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Lions Club 'Message in a Bottle' NOW AVAILABLE IN PHARMACIES

The fantastic initiative by the Killarney Lions Club - Message In A Bottle is now available in all pharmacies in Killarney.

Starting this week, anyone who might need one can get a Killarney Lions Club 'Message in a Bottle', free of charge, at their local pharmacy. The 'bottle' is a small plastic container with an information form which people can fill out with their basic medical details for use by Paramedics, Gardaí, Fire-fighters, and first responders in cases of emergency.

The initiative, which launched last November, is aimed at helping older people, people living alone and people with medical conditions to quickly receive the care they need in an emergency situation. Once the information form is complete, they can put it in the fridge with a list of medications, and put self-adhesive green cross labels near the front door of their home and on the door of the fridge. In the event of an accident or incident within the home, the first responder/emergency services on the scene will be alerted to the bottle when they see the labels.

The pharmacies taking part are: Allcare (New St.), Boots (Deerpark), CarePlus+ (Park Rd.), Kennelly's (Reeks and New St.), Reens Life (Plunkett St.), O'Sullivan's (New St.), Sewell's (New St.), Sheahan's (Main St.) and Trants (Park Rd.).

"We are absolutely delighted that all our local pharmacies are now on board with this initiative, because it makes it easy for people to get one of the bottles," said Denis Doolan, President of Killarney Lions Club. "We would encourage anyone who thinks it might help them to visit their pharmacy, get a bottle and fill out the information form. If it helps even just one person to get the help they need more quickly and effectively, it is well worth it."

Don't be a money mule' KERRY GARDAÍ launch awareness campaign to target money laundering

Gardaí in Kerry have launched a new money mule awareness campaign in a bid to target money laundering across the county.

The new fraud awareness campaign is in partnership with thirteen Credit Unions in Kerry and West-Limerick to highlight the dangers of acting as a money mule.

Gardaí in the Kerry Garda Division continue to target money laundering through the bank accounts of those residing in the county under Operation Mullet.

This operation has already led to 32 prosecutions of those whose bank accounts were illegally used to launder up to \in 1.3 million in proceeds acquired through online fraud.

Money mules are typically recruited via social media, through friends and acquaintances or while out socialising by what are known as mule herders. On some occasions it can also involve young people with drug debts who pay off such debts by allowing their accounts to be used.

The practice is co-ordinated and well-organised by a large criminal group. In the Tralee area, a large number of those recruited to act as money mules were aged between 16-20 years of age.

In efforts to highlight the dangers and serious legal implications of acting as a money mule, An Garda Síochána and personnel from Credit Unions across Kerry and West-Limerick will present to all local secondary schools and colleges.

The Uneven Levy

Let me give an example from a reader of how our head-in-the-clouds political system has lost sight of the ground. The levy on health insurance is rarely mentioned. This column has been contacted by a man who has paid for healthcare all his life. Now, with the huge increases, he and his wife wonder how they can continue. Both pensioners, they pay Euro €3,194 to Laya Healthcare and €876 of this is the Government stamp or levy - one third in other words.

And where does that levy go? It is supposed to even things up. In reality it probably clogs things up.

On modest pensions, they have to fork out the same levy as a person with an income ten times that.

"I think it is grossly unfair to be charging the same levy on pensioners as on high earners," the reader said.

The first thing to say is this: It is because the State's health system is so broken that health insurance is necessary at all. It has been broken with decades. The late 1980s, an era of public service recruitment embargo, mass emigration and huge interest on mortgages of 15 per cent or more, was pretty bleak. But people scraped to take out health insurance. This was so expectant mothers, for instance, could access decent dignified maternity care. Now the health service is even worse. Government and opposition seem to want to look up and away, at wars and issues they have no hope of resolving.

Will the new Independent Ireland, with their feet on the middle ground of squeezed Ireland be the ones to grasp the brass tacks? Certainly, their TDs have a good track record

And then Fair Hill - but we don't really own that either as Blrds Bazaar have an interest - and then Beech Road. By the time we get around to building it, there may well be fewer cars. I think the best plan is to invite Minister Ryan to see for himself how traffic problems are not just in Dublin. Then designate two or three electric shuttle buses to run from parks well outside the town. One for the local election list, perhaps.

