Please join us on Sunday 22nd September at 12pm for a celebration with bouncy castle for the children and Refreshments for everyone."



Fáilte Ireland is currently working with local industry in Killarney to establish the town as the Gateway to the Wild Atlantic Way.

At a meeting in Killarney this week, progress was made when Fáilte Ireland met with key stakeholders and businesses to discuss the next steps fora e strategy that will establish Killarney as a gateway town for visitors exploring the Wild Atlantic Way. The meeting took place at the Great Southern Hotel in Killarney and was attended by members of the Killarney tourism industry, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, the local authority, the National Parks and Wildlife Service, the Irish Hotel's Federation and local industry representatives, who are all part of a Steering Group for the Killarney Wild Atlantic Way Gateway Strategy. Killarney was identified by Fáilte Ireland as a Wild Atlantic Way Gateway as it offers visitors a broad range of accommodation, a wide variety of day time visitor attractions and activities, plenty of restaurants and evening entertainment and it is a main transport hub for the area.

"The Wild Atlantic Way has been a phenomenal success and this strategy is a great opportunity for tourism businesses to capitalise on the popularity of the route by enticing visitors to come to Killarney and Kerry, stay in our hotels, eat in our restaurants and experience everything the town has to offer", Bernadette Randles, a local hotelier and Chairperson of the Irish Hotels Federation Kerry branch, who is a member of the Killarney Wild Atlantic Way Gateway Strategy Steering Group said.

"The Wild Atlantic Way has been a phenomenal success and this strategy is a great opportunity for tourism businesses to capitalise on the popularity of the route by enticing visitors to come to Killarney and Kerry, stay in our hotels, eat in our restaurants and experience everything the town has to offer."

Killarney was chosen as one of two pilot towns/ cities to test the Wild Atlantic Way Gateway concept alongside Limerick City over a threeyear period. The Killarney Wild Atlantic Way Gateway Strategy will be finalised later this year, with recommendations and actions for local industry from 2020 – 2022.



WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO **RETIRE?**

Many pensions can be accessed from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. BUILDING WORKS BEGIN AT KDYS

This week marked the commencement of an exciting phase in the development of Youth programmes in Ireland with works beginning on an accommodation unit at the 'eurOg' Youth Centre in Killarney which is the flagship Centre of the Kerry Diocesan Youth Service.

The Centre was awarded the European Youth Centre Quality Label in 2017 by the Council of Europe, becoming the only Youth Centre in Ireland to receive this accolade and one of only 13 Youth Centres in total out of the 47 member Countries of the Council of Europe.

The Building works taking place in eurOg will see the addition of an accommodation unit – 'STAY@eurOg' -in the KDYS Centre alongside the Friary in Killarney. This new wing will create exciting new opportunities for young people to come and stay in Killarney from all over the County, all over Ireland and internationally.

Overall there will be 47 beds available along with a range of state of the art workshop rooms and meeting spaces. An onsite coffee shop will be open for the public to come in and the Centre will continue to facilitate a range of activities for the wider community of Killarney. The eurOg Centre operates as a social enterprise and all proceeds are used to further develop the Centre and services for young people in the area.

"We are delighted to expand our Service and to introduce this facility as it will connect many young people locally to opportunities across Europe and for continental based young Europeans to come here. It will also create possibilities for young people in Youth Clubs around the County to come and enjoy Killarney as part of their annual programme.", CEO Tim O Donoghue told the Killarney Outlook.

'STAY@eurOg' will cater for groups travelling

with leaders, coming to participate in a variety of programmes aimed at the development of young people in a fun and interactive way. eurOg will act as a bridge to the many initiatives available to young people as citizens of Europe. In late October the Council of Europe expert team will visit Killarney to reassess the Centre with a view to renewing the European Youth Centre Quality Label for a further five years. Tim O Donoghue says, 'the Council of Europe are very impressed with the work of the KDYS and recognise the powerful community support that ensures that our young people benefit from a high quality youth service in their area. We are very proud that a Kerry organisation is leading out these high standards on a national and international stage. The development of 'STAY@eurOg' will take around two months and this will see us into a new and exciting programme in 2020.'



Celebrate your Junior Cert results but select your Leaving Cert subjects carefully

RESULTS ISSUED

Results will finally be issued on Fri, 4th Oct to 62,562 candidates nationwide, including 1,953 (959 female/994 male) candidates from Kerry, who signed up for the Junior Cert exam. It will be a day for candidates to celebrate a significant success in their first public exam, albeit sensibly and safely. The Junior Cert exam is often overshadowed by the more public Leaving Cert exam but it's an important exam in its own right.

