## KILLARNEY GOLF & FISHING CLUB **to host the** 2025 EUROPEAN AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

he spectacular Killarney Golf & Fishing Club has been chosen to host the 2025 European Anteur Team Championship following a detailed bidding process.

16 teams will compete for the premier men's amateur team event in Europe, which will take place on the Killeen Course between 8-12 July 2025, as Killarney celebrates the 50th anniversary of their last hosting of this event.

The Killeen Course has previously hosted four European Tour events, with the Irish Opens in 1991, 1992, 2010 and 2011, along with the 1996 Curtis Cup.

Ireland had an historic double last year when Alison Taylor (Malahide) and Eddie McCormack (Galway Bay) were victorious in the European Senior Ladies' and Men's Championship in Douglas.

In 2007 the Irish trio of Rory McIlroy, Shane Lowry and Jonathan Caldwell won Gold in the European Amateur Team Championship at Western Gailes. Meanwhile, Ireland landed a bronze medal last year and Golf Ireland CEO Mark Kennelly is excited to see the event return to the island next year.

"We are all looking forward to hosting these brilliant championships back in Ireland again in 2025," said Kennelly.

"It was great to see two Irish competitors picking up silverware in the senior championships last year and it will be interesting to see how our team can perform in the wonderful surrounds of Killarney."

Many of the world's best have competed in the European Amateur Team Championship over the years. Masters champion, Jon Rahm, was part of the Spanish team in 2014. Fellow Ryder Cup star, Bob McIntyre, represented Scotland two years later, while 2023 Amgen Irish Open winner, Vincent Norrman, teamed up with another Ryder Cup sensation, Ludvig Åberg, in 2019.

The European Amateur Team Championship will take place at Royal Park I Roveri in Italy this summer, with Spain looking to defend the crown they won at Royal Waterloo last year.

"2023 was another great year for our Irish teams with the men performing heroics to bring home a bronze medal from Belgium," said Golf Ireland High Performance Director, Neil Manchip.

"The future is bright and we look forward to seeing these players grow as they make the trip to Italy before a massive occasion in Kerry next year." Killarney Golf & Fishing Club are overjoyed to announce that they will once again play host to the prestigious European Amateur Team

# Its the talk of the town...

With Anne Lucey

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

## Coffee talk - will the Government be buying cafes for Killarney?



Wild Cafe on Main Street, Killarney is one of the coffee shops which have closed in the town.

With at least four small cafes and restaurants not to mention small shops shutting down now in Killarney, does the future lie in the attempt to solve the racket in Roscrea.

There are real fears there will be no independent cafes, bars or shops left in Killarney shortly. The closure of Wild / Underground in an enviable location on Main Street/New Street is just one of the small cafes and businesses going/gone. I am sad to see Wild go. They had the best mince pies in the town over Christmas, and great coffee. The staff were warm and friendly, mostly local and they spoke English fluently (none of which is to be taken for granted any more).

The café got rave reviews on social media and also has an outlet in Tralee. Saturday queues were frequent.

I spoke to a representative. He said there were many reasons for pulling out. Energy costs, certainly, but also a downturn in footfall and walk-in customers during the week. With so few town centre hotels, guesthouses and Airbnbs now available to tourists, the coffee shop trade is down in Killarney. (This is the consensus among most bars and businesses). The term of the lease - he believes the shop is owned by someone in Cork - was also up.

Soon only big global chains will be locating in Killarney and there will be nothing individual and local, is my fear.

The atmosphere in the town has changed from holiday and carefree is my own experience too. And this is not just January blues.

The truth is sole traders and small businesses are now only coming out of Covid and while With fewer than half



Bake My Day on New Street has also closed.

Cork closures have got major headlines, Killarney is different. Cork has hollowed out its centre with twenty years. Killarney would have had a real chance had it been allowed to continue with its traditional tourism. But first our own Kerry County Council cracked down with a heavy hand on Airbnbs on Killarney. Then too many big players went after and got the lucrative Government refugee contracts closing off the lifeline for small businesses.

The council - it prides itself on its tourism department - was incredibly deaf to the pleas by Councillor Brendan Cronin and others about Airbnbs. And how many of the Airbnbs the council succeeded in closing actually turned to long term renting?

We need to hear strong statements too from the Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce on the small business closures in their backyard.

Now, with all the racket in Rackett Hall, the only hotel in Roscrea in Tipp, the Government is buying a vacant hotel for use for the community. My question is, can the Government be persuaded to buy up a few cafes for Killarney for the use of locals? And maybe a pub or two? It's coming to it.