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The new tertiary courses provide an alternative path to a degree

PRIORITY

One of the priorities of Simon Harris, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science is the creation of a unified tertiary system providing pathways for progression across and between different institutions. The National Tertiary Office (NTO) was established last year to coordinate further and higher education progression pathways from Further Education & Training (FET) courses to Higher Education Institutions (HEI).

LINKS

A links scheme already exists between Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses and HEI's. However, the number of places available to PLC graduates in the links scheme is limited and there is no guarantee of success, particularly in sought after courses, such as nursing.

TERTIARY

The new tertiary courses developed by HEIs and Education and Training Boards (ETB) offer guaranteed pathways from further education to higher education, which are driven by an applicant's career interests rather than points achieved in the Leaving Cert exam. Tertiary courses look beyond grades and points. They provide a definite path to a third level qualification where progression from further to higher education will be completely seamless. COLLABORATION

This year Munster TU (MTU) is collaborating with ETB Cork and ETB Kerry to provide four tertiary courses in Nursing, while tertiary courses in Business, Visual Arts and Software Development are pending and also likely to be available this year. Other Technological Universities participating in the tertiary scheme this year are TU Dublin (TUD), TU Shannon (TUS), Atlantic TU (ATU), South East TU (SETU), as well as Dundalk IT (DkIT) and Institute of Art, Design and Technology, Dun Laoghaire (IADT). Traditional universities are also collaborating on the development of joint tertiary courses but it is not yet known whether any will be ready for 2024 entry. Tertiary courses are a wonderful development and have expanded from 23 courses last year to an expected forty plus courses in 2024.

APPLY

Applying for a tertiary course is straight forward. An applicant can apply directly through the course information page of the NTO website, www.nto.ie, from 1st February to late September. The website also provides a full list of courses for 2024. The tertiary course enables an applicant to start a degree at an ETB college and complete it at a university. Alternatively, an applicant can get in touch with the appropriate contact person detailed in the course information section. Any applicant, who has any difficulties with any of the above routes, can contact the ETB Adult Education Guidance and Information Service. www.etbi. ie/fet-guidance.

JOINT

A tertiary course is a joint further and higher education degree programme. Students commence their third level experience in further education with the ETB but will complete the remainder of the course in the local higher education colleges. It varies from one year to two years studying in the FET college, depending on the course. It's expected than more than forty tertiary courses will commence this September in Business, ICT, Arts and Media, Engineering, Science. Manufacturing & Construction, Hospitality and Health & Welfare. It's fairly certain that additional degree programmes will be added before closing date for applications.

REGISTERED

From day one of a tertiary course, students are registered at both the ETB where they are commencing their course and the partnered university. This provides the student with access to dual supports and services including libraries, sports, and other campus facilities as well as academic, health and wellbeing supports.

ENTRY

You don't need the same leaving certificate points for a tertiary course as a person applying for the same degree via the CAO. Different tertiary course programmes have different entry requirements. An applicants may be required to submit proof from other agencies

to show s/he is eligible and meet the entry requirements for the course s/he is applying for. Refer to the course information section in the course page of the NTO website for those details. The course provider will be able to advise you of any additional paperwork which is required for your application. The contact details for the course coordinator can be found in the course page.

PATHWAY

Tertiary courses are a new pathway to a Bachelor's degree, at Level 8 or Level 7. The course information section in the course page of the website details the qualification available. Applications for the courses are open since 1st February. Applications for tertiary course are separate from applications to CAO and from applications for PLC Courses

Think carefully before DEFERRING YOUR STATE PENSION

"If you defer your pension for one year until you reach the age of 67, then you will have missed out on \in 14,419.60 for one based on todays figures. As a result of deferring until you are 67 your pension will be at the increased rate of \in 13.00 per week and it would take you 20 years at the increased rate to make up what you lost out on."

"If you defer your pension until you are 70 years of age you will have missed out on \in 57,678, again based on today's figures. As a result your pension will be increased by \in 59.90 per week and it would take just over 18 years to make up what you lost out on."

Where it would be beneficial to continue working would be if you did not meet the first qualifying condition of have 520 contributions paid during your lifetime, continuing to pay PRSI after 66 may bring you into payment of the minimum pension.

Please take advice before you make any decisions on this matter as people may not be aware of the consequences and of the fact if you take your pension at 66 then you can continue to work after pension age and not pay PRSI, depending on your employer.