VALUABLE

After three years in Junior Cycle, students get their first exposure to a public exam of the State Examinations Commission (SEC). Candidates are awarded a Level 3 qualification on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ). This Cert is a valuable document as it confirms that the candidate has successfully completed Junior Cycle education at the subject levels and grades shown on the Cert.

NEW GRADES

Six new grade descriptors - Distinction, Higher Merit, Merit, Achieved, Partially Achieved, Not Graded - are being gradually phased in in the reformed Junior Cycle programme, while the old A, B, C, D, E, F grades are being phased out.

CAREER PROFILE

The broad curricular base of the Junior Cycle gives students insights into their aptitudes, abilities, interests and personality. The exam also measures a candidate's standard at the end of the Junior Cycle. As well as the academic content, subjects like Physical Education, Career Guidance, Social and Health Education (SHE), Civic, Social and Political Education (CSPE), along with a comprehensive programme of extra-curricular activities, develop selfawareness in each student. In short, a personal

career profile begins to emerge during the Junior Cycle.

PASSPORT

With very few students now leaving school after this exam, the Junior Cert is a passport to Senior Cycle education, which lasts for two or three years. Senior Cycle caters for students in the 15 to 18 age group. The optional Transition Year (TY), which follows immediately after the Junior Cycle provides an opportunity for students to experience a wide range of educational inputs, including work experience, during a year that is free from formal exams.

SENIOR CYCLE

During the final two years of Senior Cycle students take one of three programs, each leading to a state exam - the traditional Leaving Certificate (LC), the Leaving Certificate Vocational Program (LCVP) or the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA).

TRADITIONAL LC

The traditional Leaving Cert exam, a Level 5 qualification, is the terminal exam of postprimary education. Syllabi are available in more than 30 subjects and students usually study seven subjects including Irish, English and Mathematics. All subjects are available at higher and ordinary level. A foundation level paper is also available in Irish and Mathematics.

LCVP

The Leaving Cert Vocational Program (LCVP), also a Level 5 qualification, is similar to the traditional Leaving Cert, with some additional modules called Link Modules, which have a vocational focus.

LCA

The Leaving Cert Applied (LCA), a Level 4 qualification, is a self-contained two-year

meets the needs of students who are not adequately catered for by the other Leaving Cert programs. It is a person-centered course involving a cross-curricular approach rather than a subject based structure.

Good luck to all Junior Cert candidates getting results on 4th Oct. Most schools will now give those moving on to Senior Cycle a few days to firm up their Leaving Cert subject choice. Consider your Leaving Cert subject choice very carefully, think about your course options and the related careers. In the end, select wisely as this is the first step on your path to college.



POSITIVE VIBES POSITIVE LIFE

ARE YOU A MILES PER GALLON OR A MILES PER HOUR TYPE OF PERSON?

Economy of motion is a phrase which I was introduced to, when I was younger, as a fan of the great Bruce Lee. This phrase had meaning beyond good footwork and the idea that the quickest way from point A to point B is a straight line. It was a concept. Applied to the body it would prioritise unrestricted freedom of movement, ensure muscles that are best placed to perform a function do so and eliminate unnecessary motion. This approach



wastes no energy, potentially reduces fatigue and reduces the risk of overuse injuries. As therapists and instructors, we call this neuromuscular efficiency. Over the last 2 weeks I've talked about the importance of maintaining flexibility and balance. The next step is to gain balance throughout range of movement or 'dynamic stabilisation'. This can be achieved through basic movements like you would see in Pilates, yoga or when observing a child learning to move, turn, crawl, squat or walk etc. They should be performed as perfectly as possible, as often as possible given the individual's constraints. Like the old saying goes, it is only perfect practice that makes perfect. On this point, if you can experience and learn these movements in a one to one scenario with your therapist or instructor and progress to small group classes or rely on good gym supervision, you will progress quicker than going it alone.

