



A Killarney man who raised over €15,000 for Kerry Hospice by running 170 miles last November in memory of his sister-in-law, is asking the public to support their local Hospice. David Looney got to see first hand the care his sister-in-law Geraldine received during her time in Hospice, witnessing how its work enormously comforted her family.

Seeing this effect alone was powerful enough to spur him out in the November rain.

Now he is asking members of the public to host a coffee morning for Bewley's Big Coffee Morning Social for Hospice on September 21.

The nationwide event, supported by Bewley's since 1992, has raised over €43.2million – and there is a €2million fundraising target this year.

David ran almost every day during the month of November to raise funds for those who cared for Geraldine, who passed away in 2021.

"My story is probably common enough, my sisterin-law had four sisters, two brothers, two parents, a partner, and two kids," said David.

"My wife would come home and I could see the comfort in her, knowing that her sister was in the best place she possibly could be at this time in her life with the very best staff around her.

"That made my job of trying to comfort my wife much easier."

David had been involved with a fundraising run for the Mater Hospital during the Covid-19 pandemic, which gave him the idea to undertake something more challenging for Kerry Hospice.

"I had originally committed to running 150 miles, but I thought the more I could do, the more I would raise, and right before the race I changed it to 170 miles," he said.

"My family thought I was doing too much, but I knew the more I did, the harder the task, the more I would raise because people would appreciate the challenge."

The end of David's fundraiser came on November 30 last, the first anniversary of Geraldine's death.

"The date was very poignant. I purposely stopped two kilometres short and went to the national park, where Geraldine's two sons, nieces and nephews joined me for the final distance. It was a great way to end the month," he said.

"My son, who was only seven at the time, also joined me for two kilometres in the middle to give me a boost – it was a lot for him to take on, but he was determined to do it."

Trócaire award recipient thanks Kerry public for 50 years of support

An Ethiopian nun who has continued to help people in the Tigray Region of Ethiopia in spite of the conflict that has raged there for nearly three years has been honoured by Trócaire.

Sister Medhin Tesfay was in attendance at the Trócaire 50th Anniversary Conference where she was presented with the Trócaire 'Romero International Award' by Bishop William Crean, who is Chair of the organisation, in recognition of her extraordinary courage and commitment.

Sister Medhin thanked the people of Co. Kerry and right across Ireland for their support of not just the Daughters of Charity but many other partner organisations since Trócaire was founded fifty years ago. "Through your generosity, we have been able to shed light on peoples plight, share their stories and advocate for the attention and assistance they desperately need. Your support has helped in saving many lives, illuminating a path towards a brighter future for these individuals, offering them a glimmer of hope and a chance for a better life," she said. Sister Medhin has given tirelessly to the transformative and lifesaving work of the Daughters of Charity in Ethiopia for nearly three decades. She is known and respected by many around the world, including Ireland, Scotland, England and the US, for the work she has done.

Sr. Medhin's congregation opened two houses in Tigray in the 1970s to support the disadvantaged, marginalised and people living in poverty in these areas. The first house of the Daughters of Charity in Tigray Region, and where Sr. Medhin lives and serves, was established in 1973 – the same year that Trócaire was established in Ireland.

CALL TO REMOVE UNSLIGHTLY BARRIERS

At today's meeting of Kerry County Council Killarney Municipal District, newly coopted member Cllr. Martin Grady is calling on Kerry County Council to remove unslightly barriers located just off Park Road. "I'm calling for these unsightly barriers to be removed and replaced with a suitable alternative, in the tourist capital of Ireland it's not good enough on one of our main roads approaching the town", Cllr Grady told Killarney Outlook.

"These are also reducing the overall carriageway width. These are currently located off park road at the entrance to friary downs, burr ridge, Arlington heights, Sáill Ardan and Coll Corran", he added.

The barriers which are positioned just off Park Road.





Its the talk of the town...

With Anne Lucey

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

AND THEY'RE OFF

Councillors approved a protocol this week which will likely see them take more foreign trips to promote Killarney and Kerry.

There was a staunch defence of councillors' trips abroad as seventeen councillors set off for Boston, Springfield and the

Netherlands in the next few weeks.

There were calls by Marie Moloney for Killarney's twinning committee in particular to be better funded.

Killarney which has more twins than it caters for is now getting headlines in places like Kendal in the UK, the meeting heard.

Mayor of Killarney Brendan Cronin has written to the council there to express his concern about a headline which reads that Kendal council is considering revoking their Killarney twining arrangement because no councillors from here are returning visits.

Calling for extra funding for such return and promotional visits, Cllr Niall O'Callaghan said he fully realised he would be 'slated' in the media for saying so.

Killarney did not get IDA visits and had to do its own promotion. The biggest golf event in the world, the Ryder Cup, was coming to nearby Adare and Kerry should capitalise on this. Some 200 million euro was being spent by golfers this year in Ireland.

'I come from a business mentality. If you give, you get,' Niall O'Callaghan said.

He referred to the pool of golf tourists outside of cities like New York which would readily respond to approaches by Killarney. Springfield Illinois delivered 120 visitors in March and again in October for ten years. But the visits died with the town council in Killarney.

And he made the point that at the moment Kerry is spending virtually nothing compared with other county councils as revealed in a table in the Irish Independent recently.

Others made the point that many councillors would not want to travel at all so the pool of those eagerly packing their bags would be narrowed anyway.

The protocol sets out order of importance in selecting who gets to go - rather than simply drawing names out of a hat. It also seeks to ensure that new twinning arrangements will be entered into only if they are beneficial for local towns.

But have we gone from a position of underpaying public representatives - ten years ago they got no payment now they get paid, lump sums and pensions and if anything have less authority - to overpaying them and are they over playing their own importance? I don't think so. It is definitely the case that in a world starved of personal contact and relying on virtual and social media connection, physical interaction has real impact.