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IRISH DEBUT FOR NEW OPEL ASTRA ELECTRIC AT NEVO EV SHOW

The new Opel Astra Electric will celebrate its Irish debut on Saturday 17th February as it takes pride of place on the Opel stand at the NEVO EV Show, in Dublin's RDS. With first deliveries arriving in Opel Dealerships nationwide this month, the new Astra Electric, offering up to 418km on a full charge, is available in three trims – SC, Elegance, and GS – and will retail from €39,598 including applicable grants.

James Brooks, Managing Director at Opel Ireland, said: "What better platform to launch the new Astra Electric, than the very firstever consumer Electric Vehicle show in Ireland, where over 17,500 EV enthusiasts will gather. The Astra, voted Continental Tyres Irish Compact Car of the Year 2023, is already enjoying success in its segment in Ireland. The addition of our full electric hatchback model, soon to be joined by an Astra Sports Tourer estate BEV, is sure to strengthen the range's appeal."

The Astra is now fully electric for the first time in its long success story, sporting a lively character thanks to a top speed of 170kmh, and a low kerb weight of 1,679kg. The electric motor delivers 115kW/156hp and a powerful 270Nm of maximum torque available from the first touch of the accelerator pedal, ensuring brisk starts. Depending on preferences, Astra Electric drivers can choose between three driving modes: Eco, Normal and Sport.

Energy is stored in a compact 54kWh lithiumion battery, which offers efficient packaging, low weight, exemplary range and short charging times. The five-door hatch requires just 14.8 kWh of electricity per 100 kilometres (WLTP), thanks in part to the heat pump, and its regenerative braking system ensures that energy can be recovered while driving. Indeed, the Opel Astra Electric secured third position amongst 94 passenger cars in the recent ADAC Eco Test 2023 which evaluates vehicles from well to wheel. It scored 103 out of a possible 110 points to take a podium position, achieving



the best five-star rating from the ADAC German Automobile Club.

The Astra Electric can be charged to 80% of the battery capacity in under 30 minutes at a 100kW DC fast charging station and it is equipped as standard with a three-phase 11kW onboard charger for a wall box at home.

The battery is located in the underbody, so no space for passengers or luggage is lost. Even with the rear seats up, the Astra Electric offers 352 litres of luggage space in the boot, and with the seats folded, capacity increases to up to 1,268 litres. The low position of the battery also lowers the car's centre of gravity, so that the Astra Electric has a solid stance on the road and the driver can take a sporty seating position. Torsional stiffness has also been increased by 31% compared to the already outstanding values of other Astra model variants.

CALL FOR VITAL WORKS TO BE UNDERTAKEN IN AGHADOE

Cllr. Brendan Cronin is calling on the Minister For Housing Darragh O Brien and Kerry's Minister Norma Foley for their urgent support and the provision of the required funding allocation for the commencement of vital works to connect the adjoining estates of Birch Hill and The Old Killarney Village to the Killarney public sewer system and bring an end to the long running saga for the 70 properties involved.

In 2020 just over €400,000 was allocated by the Dept of Housing & Local Government under the Water Services Resolution Programme for Birch Hill & the Old Killarney Village, the original planned option was the installation of new sewers, decommissioning of the existing problematic onsite wastewater systems along with the fee to Uisce Eireann for the connection of the 70 properties in both estates to the public sewer system. However following the development of the detailed design of the original option, difficulties arose which have resulted in rendering the original option unviable.

As a result two further alternative design options have now been developed for connecting these two estates to the public sewer and these options have been submitted to Minister O Brien's Department in recent weeks along with a request to provide the required funding for

the preferred of these designs. As the projected cost of the new designs will be substantial more than the original allocation, I am appealing to Minister for Housing Darragh O Brien and Kerry's Minister Norma Foley to realise the urgency and importance of this work for the 70 properties involved and particularly the environmental protection of adjacent watercourses, the Deenagh river and Lough Lein. The existing onsite systems are antiquated and are not appropriate or capable of safely dealing with waste water from these two estates and a proper safe resolution must be urgently provided"

IT'S A NO BRAINER.... KILLARNEY TRAIN & BUS STATIONS SHOULD BE CONNECTED

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill through the good offices of Senator Gerry Horkan recently proposed at an Oireachtas Transpirt Committee meeting with representatives from larnród Éireann that a Footbridge be provided between the Train and Bus Stations in Killarney.