Once a basic movement is mastered after a few hundred or thousand repetitions or remembered in much less, then work on local muscular endurance, strength and power can continue. That may seem like a lot of repetitions but in a typical Pilates class, a participant challenges or moves through a neutral spinal range or 'good posture' in various positions 100 - 150 times. That means, in 20 - 30 classes the position has been repeated 3000 times!! All too often an aspect of flexibility, balance or dynamic stabilisation is skipped on the journey to return to sport or exercise after injury. Simple functional movements can't be underestimated for their influence on stability, motor control and movement empowerment (and that's before we include breathing retraining, which I will discuss next week). It's not all about being the strongest, fastest or biggest, sometimes it's about gaining miles per gallon, at least as a strong foundation.



WHEN WAS YOUR LAST SIGHT TEST?

As well as an eye health check, a sight test may detect signs of underlying general health conditions, such as diabetes, high cholesterol, and high blood pressure. It is especially important in early identification of leading causes of preventable blindness such as glaucoma and diabetic retinopathy. Everyone should have a sight test every two years or more often if recommended.

GLAUCOMA

Glaucoma affects 1-2% of the population, and is a leading cause of sight loss. In the majority of cases, glaucoma is asymptomatic, so regular sight tests are important for detecting glaucoma. The majority of patients with glaucoma are diagnosed following referral from an optometrist. Without regular sight tests, the prevalence of late presentation, sight threatening glaucoma, would rise. Diabetic retinopathy

People with diabetes are at a high risk of developing retinopathy and possible blindness if untreated.



Attending regular sight tests allows signs of developing retinopathy to be identified

RISK OF FALLS

Uncorrected vision in older people also increases the risk of falls. Falls are the leading cause of disability and death from injury among people over 75 in the UK

RISKS FOR CHILDREN

Undetected conditions such as amblyopia (lazy eye) have been shown to affect reading ability and therefore may impact on future educational attainment.

Hyperopia, or long sightedness, has also been linked to poorer literacy in young children. Spotting vision problems through regular sight tests is critical to a child's future health and education.

DRIVING RISKS

Undiagnosed vision problems can increase the risk of accidents, particularly those that affect distance and side vision.





All teams are in action this weekend with games fixed for Saturday and Sunday. Our thanks to the Garvey Group for continuing their sponsorship of this fantastic competition. We wish all teams the best of luck, no doubt we will be treated to fascinating games over the next few weeks!

Special Congress in October

A meeting of the GAA's Ard Chomhairle last weekend agreed the agenda for next month's Special Congress in Cork. The meeting will debate the addition of a proposed new Tier 2 Football Championship, as well as deliberate over the introduction of three new playing rules for the game. Two proposed formats for a possible new Tier 2 Football Championship have been in circulation since late June.

Following discussions, Ard Chomhairle chose to send forward one of these formats for debate and vote at the Special Congress, which will take place at Páirc Uí Chaoimh on October 19. Under this proposal the Provincial Championships will be played as currently. The All-Ireland Qualifiers will be open to teams from Allianz League Divisions 1 and 2 and any Division 3 or 4 teams who qualify for their Provincial Final. This will mean only two full rounds of All-Ireland Qualifiers in future as opposed to four - an additional Preliminary Round is provided for however, in years where more than 8 teams are eligible to participate in Round 1.

It is proposed to then introduce a new straight knockout Tier 2 Championship for all Division 3 and 4 teams that do not reach their Provincial Finals. A range of marketing and promotional supports will be committed to the new competition, as well as the use of Croke Park for semi-finals and finals and a planned increase in TV coverage.

Following a review of the Experimental Rules that were trialed in Gaelic Football during the Allianz League and Provincial Cup competitions, it has been decided to forward three of them for proposed permanent introduction at all levels of the game.

Based on the research carried out by the GAA's Standing Committee on Playing Rules, led by Professor David Hassan, the following are to be voted on at Special Congress: \cdot The taking of all kick-outs from the 20 metre line

 \cdot The introduction of a 10-minute 'sin bin' for players who receive a black card

• The awarding of a 'mark' to players who cleanly catch a ball kicked from on or outside the opposition's 45m line, that travels at least 20m and without touching the ground

The SCPR decided to withdraw the experimental playing rule regarding Sideline kick to be kicked forward, as based on the analysis undertaken by the Committee from the Provincial Pre-Season Competitions and Allianz Leagues 2019 and feedback from players, the impact of the proposed rule was minimal.

Ard Chomhairle also agreed to amend the scheduling of the existing All-Ireland SFC Quarter-Final format for the final year of its trial in 2020. In Round 1 of the group stage of the Quarter-Final, the four provincial champions will be at home against one of the teams who came through the Qualifiers – as was the case in 2019. It was also agreed that for 2020, Round 2 will see the winners of the Round 1 matches play each other, while the losers of the Round 1 matches will also face off.