Visits from elected officials too has greater and wider impact than say a chamber of commerce representative would.

Treating our visiting delegates better should also be on the cards and as Niall Kelleher said presenting them with small tokens is not enough.



MORE SHOPPING FOR KILLARNEY

With Killarney in dire need of more shops, birdies tell me M&S is upgrading its Killarney store with extra lines and a whole revamp in its clothing and footwear section in Park Road. This is welcome. We could do with a few more shops in Killarney and a new study on retail needs is surely needed at this stage. Other towns are certainly benefiting and anyone visiting Tralee or Castleisland will meet several Killarney people in pursuit of bits and pieces. The new road to Cork will take people out of the town as well as bring them in, it has to be remembered.

Twenty odd years ago the dearth of shopping in Killarney was highlighted and studies commissioned by the then Killarney Town Council. This led to the Killarney Outlet Centre and the Deerpark shopping area. The population has grown substantially since but if anything we have even fewer shops than back then.



TIME FOR MORE FACILITIES FOR OUTDOOR TOURISTS AS DEER BEGIN WHISTLING

The National Parks and Wildlife Service has at last taken the bull by the horns and erected highly visible no overnight camping signs at several spots.

In a year which saw scenic tourist spots crowded with vans of all shapes and sizes, this is most welcome and the NPWS is certainly upping its game locally. But we really need to think more broadly in terms of facilities for outdoor tourism. It is not acceptable for tourism agencies and indeed the national park itself to bring thousands of people to mountains and lakes and provide no toilet facilities. The Great Blasket Island is a case in point. Visited by the Taoiseach this weekend it is only this year an island that gets ten thousand visitors a year has a public toilet.

It took press reports of people going to relieve themselves in Peig's old house to get action.

The toilet is being provided under a lease arrangement with the OPW.

It is only a matter of time before the unacceptable situation at Dundag beach and the lack of toilet and waste facilities there gets unwelcome national attention.

Now that the sika deer have begun whistling, we can expect throngs of photographers shortly in the Demesne and around Muckross and Mangerton.

This is welcome shoulder season tourism. But is it not high time wooden viewing platforms were erected which would provide safe havens for photographers while giving them the best shots? These could be modelled on hunting hides, the kind we see in forests on the continent.

Every year I see traffic hazards at the entrance to Muckross House as cars line up to view the deer. There is a similar situation on the Mangerton road and down the Demesne there is complete chaos in the early morning and I have heard reports of tv crews etc all speeding around.



SOLEMN PROFESSION OF VOWS



Mapping South Kerry is a major new book which tells the story of the long history of map-making linked to that part of the county south of the River Maine. Authored by the former UCD lecturer Arnold Horner, this attractivelyproduced book reviews the many hundreds of maps which have been made showing parts of the south Kerry area over a 450-year period from the early 1570s to the present day. Over 400 illustrations complement a detailed text.

The many different types of maps included in the study range from the vast array of maps produced by the Ordnance Survey of Ireland to various less familiar types such as marine charts, maps for new roads and for telecommunications and the hundreds of maps commissioned for the landlords that once owned most of south Kerry. Some of these maps were never printed and exist only as one or two copies, and some are held in places far away from Kerry, in Dublin, Belfast and in England. A feature of the book is that this diversity of maps is now listed for the first time.

The earliest map showing south Kerry in some detail was made by Robert Lythe, an English mapmaker, in the early 1570s. He travelled through the area with a special safe conduct pass. As well as working on the land, he mapped from the sea, voyaging around the coast from Dingle and up along the Kenmare River.

The later twentieth century maps shown in the book include a marine chart of the Skelligs coastal area that was used by German submarines during World War 2, and a map of the Cahersiveen/ Valentia Island area that was printed with the Russian Cyrillic script and used by the Soviet Union military during the 1970s. The latter map is so up to date it shows the Valentia bridge opened in 1971.

The landlord maps include a large number of examples from the Lansdowne, Kenmare and Trinity College estates. The areas around Killarney, Kenmare and Cahersiveen are therefore covered

in some detail. The Kenmare estate maps include images of Killarney town in the 1720s and a map showing the site for Killarney cathedral in 1843.

A feature of the book is that it tries to show how maps record the changing landscape of south Kerry over more than four centuries. The development of the man-made environment is shown on maps, and the book offers some sense of how placenames, boundaries, fields and buildings have evolved over time. An aim of the book is to portray a hidden history of south Kerry that has received only limited attention.

The author of the book, Dr Arnold Horner, has written extensively on the history of mapping in Ireland and on the history of mapping in Kerry. He has been a frequent visitor to the Cahersiveen/ Glen areas of south Kerry over more than three decades. The present book is the outcome of work undertaken since he retired from UCD in 2011.

The book is available from most bookshops in Kerry.

Pride In Our Peatlands at Kilcummin Bog

Aguided biodiversity walk launches creative community project Pride in our Peatlands, this Saturday, September 16th, kicking off four weeks of community collaborations and events celebrating the past, present, and future of Kilcummin Bog.

Kerry artists Zoe Uí Fhaoláin Green and Emer Fallon have partnered with Kilcummin Rural Development Group to stage the walk, one of a series of events taking place as part of the artist-led project funded by Kerry County Council with a Creative Ireland grant.

Over the next four weeks the two artists will explore, with members of the Kilcummin community, the transient nature of Kilcummin's peatlands through the media of writing, sound and photography.

Further events set to take place as part of the Pride in our Peatlands project include creative sessions with local national school pupils and teachers, gathering memories from some of Kilcummin's older community members, a collaborative creative community event, and a community exhibition featuring the soundscapes, written pieces, and artwork created by members of Kilcummin Community and expressing the community's hopes and wishes for the future of the bog.

