

As 2023 draws to a close, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce believes the town and its people can reflect on a really successful year during which time so many existing projects reached a new level and a number of hugely positive initiatives were advanced to make the country's premier tourism capital a better place to live in, to do business in and to visit.

The year reached a truly spectacular conclusion with the Christmas in Killarney festival which proved a massive hit and saw the streets lined five-deep with children – and the young at heart – waiting to catch a glimpse of Santa Claus and the magical festive floats and fun-filled Disney characters.

An added attraction this year was the parade being led by a convoy of fabulous vintage tractors – all afforded a festive makeover – to mark the 10th anniversary of the Killarney Valley Classic and Vintage Club.

An additional €35,000 – provided through the Ukrainian Support Fund – was spent on the already incredible Christmas street lights and decorations and there are additional plans to greatly enhance the Christmas in Killarney celebrations in 2024 to copper-fasten Killarney's reputation as Ireland's Christmas capital.

And that's not all – the Wander Wild Festival and the St Patrick's Festival, both held in March, and the 4th of July Festival, which sees Killarney celebrate Independence Day with its American friends, will also be more elaborate and more colourful in 2024. One of the real causes for celebration in Killarney in 2023 was the fantastic news that we were named Ireland's Tidiest Large Town in the national Tidy Towns Competition, in addition to winning the Kerry award and the south west regional award.

That was quite an achievement given that the adjudication takes place in mid-summer, a time when Killarney is at its busiest and the town is bustling.

A dedicated Tidy Towns Committee, featuring representatives of Kerry County Council, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and other dedicated individuals, and chaired by Michael Gleeson, worked long and hard and with real purpose to give Killarney every chance of success this year and that drive and determination really reaped dividends when the results were announced in Croke Park in early October.

Killarney was, in fact, just a single point behind the overall winner, Abbeyleix, in the Tidy Towns competition and every effort will be made in the coming months to ensure that the adjudicators will have cause to add one point – and more – to Killarney's tally next October to put us in pole position to win the prestigious overall award for the first time since 2011.

Much of the credit for the success in the Tidy Towns competition has to be attributed to the dedication of the council's top class outdoor crews and the rebirth of the Killarney Looking Good Competition which returned with a new format, new categories, a new determination and new sponsors in the form of MD O'Shea & Sons and O'Mahony Media Ltd.

competition amongst friends and neighbours to encourage civic pride and with a €5,000 prize fund to distribute this year, it created a very healthy and friendly rivalry.

Generations to come will, of course, have reason to thank the forward-thinking individuals in the town in 2023 as it was the year the fantastic initiative to move away from single-use coffee cups was launched.

Killarney became the first town in Ireland to introduce a plan to remove all takeaway coffee and tea cups to help eliminate over one million single-use containers from local waste disposal systems and to tackle the problem of littering in the national park.

Other towns and cities have been closely monitoring the hugely successful initiative which was a really pioneering and exciting move by those spearheading the project.

So many wonderful local projects were realised during 2023 that it was almost impossible to keep track of them all.

The completion of the Macroom bypass has huge benefits for Killarney given that it significantly shortens the journey time to Cork – and, more importantly, from Cork – and it is a real advantage for local people working on Leeside and commuting each day. The new road makes Killarney and other parts of Kerry much more accessible for those who wish to enjoy all we have to offer.

It was heartening to see work commencing on the new 130-bed community nursing unit on the grounds of the former St Finan's Hospital during 2023 and, in addition to providing top class facilities for the care of those that will need minding, it will also free up the historic St Columbanus and Killarney Community Hospital for other uses when the construction work is complete and the transfers take place in the coming months.

Another major shot in the arm for Killarney was confirmation that the former Pretty Polly site, which has been derelict for years, is to be transformed into a state-of-the-art educational facility as we in Chamber look forward to that exciting project coming to fruition as it is just the kind of development the town needs.

Great credit for all of the above must go to Kerry County Council and, more particularly, Killarney Municipal District Council who have been to the forefront of the various projects and without the foresight, determination and tenacity of Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Brendan Cronin, the elected members and the officials, Killarney would struggle to get its fair share of what is being distributed from the national purse to help fund the various projects. For their great work, we thank and acknowledge all involved in the town hall and in county buildings.

On reflection, it has been a terrific year for Killarney on so many levels and there is an onus on us all to continue that sense of cooperation and maintain that great pride of place that will ensure that this great town continues to set the standard.

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce would like to wish everybody a very happy and peaceful Christmas and a prosperous, successful and busy year ahead.

Hopefully, when Santa Claus parades through the streets at the 2024 Christmas in Killarney festival, he'll have his trademark bell in one hand and the overall Tidy Towns trophy in the other.

