## SIGHTS SET ON NEW FUNDRAISER FOR NIGHT NURSES

Father and son Patrick and Erik Eviston have just taken on the challenge of climbing Mount Kilimanjaro.

The duo completed the climb in six days, starting on October 12th, a very poignant date in their minds, as it was the date that Patrick's wife and Erik's mum Linda was laid to rest in 2020.

Since Linda's passing on October 10th 2020, Patrick has completed numerous marathons raising over €80,000 for cancer charities.

"This wasn't a fundraiser, it was something I wanted to do and was delighted that Erik agreed to do it with me", Patrick said.

"We brought a photo of Linda to the summit as a tribute to her", he added.

Kilimanjaro is not only Africa's tallest peak, but also the world's tallest free standing mountain. The summit, named Uhuru Point, is 5,895 meters (19,341 feet) above sea level.

Killarney National Park 'Samhain' Autumn Gathering gets under way this weekend. This year the Conservation Rangers will present a series of events, beginning on Saturday morning the 21st @ 7.30am with 'Deer Watch' in Knockreer Estate. It will be presented by well known Conservation Ranger Padruig 'Brac' O'Sullivan. He will also present the walk on Sunday morning, meeting both mornings at Knockreer front gate at 7.30am. - opposite St. Mary's Cathedral. Padruig's informative walks are always very popular.

Autumn - the highlight of the nature calendar in Killarney National Park, in particular the month of October, is considered the most amazing time to observe the Irish Red Deer activity during the annual rutting season. The audible bellows and tribal behaviour is fascinating. The rich colours of Autumn, the clear crisp air of the mornings and shadows of evening light make the park so spectacular.

Saturday will feature the annual Paudie O'Leary Lecture. Paudie, was Head Conservation Ranger at Killarney National Park, and sadly passed away unexpectedly in August 2012. His gentle presence left a huge void among his peers and people of Killarney. His knowledge and love of the National Park was incredible, his legacy enormous. This year to honour Paudie's memory, Áine Ní Shúilleabháin, Biologist, will deliver the Paudie O'Leary Lecture entitled Paudie - 'Our Man for All Seasons'. Aine worked with Paudie for many years, and always treasures the wonderful memories of their time in Killarney National Park. #### **NOT SO GREEN BAGS**

Killarney is making strides to eliminate throwaway coffee cups from paths in the national park but it now has to step up its game: green plastic dog poop bags are being placed on overhanging branches, of all places.

The National Park has issued a public appeal to tackle what it wittily terms "canis poop saccule" - dog poop bags - from bushes and trees. The green plastic bags left by dog walkers are found everywhere and spreading. And with the backing of the Department of Housing and Heritage, the National Parks and Wildlife Service, it is calling for the "eradication" of the new invader.

The poop bags are mainly to be found on trees in the park, left on overhanging branches near footpaths.

Apart from being unsightly they are also inclined to slip off during wind and rain, endangering passers by.

Clearly the campaign has struck a chord.

The Demesne is 'littered' with poop bags, members of the public complained on Facebook.

In just one stretch, of around a kilometer, some 48 poop bags - in a single day - were collected between Torc Waterfall and Muckross House by outdoor staff.

The park is now asking dog walkers to "do the right thing" and carry the bags to the

#### nearest bin.

Rather than putting in yet more bins, which can be unsightly, "just take a few extra steps to discard those poop bags in our own bin or designated poop bins," the public is urged. A reasonable request to those out walking anyway.

#### FURTHER ATTACK ON THE BELEAGUERED TOURISM PRODUCT IN KILLARNEY

Tourist holiday lets are included in the scoping exercise by Revenue on vacant home tax and are among the 25,000 properties being asked to show they were let for a minimum of 30 days in 2022. The inclusion of tourist businesses would be incredible if it were not true.

The penalty on a vacant home is three times the local property tax ! There are now three attack prongs on the clearly vulnerable tourist product in Killarney. There is the removal of mid-price hotels and guesthouses in order to provide refugee accommodation; there is the no holes blanket crackdown by Kerry County Council on Airbnbs under planning. And now we have the targeting by Revenue. Is there some civil servant somewhere intent on finishing off traditional self-generated Killarney tourism?

