

The Rally Family bid farewell to their star man

A black cloud hung over the rallying community on Thursday last as the sad news of the passing of Craig Breen started to filter through our devices.

Hundreds of motorsport fans and followers from Kerry made the journey to Waterford earlier this week to attend the funeral service, Craig Breen's final stage.

But as mentioned by his family, Craig would like to be remembered for the happy moments in his life. From his school days, he always wanted to make people proud, never put himself first and always wanted to see others happy and successful.

Of course, Craig had huge connections. Paul Nagle, from Aghadoe – the now retired World Rally Co-Driver owes a lot of his success to the Slieverue native. Craig had a claim to the Kingdom himself, his grandfather originally hailed from the Strand Road area of Tralee before he moved to Waterford to open a shoe shop.

In 2019, the Waterford/Kerry duo landed the International Rally of the Lakes crown while 2 years later, the pair went on to win the Killarney Historic Rally with the Maurice Nagle cup returning to its Aghadoe home for the first time, something Paul will be forever grateful for.

Although his love of rallying stemmed from home, he was known worldwide mainly due to his famous stage end chats on live television. Just last month, Craig finished in second position on Rally Sweden, an all snow rally which was round 2 of the World Championship.

It's still numbing and hard to comprehend that we have lost our idol at just 33 years of age. A hero to many, an inspiration to the next generation of top rally drivers in the country. The Irish motorsport family travelled

I'm walking for Nathan

The official launch of live registration for Nathan's Walk, Darkness into Light 2023 will take place at J.M. Reidy's on Tuesday 2nd May between 7-9pm and will be hosted by Radio Kerry DJ Brendan Fuller along with other guest speakers.

In addition to registering online, Nathan's team will be on hand at Reidy's for live registration where each person will receive a Pieta House TShirt to wear on the morning of the walk. Live registration will be available also on the nights prior to the walk and two hours before the walk commences at Killarney Race Course on Saturday morning, May 6th at 4:15am.

Thursday 4th May, 4-8pm

Friday 5th May, 4-9pm

Saturday 6th May - 2 hours prior to Nathan's Walk at 2am.

Those who wish to register via the Pieta website can do so by accessing the 'Kerry' in the dropdown menu where tshirts are posted to each participant via this method of registering. Each county are allocated enough tshirts for their live registrations therefore online registration must retrieve their tshirts via post.

Darkness Into Light, the annual fundraising event organised by Pieta & supported by Electric Ireland, is taking place on Saturday May 6th 2023 in eight locations around Kerry. More than 100,000 people will come together across 200 locations for the most important sunrise of the year. Each year the walk provides an opportunity for communities to come together and to bring hope to people who have been impacted by suicide. Launched by the local committees, and proudly supported by Electric Ireland, organisers are welcoming everyone to join the event and raise vital funds for Pieta's lifesaving services.

Suicide continues to be a real problem in Ireland and was the leading cause of death in young men aged under 25 in the country in 2019. Darkness Into Light helps raise essential funds and enables Pieta to continue providing free of charge suicide prevention, intervention and bereavement support to people of all ages across Ireland.

In Munster in 2022 alone, Pieta delivered over 14,000 hours of free, one-to-one therapy, and helped almost 2,000 clients. Over 30% of clients presenting to Pieta in 2022 in Munster were aged between 18-35 years and a further 25% of clients in the same year were under 18 years.

The funds raised from this year's Darkness Into Light will help communities within Kerry, with the funding going directly to Pieta's services.

Speaking ahead of the launch, Marie O'Carroll, from Nathan's Walk - Killarney Darkness Into Light said, "I'm involved in Darkness Into Light, Nathan's Walk because I lost my 14 year old son to suicide 16 years ago. I don't want any family to have to live with losing a child to suicide. Darkness Into light is very important to raise awareness and to fundraise to support Pieta in providing free services to those in need and those bereaved by suicide. Our walk goes through Killarney National Park and it's very special as it brings our community together to show that there is hope and support for those who need it. We walk in solidarity, to remember all those lives lost to suicide and to show support for anyone in our community who might be struggling."

Photographer Valerie O'Sullivan looks at Killarney National Parks Longest Serving Volunteer -Áine Ní Shúilleabháin

ine Ní Shúilleabháin is the Alongest serving volunteer in Killarney National Park, with over 41 years volunteering as a research biologist - dedicated to the recording of valuable scientific data on waterfowl and water quality in Killarney National Park. Her research has been an invaluable source of material with recordings dating back to 1982. Aine's contribution, observing ecosystems, and reports on her findings have will be recognised for generations to come.