Hop On, Hop Off

around the Ring of Kerry

The proposal by a Kerry County Councillor that the Bus Service on the Ring of Kerry be upgraded to allow passengers use it on a Hop On, Hop Off basis, is becoming a full reality with the addition of new regular routes in 2023. Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill proposed the scheme to the National Transport Authority, through a Notice of Motion submitted to Kerry County Council in March 2021 and is now delighted to see so many buses on the route.

"This is a fantastic service for all those who live along the Ring of Kerry route and it will see a reduction in car traffic for both residents and visitors. With regular return routes, people have the peace of mind of being able to complete their journey seamlessly" stated Councillor Cahill. "The additional routes are already proving a big success, with strong take up all round. These new services will open up all of Kerry in an environmentally friendly manner, reducing the use of many private cars" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.



The routes are

Route 280 Killarney - Fossa - Beaufort - Killorglin - Glenbeigh - Kells - Cahersiveen - Waterville (3 return buses a day from Waterville - Killarney and also another 4 return trips a day from Waterville - Killorglin that connects with Bus Eireann Route 279 in Killorglin for Tralee / Killarney)

Route 281 Waterville - Caherdaniel - Castlecove - Sneem - Kenmare (4 return trips 7 days a week).

With the addition of Bus Éireann Route 279a Cahersiveen - Kells - Glenbeigh - Killorglin - Milltown - Castlemaine - Tralee (1 return trip a day Monday to Friday)

"I will continue to lobby for further buses to be provided for locals and tourists alike on the Ring of Kerry as I am convinced that a full on Hop On, Hop Off service will be a major success story, especially with the first section of the South Kerry Greenway due to open in 2024" added Councillor Cahill.

At last, A Christmas Roads Surprise.

Congratulations to mayor of Killarney Brendan Cronin, town manager Angela McAllen and the council for finally getting the much needed pedestrian crossing on Mission Road over the line. The works were unwrapped on Monday - in time for Christmas festivities. This is a real present for Kllarney. It was long in coming, and several Advents passed, without result. But we won't be churlishTransport Infrastructure Ireland, the Kerry and Department of Transport itself all had to be consulted. Along with pushes, sometimes raucous, by this columnist.

But all's well that ends well, this season of Goodwill.

The N71 road by the Muckross Post Office is undergoing a much needed facelift too, finally. The foreign bus drivers and local car owners need no longer engage in the lucky dip of pot hole jumping. The decision to raise the kerb in Muckross to protect walkers is a fine one. Even my own road that used to be a great attraction for fast drivers from Cork who feared the mountain might move, has a face lift and is all lined and signed now.

We have not had a great year weather wise. And there is also economically, the chill wind of recession. Having lived through three of these things, I know this wind.

As in the eighties, and the 008s, the blight of recession sees sharp intakes, a peak in property prices, not enough housing, high rents, cutbacks in department spendings, loud lectures from Government circles - and the flight of our young people. It is all gearing up again and people sense it too. The profligate spending on some things, while ignoring the elephant in the room,



affordable housing for our own hard pressed is downright annoying. There is a lot of anger out there. But let us celebrate while we can. As the song goes, 'Enjoy yourself, it's later than you think. Enjoy yourself, while you're still in the pink.

The years go by, as quickly as you wink.' Wishing all readers at home and abroad a safe crossing over Christmas into 2024. Just to say too, the Christmas lights this year are spectacular in Killarney, but also in Tralee. And if you get a chance some evening go down Denny Street towards the Ashe Memorial Hall. The display in our county capital is stunning and it almost matches Killarney!

Street begging in Killarney JPC meeting

The recent annual general meeting of the Joint Policing Meeting inTralee heard of 'rampant begging' and harassment of Christmas shoppers in Killarney and Tralee. The matter was raised by Castleisland Councillor Charlie Farrelly. The chief garda superintendent of Kerry, Padraic Powell, said he himself had become aware of the street begging while walking in Killarney and Tralee.

Nobody likes to see anyone having to beg. But the suspicion arises when you see the same well fed looking people day in day out, that there is more to this than meets the eye. The meeting inTralee also heard from Killarney

councillor Niall Kelleher, chair of the JPC, that when concerned public representatives approached some individuals begging on the streets of Killarney with offers of accommodation, 'there was no take up'.

People feel bad passing anyone with a placard and a begging bowl lying on the street. Particularly when money is tight and yet we are still spending on stuff.

I witnessed an elderly man trying to give what he could to one individual who was anything but destitute looking.

On Friday too, just off the town square in Tralee a fine looking young couple, well dressed, were sitting out and calling at people . Now I do wonder, whatever about Killarney which quite disgracefully does not have a homeless centre, why the pair in Tralee had to go to these extremes.

I admire people who play music and look for a few bob, but this simple calling out at people is not acceptable.