"It's a no brainer, why would you expect people to walk with luggage, people with a disability, our senior citizens, parents with buggies, our small children, etc, all the way around outside, when both terminals are practically side by side in Killarney. A Footbridge connecting both is logical. I really think in this instance they are making a laugh of the people, who by the way they are supposed to be serving" stated Councillor Cahill.

"larnród Éireann, in answer to Councillor Cahill, states that it has prioritised other accessibility projects elsewhere. Killarney and Kerry seem to have been designated 2nd best by them" said Councillor Cahill. "Killarney Bus and Train Stations are used by residents from all over the county, as well as visitors, by people of all ages. A connecting Footbridge should have been put in place years ago. It is a total inconvenience to all rail and bus users and a deterrent from using the service" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"This matter has been raised over the years by former Councillor Michael

Gleeson and by a number of other Councillors. This is a no brainer. Killarney is the busiest tourist town in Ireland and I firmly believe locals and visitors alike should be accommodated with this facility" added Councillor Cahill.

larnród Éireann in response to Councillor Cahill said:

Following an analysis in October2019, 3 main categories of options were identified to improve connectivity between the Bus and Train Stations as follows;

Provision of a pedestrian route through the Bus Éireann/public car park and Train station at platform level or at grade
Provision of a new underpass

Provision of a new footbridge

While there is an estimated time saving of 4-6 minutes per passenger transfer, in the context of the wider accessibility upgrade investment in a limited funding environment, larnród Éireann has prioritised other accessibility projects around the network.

Each of the options above require varying levels of capital expenditure to build and maintain. The matter was forwarded to the National Transport Authority for final decision on funding and implementation, and it has not to date been included in funding allocations.





HOMELESS SITUATION GETTING WORSE BY THE DAY

A Chara,

I want to highlight a story with the consent of those involved, something I've previously raised and passed a motion at my first Killarney Municipal District Meeting in September last year.

I was contacted by a family residing over a business premises in Killarney town centre after being served with a notice to quit as the premises was being sold. They tried high up and low down for alternative accommodation in the Killarney area where they resided, work, have their GP services and children enrolled in school. The only option they had was to relocate to a hostel in Tralee, where 2 adults and 3 children are in one bedroom. The children are aged 6,3 and 6 months, as the parents don't drive its making life very difficult for them, while completely defeating eco friendly travelling being forced onto the country.

I'm aware of landlords offering up dwellings to the Local Authority where a high percentage of them are failing inspections, not meeting high standards as a result many are left homeless or having to live in over crowded conditions with family or friends.

Killarney and South Kerry is in dire straits of Homeless Accommodation this needs to be addressed as the situation is worsening by the day, its time to invest on record numbers of Homelessness. 13500 as of January 2024 with 4000 of those children.

Many thanks and best wishes to Micheál Burns, who has decided to call time on his intercounty career. Micheál was multi-talented as a sportsman from a young age - he has sporting DNA on both sides. He quickly established himself as a Kerry minor in 2013 - he was absolutely superb against Tyrone in our guarter-final defeat that year. A year later he was part of an iconic 2014 team helmed by Jack O'Connor. Ten of that team went on to play senior for Kerry at some stage, not including Mark O'Connor, who would surely have done so were he not thriving Down Under. That Micheál was a special talent even in that company was demonstrated when he played three years for the Kerry U21s, albeit with no tangible reward. He made his first senior appearance in January of 2018 on the right wing. Shane Murphy, Cormac Coffey, David Clifford, Seán O'Shea, and Killian Spillane (off the bench) made their senior debuts as well in that defeat to Donegal. He made 51 appearances for Kerry, scoring 1-28 along the way. In 2022 he won a coveted celtic cross.

This week Micheál stepped back from the Kerry senior squad and the colossal commitment that takes to concentrate on himself, although the Dr. Crokes man is certain to be one of the most feared forwards at club level in the county. Micheál, who teaches in Coláiste na Sceilge, was on the sideline as a selector when the school brilliantly defied all the odds and enforced absence through injury of their best forward to almost pull of a shock quarter-final win over Patrician Academy Mallow and no doubt he will be seen in that competition again too. Best wishes to a great servant of the county in the future.