At present there has been a round of games that are scheduled to take place at Croke Park. It is now planned to give the authority to CCCC to fix these games for venues other than Croke Park - if deemed appropriate. This would require the approval of a full GAA Congress and it is intended to bring forward a motion on this to Congress 2020 next February. If passed, this would come into effect for the 2020 Championship which is the final year of the current three-year trial involving the new Quarter-Final group phase.

Kerry Minors Devon Burns of Na Gaeil and Dylan Geaney of Dingle GAA both impressed during the 2019 Electric Ireland GAA Minor Football Championship, as they are selected as part of the Electric Ireland Minor Football Team of the Year.

The 2019 season featured an incredibly high standard of play, showcasing the bright future of the GAA. Minor players across the country showed their resilience, commitment and dedication this season, proving once again that there is nothing minor about playing Minor. Kerry's All Ireland final loss is not the end of the journey - but the beginning of it



Donal Barry looks back at a special weekend for the young footballers of Kerry and looks at where the road might lead them now

For fans of the series the Wire, which was set in the Baltimore projects, there is an apt quote from Omar Little that sums up Kerry's All Ireland final experience.

"Ayo, lesson here, Bey. You come at the king, you best not miss.".

Peter Keanes young guns have come a hell of a long way from when the Cahirciveen man admitted last November "we are still just putting names on the back of a piece of paper". Well those names no doubt scribbled in ink are now household names the country over following their two shots at the All Ireland champions Dublin and despite not completing the job on Saturday night against a more astute and ultimately dominant Dublin, Kerry fans certainly know that the light at the end of the tunnel is in sight.

The later start to the day and the fact that it was a Saturday led to plenty planning difficulties for Kerry fans.

But fans of the green and gold are a resourceful gang and as every last bus, train, car and even a few more arrivals to Dublin airport transversed their way to the nation's capital, many gathered on O'Connell Street in the fine summer like conditions underneath the shadow of Daniel O'Connell.

However, it was another Cahirciveen man that they hoped would become the day's liberator as they hoped to see their young men take the five in a row dreams from Dublin.

The swish of green and gold along O'Connell Street wound its way up from the Gresham Hotel as the last few spare tickets were swapped before the Kerry army marched to Croke Park like the many generations before them. Some stopping off at Cassidy's and Barry's along the way before friends, families and neighbours divided to take make their separate ways to either the Hogan, Davin and Cusack with a few making their way to the Hill to make their stand.

In many ways in must have been a feeling of Custer's last Stand but their pride saw them band together in a corner of the Hill as the Boys in blue gathered late on to welcome Rathmore's Shane Ryan to within earshot before the game started.

With nothing between them in the epic first All Ireland final, what would be different today? Well Conor Lane was one for sure. The Corkman in many people's minds as one of the best referees in the country. A view that would fall from favour by a few at the end. Johnny Cooper was different too as he headed for the halfback position with James McCarthy going into the middle.

Different too was Kerry's opening tactic of bombing in high balls on top of Paul Geaney. The first five went in but on this occasion they came out just as quickly. Was it an omen for the day ahead? Five?

Soon Dublin were 0-5 to 0-1 up (again that number five) but this Kerry team have had to learn along the way. It's a tough road for youngsters but learning quickly is a trademark of this team and bit by bit, they brought themselves back into the contest.

David Clifford as he has done all year engineered a score from nothing. Geaney got inside and fired his shot over and into the Davin and Adrian Spillane made sure the residents behind the goal had another one to collect as Kerry fought back to 0-7 to 0-4.

By the 25th minute, it was 0-9 to 0-7 with 15 of those scores coming from play as supporters had barely time to gather their breath as each team once in possession went for the big score. There was little time to digest the wonder that was unfolding as the quality was certainly not easy to measure. sales@outlookmags.com

With so much to discuss and so little time to do it in the stands. Before we knew it, Conor Lane was back out. Before Kerry knew it, Dublin had a goal with Eoin Murchan planting his effort pass Shane Ryan. Before Conor Lane knew it the Dublin corner back travelled half the field with two bounces and one solo but there was still time. It was time to test the experience and Kerry did respond. The chances presented themselves but crucially the radar was now off as the Hill greeted each wayward ball.