'Street begging is rampant at the moment, especially leading up to Christmas in our larger towns. A lot of people are being harassed with people begging on the streets of our towns,' Charlie Farrelly told senior gardai.

I think he was brave and right to raise the matter.

Chief Superintendent Padraic Powell said where appropriate, people would be moved on and prosecuted by gardaí, he said. A policing plan for the Christmas period was in operation and this would target such activity, he said.

Maybe I am not the only one weary of the constant phone calls and text messages that are scams. And I have little time either for all these aid agencies begging for international help while their chief executives earn vast sums and are ferried in fancy cars. Most of these have vested interests. I have completely gone off giving them anything as there is no real knowing where it will end up. I also suspect that the most needy amongst us will put on the smiling face and are the last ones to look for help. So, I have asked myself this Christmas and for 2024 to look a bit closer at the brave people amongst us and maybe give them a hand when I can.

JP gives to every county

Which brings me to my next piece: JP McManus. I can scarcely believe the begrudgery. Along comes JP - I admire JP and only wish we had a JP just for Kerry - and he gives money to every GAA club in Ireland and people are down on top of him. He is not paying all his tax or something to that effect in Ireland. And who pays for the roads, I heard Mick Clifford ask. Well, my answer to that is, he is paying tax through his businesses in Ireland. That's for a start. And secondly, it is some years since I sat through a board meeting of a company and realised a humble hack like me, scarcely reaching the industrial wage, was paying more tax than the company. I nearly fell off my chair. You see, there are so many ways of ensuring you don't pay a lot

in tax and all are legitimate. But to do so, you need a good accountancy firm. And the time to explore the many schemes instead of like the hamster pedaling furiously to get money in to meet the deadline. No offence, but most accountants which small self-employed / sole traders people go to are really tax collectors for the revenue commissioners. That is my experience. And if anyone knows any different, I will be happy to be corrected. So, roll on JP. The small woman's tax will pay for the roads. And Happy Christmas! The money is going where he wants it to go and I can lay a bet that if JP were to not be a tax exile and were to pay his tax in Ireland, a good accountant would find ways for him of paying far less than the 32 million he is dealing out to every GAA club in the land.

SCOIL PHOBAIL SLIABH LUACHRA

to celebrate 25th Anniversary

2023 marks the 25th anniversary of Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra in Rathmore and plans are underway to celebrate this milestone in style. The staff and students marked the 8th of December by beginning the celebration of what is a very special occasion in the life of the school. The day started with a 'Reeling in the Years' video from 1998, the year that Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra was newly formed as a community school. This was followed by a lovely mass in St. Joseph's Church, Rathmore which was celebrated by Fr. Pat O Donnell and attended by the whole school community, as well as primary school students from Rathmore and Hollymount and members of the local community. The day also included a guiz for the entire school on events that happened in 1998 as well as a staff photograph and lunch.

The new school at the time was an amalgamation of St. Mary's Secondary School, which was run by the Presentation Order and Rathmore Vocational School which was run by Kerry Vocational Education Committee (VEC). 

The Great Southern Hotel in the early
1900's was thriving and

In 1906 construction began with 100 beds and the hotel was opened in 1907. The New Hotel as it was called attracted a growing number of English working class, who could now afford to

visit Killarmey.
During the Civil War in 1922 the

making factory.






IS IT MORE DIFFICULT TO GET A MORTGAGE TO BUILD MY HOME THAN A MORTGAGE TO BUY MY HOME?

NEW YEAR CHANGES FOR EMPLOYERS TO PREPARE FOR

Revenue's Enhanced Reporting Requirements (ERR) apply in Ireland from 1st January 2024. It requires employers to report details of some payments - "reportable benefits" - including:

- Small benefit Since January 2022, you can give employees up to two small non-cash benefits each year tax-free - such as gift cards, vouchers, memberships or tickets. They must not exceed €1,000 in total.
- Remote working daily allowance Employers must now report the total number of days, amount paid and date paid.
- · Travel and subsistence Employers must report reimbursement of business-related travel and subsistence costs, including emergency travel and eating

Pension auto-enrolment begins in Q3 2024

Auto-enrolment, the new retirement savings scheme for Irish employees, is expected to begin in the second half of 2024.

Most employees in Ireland who earn more than €20,000 without a pension scheme already will be automatically enrolled into the new system. Employees and employers will initially each pay 1.5% of gross salary into the scheme, with a state top-up. Contributions will rise over 10 years until they reach 6%.

Other payroll changes in 2024 are:

- Statutory sick leave increases from 3 days to 5 days. January 01st 2024
- Minimum Wage will increase by €1.40 to €12.70 per hour. January 01st 2024
- Parent's leave will be increased to 9 weeks from August 2024.