COLLEGES GAA

The Sem's defeat to Mounthawk meant that there was no local participation but it did set up an intriguing Corn Uí Mhuirí Final. There have been a few Cork City derbies down through the years and plenty of Kerry derbies in recent years. I'll court a little bit of controversy by admitting that I'm not so sure that Kerry's virtual monopoly on the competition in recent years (16 titles in a row) is a good thing in the long term. It's takes strong stones to hone steel. The impressive showings by the likes of St. Pats Castleisland, Abbey CBS, Coachford College, and Bishopstown last year is a good sign for the competition going forward.

Mercy Mounthawk, managed by Aidan O'Shea, Kerry champions bidding for their first Munster title, went in against Tralee CBS favourites. Two years ago Mounthawk completed a Kerry (Dunloe) and Munster (Frewen) double and that formed the bulk of this year's senior team. Tralee CBS, managed by Marc Ó Sé, were mostly a year younger and were missing some key players, especially their captain Jake Foley. An intriguing side note for people, although it has nothing to do with the lads themselves, is that Jake is a grandson of 1953 All Ireland winning goalkeeper Johnny, while two of the best players on the opposing side were Jerh. and Pat Brosnan, great-grandsons of the legendary Con. Black cat begets black kitten!

There was a huge crowd in Austin Stack Park and a great atmosphere. There is nothing better in sport than a passionate rivalry than has no bitterness. Mind you, both schools admirably had mentors keeping a close eye on matters.

I was expecting a slightly one-sided affair, but instead it was a cracker. Mounthawk, with Paddy Lane on fire and Odhran Ferris in the thick of the action, had a 0-9 to 0-4 half-time lead. Ronan Carroll had impressed early on for Tralee CBS but Gary O'Riordan impressive took over that particular duel. The truth is that we all knew what was going

to happen here, and fate duly obliged. I'm not having any dig at Italy, but they are barely a blip on the radar of our aspirations. While Italy were gallant in stretching an unimaginative England, Ireland were simply mesmerising against France in Marseille. In Lansdowne Road there was only ever going to be one result.

I wouldn't be thrilled with the overall display. There was none of the intensity or raw hunger of the France game. Dare I say it, Ireland looked a little bit complacent to me (and I have to include the fairly muted supporters in that). The absolute highlight of the day was eight year old Stevie Mulrooney's brilliant enthusiastic rendition of 'Ireland's Call' – the only person I have ever heard sing that lonesome dirge with enthusiasm.

Italy looked the hungrier side early on and in Paulo Garbisi, they had the best player on the field for the first half in my opinion. Sure, not everything he did worked, far from it, but he got stuck into everything and that's a great trait in an underdog team. He did narrowly miss a long range penalty coughed up by a stumbling Robbie Henshaw early on - I don't think it would have mattered in the long run, but it might have rattled Ireland a small bit. Instead it was Ireland who opened the scoring, a good break by Hugo Keenan and guick transfers through the hands stretching Italy too thin and opening a gap for Jack Crowley. Poor enough attempt at a conversion, but Ireland in front 5-0. Both kickers had efforts blocked but the defences reacted sharply to shut the door. Ireland were at their best running at Italy and again the quality of our passing carved them open for Dan Sheehan to power through the gap. It was a much better conversion by Crowley. The next one arrives just before half-time, the maul and great work by Dan Sheehan and Joe McCarthy drove Jack Conan over. Crowley added the bonus and Ireland led by 19-0. A bit tough on Italy, who had actually played well for the most part (compare this Italy side to the team of five years ago) but just hadn't quite enough power or finesse to put it on the scoreboard.

Five minutes into the second half, Ireland had their bonus point in the bag. Again it was more about strength than anything else, with James Ryan and Dan Sheehan both being stopped inches from the line before the pressure told and Dan Sheehan got over for his second try. Another brilliant burst by Keenan had Italy at sixes and sevens – they were starting to crack now – and Henshaw eventually drove over, but it was correctly over-ruled for a double



movement. Italy lost a player to the sin bin and left themselves wide open for a burst by James Lowe along the wing. He's so stylish a player that I tend to forget how physically strong he is until I see him in full flight. Just before the finish Ireland again stretched a hapless Italian defence and it was Calvin Nash to go over. Harry Byrne added the conversion, but it was all academic now anyway. 36-0. Job done, but it always felt more like a game to get out of the way than a vibrant contest.

