



The matriarch of an incredibly entrepreneurial family that has made an enormous contribution to business and community life in Killarney over many years has been awarded the highest honour the town can bestow.

Margaret O'Donoghue of the landmark Gleneagle INEC Arena was inducted into the Order of Inisfallen by Cairde Chill Áirne at a reception in the historic Muckross House in Killarney National Park on Monday evening.

The award was created in 2005 to allow Killarney to recognise, celebrate and say thank you to a select number of people who have, in a variety of different ways, brought good to Killarney's name and image around the country and around the world.

Margaret follows in the footsteps of very distinguished previous recipients including former Taoiseach Enda Kenny, international industrialist Isolde Liebherr, Hollywood A-lister Michael Fassbender and entertainer Daniel O'Donnell.

She becomes the first lady to receive the honour since 2018 when the recipient was Camilla, then Duchess of Cornwall and now the Queen of England.

Margaret and her late husband, Maurice, who passed away in 2001, transformed an eightbed guesthouse into the incredibly successful entertainment complex that is now the Gleneagle INEC Arena which has attracted hundreds of thousands of visitors to the town over the years.

They were the guiding hands in the push to develop The Brehon Hotel, The Gleneagle Apartments and Scott's Hotel as well as top class indoor and outdoor sports and leisure facilities and a concert band and the O'Donoghue family has been to the forefront of several other major developments which have been of huge benefit to Killarney, to Kerry and to Ireland.

The Order of Innisfallen award – a joint initiative between Kerry County Council and Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce – was presented to Margaret by Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Brendan Cronin.

"Margaret has been the guiding hand in all that the family has achieved and, given her enormous contribution over so many years, it is wonderful that she is being officially recognised with this very

"They were a couple with a dream, a couple with a vision and a couple with get-up-andgo determination to pick up the ball and start running and running and running.

"Margaret, Maurice and their family's achievements with the creation and building and expansion of their enterprises over the last 59 years is nothing short of monumental," she said

Margaret said it was an honour to accept the Order of Innisfallen on behalf of both herself and the late Maurice and, indeed, their seven children, Patrick, Maurice, John, Eamonn, Áine, Shelly and Aoife.

This Competition is one of the Rotary Clubs longest running youth projects and it rewards young people with clear leadership potential.

Killarney, David Clifford has rowed in behind Vision Sports Ireland for the launch of a Vision Impaired Physical Education Teaching Guide. The Guide has been developed to give readers the skills and confidence to teach students who are blind or vision impaired by equipping them with knowledge, skills, and considerations to make PE more inclusive for all; ensuring students with a vision impairment have equal access to participate in physical education activities.

Sean Poland, Education and Training Coordinator with Vision Sports Ireland, stated "We believe in the power of physical activity and its ability to transform lives, this vision was shared with our expert steering group who have a vast wealth of knowledge and years of experience in the area of Inclusive Physical Education. We came together to develop this resource to address the gap in Physical Education levels of children with a vision impairment in Ireland, where only 1 in 3 children with a vision impairment are engaging in the recommended amount of PE time in school. I believe this resource will help equip PE teachers across the country with useful techniques and considerations for providing an optimum experience for students with a vision impairment in their class. This guide is a testament to our commitment to breaking down barriers and providing meaningful opportunities for everyone to engage in physical activity".

The PE resource is a welcome addition to the offerings from Vision Sports Ireland, following on from the Vision Impaired Rugby Coaching Guide which was launched in May 2023. This toolkit marks a culmination of work from the PE Steering Group, made up of subject matter experts.

David Clifford, commented on the launch "I was thrilled to lend my voice to the launch of such a vital resource. As a PE teacher myself, I know the importance of having such toolkits available and the impact it will have on students with vision impairments across the country. SANTA CLAUS IS NOT **DELIVERING FOR FINE GAEL THIS** CHRISTMAS - BUT A WEEK IS A LONG TIME IN POLITICS

Rumours had been swirling recently that Seán Kelly was the most likely candidate for the Dail for Fine Gael in Kerry. But Santa Claus will not be delivering for Fine Gael just yet.



Seán has turned down the approach and the

reasons he gives are interesting.

Some 70 per cent of legislation now comes from Brussels, he told Jerry O'Sullivan on Radio Kerry. For much of its time, the Dail is transposing what's already decided in Europe. In that respect he feels he can be more effective for Kerry if he remains in Europe.

(It is a nice put down to those who like to remind Kelly that he failed to get elected to Kerry County Council).

Seán also said he would have to 'start from scratch' to learn the ropes of Dail representation, never having been a councillor.