Board & Lodgings

If board and/or lodgings i.e., meals and/ or a place to live, is part of the minimum wage then the following amounts can be included to make up the national minimum wage

Amounts for 2023:

- Meals €1.01 per hour worked
- €26.70 for accommodation only per week or €3.81 per day

Increased rates from 01 January 2024:

- . Meals €1.14 per hour worked
- €30.00 for accommodation only per week or €4.28 per day

Right to request flexible and remote working to be introduced into law

The right to request remote working and the right to request flexible working under the Work Life Balance Act require a code of practice. This code of practice is currently under development at the Workplace Relations Commission. The Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment has indicated that work in this regard is ongoing, with a working group meeting regularly in order to complete the code. No set date has been agreed for its finalisation. However, it is widely expected to be introduced in Q1 of





Having held sway for the majority of the game Scott's Lakers eventually succumbed to a late Tolka Rovers rally in a cracking game on Saturday evening. The opening minutes of the second quarter were a shootout between Bell and Daivs as they went toe to toe. The bustling Tolka centre hit his sides next thirteen points while Bell hit a couple of threes and with good support from Jack O Sullivan the Lakers still led 45-39 with 2.06 to go in the half. Jack O Sullivan beat the shot clock to put the visitors 77-74 clear with seven minutes left. Dewan White and Davis were now carrying the burden for Tolka and through their efforts they ran into an 84-80 lead with 3.35 on the clock. Moss and Jack O Sullivan tried to reel them in but Davis was now rampant and with support from Rory Howe they closed out the game on a 92-84 scoreline.

Top scorers on the night for the Lakers were Braden Bell with 36 points, Paul Clarke shot 12, Terion Moss had 11, Jack O Sullivan and Eoin Carroll shared 20 equally, Mark Sheehan had 3 and Jamie O Sullivan 2.

For the victors Jaja Davis hit 31, Dewan White and Rory Howe had 17 apiece, Daniel Ayoade shot 16 and Elijaah Faapito 11.

The loss is only the Lakers third of the season and with six victories they sit well poised towards the business end of the table. EAST KERRY CHAMPIONSHIP LATE SURGE SEES CROKES RETAIN EAST KERRY CROWN

O'DONOGHUE CUP FINAL Dr. Crokes 0-12 Killarney Legion 1-8

To be honest, I wasn't particularly looking forward to this one. Dr. Crokes went in as strong favourites, deservedly so after a very convincing triumph over Spa in their semifinal. Killarney Legion had just about overcome Kilcummin in a game that was effectively a low-scoring lottery because of the weather.

It was a dark enough day (I was squinting to identify players by the finish) and miserable enough weather – albeit with less wind and rain than last week's games. I wasn't expecting too much.

And, not for the first time, I was completely wrong. ? This was a gripping contest from start to finish. If you know the history of the Dr. Paddy O'Donoghue Cup and football in East Kerry generally, it adds to the experience, but you could bring any neutral to this game and they would have hugely enjoyed it. Given the drama and the tension, I would guess that it wasn't half as enjoyable for partisan supporters! Legion, who had the strong wind in the first half, made the better start. Darragh Lyne gave away a poor pass but redeemed himself by winning a great turnover before laying off to Ryan O'Grady for the game's opening score. The industrious Lyne grabbed a high ball to the back post from James O'Donoghue and laid it off again to O'Grady to make it 0-2 to 0-0. Best known as a midfielder, Lyne played s a roving - inside to get effect when Legion had the wind, and it was an important supplement for a full forward line with bundles of talent (James O'Donoghue, Peter McCarthy, Ryan O'Grady) Charlie Keating had a good effort tipped away by an alert Brian Kelly, with Shane Murphy's '45 spilling away to the left. A great turnover and drive forward by Gavin White saw David Shaw open Dr. Crokes' account, but the impressive O'Grady clipped over from a tight angle for his and Legion's third point and Finbarr Murphy added another when Legion turned over the kick-out.

Crokes were very nearly level when Tony Brosnan slipped through ball to Gavin White with just the keeper to beat, but Brian Kelly is very hard to beat and made a great save. Mark O'Shea couldn't quite direct the resultant '45 on target, but a foul on Tony Brosnan saw David Shaw trim the gap and Cian McMahon cut it back to just one with a fine score. 0-4 to 0-3.

Legion had slightly more of the play but were struggling to convert it into scores, not least because of superb defending by David Naughton and Gavin White in particular. Shane Murphy did have to rise high to fist a dangerous ball clear.