Elsewhere France were lucky enough to get past Scotland, who had been well in control at half-time and had justifiable claims of a late winning try overruled. I've seen the tv replay and I can't tell if the ball was grounded or not. That was a very big call. England also had a very narrow win, beating Wales 16-14, and looked pedestrian enough doing it. England in Twickenham is our biggest obstacle to a Grand Slam, but England always rise their game to us and vice versa. There is still a lot of climbing to be done.

SUPERBOWL SUNDAY

Let's face it; it's actually 'Superbowl Early Monday Morning' for us transatlantic mortals. No, I didn't stay up to watch it. I'm not knocking the sport itself; I quite like it, although there are nuances to the running and blocking patterns that I don't understand and the razzmatazz does absolutely nothing for me. US sports commentary feels like the ultimate clickbait to me. You can get over it in basketball because the action is fast enough. NFL, and baseball too for that matter? Bring earphones and a book to read because there will be long, long periods of inactivity. The game - which admittedly was the second one ever to go into overtime, and was by all accounts an absolute thriller - finished at 4.00am our time. Neither were anywhere close to the most important musician attending. Yes, Taylor Swift flew 5700 miles to watch her boyfriend play in the biggest US sports event of them all (eighth in the world). There were attempts to mythologise Patrick Mahomes, easily the most successful quarterback since Tom Brady, and an awful lot more likeable. It's not really catching. Win five more, and we'll talk. Equally, there were efforts at talking about a cinderella story in regards to Brock Purdy, the last player drafted in 2022, the supposed 'Mr. Irrelevant'. Except that means that he 'only' got a four year contract worth a paltry \$4 to \$5 million dollars. Being the 262nd draft isn't any cinderella story. It's winning the lottery. We are a very long way from darling Clementine now!

We have no grasp of how NFL players are deities in America. Despite claims that baseball is America's national sport, basketball and ice hockey have overtaken it in popularity. Soccer has expanded enormously - a rise in latino population, the US womens' team success, and it's far more suitable for school sports than NFL (which is a lot more dangerous in concussive terms than rugby). But it's still way behind in the halfpenny place. In the South and Mid West particularly, Travis Kelce would instantly be far more recognisable than Joe Biden. I'm not exaggerating. Taylor Swift is one of only a handful of people more famous than him. And that's before last Sunday. In terms of sporting figures, Michael Jordan, Lionel Messi, and..... actually, that's about it.

Travis Kelce and Taylor Swift (I'm going to call them 'thrift', because I like the irony) are a much bigger story than the Superbowl. There was more global speculation about her travel arrangements and the possibility of him proposing on the field than the actual game. Granted, an awful lot of that was social media clickbait, but not all of it. As far as the 'right' is concerned (they would view the likes of Fianna Fáil or Fine Gael as dangerously liberal – they genuinely think that Bernie Sanders is a communist), Travis Kelce committed a mortal sin in taking a knee during the National Anthem in support of Colin Kaepernick and Black Lives



Matter. He compounded it with the even graver offence of supporting vaccinations during covid. As for Taylor....she had the sheer gall to encourage young people to go out and vote. Can you even get more anti-democratic? And in a country that is bigger than our continent, those views get to exist in a vast echo chamber of electronic communication.

I'm not talking about the actual game because that is a mere triviality (also, I haven't actually seen it yet). This is a story that encapsulates the link between sporting and celebrity significance and cultural and political identity. It should be a trivial thing, but it supersedes the actual event itself. And why does that matter? Because money has always played the biggest role in sporting success. American sports have actually tempered that best with their draft system. But anybody giving out about Taylor and Travis hijacking the superbowl should maybe have a look at soccer (hold your nose), golf, horse-racing, Formula 1, MMA, boxing (Fury and Usyk is the new Mayweather and Pacquaio – it'll happen eventually, but by then nobody, including me, will care).....Irish Basketball has been the latest to draw down the ire of the self-righteous. Funny - I don't see a lot of the same people calling out FIBA for allowing Israel's participation. They had no problem banning Russia.

Taylor Swift and the Superbowl is like a controversy manufactured for a Disney movie. There are much darker stories that should be called out but won't be. A lot of sporting bodies aren't up for sale – but that's because they have already been sold.

Maybe we should stick to coonversations about pop stars instead. It's more comfortable for everybody.