Diarmuid O'Connor pulled one to the left; Tom O'Sullivan saw his effort fade away too. David Moran was not immune either, but Clifford and Geaney were hauling their load today. Many felt they did not do their share the opening day. Today however in the biggest battle of them all both men battled to the end, sharing nine points between them and eight from play. By the 55th minute, there was still just a goal in it and despite Dublin trying to drain Kerry with their keep ball tactics, like an old pro boxer knowing he was ahead on points with the rounds running out they kept their distance.



APPLES, TEA, AND MODERATION-THE 3 INGREDIENTS FOR A LONG LIFE:

Researchers from the School of Medical and Health Sciences at Edith Cowan University (ECU) analysed data from the Danish Diet, Cancer and Health cohort that assessed the diets of 53,048 Danish people over 23 years and found that people who habitually consumed moderate to high amounts of foods rich in flavonoids, compounds found in plant-based foods and drinks, were less likely to die from cancer or heart disease.

Lead researcher Dr. Nicola Bondonno said while the study found a lower risk of death in those who ate flavonoid-rich foods, the protective effect appeared to be strongest for those at high risk of chronic diseases due to cigarette smoking and those who drank more than two standard alcoholic drinks a day.

"But it's also important to note that flavonoid consumption does not counteract all of the increased risk of death caused by smoking and high alcohol consumption. By far the best thing to do for your health is to quit smoking and cut down on alcohol

"We know these kind of lifestyle changes can be very challenging, so encouraging flavonoid consumption might be a novel way to alleviate the increased risk, while also encouraging people to quit smoking and reduce their alcohol intake" she said.

Participants consuming about 500 milligrams of total flavonoids each day had the lowest risk of a cancer or heart disease-related death.

"It's important to consume a variety of different flavonoid compounds found in different plant based food and drink. This is easily achievable through diet for example: one cup of tea, one apple, one orange, 100 grams of blueberries, and 100 grams of broccoli would provide a wide range of flavonoid compounds and over 500 milligrams of total flavonoids."

Flavonoids have been shown to be antiinflammatory and improve blood vessel function, which may explain why they are associated with a lower risk of death from heart disease and cancer.

A BELATED WELL DONE TO KINSALE LIFEBOAT CREW:

Last weekend a badly frightened Friesian heifer, who was marooned on rocks after slipping down a narrow path from her field at Castlepark was spotted by a man out on a passing yacht and members of the RNLI in Kinsale were called to the scene.

They took the decision to close the beach when she eventually ended up in the sea in case as a member of the public would have tried to help her and instead could have endangered their life. During the three and a half hour operation the RNLI members involved in the rescue managed to get a rope around a halter that she was wearing and she was gently towed back to safety and enticed into a nearby field by several of the crew. She was then, after some time, loaded up into a trailer and taken home where she was tucked up in her shed, dried off, her cuts and bruises seen to and she enjoyed a good feed of hay.

Luckily the kitten who had been missing for a week was rescued by an ordinary member of the public who was brave enough to take on the challenge whist Tigers owner was appealing for help on Radio Kerry's Talkabout.

THIS POLITICAN KEEPS HIS PROMISE:

UN officials reported that Ethiopia's forest coverage has decreased from 35% in the early 20th century to just over 4% in the early 2000s and the Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed promised to fight the nation's deforestation issues by planting at least 4 billion indigenous trees before October.

During one tree-planting event orchestrated by him as a part of his "Green Legacy" initiative to restore natural greenery to the nation Ethiopian officials said that they had successfully planted over 350 million trees in a single day and so far a total of 2.6 billion saplings have been planted across the nation.

The country of India originally set a world record for planting 66 million trees during a 12-hour period back in July 2017 whilst the record for the most number of trees planted in a day by an individual is held by Ken Chaplin of Canada who planted 15,170 red pine seedlings near Prince Albert, Saskatchewan, Canada on June 30th 2001.

FOR THE FIRST TIME IN 17 YEARS, THERE WAS NO WHALING IN ICELANDIC WATERS THIS SUMMER:

Due to a shrinking international market for whale meat and the expansion of a no-fishing coastal zone, both of the nation's major whaling companies decided to abandon their summer hunting season altogether, meaning that no whales of any kind were hunted in Iceland.