Saturday's walk is being led by Cathy Eastman and leaves from the starting point of Kilcummin Bog's Green Walking route at 1.30. It is expected to

take approximately one-and-a-half hours and walkers are asked to wear suitable clothing and footwear. Children must be accompanied by an adult.



Killarney Cycling Without Age' promises to be a great success

The joy of getting out in the fresh air and taking a trip around the National park has become a reality following the launch of Killarney Cycling Without Age.

HSE Cork Kerry Community Healthcare and Killarney Cycling Club have joined together for this exciting new initiative for residents of Killarney Community Hospital and St Columbanus Home.'Killarney Cycling Without Age' started in May 2023 following postponement of the initiative during the Covid19 pandemic. This new initiative is aimed at helping older persons and those with mobility issues to regain the experience of being out and about on a bike and to gain better access to explore their local community. Over the last four months, hospital and care home residents have been enjoying trips through Killarney town and around the jewel in Killarney's crown -Killarney National Park.

The electric-assisted trishaw was purchased by Killarney Cycling Club with the help of Cork Kerry Community Healthcare and Kerry County Council, it was then donated to Killarney Community Hospitals to ensure residents of the community hospital and care homes could regain the experience of being out on a bike in their local community. The Trishaw 'pilots' are experienced volunteer cyclists largely from Killarney Cycling Club, who take hospital and care-home residents (usually two passengers at a time) on trips when the weather conditions are suitable.

Project co-ordinator, Noel O'Connell commented on the success of the initiative, saying: "The residents love being out on the bike and meeting people. The model of Trishaw we use is called a CHAT and it certainly encourages conversations whenever we are out in the National Park or around the town. Weather can be an issue at times, but the bike has a waterproof blanket cover and canopy to help along the way. Since beginning at end of May, the initiative has been in use each week and will increase with a number of new volunteer 'pilots' who have been trained to cycle around Killarney town and the National Park. The hospital and care-home staff are very supportive of the scheme and residents are always encouraged to give it a try and for the most part, they can't wait to go again!"

The trishaw runs from Killarney Community Hospital and St. Columbanus Home, and plans to develop the scheme for other care homes are being researched.

This initiative is proudly supported by the HSE Cork Kerry Community Healthcare and the Killarney Cycling Club.

CROHANE SET TO BENEFIT from Uisce Éireann's Leakage Reduction Programme

The announcement that Uisce Éireann, working in partnership with Kerry County Council, is replacing over 1km of aged water mains in Crohane,outside Killarney has been welcomed by Cllr. Brendan Cronin.

",I am delighted to welcome and finally see this important project going ahead as I have been highlighting this repeatedly at Council meetings over the last number of years. The constant breaks on this section of pipe has had a serious impact on customers all across the Mid Kerry water supply scheme served by Barleymount

reservoir with regular water outages. There will be local road diversions as indicated by Irish Water for the duration of the contract works and I would appeal for the public's cooperation during this work.

The works, being carried out by Ward and Burke Construction Ltd, are due to commence in late September and will be completed by the end of November. Once completed customers in this area will enjoy an improved water supply with less disruption due to bursts and leakage.

Commenting on the project Portfolio Delivery Manager at Uisce Éireann, Kevin Murphy said: "To facilitate the safe delivery of the works, there will be temporary traffic lights and a short-term local road closure required. The community will be notified of this in advance. Alternative routes will be available, and diversions will be clearly sign-posted. Local and emergency access will be maintained at all times. We would like to thank customers in advance for their cooperation and patience while we complete these essential works."

"These works are part of a significant investment programme by Uisce Éireann to improve the water network across the Kingdom, prioritising investment where it is needed most enabling these communities to thrive."

Areas of work will be limited to short sections to minimise the impact on customers. Temporary traffic lights will be in place along the R563, at Dromkerry, and will continue onto the N72, just after the Killarney Brewing and Distilling Company. For the works along the L11012, a road closure will be in place from Monday, 18 September to Friday, 6 October inclusive. The road will be closed from the Dromkerry crossroads (of the L11012 and the R563), along the road to Gortacollopa, and will end at the crossroads exiting onto the N72. Local diversions will be in place via the



N72 and R563.

The works may involve some short-term water interruptions, however, the project team will ensure that customers are given a minimum of 48 hours' notice prior to any planned disruption. The works also involve laying new water service connections from the public water main in the road to customers' property boundaries and connecting it to the customer's water supply. Where the existing service connections on the public side are lead these are being replaced.



Cllr. Brendan Cronin has welcomed the news.

Customers can phone Uisce news. Éireann on 1800 278 278 if they

have any questions about the project or check out the Water Supply Updates section of the Uisce Éireann website for regular updates.

This project is one example of how Uisce Éireann is working in partnership with Kerry County Council to reduce leaks every day. Fixing leaks can be complicated. We have over 63,000 km of water pipes underground in Ireland – enough to circle the earth one and a half times. Most leaks aren't visible, resulting in precious water being lost but we are making progress. In 2018 the rate of leakage nationally was 46%, by the end of 2022 it was 37%. We are on track to achieve a national leakage rate of 25% by the end of 2030.

GOOD PLANNING AND CONSISTENT WORK LEAD TO EXAM SUCCESS

BEGINNING

September heralds a return to school or college for thousands of young people throughout the country. It's also the beginning of an important year for those facing into state or college exams. So, whether you have a public or an in-house exam at the end of the academic year, the key to success is good planning and a consistent approach to study. Set realistic target grades in each subject or module. A clear aim will focus and motive you. Achieve your goals by efficiently managing your time, your study and your personal fitness.