Already cafes, shops, pubs and other small activity businesses tell me they are barely surviving. Traditional footfall is way down because mid-price accommodation is rarely available in Killarney these days. People are holidaying in west Cork and Galway and other places. Several Airbnbs have simply shut shop rather than face the wrath of the council, its legal threats not to mention the reams of bureaucracy.

We need someone to speak out - and on this

note I wonder whether it is time to have a new representative body for the entrepreneurs who are the backbone of Killarney, the sole traders and the small businesses?

By now we were supposed to have a shortterm tourist letting register, which might have been cross-checked by Revenue, so businesses would be excluded, you would expect!. But of course this has been delayed because Ministers O' Brien for Housing and Martin for Tourism did not have their ducks in a row and the EU Commission stepped in.

'There is no blanket exclusion or exemption for holiday lets and a holiday home that is not occupied for at least thirty days in the year is therefore generally liable to the tax,' a Revenue spokeswoman told me.

The objective is to have more housing enter the long term residential market, she explained.

But there is an added objective in Kerry the council's Ukrainian unit tell me they want to move Ukrainians out of hotels and guesthouses. 'Own door solutions' are being sought, according to the council which works closely with the Department of Children and UCTAT - Ukraine Crisis Temporary Accommodation Team.

So is this latest move by Revenue to free up hotels by forcing other tourism accommodation out of the tourism market? If so, robbing Peter to pay Paul strikes me. In any case, hours must be spent now gathering documentation for Revenue proving they have had tourists. My question is what if a self-catering businesses has had a bad year? Answer: they must pay three times the tax in order to stay in business in the hope of a better year next year! Is anyone calling out this and where are our TDs? How can they not be aware of this latest attack.

#### UPGRADE NEEDED FOR KILLARNEY WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Killarney Waste Water Treatment Plant may see an upgrade, after admission the plant is the cause of the pollution in the lake. It has taken months to get straight answers from Uisce Eireann and from the Environmental Protection Agency which inspects water. And to get the two bodies to liaise. In June on foot of the lakeside Folly Stream designation as 'bad' by the EPA I enquired of both if this was the result directly of the Waste Water Treatment Plant. Uisce Eireann gave me the run around saying while the water quality was poor indeed, it could not say what caused the deterioration. The WWT was not at capacity and there were no plans for an upgrade. Which rather surprised me, particularly with Kilcummin soon to be connected up.The plant has failed in some areas of inspection such as levels of ammonia in recent years. There is also the fact that Killarney now, while it has tertiary treatment, is fairly basic in comparison

with other modern plants. Our treatment plant has no UV - ultra violet - a disinfection treatment which gets rid of some toxins and pathogens from wastewater.

But the good news is both the EPA and Uisce Eireann, after liaising with each other, now say an upgrade is to be considered as well as diverting water from the plant from the Folly Stream which goes into the bay at Ross.

'The EPA found that the Folies (Folly) stream had declined to bad ecological quality in 2022 and the Killarney WWTP was identified as the suspected source of the pollution,' it said in language that at last may be understood clearly.

'The Kilcummin drainage area plan will identify network upgrades required to ensure sufficient capacity and environmental compliance. Uisce Éireann have stated that all efforts are being made to ensure optimal performance of the plant at all times. The EPA has been informed by Uisce Éireann that the options in relation to modifying/ upgrading the existing WWTP to provide for growth and continued discharge to the Folies stream along with the options for relocating the primary discharge point to alternative discharge locations are currently being assessed.'

Uisce Eireann also confirmed that the Killarney plant will be considered 'as a candidate for inclusion in next investment cycle RC4 (2025 -2029)' - a complete shift in their earlier position.

## GREAT CREDIT DUE TO MINISTER FOLEY FOR PROGRESSIVE EXAMS' REFORM AS **KERRY'S JUNIOR CYCLE CANDIDATES DELIVER SUPERB RESULTS**



### OUTSTANDING

Junior Cycle exam results were issued by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) on Wednesday, 18th October to 70,727 candidates nationwide, including 2,148 (1,095 female/1,053 male) from Kerry. Junior Cycle results are available to candidates in their schools from early morning and candidates also have access to their results online from 4pm on Wednesday. Junior Cycle exam results in Kerry were superb and on par with the very high standard of last year when the new grade descriptors were exclusively used. The number of candidates who sat for the Junior Cycle exam this year was about 3,592 or 5.35% up on the 2022 figure of 67,135. This is the first time ever that a junior cycle exam has exceeded 70,000, indicative of population growth.

