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



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SPECTACULAR STAG

will be festival focal point

giant artistic stag, brilliantly representing Killarney's historic past, has been created as the signature mascot for this year's St Patrick's Day parade in the town.

It has been painstakingly created by local artist Sophie Lodge whose spectacular work has been very loyal and true to the magnificent animal that has freely roamed Killarney National Park for generations.

The imaginative artist behind the striking feature piece honed her skills at the world famous Notting Hill Carnival in London.

With a background in visual effects, Sophie has always had a passion for working on community art projects that bring people together and she was the artist responsible for the giant sunflower and colourful butterflies that adorned the bell-tower at St Mary's Church of the Sloes for previous St Patrick's Festival celebrations.

This year's parade will dazzle the public when the custom-made stag, generously sponsored by the trustees of Muckross House and Gardens, is unveiled and paraded through the streets with the assistance of three operators.

With its stomping ground in the UNESCO biosphere reserve of Killarney National Park, home to the deer herd, this historic animal will take centre stage in celebration of the town's rich natural heritage.

The striking artwork really embodies this year's festival theme, which delves into echoes of Killarney's historical past, and the stag is poised to evolve in the coming years when the focus in 2025 will shift towards echoes of Killarney's present, followed by a gaze into the future in 2026.

Jason Clifford, Chair of the St Patrick's

Day Festival, said the stag will be a key addition to this year's parade, capturing the imagination of both young and old.

"We are thrilled to have the support of the Muckross House Trustees in bringing this magnificent creation to life, given the integral role that the stag, Muckross House and the national park play in the fabric of our town," he said.

Marcus Treacy, Chairman of the Trustees of Muckross House, remarked: "Our partnership based on the stag is a perfect fit and it will contribute hugely to what promises to be a splendid St Patrick's Festival".


He added: "We anticipate drawing visitors not only to the parade but also to the town and attractions like Muckross House and Gardens."

Killarney's innovative single use coffee cup initiative has won a major national award.

The first project of its kind in the country scooped the Best Environmental/ Ecological category prize at the Local Authority Members' Association (LAMA) All-Ireland Community and Council Awards at the weekend.

The awards were presented at a black tie gala in Dublin on Saturday night and Killarney was represented at the ceremony by Deputy Mayor Cllr Marie Moloney and Juliette Kelly of the Killarney Tidy Towns/Killarney Looking Good Committee.

Also in attendance were Mayor of Kerry Cllr Jim Finucane and Kerry County Council's Director of Economic and Community Development, Niamh O'Sullivan.

The awards celebrate communities and councils working together, highlighting the great work done and recognising the phenomenal contribution made.

The adjudication commentary noted that Kerry County Council has supported the establishment and promotion of the Killarney project, making it the first town in Ireland to be declared single use coffee cup free.

The judges noted that the removal of over 1,000,000 single use cups on an annual basis was the equivalent of 18.5 tonnes of waste.

"It has seen the core objectives of the circular economy and sustainable tourism principles brought centre stage to the benefit of all in Killarney," they said.

The Killarney coffee cup project had already won the overall prize at the annual Pakman Awards and it clearly illustrates that the town is certainly winning the struggle against disposable cups.

Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Niall Kelleher, said as a member of LAMA, he was delighted to propose that the Killarney coffee cup project be put forward for the national award given the tremendous coming together of people to ensure the project worked.

"To remove over one million single use cups from the environment, including the national park and the amenities, is an achievement that Killarney can be very proud of," the mayor said.

Killarney Tidy Towns Committee Chairman, Michael Gleeson, congratulated all involved in the project, the business owners who are backing the plan and the public for supporting it.

"This project aims to progressively reduce the number of disposable coffee cups which had, for too long, littered our footpaths and roadsides. "A cleaner town and litter-free approach roads are better for local people and for visitors," he said.

Local coffee shops and hotels continue their collective effort to eradicate single-use coffee and tea cups having switched to the reusable system in July of last year.