This column regularly laments the inability of our Dail and Seanad people to secure better resources for Kerry. So, would we be better off in future when it comes to roads, new courts buildings, provision of housing, not to mention the thousands of Ukrainian refugees in tourist accommodation in Killarney, to sound Seán Kelly to see if he could maybe use European legislation for better services? Meanwhile, the next Dail and council elections are all to play for, once again. The shine seems to be going off the Shinners. Suddenly they don't look the sure bet they

Their appeal will delay the construction of much needed housing, of course, and this is a pity. But the situation with the treatment plant and the sewer systems needs to be addressed. For years all development in Kenmare has been halted for the same reason: sewerage and water. Coincidentally it is a Kenmare company which is behind the 249 new residential units now under appeal. In principle, the anglers have no objection to more housing for Killarney, Laune Anglers' honorary secretary Danny Joy of Killorglin said.

However, the application would result in 'significant increase in the annual daily load into the Killarney Town Sewage Treatment system and network,' he said.

He referred to the recent water quality report which found the River Laune was one of the two worst rivers in the country and the Folly stream which takes treated water from the plant in Ross Road was the cause.

'Having regard to Killarney's reliance on tourism and in particular recreational activities this is a catastrophic situation,' the anglers said. They are right.

The planning appeal case is due to be decided by An Bord Pleanala in early April. The decision will be of huge interest in Killarnev.



THE SAGA OF THE ANNALS - TIME TO **PURSUE THEM AGAIN**

Several European countries are now in pursuit of the British Museum and other institutions for their native treasures. The most famous repatriation row is over the Elgin Marbles of Greece and it has hotted into a major dispute between the UK and Greece. There is also an issue between Italy and Germany over a Roman statue known as the Discobolus which was much loved by Adolf Hitler and was sold to his reaime.


The statue had been 'returned' to Italy by US troops after the war. A marble base remained in the museum in Munich. Italy's national museum in Rome wrote looking for the base. It got a reply saying Germany had in fact legitimately purchased the Discobolus and its base in the first place. Positions have been taken and tempers have flared.

The 'we bought it', that is, acquired it legitimately, excuse is the one the Bodleian Library in Oxford used when I asked them about the return of the Annals of Inisfallen to this town. But the Bodleian also said they would look at repatriation. And I felt there was a chink of light. Councillor Niall Kelleher made huge efforts too.

'The Bodleian Libraries have not been approached by the Irish Government nor the Government's Arts and Heritage Minister with a request to have the Annals returned to Ireland,' is what the Oxford museum told me in early 2022.

The gold luna from Mangerton is another 'legitimately' acquired object sitting in the British Museum. I went after this too.

Unfortunately, I have heard nothing since. I feel strongly we should be making a better effort to get both the annals and the luna returned to their native Killarney. Now that there is renewed momentum from other countries on repatriation, could our TDs and maybe our important MEP join in on this?

WINTER SUNDAY SOLSTICE ON THE PAPS OF ANÚ **IN MEMORY OF JOHNNY 'THE ROCK' O'BRIEN**

A call from our ancient ancestors - as our astronomical calendar gets closer to the Winter Solstice - the shortest day of the year - this year the ancient trek takes place on Saturday morning 23rd, December, 2023, departing at 6.45 am, in aid of Kerry Hospice Foundation Palliative Care.

Having a Saturday Solstice will allow people to travel and have time to savour the day, marking the first day of the Christmas holidays. This year the charity walk will be in memory of Johnny 'the rock' O'Brien, who sadly passed away on St. Stephen's Day, 2022. Johnny was the heart and soul of Glenflesk, a caring farmer and wonderful neighbour who lived his life on his own terms. Waving to everyone who passed his house, with a return beep from lorries and locals. He tended to his animals with such compassion, and made sure they were safe during storms and floods.

Carpooling is encouraged parking at the Kerry Way Inn, Glenflesk, and with the kind permission of local landowners, the walk departs at Garries Bridge - the first bridge after St Agatha's Church, Glenflesk, Meeting at

6.45am.

The long walk in darkness to the summit, has two strenuous inclines, leading to the Western Pap at 690 Metres. At approximately 8.45am sunrise and craic begin, with Glenflesks finest musicians Derry and Rosie Healy, setting the pace for a Kerry polka set, followed by a rendition of 'For these are my Mountains' Johnny 'the Rock' O'Briens favourite song. Mountaineer Donie Mulcahy and crew will guide the walker to and from the summit.

These ancient sacred summits, 'The Paps of Anú', resemble a pair of breast shaped hills known as 'The Paps' in the Derry Na Saggart Mountains close to the Cork Kerry border. The Paps have long been associated with mythology, mysticism and majesty. The Goddess Anú represents all that is earthly, fertile, abundant and protective.