#### DESCRIPTORS

Six grade descriptors - Distinction, Higher Merit, Merit, Achieved, Partially Achieved, Not Graded - are now used in the reformed Junior Cycle programme, replacing the old A, B, C, D, E, F and NG grades. The Junior Cycle exams were cancelled in 2020 and 2021 and replaced with a system of school assessments. Since 2022, when the Junior Cycle exam was once again held post covid, all subjects are examined under the new Junior Cycle grade descriptors. English, Irish and Mathematics are examined at both higher and ordinary levels while all other subjects are examined at common level. As and from last year's Junior Cycle exams, Irish is examined at two strands with T1 aimed at native speakers and T2 aimed at non-native speakers.

#### COMMEND

The Junior Cycle exam results were issued exceptionally late last year on 23rd November, so the SEC must be commended for getting the results out five weeks earlier this year. The increased availability of markers and a major move to online marking in almost all subjects helped to facilitate the early results. It's wonderful also that students, are once again getting state exam experience at the end of the

#### junior cycle.

CREDIT

Great credit is due to Minister for Education, Norma Foley for overseeing a seamless transition from the old Junior Certificate exam to the reformed Junior Cycle programme, which is far more suitable for the current student body. When you combine this achievement with the reforms that are currently in train at Leaving Cert level, Minister Foley has emerged as a very progressive Minister for Education. The icing on the cake of Minister Foley's outstanding stewardship will surely be the publication of the 2024 state exam results along the pre covid timeline for the convenience of Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle students.

#### CERTIFICATION

The reporting process at Junior Cycle culminates in the awarding of the Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA) to students. The JCPA replaces the Junior Cert and consequently the SEC no longer issues these certificates. The JCPA confirms the level of achievement in learning, under five descriptors – exceptional, above expectations, in line with expectations, yet to meet expectations and not reported, across all areas of learning including Classroom-Based Assessments (CBA), Short Courses, Priority Learning Units and other areas of learning, as well as the SEC exam results.

#### IMPORTANT

The Junior Cycle exam is often overshadowed by the more public Leaving Cert exam but it's a very important exam in its own right. It's a prestigious exam of the SEC and it's the first opportunity for second level students to engage with a public exam of this nature. With very few students now leaving school after this exam, the Junior Cycle is a passport to Senior Cycle education, which is a further two years – three years if the optional Transition Year is included. During the final two years of Senior Cycle, students take the traditional Leaving Certificate (LC), the Leaving Certificate Vocational Program (LCVP) or the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA).

#### FINALISE

Most schools will now give those moving on to 5th year a few days to finalize their subject grouping for Senior Cycle. Consider your Leaving Cert subject choice very carefully. Start thinking about your college course options and the related careers because, this time next year, it will be your turn to apply for college. Congratulations to all candidates, who received Junior Cycle exam results.

It is estimated that there are over 150 types of brain tumour, with latest figures from the National Cancer Registry (2018-2020), showing that there are approximately 823 people diagnosed with a brain, or other central nervous system tumour, in Ireland each year.

Brain tumour symptoms can include headache, visual problems, speech difficulties, seizures, personality changes, memory loss, nausea and vomiting, and I would always encourage readers to visit their GP if they have concerns.

# **A GUIDE TO SCREEN USE**

Many people worry that viewing a screen can damage their eyes. There is no evidence of this. In fact, because you can alter the size, brightness and contrast of the display, it can easier and more comfortable to see on a screen compared with looking at things on paper. However, some people find that looking at a screen for a long time is tiring and may find wearing glasses for computer use helpful.

Special protective coatings can be put on glasses lenses to help against eye fatigue from digital screens. Such coatings include blue light blocking lenses. These can help reduce glare for more comfortable and relaxed vision, create better contrast perception, offering a more natural colour experience

### Here are some ways to look after your eyes while using your screen:

A pply the 20-20-20 rule – every 20 minutes look at something 20 feet away for 20 seconds. That will give your eye muscles a rest.
Try to blink regularly. Focusing on a screen may make you blink less, which may make your eyes dry and uncomfortable. • Position your computer screen

so that: it is between 40 and 76 centimetres (16 to 30 inches) from your eyes.