Since becoming Ireland's first town to become single-use coffee cup free, the local businesses have witnessed a very positive reaction from locals and tourists.

The ground-breaking project – also the winner of the sustainability award in the 2023 Killarney Looking Good Competition – has been promoted and supported by local partners including Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce, Kerry County Council, Killarney Credit Union, Kerry Convention Bureau and AlB.

The decision to ban single-use cups was underpinned by complaints that some of Killarney's most visited beauty spots were being polluted and studies of clean-ups in the national park revealed that one of the most common forms of waste recovered was single-use coffee cups.

Church Property

Church property is coming under scrutiny. With just over 40 priests for 110 churches, the use of churches going forward is forming part of the consultation with the laity now underway. Are churches to become community halls or to retain their sacral function? It's not so long ago the Church of Ireland faced the same dilemma. The wheel turns quickly: Rotha mór an tsaoil.

In the meantime, parishioners are warned about proper security amid increasing breakins and burglaries.

But the council is beginning to cast a covetous eye too. Dare I use the term!

John Francis Flynn FF just this week moved a motion at the council seeking a list of all church property held by St Brendan's Trust. A similar motion some years ago for a list

A similar motion some years ago for a list of council owned property had yielded "positive" results, and some property had been developed, John Francis said.

There was a shortage of houses and long term accommodation for Irish and refugees was needed.

Businesses were closing down all over the county as hotels and guesthouses were taken up with refugees, he said.

People were on housing lists for years. He strongly supported a motion by Maura Healy Rae that tourist accommodation no longer be used for refugees, the councillor said.

Meanwhile as with all the empty HSE buildings, security is a headache and cctv and lighting all must be considered by parishes with « increasing break-ins and burglaries, » the Diocese reminds parishes.

Referendum to neutralise women

One church-owned building, the now vacant school in the Black Valley is being put to

good use on March 8th as a polling station for 81 voters.

We have very little information on the proposed two amendments labelled family and caring. Really it is the caring one that interests me because this has to do with women and motherhood.

March 8 is international women's day globally. I doubt anyone has remarked on the coincidence yet.

Because the people of Ireland are being asked to delete all references to the word 'mother' in the Irish Constitution.

Article 41 and as it stands says a mother should not be forced to work outside the home for economic necessity; (It has long been misinterpreted as saying women are to be confined to the home. Perhaps the confusion has deliberately never been cleared up as the aspiration has never been realised or acted upon?)The related part says a woman lends a unique contribution to a home and this should be cherished.

Those are my own plain English words.

This is the formal version, so I am not

This is the formal version, so I am not misleading anyone:

As it stands, Article 41.2.1 states: "In particular, the State recognises that by her life within the home, woman gives to the State a support without which the common good cannot be achieved."

Article 41.2.2, related: "The State shall, therefore, endeavour to ensure that mothers shall not be obliged by economic necessity to engage in labour to the neglect of their duties in the home."

These two sections, and their feminine nouns, 'mother' and 'woman' are to be removed altogether.

They are to be replaced by a watery and anodyne 'Members of the family providing care for one another. Then there is the 'home part'. This is going too.



This is what's replacing it:

"The State recognises that the provision of care, by members of a family to one another by reason of the bonds that exist among them, gives to Society a support without which the common good cannot be achieved, and shall strive to support such provision."

I am not a turkey voting for Christmas. I will be voting no. Not only this, but I will do so with great glee.

The State has not lived up to the original aspiration to the home, let alone to women or mothers. It is more difficult than ever to build a home. And if the State - Leo and Helen and others - were serious about either women or homes, then they would give all women a basic income. Much like artists now get. And they would make it possible for everyone to have a house, so they can have a home and be a mother to children if they so want.

Instead they are tinkering around with a constitution in an abstract and meaningless way. And while driving women out to work to keep a roof and giving no proper childcare or valuing child minders.

Misogyny comes in many forms and this I fear is a Trojan Horse. Basically women are getting neutered in our constitution. I will look at the Family amendment next week.