### Time to think outside the box in medical care

With fewer than half the GPs it had twenty

years ago and more people, the Iveragh peninsula in south Kerry is asking the HSE and Health Minister Stephen Donnelly 'to think outside the box'. They want Cork Kerry Community Health Care to start buying up and running the business end of practice - much like the old dispensary in Killarney.

Iveragh will shortly be served by just two and possibly even one GP as multiple efforts to recruit family doctors for the area stretching from Glenbeigh to Waterville have failed.

Six GPs once served the huge south Kerry/ Iveragh peninsula. The resident population now is around 8,500 all year round. Not to mention the day trip tourists. South Kerry now also includes around 1,000 Ukrainian refugees who have arrived in the past two years.

There are nine doctors in Dingle for a population of 10,000.

The stark facts were placed before local representatives and Kerry T D Michael Healy-Rae last Friday at a meeting called by the veragh Tascforce, Tascfhórsa Uíbh Ráthaigh. I wonder why an audit of each region is not undertaken? Killarney is nowhere near the numbers of GPs it should have. And surely it is high time we had a return of 'the dispensary' to Killarney and South Kerry for diagnostics as well as minor injuries, for medical as well as dental and therapy?

I put questions to Cork Community Healthcare about GP and minor injury clinic services in south Kerry. Yes, there were 400 GP contracts operated by them and in real terms only Cahersvieen has a continuing vacancy. They are advertising.

But regarding opening of minor injury clinics that is a question for a different communications body, a private body which has the contract for UHK, they said. The hospital is in charge of minor injuries clinics.

Clearly, one of the problems with the health service in Kerry is how disjointed it is.

So, could somebody ask Tanaiste and Fianna Fail leader Micheal Martin who was the health minister who created the monster that is the HSE in 2004 to go back to the drawing board - before he hightails off to another big job in Europe?

#### Owls away and a cack-thing of ducks

The owls are back on Mangerton. They come and they go. I have a sneaking suspicion that nest boxes built for other birds are being investigated by them. And they are nesting not just in the tree hollows and empty buildings.

Years back a wonderful ghostly white barn owl would perch on the same branch in the pine wood each night. The branch was a good viewing point for a mouse or two on the moor. I haven't seen him in a few years. I don't know which type is making itself heard in the frost these weeks. Sacred to Athena, the crafty Greek goddess, owls are curious and have fantastic eye-ear coordination. And they are good on the human ear too with a soft sound like a whisper when they are at rest. It is warming to hear them on cold frosty nights.

They are not the only ones cackling in the frost. A meeting of ducks

took place on the Middle lake out from the boat house last week. I was thinking of describing it as 'a cack-thing' - especially now there is a volcano waking up in Iceland. 'Thing' is an old Icelandic or more properly a Norse word for a parliament or an assembly. Down in Muckross the ducks had an Irish parliamentary gathering. I don't know what sparked the conference on the lake and in the cold too. But they assembled from four points and there was much conversation. And storming from the room! But about what thing, I wondered as the ducks scurried back and forth to the meeting point and I hurried away.

By the way, BirdWatch Ireland report that the 2023 barn owl breeding season has been the best on record.

In August, a record 100 Barn Owl nests were recorded in County Cork alone.

The council replied that after the extreme weather event in December 2022 Kerry County Council committed to carry out a review of its Winter Maintenance Operations.

In particular it looked at adding additional routes to be treated which had significant traffic volumes servicing large population centres. The review was presented to the Transport SPC on the 9th March 2023 and a further presentation was given at the full

5. Framework of plant hire operations to include for tractors / spreaders

## **BE PREPARED FOR WINTER WEATHER AT HOME**

Have a small supply of non perishable, easy-to-prepare foods.

Keep extra supplies of essential medication in case it is difficult to get to the doctor/pharmacy.

Have an adequate supply of fuel for heating/cooking and, if possible, a suitable alternative should the main supply fail.

Know how to turn off your water supply.

Have a water container to ensure a supply of drinking water.

Have batteries for torches and alternative light sources in the event of power cuts.

Keep mobile phones charged up -have local emergency numbers in your phone.

Have a suitable snow shovel (but any shovel or spade will do). Know your EIRCODE

ARE YOU READY FOR SNOW AND FREEZING CONDITIONS?

Snow clearing is strenuous-do not attempt it unless you have a reasonable standard of fitness and do not have an underlying medical condition. Wear suitable clothing and boots or shoes with a good grip. Clear the snow earlier in the day - do not use boiling water as it may freeze over and cause a hazard.

#### **BE PREPARED – PREVENT PIPES FREEZING AND PROTECT YOUR** WATER SUPPLY

Insulate water tanks and pipes Protect exposed pipes, including attic

pipes, from freezing and cracking with lagging or by wrapping a towel around them.