TIME MANAGEMENT

Time management means establishing a regular and disciplined study routine. Commit to a number of hours study each night. At the end of a short period, such as a week, review the quality of your work. Medium term planning involves the completion of a certain amount of work over a longer period, such as a school term. The long-term plan is to be totally prepared for the end of year exam.

REVIEW

Review your progress regularly. The first term is primarily utilised to complete course work. Your immediate objective is doing nightly homework of a high standard. Develop the habit of revision as early in the year as possible. Start to organise your copies of past exam papers. Begin to consider how the exam is structured. Become familiar with the format and layout of each paper, the style of question asked and the topics examined. Know how the marks are allocated and how much time should be spent on each question.

DIARY

Use a conventional or electronic homework diary to record homework assignments. Develop your own study plan, but prioritise, with deadlines in mind. An efficient system is to follow the subject timetable for the following day's classes, which will give you variety each night, keep you working to deadlines and provide a safeguard against beginning with your favourite subject each night and relegating a less favoured subject until last. Commit yourself to about four hours work each night, to include homework and a little revision, if time permits. Work in two-hour sessions and take a half hour break between the two sittings. In an exam year, Friday night must be included in the study schedule. Do six- or seven-hours study over Saturday and Sunday, mainly consisting of review and revision.

REVISION

Revise only when you have completed your

homework assignments. Try to include all your subjects in your weekly revision plan. Revise in small manageable self-contained units. Revision is effective only if you understand and can write down what you have revised.

REWARD SYSTEM

Study and revision can become tedious. So, stay focussed by establishing a reward system to reinforce your progress and to maintain your momentum. Exam success is your greatest motivator, but short-term rewards give you an immediate sense of purpose. Identify the 'time thieves' - that is, where time is being wasted early in the year and eliminate them by efficient time management.

WORK ENVIRONMENT

Good working conditions are vital aids to effective study. A comfortable private study environment at home is essential. Study on your own, if possible, in a room which is peaceful and quiet. A table and a hardback chair are basic requirements. Make sure the heating and the lighting in the room is satisfactory. Don't distract yourself by playing music in the background or by wearing earphones. Organise your books and materials before you begin each study session to avoid having to leave the room.

SCHOOL WORK

At school, listen actively in class. Participate in class by asking questions, by showing enthusiasm and by helping to create a studious class atmosphere. It goes without saying that the best information is available at school. So, attend all your classes punctually and be determined to learn.

MATERIALS

Organise your practical materials, such as calculator, books, writing pads, etc. Clear, comprehensible and well-documented notes are an invaluable organisational aid. Ensure that your handwriting is legible, that your diagrams are detailed and intelligible and that your presentation is neat. If you are filing material on your desktop or laptop computer organise it carefully for easy access.

CONCENTRATION

Concentration is a by-product of routine and organisation. By arranging it for a set time each day you reinforce your commitment to your study. The more focussed you are on your study and the more determined you are to do well, the more your concentration will improve. To aid your concentration during study, develop the habit of doing mild forms of exercise perhaps a short breathing exercise, or simply close your eyes to allow your mind and body to relax for a few moments.

POSITIVE ATTITUDE

Concentration is considerably aided by a positive attitude, so have confidence in your ability to perform well in your exam. Always keep a good thought about yourself and be success orientated. Self-confidence and positive thinking lead to success. Be single minded about your objectives. Keep an eye on your personal targets and avoid mental fatigue by sensible use of recreation and leisure. With an organised and disciplined approach to your study you will do very well in your exam. Have a good and successful year.


Further investment was made through the Community Enhancement Programme with an additional bench and a recycled plastic table.



GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCES €1.5M INCREASE IN FUNDING to Kerry County Council in 2024

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, Darragh O'Brien TD has announced a \in 75.4m increase in Local Property Tax (LPT) baseline funding to Local Authorities - bringing the total to \notin 428.4m in 2024 – following a review of how the money is allocated.

As part of this review, Kerry County Council will now receive an additional €1.5m in funding in 2024. This will see the

local authority's baseline LPT funding increase by 10.8 % from $\leq 13,776,761$ this year to $\leq 15,276,761$ next year. Every local authority receives a minimum ('baseline') amount of funding from the Local Property Tax, supplemented by funding from the exchequer where a local authority's LPT income is lower than its baseline. This baseline funding is essential and recognises the



essential role played by local authorities, not only in delivering a broad range of services day-to-day, but also in successfully leading the local response to emergency situations; such as sector's establishment of Community Call during Covid-19, and more recently the community response to support the Ukrainian crisis.





POLITICAL VIEW

Deputy Michael Healy Rae TD has said that Agriculture Charlie McConalogue has failed Irish farmers when negotiating with the EU on extending Ireland's derogation from parts of the nitrates directive.

As a result, up to as many as four thousand farmers will be obliged to cull their herds following the Government's failure to get an extension to the derogation.

"When the January 2026 cut off deadline kicks in many farmers will be obliged to cull their herds. In fact, many farmers will have to cut back from 3 cows per hectare to 2 cows per hectare making many farms financially less viable. While others will have to take on the expensive option of finding more land"

Ireland's current derogation is due to expire on January 1, 2026, with the derogation limit due to reduce to 220kg/ha from 250kg/ha on January 1, 2024, in certain areas.

Negotiations had been ongoing, but the European Commission indicated on Wednesday that Ireland's nitrates derogation limits will be cut to the lower level.

Agriculture Minister has failed Irish farmers

"The Minister has simply failed Irish farmers on the most important stage of all. He left the EU Commissioner for the Environment, Mr Virginijus Sinkevičius simply brush him aside and as a result by not reviewing the decision diary farmers will have to reduce their herd sizes within the next four months or spend hundreds of thousands looking for land scrambling to comply with the new rules, which are set to change on January 1.