Droning on deer

Deer counting is not something this country excels at. However drone technology may be employed, the Department of Housing has confirmed to me.

It is already in use in Scotland and there have been pilot drone count projects in Waterford and by Coillte, I am told.

We badly need a proper deer census in Kerry. No one has a record of how many accidents involve deer, the recent meeting of the county's joint policing committee was told in Killarney.

Partly this is because the collisions are not reported to gardái as people whose cars are damaged see little point.

However there are numbers of collisions and deer now have spread across the county far from Killarney.

The fact there is no deer census is of concern to deer societies too.

'We have no clue how many deer we have, still after years of calling for a census,' Damien Hannigan of the Irish Deer Society, said.

Damien is well known in Killarney and works closely with the national park and with deer people

I asked him about the possibility of drones

being employed.

He would welcome the move, but cautioned about the drawbacks. Drones can't penetrate the tree thicket particularly with coniferous forcests.

'Anything that helps us get an understanding of deer numbers is welcome,' Damien said. Meanwhile, drone technology has been used in Scotland and elsewhere to count deer for

some time, the Department acknowledged. The use of drones is particularly effective within open habitats and difficult terrain such as mountains and blanket bogs, a spokesman said.

'While drone technology is not currently used by NPWS, it may be used in the future on NPWS properties to monitor deer numbers, map deer distribution and monitor daily/ seasonal deer movement patterns, where it can complement existing techniques such as camera trapping used in woodland areas.'

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
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TRIBUTES TO TIMMY FOR **50 YEARS OF DEDICATION AT DERO'S**

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APPLY NOW FOR PLC COURSES ON THE FURTHER EDUCATION AND TRAINING (FET) COURSE HUB



FFT

Further Education and Training (FET) offers a variety of life-long education options, including apprenticeships, traineeships, Post Leaving Cert (PLC) courses, community and adult education as well as basic literacy and numeracy services. FET courses are provided through the Education and Training Board (ETB) network throughout the country as well as through other local providers including online through SOLAS' eCollege. FET courses are provided from levels one to six on the National Framework of Qualification (NFQ) for anyone over 16 yrs., who wants to learn new skills or enhance existing skills to get the right job, progress to third-level or to support the achievement of personal goals.

ALTERNATIVE

PLC courses are an attractive alternative to higher education and provide a link between 2nd level and 3rd level. The CAO route doesn't suit everybody directly after Leaving Cert. Some may not feel ready for 3rd level. Others may not have secured a CAO offer or may be unhappy with the offer received. Over 200 Colleges of Further Education throughout the country offer PLC courses leading to awards at QQI FET Levels 5 & 6 from Quality and Qualifications Ireland (QQI).

RANGE

There is a huge range of courses available at PLC level and the courses are free of tuition fees. A PLC course is ideal for a person who has completed the Leaving Cert and requires further vocational education and training to enhance her/his employment prospects. A PLC course provides students with the opportunity to try out a course before committing to 3rd level studies. It's also tailor made for a student with the Leaving Cert Applied (LCA) and for mature students, who are returning to education.

BLEND

PLC courses are full time, mainly one year, offering a blend of academic work, practical work and work experience. Many PLC courses lead directly to employment. Increasingly, PLC courses are used to access 3rd level education, with more than 700 courses in the CAO system

now accepting a PLC qualification for entry. Last year, about 14,523 applications to the CAO offered a PLC qualification. This is a very healthy development as it provides an alternative route into 3rd level.

LINK

Through the higher education links scheme (HELS), the PLC courses provide an alternative route into CAO courses other than Leaving Cert exam results. A PLC course normally involves completing eight modules in the academic year by continuous assessment and a final exam. Students' entry to CAO colleges is then based on a scoring system for PLC awards achieved at Level 5 and/or Level 6 on the NFQ. Full details about the scoring system are available on the QQI website, www.qqi.ie.