Micheál Burns drew Crokes level in the 25th minute, but Finbarr Murphy won and converted a free to restore Legion's slender lead. He had one more free before the break from out on the sideline. It looked innocuous enough, a difficult kick for a free-taker. He judged it perfectly, curling it beautifully into the wind and heading over the black spot....only to dip, and Crokes were caught unaware as, bizarrely, it slipped into the net. A bad goal to concede, and a bad time to concede it, with Legion taking a formidable four point lead into the break.

Half-time Killarney Legion 1-5 Dr. Crokes 0-4 Four points is a big lead to be chasing in winter football, even with the wind behind you, and Crokes set to work to trim it immediately. They struggled to convert though, with Cian McMahon's high ball into the square being well cleared, Charlie Keating having a weak effort comfortably gathered by Brian Kelly, and

Micheál Burns' having a chance fall short as well. Legion almost got through for a goal, but Ryan O'Grady slipped just as he was pulling the trigger and a grateful Crokes cleared their lines – that one was a real let-off.

Tony Brosnan, looking much livelier in this half, opened his account with a free and quickly added another after good work by Mark O'Shea. Finbarr Murphy replied with a free of his own after James O'Donoghue was fouled and there were two points between them again, 1-6 to 0-7.

In the 45th minute a high ball in from Brian Looney was bundled into the net, but referee Pádraig O'Sullivan correctly disallowed it for a free on the keeper. Instead it was Legion who got the next score, Eoghan O'Sullivan wisely opting to fist over.

A good effort by Tony Brosnan hit the post, with Micheál Burns swooping on the rebound, jinking into the square, and curling the ball past the last defender and keeper....only to see it stray just the wrong side of the goalpost. Another heart in mouth moment in a game that had plenty of them.

Both sides were conscious of the clock ticking that bit louder now. Crokes stayed calm. Tony Brosnan kicked his first point from play. Kieran O'Leary raised a huge cheer as the Dr. Crokes talisman split the posts. Just one point in it now. Eoghan O'Sullivan, outstanding all through the second half, picked off a a second point and they were just minutes away from a historic victory.

Long, hard minutes. Legend has it that Roscommon captain Jimmy Murray, when he was being taken off for treatment to an injury, was being cleaned up for the presentation of theSam Maguire with his side six points up and just a few minutes left on the clock. While he was absent, Paddy Burke goaled for Kerry and then Tom Gega O'Conor's sideline ended up



in the net. Kerry went on to win the replay. No Killarney Legion devotee needs to ask how those Roscommon supporters felt back then! Micheal Burns laid off to Tony Brosnan and the gap was down to the minimum. Brosnan lined up another one, but Cian Gammell made a great block. Mark O'Shea stepped up to the '45 –remember, Crokes had already left two such chances behind time – and this time he judged it absolutely perfectly.

With less than two minutes remaining on the clock, Tony Brosnan won and converted another free. It was the first time all day that Crokes were in front, but it was also the most crucial time and when the final whistle went, it was Dr. Crokes captain Gavin O'Shea who lifted the coveted O'Donoghue Cup.

CLANMAURICE WIN ALL IRELAND CROWN

ALL IRELAND INTERMEDIATE FINAL Clanmaurice (Kerry) 1-7 Na Fianna (Meath) 0-7

People will tell you that Leonidas of Sparta had a tough job ahead of him guarding the Hot Gates (the thermos-pylae) from the Persian army of Xerxes. I was going to start this story by drawing parallels with Clanmaurice in Croke Park, but when I think about it, there are important differences. For one thing, Leonidas and the Spartans would have been a bit too far to the right for the German Government of the early 1940s (they were very, very much the bad guys), whereas the Clanmaurice girls are as sound as they come. For another, Leonidas didn't have 300 soldiers. He had somewhere between 5000 and 7000. Mind you, to be fair about it, Xerxes had somewhere between 120,000 and 200,000. Na Fianna didn't have that kind of playing panel. So that was an awful metaphor by me, and by rights you'd be better off ignoring it.

Clanmaurice had 17. In total. Two subs. Murt Murphy told me about their opening game in Munster this year (as Kerry's only senior club, they are automatically our representatives), and I told him that getting to Intermediate grade was an almost unbelievable achievement it itself. A Munster Intermediate? Not impossible, depending on the luck of the draw. The advantage of only one senior club (it doesn't offset the disadvantages – going forward, Kerry

camogie needs senior club competitions) is that they are also inter-county players, and Kerry's triumph in Division Two was founded on Clanmaurice building blocks.

Clanmaurice, as you'd expect, were only hanging on in the first half. Na Fianna had the run of Croke Park but somehow – and actually there isn't any mystery, Clanmaurice managed to get pressure on every shot but couldn't create any real chances themselves. They trailed by 0-3 to 0-1, Aoife Carey on the frees for Na Fianna and Patrice Diggin on target for Clanmaurice. Na Fianna maybe lost a little bit of concentration, coughing up two late frees for Patrice to convert handily enough. It was level pegging at half-time. Mind you, 0-3 apiece, all frees, says a lot about the game. No neutral was urgently texting their friends "Switch channels! You need to see this game!"

