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


"The sun was shining and everybody had a wonderful time. We had close to 70 entries and one of the biggest crowds ever seen on the streets of Killarney," he said.



STREET CLOSURES PLANNED FOR ROAD RACE

Killarney Valley AC committee are planning their Streets of Killarney 2024 5 Mile Road Race and to facilitate that, there will be road closures from 6-8pm on New street, High street, Beech road and partial use of New street car park. There are partial road closures on the New road with no traffic allowed from Rock road and St Anne's road direction via New road and no traffic from the New road to Port road section heading left back



to New street for the duration of the event. The race commences at 6.30pm sharp at Killarney house and covers two miles there and via the Killarney National Park Knockreer.

The runners will then emerge from the park crossing onto New street, the first runner is expected to emerge from the park at approximately 6.39pm.

The athletes and runners will then proceed up New street, towards Market Cross turning left up High street, then back via New road and Port road keeping left back to New street.

They will complete two full laps of the inner section of the town route totalling three miles.

On completion of the town loop twice they will head for the finish line via Beech road and into the New street car park turning right parallel with the tourist office where the finish line logistics will be in operation.

The first runner is expected to finish in approximately 25 minutes with the final runners to take up to 1 hour.

With a major traffic management operation plan to ensure the safety of all, can we thank the public for their cooperation and would ask drivers if at all possible to avoid the area at this time and assist the stewards in ensuring a safe event.

"In advance can we thank the Gardaí, Kerry county council, the residents and the business owners for their cooperation.

With hundreds of runners coming from all over Ireland and beyond the showpiece event from Killarney valley AC assists the maintenance and viability of the athletics track within the town", a spokesperson from the club told Killarney Outlook.

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

The St Patrick's Day -Best ever parade

This year's parade was top of the class. History feeds ideas. And the theme Echoes of Killarney was inspiring. Parades are a very ancient means of making us speculate as well as offering a spectacle and a chance to socialise. Just think of all those odes to Grecian Urns! They tick all the relevant boxes so long as the weather is good. This column was especially taken with the Mangerton Luna display by the Two Mile School Community School, and the effort put in by children and teachers. The Two Mile reminded us Killarney's history did not start with Inisfallen or Victoria's visit or even Patrick's arrival. But like ancient Egypt, we had a culture that flourished thousands of years ago. The luna was found in a bog on Mangerton and sold off to a middle man in the 1840s. I once started penning an imaginary story about this event. (Sometime along with all the other boxes of started stories, I will finish it!) This vast area, replete with ritualistic place names like gallán remains largely unexplored from an archaeological point of view. I have long been convinced - not only from the evidence of that stunning gold half moon collar - we have a Newgrange on our doorstep, but to investigate it.

Pity that priceless collar discovered in a

bog on Mangerton is still in the British Museum. The collar was made by beating gold into a very thin sheet then decorated with a complex finely-incised geometric triangle pattern with considerable skill and was probably worn as jewellery or a ritual item, is how the museum itself describes it. I have been pestering them to hand it back. However they feel they bought it legitimately. Other high notes to this year's parade included the Renaissance Italian delegation thanks to Davide Mosca, crowned Count of his native northern Italian village of Verres in February 2020.

Davide was named 72nd Count - the first person living abroad to be honoured with the title.

Massive congratulations to Mike Fuller for his entertaining as ever contribution in Fair Hill. I tend to 'park' myself there now just to be entertained by Mike's take on the floats - and everything else.

One suggestion for next year: could there be a park and ride system put in place from all points please? Car parks were full from very early. The Cathedral field, Liebherr, and maybe Tescos in Deer Park could easily accommodate a park and ride, is my thinking. Huge congratulations to Teresea Irwin for 52 years of the Irwin school of dancing. As usual, Teresa, Clodagh and sisters and their dancers of all ages made a very stylish contribution.

Where, oh where, is the wifi?

We should at this stage have municipal free wifi in all towns. It is 2007 since Killarney barely lost out to a free wifi programme funded by the EU. It has since apparently become available on Main Street, but a bit of publicity might do it good.

All I can find on the council website is reference to Listowel.

What prompts me to raise the issue is a visit to Tralee MTU last week where there is no guest wifi. I could not believe this. I went back towards the town and tried a number

of Tralee cafes. Wifi not working. Ditto on Friday in the town center. I actually ended up coming back to Killarney to file my story on Thursday. Cyber attacks and fear of cyber attacks has closed it down at MTU apparently. Brian Looney Kerry County CouncilHead of Digital, Smart Programmes & Broadband tells me there is free public wifi but only in certain spots in the core of Tralee and in the core of Killarney.

