



Killeen House Hotel, the award-winning 23-bedroom hotel in Aghadoe, Killarney, has been sold to Killarney businessman Patrick Eviston, who owns and operates the **Eviston House Hotel and Brook Lodge** Hotel in Killarney town centre.

The hotel's owners Michael and Geraldine Rosney are retiring after more than three decades of ownership. The new management will commence next week and all existing and future bookings and vouchers will be honoured under the new ownership.

The Killeen House Hotel and Rozzers Restaurant has been owned and operated by Geraldine and Michael Rosney since 1992. The hotel, a former rectory for the nearby historical church, was built in 1838. It has 23 bedrooms and is set on an acre of manicured gardens less than a 10-minute drive from the centre of Killarney. Since opening, the hotel has won many national and international awards for its charm and unique guest experience.

Commenting on the sale, Geraldine and Michael Rosney said: "We would like to thank all the guests who came to visit us time and time again since we opened our doors in 1992, our ambition was always to ensure that everyone who set foot on the premises was treated to the best of Irish hospitality. We would also like to express our gratitude to all those wonderful people who have worked with us over the course of the last 30 years and have helped to make so many special memories for everyone sending guests home happy with memories that will last a lifetime. We would also like to thank the wonderful local Killarney community for their support over the years and our excellent local suppliers and

Tributes have poured in following the death of Paul Coghlan who passed away surrounded by his family.

The popular politician was much loved in the town of Killarney, a place which he was very proud of.

Leading the tributes, An Taoiseach and Leader of Fine Gael, Leo Varadkar, who led a guard of honour at the removal on Sunday afternoon, has expressed his condolences on the death of former Fine Gael Senator Paul Coghlan.

"I am deeply saddened to hear of the passing of former Fine Gael Senator Paul Coghlan.

"Paul was a very proud Kerryman, and over the course of his professional life was a member of Killarney Urban District Council, to which he was first elected in 1985, Kerry County Council, to which he was elected in 1991, Kerry VEC and Dingle Harbour Commissioners. He was also a founding director of Radio Kerry and was a trustee and former Chairman of Muckross House. "In his political life, Paul Coghlan was first elected to Seanad Éireann in 1997 on the Industrial and Commercial Panel, where he served until 2020.

"During his time in Seanad Éireann, Paul served as Leas-Cathaoirleach and Government Chief Whip of the Seanad, as well as Fine Gael spokesperson for Defence. He also served on the Oireachtas Committee on the Implementation of the Good Friday Agreement and the Joint Oireachtas Committees on EU Affairs and Finance.

He was very collegial and affable in his approach to politics. He would talk to anyone and fell out with no one. While we did not always see eye to eye on policy, he was always very kind, very good company and he will be missed by his colleagues and party.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has said it was deeply saddened to learn of the passing of the late Paul Coghlan, a long-time member of chamber who was a very effective

and dedicated president of the organisation in 1980.

A statement issued by joint presidents, Pádraig Treacy and Johnny McGuire, said Paul was involved in almost every facet of Killarney life and he made an enormous contribution to local business and the community.

Deputy Michael Healy Rae also offered his condolences. "It is with great sadness that we all learned of the passing of the late Paul Coghlan on the Thursday 8th June 2023. Paul was probably one of the most courteous kind and sincere Politicians ever to come out of Kerry. He always had a good and kind word for everyone, and his popularity crossed all party political divides. I had always thought at the time of his retirement that he would become a forever unofficial Mayor of Kerry and Ambassador for the County who would always be on hand to attend when required in particularly to meet visitors to the County be it businesspeople or people from the world of Politics. Unfortunately, and sadly, that was not to be as illness took that opportunity from him.

Everyone will always remember his kind smile, his friendly words", Deputy Healy Rae said.

Cllr. Patrick O'Connor Scarteen paid tribute to a great friend of his family.

"RIP Paul Coghlan a great friend of our family especially my father Michael and I . Paul was a true gentleman, warm and witty. He was a canny, principled and loyal Politician. The former Fine Gael Senator, Councillor and Mayor of Killarney was a formidable Parliamentarian who loved Kerry and assisting people and community organisations throughout the County.

He also had great success as an Auctioneer and in his various business interests", Cllr. O'Connor Scarteen said.

Mayor of Killarney, Cllr. Niall Kelleher also extended his sympathies I wish to extend my sympathies to the wife and family of the late Paul Coghlan whose passing, on Thursday, caused great sadness in the town. Paul was a larger-than-life character who contributed enormously, over a long period of time, to business and political life and he always had the interests of Killarney and its people at heart. 

MUNSTER TECHNOLOGICAL UNIVERSITY KERRY CAMPUS Awarded €830,000

Munster Technological University – Kerry Campus has secured €830,000 in funding to provide over 330 places under the Government's Springboard+ initiative for the academic year 2023/2024. In total, MTU Kerry Campus is offering 11 Springboard+ courses as part of its suite of part-time offerings.

These funded places are spread across a broad range of disciplines including Culinary Skills, Pharmacy Management and Circular Economy, as well as Sustainable Agriculture, Industrial Instrumentation and Automation, Industry 4.0 and Building Information Modelling (BIM) with Revit, Leadership and Transformational Change and Manufacturing Sterilisation and Validation Science. MTU worked closely with the South West Regional Skills Forum in developing and prioritising its Springboard+ offerings in line with the needs of industry and business in the region.

Springboard+ courses are free for people who are unemployed, those who were previously self-employed and returners to the workforce. Courses at NFQ Level 6 are also free for those in employment. For employed participants on courses NFQ level 7 – 9, 90% of the course fee is government-funded, with participants required to contribute just

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

Killarney at the back of the class in housing and roads - but hope at last for the N71

A huge revamp for social and affordable housing is underway in St Kevin's former mental asylum overlooking Cork city.

Just how much longer its sister asylum, St Finan's, is to be 'overlooked' when it comes to its obvious housing potential is a question being put to Councillor Brendan Cronin.

The real lack in Killarney is not so much social but affordable housing - apartments and houses that can be bought at reasonable price.

Brendan Cronin has pushed the case for Finan's as far as he can. Disappointingly, no senior political figure in Kerry seems to have got behind him.

St Kevin's was taken under the wing of the Land Development Agency pre-Covid. The diggers moved in last month, and the first of 266 homes from townhouse apartments to four-bed family homes will be available in 2024.

'Our asylum' has been allowed to sit and stagnate. Only recently has the LDA begun to take interest. And 'begin' is the word. At the March meeting of the Killarney Municipal District, it was revealed senior council officials in Kerry were meeting with the LDA.

Contacted, the LDA said it was too soon to say if the discussions would get anywhere. It was only 'beginning' to look at the Killarney site.

Cork, with its three senior ministers, and a city council management anxious to get something done with an eyesore, stole a march on everyone and made sure the LDA were on board. The result is a landmark development that will transform the city and massively help Cork's housing.