Service your boiler. Your boiler needs to be serviced regularly by an accredited plumber to run efficiently and to keep your home

or business warm. If not, leaks could freeze and cause a breakdown and costly repairs.

Keep your home warm Minimising all draughts, leaving heating on low for long periods and opening doors to allow warm air to

circulate to unheated areas of your house will help prevent pipes and tanks from freezing in the cold weather.

Fix external dripping taps It is recommended you always fix any dripping taps but pay particular attention to external dripping taps in winter as water from them can freeze on the ground and can cause people to slip and injure themselves.

Unattended Property If you are leaving your property unattended for a period of more than a day or two, you should shut off the water supply to the property from the external stopcock (while ensuring that any waterdependent appliances or facilities are also shutoff).

Running your taps will not prevent pipes from freezing

This is especially important as this can cause frozen drains and puts undue pressure on supplies across the network.

CAO application season is in full swing and with 85,000 plus applicants competing for about 52,000 college places, it's vital to submit a complete application form. Stay focussed and be aware of key dates and the important tasks to be done in the weeks ahead. The 2024 CAO online application remains open until 1st February. Open your CAO interactive online account via "Apply" on www.cao.ie, by 20th January to get a discount rate of €30. After that the fee increases to €45 until the 1st February. The clossing date for online Change of Course Choices, which is free, is also 1st February.

#### CHANGE

You may use the online Change of Course Choices' facility, fee  $\leq 10$ , from 6th February to 1st March to add any restricted courses not already listed. Restricted category applicants may also use this facility. All other applicants should use the free Change of Mind option, between 7th May and 1st July, to make any course changes.

#### **HEAR/DEAR**

Completed online Higher Education Access Route (HEAR)/Disability Access Route to Education (DARE) forms must be submitted by 1st March. HEAR/DARE supporting documentation must arrive in CAO by 15th March.

#### LATE

Late applications, fee €60, will be accepted from 5th March to 1st May. From 7th May, you may register a change of course choices online at www.cao.ie. Check that your courses have been updated by using the "My Application" facility before 1st July. Before the end of May, you will be sent a 'Check and Confirm' reminder. Inform CAO if you do not receive it.

Scotts Lakers stood on the doorstep of victory three times in this titanic battle in Portlaoise but three times they were denied by a relieved home side who used every bit of nous, and a smidgen of luck, to eventually carve out the win. Leondre gave us a great offensive effort having only flown in last Sunday and we'll have to work in training and see if we can get the same defensive edge out of him that we get from Terion Moss. To be fair he hasn't had much time with us so we'll get him up to speed on our different schemes. Looking ahead Clarke is eyeing up a busy month." We need to get a run going again and the one thing I keep drumming into the team is to know the value of the ball. We'll work on keeping it better and sharpen our minds for the Cougars match on Saturday January 27th."

Portlaoise Panthers are enjoying their best season to date, and with only two defeats all season, they sit on top of the league rankings. They made a quick start with Liam Kinsella hitting a brace of baskets, but Braden Bell and Leondre Washington replied in kind. Bell hit a three, but that only served to rouse a Panthers response, with Ravel Moody and Benny Carroll stretching the game out to 12-7. Jamie O Sullivan and Moody exchanged baskets before Rui Saravia hit a pair of baskets, but again, Rian O'Connell and Liam Kinsella struck back to help the Panthers into a 20-13 first quarter advantage.

The second quarter saw Washington really grow into the game. His eleven point contribution was the highlight reel for this period. That was stretched out again to 95-90 with 1-09 to go, but Dylan Dunne and that man again, McEvoy, set up another five minutes of overtime. # KERRY FC book their place in the Quarter Final of the Munster Senior Cup

# MUNSTER SENIOR CUP ROUND THREE KERRY FC 1-0 AVONDALE UNITED

Kerry FC had their first test of competitive action on Friday night when they took on Avondale United of Cork in the third round of the Munster Senior Cup at home in Mounthawk Park.

It is Kerry's first involvement in the competition since joining the League of Ireland last year, and they will be determined to get off to a winning start. Manager Conor McCarthy said during the week that pre-season games are great for getting a run-out for the team, but nothing beats a competitive game for a real test to see where the squad is at ahead of the new League season which starts in just thirty-four days.

McCarthy named a strong eleven for his first game in charge. Three of the four new signings started on the night. Jack Kavanagh, and Steven Healy were named at both left-back and midfield respectively while Andy Spain was named at centre-back and lined out as captain of the kingdom. McCarthy did say whoever was named out as captain on the night might be the captain

for the season as the decision had not been made yet.

Avondale United got to this stage with two convincing wins over Kanturk AFC and Passage AFC. The side recently beat Ringmahon Rangers 4-1 in the O'Connell Cup whom Kerry are familiar with from their 2-0 win over Rangers in the first round of the FAI Cup last season, so it was evident before a ball was kicked that this would be no easy game for the kingdom.