This is under the EU's WiFi4EU and is also available in areas of Killorglin Dingle and from the beach amenities at Ballybunion, Fenit Rossbeigh.

Dinis Cottage and Ross Castle enjoy it too and Brian says he wants to roll it out this summer to Torc Waterfall.

In Killarney the scheme again is in the area of the town core: Main Street, the Haha, Anam, College St / Plunket St, Courthouse / Fair Hill. Sit on Beech Road and there is nothing, though.

Before the summer season, Brian expects to do a maintenance round 'and resolve a number of off-air and outstanding additional sites (including Kenmare) town centre and launch the service in these locations with local chambers.'

It is time the chambers in Tralee and Killarney and the county council's enterprise and tourism officers got their acts together on wifi and on work spaces in their towns.

We need wifi in our towns but we also need work stations and hot desks. What happened to the idea of town hubs or was it ever there? With the closure of so many cafés and such poor wifi we need publicly supported internet cafes for workspaces. I see lots of big words about 'innovation' and we are tripping over the fine talk about 'entrepreneurship'. Whole supplements are being brought out about Kerry being 'a great place to do business'. My own experience along with other mobile workers in the county is the whole thing is still up in the cloud! Perhaps it is not just the Government who need to come down to earth a bit.

Rent your bin or else

While we have no hot desks to rent in Killarney to do business, the latest hot idea to extract money from hard-pressed businesses is to rent a bin.

Charging for the spaces to place bins in Killarney! I kid you not. Businesses in Killarney must now rent a bin space as well as pay rates and pay for their refuse collections. Before anyone rubbishes the idea, we really are not talking pavement tables here. We are talking bins.

I must have missed some of the council discussion on this hot topic. Or maybe the whole thing seemed so bizarre, I dismissed it. I sometimes do this. I think - 'this can't be

true'. It is a flaw and I find lately I have to fight it increasingly because the world is truly gone mad. And things no one ever could deem plausible are in fact happening.

Anyway, this latest scheme seems to have stemmed from the IBAL report, Irish businesses against litter, which highlighted unseemly bin placement in the Glebe. Niall O' Callaghan at one point suggested we imitate cities in the south of France where bins go under the pavement. The councillor is correct. We need car parks to go up and bins to go down to improve our town. It is common sense.

In the meantime the council in Killarney is going around to businesses and if they are

not agreeing to annual fees of around 250 euro per bin space they will be fined. A few are taking the bin away altogether, they told me. I rang the town hall for a comment. No one has come back.

Survivor is a short film about Mark a local professional athlete who was born and raised in his small town. He is known by all and gets a lot of support. He mainly sticks by his friends, Sam and Kyle. Mark suffers from severe depression and anger that he keeps together when he is around his friends but lets it out when he's alone in his apartment. He has been visiting his counsellor, once a week, for many months but has given up hope and believes that it's all pointless. He is sick of being around, until he meets a girl called Lily. Lily sees past Mark's fame and fortune and likes him for him, which Mark adores. Since Mark has met Lily, his life has changed for the better until he gets a message saying that his sponsorship has had to leave him. This leads to Mark, once again, spiralling down that deep rabbit hole that he tries so hard to avoid", he said.

"I feel this 'Survivor' should be made as it shows the importance of speaking up when you are suffering from depression, anxiety, anger. It also shows the common trend that a lot of young people nowadays, especially men, hide their problems

from their friends as they are scared of being judged. We wanted to show that not only do everyday people suffer from mental health problems but so do professional athletes at the highest levels. We think it is important to address this in films, that there are many well-known figures suffering from huge inner turmoil behind closed doors. Through the story of Mark, we want to encourage speaking to mental health professionals which is something many men do not consider to

be "manly". There is also plenty of diversity, different ethnicities in the characters so we are touching off different cultures in this film", he added.

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

Three Killarney students were among nine students from Kerry were among a total of 626 first-year students from Ireland and overseas who received prestigious Entrance Exhibition Awards for the 2023/4 academic year from Trinity College Dublin.

Ellen Considine, a former pupil at St. Brigid's Presentation Secondary School, Thomas Knoblauch a former student at St. Brendan's College and Ivan Huggard, a former pupil of ISK Killorglin were among those students accepted into the first year of a full-time undergraduate degree programme who achieve the highest points among Trinity entrants from their secondary school, above a minimum of 500 CAO points (or equivalent).

Many former awardees have gone on to make a significant contribution to the economic, cultural, and political life of Ireland and beyond. Past Exhibitioners include Taoiseach Leo Varadkar.

The students come from 445 different schools and from all 32 counties on the island of Ireland as well as 28 countries overseas.