'St Kevin's is a prime example of what can be done. The precedent is there. We have a similar scenario and nothing is being done. Do we lack political clout?' Brendan Cronin asks. He may have a point. We have one Government minister. And while Norma Foley's able and articulate performance is to be applauded, she is very much education and Tralee.

With Brendan Griffin, hamstrung and sidelined, since his announcement he is leaving politics, we don't have anyone anymore batting for us at senior political government level in Killarney. I look at the N71 road near the Muckross Post Office. This Killarney road is one of the country's main tourist roads.

It is a total embarrassment. Can there be a worse stretch of national road in the whole of Ireland?

On the upside, Kerry County Council 'recently submitted a report to TII on this matter', they tell me this week.

'The TII has approved the advertising of tenders for the work, which is estimated to cost in the region of €2m. And KCC anticipates receipt of those tenders 'by the end of this month,' they said.

Once a contractor is identified, approval will be sought - and it is hoped 'that work could be carried out in the autumn". I cannot but ask: why has this not been pushed before the tourist season? And why is this question left to a local columnist. Where are our TDs who must be getting a tidy sum in mileage alone up and down to the Dail? And if they can't secure the most basic housing and roads for their constituents, what is the purpose of all that running up and down to Dublin?

Councillor weighs in behind facilities for Dundag



At the same time, it is great to see a bit of upcoming political clout weighing in behind facilities for sunbathers and swimmers at Dundag.

Kerry County Councillor Michael Cahill FF (watch this space, I see Michael Cahill throwing his hat in for a nomination on the FF ticket) contacted by people from Killarney, has raised it with county council management.

The Health and Safety requirements of modern society demand that proper year-round toilet facilities be provided wherever people gather regularly in numbers, he maintains.

They have told him that they provide public toilets at Blue Flag beaches 'only.'

Michael is calling for a change in the council attitude. In this world of increased outdoor pursuits, people are in the open air all year round and a basic requirement is a public toilet, he says.

"Killarney is the most important tourist town in Ireland, with its stunning scenery, its National Park and its lakes. And yet the basic human need of toilet facilities is not provided at Dundag beach, which is thronged during the fine weather by both residents and visitors,' is how Michael puts it.

Kerry County Council have told him that they provide public toilets at Blue Flag beaches

'only', which immediately rules out Dundag.

"I believe that a total review of where these facilities must be undertaken now, to include places like Dundag. We must provide year round Public Toilet facilities wherever people gather, not alone in our towns and villages, but at beauty spots throughout the county," said the Rossbeigh based councillor.

It is illegal and unseemly to do one's 'business' in public and therefore it is incumbent on the powers that be, to build public toilets to cater for the people's needs, he argues.

'We are after all supposed to be the premier tourist county in Ireland," Michael added.

New Vistas are being opened up in Killarney

Between January and April the Meitheal woodland volunteers quietly clear the invasive rhododendron ponticum from the national park. For the first time in seventy years the woodland floor is seeing the light in the Blue Pool and a sister project across the road near the Abbey. Something like thirty full days have been put into the Abbey to New Bridge section and it is possible now for the first time in decades to

Apart from the new vista, what brought me to this is the shocking increase in the purple plant this year. Johnny McGuire who is foreman of the Meitheal project tells me it is back 'ten times stronger' than it ever was after the '21 fire in Glena. Mangerton is in a similar state after the February fire there.

walk where there is no rhododendron.

'Four ft high and flowering,' is how he puts it. Fires increase the spread of rhodo. Well outside the national park, rhodo has Caragh Lake taken over.

Minister Malcolm Noonan who spent summers working on rhododendron clearance in Killarney was presented with a pen fashioned from the wood of Killarney rhododendron when he met the Meitheal group in Muckross a few weeks ago.

'The pen is mightier than the hatchet,' Johnny McGuire says. He is hoping Minister Noonan will, with a stroke of a pen, declare rhodo as something more than an invasive species.

'Isn't it time rhododendron was declared a noxious weed?' Johnny asks.

This would strengthen the hand legally in the battle against rhododendron which is taking place all over the country now.

One of Ireland's most intriguing natural mysteries may soon be solved thanks to a cross-channel Cuckoo tracking project that aims to find out where Irish cuckoos spend their winter months. The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) hopes that the project will also answer the question of whether Irish cuckoos undertake a different migration strategy to their British counterparts across the Irish Sea.

The Cuckoo Tracking Project is being undertaken by the NPWS and the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO).

The Cuckoo, along with the Swallow and the Corncrake, has a long history in Ireland as a harbinger of summer. It typically arrives in the last days of April, which have often been referred to as 'the time of the cuckoo.' Cuckoos, or Cuach as gaelige, are a summer migrant to Ireland. Adult higher are recident here from April to early July having sport the winter

birds are resident here from April to early July, having spent the winter on the African continent. They are a unique bird in Ireland as they lay their eggs in other birds' nests and have no involvement in raising their young.

While the Cuckoo has been well-studied during the breeding season, very little is known about the routes they take once they head off on migration or where in Africa they spend the winter months. If these areas of importance could be identified, then scientists would be able to better understand habitat pressures that affect losses of the Cuckoo population.

Minister of State for Heritage Malcolm Noonan says he is looking forward to tracking the birds' movements and ushering in a new era for bird monitoring in Ireland adding "I'd like to congratulate the staff of the NPWS, in particular Sam Bayley, Mary Sheehan, Jamie Durrant, Emma Granville, Michael Killeen, Dan Flanagan and others, for their leadership and dedication to this project. It's great to see our national nature agency collaborating with the BTO on such important, multijurisdictional research."





BALLYFINNANE FESTIVAL OF SPEED IS OFFICIALLY LAUNCHED

Kerry Motor Club and the Ballyfinnane Community Council launched The Brian O'Neill Garden Equipment and Trailers Ballyfinnane Festival of Speed in the mid-Kerry village on Monday evening. This brandnew event will celebrate 120 years of closed-road motorsport in County Kerry on July 16.

On July 15 1903, Charles Rolls, who a year later became a founding partner of the Rolls Royce Motor Company won the Kerry Hillclimb, the final event in the first-ever Irish Speed Fortnight. The event paved the way for closed road motorsport in County Kerry and today the county boasts two very active motor clubs and four events ranging from an international rally, a national rally, a club rally and a historic rally. Next month Kerry Motor Club and Ballyfinnane Community Council will join forces to run a festival of motoring in Ballyfinnane. The highlight of the July 16 event will be a recreation of a speed hill climb in the area. It will be the first time since the mid-1980s that Kerry Motor Club has hosted a speed event in Kerry and as well as a host of local rally cars several single-seater formula racing cars are expected to contest the event.

Local business, Brian O'Neill Garden Equipment and Trailers was announced as the event's title sponsor at Monday night's launch. Additional support comes from Wharton Tool Hire and Moriarty's Central Car Sales.