• The top is level with, or slightly below, your eyes.

It is tilted away from you at a

10- to 20-degree angle.There are no distracting

reflections, e.g. from a window.

Once you have adjusted your screen, adjust the font size so it's easy to read.

Use document holders for reading or reference materials. Place them close to the screen at the same distance from your eyes. This will enable your eyes to remain focused as they move between the screen and the documents.

Use a character size that is easy to see. The character size is an important factor since it determines the distance at which you prefer to view the monitor

Ronan Buckley added a point before Maurice Hickey pointed for St. Kierans, and they needed that one. East Kerry led by 1-7 to 0-4 at half-time and it felt ominous for St. Kierans. Brave underdogs but still underdogs.

Both sides scored well in the third quarter. St. Kierans added five points to their tally, but East Kerry added 1-7 of their own. The goal came from a stunning David Clifford pass and fine finish for the in-form Patrick Darcy. At 2-14 to 0-9, there was never realistically gong to be a way back for St. Kierans and Dara Roche and impressive sub Emmett O'Shea added further goals to close it out. St. Kierans actually acquitted themselves well here, but East Kerry had nineteen points to spare in the finish. That says it all, really.

#### Dingle 0-20 Templenoe 0-9

Templenoe were always going to be underdogs against the Club Champions, and so it proved eventually. Templenoe are a stunning championship team - talk about maximising your assets. They were under the cosh early on, especially with the absence through injury of the influential Adrian Spillane. Cathal Bambury

hit the post with an early goal chance. Daniel and Aidan Crowley soon got the scoreboard working in Dingle's favour. Cathal Bambury and Paul Geaney (f) soon had Dingle back on level terms and points from Dylan Geaney, Cathal Bambury, and three from Paul had Dingle 0-7 to 0-3 ahead, Colin Crowley on target for Templenoe. 0-7 to 0-5 at half-time. Dingle had a slight edge, but there was plenty of opportunity for things to get interesting...and they most certainly did.

Dan Goggin opened the scoring but Mid Kerry responded quickly, with Seán O'Brien, Éanna O'Connor (2), and Liam Carey putting them ahead. A great turnover by Gavan O'Grady, who is looking sharper with every single game, led to a well-worked Éanna O'Connor goal. 1-4 to 0-1. Na Gaeil are running cold and Mid Kerry are accelerating. David Roche, Seán O'Brien, and Éanna O'Connor (f) stretched out the lead. Na Gaeil were actually getting their hands on the ball, but weren't able to turn it into scores. Jack Sheehan did pick off their second point in the

17rth minute, but Gavan O'Grady replied with a free. This should very much be one to savour. Dingle, even without Barry Dan, have been the best club side this year and last year, and to be honest a club team brings more vibrancy to the spectacle of a game that a divisional team can. And we may as well face the fact at this stage. So far, the Kerry County Championship has totally failed to ignite. The quarter-finals were the first knock-out games, and I thought the low crowds would double at that stage. Instead they have dwindled even further. The Geaneys have been shooting the lights out all year. Personally I have no doubt that Paul Geaney will be back with Kerry next year and he'll have family beside him on the training ground at least. Mark O'Connor is a big addition

beside the always excellent Billy O'Connor in midfield. Mark isn't looking to make headlines, just to do a job for the team, and it's working. The thing is, there's a real likeability about Mid Kerry football. Of course the Milltown lads have to balance things just the same as Fossa with East Kerry, but the likes of Emmett O'Shea and Matt Rennie are obviously relishing the games and so are Cillian Burke, Éanna O'Connor, and Gavin Horan. The latter isn't as big a name as the other two, but he's a lock on my team of the year; I think he has been amazing for club and division. Keith Evans and Seán O'Brien absolutely flying as well. Gavan O'Grady, shaking off a bit of an injury in earlier rounds, is more like his formidable self again. Likewise with Mike Breen. We all know what Liam Carey can do; Jack O'Connor can do the same thing if he can get an injury-free run.

My best guess would be Dingle by two points, but if Mid Kerry get in for goals, my guess could be way off.