The awards were delivered at three ceremonies at Trinity, to which the students and their school principals were invited.

Students who achieve the highest points among Trinity entrants from their secondary school with at least 500 points in the Leaving Certificate (or its equivalent EU/EEA second-level final examinations) are eligible for an Entrance Exhibition Award. This includes bonus points for Mathematics. When more than one student from a school gets the same high points, all receive an award.

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

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NOW IS THE TIME TO START THINKING ABOUT THE COST OF COLLEGE



FINANCE

Higher and Further education is expensive and puts many families under considerable financial pressure. The financial burden is eased a little for students who qualify for a partial or total SUSI grant. Even so, many college students have to work part-time or depend on their parents to make ends meet. Thousands of students who are ineligible for funding must come up with about €14,000 annually if they are living away from home or about €5,000 if living at home. The student contribution also has to be paid.

SUSI

Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) is Ireland's higher and further education grants awarding body. Student grants are divided into maintenance grants and fee grants. Maintenance grants are paid directly to the student's bank account. Fee grants cover tuition fees, the student contribution and the cost of essential field trips. SUSI grants are available at PLC, undergraduate and postgraduate levels.

STUDENT CONTRIBUTION

In Budget 2023, there was a once-off reduction in the student contribution from €3,000 to €2,000. Assuming that the reduction applies in the 24/25 academic year, SUSI will pay the entire €2000 to colleges on behalf of students who have been awarded 100% student contribution, €1000 for students awarded 50% student contribution and €500 for students awarded 25% student contribution.

CRITERIA

To be eligible for a grant, an applicant must meet a nationality criterion, a residency criterion, an education progression criterion and an approved course criterion, all of which are mere formalities for most applicants. To be eligible for funding, your total household reckonable income must fall below specific income thresholds. The SUSI website contains tables outlining the income thresholds and the associated maintenance grant rates for applicants. The minimum distance from home to college for the higher grant (non-adjacent) eligibility is 30km. About 80,000 students should be eligible for some level of standard maintenance grants ranging from €612 to €4,292.

GRANT

The maximum standard non-adjacent maintenance grant payable in the 24/25 academic year will be €4,292. For students who live less than 30km from their college, the standard maximum adjacent grant is €1,774. The gross annual income level for grant eligibility is €40,875 (less than four dependent children), €44,810 (between four and seven children) or €48,575 (between eight or more dependent children). Income thresholds increase by €4,950 for each additional family member in college. The amount of non-assessed holiday income that a student can earn per annum is €6,552.

SPECIAL

There is also a special maintenance grant for applicants whose annual gross income is less than €25,000 (less than four dependent children), €27,400 (between four and seven children) or €29,702 (eight or more dependent children). That payment is now €7,586, nonadjacent and €3,230, adjacent, respectively.

ASSESSED

Applications for academic year 24/25 will open shortly. SUSI usually prioritises new grant applications until July. SUSI will process late applications but its best to be on the priority applications list. Applicants are assessed on gross income from all sources in the 2023 financial year. Applications are assessed as either a 'dependent,' 'mature dependent' or 'independent' application. A dependent applicant is assessed on the income of parents or guardians. An independent applicant is assessed on personal income and that of her/his partner.

RECKONER

As the grant is means-tested, visit the eligibility reckoner on www.susi.ie. This facility provides potential applicants with an approximate indication of whether or not they are likely to qualify for a grant. However, it's always advisable to submit a grant application. Even if you don't currently qualify, your financial circumstances may change going forward. There is also the possibility that Mr Harris may alter income qualification levels and maintenance levels, so keep an eye on the SUSI website, www.susi.ie for any updates.

ACCOUNT

Before you start your application, create an account in your SUSI student portal. You will be asked for your Personal Public Service Number (PPSN), Name, Date of Birth, Email address and Phone number. Create your log in details where you can set up your username, password and security pin. Then carefully complete the interactive application form. Once you have submitted a grant application you can follow its progress on the SUSI Online Application Tracker.

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
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Teenagers and Sleep:

Why is sleep so important for teenagers? Sleep is necessary for physical growth, of which there is a big proportion of at this age but also it contributes to good mental health. Sleep allows the teenager to adapt and respond to daily stresses, from assignments to relationships, navigating the journey can take a toll on the body.

We may scold our teens for sleeping in too late in the morning but in actual fact their body needs the extra sleep! Hormones are changing and often heightened in teenagers. Dopamine and Serotonin play key roles in establishing

sleep patterns in teens. Dopamine is responsible for regulating sleep/wake cycles and influences circadian rhythms. This can cause a delay in sleep pressure or need. Serotonin is responsible for relaxation, sleep quality and duration. So, sleep can easily become dysregulated in teenagers and have difficulty getting to sleep.