Modern safety rules prevent the original course from being used but a new course has been identified by both Kerry Motor Club and the Motorsport Ireland Hillclimb Commission that will see the finish line almost beside the entrance to the Ballyfinnane Community Council's hall. As a result, the famous crossroads beside the Shanty Bar will become a hive of activity on the day with the official pitstop for the event set to take place within 500 metres in each direction of that area.

Around 80 cars are expected and each competitor will get between three and five runs at the course with the overall winner decided by the driver who sets the fastest time of the day on any of the runs.

The weekend's activities kick off on Saturday when The Kingdom Veteran, Vintage and Classic Car Club and the Irish Veteran and Vintage Car Club host a road run of period and classic cars from Castlemaine Village to their monument at the top of the original hill.

The KVVCC will issue full details of their event in due course but over 100 cars including close to 30 period cars are expected at this event which is due to pass through Ballyfinnane on the afternoon of July 15.

Later that day the first of the Kerry Motor Club hosted activities will begin with the safety inspection on competing cars set to take place from 2pm at Kerry Agricultural Services in the heart of Ballyfinnane. Drivers' briefings and marshals' sign-on will take place in the Community Hall from 2pm until 7pm.

A driver and car parade will take place in the village on Saturday night with a ceremonial start set to take place at the crossroads at around 9pm. Afterwards, there will be entertainment in the Shanty Bar.

The main action is scheduled for Sunday and a massive traffic management plan is in place for the day. Roads will be closed from at least 3kms from the village, there will be designated parking at these points and the organisers will provide a free shuttle bus service into the heart of the village. This service is only open to people who buy official programmes and these will be available to buy (cash only) from the car park attendants. A more detailed traffic management plan will be published nearer the event.

As well as the racing activities on Sunday, the Killarney Valley Classic and Vintage Club have come on board to organise a massive classic car display near the village. Over 200 cars are expected to go on show all day and a dedicated classic car-only entrance will operate from the Tralee/Farmer's Bridge side.

The Killarney club will also host live music and catering vans at their display.

There will also be a dedicated 'Blue Badge' holder entrance and a dedicated parking area will be available in the old creamery yard in the village.

Meanwhile, the village itself will be very busy on Sunday. There will be live commentary of the day's proceedings from a dedicated broadcast unit in the village. The organisers have secured spectator zones thanks to the support of local farmers and landowners. Other areas will remain strictly out of bounds for safety and operational reasons and attending spectators should seek advice from the many volunteer marshals on duty.

Adding to the occasion there will be a static display of local road racing motorcycles and other side shows.



THERE IS STILL A LOT TO PLAY FOR AS THE STATE EXAMS REACH THE **HALFWAY MARK**



As the state exams approach the end of the second week, many candidates have reached or are close to the end of the road. The optional subjects now take centre stage. As the number of candidates taking these subjects is considerably less than the number taking the compulsory subjects some exam centres will close early. Candidates from these centres will be relocated to a different centre for the remainder of the exam. The number of candidates in the school environment will also continue to decrease, so it's important for candidates who still have a job of work to do, not to feel left behind or become impatient to get over the finish line.

SEVEN DAYS

Normally in the final seven days, candidates will have one or two subjects from a standard seven left to do. However, it's not unknown for students to take an eight or even a ninth subject to complete a particular vocational grouping such as Biology, Physics and Chemistry. So, there is still a lot to play for. There are grades and points to be earned.

FOCUS

Candidates must guard against exam fatigue in the final weeks. The buzz of the early days is gone. There is less foot fall around the exam centres. Your remaining subjects are likely to be spaced out. These subjects have to be faced. They must be given priority between now and Tuesday week. Keep a lid on your impatience and stay in exam mode. You need to be as motivated, focussed and energetic as you were on the first exam day.

SESSIONS

Eight of the fifteen exam days will have passed by this Friday evening. There are fourteen more subject sessions in the remaining seven days. The number of candidates taking these subjects will be much less than in the earlier days of the exam. However, candidates concerned must defer any post exam celebrations. In sporting parlance, as Galway hurlers found out last Sunday, the game ends only with the final whistle. Defeat has often been snatched from the jaws of victory by one untimely lapse in concentration.

WEEKEND

The weekend provides an opportunity to recharge the batteries and to plan for next week. Enjoy some exercise and fresh air to prepare for the third week. A good work out will help you to sleep soundly, to build up stamina and endurance and to maintain your concentration for the last lap. Enjoy a few good nights' rest so that your mind and body are fully alert for the remaining papers. Organise your revision sessions for daylight hours. Don't burn the mid-night oil but go to bed early. Go over the tips and predictions for your remaining subjects. Resist the temptation to spend endless hours cramming course material. Scan your notes on the eve of any remaining paper so that the key concepts are fresh in your mind.

APPROACH

Maintain your disciplined and organised approach over the remaining days. Avoid late night socialising with those who have finished the exam. Keep your distance from alcohol as you'll need a clear head and lots of energy for the task ahead. Eat well as good nutrition is important in week three to avoid energy loss. Keep your fluid levels high to avoid dehydration.

GOOD PERFORMANCE

Candidates have performed very well during the past fortnight. Keep up the good work and bring your exam to a successful conclusion in your remaining subjects. Use your free days wisely. Stay positive and be confident in your ability to do well in next week's papers. Take it subject by subject and bring the curtain down on a stellar performance.







Kerry County Council's Arts Service is seeking sectoral and public input to the forthcoming Kerry Arts Strategy. This Arts Strategy will cover the period 2023-2033, building on the achievements of previous arts strategies, and looking to grow arts support and plan for development of the arts in Kerry.

The current Arts Strategy was informed by public consultation back in 2015/16 and saw an informed focus on three key areas. Firstly, supporting professional artists to live in and make work in Kerry. Having artists living in and making work in Kerry is important as this adds to our living culture, and innovation in the county. Importantly the creation of work ensures the many Kerry arts festivals, events, showcase opportunities, and venues can programme local content that is of a high calibre, inspiring practitioners, upcoming generations, and audiences alike.

Secondly, the strategy focused on youth arts, and arts in education. Promoting access for children and young people to the arts across artforms, has been central to former Kerry Arts Strategies. In addition to Kerry County Council's Arts Service delivery, the national landscape has changed since the last consultation. There is a significant increase in arts supported activity for children in schools through Creative Schools, Teacher Artist Partnerships (TAP), and Bringing Live Arts to Students & Teachers (BLAST). The development of Music Generation Kerry and the Kerry Local Creative Youth Partnership have further progressed arts for young people in Kerry.

The third priority of the previous strategy was strategic partnerships. Kerry County Council Arts Service continues to work with many committed partners on the Sliabh Luachra Music Trail, Music Generation

Kerry, Screen Kerry & Film Stakeholder Group on film development, Creative Places Úibh Rathaigh, and with the Arts Council on agreed shared objectives.