Some ostensibly lesser lights have come to the fore this year, with Alan Dineen excelling as a driving full back, Dan Murphy thriving as a utility player, Fionn Murphy settling in comfortably to a senior berth, Fionn Holohan, James Darmody. To be honest, having watched it on video again (clubber) I remain expectant that Mark Ryan's red card will be overturned, but of course that's very much a layman opinion.

I really like the brand of football that Rathmore play. And with that said, I'm sorry, but just look at the players that East Kerry have on their bench. Not the starting fifteen, the bench. Like pretty much everybody else, I can only see one winner here.

#### PETER KEANE TO MANAGE TIPP?

It's not quite confirmed yet, but looks a virtual certainty, and I think Peter Keane would be a huge asset for Tipperary. People think I'm joking, but go back to around 2012 to 2015, Tipperary were definitely the second best team in Munster overall and were winning regularly at minor and U21 to supplement a senior team that had serious talent anyway.

Of course hurling is always going to be number one in Tipp, just like football is always going to be number one in Kerry. That's simply a fact that any incoming manager has to accommodate. But a guy who brought Kerry to a replay with the greatest team of all time knows how to cut his cloth to measure. Tipperary are down a bit as a football force (that covid Munster victory dissipated surprisingly quickly) but I could see Peter really turning that around. Expectations for success need to be clearly laid out - look, getting to a Munster Final would be a colossal achievement. Getting out of Division Four has to be a priority and that's simply going to be a nightmare for ay incoming manager. Seriously, Laois, Leitrim, Wicklow, Carlow? Those are going to be really hard, dog-eat-dog games. Don't think it's less ruthless or less important in the lower divisions; it's the exact opposite. Either way, the very best of luck going forward to Peter.

#### WORLD CUP Ireland V New Zealand

New Zealand with a try. It's made by Barrett with a great burst and they calmly spread it wide for Fainga'anuku to go over. Mo'unga slots the conversion. We are definitely in trouble here. To be fair, the Irish crowd are singing. They still believe in this team, and rightly so.

At the end of the first quarter, Ireland get on the board. New Zealand coughed up a nedless penalty and it was a handy one for Johnny. Ireland cough up another line-out. Johnny Sexton chases down a very good break forward. It's neck and neck with Jordan Barrett. These are among the very best players in the world....and this time it's Barrett who gets there that vital millisecond faster.

Ireland come again. Lowe hits Aki Bundee with a pass. He has a lot to do, but Bundee has been one of the players of this tournament and shows why, with a beautifully balanced sidestep before going ever. Fantastic try. Johnny converts and we are right back in the mix. Just three points in it now.

New Zealand are almost in again but Gibson-Park makes a brilliant tackle and Ireland manage to clear. New Zealand have more tricks in their bag than us, and the line-out....well, by now we all know that Ireland have issues there. New Zealand win another one and here they come, and this time Ireland can't stop Ardie Savea (I thought he was excellent) gets over.

Aaron Smith heads for the sin bin. Ireland have a penalty and Johnny again opts for the corner. I dunno....we aren't winning those line-outs.

Savea coughs up another penalty. New Zealand have a certain ruthlessness about them. I don't mind, it's only to be expected at this level. Johnny opts again for the corner.

This time Ireland win the line-out and there is Jamison Gibson-Park, wriggling through like a freshwater salmon. They can't hold him. Johnny converts and once again, Ireland are right back in the game. It is sapping energy, though. We are working very hard for everything we get. *Half-time New Zealand 18 Ireland 17* 

I'm hopeful now. We have been second best for the most part but one point behind with forty minutes to go, having come back from a 13 point deficit? Honestly, I'm kind of liking our chances. Keep controlling the ball and going through the phases. Don't get suckered into being over-ambitious. Tighten the line-out and start dealing with those chip passes that New Zealand are using to such deadly effect.

Peter O'Mahony rises high over Mo'unga and it's a real chance, but he can't quite hold it. Good sign, though. Hansen kicks beautifully to Dan Sheehan, who is wide open in space. It's just inches too high, unfortunately. That was a bad lapse by the All Black defence. Are they feeling the strain?

Our turn for a mistake as Mo'unga gets way too much space and breaks the line. We're on the back foot straight away and a good effort by Keenan can't stop Will Jordan getting over. Jordan Barrett converts and Ireland have a lot of work ahead if they want to win this.