Áine's 'wingman' is Boatman and co-counter, John Michael Lyne, who operates from Muckross boathouse, John's knowledge of the lakes and interest in wildlife is remarkable. Generations of John Michael's family have been involved with Muckross and Killarney National Park. The day on the lakes, John Michael, Áine and Bird Expert and National Parks and Wildlife Conservation Ranger, Sam Bayley, observed, nesting Herons, ringed Mute Swans, Golden Eye pair, an Egret, Cormorants, Irish Red Deer Hinds by the shoreline, and a White Tailed Eagle in the distance.

'It's a wonderful privilege to be working in Killarney National Park, the Rangers are so open and welcoming. I first came to the park in 1974, working with Dan Kelleher and the late Paudie O'Leary, and then on contract from 1976-1984. My supervisor suggested that I link my work as a fresh water biologist looking at the lake water quality with

my great interest in wildlife ecology and management, that's how I started doing the waterfowl counts." The project was spearheaded by prof John Bracken, Zoology Department IJCD

When Aine was appointed Senior Fisheries Environmental Officer in Donegal and Cavan (1982-2008), she still found time to travel to Killarney and carry out her bird counts. " Being involved in waterfowl counts and waterfowl research in the Killarney National Park, alongside the great staff, so committed and knowledgeable from Dan Kelleher to the current management and staff, Éamonn Meskell, Danny O'Keeffe, and the great team of Conservation Rangers, and Sam Bayley being the Bird Expert, is such a privilege


After retiring, Aine returned to Kerry and Glenflesk became her home place. She immersed herself helping Glenflesk GAA Club, with her strong Kerry roots, she served as Club PRO and now as Health Club Officer. She was appointed to the role of Kerry County Board Children's Officer, a role she is very proud to hold. As she says she is in a unique position volunteering "It's unique having a long series of data going from 1982 to 2023, that's because of the commitment from past and present staff and for me to continue to work as Volunteer is a wonderful privilege, it's great to be out in nature, in such a beautiful place, so many different ecosystems and great wildlife".

St Finan's: Councillors back motion to look at delisting

During a busy monthly meeting, motion the Brendan by Cronin which asked planners consider' "to removing protected status something could be done with St Finan's serious got attention and it may well lay the foundation for urgent action. Finally. It is clear from Monday Killarney councillors, neighbour and Norma Moriarty who seconded the motion, want something done before it is too late.

said he would be "vehemently opposed" to removing the status. And there would be uproar and the State needs to step in which is what everyone wants anyway. But what are SF about, I do wonder? First they have sought to hold up a new courthouse for Tralee because of their fond attachment to the decrepit British Empire building in Ashe Street. And now hey are coming out swinging for another Victorian era pile, this time in Killarney, saying do't touch it. Next they will want Ashe Street to return to its Lord Nelson name!

Meanwhile, pigeons were already flying in and out of the attic of the Killarney building 30 years ago, Donal Grady pointed out. He would not be for knocking the building but something has to be done, Donal said. "A protected structure is all well and good but it won't put a roof over anyone's head," Maura Healy-Rae said.

John O'Donoghue had similar welcome for the motion and he would not want the building knocked either but something must be done to "knock the HSE heads together", as he so cogently put it.

Brendan Cronin had thought long and hard before putting down the motion "to consider" removing the designation, he said.

In responses from the HSE and the Council

over the years, the protected status emerged as an impediment to doing anything with it. "Killarney will end up with a derelict eyesore if we keep the protected status," Brendan said.

Refurbishment cost, estimated at 115 million Euro, was "financially toxic" and no one had expressed any interest.

Not a single affordable house was being built in Killarney, the meeting was also told.

"The bar to remove the protected status designation would be very high. It was a decision for the chief executive and there would have to be exceptional circumstances," council chief executive Moira Murrell said. However Moira - who like myself lived on the Rock Road underneath the hospital during earlier lives - did understand the motion and she will consider it.

"We will consider it. It would have to be something very convincing and we have to take in its heritage value," she said.

Moira is also to meet with the land development agency this week.

Tweaking the boundaries: A Telling Tweet from the Electoral Boundaries Commission

There was an interesting tweet last week from the electoral commission.

We are going to have one or two extra MEPs and extra TDs by the next elections. We have 160 TDs currently and from 2024 there will be at least eleven more, according to the information being put out by the commission The consultation underway seeks to encourage submissions on both Dail and European Parliament by the May 10 deadline. "Geography, and significant physical features" as well as population density are the factors to get consideration, their April 14 tweet said.