So, what simple steps can be put in place to promote good sleep behaviours...

Again, consistency is key, going to bed at the same time and rising at the same time helps the circadian rhythm regulate.

Similarly, as with younger children, limiting screen time before sleep is vital.

Diming lights and unwinding relaxes the body and initiates melatonin production.

A dark, calm and cosy room is more inviting for sleep.


Appropriate time outdoors, not only burns physical energy but also is good for mental health. This can improve sleep need but also improve the ability to relax into sleep.

Meditation and mindfulness can help reduce racing thoughts at bedtime. Training the mind to be present and relaxed takes time but certainly is a very beneficial tool to use.

Using lavender oils/ sprays or herbal teas can also be good sleep associations.

Sleep disturbances or changes to normal sleep patterns, should not be looked at in isolation. Seeking medical assistance when necessary must always be considered if your teen is experiencing difficulties sleeping.

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SCREEN TIME, FACTS FOR PARENTS

Most parents worry about how much time children are spending on digital devices. Here are the facts

WHAT IS BLUE LIGHT?

Sunlight contains red, orange, yellow, green and blue light rays. Combined, this spectrum of coloured light rays creates what we call 'white light' or sunlight.

Depending on where they fall on the spectrum, light rays have long wavelengths (with less energy) or short wavelengths (with more energy).

Blue light is a high-energy visible light and has shorter wavelengths. It is known as blue light because it is on the violet-blue band of the spectrum.

Blue light is naturally present in sunlight but is also something we can see from screens such as TVs, computers, smartphones and tablets

Can blue light damage my child's eyes?

There is currently no scientific evidence that blue light causes damage to the eyes. However, there is evidence to suggest that carrying out near tasks, involving looking at something close-up, such as using mobile devices, screen time and reading a book, can increase eye strain for those who do this for long periods of time.

What is digital eye strain?

Digital eye strain happens when a lot of time is spent using near vision, for example, reading on screen or playing online games.

One of the main symptoms is temporary blurred vision but other signs such as sore and tired eyes, dry eye and headaches are also associated with digital eye strain.

Can blue light affect my child's sleep pattern?

Using screens close to bedtime age of three.

may contribute to poorer sleep, which may mean your child's concentration levels are lower during the day. This may be because blue light is linked to the suppression of the hormone melatonin which makes us feel sleepy. However, there is a range of other factors linked to disrupted sleep.

Can blue light filtered lenses help?

Some people report that lens coatings that filter blue light make their eyes feel more comfortable or are helpful before bed.

IS THERE A LINK BETWEEN SCREEN TIME AND SHORT-SIGHTEDNESS?

Short-sightedness, or myopia, is increasing throughout the world. Family history, ethnic background, environment (living indoors, in cities) and carrying out near tasks, such as screen use, have all been linked to the development of myopia. However, there is no clear evidence to suggest that screen time alone is the direct cause. But, there is good evidence to suggest that children who spend more time outdoors are at lower risk of developing short-sightedness.

TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR CHILD'S **EYES HEALTHY**

Get them outdoors - regular play and exercise can help prevent or reduce the development of myopia (short-sightedness). Studies show two hours of outdoor activity a day is ideal1

Use night settings - using night settings, if your device has them, may help children sleep by reducing the amount of blue light given off by the screen during night-time hours

Make sure digital devices are turned off at least an hour before

Book your child in for a sight test at least every two years, from the

FOLEY INJURY OVERSHADOWS VICTORY OVER ROSCOMMON

National League:

Kerry 1-17 Roscommon 1-11

I suppose it's a sign of where both counties are that Kerry came out of Dr. Hyde Park with a comfortable win but without allaying any worries about our depth. In fact, a big worry going forward is a nasty enough injury to Jason Foley; that's unquestionably one of our linchpin players. That said, there's a bit too much eagerness to be hunting for a villain of the piece on social media to suit me. I've seen the same video most people have, and I don't think it was intentional. It doesn't make sense either - you scoring a goal would provoke an angry reaction from you? When you have just reduced the deficit to a manageable level? The lad is a volunteer representing his county; let's all hold off on the metaphorical stonethrowing.

The truth is that Kerry were okay, no more than that, it a game that epitomised why Jim Gavin, Eamonn Fitzmaurice, and co. have a very daunting task ahead of them in revitalising a sport that has become dull to watch. Both sides were ultra defensive and risk-adverse here and it just plain and simple wasn't entertaining. I didn't make it to Roscommon myself, relying instead on a combination of TG4 and Kerry Radio (who were excellent), and I was kind of glad I didn't.