It could be a lot worse. Aaron Smith intercepts a careless pass and should really have gone over, but he slipped at the crucial moment. Another penalty for Ireland. With two scores between the teams, it's obvious that Johnny is going to go for the kick now. Except that our talisman, inarguably one of the greatest players of all time, sees his effort pull away to the left. His last game, and this is not how he would want to go out, but sport is more than fickle; it can be downright cruel.

We need a break and get it. Ireland's maul makes good ground and New Zealand have no option but to bring it down. Penalty try and another All Black is off for ten minutes. One point in it again.

New Zealand with a penalty, once again Ireland are just out of angle in the tackle. Jordan Barrett steps up but, just like Johnny, his effort tails off to the left.

Barrett with another one. He actually fouled Keenan, but was only late because he had been impeded by Peter O'Mahony on the way. It's tight but that's actually good refereeing. This is an easier kick and Barrett makes no mistake. Ireland have to score a try.

They have a great chance. Johnny takes it forward. Murray kicks ahead towards Bundee Aki. Barrett gets there but Bundee wins the penalty. Johnny has no choice now, he has to go for the corner. Three points won't do.

Great attack by Ireland. Ronan Kelliher drives over the line and starts to plant down....Jordan Barrett, man of the match, literally gets under it and stops him touching it down. You literally cannot get closer to a try than that and be denied.

New Zealand are slowing the tempo and keeping bodies back. Of course they are. In these circumstances, wouldn't you?

One last attack. Ireland probe and prod. It's good rugby, but so is New Zealand's defence. Over thirty phases of play, and not once did New Zealand cough up an opening. In the end they get the penalty and that's it. New Zealand are in a semi-final and Ireland are going home. They did us proud.

#### IRELAND NEW ZEALAND DAYS OF YORE

Rugby is openly and honestly professional now, and it simply had to go that way. Too much demand as the sport grew popular and too many brown envelope operators back in the day. Things weren't necessarily better back in the day – far from, actually, there were a lot of medical bluffers for one thing and too much machismo – but there was also more opportunities for humour. The following are just a few of the anecdotes that the All Blacks and Ireland have shared together over the years. I've left out Munster's famous win; that story has been told by better storytellers than me.

1966 Des O'Brien was the manager and known for his calm demeanour. When Welsh centre Ken Murphy disappeared for a few days, players were getting worried and suggesting reporting a missing person. Des, who knew his man, told them to relax. Sure enough, on the night before the game, Ken strolled in for dinner, having enjoyed a few two days in a hunting party with some new friends. O'Brien looked up, said "Hello, Ken. Will you be joining us for the game tomorrow?" Murphy, who had simply assumed that a grown man in an amateur game didn't need anyone's permission to go anywhere, agreed and did. He played well, too.

O'Brien was an interesting figure in his own right. A key player in Ireland's first Grand Slam in 1948 and former Irish captain himself, he was capped for Ireland in squash and played professional tennis.

1976 Brendan Foley was a Munster legend and his son Axel would become even more so. In 1976 he was an automatic selection for Ireland's tour to New Zealand. At one stage a slightly worse for wear Foley decided he'd had enough pints and decided to go fishing. He did, and it did relax him....but he didn't actually catch anything, since he was fishing in the fountain in the foyer of the team hotel. Hence the rather bizarre nickname of "Foley-nevercaught-a-fish".

1977: Phil Bennett was captain of the touring Lions in New Zealand. At half-time in a game, Willie Duggan got so battered that he had to go off before half-time to get his battered face attended. At half-time the Lions came into the dressing room to find Willie with a bottle of beer in one hand and a lit cigarette in the other, blood oozing from his cuts. "Hard luck but well played," said Bennett, one of the all-time Welsh greats. "Hah?" queried an equally great if unorthodox Irishman. "Soon as I get my face stitched, I'm coming back on!" He did, too.

Moss Keane is probably the most larger-thanlife figure in Irish rugby. Those who knew the man tell me that the vast majority of the stories told about him were comic exaggerations; Keane was not some kind of 'wild man' by any means. He had a certain stubborn selfsufficiency though. On that 1977 tour, roommate Peter Wheeler woke up to see Moss Keane awake and opening a beer. "It's five o'clock in the morning", exclaimed the surprised Wheeler. "Aye", replied Moss calmly. "But it's five in the evening back home, and I usually have a beer at this time."