On issuing this call out for public input, Kate Kennelly, Arts Officer stated, 'I want to firstly thank Kerry County Council's Strategic Policy Committee for their continued support & input to planning for the arts. I want to thank the artists, arts festivals, arts venues, partner organisations, the Arts Council, and the public that support our work; this support is the corner stone to all we do to further the arts in Kerry. We look forward to hearing how Kerry people want the arts to grow over the coming ten vears'.

SUMMER EYES

As the weather gets warmer and the days grow longer, we often think about improving our health and getting into better shape. As you prepare to enjoy the outdoors this summer, don't forget a plan for keeping your eyes happy as well.

Avoid getting"sunburn of the eye."

When sunlight shines off water, sand or other highly reflective surfaces into your eyes, it can cause a very painful condition called photokeratitis. This is when the sun's ultraviolet rays burn the surface of your eye. Pain, redness, blurriness and even temporary vision loss are symptoms of this condition. Prevent photokeratitis by wearing sunglasses that are marked "100% UV protection." Also, wear a broad-brimmed hat for added eye protection.

Prevent "swimmer's eye" in the pool.

Pools can be tough on the eyes. Chemicals used to keep the water clean, such as chlorine, can affect the natural tear film that keeps our eyes moist and healthy. The result can be Red, gritty-feeling eyes and blurry vision. Keep eyes feeling and looking good by wearing swim goggles in the pool, and splash your closed eyes with fresh water immediately after getting out of the pool.

Keep dry eye at bay.

Spending time outside when it is hot, dry or windy can irritate a common condition called dry eye. A hot, dry environment affects the tear film, drying out the eye's surface. "Ring of Kerry Not Fit for Purpose"

Cllr. Cahill

The road network on the Ring of Kerry route is not fit for purpose on a number of levels and requires major investment as a matter of urgency, according to Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill. He believes the importance of the route to the nation's economy has not been recognised by in the Government Departments of Finance, Transport, Tourism etc.

"I am repeating myself when saying that the Ring of Kerry is at least as important to Ireland as is the M50, but is not matched with investment funding" statedCouncillorCahill.

"For all its beauty, it is frustrating to see major faults that could be corrected through Architectural, Engineering, Construction and Maintenance ingenuity, left unaddressed. The vast majority of all tourism in Ireland, be it international or internal, passes through the Ring of Kerry which is famed all over the globe" said Councillor Cahill.

"There are stretches of roadway that are dangerous to both traveller and vehicle. There are beauty spots where shrubbery and trees hinder or completely block the view. At Caragh Bridge, near Glenbeigh there is only one traffic lane, which would be seen as a joke if it wasn't such a safety hazard. The condition of the road and footpaths through Caherciveen





town are a disgrace for manyyears. The road from Caherciveen to Waterville is in a shocking and dangerous condition and the list goes on and on. We are expecting modern day visitors, using modern day means of transport to travel a route of approximately 180km in old world conditions. I have said it before, if we do not invest in this piece of vital tourism infrastructure, we will kill the Golden Goose that is the Ring of Kerry" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"It requires a dedicated Maintenance Team, major roadwork's investment, major bridge replacement investment, provision of parking, traffic management upgrades in our towns and villages, complete removal of shrubbery at beauty viewing areas and more" stated Councillor Cahill.

"The Ring of Kerry road has been neglected for decades and the time is now to invest in the future of Irish tourism and where better to start than at the Ring of Kerry, Ireland's premier tourist attraction "added Kerry Fianna Fáil man.

Ireland on verge of additional seat in the European Parliament

n a significant development, Seán Kelly, a Member of the Constitutional Affairs Committee of the European Parliament, welcomes the fact that Ireland is set to gain an additional seat in the European Parliament in the upcoming elections. This news comes after Monday evening's committee vote endorsed the plan demonstrating a positive step forward for Irish representation in the EU. The vote with passed with 16 in favour, 10 against and 2 abstentions.

During the vote, the Constitutional Affairs Committee, supported the amended draft report on the composition of the European



Parliament for the 2024 – 2029 legislative term, which proposed adding 11 extra Members of the European Parliament (MEPs). Sean Kelly confirmed that this includes one additional MEP for Ireland.

Highlighting the purpose behind the report, MEP Kelly stated, "The proposal aims to bring the total number of MEPs up to 716, instead of the current 705, in order to ensure the principle of "degressive proportionality". This principle guarantees that smaller member states are allocated more seats than would be if the calculation was done strictly in proportion to their population. This prevents smaller states from being underrepresented."

Under this proposal, Ireland will gain one additional seat, along with Austria, Denmark, Finland, Slovakia, Slovenia, and Latvia. Furthermore, Spain and the Netherlands will both gain two additional seats. "These adjustments are necessary due to changes in population figures, as the current allocation of seats in the Parliament no longer aligns with the Treaty provisions. The population in some EU member states has gradually increased, and

an increase in citizens warrants an increase in MEPs", added Kelly.

"Ireland is a European success story and has been transformed by the opportunities that the EU offers. We have moved from a benefactor to contributor, and when you factor in Brexit, it makes sense for Ireland to have another MEP", said Kelly.

Kelly emphasised the importance of finalizing the proposal in a timely manner, stating, "This procedure must be completed in time to allow member states to introduce the necessary modifications to their respective electoral laws. With the 2024 European Parliament election scheduled for 6 to 9 June 2024, the proposal needs to be finalized as soon as possible."

The proposal will now proceed to a plenary vote this Thursday (June 15). If adopted, it will require approval from the Member States (Council) before being implemented. The outcome of this vote holds significant implications for Ireland's representation in the European Parliament, ensuring that its voice and interests are effectively represented at the EU level.

New Garda control centres must put community service first

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Justice, Pa Daly TD, has today called for the new Garda control centre system to "put community service first" and "not compromise the strengths of local Garda stations".

Teachta Daly said: "Traditionally, people are used to calling up their local Garda station and getting a sympathetic ear and someone with local knowledge. Under the new Computer Aided Dispatch II (CADII) system, calls are now routed to a centralised control facility.

"For calls in County Kerry, calls are now handled through Cork City. I have heard from constituents of a number of incidents where they phoned a local station, only to be put through to the centre.

"These were constituents in rural areas in Kerry, where local knowledge is absolutely key and the service in these instances left something to be desired. Response times were long and these constituents were left

frustrated.

"Sinn Féin believe in reform of our policing service. The use and application of technology to maximise resources and increase efficiencies absolutely must be a part of that.

"However, there are some traditional strengths within local stations. Trust has been built up over time between Gardaí stationed locally and the community there.

"Time for the new system to bed in will be crucial, but community service must be at the heart of these new processes."

KERRY V LOUTH

Kerry travel to Portlaoise this weekend for a banana skin clash with Mickey Harte's Louth. The Wee County are comparatively limited but extremely durable and Kerry supporters would be well advised to temper their expectations – I'd shake your hand on a one point win right now if I could.