EETCH

CAO has provided links to a host of full-time higher education, further education and training and apprenticeship options available to post-second level applicants. However, CAO does not accept applications for further education courses or apprenticeships. For all queries and information about Further Education and Training or Apprenticeship options, click on the further education and training tab on the CAO website. Alternatively. go to the FET Course Hub, www.fetchcourses. ie

APPLY

To apply for a PLC Course on the CAO website, click on the further education and training tab. This will open up the further education and training course hub. Click on the course category that interests you or select all courses. A list of available courses in your chosen category will be displayed along with details of the course provider. Select the course you are interested in. More information about the course will be displayed including details of course content, entry requirements, course qualifications, awarding bodies and location.

REGISTER

Apply for a course by clicking on the 'apply now' link. You must now register with Fetch. Once registered, up you will be able to see details of the courses you applied for. You can also save

courses to your account which you can review at a later date. Contact details for the course provider are available for further information. Once you have applied for a course you will receive acknowledgement of your application. Your course provider will supply details of the next step.

CENTRALISED

The centralised application system has made the application process for PLC courses much easier. Entry requirements normally consist of Leaving Cert standard and satisfactory performance at interview. Mature applicants are assessed on their life's experiences. PLC colleges are now accepting applications so apply early as places on the most popular courses fill up quickly.



TOUR DE FRANCE EVENT COMES TO KILLARNEY

The Tour de France will bring it's iconic L'Etape event to Ireland this September giving up to 3,000 cyclists the chance to sample the unique thrills and challenge of a Tour de France stage in Ireland for the first time.

Designed and vetted by the team behind the Tour de France, two routes, starting in Killarney, will take in some of the country's most breathtaking scenery and epic climbs where cyclists can experience the Tour De France on their own terms. L'Etape Ireland is the 32nd

De France on their own terms. L'Etape Ireland is the 32nd race to be added to the global calendar and takes place on September 7th, 2024. The event was announced today with race ambassadors and Irish cyclists Imogen Cotter and Dan Martin. Riders can choose from two routes with different elevation and distance profiles; a 100km route or a more challenging 135km route. Inspired by the Tour De France, both

routes will have three timed Mountain stages taking in iconic climbs across Molls Gap, Ballaghbearna Pass and Caragh Lake to compete for the title of King and Queen on the mountain and a coveted polka dot jersey. There will also be a sprint section where participants can battle it out for a Tour De France green jersey. Beyond the race, participants can look forward to exhibitors, shows, a pop-up Tour de France Museum, athlete meet and greets and more on the day.

Both routes will be on closed or partially closed roads and the race and its participants will be monitored by safety officials throughout.

Retaining his interest in politics until his passing, he will be missed by people from all aspects of politics.

Michael O'Regan's journalistic career coincided very closely with my own time in Leinster House and he was a journalist for whom I, together with so many others, had the utmost respect.

Throughout the many years in which we met, Michael was always warm and engaging in conversation on the many topics which were for discussion. He was incredibly courteous, and a perfect judge of when an injection of the humour, upon which he drew from his proud Kerry background, was needed.

Michael was from a classical Rathmines College school of journalism that prioritised context, thus standing behind his reporting on any matter was the very significant work which he had put into researching and locating the issue in time and any previous statements by the interviewee.

This grounding of his work in extensive research ensured that Michael not only brought a full understanding of each of the topics on which he wrote to the readers of the Irish Times, but also to those who benefited from his regular contributions to radio and television panel discussions.

Prior to becoming an Oireachtas reporter, Michael made a significant contribution in his coverage of the Kerry Babies Tribunal, both during the tribunal itself and in his book on that tragic event and its handling.

In recent years, Michael wrote about his cancer treatment with great dignity. In writing with such clarity and honesty of his treatment, he provided a great service to others in helping

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

Credit Unions taking on the banks in the mortgage market will help future homebuyers

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said that new legislation enabling Credit Unions to more coherently take on the banks in the mortgage market will help many potential homebuyers due to the lower rates they offer.