"Farmers have had many bad days but under this Government, it has been body blow after body blow. The most disappointing aspect of the whole thing is that no regard was taken for the measures farmers have already taken to improve water quality." Deputy Michael Healy Rae concluded.

ROAD SAFETY EDUCATION LACK OF STUDENT **FOR SCHOOLS** would be welcomed

Media reports that the Minister for Education, Norma Foley is considering the introduction of road safety classes to the Leaving Certificate curriculum, have been warmly welcomed by her Kerry Fianna Fáil colleague, Councillor Michael Cahill. The Rossbeigh man has been highlighting the need for this intervention for some time now, to ensure our young drivers are educated on the dangers of the road.

"It only makes sense that our young people are educated on road safety in the school environment and at the time that they themselves are anxious to become drivers. A professional syllabus around the Driver's Theory Test and Road Safety in general, would be a major step forward in teaching life skills to our population. To date, too many of us have picked up driving habits from friends etc, and to be honest, such sources can be suspect" said Councillor Cahill.

"A professionally drawn up course of Road Safety, to include the Driver's Theory Test would ensure bad habits could be avoided. The carnage on our roads is unacceptable and every possible avenue must be explored to put an end to the grief and suffering caused by it" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I have stated in the past that a car or any type of vehicle is like a loaded gun if not respected or handled properly" added Councillor Cahill.

ACCOMMODATION A HUGE DILEMMA

Labour Councillor Marie Moloney is calling on Minister Harris to address the lack of Student accommodation without delay and in the long-term as a Government to invest in the provision of adequate student accommodation. As many of the first-year college students move on to the next chapter in their lives, they are faced with a major problem of not being able to source accommodation for their chosen college. Many are distraught and worried as college starts next week and they still have not found accommodation. Many are now faced with a huge dilemma, to drop out or to defer.

This is totally unacceptable as not enough student accommodation is being provided. It is daunting enough for first year students in particular entering college without the worry of where they are going to stay. One

student I know of has booked into a hotel in the hope of finding somewhere to stay for the year, others are bunking in with their colleagues on air matrasses while some are simply deferring their course. Parents and students alike are very worried and concerned about this issue.

I would call on Minister Harris to address this problem without delay and in the long-term as a Government to invest in the provision of adequate student accommodation.

Tommy Griffin is married with three young children and currently works as Parliamentary Assistant to Brendan Griffin TD, a position he has served in since 2011. Tommy is a well-known volunteer and community activist in his locality and is heavily involved in organisations including Castlemaine Events Committee, Happy Valley Childcare Committee, Keel Community Council and Keel Community Alert. He has also acquired a qualification in Local Government Studies from the Institute of Public Administration.

Tommy's first electoral outing was in 2019, when he

contested the local election in the Corca Dhuibhne Electoral Area. On that occasion, he polled the third highest first preference vote, but ultimately missed out on a seat on Kerry County Council by just 56 votes after the last count. Despite the disappointment of coming so close, Tommy said his first election was a great showing, with over 1,250 first preferences, and was a really valuable learning experience and launching pad for the next election.

He said his current job has enabled him to directly help thousands of constituents over the years, while also acquiring vast experience in all matters of political activity, including regular County Council related matters. Tommy said he wants to continue helping people and putting his experience to use after Deputy Brendan Griffin leaves politics at the next general election.

Tommy payed tribute to party collegue Cllr. Seamus Cosai Fitzgerald who has decided not to contest next year's election, saying he has been a very hard working and effective representative for the people of Corca Dhuibhne over the last five Council terms.



CHANGING WITH THE SEASONS



If you are experiencing any eye pain or discomfort, or you suspect you have a corneal abrasion, you should always consult your optometrist for advice.

What causes a corneal abrasion?

A corneal abrasion normally happens after an accident or injury to the front of the eye. They are often caused by fingernails, or an accident in the home or while gardening.

What are the symptoms of a corneal abrasion?

There are several symptoms associated with corneal abrasion, and you may only experience a few, but they can include:

• Pain, which may feel worse when you open or close your eye. A feeling that there is something in your eye or irritation

• Your eyes watering far more than usual

Redness

Sensitivity to light

• Blurred vision or loss of vision • A headache

How long does it take to heal? Corneal abrasions will normally heal completely within 48 hours. If the abrasion is in the centre of the cornea, your vision may be slightly blurred. It is also normal that your eye will be a little red and you may find bright lights uncomfortable until the abrasion has healed.

Treatment You may be given lubricating

drops to make your eye feel more comfortable and help to keep it moist.

The following may also help: Over-the-counter painkillers such

as paracetamol will help with the pain

Avoid rubbing or touching your eye as this may make the abrasion worse or slow down the rate of healing

Wearing sunglasses may help if you are sensitive to light


If you wear contact lenses, you should not wear them until the corneal abrasion has completely healed. Your optometrist will be able to tell you when you can wear your lenses again

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS SENIOR FINAL

Dingle1-9 Kenmare Shamrocks 0-11 Heartbreak for Kenmare, and you'd have to have sympathy with their second defeat in two years and fourth in six years in this final. Seanie O'Shea deserves to win one and I hope he does one day. But you'd need an even harder heart not to be pleased for Dingle. They have been setting the standard as a club for a long time without too much tangible rewards for it. No offence to West Kerry championships, but they have been knocking at County and Senior Club Championships only to run into that great Crokes team or a superpower East Kerry.