I don't know what to make of Kerry this season. Teams have learnt how to lockpick our defensive structure from last year, while up front we are leaning heavily on David Clifford's broad shoulders for the margin between aspirants and genuine contenders. Paul Murphy adopting the outside sweeper role normally taken up by Tadjhg Morley against Cork was highly successful on our last outing. Time is getting thin for Brian Ó Beaglaíoch to break into the starting team. I don't see Jack O'Connor making any dramatic changes anyway; it's a bit late in the championship season to start second guessing yourself. I wouldn't expect Stephen O'Brien to start, but I would like to see him him get a decent chunk of action - our half forward line are mostly trojans, but I want a rapier in there and Stephen has a direct cutting edge. I think there is general acceptance that Adrian Spillane has to start. Diarmuid O'Connor is finally starting to look like himself again (I think the injury layoff hurt impacted him and Seán O'Shea more than is generally appreciated) while Jack Barry's workrate doesn't get the credit it deserves, but there isn't a Ruane, Donnelly, Fenton, or a McDaid ti impose themselves on the play in Kerry and we need to be honest about that. We need Adrian's presence and his controlled aggression.

I'm confident of a Kerry win here. Louth are a very solid side – Harte gets the maximum from them – and they do have a special player in Sam Mulroy, but Kerry have too many aces at both ends. This one won't silence any doubters, since a win is expected and will most likely be harder work than most supporters realise, but it should start giving us a foundation going forward.

I'll be keeping note of Mayo v Cork as well. I thought Cork finished against Kerry a lot stronger than the started, and I still say that there's the bones of a very good team in Cork. I'll be surprised if the League champions are able to blow them away – surprised, and very worried if Mayo can do that.

BLAST FROM THE PAST All Ireland Semi-Final 23/8/1953, Croke Park Kerry 3-6 Louth 1-6

Kerry had plenty of reasons to be worried about this one. Louth, after all, had beaten them well just three years previously, 1-7 to 0-8, at the same stage. Moreover, Kerry were still a bit shaken after being hammered – absolutely

hammered – by Cork the year before. Kerry had brought in Ned Roche, who had been playing with Tipperary, and the Cronin brothers of Milltown, who had been playing in Cork, to bolster the ranks, but the public jury was still out on the merits of the move. Paddy Bawn Brosnan, easily Kerry's best player in 1952, had retired. Jerome O'Shea was absent through illness. Micksie Palmer had been accidentally spiked with a pitchfork while doing farmwork. Donal Marcus O'Neill had been dropped by Dr. Eamonn with no explanation forthcoming.

Kerry had familiar names – Legion's O'Sullivan brothers and former teen prodigy Donie Murphy, Tadhgie Lyne, Eddie Dowling, Jackie Lyne, Seán Murphy, the Brosnans of Moyvane. But Ned Roche was relatively untested in front of Johnny Foley's goal and Kilcummin's Seán Kelly a newcomer up front. Bobby Buckley of Clounmacon was a brilliant athlete, but had he the football for this level? It turned out that he most certainly did. He got the nod ahead of the young John Dowling from Rahillys and Dermot Hanafin Snr. of Desmonds in midfield.

Louth had great footballers in their own right. Stephen White would have walked onto any team in the country, including Kerry. Dermot O'Brien, who would become a huge singing star and hugely popular in Maurice O'Donoghue's Gleneagle Hotel in later years, wasn't far behind him. Hubert Reynolds, the Conlons, Jimmy McDonnell, Paddy Markey....make no mistake. These were known men.

Kerry got the perfect start through their two best players. Big John Cronin sent a rocket in to Tom Ashe, who rounded Jim Tuft and blasted to the net. Shortly after Cronin found Tadghie Lyne, who slid it across with his foot for Ashe to fire home a second. Seán Kelly made it three and Kerry led by 3-1 to 0-5 at half-time. Louth had grown into the play and would be hugely competitive in a thrilling second half. White had Kerry captain Paudie Sheehy in his pocket (famously, John Joe Sheehy would recuse himself from the selection meeting for the final at which his son was dropped). Micksie Palmer came on but wasn't his usual self at all. Gerald O'Sullivan and Mick Brosnan did come on and pick off points - Kerry needed them. Gerald came on for Jim Brosnan, who had picked up a knock, but Jim later came on himself to replace the tiring Tom Ashe - an early example of a blood sub before such a thing existed. Louth brought on Kevin McArdle, and he was the best player on the pitch in that second half, his only rival for the honour was Kerry's Jas. Murphy. It was Jas.'s finest hour in a Kerry jersey - and that's no small thing to say.

That was seventy years ago. You can argue that gaelic football has changed completely in the interim, but I'd argue that the stories and the personalities and the pride in both teams....no, it's not as different as you might think.

KERRY MINORS ADVANCE TO LAST FOUR

All Ireland Minor Quarter-Final: Kerry 2-13 Kildare 1-11

They aren't perfect. They certainly aren't the best minor team I've ever seen – I'd have to think about that one, but offhand I'd say 1992 (a last minute goal by Cork undid a fiercely talented team), 2008 (caught by Mayo in a replay), 2012 (Tipperary stunned them and went on to make history), 2014 (even the bench was scary good)

or 2016 (that O'Shea/Clifford axis) would be contenders.

This team are not that. Or not yet, anyway. That's what I really like about them, the constant improvement. Competitive games will do that, but only if the mental buy-in is right by both players and management. Kerry made mistakes in that first game against Cork, but had clearly worked on them by the Limerick game. That one was a bit too easy for Kerry, I think teams emerge from dogfights with lessons on board, but Kerry won that one in cruise control. Cork again was the real test, and this time we were ready for Cork. An excellent gameplan to stymie them and the players with both the skills and discipline to implement it. I'd be pretty sure that Kerry have the strongest midfield pairing left in the competition in Evan Boyle and Daniel Kirby (my understanding is that the Stacks man is likely to be back for the semi-final). Ben Murphy being freed from the restrictions of the full back role is a master stroke. I saw an understrength Stacks minor side take red hot favourites North Kerry to extra-time and a one point loss in the Minor County Championship two years ago. I asked if the young corner forward was in with the Kerry minors that year. He wasn't - he was only fifteen years old at the time.

A narrative that I and some others of my generation would have enjoyed (without labouring the point in print - young lads have enough on their shoulders without fools like me adding the weight of history) would have been Kildare's captain Ben Ryan and Kerry's Jamie Moynihan facing each other. They didn't like their football skill from the stones - Kildare's Glenn and Kerry's Seamus knew each other on the field before either of their sons were born! A worry for me is what seems to be a slight over-reliance on Paddy Lane for scores. Tomás Kennedy is good for a monster score or two, Dara Hogan is a fine footballer, Stephen Gannon is very direct and effective off the bench. But take Paddy out of the Kildare or Cork games, and we could easily have been looking at a completely different narrative.