Kelleher, Chair of the European Parliament's Credit Union Interest Group, was commenting ahead of the first phase of implementation of the 2023 Credit Union (Amendment) Act, with the second phase expected in April. This is the first piece of Credit Union specific legislation in over 12 years.

"We all know how important credit unions have been in terms of supporting families with personal, car, holiday and other loans. Now, with the enactment of this Act, we will see our credit unions be able to greatly expand their offering in terms of mortgages.

"While some Credit Unions are already offering mortgages, 1800 in 2023 were drawn down, the new legislation will enable non-mortgage lending credit unions to refer their members to other credit unions.

"Additionally the law will allow the credit union movement to collaborate nationally on mortgages by developing and marketing a national brand and a national mortgage rate.

"This is something I very much support. As I have previously stated on many occasions, our traditional banking sector is too small. A lack of competition pushes interest rates up.

"With more and more credit unions getting into the mortgage market, it will increase competition and improve services for us all.

"The Credit Union movement is strong in Ireland. There is significant member loyalty with member unions of the Irish League of Credit Union holding over €310 million in savings alone.

"However, the ability of credit unions to issue mortgages is still limited by Central Bank of Ireland regulations which impose a cap on lending relative to the credit union's assets.

"With the Credit Union (Amendment) Act the Department of Finance has opened new opportunities for credit unions. It is now the job of the Central Bank to step up and play its role.

"I would urge the Central Bank to review these lending limits and consider whether they are proportionate and well calibrated or whether raising these limits could stimulate more competition in the market," concluded Kelleher.

There was more success for Killarney Valley AC Athletes at the national senior indoor athletics championships.

Nine athletes took part, in the national indoor athletics championships at the NIA in Dublin over the weekend. The club achieved two silver and one bronze medal.

The weekend started with first success for Ciara Kennelly who claimed the bronze in a height of 1.76m, Ciara is having a great season having a couple of weeks previously winning the Irish universities championship in a new PB of 1.79m. Project 1.80m and the outdoor championships in the summer are now Ciara's focus.

Then it was the long awaited 60m final for Sarah Leahy where Sarah was attempting to achieve back to back titles, Sarah finished in the silver position just six hundreds of a second separating Mollie Scott and Sarah in a photo finish, in third place was fellow international team mate Ciara Neville. Sarah who is a member of the Irish 4x100m relay squad now focuses on the outdoor season and in her individual 100m.

The final event of the championships saw the Killarney valley ac junior squad compete against the senior men in the 4x400m relay. The team included Jason O'Reilly, Oisin O'Regan, Cian O'Brien and Jack O'Leary who anchored the team home to the finish in second place claiming the silver medal. Killarney valley ac has achieved success in junior relay and senior relay in the same year, a super achievement.

With all the other club participants gaining great experience at the championships more success is surely to follow at this level.

In his recent Pastoral Letter, Bishop Ray issued and invitation to all parishes to have consultation meetings regarding the formulation of Diocesan Policy for the shaping of our parishes in the immediate future: "I see the life of the 110 local church-communities as a valuable and

valued resource for people now and into the future. In the light of fewer clergy, we need to explore how each local churchcommunity can thrive with local leadership acting co-responsibly with the priests ministering to the parishes of the pastoral areas. A church can still be the centre point for community life, even if there is no weekend Mass. Think of your local church community in four ways: a social/friendship community; a caring compassionate community; a praying, worshipping and sacramental community; and a community whose mission is to nourish and develop its faith, and hand it on to the next generation."

"Our first step in the process is consulting you, the people of the parishes. In February, there will be a gathering in each parish. The invitation is open to all: what do you see as the strengths and weaknesses locally, and what are your thoughts on what might be done? In parallel with this, there will be a consultation for the clergy. Our hope is that parishioners and deacons will take a structured leadership role in their pastoral areas working in a co-responsible way with the priests of the pastoral area as well as priests from abroad. This will allow priests to work across pastoral areas in a more sustainable manner. We will keep people informed as the process progresses."