Donations will be collected on the morning of the walk. It is compulsory to wear a head torch, a level of fitness is required. Proper walking boots and rain gear is advised. Guides will be on duty for gear check before departure.

n October, Samaritans Ireland released its annual Impact Report and it showed that volunteers in Kerry Samaritans played a major in supporting the nation's mental health last year as figures show calls to the helpline rose.

Samaritans is the only 24-hour emotional support helpline that covers the island of Ireland. Volunteers from Kerry are among the 2,000 strong volunteers who answer the freephone number 116 123 and email jo@ samaritans.ie. They answered over half a million calls for help last year – that's approximately 1,000 calls a day last year, up 10pc on 2021. The 2022 Impact Report showed:

Over half a million calls were answered across Ireland (400,000 in Rol and 100,000 in NI).

The most frequently raised concerns related to mental health or illness (42%), isolation and loneliness (34%), family (30%), relationship problems (20%). (Multiple issues can be raised in one call)

A call needing emotional support lasted an average 26 minutes.

Volunteer Branch Director of Kerry Samaritans, Jan Rice: "The rise in calls answered by volunteers shows the continued need for our services and

the impact they are making in providing emotional support to those in distress. We are focused on being there when people need us most. "It has been a challenging time, but we are proud to say that Samaritans successfully provided essential support to those in need, 24 hours a day." As the Christmas season fast approaches, Samaritans would like to remind everyone that they will be conducting a collection drive at church gates all across the county on the 24th and 25th of December. Any donations are welcome, and for those who don't carry around change anymore, they will have QR codes that will bring them to Samaritans online donation page.

Lastly, branch director, Jan Rice, added: "The 21st of December is a special time of year for Samaritans as the Longest Night of the year is marked when public buildings, landmarks, and businesses light up green to remind everyone that our volunteers are always there to listen, especially on the darkest days."

5 TIPS TO KEEP YOU FIRE SAFE THIS FESTIVE PERIOD:

Have a working smoke alarm fitted.

The top advice from NDFEM is to have at least one smoke alarm fitted on every level of your home, ensure you can hear them from your bedrooms, test them weekly and never borrow batteries from your smoke alarms. In under three minutes you could die from smoke inhalation and the sound of a smoke alarm is the sound that could save your life!

Stay vigilant if using a stove or open fire.

Keep Christmas cards and decorations away from stoves and open fires. Chimney fires remain the top cause of fire in Ireland. In 2022, over 1600 chimney fires were attended by fire services. A loud roaring noise from your fireplace would indicate that your chimney is on fire. While an open fire can give a festive feel, remember to get your chimney cleaned, keep a spark guard on and be cautious of anything that may fall from the fireplace.

Be mindful to plug out this holiday season!

During the festive period more equipment will be plugged in and electrical fire continues to be a big danger. Never overload sockets and always ensure all electrical equipment is in good working order especially if not used since last year. If Santa brings new e-scooters or e-bikes charge them in a safe place and never overnight.

Extinguish cigarettes and ash.

The biggest cause of fire fatality so far this year in Ireland has been smoking, due to leaving lit cigarettes unattended. 1 in 5 Fire Fatalities in Ireland in 2022 were from smoking materials! The NDFEM advises not to smoke in bed and to ensure that cigarettes or cigars are always fully extinguished. Dampen ashtrays with water before retiring for the night.

Call 999 or 112 in case of fire.

If a fire starts in your home, get out and get the Fire Brigade out!

The campaign also reiterates existing fire safety advice to ensure you have at least one working smoke alarm in your home and to have a plan in place with your household for what to do if a fire breaks out.

Additionally, people are being asked to check in with the elderly and more vulnerable in their community and check:

Do they have working smoke alarms? Are their escape routes clear? Are they fire safe aware?

With top scorer Braden Bell struggling with injury and Malahide 61-58 to the good heading into the final quarter, Scotts Lakers would have been forgiven for staring long down the barrel of the gun. But they refused to yield and instead made a stirring final quarter charge to eventually put the squeeze on a gallant Malahide side who twice in the second half looked like they had the winning of the game. With Bell watching from the bench it was his compatriot Terion Moss who picked up the baton. He hit 11 points in the final quarter but struck 32 overall and undoubtedly gave his best performance of the season.