I make no secret of my view that Kerry as a single constituency does not work for the old Kerry South. It takes well over two hours to get from one end of the county to the other. It is not distance so much as poor roads and few people sitting behind desks in Cork or

in Dublin or even Tralee appreciate how far away Lauragh, or Castlecove are from Killarney. Or that crossing several bridges on narrow roads and mountain passes across three peninsulas is itself a lesson in geography. You'd be in Cork or Limerick quicker. Kerry North and Kerry South

Kerry North and Kerry South have different economies and they have different histories. We in south, west and east Kerry are much nearer north and west Cork in our history and outlook. And North Kerry is more naturally west Limerick than it is Iveragh.

Good Work in Muckross but a lot more to do around the Abbey and on the N71

This column occasionally makes reference to the royals. It would welcome another royal visit because of the great spruce job on Muckross House and on the route taken by their majesties in 2018. The great work continues in deepest Muckross.

But the area around Muckross Abbey is sadly neglected. From the entrance gate to the railings the walkway is in a terrible state. This is a very popular area and bent, unpainted and rusting iron railing is a distraction. Even the ornate entrance gate near the jarvey stand is in q state and could badly do with a coat of paint.

The surface of the car park at the Abbev is all but gone. As for what passes for a roadside footpath at this location: it is simply rough gravel. Opposite the hotel a whole stone wall just at the back of the yew tree collapsed last week with the weight of ivv. Now continue further on and the N71 is hardly better than the worst local road. While we commend the council elsewhere in this column, what are councillors and management and our TDs doing about the state of the road around the Muckross Post Office? This area is home to the most famous bluebell wood in the whole country. Potholes are so deep and it has been patched so often it is almost impassable. The tourist season is underway and my heart goes out to the drivers of the big coaches. As for the unsurfaced footpath - you can hardly walk there either. We definitely need another royal visit. Maybe a cable car is the best solution.

Let's Get Physical FOR NATIONAL ARTHRITIS WEEK

ith the theme of physical activity, National Arthritis Week taking place between the 24th-28th Current research has shown that movement and exercise has a positive and beneficial effect on the management of a persons arthritis, once the person is on a medication treatment plan for their arthritis. Arthritis is the greatest cause of disability in Ireland affecting 1 in every 5 people and causing the greatest number of GP visits, greatest days of work resulting on a great drain on the social welfare system. There is still no known cure. People living with arthritis find it difficult to do the basic things that healthy people take for granted like tying buttons and shoe laces, carrying grocery bags and cooking utensils. Arthritis also steals a persons social life as your too tired and fatigued at the end of the day to socialise with family and friends as well as not being able to stand, walk or go shopping for long periods.

Arthritis Ireland and its local branch network have a wide range of events planned over the five days. 





A commemoration is to be held in Milltown next month to remember three local civilians who died during the Civil War. The deaths of Jeremiah Hanifin, Jeremiah McKenna and Mary Mc Kenna in separate incidents during 1922 represented almost one quarter of all the civilian casualties in County Kerry during the Civil War.

Organised by local historian and author, Owen O'Shea, and with the support of the Milltown Community and Chamber Alliance, a memorial plaque will be unveiled at the Square in Milltown on Sunday, 7 May at 12 noon.

'In all wars, the toll on civilians is often forgotten and overlooked. During the Civil War, a total of fourteen civilians lost their lives in Kerry. It is important that they are remembered and not forgotten as we approach the centenary of the end of the Civil War,' said Owen.

Father of ten, Jeremiah Hanifin was talking to a neighbour outside his home near Farran Cross, Milltown in September 1922 when a Free State army patrol passed by. Shots were fired indiscriminately and Hanifin was mortally wounded. Two months later at Kilderry near the village, mother and son Mary and Jeremiah McKenna died when they fired upon following an ambush of a Free State army cycling patrol. All three were

innocent bystanders with no apparent connections to the conflict.

'Thankfully, my home town of Milltown was spared much of the viciousness and brutality of the Civil War which impacted communities in many other parts of Kerry. There were, for example,

no known fatalities among natives of Milltown in the ranks of the Free State army or the anti-Treaty IRA.

'Sadly however, three innocent civilians became victims of the dreadful war, which claimed the lives of a total of 14 civilians and over 150 combatants in Kerry. It is important that we remember and commemorate those who died during this dark period in our history, be they combatant or civilian,' said Owen.

The commemoration ceremony on Sunday 7 May at 12pm will feature a short address by Owen O'Shea on the Civil War in Milltown and the unveiling of a stone plaque to the memory of the three people who died by local councillor and Cathaoirleach of the Castleisland-Corca Dhuibhne Municipal District, Cllr Michael O'Shea.

IT'S TIME FOR STATE EXAM CANDIDATES TO FOCUS ON JUNE'S WRITTEN EXAMS



WRITTEN EXAMS

Just over seven weeks remain before the state exams get underway on Wednesday, 7th June. The Leaving Certificate exams, the Junior Cycle exams and the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA) exams will run until Tuesday, 27th June, Monday, 19th June and Thursday, 15th June, respectively.