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PROBATIONARY PERIODS FOR EMPLOYEES: LEGISLATION AND BEST PRACTICE

A probationary period is a requirement in employment contracts that allows Employers to review new Employees' suitability throughout the early stages of their employment. It is a trial period during which both parties can assess the working relationship and allows the Employer to determine whether the Employee is a good fit for the role and the organisation. Employers should be aware of the purpose, duration, and rights of Employees and ensure they follow best practice.

Employer's Rights during the Probationary Period

As an Employer, if you dismiss an Employee while on probation or undergoing training, please note that the Unfair Dismissals Acts 1997-2015 will not apply, once:

- The contract of employment is in writing and
- · The period of employment or training lasts one year or less, as specified in the contract. However, the Unfair Dismissals Acts will apply an employee is dismissed due to:
- Trade union membership or activity
- Pregnancy-related matters
- Entitlements under maternity protection, parental leave, adoptive leave, parent's leave, paternity leave, force majeure leave, or carer's leave legislation.

What is the purpose of a Probationary Period?

The probationary period serves several purposes for both Employers and Employees. For Employers, it provides an opportunity to assess an employee's skills, competencies, and overall performance in real work conditions. It allows Employers to evaluate the Employee's suitability for the role, their ability to meet the required standards, and their compatibility with company culture. For Employees, the probationary period offers a chance to familiarise themselves with the job, understand expectations, and determine if the role aligns with their career goals. In doing so both Employers and Employees should benefit from a probationary phase.

Duration of the Probationary Period

The European Union (Transparent and Predictable Working Conditions) Regulations 2022 came into force on 16 December 2022 and introduced significant changes to the law on contracts of employment and working conditions for Employees. Specifically, there are now new regulations regarding the length of probationary periods in contracts of employment for Employees.

The new regulations state that probation periods can be no longer than 6 months. In exceptional circumstances, an employee's probation period can be extended for up to a further 6 months (up to a maximum of 12 months in total). An extended probation period occurs when it is deemed in the Employees interest or when an Employee has been on extended leave, such as sick leave, during their probation

It is relatively commonplace for some Organisations to take a relaxed approach to managing probationary periods, knowing that they can simply extend the time period if they realise after six months that their employee may not be suitable. The change in employment law means Employers can no longer take this relaxed approach without

HR Buddy would therefore highly recommend that Employers reassess their employee's contracts and their probationary practices in light of this new regulation.



burning.



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




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DON'T WORRY - BE HAPPY!

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BLURRED VISION

When you have blurred vision, your eyesight is less sharp and objects, images and words seem to be out of focus.

Who is affected by blurred vision?

Anyone can be affected by blurred vision. It could be a sign of getting older and/or needing new glasses, tiredness, or too much sun. But there are many other causes, and it could be one of the symptoms of a range of conditions including:

- Short-sightedness (myopia), longsightedness (hyperopia), astigmatism and presbyopia
- An eye injury which may have scratched the cornea
- Foreign object in the eye
- Eve drops

- Cataracts

CAMHS SCANDAL, STATE APOLOGY

At this month's meeting of Kerry County Council, Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill called on An Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar to issue a State Apology as a matter of priority, to all individuals

and their families affected by the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) scandal. Councillor Cahill said the Taoiseach's refusal to issue a Public Apology to date, is an insult piled upon injury."

"This is a hugely important issue for many individuals and their families in our county. I previously stated that this is one of the biggest scandals of my lifetime, if not the biggest" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I attended 2 meetings in Dail Eireann in regard to this scandal, the first at the beginning of 2021 on the invite of the Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group and the second one more recently at the beginning of December 2023 on on the invite of Davin Godfrey and his family. Davin has been campaigning on behalf of individuals and families affected by CAMHS and has called on the Taoiseach for a State Apology on a number of occasions. I believe the Taoiseach must issue a State Apology with immediate effect" said Councillor Cahill.