They were a little bit lucky to get away with this one in the end. Kenmare played slightly the better football and should maybe have closed it out late on when ahead, but Dingle's experience told at the crucial stage. To be critical, I would say that neither team performed to same level as last weekend's impressive triumphs, but I suspect that the heavy, dead heat didn't help matters either. Dingle were reliant on the Geaney's for scores (Paul, Dylan, and Conor shared 0-9 equally), with Tom O'Sullivan less influential and Mark O'Connor playing well but with a few obvious signs of rust, while Sean had 0-9 for Kenmare and Stephen the other 0-2. David Hallissey, James McCarthy, and David Ciuciu gave the battle everything.

Dingle made the better start (they were probably strong favourites going into this) but Kenmare really won hearts and minds by really lifting their game after Dylan Geaney's goal left them facing a deficit of 1-4 to 0-2 early on. They almost got a slightly goal through David Ciuciu's misplaced point effort, with Gavin Curran having to be sharp to claw it away. Shortly after the otherwise impress Conchúir Ó Súilleabháin was pickpocketed by Stephen O'Brien and Seánie sent a beauty arcing over the stranded keeper...only for it to come down off the crossbar and and out.

Kenmare looked the better side and in control at the three quarter mark, but maybe afforded Dingle too much space as they tried to hold rather than build on that lead and could only muster one further point. It was all about the Geaney clan late on after Seánie was somewhat harshly called for a shoulder on Mikey Geaney that looked more robust than ill-intentioned. Niall Gaeney won a free duly despatched by Conor, and then Paul (once again, a masterclass, and he just clips Seán O'Shea and Micheál Burns as my Player of the Championship) sent a great ball into Dylan for a mark and the winner.

INTERMEDIATE SEMI-FINALS Milltown/Castlemaine 1-13

Killarney Legion 1-10

A tough one for Killarney Legion, but in truth they have struggled to put teams away in the championship and Milltown/Castlemaine have been very solid all through. Especially with the unfortunate absence of James O'Donoghue (he did make a late appearance but it was clearly a hopeful throw of the dice), this one wasn't quite the surprise that those who don't follow the games closely may have thought.

Will Shine kicked a good opener and played his heart out for Legion – they couldn't be faulted for effort and any stage - but Milltown were more direct and more potent. Éanna O'Connor was almost metronomic with his impeccable frees and with Cathal Moriarty also on form, they deservedly led by 0-9 to 0-6 at half-time. Legion had plenty of ball, but not enough return from it. Three of their six points had come from defenders, with Rob Leen and Cian Gammell both scoring and Podge O'Connor winning a free for Finbarr Murphy. Milltown/Castlemaine's defensive tackling was very strong - Legion either needed quick ball in before the defence set up or a target-man inside to make it stick, and simply had neither. Quick ball in sounds easy, but that big Milltown midfield diamond of Dennehy, Horan, and O'Connor drifting out makes it hard going.

Cillian Burke began to cause huge problems with his ball-carrying in the second half – he is simply strong enough to burst through tackles. His run after a good turnover led to Cathal Moriarty's goal. Legion never again could close the gap, although they did get it down to two points after Ryan O'Grady coolly slotted a great penalty (I thought the defender got a diving hand on Pádraig Lucey's goal effort but in fairness, I was a lot further away than a well-positioned ref and an alert umpire). Burke slotted a fine point himself to steady the ship and Milltown never looked like coughing up the goal that Legion needed.

Fossa 0-21 Austin Stacks 0-21 aet (Fossa win 3-2 on penalties)

There isn't much that I have left to say on David Clifford. They will need to put new superlatives in the thesaurus to keep up with him. I've seen plenty of greats. Cooper, Moynihan, and Maurice would be my Kerry pick of recent generations (you may note that one doesn't need a surname). Michael Murphy is definitely the pick of a generation for me, Conor McManus and James McCarthy just an inch behind, Lee Keegan and Cluxton (why do people not seem to think of goalkeepers as footballers in their won right?) not far away either. But this quietly smiling giant from Fossa? I have never seen anything like this. I worried that they hype might be a problem, but he's bred from different steel (and I'd say his brother wasn't going to be having any shenanigans anyway) and he has blown past the hype like he blows past defenders. If Milltown/Castlemaine are going to stop him – and I have been very impressed with their defending - I think they'll need to bring some of those dart guns they use to put elephants to sleep.

Paudie doesn't make those headlines, but Paudie can break a teams' heart in other ways. David had thirteen spectacular points but Paudie had six and won umpteen turnovers. He's quick, agile, tenacious, and he is very intelligent with the ball. I was young watching Ogie Moran in his prime, but I'm fairly sure that God didn't throw away that mould at the time when I watch Paudie in full flight.

It was point for point in the first half – I thought Stacks could have gone more for the jugular; it felt to me like they were hedging their bets between attack and containment. 0-7 apiece at the break. Fossa, with both Paudie and David just awesome, pulled four points clear. Stacks, even with that deficit, for some reason continued to keep twelve men in their own half but Fossa couldn't nail a clincher and the Tralee side gradually and impressively came back, fresh legs off the bench giving them a real surge. They got it into extra-time and I thought Fossa might have missed their chance – surely Paudie

and David had to be feeling the strain of their enormous energy expenditure by now. Stacks did have two goal chances, but couldn't take either of them – David Mannix did everything right except keep the finish down. With time almost up and Fossa a point down, absolutely everybody, Stacks and Fossa, was looking at one man to save Fossa's bacon. Somehow.... he did, curling over off his left and over.Yerra, I think he accidentally turned everyones' water bottles into wine with a wave of his hand at the same time, but we'll say nothing to the Vatican just yet. It was that good a score. Like I said, I have simply never seen anything like it.

That brought it down to penalties. I don't like them – I hate how penalties feel like such a personal responsibility on lads – but I don't see other options. Forget replays – the schedule is already far, far too crowded for my liking and I actually think it's literally dangerous at this stage.