But he was not on his own as Eoin Carroll continued to flourish, Jack O Sullivan came up trumps in that final period while Paul Clarke delivered at crucial moments also. And even though he was only on court for six minutes Mark O Shea's physicality was crucial in Bell's absence. Mark Sheehan also made his return from injury and Jamie O Sullivan and Oisin Spring helped keep the Lakers effort going when needed most. The win leaves the Lakers on six wins from their eight games with only the Limerick Celtics ahead of them in the standings. The Celtics sole defeat came in Killarney last month and if the curve can continue to go in an upwards direction who knows what 2024 could bring for Brian Clarkes side.

It was Malahide who sprung from the traps first with Sean Daly and Matthew Harper being particularly accurate. They helped the visitors into a 10-4 lead, with Jack O Sullivan and Moss on target. Moss was cutting to the basket with great effect but BB Chuks Mady and Daly with a three made it 15-8. Bell hit two quick baskets but Daniel Heaney alongside Mady and Matthew Harper was beginning to cause the Lakers defence problems. Eoin Carroll got his first bucket from a fast breakaway and further points from Bell made it 24-17 at the conclusion of the first guarter.

Bell and Moss set off the fireworks early in the seconds hitting nine points in just a minute. They combined for a neat Bell basket before a spectacular alley oop finish from Bell had the crowd on its feet. That helped the Lakers draw level with Malahide temporarily but Heaney, Stephen Ingle and Mady kept them 42-33 ahead despite Bell's promptings. Eoin Carroll and Moss stole in for crucial scores towards the end of the quarter and at 45-39 adrift it ensured the home side were still in the conversation.

The halftime cup of tea definitely went down easier in the Lakers dressing room as they started the second half much the brighter. Moss hit his sides first three of the evening and alongside Carroll and Bell they again drew level at 51 each. The period of ascendency continued as Paul Clarke hit seven points on the spin with Malahides sole reply being a Mady free throw. At 58-52 the Lakers looked set to take over but two things conspired to change that prediction. Bell took a charge from Heaney but came out of it limping while Clarke picked up his fourth foul. This seemed to unsettle the hosts and Christian McDonnell and Heaney picked up on that vibe to push Malahide ahead again at 61-58.

That pattern continued into the final quarter as Ingle with a three and Heaney made it 68-60. With Bell visibly struggling he had to retire to the bench but not before Moss picked up his baton. Jack O'Sullivan hit a three soon followed by Moss and Clarke baskets. The crowd too were starting to play a part, their boisterous support cajoled by MC Alan Finn, who certainly got the sixth man going. Heaney and Harper hit back but the momentum was all with the Lakers as they kept the Dublin side scoreless in the final four minutes. All the while Moss was brandishing his own box of tricks and a sublime Jack O Sullivan pass set up Clarke to help the Lakers 78-75 clear. Carroll made it a five point game while Malahide ran into team foul trouble. It meant Moss and Jack O Sullivan could seal the win from the charity stripe as the Lakers eventually ran out 84-75 winners.

Terion Moss hit a game high 32 points, Braden Bell had 19 before succumbing to injury, Eoin Carroll was impressive with 16 points, Paul Clarke scored 11 and Jack O

Sullivan 6.





EAMON HORAN RIP

I was at the O'Sullivan Cup Final last Tuesday week when a well-known Kerry GAA supporter came up to the press box at the back of the main stand to let us know that Eamon Horan had passed away. To say that it cast a pall on an otherwise thrilling match (Mounthawk took the honours and their first ever senior trophy with a really sparkling display of football) is an understatement. I only met Eamon a few times – he had left the press box before I began venturing into that hallowed territory – but I knew his name from his match reports long, long before I met him in person.

I occasionally use the research and local history facilities of the Kerry County Library to research old games and old stories (before you ask, of course I am a hit at parties with such an interesting lifestyle). I believe and have long believed that is the fabric of those stories that form the culture of Kerry, not any scorelines or titles. There were very few story-tellers of his era that could weave those stories like Eamon. He could read a game at a glance, knew the background of every player and team, and most of all, his pen dripped with occasional humour but never malice. An under-estimated trait nowadays, when vitriol is used to generate clicks. The likes of Elon Musk and Kim Kardashian are the arbiters of modern journalism; it serves neither the writer nor the reader.