GRADES

The H/O grading system and the CAO common points system have been very successful since being introduced in 2017. Grades now cover multiples of ten percentage points and 625 points is still the maximum CAO score. Grades from H1 to H7 are awarded points at Higher Level while grades from O1 to O6 merit points at Ordinary Level.

JUNIOR CYCLE

Last year, Junior Cycle exams were held for the first time since 2019 and there were significant changes as a consequence of the Junior Cycle reform which has been ongoing for the past few years. All Junior Cycle subjects have undergone syllabus change and no Junior Cycle exam will last longer than two hours. In addition, all subjects are now examined at common level except for Irish, English and Mathematics, which are still be offered at both Higher and Ordinary levels.

DESCRIPTORS

Six new grade descriptors - Distinction (90% to 100%), Higher Merit (75% to < 90%), Merit (55% to < 75%), Achieved (40% to < 55%), Partially Achieved (20% to < 40%), Not Graded (0% to < 20%) – have been gradually phased during the past few years in the reformed Junior Cycle programme. The old A, B, C, D, E, F and NG grades have now been phased out since last year.

OPTIMISM

Candidates can approach the state exams optimistically because they are well prepared by a dedicated teaching force. The national results achieved each year in the state exams are very impressive. In addition, places in further and higher education courses, apprenticeships and traineeships are very plentiful in a buoyant economy. At this stage, there will certainly be more places available than there will be applicants to take up these places. More employment opportunities are

available to school leavers as the economic continues to thrive. Nevertheless, if the trend of previous years continues, the vast majority of Leaving Cert exam candidates will continue in education as the changing nature of the work environment means that employers are looking for staff with qualifications at craft, traineeship, degree or post-graduate level.

CERTIFICATION

The stigma of failure is long gone from the state exams. Back in the day, failure in Irish meant overall failure. Thankfully, those days are far behind us. Every candidate's performance is now acknowledged by individual certification. Exam candidates' main aim nowadays is to achieve the minimum entry requirements, the specific course requirements and the points for their preferred courses. The State Examinations Commission (SEC) also provides a range of exam supports, known as "reasonable accommodations," for candidates with physical, visual, hearing and learning difficulties in order to remove, as far as possible, the impact of the disability on the candidate's performance in the exams. This facility ensures that no candidate for the state exams is disadvantaged because of a disability.

GOOD MANAGEMENT

Despite all the hype about exam pressure, all you need is a cool head, a positive attitude, optimum use of the remaining weeks, good personal and time management, plenty of nutritious food, rest and an exercise programme to burn off any excess stress. Approach the exams with confidence, do your best during the remaining weeks and at the actual exams. Then forget about them and enjoy the summer. Exams should be kept in perspective. They are just another milestone on the eventful journey through life.

SCHEDULE

With the oral exams now concluded, including, this week's contingency days on the 19th and 20th April and practical coursework, project work and study reports due to be completed or nearing completion, exam candidates have a great opportunity to bank very precious marks. Remaining practical exams will be conducted from Wednesday, 3rd May to Friday, 5th May. The Leaving Cert Vocational Programme (LCVP) written exam is scheduled

for Wednesday, 3rd May. The written exam in Leaving Cert Computer Science will take place on Wednesday, 24th May. In the final term, the written papers now become the major focus of attention as the June exams draw ever closer.

Great Prizes in 'Get SunSmart!' Children's Art Competition

An OPW Heritage Card, A family Day Pass for Dublin Zoo and National Book tokens are up for grabs in the Get SunSmart! Children's Art Competition.

The SunSmart 5 Ss are:

Slip on clothing that covers your skin such as wearing long sleeves, collared t-shirts:

Slop on broad-spectrum (UVA/UVB) water resistant sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 30+ for adults and 50+ for children, with high UVA protection. Reapply regularly;

Slap on a hat with a wide brim: Protect your face, ears and neck.

Seek shade: Sit in cover of trees to avoid direct sunlight and use a sunshade on your buggy or pram. Keep babies and children out of direct sunlight.



Slide on sunglasses to protect your eyes.

Announcing the competition, Minister Naughton said:

"Spending time outdoors is very important for our health and wellbeing, and particularly for young people. By following the 5 Ss of the SunSmart campaign, children can protect their skin while having fun outdoors.

"I'm delighted to open the call for entries for the Get SunSmart! Children's Art Competition and I'm really looking forward to seeing the results.

"Our young people have so much talent, imagination and creativity so I can't wait to see how the SunSmart behaviours are illustrated in pictures.". The Get SunSmart! Children's Art Competition runs until 5pm on 31 May, 2023.