We've seen Dublin, who took us to school while keeping plenty of powder dry, and Derry (I suspect they might be going a bit strong for so early in the year) absolutely sliced Mayo open. Kerry, and granted we are not putting full pedal to metal just yet, look a fair distance behind.

Roscommon are just not in that kind of conversation. I like the Rossies - frankly, any county whose supporters take gleeful pride in a nickname like 'the sheepstealers' are my kind of people. They are rarely up among the elite counties, but they are always capable of giving any of those counties a good rattle. But this was a lacklustre showing that never really fired the blood.

Kerry opened the scoring with Joe O'Connor fisting over the bar. Kerry always had the edge in the middle third - O'Connor is industry personified, but I have to say I am becoming a firm admirer of Barry Dan O'Sullivan's positional sense and game intelligence. I think he does a lot of simple and uncredited things perfectly. I often think of an aging Franz Beckenbauer when he was asked why he could beat so many younger players to the ball in a race from A to B. "I never start at A", the great man replied simply. Ronan Daly replied and Roscommon turned over the Kerry kick-out to win a free. There seemed to be a bit of bite to the wind as Diarmuid Murtagh's effort curled wide. A second effort by him also went astray. At this level, teams need to be taking those.

Gavin White and Dara Moynihan were covering a lot of ground for Kerry – both came in for a certain amount of criticism early in the league but have been absolutely superb in recent outings – and a surge by the Crokes' man saw David Clifford smoothly split the posts. Barry Dan O'Sullivan fisted over from a tight angle for another – again, nothing overly complicated. Roscommon with another wide and Seán

O'Brien with a Kerry score. It showed the difference between the teams; Kerry were just that bit more clinical - without, and I have to stress this, setting the world alight in any way themselves. Sure enough, Roscommon racked up yet another wide and Dara Moynihan set up Darragh Roche for a score. A superb turnover by Seán O'Shea saw David Clifford raise another white flag. This game was dying a slow death as Kerry lead by 0-6 to 0-1.

After twenty minutes, Roscommon got their second score. It was a fantastic kick and credit where it's due, but it's by their goalkeeper Conor Carroll. The goalkeeper. If ever there was an indictment of a forward line....I was sorely tempted to turn off the television.

Roscommon, looking to close that deficit, for some reason decided to absolutely pack their defence even more. I don't know, maybe

they wanted to give Carroll space to attack or something. The amount of bodies back there didn't bother David Clifford; he just curled the ball over them with his left boot.

Roscommon have put up very little to encourage their supporters, but Enda Smith sold a great dummy and fired over a beauty. Daire Cregg added another. Were they kicking up a gear? We could but hope....

This is an old bugbear by now, but still worth highlighting. Kerry broke at speed and Seán O'Shea flicks it to the net, but is fouled in the process. So the referee applies the advantage rule and calls play back for the penalty.

So, as a reward for being fouled, Seán's goal is chalked off and it's a penalty to Kerry. Exactly how is a penalty more of an advantage than a goal being awarded? It's a completely illogical but constant application of the rule.

David with the penalty, and that's not a great effort. He seemed to concentrating more on the march up than the ball itself and it rose too high. Ah well, you learn lessons by trying things. We'll take a point. A foul on Paul Murphy saw Seán O'Shea step up to the free but it's a very uncharacteristic miss from the Kenmare man. Again, not a big deal in a game like this, especially not with Roscommon's shooting being so far off - they leave two more scoring chances behind them before the whistle.

Half-time Kerry 0-8 Roscommon 0-4. You'd be a while putting together a highlights reel.

Roscommon come out with a bit more ambition and Enda Smith kicks another good score. Daire Cregg adds another. There's just two points in it now and this could (hopefully) be about to get very interesting.

Barry Dan O'Sullivan scores his second point. I like that. No hesitation, no sizing up options. I'm an inter-county footballer and I'm inside shooting range, so I'm shooting. Frankly, every player in every county, and I include defenders, should consider that a basic requirement of the

Dara Moynihan adds another and the gap is back to five points again. Paudie Clifford is very narrowly wide with a great effort – I absolutely love that he took the chance on. His brother gathered from Seán O'Shea to clip over another. This is comfortable rather than inspiring football, more down to Roscommon's deficiencies than any particular Kerry brilliance. Enda Smith is Roscommon's key threat and he takes another nice point, but Diarmuid Murtagh is having an off day and spurns another chance from a free – in fairness to Murtagh, he's usually much better than this. Every player can have an off day.

Paudie Clifford clips the post but again Kerry are sharpest to react, with Seán O'Shea slotting the rebound.