He opened Kerry's account with a brilliant point from play. Kildare keeper Cathal Moore opened their account from a free but Paddy clipped over again. Joey Cunningham with a Kildare free, but it was Kerry who were playing most of the football. Paudie Fitzgerald kicked a nice point and Paddy won and converted a free. We were leaving good chances behind, though, five wides and two short already. On another day, that'll come with a price tag.

Kildare took the lead against the run of play, the defence for once giving Harry Redmond too much space and he produced a clinical low finish. 1-2 to 0-4, and a sharp wake-up call for Kerry. No harm, either, they needed a jolt.

Paddy with his left leg to square things and his pinpoint pass set up Dara Hogan for another. Joey Cunning ham punished afoul on Tadhg Donlon. Paddy had a shot deflected off the crossbar by an alert keeper and Tomás Kennedy was short before James Hoare closed out the first half with Kerry in front.

Half-time Kerry 0-7 Kildare 1-3

Pádraig Moynihan won a free for Paddy to open the second half scoring, but Kildare drew level

through Paul O'Dea and Joey Cunningham./ Kerry, as has been their wont in previous games, were beginning to open the engine now. Paddy coolly fired over. It looked as if his next chance had been closed down but instead a beautifully judged lob rose over everyone and dipped into the far corner of the net. With another player, you might suspect that he got lucky with a point attempt – but I've seen Paddy attempt this kind of thing before and pull it off. Ben Murphy and Evan Boyle were totally dominant in midfield now and Ben slotted a point himself. 1-10 to 1-5; the gates were creaking.

Joey Cunningham pulled one back but Paddy added two more, sandwiching a Tomás Kennedy score. Cunningham, impressively defiant all through, slotted three more points and he would add a fourtyh before the finish. But before then, Ben Murphy had absolutely slalomed through the defence (let us whisper it; they were very slow to close ranks) for what

will surely be a goal of the season contender. That it was a flourish, and not a necessity, says a lot.

Mind you, Monaghan are a different story. Monaghan played Kerry in the 2018 minor semi-final, and it was a ferocious game. It was the first Monaghan minor team to ever play in Croke Park and I felt that they were a little bit stilted and overawed for the first twenty minutes. When they loosened the shackles.... my word, but they were a great football team. That was a very good Kerry minor team -Colm Moriarty, Dan McCarthy, Paul O'Shea, Paul Walsh, Dan Murphy, Killian Falvey, Dylan Geaney....and they were put to the absolute pin of their collars to get out of that one. Given how dominant Monagah were against a Mayo side that were my favourites for the All ireland, I wouldn't expect this one to be any different.

CAMOGIE All Ireland Intermediate Championship:

Meath 3-15 Kerry 0-11

A tough one to take, especially after Kerry made a fantastic start. Kerry boomed over long range beauties from Jackie Horgan and Patrice Diggin straight away. Meath had serious pace but Kerry players like Sara Murphy, Rachel McCarthy, Áine O'Connor, Kate Lynch, Caoimhe Spillane, and Ellen O'Donoghue. Patrice's sharpshooting helped us into a 0-6 to 0-2 lead. Kerry's problem was that they were heavbily dependent of two players for all of their scores, whereas Meath had a multiplicity of threats. Kerry felt the absence of Amy O'Sullivan and Norette Casey, both of whom know where the posts are, very badly. Meath gradually started taking control and trailed by just a point, 0-8 to 0-7, at half-time.

The second half was a bit of a disaster. Meath hit us for a rapid 1-2 (sharpshooter Aoife Minogue with the penalty) and never looked back. Meath hit uis for 3-8 and we only scored 0-3 in return, none from play. The second goal was an unfortunate fumble of a speculative Minogue ball in, but the game was visibly slipping away from us already by then, and sub Nadine Doyle slotted the third to finish out an impressive display by Merath.

Kerry have to beat Laois and hope that Meath hammer Westmeath. That would leave us level on points with

COUNTY HURLING CHAMPIONSHIP

Look, I and anybody else would have as good a chance of predicting Love Island after the first episode as predicting the outcome of the Kerry hurling championship. I honestly think that it is wide open. Obviously the reigning champions will start as favourites – Causeway caught me a little bit by surprise last year. It's not that they have spectacular individual talent, but their tackling and shooting efficiency....very hard to look pasta team who can produce that consistently. Ballyduff will knock on the door

but it might be a year too soon for them to fully blend in their impressive flow of underage talent of recent years. Kilmoyley will be there or thereabouts. St. Brendans and Lixnaw are not quite the force of old. I don't see enough scoring power in Ballyheigue. Dr. Crokes have been growing since they entered the senior championship - Keating, Doyle, and Lenihan wouldn't be out of place on the Kerry seniors. Have they the depth? I don't know - but I'll learn an awful lot when I see them against Abbeydorney, whom I consider to be serious dark horses. Again, look at their younger talent coming through; Abbeydorney are seriously under-estimated in my opinion. Crotta are another side who will take watching. They can be mercurial but when they hit form, they are lightning. The Kerry hurling championship demands consistency though.

I have no idea how any of this is going to unfold. But I'm looking forward to finding out.

IRELAND TO FACE GREECE IN CRUCIAL TIE

Irish soccer pundits have been relying on hype more than substance for...well, mostly forever, apart from the pragmatism of the Charlton era. But for once, this game really does have the significance attached to it. Quite simply, if Stephen Kenny beats Greece tonight – and we should, at least on paper – then he has successfully stabilised a ship that was in real danger of sinking, not least after being holed by its own pursar. If we lose...well, it renders the rest of the games probably moot, and Ireland doesn't do well with 'probablies'. It's basically all on the line tonight.

Greece have a good recent record in games, but it looks a little flattering. They have struggled against the likes of Kosovo, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Cyprus, Slovenia....sound familiar? It should. Now, they did beat Sweden and gave Finland a fierce rattle; I'm certainly not suggesting that they are any pushover. Worryingly...very worringly...they score at least once in almost all of theuir games. Let';s be honest, we can't say as much.

I'm writing this before the team is announced, so a lot of this is just guesswork, but Stephen Kenny isn't the kind of manager who springs rabbits out of hats. We have a good keeper - I can't see Kelliher dislodging Bazunu until he's first choiuce at a club. Solid defence. Collins, Egan, O'Shea and Darragh Lenihan have stepped up for me. McClean is not the force he was and O'Dowda has tremendous workrate but I'm not sure he can read danger early enough. Then again, he's always been used in a utility role.

Midfield is more a shrug than a roar. They'll work and have the potential to be very effective. Cullen has really grown into the game. Hendrick is solid, and there's an awful lot to be said for that. Jason Knight, when on song, can be dangerous, and Will Smallbone even more so. I can see Smallbone getting on the scoresheet tonight – provided that Ireland aren't afraid to take them on, and in fairness to Kenny, he doesn't rely on lone striker and long ball. Smallbone has pace going forward and he

can really shoot.