There are three age categories with a prize for the winner in each category. The three age categories are junior infants to 1st class; 2nd to 4th class, and 5th and 6th class.



Celtic party really enjoyed the Italian job

A total of 42 young Killarney Celtic players enjoyed the experience of a lifetime during the Easter school holidays when they participated in a friendship tournament in Verrés, a beautiful Aosta Valley village, located to the north-west of Turin in Italy.

They competed in an event dedicated to football, culture and friendship.

Flying from Dublin to Milan Malpensa before completing the journey to Verrés by bus, they were accompanied by 21 adult club members and coaches with two Celtic teams competing – with successful outcomes – against the locals in under 13 and under 14 blitz-style tournaments.

As well as daily training sessions, they also had an exciting coaching clinic and a questions and answers session with legendary Italian soccer star Moreno Torricelli, who won three Italian titles, the UEFA Cup and the Champions League with Juventus and was man-of-the-match in the 1996 Champions League final. He also played for Fiorentina and was part of the Italy squad for Euro 96 and the 1998 World Cup.

The Killarney contingent also took in a Serie A clash between José Mourinho's AS Roma and Torino in the Olimpico di Torino which the visitors won 1-0.

As the Alpine province of Verrés is very close to the Italy-France border, and many of the travelling party are studying French in secondary school in Killarney, a full hour of French lessons was organised on each of the five days.

One of the most entertaining events of the visit was a sevena-side clash between the visiting Killarney Celtic coaches and parents and a local team, starring the Mayor of Verrés, and despite romping into a 3-0 lead, the Celtic representatives were eventually hauled back and the game ended 3-3.

The visiting party from Killarney also enjoyed sightseeing tours to ski resorts and cable car rides in the Alps and, to mark their visit, they were afforded the full VIP treatment when the town square was closed off and a street party and open air disco were held in their honour with souvenir medals presented to the Celtic players by the mayor.

The travelling party was accommodated, free of charge, in campus-style chalets and the visit was supported by a generous €700 donation to Celtic by Kerry County Council under the Community Support Fund.

The club also organised a number of fundraising initiatives - including a quiz night, a cake sale, collecting acorns in the national park and stewarding for an adventure race – to help offset some of the flight costs and expenses.

The main organiser of the trip was Killarney architect Davide Mosca, who is a native of Verrés, and he was joined by Celtic vice chairman Paul Sherry and long-time club official Mikey Lyne in an advance party which travelled out to ensure everything was ready for the Celtic visitors when they arrived. "It was a very positive experience and all the Celtic party enjoyed themselves thoroughly. We were treated like royalty," Paul Sherry explained.

"We hope to arrange an Erasmus-style educational exchange between the two locations and it certainly helped to create great new friendships and bonds for the kids which will stand to them going forward," he said.

Celtic officials intend to reciprocate the visit by hosting children from Verrés in Killarney next year and, hopefully, start an annual trip experience for different age groups for boys and girls in the coming years.

KERRY LADIES CLAIM NATIONAL LEAGUE

Division One Final:

Kerry 5-11 Galway 1-10 The Kerry Ladies had a great year last year,

winning division two and reaching an All Ireland Final. So far this year has gone even better, and this was without question their most convincing performance yet. Kerry beat Galway in their last game of the group stage, but there was a strong possibility of ducks and drakes about that one, given that both sides already knew that they would be meeting in this final. But there was absolutely no doubt whatsoever about this one. This was pedal to the metal football, and it was like a race between and Formula One car and a Morris Minor. That's not to take anything away from Galway, no-one who follows the game needs to be told who the likes of the Wards, the Divillys, the Slevin/Leonard scoring threat, or of course the great Tracey Leonard. But they were simply up against an entirely different class here. Kerry put together as good a team performance as you will ever since, including some simply astonishing individual performances.

Galway actually started well, with Leanne Coen finishing off a good team move with a point. They then retreated into a hard shell - they had coughed up three goals to Kerry in a somewhat open league encounter, and their game plan clearly hinged on no repeat. I worried as soon as I saw twelve Galway players shielding their own square, cutting off any space, about our ability to penetrate.....whatever psychic ability is, it turns out that I have the exact opposite.

Niamh Carmody doesn't need much space, and she clipped over Kerry's opening score from a tight angle. There was good defending at both ends, with Ailbhe Davoren deftly picking no less a pocket than that of Louise Ní Muircheartaigh. I wonder if Kayleigh ever marked Colm Cooper up at club training when she was younger - she plays like she did. Anna Galvin kicked Kerry's

Galway weren't giving up, and Olivvia Divilly kicked their second point, but an excellent Lorraine Scanlon coolly replied in kind. Galway were running at Kerry with pace, and drawing fouls (personally, I want a certain lack of ruth

among my defenders at this level), with Roisín Leonard kicking two over. Another perfectly judged pass by Ní Muircheartaigh saw Hannah O'Donoghue lay off to Niamh Ní Chonchúir for another goal chance, but this time she contented herself with a point, with Louise Ní Muircheartaigh added a handy free after Galway under pressure coughed up a careless kick-out infringement.