IP-Utgerd – a company specializing in harpooning minke whales – said that the expansion of the no-fishing zone would force their ships to travel farther out to sea, making the venture far more costly than usual. The company said that they focused on collecting sea cucumbers (marine animals with a leathery skin and an elongated body found on the sea floor worldwide) for the summer instead.

Hvalur, the other lcelandic whaling company, specializes in harpooning fin whales – an endangered species that is hailed for being the second largest whale in the world. Though the company typically exports 100% of their catch to Japan, a shrinking demand for whale meat prompted them to abandon their summer harpooning.

Though the companies may reconsider their whaling ventures next summer, environmentalists and marine biologists are rejoicing over this year's harpooning respite.

THE CANINE CAST OF THE LIVE-ACTION REMAKE OF "LADY AND THE TRAMP" FEATURES REAL-LIFE RESCUE DOGS:

Monte, a 2-year-old terrier mix, was at HALO Animal Rescue in Phoenix with hundreds of other dogs when shelter workers noted that Monte was super friendly, loved to greet people and give kisses, and loved attention.

So, when animal trainers came scouting from Hollywood, Monte was a perfect fit to play the "Tramp".

According to Disney, all the rescue dogs featured in the film found forever homes when production ended.





Welcome back dear reader "weeping may endure for the night, but joy comes in the morning" (Psalm 30:5). Are you going through a season of weeping? God promises that no matter what the ordeal, joy will come as you praise and honour Him. Everyone goes through dark trials in life. Night time can be the hardest, when everything is guiet and we start thinking. But after every night there comes a dawn. It is true friend - whatever the circumstances you are going through light will come. But many things can prevent us from breaking out of darkness, grief and fear. In 1st Samuel chapter 7 the people of Israel were in trouble. Their enemies were terrorising them. Even though they were God's people, they had turned away from His Word and worshipped false gods and trusted in them. Now they were reaping the results of the demonic influence those idols brought. Many people are in dark places today and they have no idea why. They are living with curse, sickness and torment; suffering terribly and are clueless on how to receive healing. But God's Word is very clear - the second commandment tells us that we are not to bow down before images or statues of anyone who is in heaven or on earth, and we are not to worship idols because it brings curse. Everything changed as they changed the focus of their worship. Samuel put up a stone of remembrance to remind them of God's deliverance, so they'd never forget to worship only Him. There is no other name by which men can be saved but the name of Jesus (Acts 4:10-31). Taking the cup and bread is our reminder today of God's Salvation, and it's only in Jesus' name that we can approach God the Father (1 Corinthians 11:23-30; John 14:6). 

Do you ever feel that you have more potential that you are realising? Perhaps it seems as if your plans never come to fruition – or you sabotage your own success. Perhaps you lack confidence in your own abilities and doubt your capacity for success. Do you tend to procrastinate or find your great ideas never see the light of day? Then it may well be that you are creating your own psychological barriers to success?

Many of us carry around limiting beliefs and negative habits which hinder our success. These beliefs and behaviours are sometimes so well developed that we don't even realise they are there – and when we do, we don't have the skills or tools to overcome them. Typical barriers to success include: Fear of success and/or fear of failure, low self-esteem, negative thinking, reluctance to seek help, negative past experiences that continue to create emotional blocks, difficulties relating to others, depression, self-doubt and/or lack of self-belief.

However we pay the price for these negative thoughts and self-doubts.

Bring to mind something that you've been wanting to do – and write it down on a sheet of paper. Now think of all of the reasons that stop you from doing this – and write these down. Next review the list and cross off those that are simply not real or true (it may be helpful to enlist the help of a friend here).

Now look at the negative beliefs on your list that can be substituted with something more positive. The brain cannot hold two contradictory beliefs simultaneously – thus try replacing a negative belief (e.g. I could never go to college) with a more positive one (I have the ability to go to college). Better still, write the positive affirmation in the present tense as if it is already happening (I am studying in College and loving every minute of it). Write down your affirmations and put them on your desk or bathroom mirror, repeating them as often as possible. Notice when self-doubts crop up.

When self-doubts and limiting beliefs sneak in – do a reality check and ask yourself 'Is there a rational reason to believe them?' If so, what can you do to change this? Is there something practical we can do to? Sometimes our doubts and negative self-beliefs are rooted in earlier life experiences or childhood traumas. If this is the case, perhaps you could seek the help of a counsellor or coach to overcome these.

Next week we will continue to look at our own personal Psychological Barriers to Success and discuss ways in which these can be overcome.
