ON HEDGING

Outlook

Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance because a hedge allows the wind to filter through it reduces its velocity.

Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil.

To choose the right hedge for your garden, here are a few pointers to think about: 1. The type of soil you have.

- How exposed the garden is i.e. what direction is it facing.
- 2. The eventual height and width the hedge will be
- 4. Does it need to be evergreen

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want, it's time to prepare the soil. Start preparing the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year around but the ideal time is between November and March as all hedging plants will be dormant at this time. What that means is when you go to buy your hedging plants, they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure that when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. If you have missed the bare rooted season at the end of March, you can plant container grown hedging all year around.



Welcome back dear student, continuing on being 'trapped'. "....l focus on this one thing: forgetting the past and looking forward to what lies ahead. I press on to reach the end of the race and receive the Heavenly prize for which God through Christ Jesus is calling us" (Philippians 3:13-14). Living in the past is a snare set by Satan to block advancement. 'I'm looking forward to...' is a phrase often said, yet many times we are held by chords to the past that have trapped our mindsets - causing us to dread and fear, instead of being able to 'look forward' with hope. 'Hope is the anchor of the soul' (Hebrews 6:19). When someone is caught in a trap of always looking back, re-hashing and rehearsing all that happened, it breaks the soul and sickens the heart (Proverbs 13:12). It breeds discontentment and suspicion, causing that one to lose hope and ultimately lose their joy. Holding on to the past never got anyone anywhere. God does not hold on to the past, and neither should we.

When we have been hurt by others, or gone through some trauma or loss, it causes pain. No one denies that. But, what we decide to do with that pain will determine not just our own personal outcome - but even our future generations. It is important to acknowledge trauma; but then to heal from the grief and release the pain - ask the Lord to minister His love to you and carry you through (Psalm 23; Psalm 34:18; Isaiah 43:1-2). It is vital to keep moving forward and come out the other side. When the wound has come at the hand of another, it's crucial to learn to forgive, and make a decision that this event will not make you bitter, or be the legacy of your life; because offence, unforgiveness and bitterness are traps that will never let you go, unless you first let the hurt go (Hebrews 12:14-15). Offences get visited down generations of families, opening the door to demons, curses of sickness, and all kinds of problems. The Word of God tells us to 'strive and make every effort to enter that rest of God, so that no one will fall by following the same example of disobedience as those who died in the wilderness' (Hebrews 4:11 AMP). There is a rest available to believers who acknowledge Jesus as Lord, so we must determine to push past the devil's traps in order to enter God's Rest. God is Holy that means sin cannot enter His Presence. But He gave His Son Jesus to pay for all of mankind's sin, so that we could be reconciled back to God as if we had never sinned, by the Blood that Jesus shed for us at Calvary. God chooses to forgive our sins and to forget them, thereby giving us a fresh start with Him (Hebrews 8:12; Psalms 103:12). Jesus prayed 'Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven' (Matthew 6:10). Well, in Heaven there's no sin. No anger, offence, bitterness or self pity. So, in order to enter into the Kingdom of God, we need to unload our baggage here. That is in no way denying that wrongs were done; but, it's choosing to repent and receive healing from Jesus by releasing the pain to Him, so that hope can be restored and we can look forward to a future of victory and peace (Mark 11:22-26).

As locally we face inflation hikes and electricity shortages we turn our attention during this Webinar, Thursday the 20th of October, to poverty-stricken countries and we converse with people who dedicate their lives to working with the poor, focusing on education, health and dialogue between faith groups, in the hope of peace and justice. Liam O Callaghan is one of these. Throw into that mix the overwhelming negative impacts of climate change to which richer countries, Ireland included, have contributed and we see how the problems for poorer countries like Pakistan have escalated. This summer extreme heat followed by the well documented, severe monsoon floods, left one third of Pakistan under water. This caused widespread devastation to the agricultural sector, especially in the southern parts of the country where Fr. Liam is based. Villages were washed away leaving around 3.4 million children in need of assistance and at increased risk of waterborne diseases, drowning and malnutrition. The situation is still critical in the worst affected areas due to the flooding from the overflowing River Indus and Lake

Manchhar. The Sindh Government has declared 23 out of 29 districts as calamity-hit areas.