A lot Eddie Murphy, who has mastered many great victories for Kerry in hurling as his famous father Weeshie 'Long Puck' did in Cork, will care. His team were still alive and still in with a chance thanks to Patrice Diggins three frees. Eddie worked his magic during the break. I wasn't in the dressing room but I have no doubt it was more about staying calm and focussed than stirring the blood. That stuff is great for Hollywood movies but intelligence surpasses passion for the most part, especially with experienced players.

Patrice with a stunning free in the 35th minute and suddenly Clanmaurice were in front. Aoife Carey replied with a fourth free of her own but Clanmaurice were much better at battling for primary possession now. Julianne O'Keeffe hit a good shot, with the keeper forced to deflect it over the bar. It was Julianne's last part of the action, making way for Amy O'Sullivan, with Killarney juvenile coach Kate Lynch making way for Elaine Ryall at the same time. O'Sullivan and O'Keeffe's emergence from underage has been absolutely crucial for both club and county. Clanmaurice and Kerry always had brilliant defenders in the likes of Sarah Murphy and Niamh Leen. It was at the other game that their limitations were showing, relying very heavily on Patrice Diggin and Jackie Horgan for great scores. Both Amy and Julianne are always good for a couple of scores (Kate and Aoife Behan as well) and they make a real difference. That was the case here. Caoimhe Spillane sent in an inviting ball and Amy's pace saw her gather just ahead of the keeper and tap it into the net. One of those that looks simple but is actually far from it. Jackie Horagn boomed over a great point and suddenly Clanmaurice were five points clear in a game where scores were at an absolute premium.

Na Fianna were not giving up. Aoife Carey picked off another free before Sophia Payne got their first score from play. Two points in it – Clanmaurice were caught last year in the All Ireland semi-final when leading by that exact scoreline. History was not repeating itself, though, with a nerveless Amy O'Sullivan splitting the posts to seal an incredible victory. Seventeen players in total. Be honest. If you had that number on one of your underage teams, you'd be looking to amalgamate with somebody to ensure that fixtures can be fulfilled and players would get games.

MUNSTER GAA AWARDS

The Munster GAA Awards have been good to Kerry in recent years and that trend continued this year. The Senior Footballer of the Year was, for the first time that I can remember, shared, but it still stayed in the one household as the Clifford brothers Paudie and David won the honour. No doubt sympathy played a certain part, but I do think the decision stands on its own merit, given their performances.

The U20 Player of the Year was a formality, given Will Shine's scoring. I do have to give a mention to Clare's Brian McNamara – I know it was just one game, but his display against Kerry was an absolute tour de force and I actually hope to see more footballers produce that, even when it's against us.

There were two candidates for the Minor Footballer of the Year. A Kerry player was always going to win it, despite the brilliance in our opening defeat of Cork's Darragh Sheedy and Seán Coakley. Ben Murphy started at full back but Kerry really opened the throttle when he moved out to midfield subsequently, but the key player for me was Paddy Lane. Rarely have I seen a Kerry minor team so dependent on one player. In 2018 you had Paul O'Shea, but you had the likes of Paul Walsh, Dan Murphy, and Killian Falvey as well. Go back to David Clifford's era, and you are factoring in the likes of Seán O'Shea, Diarmuid O'Connor, Graham O'Sullivan....2014 we ended a fairly long famine

(by our standards) but that team had serious talent on every line, starting with Shane Ryan. Go back all the years that you want. I'm not saying that this year's Kerry minors had only one talented player - far from it, you don't need to tell me about the likes of Pádraig Moynhan, Gearóid Evans, or multi-talented Evan Boyle... you'll see these lads again. In fact, you'll see lads like Seán Ó Cuinn, Aodhna Ó Beaglaíoch, Ronan O'Carroll, and Ben Murphy back in Kerry jerseys sooner than you might have expected, given that they are all eligible again. But Paddy Lane would have just pipped hbis Austin Stacks' team-mate Murphy to the Munster Minor Award if it had been my call. Arrah, the world would be very different if I ran it.

Ladies Footballer of the Year is Roisín Ambrose of Limerick. No argument. Limerick showed serious progression at both club and county this year. Kerry can feel slightly aggrieved, having won Division One and reached the All Ireland Final, and Cork could raise an eyebrow as well given that they actually won the Munster Senior Final, and did it in style, but I don't think either had a stand-out individual who could justifiably pip Ambrose to the title Aaron Gillane is the Senior Hurler of the Year. Anyone who didn't see that one coming needs to contact Specsavers. Urgently, Likewise with John Kiely as Manager of the year and Limerick as Team of the Year. The U20 Hurler of the Year is Cork's Ben Cunningham. He did impress with the senior team, but I'll be honest. The hurling came so thick and fast at me this year and there were so many fast-changing permutations in Munster that I lost track of it. The only way you could really be a devotee of hurling these days is if you were willing to forego all other sports, and I simply am not. So I enjoyed the hurling matches that I saw as I saw them. If they tell me that Ben Cunningham was the best young hurler in Munster this year....fair enough. I'm not going to argue.