ATHLETICS

The County winners of the Federation of Irish Sport Volunteers in Sport Awards were announced today last weekend. Congratulations to Lorcan Murphy of Iveragh Athletics Club on winning this award. Lorcan has spent 53 years volunteering with lveragh Athletics Club and has been described as the driving force behind Iveragh AC. Lorcan has held many roles within the club; Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, PRO and coach. Lorcan's name is synonymous with Iveragh AC and his passion for coaching, guiding and mentoring athletes of all abilities in the South Kerry region has seen the club blossom into a social, inclusive and fun environment for people of all ages.

A National awards ceremony will take place at The Crowne Plaza Hotel, Blanchardstown on Thursday 29th February 2024 where Lorcan will be presented with his award, as well as an overall winner being announced.

Congratulations to the Kerry U11 Boys who won silver in the National Juvenile Cross Country Championships, especially Conor O'Donnell of Killarney Valley.

Some of Ireland's highest profile athletes have been setting new benchmarks this week. Sarah Healy took a whopping three seconds off Ciara Mageean's 1500m indoor record, set in 2020, when she finished in fifth at the World Indoor Gold Tour in France last Saturday in 4.03.83. Sarah Lavin finished third in the 60m.

Rhadisat Adeleke set her third Irish record of the year in New York. Having already set new times for the 60m and 200m, she finished the 300m at the Millrose Games in 36.42 to beat her own record. It says a lot for her high standards that she was actually disappointed after finishing second.

Roisín Flanagan clocked 9.36.70 for the two mile indoors to set another new Irish record.



For the first time in a long time, it has been a good week generally for the FAI. The announcement of a national sponsor to replace Three might have been an awful long time coming and I suspect that the asking price dropped quite a bit in the interim, but having Revolut on board bestows a certain amount of badly wanted credibility as well as income.

The League of Ireland has increased in popularity, but that has drawn attention to the poor state of most of the facilities. That's no fault of the clubs – let us recall that for a long time John Delaney's annual salary, not counting expenses (nobody else counted them either, as we unfortunately found out) was almost triple that of the League champions. Clubs could barely hang on, let alone invest in facilities. It's an open secret that the likes of Bohs and St. Pats sold out their stadia several times last year. Barring finals, that hasn't happened on any regular basis in the League for over fifty years. The biggest news this week is Dublin City Council confirming plans to upgrade Dalymount Park (I used to attend Bohs games on Friday nights if visiting student friends in the city - it was a fiver in and you got a free can and a bar of chocolate) and Tolka Park (home of Shelbourne). Tallaght Stadium was effectively rebuilt by South Dublin Council. These are legitimate community developments deserving of the grant aid they have received, having demonstrated a clear demand within the community. This is the way to go. We can consign that absolutely ridiculous €863m plan, €700 of which was supposed to come from taxpayer's money, that the FAI proposed last year just before it transpired that they had ignored several warnings about illegal under the counter payments to Jonathan Hill. That wasn't just a non-runner, that was a fiasco. A piecemeal approach in conjunction with the clubs - with very stringent supervision of spending for obvious reasons - is the better long-term model.

NATIONS LEAGUE

Ireland still haven't found a new manager. I have said it consistently, even while Stephen Kenny

was in situ, I can think of no practical reason why anyone would take the job. The English Championship pays high managerial salaries and you'd actually have enough access to your players to work on long-term approaches and improvements. No international manager gets that luxury. You are completely reliant on your national development system, and despite all the bluster, we don't actually have one worthy of the name. There is no League of Ireland player anywhere close to international standard - those who departed for English championship teams in recent years after shining here have been mediocre at best in the English championship.

Ireland were very poor under Stephen Kenny, but I'm less convinced that it was actually Kenny's fault. He rejected hoofball in favour of actually playing - we just didn't have any midfield presence. Our 3-5-1-1 always turned into 5-4-1 straightaway, and the lone crathur up front was tasked with chasing shadows nonstop. What's a new manager going to do? Four at the back and a holding midfielder? Great -Seamus Coleman, you are now our only winger. In fairness, James McClean, Robbie Brady, Aidan McGeady - they'd almost always run into rabbit holes down the wings (McGeady would beat two men and go looking for two more instead of crossing the ball) but at least they would do it. We have strikers and we have a defence. But we have nothing - and my respects to the lads for their efforts - no presence whatsoever in midfield. I don't see how a new manager is going to magically change that.