Up front? This is Ireland's problem and has been for years. Let's facing it, for the bones of five years our main scoring threat was Richard Dunne heading home a setpiece. Put a young Robbie Keane in that team and I'd be confident. Robbie was as cocky as they come, but with good reason. Is Ferguson that good? As good as we were assured Troy Parrott was going to be? Or Idah? Or Obafemi? Tom Cannon is the subject of current tabloid speculation that he is rejecting Ireland in favour of England. I'll suspend my disbelief to wait and see - this is the silly season for transfer rumours in general and the main tabloid source is one that makes the likes of Fox News or the Daily Mail look informative. Actually, the hype around those lads, especially Parrott, was preposterous. Parrott lining out for Ireland was made out to be like Messi signing for PSG. But Ferguson? This lad really does look like the real deal. This is an Irish player whose name gets linked to the big clubs, and our first inclination isn't to laugh. Ireland have had solid, hard-working and reliable but blunt force teams for along time; Ferguson as a cutting edge could prove the difference. Moreover, having a threat like him draws the opposition focus, opening gaps for the likes of Smallbone, who has the same kind of electric pace as Idah and I think has a better shot at the end of it.

CHAMPIONS LEAGUE FINAL

Doing the treble of Premiership, FA Cup, and Champions League is spectacular. You can (and quite possibly should) include a caveat regarding 115 charges of financial wrongdoing (not that anyone really expects anything to come of that, given FIFA's own record) and that it's owned outright by a regime that is most certain, to western ideologies (including very, very strongly my own) extremely repressive, misogynistic, and especially and horribly homophobic. The US is moving in the same direction, unfortunately.

In the corridors of power, be it Lausanne or Washington or Stormont, the truth is that nobody cares. The great Irish philosopher Edmund Burke lived in and argued against a similarly repressive regime in the French Revolution. He is commemorated by a statue outside Trinity College - which led to someone describing St. Stephen's Green as the place where "the orator Edmund Burke looks across at the Bank of Ireland - and only the money talks". That's fairly apt in global terms nowadays, and it was surely obvious during the tame acquiescence as a World Cup was played in Qatar. Bit late to start calling out Man City, lads. With Gianni Infantino pushing the idea of a Club World Cup (because we can't have profits going to national organising bodies, and we don't care about the workload on players), a European Superleague is not only going to come up again in conversation, I believe that it's an inevitability. So if you think that any of this is about growing the game or is going to go back to the grassroots in any way, well....do you mind if I take a selfie with you? Because you are just adorably naive.

To be fair, you could substitute golf for soccer in

this piece and it would work just as well, and for the same reason (in fact, it's the same money). I have nothing against Man City themselves. Neither Pep nor his players are responsible for the club finances. They come across as welladjusted and likeable professionals - give me that much money at that age and I suspect I would not be very likeable at all. They are a joy to watch. Okay, they emphasize defence, but in a playmaking way. Haaland isn't a new Aguero - he's like Aguero in the way that David Clifford is similar to Colm Cooper, i.e. add another three stone of compact muscle. I never thought I'd see a more complete striker than Shearer in the Premiership. Bergkamp had more technique, Wright and Cole had speed, Henry was instinctively brilliant, even lan Rush was a deadlier poacher, but Shearer just had it all, including a natural selfishness. Haaland? Different animal. I know he has the best club supply lines of any club ever (Messi and Ronaldo never gave their fellow strikers enough freedom, most notably Barcelona playing Ibrahamovich as a wide winger) but pace, power, control.... Just wow.

And he's still not the reason I would watch them. That's De Bruyne. It's a much overused term in sports, but he really is a visionary. As far as I can tell, he can see in four dimensions instead of three. His eye for a killer pass is only matched by his ability to deliver it. Would I pay money to watch him play in person? Oh, yeah. So there's nothing wrong with the team. Nor is the club a rich man's plaything. PSG have come across as a vanity project, just as Chelsea did when Abramovich first arrived. Man City are not that. No, Sheikh Mansour has invested heavily in infrastructure and in the Manchester community. They did buy the best players, but they had a long term strategy (other clubs Chelsea and Man United, take note) and bought to fit that, instead of buying the most expensive players and then trying to structure a team around them.

But admirable to all of that is, it is also a part of the problem. Sport may be structured along business lines, with corporate jargon common to both - but its lifeblood is actually dreams and figments of imagination. Supporters don't go to games because their team will always win. They go because they can dream of it. You can argue that soccer in England has always been about the wealth of the various clubs ever since the removal of the wage cap (it was basically a means of almost slave labour but it did level the playing field) but Liverpool in the eighties, United in the nineties, Chelsea....the richest clubs always hoover up the best players. But the disparity has never been this great. Say what you will about Alex Ferguson's team (really, you can say what you want, I encourage it) but there was an element of romance and fantasy about that one, especially with the homegrown contingent. Let's be honest as well as respectful here, Munich added a certain depth and pathos to that entire narrative that made begrudgery impossible. Man United supporters could dream of a European Cup and eventually achieved it, and the drama of the end of that match

For Man City supporters, it was more

expectation than aspiration. They were always going to win the League; I never had the slightest doubt about that. No other team has their depth. Blips along the way and especially Arsenal's chances were vastly exaggerated by a media desperate for a narrative. The FA Cup? I'd say take it or leave it. It has a sentimentality, but none of the top managers are risking big competitions for that bit of decoration. The League and Europe are the business end, and the most expensive team are always the obvious favourites.

Congratulations to City on a treble. It just wasn't a story with any twists or turns. It wasn't an adventure. This year, it's the unfancied but very effective Denver Nuggets, who comprehensively beat the unlovable but impressive Miami Heat, who are this year's beanstalk climbers. That's the kind of story that lifts fans out of their seats and, to be blunt, gets them to empty their wallets. Man City? Not so much.

On Friday last, Kerry FC were at home for the second time this week as they faced promotion hopefuls Athlone Town in Mount Hawk Park. FIRST HALF:

The first half started quite even in possession with no big chances for either side. Athlone started slightly on top with the ball more in their attacking half, but they made nothing of it. It was the home side with the first big opportunity when they had a goal ruled out for offside in the fifteenth minute. Togor Silong's tackle set Kerry away but a slow pass into the path of Ryan Kelliher which took a deflection was brilliantly finished by the number nine, but the linesmanruled it out questionably.

After the offside goal, Kerry started to gain a foothold in the game, and they played the ball around much calmer and more controlled. Kerry would need to capitalize on this period of pressure if they wanted to bring something in at half time to give the visitors a run for their money.

Against the run of play, Athlone would have their first big chance of the game. A pass along the ground, flicked on by Frantz Pierrot, made its way into Adam Lennon. His left-footed shot on the left side of the box was judged poorly and his effort went wide from the bottom right corner, helping Kerry feel relieved.

This first half started to look like a game of chess, as it was end-to-end and only seemed like a matter of time until one of the sides would edge ahead. Kerry came close again with fifteen minutes left in the half. A trademark long throw-in from Sam Aladesanusi arrived at Sean McGrath who flicked the ball on beautifully to Ronan Teahan at the byline. Ronan crossed back into McGrath who had a backheel effort gathered by Enda Minoque.