### **FIRST HALF**

The first half was an incredibly quiet affair with not much to shout about. Daniel Okwute who started out on the right wing made some fantastic runs down the flank beating his opponent more times than not. Okwute had a fair shout for a penalty after getting around his opponent only to be dragged down in the area but the referee on the night Ray Matthews did not feel there was enough in it to give a penalty. Despite the shouts from around the ground, the referee kept to his decision and waved on the play.

The debut of Andy Spain was cut short as he and Simon Falvey clashed heads in around the centre of the pitch late in the half. Falvey kept playing with a bandage around his head, but the Kerry sideline felt it was best that Spain would make way for Ethan Kos. First-team coach James Sugrue said after

the game that Andy wanted to stay on, but the doctor made the call which was the best for the long term. Ronan Teahan was closest to opening the scoring for Kerry as his halfvolley effort inside the area was saved well by Adam Murphy O'Dwyer. The half shortly ended after this sequence of play and Kerry knew if they were to be in the next round of this competition, they would have to

step it up in the second half.

# SECOND HALF

Kerry started the second half on the front foot. A free kick from Steven Healy sailed just over the crossbar and only a few moments later Sean McGrath had two near misses as his first effort went just wide of the top left corner from far out and his second went just wide of the keeper's bottom right-hand post. Kerry were getting closer and found a rhythm that they were lacking in the first forty-five minutes. Keeping that rhythm going and keeping a consistent defensive shape was the big test for the duration of the game.

Avondale had a couple of big chances themselves to open the scoring as a cross from Danny O'Connell into the six-yard area found Naythan Coleman, but he was not able to convert and put his effort over the crossbar from 6 yards. In the sixty-fourth minute Simon Falvey tried to catch out Lee Axworthy with an audacious long-range shot but went wide of the target.

Kerry found their breakthrough in the seventyseventh minute when Daniel Okwute coolly slotted home into the bottom left corner to give the Kingdom the lead. The chance was really created and finished by Okwute himself who managed to make space for himself outside the area and dispatch his shot with pure power and technique.

Kerry held out for the next thirteen minutes plus stoppage time to see themselves through to the next round of the Munster Senior Cup where they will either face Cobh Ramblers or College Corinthians of Cork at home again in Mounthawk Park. Kerry have their first preseason friendly on Thursday next as they face an old friend in Leo Gaxha when they play newly promoted

Galway United in Killarney.

# MCGRATH CUP Kerry 3-20 Tipperary 0-10 Kerry 6-18 Limerick 0-11

Let's be very clear about things here. I have almost as much interest in the McGrath Cup as I do in Donald Trump's assessment of..... anything. It's not something to which I would devote much attention. I would genuinely prefer if players got a full break from mid December to the end of January. The trouble is not the split season, an easy target for cheap criticism. The trouble is that the schedule is absolutely crammed, far too much so. That all Ireland club semi-final between Watty Grahams The Glen and Kilmacud Crokes has been described as exciting. I don't know how anyone could tell; it's not like you could actually see much on television or in person because of the fog.

What have we learned? It turns out that if no team is going at full tilt (and any team going at full tilt in January is going to be exhausted long before any crunch games), then Division One Kerry tend to be better than teams from Divisions Three and Four. The idea that you can assess a players' value at this time of year is nonsensical. Not just misguided. Nonsensical. Players have absolutely put their hands up as real options. Both Geaneys have done well, especially Dylan. I like his positional sense and his speed in the pass. Quick and correct decisions will hurt teams in the summer much faster than guick or accurate feet. Seán O'Shea looks sharp, fast, and hungry. He is relishing the chance to actually play in the scoring area instead of foraging in the engine room. Seán O'Brien looks the real deal out there. Joe O'Connor looks like a massive find. Real energy and the power to see it through. I really like the decision to go in goal in the Limerick game. No confusion or dithering. "We have a problem; I'm going to solve it" and done. But it's like thinking a guy will break Las Vegas at the poker tables because you saw him win a game of solitaire. I'll need to see Kerry's midfield up against a higher level midfield before I can judge, and even the McGrath Cup Final against Cork, while a better barometer, is still January football. I can still see Sean O'Shea being needed out the field in the summer heat, with Kerry robbing forward Peter to pay midfield Paul. Of course I hope I'm wrong.

# ALL IRELAND JUNIOR FINAL Arva (Cavan) 0-13 Listowel Emmets 0-10

It'll sting. It'll sting for a .long time, unfortunately. The worst phrase in all sports – in fact, I believe the worst words in anything – are "what if?" And unfortunately, Listowel were so close that those players will be asking themselves that eternally unanswerable question.