Clare's Eoghan Gunning is the Minor Hurler of the Year. Again, I'm quite happy to take their word for it.

Karen Kennedy of Tipperary is the Munster Camogie Player of the Year. It maty seem a little contradictory, given that Waterford's Áine O'Gorman was named Camogie Player of the Year nationally, but Kennedy was a key player and All Star winner as Tipperary won their first Munster title in 11 years. Camogie needs the likes of Cork, Tipp, Kilkenny, Wexford, and Galway dining at the top tier. It's been a triumvirate for too long in my opinion.

The Club of the Year is Castlehaven. Fair enough. Of course I think it's fair to say that Clanmaurice's astonishing All Ireland win is an incredible achievement, but that happened after these awards were announced.

RTE SPORTS STAR AWARDS 2023

I am absolutely delighted to see Rhys McClenaghan to win the overall award. Also a little bit surprised – I assumed that they would go for a bigger name in the zeitgeist, which would be Katie McCabe, given that Katie Taylor has been a previous winner. But McClenaghan

took World and European golds in an incredibly hard discipline, one that I never imagined in all my life would ever be spoken of internationally in an Irish context, and I'm glad that it has been acknowledged properly.

Andy Farrell won Sports Manager of the Year. Farrell has done an awful lot to instill confidence in Irish rugby and he is a great hand on the tiller, I am delighted that he has signed a new contract, but John Kiely of Limerick has to be privately looking askance at that one. Limerick are acknowledged as the Team of the Year.

Evan Ferguson has been the great hope of Irish soccer and has established himself as one of the best strikers in the Premiership. He is fully deserving of the Young Sportsperson of the Year. Look. I will never understand how 21 year old Rhadisat Adeleke wasn't included in that conversation. The reason that I'm not sure how many Irish record times – as in, best Irish times recorded ever in events – is literally because I lost count. And she's not even in the conversation? Look, I don't want to come across as the gruff red-faced retired colonel in a P.G. Wodehouse novel, so I will say no more.

Paralympic sprinter Jason Smyth was inducted into the Hall of Fame, deservedly so. Six Paralympic golds. Eight World Championship golds. Six European golds. It's not quite true to say that he retired undefeated – why do people feel the need to embellish an already phenomenal reality? He was beaten in qualification on occasion, but he did take gold in every event that he did qualify in.

Hall of Fame Winner Jimmy Barry Murphy

The Hall of Fame entrant was Jimmy Barry Murphy, and I only have one tiny criticism. How on earth did it take so long? He si the only player in history to win All Irelands in hurling and football at minor, U21, and senior with Cork and U21 and senior in both codes with his club, St. Finbarrs. In 1999 he broke Kilkenny's long hegemony to lead Cork to one of their greatest hurling triumphs ever.

Here's the thing. Absolutely none of that reflects the actual impact of Jimmy Barry Murphy. Like Jack Lynch before him, he transcends his actual sporting achievements, astonishing though they are.

Kerry people of a certain vintage will remember. Kerry were winning All Irelands with legends of the game like Culloty, O'Connell, O'Dwyer, O'Sullivan, the O'Donoghue brothers, Long, Prendergast. If you need me to include the Christian names, then you may as well stop reading now.

Cork were coming. We knew full well that Cork were coming. They had great young players dominating underage in both codes. Don't think that Jimmy, or the likes of Brian Murphy or Declan Barron for that matter, sprang out of nowhere. Did you think we didn't know what Denny Long or Denis Coughlan could do? But we weren't ready for them to come at us so hard and so fast. And absolutely nobody was ready for the impact that Jimmy Barry Murphy would have. Nobody.

The GAA back then was considered conservative. Traditional back and sides hairstyle, semi-casual dress. None of your hats, flags, scarves, or headbands. Leave that to the

children. We were past the stage of kissing the Bishop's ring before throw-in, but not by all that much.

Jimmy Barry Murphy was different. He never set out to be emblematic of a new, confident young generation. He had a skinhead haircut because he liked it. He wore denim because he and his friends considered that fashionable. There was a young rock scene beginning to stir in Cork City. They were listening to the Rolling Stones, Lou Reed, James Brown....maybe a bit of fledgeling punk, a bit of Van Morrison, a bit of Rory Gallagher. They were...different to the previous generation. Better educated but also much more politically impassioned in many ways. Not quite hippies, not quite punks, but the respectable verge of either or both. And they were respectful and very proud of their sporting past - they grew up on stories of Lynch, Eamonn Young, and Ring.