Moss was interviewed by Nigel Starmer-Smith of the BBC. He was asked his favourite moment of the tour so far. "When I heard that Kerry beat Cork in the Munster Final" was the reply

#### EUROPEAN QUALIFIERS Ireland 0 Greece 2

They think it's all over. Well, it is now. Once again Ireland, despite the boost of Evan Ferguson restored to the line-up, were absolutely toasted by Greece. This isn't Poland in 2016; this is far worse. At least the supporters were behind the team in Poland; this time there were boos ringing out around the stadium well before the finish. And I don't ever like that, but it's fully understandable because this was a toothless display. Even on our bad days there was always a bit of snap and snarl in us, but in this one Ireland faded out of the game after ten minutes and never ever looked like getting back into it. You can talk about the lack of player development or investment by the FAI (and rightly so) you can talk about mismanagement (and while I've always had sympathy for the

awful hand that Stephen Kenny was dealt, this was a bad night for him and by him – he got tactically out-manoeuvred from start to finish) but even these players are better than the showing that they put up. They can talk about how much they support the manager and want him to stay on, but I need to see that on the pitch and ye just didn't do it.

Ireland did start well, with a good ball from Ogbene to Smallbone forcing the keeper into a solid save, with debutant Liam Scales putting the rebound over the bar. Just two minutes later Evan Ferguson went agonisingly close, his skillful curler hitting the butt of the post and away. And that, basically, was that. Ireland didn't really raise another gallop. The second goal was a killer blow, but the truth is that Greece were always that class apart. We could still be playing now and we wouldn't have scored.

There is no way at all for Ireland to qualify now, which isn't actually a bad thing. We need a revamp. Sure, there will inevitably be a new management team coming in, but that's not going to change anything at all. I have no idea who would actually want the job, no top manager is committing suicide by taking on a team where playing standards have dropped way below supporter expectations. Our players, respectfully, just aren't very good. Smallbone has talent, but he's half a nine and half a ten, and half of anything isn't much good. He doesn't quite finish chances. Ogbene came in for a lot of praise for his work-rate and in fairness he did work his socks off - but you understand that the game is about end product, and he just doesn't have enough of that? I'm not being mean. These guys play their hearts out and I do appreciate that. It just isn't enough. The nicest thing I can say about our midfield is that it would be great to have one. I'll make allowances for Johnston: he did look lively, but I watched Irish teams with the likes of Kevin Sheedy and Damien Duff on the wing. McClean wasn't guite that, but he was just one level below. Mikey just isn't that. Not yet, and possibly (I'm genuinely saying it with respect) not ever. I think a lot of people just don't realise how high the standard is. You need at least half your team to be regular starters in the likes of the English Premiership and four or five who can genuinely be expecting to feature in the champions league more years than not. Plus a 25% goalscorer. As in, 25% of decent chances are converted. Does 25% sound low to you? The likes of Robbie Keane or lan Rush used to score a lot of tap-in goals. The kind that make you think you can do that - I absolutely guarantee that you can't. Do you know what Erling Haaland's shot to goal conversion rate is in the English Premiership? It's 28%. Now, that's the most targeted striker against the toughest defences, but that gives you a measure of how difficult it really is. The last I looked, he was on almost a goal per game (23 in 24) for Norway. Every now and then you could hear somebody saying, "oh, this gaelic footballer or that hurler would be worth millions if they played in England." No. Sorry now, but they actually wouldn't. Watch that Wrexham documentary (ignore the bits about Ryan Reynolds modestly explaining how truly great he is and dear God, Beckham's stuff is worse than Michael Jordan's hagiography) and ask yourself if Shamrock Rovers would regularly be competing at that level.

Greece aren't world beaters. I'm sorry, but they just aren't. They are reasonably solid and have gelled well as a unit, and that's more than enough to beat us with ease. A new manager isn't going to change the fact that we simply don't have enough high level

everybody.

competitors. I'm not seeing any real investment in changing that on the ground either.