To the home fans dismay, it would be Athlone to go ahead first. A throw put into the feet of Valerii Dolia broke into the box at pace and had his left foot shot whipped around and found the bottom left corner. A goal that Kerry would be very dissatisfied with to give away so close to half time as it really came from nothing. From the very even first half it seemed like Kerry once again had it all to do in the second.

SECOND HALF:

The second half started as a carbon copy of the first, Athlone were slightly on top, but nothing separated the sides. Kerry seemed to be one good pass away from being in on goal on every attack. It was a half of football dominated by only one team. That was Kerry FC. A fantastic cross from deep into the box by Matt Keane put serious pressure on the Athlone backline. A ping pong type of attack saw Kerry not being able to get a shot off and Athlone struggled to clear the ball before eventually doing so.

As the half went on Athlone really started to feel the constant pressure that the home side were putting them under as they struggled to get out of their own half. Athlone's defensive line was one of two. Either very impressive and well-structured or saved by poor linesmen's decisions

that stopped Kerry from having a couple of real opportunities deep into the attacking third. Most in Mounthawk would agree it was the second.

With just eighteen minutes to play, Kerry seemed to have leveled. A pass through the middle by Ronan Teahan was received in Dennis Bergkamp-style fashion by Ryan Kelliher who turned his defender superbly. He took a left-footed shot from just nine yards out that seemed to find the bottom left corner only for Athlone goalkeeper Enda Minogue to pull off a save-of-the-season contender and tip it onto the post. This save kept Kerry at bay again and made them feel like it

was not their night.

The Kerry lads will have nightmares of Minogue in the days to come as he popped up again to catch a thumping cross into the box from Teahan which seemed definite to find someone in a Kerry shirt.

The closing minutes of the game were still all Kerry and the Athlone lads played as if the 1-0 would be enough to keep them safe. Evidently, it would be enough, and Athlone left Mount Hawk Park with a stolen three points.

Kerry would leave both devastated that they could not nick something but also immensely proud at the fact that they were the better team on the night. This break comes at the right time and the boys can rest and relax before kicking off the second half of the season away to Bray WanderersBon the twenty-third of June.

Pollution to the River Laune "devastating"

- Cllr. Michael Cahill

Local Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has described as devastating the announcement by the Environmental Protection Agency that the River Laune in Kerry is one of two remaining rivers in the country in 'bad condition'.

"I previously raised this issue with Kerry County Council through a Notice of Motion last year where I called for the source of the pollution to the River Laune be traced and stopped as a matter of extreme urgency. This is a major health hazard to wildlife and humans who use the river for leisure purposes including rowing, fishing etc. The Laune drains the Lakes of Killarney into the Atlantic at Ballykissane, Killorglin and pollution of it, has a devastating effect on the Ecosystem of a vast area of our county" stated Councillor Cahill.


"Kerry County Council told me at the time of my Notice of Motion that the pollutant I reported in the River Laune, was most likely carried on the tidal flow. They said water samples were analysed and found to contain 'algae and other organic matter' said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"This, however did not explain the source of what was clearly seen in the river at the time by members of the community. The EPA has now stated that the pressure on the Laune River is from Urban wastewater. Again I call on Kerry County Council

to immediately liaise with Uisce Éireann to locate the source of this pollution and have it rectified in the shortest timeframe possible, to reduce any further damage to the environment" said Councillor Cahill.









Jardening with Killarney Outlook

Most gardens have a shady spot, a north facing wall, under a tree or in the shadow of the

There is a huge range of plants to suit shaded areas including broad-leaved foliage plants, to spring flowers and ever green flowering shrubs. Ferns are probably the first plant you would think of when it comes to shade - you can choose from a wide range of ferns from dwarf, medium or large. Ferns look very natural when planted under a tree or beside a wall. Most ferns will die back for the winter so if you want all year round foliage you will need to plant something evergreen near the fems i.e something low growing like the Viburnum Davidii which is a great plant when planted in groups of three. Another good evergreen plant for the shade is the Heuchera which comes in lovely shades including dark to light purple and green to light green.

There is also a wide range of flowering plants for shade. A good example is an Astilbe, an

called Vinca Minor which is an evergreen flowering ground cover plant. But remember to water until established.

And Dad's Army takes me every time, on a sentimental journey!






Welcome back dear student "see how very much our Father loves us, for He calls us His children, and that is what we are!" (1 John 3:1 NLT). Happy Father's Day to all the Dad's celebrating this weekend! May the Lord bless you and keep you and give you His favour always as you lead and cover your family (Numbers 6:24-27; Genesis 18:18-19). For those Dads who have found parenting difficult, it's never too late to start praying for your children and learning God's Word to bless your family. "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creation' (2 Corinthians 5:17-21). Call upon the Lord Jesus and He will help you. If you are a father who has abused or hurt your wife or children, you need to repent and get right with God before it's too late! God warns men to cherish and love their wives in the same way that Christ loves the church, and to tenderly love their children and not provoke them or wound them (1 Peter 3:7; Colossians 3:21). Men — this is serious. No-one knows the day or the hour we will meet God, and wronging your wife and children is an open door for generational curse and judgment.

Not every parent was able to love their children. Some died prematurely before they could. Others, for whatever reason were unable, or unwilling to show love to their children. For children who grow up without knowing a father's love it leaves a deep wound. It may be that a father wasn't able to tell his child how much he loved him or her, due to never having experienced it himself; or maybe he just plain treated his child badly by abandoning or abusing them. Whatever the circumstances, fatherlessness or abusive parenting can affect an individual to the point that sadly, it changes the way they view God the Father. People have no problem identifying with Jesus as Brother but God as Father? That can be a different story, and they never understand why, but it co-relates to the relationship with their earthly fathers. A father who wasn't there for his children may cause that child to see God as a far-off, cold entity who doesn't care either, or is someone to be feared as they feared their abusive earthly father. Nothing could be further from the truth!

When the disciples observed the power of God at work in Jesus, they asked Him to teach them to pray to God. Jesus said, "when you pray, pray like this: ...our Father...." (Matthew 6:9). It wasn't a method of connecting with a tyrant that Jesus was showing them, or a babbling repetitive prayer to a worthless idol, but He was demonstrating the power of God is encountered through relationship, with the One Who created us — our Father. Jesus came to restore that relationship with Father God by paying the ransom that was due for our sins with His sinless Blood, so that all of us could be forgiven and brought back into God's family as His sons and daughters, as if we had never sinned - and not only be saved and redeemed, but then used by God to demonstrate His Love to others - our families and children; and also we can be 'spiritual fathers and mothers' to those whose lives we impact every day, by building them up and loving them. "The Lord is like a Father to His children, tender and compassionate to those who fear Him" (Psalm 103:13-18). Good News - Your Father loves you friend!