The old issues of the Kerry Sentinel, Kerry Weekly Reporter, Kerry News, or the early days of the Kerryman are genuinely fascinating to read. The journalists used pseudonyms – you might think it a throwback to the days when it was a genuinely dangerous profession, particularly politically, but remember the troubled times of the early half of that century in Ireland. P.J. Devlin, a personal friend of both Michael Cusack and Arthur Griffith, was the first great GAA journalist and the man who set the template for all others. D. P. Moran would also touch strongly on the GAA in his writings (mostly for An Claidhaimh Solais) but he was more polemic than analyst and his idea of 'pro-Irish', in my opinion, was much more 'antieverything else'. Paddy Mehigan, 'Carbery' or 'Pato' soon followed, and he remains one of the giants. 'P.F.', Tralee's Padraig Foley (nephew of Kerryman founder Maurice Griffin), was the main sportswriter for the Kerryman back in the early half of the 20th century (from 1923 to 1966) and his word was law. The paper came out on Thursdays and Con Houlihan, himself one of our greatest storytellers (he could insert a paragraph about cutting turf into an All Ireland Final report, and readers rightly loved him for it) famously quoted one reader saying irritably after a game "Sure, how do I know how I feel about it until I read P.F.'s report on Thursday?" My favourite of all his writings, even better than his famous 'Kerry's Football Story' published in 1945, is his recount of Kerry's famous 1926 trip to the United States - it reads as funny now and must have been hilarious back then.

Eamon started with the Kerryman in 1959 and quickly established himself as chief (sometimes only) sportswriter. He never sought controversy but there was no plámás in him either and he didn't hesitate to criticise Kerry when he felt the need. The sixties and early seventies were the great age of GAA journalism, with the likes of John D. Hickey, Pádraig Puirseal, Paddy Downey, Mick Dunne, Peter Byrne, Jim O'Sullivan, famous players Paul Russell and Jack Mahon.... and, of course, Eamon Horan. There were no laptops or internet back then. They would call their match reports out to a stenographer over a phone. Time was of the essence but there was never any compromise on quality. They were welcomed into dressing rooms and knew the players personally. They were highly respected and always showed respect in their turn, but were not sparing. Tipperary famously once banned the lot of them in 1968 after they committed the appalling sin of actually naming a player who was sent off (there were no red or yellow cards back then; Weeshie Fogarty was famously the first GAA referee to use them and, because the GAA sent him no actual cards, had to cut makeshift efforts out of his daughter's copybooks). The journalists, most famously the irreverential Breandán Ó hEithir, relate funny anecdotes about the incident, but in fact Tipperary got a big surprise when the journalists, with the full backing of the newspapers, made it very clear that they were not and would never be answerable to County Boards or to Croke Park itself. It was not as funny an incident as is portrayed in official accounts on both sides.

Eamon never needed any player to tell him about the rigours of training or keeping fit. He was himself one of the greatest handballers of his era, and handball is at least as demanding as any field sport if not more so. He brought four minor All Irelands back to his native Bridge St. in Tralee and a schools title to Tralee CBS alongside Pa Laide's father Mick.

In 1977 Eamon, in collaboration with his longtime colleague and close friend John Barry. wrote "Years of Glory: The Story of Kerry's All Ireland Victories". It remains the definitive work and, like all his writing, remains immensely readable to this day. Owen McCrohan's authorised biography of Mick O'Dwyer (1990), despite being slightly hagiographic (how could it not be?) remains the definitive biography of that Kerry era for me, but Eamon Horan's account - detailed, accurate, honest, and written more from the perspective of a supporter than an analyst, was as much the authoritative version as P.F's famous 1945 book was of his era, or even Dick Fitzgerald's "How to Play Gaelic Football" in 1914 was in his time (it's included in Fr. Tom Looney's brilliant biography 'Dick Fitzgerald: King in a Kingdom of Kings'.

Mick O'Dwyer defined Kerry football for Eamon's era, both as a player and as a manager. But it was Eamon Horan who translated that into terms that I could understand, and I don't believe that I am the only one who remembers when the Kerryman was required reading in every household and, especially for us young ones, Eamon Horan's articles. I knew Kerry footballers as the burly men who arrived at the primary school with bottles of lukewarm TK lemonade to fill the heavy silver cup that meant Kerry had won the All Ireland. 'Twas the same red sticky lemonade you would get when a family member would make their Holy Communion; and had close on the same religious significance for many people.

In fact, Eamon Horan's commentary in print had pretty much the same aura as the catholic creed in Ireland back then. You could demur with it but never disagree.

I can't say that I knew him personally. I didn't need to; he introduced himself on a weekly basis in print. May he rest in eternal peace.