Kerry weren't over-confident going into the Munster Final of 1973 against a Cork team that included the likes of Billy Morgan, Frank Cogan, Humphrey Kelliher, and of course Denis Coughlan, but they weren't afraid of it either. After all, the bulk of this team had won All Irelands in 1969 and 1970 and lost a final after a replay in 1972. Cork were starting a lot of garsoons. Okay, Kerry had young guns themselves - but nobody needed to worry about the likes of Jimmy Deenihan, Ger O'Keeffe or his midfield cousin John, Brendan Lynch, and definitely not young Egan at corner forward. Cork knew about the best of the Sneem brothers from his time in Carrig na bhFearr school.

It was the last game played in Cork's Athletic Grounds. The politest skinhead in human history at corner forward for Cork destroyed Kerry. He was just too fast. Cork, cleverly, drew out Kerry's defenders, with Ray Cummins drifting out to bring Paud O'Donoghue out of the square, before sending in fast ball to run onto, and it worked a charm.

Funny enough, Mickey Ned O'Sullivan and Mick O'Dwyer were denied early goals by good saves from Billy Morgan. But Declan Barron latched onto a through ball from Denny Long and gave Eamonn Fitzgerald no chance. People were still queueing to get in when Jimmy Barrett added a second. Billy Field converted a penalty. 19 year old Jimmy Barry Murphy goaled less than a minute later. With just 32 minutes gone (games were 40 minutes a half at the time) he fisted home a second goal and Kerry were trailing by 5-3 to 0-2.

Kerry did actually rally in the second half and bolt the stable door, but the horse was long out of sight by then. Cork won by 5-12 to 1-15, Donal Kavanagh with Kerry's goal.

Cork had a new hero, and it was hard to grudge this soft-spoken teenager who considered gaelic games as much a part of the modern Ireland that he knew as Rory Gallagher's guitar. A year later that Cork team's rise would be abruptly halted by Dublin and the rise of 'Heffo's Army' as again a young city generation suddenly fell in love with ancestral games. Even by his own phenomenal standards, it still has to stand out as his greatest achievement.

Dr Crokes recovered from conceding a shocking goal just before half time, to win their third O Donoghue Cup in a row, and gain revenge for their 2019 defeat to Killarney Legion, after a fierce battle between the 2 neighbors, at Fitzgerald's Stadium on Sunday.

It was Legion who got off to the guicker start, with Ryan O Grady scoring 3 point's early. Brian Kelly denied Crokes a goal with a sharp save from Charlie Keating. Points from David Shaw, Cian McMahon and Michael Burns were reward for Crokes improvement, after their sluggish start. O Grady then fired over a superb long range free. Just as half time arrived, Legion got their fortunate goal. Finbarr Murphy's long range free looked to be going over the bar, but instead dropped just underneath the bar. A great way to end the half for Legion, sending them in with a 4 point lead at the interval.

Legion had an early goal chance to start the second half, but the ball went loose just as it looked they would find the net. This escape spurred Crokes into action, with Tony Brosnan leading the way. He scored his side's next 4 points, with Kieran O Leary adding another 1, as Crokes brought the deficit back to just 1. Eoghan O Sullivan increased to 3 by fisting over after a good move by Legion. FOCUS ON **HEDGING**

Hedges can make a much more natural background to a garden than a wall or a fence. They can provide shelter and are cheaper and require a small amount of maintenance.

Because a hedge allows the wind to filter through it reduces its velocity.

Tall or low growing, clipped or informal, there is a hedging plant for every purpose. One thing to remember about a hedge is that it is intended to be a permanent feature in the garden so therefore should be chosen with care and planted in well prepared soil.

To choose the right hedge for your garden, here are a few pointers to think about:

- The type of soil you have.
- How exposed the garden is i.e. what direction is it facing.
- 3. 2. The eventual height and width the hedge will be
- 4. 4. Does it need to be evergreen.

When you have chosen the type of hedge that you want, it's time to prepare the soil. Start preparing the soil by digging thoroughly and forking in some well rotted farmyard manure. Hedges can be planted all year around but the ideal time is between November and March as all hedging plants will be dormant at this time.

What that means is when you go to buy your hedging plants, they are lifted straight from the ground and are called bare-rooted hedging. This enables you to replant straight back into the ground when you get them home. Just make sure that when planting that the roots are spread out well as this will encourage them to root quickly when the growing season starts. If you have missed the bare rooted season at the end of March, you can plant container grown hedging all year around.