In fairness, the gap felt bigger than seven points. Kerry had dominated all over the pitch, with Galway struggling especially badly in attack. U20 Munster Semi-Final: Kerry 1-20 Clare 4-9

An rud is annamh is iontach, a deireann an seanfhocail. Well, Clare beating Kerry in a football championship match is not just rare. It's almost unheard of. I've seen it happen once that I can remember – it's not an easy one to forget. That was the day that the great Jack O'Shea's playing career drew to an abrupt halt and to be honest, despite one great point, the greatest midfielder of at least one generation had gone on a year too long. He was only a shadow of himself that day.

I've seen Kerry play Clare a lot since. Development squads, minor, U21, senior. Clare gave us some hard battles in Ennis early doors in championship games - part of that was simply because it was the start to championship and Kerry, quite rightly, were not in top gear. Flannans, a truly great sporting nursery in all codes - I have a fierce grá for them, never an ounce of give in their spines - never quite had enough scoring power to get past a Kerry team. Never lay down, not once, but football isn't bred into their bones like it is here. That's no disrespect, but Kerry teams are expected to get past Clare, and I and everybody else was expecting more of the same when I headed to Austin Stack Park last Monday. I even saw a Kerry team under Eddie Murphy, namely son of 'Weeshie 'Long Puck' of Cork, beat Clare in the hurling once - granted, that day it was a league game that Clare took too lightly.

To be quite truthful, I was worried that Clare would play ultra-defensive and we would be treated to a low-scoring and dismal affair, with Kerry running out winners in a dour slog. I've seen a lot too many of those in recent years; it does nothing for me. Thankfully – genuinely, I don't mind a fright, I'd have lived fine with us losing a good game – Clare came hunting.

They weren't one bit afraid of Kerry, and played a huge part in a highly entertaining game of football.

Kerry drew first blood. Clare were running at a Kerry defence who were quite comfortable closing them out with tackles and sending good kick-passes down the field. A good direct ball in from Cian McMahon found Aaron O'Shea, who took his mark and calmly split the posts. So far,. So good.

Except that when Clare started kicking the ball in, the Kerry defence suddenly looked an awful lot less sure of themselves. A good ball in from Cillian McRoarry found the whole defence wrongfooted, pushing forward without minding the house, and Paul Frawley produced a silky finish to slide it past a helpless Kieran Mackessy. Brilliantly taken, but that one was very careless defending.

Will Shine, Kerry's best player on the night, swung over a left legged beauty. But then Seán McMahon sent in a high ball into the Kerry square. I'm sorry, but that's bread and butter defending. One under it and one waiting to gather the loose ball. That's basic stuff. Instead, Mackessy came out of his goal into no man's land. If a keeper is going to do that, you absolutely have to get a hand on it. To be blunt, you take man, ball, and acreage with you if it comes to it. Instead, big Joe Rafferty just got the lightest of touches first and it was goal number two.

I still wasn't worried. In hindsight, there's a lot of arrogance about that, but I felt that there was plenty of time to recover. And to be fair, Kerry did take over completely. Will Shine, Aaron O'Shea, and Rob Monahan, all of whom looked good, picked off good points. A good run by an effective Cillian Burke (early days, but that lad will be seen at higher levels) saw Thomas O'Donnell only denied a goal by a brilliant save. Rob Monahan added two more, including a '45, and the irrepressible Will Shine another to make it 0-8 to 2-0 at half-time. We had received a real scare, but I assumed in my innocence that we were over it. Normal service had been resumed. Brendy Rouine clipped over a mark on the restart and added a free, but Will Shine replied in kind and added another from play. A good run by the effective Paudie O'Leary saw Cian McMahon blast just over the bar - a point was not what he was looking for - and Keith Evans and Rob Monahan added scores to make it 0-13 to 2-2. Cillian McRoary, probably Clare's best player on a night where they had a lot of good ones, kicked their third point and Rouine added another. Then disaster struck. I wouldn't blame the defence for that one, it was simply a well-crafted, well-finished goal. Seán McMahon and Brendy Rouine combined well at speed for Paul Frawley to get in again and once again he finished with applomb. 0-13 to 3-4, level pegging and Clare with wind in their sails.