RTE SPORTS PERSONALITY OF THE YEAR

For me, and I suspect most people, it's more of a blatant bit of self-promotion than anything more sustainable. That's not me having a dig; I actually think RTE provide fantastic sports coverage, given their resources. That's not denying wastage - and quite a lot of it, with those chickens swooping home to roost in a big year this year, but sports-wise they are excellent. Every now and again you hear people contrasting RTE with BBC coverage. Sorry, now, but that's very much like comparing Kerry FC to Manchester City. RTE have fallen a bit into the jokey 'let's provoke-a-controversy-for-thecraic' mode that has been the bane of modern sports broadcasting too much for my liking but generates clicks without risking provoking

original thought. I've watched Sky and a lot of the US-based commercial sports coverage and I really love that mute button. But most of RTE's sports coverage, especially international events (soccer is more soap opera and rugby is developing too many 'personalities' and not enough actual analysis), is excellent. They do their research; they know their stuff, and they share it. No histrionics and no bluff. I am a big admirer.

I'm always suspicious of 'Personality' awards. Exactly what is the metric here? Success? Popularity? International standing? Brand marketability? The answer currently seems to be 'all of the above'. I'm also suspicious of this 'independent panel of expert judges' although it definitely beats a popular vote.

Regardless, this year's candidates, announced tomorrow night, are:

Johnny Sexton – The 2018 winner retired this year after a glittering career, having captained Ireland to a number one spot in world rankings and, much more significantly, a Grand Slam. However, losing the Champions Cup Final to La Rochelle and a World Cup quarter-final (again)...I wouldn't call this his best year. To be honest, I'd have nominated Bundee Aki, whose rejuvenation during the World Cup was genuinely astonishing.

Katie McCabe – inspirational captain as Ireland reached their first ever World Cup and then won promotion in Europe with ease, not least because of her dynamic midfield drive. A key player as Arsenal won the League and reached a European semi-final. Ballon d'Or nominee. Simply phenomenal.

Katie Taylor – Three time winner and with very good reason. Moved up a weight this year, lost to Chantelle Cameron in a genuine thriller, and won the rematch in another genuinely awesome display (a lot of credit to Cameron as well). I suspect that past glories will come against her, but this really is one of Ireland's greatest sporting figures ever.

Rhys McClenaghan – When you think of all the great pommel horse gymnasts in the world right now, especially the stand-out names like....yeah, I have nothing. When you think of a young man from Newtownards in County Down dominating the news headlines, you aren't necessarily expecting that he is a back to back world gymnastic champion, qualified for the Olympics, or picking up his second gold. The relative obscurity of his sport may come against him, but I think this guy is one of the most inspirational sports stories in Ireland that I have ever come across.

Paul Townend – Third Cheltenham Gold Cup, Queen's Mother Chase, Arkle, Irish Gold Cup, and sixth National Hockey crown. Had to be in there, but respectfully it feels more like boxes ticked along the way to greatness than any inherently great sports story in itself.

Roisín Ní Riain – The 18 year old won gold and silver at the Para Swimming World Championships in Manchester and has qualified for her second Olympics. Look, that's a fantastic achievement by her, but Daniel Wiffen just claimed two European golds (1500m, 800m, and 400m), having just swam the third fastest 1500m in history and set a new world record in the 800m...well, he may be too late for a nomination here, but you just know that Roisín isn't getting the award in these circumstances Aaron Gillane - Gillane is a 'wristy' hurler, which is code for he has bags of skill. He's also tough as nails and fierce accurate. Probably the best GAA player I saw this year, with respect to the back-to-back Footballer of the Year winner. League, Munster, All Ireland. Hurler of the Year. Gillane benefitted from great service from outside - Limerick can out-muscle teams but their greatest asset is those pinpoint long balls into space for the corners to run onto, and once Gillane gets possession....well, sin deireadh an scéal. I have an enormous soft spot for TJ Reid, and wouldn't have objected to his nomination, but a part of that is personal sentiment towards one of the all-time greats as twilight approaches.

My own personal preference? Katie McCabe would just about edge Rhadisat Adeleke for me. And I know that Adeleke wasn't nominated, but that's just an abominable oversight that absolutely destroys the credibility of all of this for me. But sure, this kind of stuff is just winter talking points. I wouldn't be getting hot and bothered. With the weather lately, I'd be fine with something to warm the blood!

An rud is annamh is iontach. Remember when our mens' team were regularly putting up scorelines like this? Yeah, me neither. It feels like it's almost becoming blasé for the Irish Womens' team in this year of years. I suspect that it's not. I think we are living in a golden age for womens' soccer in this country and I hope they can leave a lasting imprint. Ireland women qualified for their first World Cup this year. Australia went about as well as anyone with realistic expectations (a description that fits very few Irish fans, unfortunately) could have hoped - there is an argument that a more aggressive approach would have yielded more goals scored, but I strongly disagree, it would have left us much more open to counter-attack. We were simply batting well above our weight. I firmly believe that Vera Pauw was hard done by and that matter was appallingly handled by the FAI. But that's not to take away from the achievements of Eileen Gleeson. She has brought players like Toland and Saoirse Noonan (Savannah McCarthy came back after injury) back into the fold and has Ireland playing positive football. It's obvious that we are well past B1 standard now and had already sealed promotion to League A before this game.