With quarter of an hour left, Diarmuid Murtagh slipped by Seán O'Brien on the byline and crossed for Cathal Henaghan to fist home. The game needed it. Roscommon won the kickout, but this time Kerry managed to clear the danger.

Disaster. Jason Foley is down and it's immediately obvious that it's bad. This is the one thing Jack O'Connor definitely won't have wanted. Our list of walking wounded is already a bit of an issue and our All Star full back is a key component in our ambitions, to say the least. It's a separate conversation, but are games coming too thick and fast? It feels like both clubs and counties have no time to really recuperate or steady themselves. All of the experts will tell you that the difference between professional and amateur sports isn't really the training, it's the rest periods.

Stephen O'Brien with a fine point, but Ronan Daly replied in kind. Paudie Clifford looks up and splits the posts. Kerry are putting this game to bed. Roscommon notch another wide - that's their tenth of the evening. Turn those into scores and you have a different narrative. Paul Geaney finds Stephen O'Brien but he couldn't quite finish it to the net. Those two had a refreshing directness to them. Donie Smith kicked a superb point from a tight angle for Roscommon, but Paul Geaney hit a great rejoinder for Kerry. Smith added a free. It says something worrying about Kerry that Roscommon were still hanging on in this game. Injury time. Paul Geaney notched his second point and then laid off the final ball for Joe O'Connor to roll it past a helpless Carroll. Sin sin, done and dusted.

A win is a win, but that's about all that can be said. Kerry are safe in Division One with Galway left to play and have an outside chance of reaching a League Final (I don't particularly want to) but Jack O'Connor will be coming away from this one with more questions than answers.

Pádraig O'Halloran did brilliantly to clear his effort off the line, only to see his attempted handpass intercepted and McCullagh blast home.

Paddy Lane, double marked by now, picked off a point from play and added a free won by Tomás Kennedy (I felt that Mounthawk might have profited from more high balls into the big full forward, but sure hindsight wins a lot of wars) but the writing was already on the wall. Omagh kicked the next three points And added a third goal through McCullagh. Tomás Kennedy did gather a superb mark for a point but Eoin Donaghy closed out Omagh's deserved victory.

A tough one for Mounthawk, but nonetheless it has been a great year for them, capped with that debut Corn Uí Mhuirí title.

BIG WIN FOR KINGDOM WARRIOR

It was basically a dream debut for Kerry boxer Kevin Cronin in his first professional fight on US soil, and the large Irish contingent in Boston were appreciative of the expertise he brought to the ring. He took control right from the off, keeping Patrick Pierre on the back foot with left

jabs. In fairness, the American did land a few punches in the middle of the first round but Cronin was landing much better shots towards the finish.

Pierre came out swinging in the second but Cronin's footwork was better and he gradually began to wear the local man down. Pierre was definitely laboured in the third and did well enough to last the round, but the Tralee boxer had the measure of his man now and his combinations had the New Yorker reeling. Stuck on the ropes and taking shots to both the body and the head, there was no respite and the referee quite rightly interceded to call it off and award a technical knock-out. Cronin would have gone into this fight as the favourite, but this was a lot more emphatic than expected and puts Cronin and promoter Michael Conlon firmly in the spotlight.

RUGBY

Ireland Crowned Champions Six Nations: Ireland 17 Scotland 13

You'd say that Ireland don't exactly have so many Six Nations titles that we can afford to be grumbling about the manner of one. You'd be wrong. Ireland came into this tournament as reigning champions and one of the best team in the world, even without Sexton. We had width, pace, power, and array of options all over the field. And at times, we looked like that - the French game was brilliant. But, while it certainly wouldn't be fair to say that the wheels came off the wagon, we did seem to get a little derailed by the finish. Fair enough, we were missing some top guns - Keenan can be a great lockpick in games like this one - but we seemed a bit ponderous. England took away our chances of a Grand Slam, and that one point defeat actually flattered a very outclassed Ireland on the day, and everything seemed to feel a bit hollow after that.

Van der Merwe made the first real break for Scotland – his pace and power always concern me, but Dan Sheehan did really well. Scotland were quite obviously up for this one and a penalty coughed up by James Lowe saw Finn Russell kick Scotland in front. Ireland responded with a great break by Robbie Henshaw, allowing Jack Crowley to find the corner. Scotland made an absolute hames of the line-out, picking out Dan Sheehan for a try that truthfully was more about bad defending than quality attack. The scoreboard doesn't have points on merit, though, and Ireland were in front, with Crowley

slotting the conversion.