Rob Monahan had a piledriver tipped over the bar by an alert Thomas Collins. Will Shine added two more points (1f) to his growing tally. Keerry up by three. Back came Clare with two points, the second was actually a good save from a Cillian McRoary rocket. Tom Curran did pick off a Clare point, but Keith Evans finished a good Kerry move to the net and that goal gave us a lot of breathing space. And still Clare just would not go away. You have to admire the grit and the resilience. They still had time for one last goal, a fine strike from Brian McNamara, but this time it was too little, too late.

Kerry advance, by the skin of their teeth, to meet a Cork side that walloped Limerick by 2-14 to 0-6. On paper Cork will be hot favourites, but I actually think that this wasn't that bad of a Kerry display, it was more about great play by Clare. Alright, two of the goals were questionable defending, but that's a fixable problem, even in the tight time frame. We have scoring forwards and we have a hard game under our belts. I would like a bit of speed to go along with the muscle in our defence and there's no question that Rob Monahan will be a massive loss, but Cork are missing some top players through injury. Look, we'll all know soon enough, but I;'d be slow to call this one yet.

And he excelled at both in his playing days. Jim played all his underage football with Milltown/ Castlemaine, and also played senior with the club in the 70's and 80's. He was part of the team that brought success at county level to the club for the very first time.

Having lost the 1978 County Novice final to Ballydonoghue, a game which saw Jim leave the field of play after a somewhat bizarre incident, they returned in 1979 to face Knocknagoshel. He scored one of his sides four goals which saw them capture their very first county title on a score line of 4-06 (18) to 1-07 (10).

Jim was noted as a skilful forward, full of trickery, and long before the arrival of the Gooch or David Clifford, "The Ballygamboon Shuffle" was in operation! While a talented footballer, training or pre-match warm ups were not his forte! Jim's idea of a warm up was far removed from today's and he often was heard to say "How can they play proper football, sure they're burned out before the throw in!"

Up until the emergence of COVID-19, Jim was groundsman in the Paddy Burke Memorial Park, and his delicate touches with the whitewash were often the difference between the ball being in or out of play; or it being a penalty or a free in!

Jim Daly, an honest, simple living man whose motto was: insult no one and be glad of what you have, because there is always someone worse off than yourself.

Minister Donnelly welcomes the abolition of public hospital in-patient Charges

inister for Health, Stephen Donnelly has announced that, with Verifiect from Monday 17 April 2023, public in-patient charges have been abolished in all public hospitals.

The Health (Amendment) Act 2023 removes the acute public in-patient charge of €80 per day, up to a maximum of €800 in a year (including daycase charges) for people accessing care as a public patient in all public hospitals. Following the enactment of the legislation, the Minister for Health signed the Commencement Order providing for the removal of charges from today.

Minister Donnelly said: "I am delighted to announce that from today,

people will no longer be charged when accessing public inpatient care in our public

"This legislation removes the existing financial burden of public inpatient charges when accessing care in a public hospital. The removal of these charges, announced as part of Budget 2023, is an important step towards reducing the healthcare costs of patients and families.

"This measure builds on the abolition of public in-patient charges for children, which I introduced last year, and is another significant step in ensuring that people have access to affordable healthcare services."



DOG ATTACKS

Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has condemned the injury and involved" said Councillor Cahill. "The sight of finding your sheep

"These incidents are very traumatic for all involved and on top of that, are bringing financial hardship to our hard pressed sheep farmers. Unfortunately the incidences appear to be on the increase and the losses higher than before" stated the Mid-Kerry man.

"We all love our dogs and pets, but we must all take responsibility for them and ensure they have no opportunity to stray onto farmland, worrying livestock and in some instances, causing injury or death. We are talking about people's livelihoods here, not just the pure cruelty

"The sight of finding your sheep and lambs lying dead or dieing, having been viciously torn apart by dogs is one that you will never forget" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Do you know where your pet is 24/7? Are you entirely satisfied your pet is not straying onto lands stocked with sheep and cattle? If this continues, severe penalties will have to be imposed, both financially and on the freedom of movement of dangerous pets. And that's the last thing anybody wants" added Councillor Cahill.

GREENFIELD SITES RAISED IN COUNCIL MOTION

*Ilr. John O'Donoghue has raised the following motion at the recent meeting of **Kerry County Council:**

The Councillor's motion focused on green field sites within the County zoned residential, and therefore liable for the new tax, how many will require significant upgrades to their services, particularly their foul waste sewer infrastructure before significant development can take place on the site."