There isn't much actual 'what if' about the result. The truth is that Arva rose their game when the pressure was on and they fully deserved their win. Their defending in the last twenty minutes? That wasn't junior standard. That was phenomenal. So fair play to them.

Arva made the better start, two quick points on the board from the start from Ciarán Brady and Peter Norris. Referee Anthony Nolan had two names in his book already for yellow cards - I have absolutely no problem with that. The sanction of an offence should not vary depending on the time it occurred. Arva looked the better side at that stage, but missed some good chances - I'd make a lot of allowance for nerves in Croke Park; it is genuinely intimidating at first on that pitch. Eddie Healy was already stamping his class on the game with a great but fruitless drive and Joe Joe Grimes and Darragh Leahy were beginning to take control of midfield. It was at the end of the first guarter that Cormac Mulvihill finally got them on the scoreboard. Mulvihill added two more and David Keane slotted two frees with Cormac Mulvihill kicking a real beauty on a day whebn such scores were rare on both sides. Tristan Noack Hoffman kicked a beauty but Listowel Emmets were full value for their 0-7 to 0-4 half-time lead. Arva's defence had already shown that it would take good work to get past them, while their forwards had been somewhat wasteful

Darragh Leahy had already been ticked as well as picking up a yellow card. The decision to take him off may have been costly in hindsight, but at the time it certainly looked the sensible call to me. Darraghh Lynch is a fine player in his own right. To me, it looked like the side that improved their conversion rate would win this game, and to be honest I thought it would be Listowel. I thought that Arva defence would creak slightly late on and Listowel would get a few scores. Listowel did have two good point opportunities in the third quarter. They went for goal chances that were never on instead; even at the time I was sure it was a mistake. Arva began to completely dominate the middle and, while their shooting was never great, their defence restricted Listowel to a single second half point from play. Listowel lost Ger McCarthy to a black card - anyone trying to debate whether it was the correct call is a Kerry partisan. Black card all day. Likewise with the goal by Joe Joe Grimes late on that would have cut the gap to a single point. The whistle was clearly well gone before he hit the shot. Not only was it not denying a clear goal-scoring opportunity, it didn't even look like advantage accruing. No, I thought the referee had a good game. I just thought that Arva's defence were the difference between two good teams and they deserved to win. Sometimes the narrative is just that simple. It doesn't take away from the North Kerry club. It's great to see them back at Intermediate level and I hope more of their neighbours join them. Football in both North and South Kerry could do with improvement at club level – I still consider North Kerry's minor and U21 amalgamation to be a very positive move for Kerry football overall and hopefully that's part of a rising tide.

Of course, if Meath club Rathkenny get their way, players who feature on divisional sides won't be allowed to represent their junior or intermediate club in provincial or All Ireland competitions. It's generated a bit of debate..... well, it hasn't, but various pundits seem to wish it did. This is a real January story if I have ever heard one (and let's face, I've actually started one or two of those in my time – pages still needed filling even in the quiet months). Complete nonsense and you'll see turkeys voting for Christmas before you see

Pádraig Ó Caoimh – and he was a tough cookie in his own right but no egomaniac – would have bitterly opposed this and so do I and every Cork supporter that I know. But you no longer count as supporters. You are merely consumers. You have the right to an opinion – but that opinion no longer matters. A sad day for the GAA.

The Fitzgerald Stadium is named after Dick Fitzgerald, by the way, and Austin Stack Park is named after Austin Stack. For the love of God, let's keep it that way.

# LEGENDS LAID TO REST Franz Beckenbauer

At the top you have Pele, Maradonna, and arguably Johann Cruyff. Messi is there or thereabouts. Di Stefano and Puskas. Could you put Matthews, Finney, or Charlton into that conversation? Only in a Blackadder episode. Beckenbauer? Most definitely high up in the

pantheon. Like the top three, he thought about the game differently and not only played it differently; he basically did it so well that he forced every other team to do the same.

He made his debut for Bavern Munich at nineteen years of age and got them promoted straight away (ironically, he had always supported 1860 Bayern but fell out with his home club as a youth player). Technically he was a central midfielder but already he was beginning to change the role from workhorse to thoroughbred. Soccer didn't even half a word for 'libero'. Centre half and midfield were rigidly defined roles, but Beckenbauer changed them by reading the play and cutting incisively. Remember, this is around the time that Alf Ramsay was about to win a World Cup without plaving wingers. You didn't need plavers in free roles. Except that Beckenbauer revelled in exactly that, and what's more, his teams were winning. Bayern won the German Cup in 1966 and the European Cupwinners' Cup a year later. They won the German League three times in a row and the European Cup three times in a row after that. Beckenbauer was central to all of them. Ignore his tactical nous; he had pace, power, immaculate control, and was probably a more visionary passer than his contemporary Cruyff.