Northern Ireland were as good as us initially, with neither side really threatening much or actually looking all that composed. In fact, Lucy Quinn's opener was the first real bite of the game after 36 minutes and I thought it was real class. Lovely control and lay-off by McCabe, that looks simple but isn't, and then a great directional switch (the defender clearly expected a return down the wing for a cross) and a brilliant finish. In fairness, I did think the keeper should have done better. Quinn turned provider with a cross for Heather Payne to tap home just two minutes later. I'm sorry, but that was dog's defending. That was brutal. Two of you plus the keeper guarding the front post and a player runs unmarked behind you? No, you'd be cross if you saw it in a juvenile game. Northern Ireland are facing a relegation playoff, and frankly I can see why.

Nice cross by Katie McCabe early in the second half and Kyra Caruso nodded home from the front post. I thought maybe she had fouled the defender just before it, but if so, she got away with it. Napoleon wasn't only one who wanted his generals to be lucky. Absolutely no debates about the fourth. There would be a general belief that Ireland's greatest midfielder either hails from Mayfield in Cork or Ormond Square in Dublin. There is an argument (and I'm not making it just yet, the truth is that Division 1B in Europe is not the kind of stage where Roy Keane or John Giles made their name) that a girl from Kilnamamagh, just outside Tallaght in Dublin, belongs in that conversation. Katie McCabe got a little too much room from the defence and used it instantly to open up a shot and my word, what a finish. Just lifted it smoothly like she was passing it to the top corner. Brilliant skill. She is famously dynamic and combative for Arsenal, but there's sublime skill in there too. That was her weak foot, by the way. The fifth was a corner headed home by Louise Quinn. Nothing at all wrong with it; there are games where you are praying for one of those, but it was....ordinary, in a strange way. Just no real talking point.

Northern Ireland pulled one back. Great control by Rebecca Holloway (herself and partner Lucy Quinn must have had plenty to talk about after the game) of a headed clearance and she fired into back into the box, with Kerry Beattie diverting into the net.

Caitlin Hayes got on the end of Megan Connolly's corner to make it 6-1. Very well taken, but again I have to question the defending. The ball simply cannot drop unchallenged in your own square from a set-piece like that. Defend a corner goal-side, that's about as basic as it can get. If Hayes hadn't finished it, Lily Agg would probably have done so.

It never felt like a competitive match, to be honest. More of an exhibition bout. The hard truth is that Ireland being in Tier B in Ladies soccer would be a bit like Kerry's gaelic footballers being in Division Three of the National League. Ireland can't take too much out of it, but you need to enjoy days like these. Otherwise, why bother? Northern Ireland....I expected better, to be quite truthful.

Technically this ends Eileen Gleeson's stint as interim manager of Ireland (and easily the most successful Irish manager on a per-match basis). I understand that her preference is to go back to her overall development role rather than stay on as team manager. One thing is certain. Unlike the mens' role, there will be plenty of willing candidates.




"I have campaigned over a long period of time for a Sewerage Scheme for Beaufort, arranging Deputations, meetings with Uisce Eireann, Notices of Motions, lobbying Council Officials, lobbying Ministers, etc, and on a personal basis I am delighted that Beaufort has been given the Green Light" stated Councillor Cahill.

"The inclusion of Beaufort in this €50m funding along with 6 other applicants nationwide, is fantastic

news. At last we can see some relief coming to the residents of housing developments in Beaufort such as Coolmagort Avenue, on whose behalf I have lobbied loud, long and hard. Their suffering to date has been horrendous and perhaps now that can be finally ended with this funding" said Councillor Cahill.

"This has been a long battle and it gives me great personal satisfaction that I was able to impress upon the Minister and his Department of the deep need for this Wastewater Treatment Plant in Beaufort. I sincerely hope that there is no further delay in order that this hugely important facility is put in place for the people of Beaufort as soon as is humanly possible" added Councillor Cahill.

CALL FOR ACRES TO BE PAID **BEFORE CHRISTMAS**

Danny Healy Rae, TD has requested in the Dail that the ACRES Cooperation farm payments be paid before Christmas.

"It is not fair on farmers that they are expected to wait for the payments.", the Kerry TD said.

It has been indicated by the Department of Agriculture that over 18,000 farmers who have applied under the ACRES Cooperation project stream won't be paid until next February, at the earliest.