Stacks did nothing wrong with theirs, but Shane O'Sullivan was the man in the hinder gap and frankly, he was as indomitable and impassable as Fossa themselves. For most of my life, Fossa were a Division Five team and a good year would see them reach the latter stages of the novice. That's not disrespecting the likes of the clinical Donald O'Sullivan, the Cronin bothers, Colin Myers, Mark Dennehy, Lorcan Daly, Kenneth Clifford, and of course the late and much loved Jimmy Falvey....those lads left impressive footpaths along a trail carved out of sporting wilderness just a generation before them. Did I think I would see one of Kerry's youngest clubs beating one of the oldest, a club with 13 senior titles and more All Ireland medals than any other? I did not, and it took some doing for people out in that parish to not only see it twenty years ago, but actually build towards it. You know, I made a small bit of a biblical reference by way of a joke a few paragraphs ago but quite honestly, there's some sort of a parable in there somewhere.

RELEGATION FINAL

St. Marys 2-14 Currow 1-9

St. Marys led by 2-8 to 0-4 at half-time with Tadhg O'Connor scoring two goals. That had them in the driving seat and they were always in control after that, with Currow getting the consolation of a late goal by Luke Fitzgerald. Currow have been in the relegation battle quite a bit in recent years and eventually the drop just couldn't be avoided. They have a good juvenile system though and, even though the Junior Premier is notoriously impossible to predict (not least because it usually covers four different county league divisions) but Currow will be very real contenders there

JUNIOR PREMIER SEMI-FINALS

Listowel Emmets 0-14 Annascaul 1-9 Listowel is the hub of North Kerry and the fact that Emmets have been struggling to impose themselves in county terms has been a key factor in the decline of North Kerry football in recent years - Kerry teams always needed North Kerry footballers, from Jack Walsh to Gus Cremins, Eamon Walsh, Eddie Dowling, Mick Finucane, Deenihan, the Kennellys, the Galvins, Enright, Fitzmaurice....you're going nowhere without lads like that. For that reason, I think the resurgence at underage by a combined North Kerry side has generated huge enthusiasm and having two North Kerry teams contest the Junior Premier is a good thing in terms of the future.

Listowel were always the better side here. They led early on, David Keane's accuracy and Bryan Sweeney's fielding on the square standing out, but an excellent Killian Falvey had them all square at the break, 0-8 apiece. Listowel took over in the second half though, and a very late James Ashe goal made it sound a closer contest than it actually was.

Ballymac 2-12 Ardfert 1-10

I was genuinely curious about this one. Of course Ballymac were favourites - they didn't just play in Division One this year; they were one of the main contenders for it and they have looked in great form all through this championship. Truthfully, they will go into the final asc favourites as well. I gave Ardfert a strong chance here because Ardfert have actually been playing very good football in the past two years (they could, genuinely, have beaten Fossa last year if they are a bit more accurate with their chances). Ballymac led by 1-7 to 1-5 at half-time but Aidan Breen's 40th minute penalty looked to have put it to bed against an Ardfert side who were missing Rob Monahan and John Egan and had Eoghan McElligott coming off the bench while Daithí Griffin had to depart the scene early enough in the first half. Ballymac should really have closed it out at that stage but left numerous chances after them. A full strength Ardfert might have had something to say about that, but they just hadn't the depth on this particular day to get over the line.

They led 0-6 to 0-0 but Sneem/Derrynane, with Ronan Hussey very much to the fore, got it back to 0-6 to 0-2 by half-time. An impressive third quarter saw them trim it back to two points but a very good pass by William Galvin set up Conor O'Leary for a goal and Reenard's scoring power saw it out.

Tarbert 2-12 Beale 0-13

I wasn't at it but my good friend Damien Stack (who knows his stuff better than I do - but don't let him know that I said that) noted that Tarbert took 14 out of 18 chances while Beale could only take 13 from 21. Stats don't tell the story of a game – too many people make that mistake, having overlooked the value of stat analysis for too long - they inform it. Beale having more chances usually (again, caution - sometimes a shooter just has a bad day) means that their shooters were under greater defensive pressure or making poorer shot selections. This was the former, with Tarbert's defence working very hard. Shea |McDonnell's goal put Tarbert in front. The impressive Robert Stack (I'll be watching out for him in the County Championship) brought Beale back into it, 1-7 to 0-8 at half-time. Michael Heaphy added a second goal for Tarbert after forty minutes. Beale kept going but a strong finish sees Tarbert advance to the final against Reenard.

KERRY MASTERS FACE TYRONE IN ALL IRELAND FINAL

Dr. Mick Loftus Cup Final: Kerry v Tyrone, Saturday September 16th, 4.00pm in St. Brigids Kiltoom, Co. Roscommon

Masters football growing has been exponentially in popularity in the past couple of years, with Tyrone and Dublin in particular setting new standards for the game.; Kerry entered a team last year and made it all the way to the last four. That was a high bar to set for this year but Kerry set out their stall early and a strong campaign saw them reach the knockout stages, where they saw off Derry and Galway to set up a final against reigning champions Tyrone in Roscommon this Saturday evening.

Tyrone easily topped the league table with 12 points from six games. Kerry, Dublin, Galway, and Derry all finished on ten points each. An open draw put Galway and Dublin straight through to semi-finals, while Kerry and Derry were drawn to play each other in a quarterfinal, with Kerry prevailing by a single point in a thriller.

That pitted them against a fancied Galway in the semi-final, with Kerry producing a majestic second half display to win by 0-12 to 0-7 and qualify to face the Red Hand.