#### Ireland 4 Gibraltar 0

It's a ray of sunshine, but with the greatest of respect, Ireland celebrating a win over Gibraltar is a bit like Shamrock Rovers celebrating a win over Rattoo Rovers. Gibraltar, the entire population, could not fill Lansdowne Road. Look, any win is better than a loss and it's not nothing. Ireland somehow managed to dominate possession against that interesting 7-3-0 formation. Look, I know I've written a fair bit about Ireland's loss and I'm running through a win fairly quickly, but one of them genuinely had far, far more significance than the other.

Evan Ferguson opened the scoring with a fine finish after a good cross from Doherty. Matt Doherty also set up the second with a good cross, Mikey Johnston initially hitting the post but following up on his own rebound from 2-0. In the second half a nice flick on by McGrath saw Doherty put one in himself (he deserved it) and Callum Robinson got a fourth – a good confidence boost for a player whom I suspect needed it. All very well, Ireland did show some nice touches, but you know yourself, you will honestly get more intensity in a training session.

We do still have a chance of getting into a play-off; but it's roughly the same chance as me winning millions in the National Lottery tomorrow night - it wouldn't improve the odds all that much if I actually bought a lottery ticket. There is a technical thing whereby if we lose to the Netherlands, it actually works in our favour because Greece (despite thoroughly outplaying us twice) are actually ranked lower than us so we are better off if the Netherlands qualify in their own right, freeing up a qualifier spot for the higher ranked losers....i.e. us. That's all a bit ridiculous. I still think that UEFA will squeeze us in as an automatic qualifier as joint hosts - they know what Irish fans can bring to tournaments and the whole idea of expanding the competition was to increase revenue. For me, though, having weaker teams in the mix at the finals stage dilutes the quality and makes for too many games that are too predictable. I know people won't like me saying, but either be good enough to actually qualify for the tournament or don't be there, Earn the right, whether it's Ireland or anybody else, but

don't cheapen the standard. That just hurts

# LEGISLATION FOR ATM CHARGES CALLED FOR

Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has laid down a marker for banking in Ireland, by calling on the Minister for Finance, Michael McGrath to urgently introduce legislation, outlawing future charges for the withdrawal of cash from Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) by their operators. This is a controversy that raised its head before, when one of the pillar banks was forced by public opinion to pull back from introducing such transaction fees. Councillor Cahill has submitted a Notice of Motion to a full meeting of Kerry County Council to this affect "We are swiftly being catapulted into a cashless society by those who would like to control and charge for every single transaction" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I want our national legislators to be ready and prepared to stop this slide into total plastic transactions. We are already struggling to purchase

tickets for entertainment events, particularly sporting, as we have witnessed here in Kerry at GAA games with cash. Those without bank card facilities are being excluded and that is not right or ethical and it is our Senior Citizens who are affected most and this is not right "said the Fianna Fáil man.

"This is Ireland for heavens sake, we are still a highly rural community and our local shops and services survive because local people support them and deal with them in cash. If the online frenzy takes over completely, the local businesses will be no more" said Councillor Cahill.

"Charging for cash withdrawals at ATMs is just another way to discourage the use of cash and can only lead to the wipe out of all local retailers" added Councillor Cahill.

I am asking ye not to do that on these grounds, St.John of God's, the workers have been doing great work and are doing great work as we are talking today but it is being closed down by stealth. If ye are talking about new Residential care places, I am asking that Whitefield in Beaufort be developed and make it a state of the art place because as I said in the first place it was donated by the Doyle and a whole lot of voluntary work has gone on and fund raising has gone on over the years, we can't let that place close down Minister and I am appealing to you now, you are saying it won't, I am asking you to address it, will it be one of the places ye talked about in the Budget because it has to be.

# PRUNING

# **APPLE TREES**

Apple trees should be pruned every winter if you want a good crop of fruit the following season. If you don't prune your apple trees every year, they can become congested with a lot of old branches and don't produce as much fruit as it would when pruned. It is not a very difficult job to prune an apple tree. All you need to remember is that you want to create an open centre with about half a dozen main branches. You should prune your apple trees always use a sharp pair of secoteurs, loppers or pruning saw.

The point branches to start are those that are diseased, dead or damaged, then start by pruning those that are crossing each other.

Try to remember to keep the centre of the tree open even if you have to remove large branches.