The Irish soccer public are fickle. We have the real English disease in thinking that we are far better than we actually are. Kenny underperformed, but by very little. We weren't unlucky, and haven't been for a long time. People have convinced themselves that Lee Carsley is the man based on a phenomenal English team winning the U21 Euros in 2021. Definitely a glowing CV, but you wouldn't be working with that calibre of player. Regardless, anyone else who takes the helm is going to be compared unfavourably to Carsley from the very start. If they reach and lose a final, Irish supporters will claim that Carsley would have won it. There is no possible way to succeed in those circumstances.

I suspect that the FAI will cave in to all of Carsley's demands and stump up the money - they surely understand now that their payments will be closely scrutinised. Surely they understand that by now? But if I was Carsley, or anyone else in the discussion, l'd have wanted to know the Nations League draw before agreeing to anything. A good group and you could dig out a few results. A bad one and you are on a hiding to nothing. Irish fans are very low on patience these days. As for the claim from Marc Canham that they FAI will have input into who the new manager brings in with him? Nope. There is only one captain of a ship and needs to know who is with him. Once upon a time, i.e. the sixties, the FAI had a 'selection committee'. It was absolutely preposterous even by our own very low standards. If the new manager hasn't got enough about him to pick his own backroom staff, then he's too weak for

the job anyway.

England, Finland, Ireland, Greece.

It could theoretically have been worse. We could have gotten Norway instead of Finland. That's about the only way it could have been worse. FAI CEO Jonathan Hill said that "I don't think there's any professional in the football space who wouldn't look at it and say 'Yeah, that looks great, it's what we're here to do and these are the challenges we want to rise to." In fairness, he can't exactly say out loud that it's a dogs' dinner of a draw and no manager with an atom of sense is touching Ireland with a barge pole. We open to England. That'll generate publicity and column inches - more guff about Rice and Grealish, both of whom were born and bred in England. But you're basically talking about a top Premiership side taking on a lower Championship one. A realistic best case scenario is England beating everybody to make it a three-way battle for second place. Then it's Greece, and their last two games against us were embarrassing for Ireland. They took us apart without breaking sweat. Doing it once was bad, pretty much a nadir foor Ireland. But to have it happen a second time? We need to beat Greece in Dublin and I'd hope for a draw away. Finland I just don't know enough about. We lost to them 1-0 home and away in the Nations League in 2020, but that was during covid and games that year were...strange. I imagine we will be favourites in Dublin and fancied for a draw in Helsinki. But I could just as easily see things going completely awry. We need to win that first game against Greece. We don't have the confidence to be chasing dropped points from so early.

The lower our rankings, the harder our draws become. We've basically dropped from second seeds to third seeds and we need to get back into pot two. We won't be winning anything of significance for a long time, but surely we can get back to being regular qualifiers.

The FAI have been unlucky in the draw. That could have gone an awful lot better. But the friendlies we have opted to play....that's a bad long-term error by the FAI. Short term profit at long term expense. A country that desperately needs to up its world ranking has opted to play friendlies against Belgium, Hungary, Switzerland, and Portugal. These games make sense for the four countries that are competing in the Euros. They won't do anything to lift our fragile confidence. If the FAI had implemented a successor to Stephen Kenny before arranging those games, I imagine the new manager would have wanted input on that. One or two high quality opponents? Sure. We do need revenue, I'm not disputing that. But the other two should be opponents that we can legitimately expect to score against. Increase world ranking fractions are crucial in the next two years or we will most likely be third seeds for at least a decade. Likewise confidence. Nothing gets a team believing that they can win games more than winning other games. Too late now.

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Because of the short length of time it takes them to grow to the maximum height and spread. When planting a Herbaceous border, always remember to plant the taller ones to the back or middle and the smaller growing ones to the front. When choosing your plants pick one plant that you can repeatedly plant in the border to create a sense of continuity to the planting scheme. Herbaceous Pernnials flower from April until October/ November so you have a wide range of flowering times and colour to choose from. The secret to having a good flowering Herbaceous Border is every few years in the winter to lift and divide the plants that are suitable for this.

You get back home exhausted, and grab a bite to eat, And then head for the day job, trying not to fall asleep.

Welcome back dear student, I hope you had a happy Valentine's Day. 'Love is all around me...' so the song said...but what kind of love is all around?