Scotland weren't afraid to go at Ireland and Finn Russell notches another penalty. Neither side was free-flowing, but they seemed to be that little bit more up for the contest than we are.

Ireland with a penalty and a chance to extend their lead, but Crowley couldn't quite get it there. No big deal, Sexton and O'Gara weren't exactly nailing those ones at stage of their careers either. I'm more than happy to give him time.

There were little mistakes on both sides that keep breaking the

patterns of play and ensured that the scoreline remained unchanged at the break, with Ireland leading by 7 to 6.

Ireland made a better start to the second half, with Lowe and Aki taking the ball at Scotland and good Irish pressure forcing a penalty that Crowley put over. That's a bit of daylight between the sides, hopefully Ireland can get their rhythm going now.

That's certainly how it looked as Ireland drove forward. Great burst by Tadhg Furlong and that looks like a try to me. There was a wobble on it but I thought he had regained control of the ball and there was clear downward pressure as he grounded it. Very tight call but the TMO over-rules it. No try.

Scotland haven't become toothless, with Jamison Gibson Park doing well to clear the lines, but it's mostly green shirts pushing forward and Scotland are defending stoutly.

Ireland pressed again and this time it looked as if Henshaw got in, only for a Scottish hand to get down fast enough as he grounded it. Great defending.

Ireland could scent blood now, though. Pressure always tends to tell in rugby and Ireland finally made the breakthrough, Andrew Porter bursting through. Crowley converted to put Ireland eleven points clear and it's a deserved lead. It's hard to see Scotland coming out of this with a win and the Six Nations Championship is realistically done and dusted.

Scotland got in for a try from Huw Jones and I'm sorry, but Ireland were sound asleep for that one. That's a try that the likes of New Zealand or South Africa will never give you and I imagine there will be some quiet conversations about that one going forward. Another try and Scotland could snatch victory here.

Ireland captain Peter O'Mahony has looked emotional all day and I for one fully expect that he will call it a day. Conor Murray, too, has finally started looking his age and showing the wear and tear. Two great giants of the Irish game and it's nice to see them bow out with medals – plenty of great Irish players never got that chance.

Elsewhere, it seems that the Welsh dragon could no longer start a fire if you gave it a flamethrower. Italy, who had won the grand total of two Six nations games in nine years, went unbeaten for three games this year and won two. I've been critical of their participation in the Six Nations in previous years; I'm more than happy to eat my words now. They showed

far more flair than Wales and if anything, they deserved to win by a lot more.

What can you say about France and England? That was some kick in those circumstances. Imagine if Scotland had scored another try against us, leaving the door open for England to take the title? What a finish that would have been! As Oscar Wilde famously said about the death of Little Nell in a Charles Dickens novel which provoked a tremendous wave of sympathy in England at the time, "One would need a heart of stone not to laugh at the death of Little Nell". The little divil on my shoulder felt exactly like that when Thomas Ramos put that last long distance monster between the posts.

SOCCER

In a week packed with sporting highlights, my absolute favourite comes from supporters rather than a team or player. When Brighton faced Roma in the first leg of the Europa League, they were greeted with a fairly nasty banner by the Italian fans insulting the late queen of England. Nasty stuff, mind you.

Francisco Totti was Roma's greatest striker and a club as well as national legend. In his heyday, Totti was basically unstoppable.

Italians are fiercely proud of their cuisine. Not the Americanised versions, which came about largely because the immigrant Italians had much better access to meat, hence you got the likes of inch thick meatballs and 'chicken alfredo'. They do use garlic, but the notion of serving garlic bread with every meal.... no chance. Carbonara, funnily enough, was invented during the second world war because the visiting US soldiers to Rome had bacon.

Italian food is very Meditteranean, pasta, quality cheeses, fresh ingredients. Olive oil rather than butter or heavy fats. In Italy, unlike in my house, spaghetti Bolognese does not contain mushrooms, peas, diced turnip, or anything that's just lying round. The colder northern cultures, including Celts, Danes (i.e. Scandinavians), and Germans, were always more meat-based. Italians would never load a pizza with meats, not in any of the many regional variants. Even worse, of course, would be the 'Hawaian' pizza (it was actually invented in Canada) which contains pineapple as a topping. Even Americans generally draw the line at that.

The Brighton fans felt that they had a point to prove, and by jaysus but prove a point they did. As the visiting Roma took the field, the Brighton fans in the crowd unveiled a banner that simply read "Totti adora l'ananas sulla pizza".

'Totti loves pineapples on pizza'.

That is just about the classiest rejoinder I have ever come across. I laughed my head off. It's more funny than insulting, and it basically announced that in the war of words, Roma had just been absolutely hammered.