He was already being called 'Der Kaiser' before those wins. It wasn't an affectionate nickname. There are a number of fanciful origins for the nickname, at least one fabricated by the man himself, but the truth is that it was applied to him by his national team-mates. Beckenbauer was famously autocratic and even more famously misogynistic. He was a national hero, but disliked by many of his colleagues. It didn't matter; a player this good could get away with it. Germany were runners-up in 1966 ("They think it's all over..."), third place in 1970 (that Brazil team fired the world's imagination. That was the day that soccer became a legitimate global sport), and finally, in 1974, World Champions. Beckenbauer was on the Team of the Tournament at all three; in 1974 the captain was at the absolute peak of his powers. He had captained his country to the European Championship two years earlier.

In 1977 he famously joined the New York Cosmos, playing alongside the likes of Pele. It was here that he made his famously laconic reply when asked how he was so good at getting from A to B ahead of younger, fitter players, "I never start at A". He wasn't being sarcastic; his awareness of positional sense really was that good. The game didn't catch on in the US (changing political demographics -'soccer mom' is now almost the exact oppositite of the original intention of the phrase - and concerns over American Football injuries mean that it is becoming more popular now) but Beckenbauer did win three titles. However, while both of them could play the game superbly, Pele could also play the crowd. Beckenbauer, unfailing courteous, never had that kind of charisma.

In 1984 Beckenbauer took over the German team. Two years later they would reach the World Cup in Mexico, but Maradonna dominated that tournament as no player ever has. Even German supporters had to acknowledge that not even Der Kaiser at his best could do the things the ultimate 'pibe' was doing, let alone any of his players. Germany stayed with their manager and the decision proved correct when Germany won the 1990 World Cup, beating Argentina 1-0.

He would later move into soccer administration. In regard to that, I will allow the charity of silence, and that is being very charitable indeed in the circumstances. Let us merely say that as a player and a manager, very few player ever gave as much to soccer as Beckenbauer did, but the game certainly owes him no debt.

Beckenbauer was the only man to win the World Cup as captain and subsequently

manager (Deschamps has done it since), Ballon d'Or twice (unheard of for a defender), European Footballer of the Year twice, and was an automatic selection on both the World Team of the Century in 1988 and the FIFA World Cup Dream Team in 2002 (Lev Yashin, Pele, Maradonna, and Cruyff were also named on both teams).

# JPR WILLIAMS

The best rugby team of all time. You could be thinking about that for a while. The 1905 Originals brought a completely new version of the game all the way from New Zealand. They performed a 'haka' whatever that particular bit of Antipodean madness was; perhaps it involved witch doctors. They played an unheard of running game – all backs, as opposed to forwards – and of course wore a black uniform. A Fleet Street telephonist coined the term 'All Blacks' (they were, of course, all very caucasian) and a legend was born.

You could throw the 1920s All Blacks or the New Zealand side of a decade ago into the mix as well. England '02/'03? No. Brilliant team in many ways, but compared to the very pinnacle? Not at that level. Ireland in the early '80s or the '0-9 Slam winners? Arrah, stop.

Wales in the early 1970s. There is something about the 1970s. It was the first real television era. Sure, it was there in 1950s America and 1960s Britain and Ireland, but it was in the seventies that the medium took off. It could generate water cooler conversations long before the phrase was coined. Think of the sporting icons of that era. Muhammed Ali, the undisputed number one (there was real substance underneath all the showmanship). Pele, Cruyff, Beckenbauer. Kareem Abdul Jabbar (a lack of genuine peers means he is not acknowledged properly nowadays), Nadia Comaneci,, Bjorn Borg, Chris Evert, Martian Navratilova, Jackie Stewart, Lasse Viren (I know some of you won't have heard of him google it. I'm absolutely serious). Alex Higgins. Jack Nicklaus. Red Rum, of course. You simply cannot imagine now how adored he was.

Enter the Welsh rugby team. The Red Dragons were never easy fodder for anyone, but in the early 1970s they were simply the best in the world. They had incredible talent. Barry John was absolutely iconic. Lightly built, he could dominate games like none of the big men. Welsh fans will tell you he was the greatest player of all time, certainly the best fly half. They have a famously droll sense of humour, but they aren't lying. Phil Bennett took up that mantle when he retired early. Bennett might not have been Mike Gibson, but he was in that bracket in terms of speed and guile. Again, just search for 'greatest rugby try of all time' on youtube. Yep, that's Phil Bennett.

JJ Williams. The master of the chip and chase. I'm not talking Garryowen. Just a rapid neat punt into space and then it's a race – and JJ always won those races.