Tyrone will go into this one as the hottest of favourites. They have scored an incredible 15-97 in seven games and conceded the grand total of 1-42. Kerry have scored a mere 8-62 and shipped 2-49 in eight games by comparison. Tyrone are in their fourth final in a row and looking for their third title on the trot. They are unquestionably the kingpins of masters football, whereas this is just Kerry's second year competing in the grade, having lost last year's semi-final by 0-12 to 0-10 to Dublin. Last year Dublin took Tyrone to extra-time in the final. This year Tyrone blew Dublin aside with fourteen points to spare - the same Dublin team that had eleven points in hand over Kerry when they met. They have a host of star names like Conor and Niall Gormley, Ciarán Gourley, Seán Cavanagh, Stephen O'Neill, Eoin Bradley, Martin Penrose, Joe McMahon, and Fermanagh legend Marty McGrath.

That said, Kerry are not coming into this one empty-handed. The likes of Aidan O'Mahony, William Kirby, team captain Don Murphy, and Fergus McAuliffe won't be unknown names to the Tyrone players either and Kerry have showed admirable steel and commitment throughout all their games, while the likes of Terry O'Sullivan and John O'Connor have been lighting up the scoreboards in the absence of the injured Frank Rahilly, who had starred for Kerry in earlier games. It'll be an uphill battle, but this Kerry team won't shy away from a battle.

SOCCER END OF THE ROAD LOOMS FOR **KENNY**

France 2 Ireland 0

Look, I'm not going to be twisting the knife when they are already down and out. There were no surprises here. Don't mind hoping for a draw; once Evan Ferguson was out, I'd have been quite impressed with a 1-0 defeat. We've had Irish media blathering about every young Irish goalscorer as the next Robbie Keane since.... well, since Robbie Keane stopped playing for the FAI and started taking easy handouts after their managerial contract shambles instead. Except that with Ferguson, actual soccer media internationally, with no parochial bias, reckon this is the real deal. Would he have scraped a goal to put France on the back foot?

No. We have a solid keeper (ignore the nonsense about a weakness at long range shots being currently bandied about) and plenty of backup, a very good defence with plenty of options who can actually play the ball (also Shane Duffy, but he brings other vital attributes to the table so that's okay)and....that's about it. Alan Browne really surprised me, not just well up for a battle (passion was never our problem) but actually a good enough player to be able to bring one. Much has been made of a player from England's fourth tier being brought on for Ireland, as if that's what symbolises our shortcomings in player development, but Wrexham's James

McClean did very well after the unfortunate Stevens had a nightmare. Good defence, weak attack, no midfield presence worth speaking of. Josh Cullen is a workhorse and a dog soldier, a lot more Nicky Butt than Paul Scholes, and takes responsibility. I like him, I rate him, but that extra yard of pace, that finesse with the first touch, that positional sense, vision....it's just not there. He'll never let you down, but he'll never turn a game at this kind of level. Molomby and Knight? Equally hard-working, but they are like boxers punching granite. France basically shrugged them off and that left Ireland with no foothold to build on in midfield. None. We had one chance and Ogbene's header was never really going to get in. Ogbene was good but he'll never score enough. I thought Adam Idah, whom I've always considered very overrated because of his pace, far exceeded my expectations and put in a huge but thankless shift. Kenny does have Ireland trying to play football as opposed to hopeful punts into the box, but that's how we end up anyway against a team like France. No shame in it. This always felt like an English First Division team against Champions League contenders and that's how it panned out. Valiant last minute defending kept the score down, and that's about the only positive thing that can be said.

Netherlands 2 Ireland 1

This one hurt an awful lot more. I think there was general acceptance that we weren't going to get anything from France. A perfect start by Ireland gave us hope here, though, and they do say that it's the hope that kills you. Chiedozie Ogbene should have done better with the very first attack of the game but was blocked for a corner. But Ireland got a lucky break (the first in about a year) when James McClean's inswinging corner came off Van Dijk's arm. Up stepped Adam Idah and, critical though I have been of his finishing ability, his penalty was perfect. I liked Idah here, he gave Van Dijk plenty of it. No harm in that controlled aggression. There was some fairly uncontrolled aggression around as well, on both sides. I thought McClean could have been booked - to me, that one was late enough to deserve a caution. Stephen Kenny actually deserves a lot of praise here, his game plan was obviously to press the Dutch up close when they played out from the back and they didn't like it.

Unfortunately, while the individual defenders were doing well, collectively they didn't have that sense of cohesion and were always a small bit out of sync. It took just quarter of an hour, during which time Ireland were actually the better side, for the Dutch to equalise. Duffy was caught behind the defensive line, which allowed Dumphries to run clear and forced Bazunu to dive in an attempt to block. Clear penalty, nothing Bazunu could have done about it, and the excellent Gapko slotted it home.

From there on, the Dutch grew in confidence and Ireland visibly wilted. Again, we had trierrs rather than doers in midfield and once the Dutch started containing that, Idah and Ogbene had less and less service. They never stopped trying; I don't know can the same be said about all the Irish players. Quite simply, we looked a defeated team even taking the field in the second half. I'd have made changes at that point. I think the tide had turned, though, and wasn't going to turn our way again no matter what.



LOOKING AFTER YOUR

HOUSE PLANTS

Houseplants come in all shapes and sizes. Many are grown for their foliage and others are grown for their flowers. Most houseplants will need regular watering and feeding but a lot of them don't require much attention.

The majority of house plants like bright light, but it is important to avoid direct sunlight though glass as this can scorch the foliage. During wintertime try to keep house plants in a room where the temperature is the same most of the time rather than going from one extreme to the other.

When watering remember to mist the foliage of tropical house plants rather than overwatering. During winter gradually reduce water and feeding except when plants are flowering or growing vigorously.