This is not acceptable; Farmers need money for Christmas like everyone else. After a very tough year weather wise, bad weather makes every chore more expensive, fodder is scarce and expensive, they have bills to pay like everyone else, What I am asking now is that if the Government can't pay the 100% at least pay them 50%, that all farmers be paid their payments 50% before Christmas and pay the remainder after. It is a fair and reasonable request.

Grants Available for Faulty Septic Tanks

Cllr. John O'Donoghue is delighted with the news that following his Notice of Motion in June 2023, calling for an end to the restrictions on people being able to avail of the grant to fix faulty septic tanks, that the minister has listened to his call. The previous situation encouraged people to turn a blind eye if their septic tank was malfunctioning, which was a disaster from an environmental perspective.



"From January 2024, everyone who has a malfunctioning septic tank will be able to avail of this grant which is wonderful news. It is imperative that we a local authorities do all we can to preserve our local ecosystems, and this is a huge step in the right direction", Cllr O'Donoghue told

NEW APPRENTICE TRAINING FACILITIES AT MTU

Education Minister Norma Foley has welcomed the provision of €425,000 for new apprenticeship training facilities at MTU Kerry

The additional capacity is required to meet the increase in apprentice registrations as indicated by SOLAS in a number of trades.

The funding will pay for the construction of six new training blocks at MTU Kerry for electrical apprenticeships.

Minister Foley welcomed the funding announcement by

her cabinet colleague, Minister for Further and Higher **Education Simon Harris.**

The Government is providing €17 million in total for 132 apprenticeship craft training blocks in technological universities around the country to support extra apprenticeships in crafts such as Electrical, Electronic Security Systems, Pipefitting, Plumbing, Metal Fabrication and Refrigeration and Air Conditioning.





Welcome back dear student "God, the Lord, created the heavens and the earth and everything in it. He gives Breath to everyone, Life to everyone..." (Isaiah 42:5). Last week we spoke of pressure triggering reactions in the body causing breathlessness. The Christmas season can be a time of stress and frustration for many: those under financial pressure - or those worried about difficult family get-togethers going haywire. It can be a time of loneliness and despair for others who are grieving and in pain, or those walking through a dark season (Psalm 23:4). Everywhere you go people ask, 'are you all ready for Christmas?' which, if you are not, causes high tension to those already suffering. What does 'ready for Christmas' mean anyway? It's one day a meal. But it has been made into a high thing, and high things exalt themselves against the knowledge of God (2 Corinthians 10:5). It's great to meet up and spend time with friends and family, and lovingly give presents, but much of it is out of proportion. Older generations have happy memories of Christmas long ago, mostly involving very humble gifts - but that include worshipping the Lord Jesus, Who this festival is supposed to be about. Now it has been taken over by drinking fests, extravagance and baloney. There's nothing wrong with folks enjoying themselves -God wants us to enjoy our lives (John 10:10) But when people try to enjoy their lives without God, there's no fulfilment, and that's why they need more. More drink, more parties, more shopping - the desires are insatiable, because the 'things' are not satisfying.

True contentment is not found in stuff or great nights out, it's only found in relationship with the One Who made us. The effect of searching for happiness in the wrong places makes for a cycle of devastation. This is why many dread Christmas because of loved ones drinking or fighting, spoiling what the world portrays as 'the happiest time of the year'. Christmas becomes a major anti-climax, and leaves people feeling isolated and joyless, creating inner conflict, a root cause of oppression and heaviness. So how do we tackle this according to the Word of God? (Isaiah 61:1-3). There is a God-solution for every problem. 1) The first answer is Prayer (Psalm 27). Seek God and ask Him to show you how to navigate through this time. 2) Study His Word and focus on what He says, rather than what the world is telling you to do. "Let God be true, but every man a liar" (Romans 3:4). This means fix your eyes upon Jesus and refuse to let the crap get to you. When it does, bring it to Him and ask Him to help you deal with it. 3) Ask the Lord Jesus to shine His Glory Light into those areas of darkness where the devil is operating and bring God's answer through His Holy Spirit Power (2 Corinthians 4:6-18). Don't let the enemy trick you into believing that everyone else is happy so there's something wrong with you, or you are cursed to be forever defeated. Satan is a liar first and foremost - his character is lies (John 8:44). But God is Faithful and True (Psalm 33:4). You can trust Him to not only help you stand and endure difficult times, but to overcome and come out victorious (Romans 8:31-39). Finally, 4) Ask the Lord to give you His Grace to be wise, merciful and patient! For '... His Grace is all you need. His Power works best in weakness... for when you are weak then you are strong.' (2 Corinthians 12:9-10 NLT). God's got you friend x