Mervyn Davies. 'Merve the Swerve'....as literally no genuine Welsh rugby supporter has ever called him, ever. Have a bit of dignity, people. He was a winger. Mind you, he was a winger in the same way that Albert Einstein was an office clerk. He was fast, of course, but better yet, he was intelligent and knew exactly how to stretch a defensive line to breaking point.

I didn't see them play but I grew up with people mentioning those names. I didn't come from a rugby household – 90% of everything we knew about rugby was that Moss Keane played it, and 8% of the rest was the Doyle brothers. Arrah, Con Houlihan accounted for most of the rest, to be truthful.

But I did watch those games later on in life, just to tie the stories in with my very scattered childhood memories. And somehow, there was one player who really captured my imagination. I think it was an interview where JPR Williams spoke about the satisfaction that he got out of a try-saving tackle, more so than actually scoring himself (no, not the Gourdan one, it was earlier than that). He won practically everything, but something about that kind of transcended the medals. He never actually looked that comfortable in interviews. By all accounts he was aloof with supporters – I suspect that shyness may have been confused with arrogance.

He wasn't always JPR, of course. He was plain John Williams when he won the 1966 British Junior tennis title (nope, not kidding) and when he started for Wales. As a schoolboy he had been understandably reluctant to play full back, as they were simply supposed to kick to touch rather than carry. But rugby was changing in that regard. It's a part of why the game became so popular in that decade – it was rapidly transforming to a game of speed rather than muscle.

JPR had both in abundance. He made his Welsh debut in 1969 as a nineteen year old – and that was already a tough side to break into. By 1971 he was a Lion, and a key player in their victory over New Zealand,. He also won a Grand Slam that year. Already Wales were making such feats seem almost normal. He would win two more, 1976 and 1978 – remember that Ireland had only ever won one in its entire history. He won six Triple Crowns. He played England eleven times and never finished on the losing side. Imagine how much currency that's worth in Wales when they are looking for sporting heroes? Wales, of all places?

By 1974 John Williams was firmly established. A new winger came onto the Welsh team in 1973 but it wasn't really a problem. It was when they both made the starting line-up for the 1974 Lions side that the problem manifested itself, with one of the greatest pieces of sports commentary of all time. "And John Williams passes to John Williams, John Williams passes it back and John Williams scores." The fullback became John Peter Rhys, or JPR, and the winger became John James or JJ.

That was the famous 'Invincibles' tour of South Africa. The one with the famous '99' call to arms by Willie John McBride if a single Lion was fouled. Despite the many myths, I'm not sure that the Lions were more sinned against than sinning in that one, but what is certain is that JPR Williams did not shirk the call.

Rugby does have the global appeal of soccer and I'm not saying that as many people will feel that a piece of their childhood is slipping away at the news of JPR Williams' passing as at that of Franz Beckenbauer. I'm merely saying that it means that little bit more to me, though I never met either man. May they both rest in peace.

Two years ago Mercy Mounthawk agonisingly lost the U19 All Ireland Final on the buzzer to St. Malachys. Last year they beat St. Malachys in the semi-final on their way to the U14 All Ireland. This year, Tomás Kennedy and Evan Boyle were the survivors of the 2022 panel on the Mounthawk team managed by John Dowling that beat their Belfast rivals to lift the All Ireland title in a stellar display.

Olaf Michalczuk led the way with seven points in a first quarter that ended 11 apiece, but actually St. Malachys looked the better side at that stage. Welcome back dear student last week we looked at setting spiritual goals for the coming year and the blessings that come from prioritising our relationship with God. "Where there is no vision the people (perish) cast off restraint" (Proverbs 29:18). The word vision translates to mean 'prophetic vision' here. When people don't know or have turned away from God's Word they lose sight of His vision and thus, casting off restraint, they go wild. Doors are opened for the enemy to come in through sin, causing separation from God. The devil keeps people busy in the flesh, even busy doing good things - maintaining that chasm between them and God. Then when trouble comes, and it will, people have nothing in the tank to bring them through.

This is why it's vital to study and know the Bible - God's Word that sustains us, builds, and strengthens us. His Word arms us with strength for every battle (Psalm 18:39). God speaks wisdom to us - giving us insight into how to navigate through difficulties. He pours His Love upon us in His Word - reassuring and keeping us stable when there are turbulent circumstances. "My victory and honour come from God alone' (Psalm 62:7). King David wrote this - the greatest king the nation of Israel ever had, yet David knew that he was nothing without God. It was this knowledge that catapulted David into his destiny when he took on Goliath – the giant of whom the whole nation was afraid (1 Samuel 17).