I know almost nothing about Brighton. DJ Fatboy Slim (Norman Cook) came from there and the English royal family popularised it as a holiday resort in the 19th century. That's it, that's all I know. I can't name a single player. But I will have a soft spot for them for always

Over €3.9m for Kerry projects under Community Recognition Fund

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D, Norma Foley, has welcomed €3,946,095 in funding for Kerry County Council under the Community Recognition Fund 2024.

The Community Recognition Fund was first introduced last year to recognise the huge efforts made by communities in welcoming and supporting people coming to Ireland.

Through the 2023 allocation, funding of €50 million was approved for some 900 projects in supporting cities, towns and villages nationwide that have welcomed people from Ukraine and other countries.

Under today's announcement, a further €50 million is being provided again to deliver projects over 2024 and 2025.

Local authorities, in collaboration with communities, will be funded to develop projects that will deliver long term benefits to those living in the areas selected.

Projects that will be funded include:

- Development or refurbishment of community or cultural facilities including play areas, walkways, parks, community/sensory gardens, allotments, and recreational areas;
- Development or refurbishment of local club and sports facilities;
- Enhancement to school/parish facilities which are open to use by all of the community after school hours;
- Purchase of equipment for local clubs, festivals, community events and organisations
- · Transport infrastructure such as community vehicles

Minister Foley said: "The Community Recognition Fund will give towns and villages across Kerry an opportunity to create a more inclusive and enjoyable environment for all. This is a very significant funding announcement by Government with over €3.9m being allocated to Kerry County Council and it builds on the €4. 4 million allocated to the county in 2023. By investing in facilities and organisations that facilitate integration and community participation, we are building stronger communities that embrace diversity while promoting social cohesion."

"I know communities the length and breadth of the country have really stepped up to the plate in recent months in terms of welcoming families

from Ukraine or those seeking asylum from other countries.

"This funding is about recognising the efforts and the generosity that so many communities have shown."



Bus Shelter for Farranfore is vital

Aontú Candidate for the Castleisland Electoral Area Cáit Ní Ríordáin has welcomed confirmation from the NTA that Farranfore is included on Kerry County Council's short list for technical assessment for the provision of a bus shelter.

. Cáit Ní Ríordáin:

"I have been informed by the NTA that the technical assessment will consider space availability at the proposed location, road safety considerations, accessibility standards, as well as the design details and technical requirements relating to the bus shelter. I have been contacted by many people regarding this issue including those who have had to stand in the rain while waiting for the airport service that leaves just after midnight. Therefore, the provision of a bus shelter in Farranfore is vital."

INCREASE IN RATES

Fianna Fáil County Councillor, Michael Cahill has blasted the Rates Valuation Office in Dublin as being out of touch with reality, following the recent issuing of Rates Bills for businesses in Kerry.

"In a time in business where huge challenges exist to keep the doors open, with enormous rises in overhead costs, energy, wages, supplies, etc, the Valuation Office has seen fit to send out bills to people showing more than a 100% increase in Rates. This is against a background where towns and villages are seeing many businesses closing weekly because they cannot survive" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I have been contacted by numerous business people on this issue, some saying they will need to borrow money if they are to pay these inflated Rates bills, others admitting that they cannot continue to trade under such a burden. The real world is here on the streets of our towns and villages, where small businesses exist, run by real people for real people. It is incredible that people in the Valuation Office can sit in their Ivory Tower to issue a crippling 100% plus Rates increase on those who are the backbone of our economy" said the outraged and flabbergasted Councillor Cahill.

"Small businesses need to be nurtured in our local economies, they need to be supported while trying to recover from lockdowns and energy price hikes. The more than doubling of Rates bills will cause an economic wipeout in every town and village in this county and I will be calling on Kerry County Council to make the case on behalf of their clients, the business people of Kerry, to the Valuation Office as a matter of extreme urgency" added Councillor Cahill.

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

HYDRANGEAS

Hydrangeas are a very popular garden shrub with delicate heads of flowers that come in shades of white, pink or blue and they flower from late Spring to Autumn. The mophead and lace cap Hydrangeas are well known for the ability to change colour in different soils. Hydrangeas thrive in moist but well drained soil, in the cool, semi shady part of the garden. Try to avoid dry sunny situations and east facing areas. Feeding your Hydrangeas once in late Winter or early Spring is probably enough for the year as too much feeding will only encourage too much soft leafy growth and this will lead to the Hydrangeas not developing a lot of flower buds. Pruning your Hydrangeas is usually done in late Winter or early Spring, although the climbing Hydrangeas should be pruned after flowering in Summer.



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
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
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