What he said on the motion:

"My motion is a very simple one. I have previously highlighted the issue of the proposed 3% tax on land which is zoned residential, and how unfair I feel it I on those running viable farms which are a major source of income for the family, as some of these farms have been in families for generations. All of us sitting here are acutely aware of the housing crisis we are in, and the need to build as much and as quickly as possible. I do however feel this new tax is very unfair as at the very least, the green spaces identified which are not currently being used for anything should be taxed and built upon first, before any moves are made to tax family farms. My question is to wonder if some of the land which may be fully serviced officially, may not be serviced to the level required for substantial development. I have heard, anecdotally it must be said, where other Local Authorities have told landowners that while officially their land should be liable for the tax, they are not serviced to the point where development is a possibility at this moment, and they will be exempted until the facilities are in place to allow for such development. The foul waste water sewer seems to be a particular issue and I am wondering the following:

- · Is this the case in any of the areas zoned residential here in Kerry?
- If so, surely these landholdings should also be exempted from the tax until such time as the services are brought up to the required standard".

The Council's reply to my motion:

In order to be considered in scope for the Residentially Zoned Land Tax (RZLT) lands must be zoned solely or primarily for residential use or for a mixture of uses including Residential and connected to or capable of being connected to relevant services. Irrespective of the cost of connecting to wastewater services, these are matters outside of the control of the Local Authority. There are a number of settlements in the County where the wastewater treatment

plant is inadequate to for residential development and light of the legislation and guidelines from the Minister, lands in these settlements are not in scope for the tax until the necessary upgrades take place to the wastewater treatment plant. The draft map identifying lands in scope in the above settlements (List A) was published on the 1st of November 2022. Having regard to the

existing wastewater network and capacity in the wastewater treatment plant serving these above settlements, there were no lands zoned R1, R2 or R4 in these settlements excluded from the draft RZLT map. Landowners had until the 31st of December 2022 to make a submission to the Council in relation to the inclusion of their lands on the draft RZLT map. 52 (No.) submissions were received. Where relevant, these submissions were referred to Irish Water forcomment. The Council issued its determination in relation to these 52 submissions before the 1st of April last. Landowners have until the May 1st to appeal the determination of the Council to An Bord Pleanála. Therefore, having regard to the process it is not possible to ascertain if any lands the subject of submissions will be removed from the map in scope.


Welcome back dear student last week we spoke about private tears. Are you in trouble? Does it feel like you are up to your neck in it? "Save me, O God, for the floodwaters are up to my neck. Deeper and deeper I sink into the mire; I can't find a foothold. I am in deep water, and the floods overwhelm me. I am exhausted from crying for help; my throat is parched. My eyes are swollen with weeping, waiting for my God to help me" (Psalm 69:1-3). This Psalm was written by King David a man well accustomed to turmoil. It is quite a prophetic song about the Messiah. Jesus quoted this while speaking about His Love when He taught that He is the Vine and we are the branches. He warns that standing on God's Word will not make one popular — just as He experienced.... "they hated me without a cause" (John 15:25; Psalm 69:4).

At times it can seem that even though you are doing the right thing you are not seeing the results you expected. This is where your faith and personal knowledge of God's Word and His Love kicks in. God warns us that "our adversary the devil roams around like a roaring lion seeking whom he may devour" (1st Peter 5:8-9). The devil wants you to fail, to fall into destruction and to be utterly defeated. However, the Lord re-enforces His Everlasting Love - telling us to 'cast our anxiety upon Him because He cares for us' - all the while 'resisting the devil firm in our faith knowing that our brothers and sisters in Christ are having similar experiences'. That may be hard to believe because the enemy will whisper that no-one knows how you feel, or will taunt you that no-one else is in the predicament that you find yourself in. Remember this friend - the devil is a liar. He doesn't just tell lies — Jesus revealed Satan as a liar, a cunning cheat, a slanderer and accuser, a murderer and a thief.

Most people cover things up when they are in trouble. It can be financial, family, work, mental health - the problem may differ from one to another but the source and the solution are always the same. Satan, sin and curse is the root of the problem; but our Loving God, His Mercy and His Son Jesus is the answer (John 14:6). No matter what the issue, here is how to see things change. First, acknowledge your sins to God. All of us have sinned and fall short of God's Glory and deserved to die for our sins (Romans 3:23; Romans 6:23). But God's Love overcame sin, death, curse and sickness in the Person of His Son Jesus when He laid down His sinless perfect life paying for you and me to be saved with His Blood. Next - ask the Lord Jesus to come into your heart to be your Lord and Saviour. Making Jesus Lord means turning away from the way you used to live - instead living in obedience to His Word bringing Him Glory. Thirdly, ask the Lord to baptise you with His Holy Spirit Power and watch as His Fire fills your life and opens up and reveals God's Word to you as you study. There is a cost friend - it's your time and your whole heart, but the result will be that you will learn the Truth and 'the Truth shall make you free' (John 8:32). "Return to your rest O my soul" (Read Psalm 116).