The young shepherd boy showed up on the battlefield to drop supplies to his older brothers. God had him just where He wanted him. The army had been out on that hillside for over a month with no victory - only dishonour and fear. Now this teenager hears the word curses the giant spews at God's people and a righteous anger rises within him. The adults don't want to let David out to meet the giant because he has no battle experience. But David confounds their unbelief, telling them of how God had previously rescued him from danger. David releases God's Truth into this situation: yes, this giant may be big - but God is bigger! This enemy army may be powerful, but God is more powerful!

And so, with only this vision in front of his eyes David runs out to confront the bully – ignoring his rants and curses, and instead proclaiming God's plans and His Awesome Name. The giant believed in his strength, but David believed in God's. And the power of flesh is no match for the Power of God! This would've never worked out had David not known God's Word and been immersed in His Love and promises. We are no different dear friend. How wonderful to study God's Word, and how privileged we are to have the opportunity to grow to know our Creator - the Fountain of Life (Psalm 36:9; Proverbs 14:27). It was that knowledge that sustained David and brought him the victory over the impossible and it's there for you and me too!

# LOCAL AREA PLAN

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has expressed his disappointed with the way the Office of the Planning Regulator operates its business.

"It would now appear that the Planning Regulator is a dictator and is the ultimate decider in what eventually is approved in what is erroneously called the Local Area Plan. It is farcical having a consultation with the general public and the Local Councillors when the plan is already a 'fait accompli'. This is a shocking state of affairs and the last throw of the dice to annihilate any local input by the local community and the elected representatives and indeed the local County Council" stated Councillor Cahill at the commencement of a recent eleven and a half hour marathon meeting.

When Councillor Cahill repeatedly asked the the question "Who's plan is this?, he eventually received a response from the Area Manager and Director of Housing in Kerry. "This is your Plan, this is the Councillors Plan. An angry Councillor Cahill responded by stating "This is not our Plan, we have had absolutely zilch imput. This is the Planning Regulators Plan. You have already informed us that the Council recently met with the Regulator prior to today's meeting and the Planning Regulator is referenced in almost every page in this Plan. This is the most anti Development Plan that I have seen during my lifetime as a Public Representative".

Funding has been approved for the construction of an accessible picnic area in Barraduff,

"How can you say this is our Plan when over 95% of all submissions have been shot down in the Chief Executives Report" stated Councillor Cahill.

"This is an affront to the whole system of Local Government and democracy" said Councillor Cahill.

"We are in the biggest Housing crisis of our time and indeed of the last century. You can not buy or rent a house in Killorglin or Caherciveen. Ask any auctioneer? Ask any Kerry County Council Housing Investigating Officer and they will confirm what I am saying. This is our opportunity to do something about it, it's an opportunity to get Social and affordable Houses built and you and the Regulator are trying to prevent us from doing just that" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The Planning Regulator who has drawn up this Local Area Plan, appears to have already made the ultimate decision as to what is or is not included in it, despite having no consultation with local Councillors" said the Fianna Fáil Local representative.

"The elected members of Kerry County Council should have the majority input into such a plan, as the representatives of the people of Kerry. This process is turning our Local Government system into a toothless guango and it is time we called a halt to it" stated Councillor Cahill. Councillors were warned by Kerry County

Council's Director of Services, and Kenmare MD

manager, Martin O'Donoghue that they were knowingly going into a straight up battle with the Officer of the Planning Regulator if they didn't abide by its recommendations.

"In my mind, recommendations are to be looked at, judged and voted upon, not forced down the throats of the Councillors elected by the people of the Kenmare Municipal District. We live in a democracy and the dilution of it in any way is a flagrant perversion and goes against the Irish Constitution" stated Councillor Cahill

"If the Office of the Planning Regulator wishes to make recommendations that the elected members of Kerry County Council can accept or reject, that is fine, but in this instance we are being presented with a decree, an edict, with no say whatsoever and that is not acceptable" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"When asked at the end of the meeting how he felt, Councillor Cahill said "We zoned what we felt needed to be zoned for our people and the benefit of our communities going forward and as you are aware I pleaded with the Planning Regulator to give us back our Plan. We have huge numbers on our Housing list in Killorglin and Caherciveen and throughout the county and we must help them" stated Councillor Cahill.

"It should be noted that we zoned alot less lands in this Plan than in the last Plan " added Councillor Cahill.

"This long-awaited piece of legislation will not only simplify travel but also transform the commitment to free movement for all Europeans, outlined in the EU treaties, into a tangible reality. It is high time to ensure that everyone, including individuals with disabilities, can move freely within the EU.

"I am hopeful that agreement will be reached between the European Parliament and European Council within the next number of months, and that this proposal will become law in 2025," concluded Kelleher.