"Many of these families and individuals are known to me and they have legitimate concerns in regards to the overprescribing of psychotropic drugs, the lack of monitoring and the absence of psychosocial intervention for both patients currently in the service and for those who have left the service. This scandal has had a devastating affect on the lives of these young people and in many cases lives have been ruined" stated Councillor Cahill who previously

called for a State Apology last year.

"Having heard all the evidence and the impact these drugs have had on our young people, I am convinced that this issue warrants a State Apology" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"We have seen in the past where the former Taoiseach, Enda Kenny issued an apology in regard to the Magdalene Laundries, we have seen in the past where Micheál Martin as Taoiseach issued an apology in regard to the Mother and Babies Homes and where our present day Taoiseach Leo Varadkar issued an apology for the Cervical Check issue so why will our Taoiseach and leader of this country not issue a public apology to all those affected by the CAMHS scandal. Todate, he has also refused to meet with Davin Godfrey a Spokesperson on behalf of all those individuals and families affected by this scandal here in Kerry and this is outrageous" stated Councillor Cahill.

"As Tanaiste, speaking in the Dáil, during Leaders Questions a couple of years ago Mr Varadkar said and I quote 'he was very disturbed and very worried about what had happened both as a Public Representative and a Doctor'. He also said andIquote 'The issue of a State Apology to the affected families would have to be given consideration by the Government and the Taoiseach'. This man is obviously a hypocrite. He is talking out of both sides of his mouth. It is time for action and the Taoiseach must give a State Apology for all the damage done to all these individuals and families" said an angry Councillor Cahill.

Councillor Cahill requested that an emergency meeting be sought with An Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar and this was agreed by all Councillors present.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL NOTICES OF MOTION

Cllr. John O'Donoghue raised the following at **begin emailing payslips each month instead of** Monday's Kerry County Council Meeting: **wasting money posting them, it has emerged**

That the Council would detail the numbers of people accessing homeless services within the County for each of the last 6 months, with the number of cases involving children being detailed for each month. Also, that the Council would detail the steps being taken to eradicate child homelessness.

"The housing shortage in this country is well documented but one of the most shameful aspects to this shortage are the numbers of homeless in the country, including the number of children who find themselves without a safe, secure and permanent place to live. This morning's figures show the numbers of homeless in the country to be above 9,000, with over 3,500 of those being children. This is nothing short of a disgrace in a country the purports to be a modern, first world country. I note in the reply that numbers in Kerry are dropping and I welcome this. I recognise that the reasons behind those accessing emergency accommodation are varied, but is imperative that we as a Council do all we can to assist these people as we are very often the only people they can turn to for help. I see that numbers in Kerry have been steadily dropping from a high of 172 adults and 70 children in November 2019, to 36 adults and 8 children in December, and I commend the Council staff for this. I also welcome the setting up of a dedicated point of contact for families entering the emergency accommodation services. Numbers have been reasonably steady in the last 6 months, with largely the same numbers for each month, approximately 40 adults and 8 children per month and I accept there will always be those accessing emergency accommodation, it is imperative we do all we can to get it as low as possible, as 1 homeless child is one too many".

OPT IN SCHEME SUGGESTED FOR DEPARTMENT PAYSLIPS

Further to my successful NOM in September 2021 calling on the Department of Education to

begin emailing payslips each month instead of wasting money posting them, it has emerged that the numbers availing of this option is disappointingly low. I now propose that we write to the Minister asking that the initiative changes from an 'opt in' scheme, to one where

people will have to opt out in order to continue receiving a paper payslip.

"I was delighted when my Motion in September 2021 ask the Department Education to cease unnecessary posting out of physical payslips to teachers each week in favour of electronic ones was supported in this chamber and ultimately came into practice last vear. I documented the benefits at the time, both in terms of saving millions of euros each year, as well as reducing our paper waste. Unfortunately, it has recently been reported that uptake for electronic payslips has been disappointingly low. I have conducted informal surveys amongst many of my teaching colleagues, and have asked those who didn't sign up for a payslip to be emailed to them why they hadn't. The answer was almost always the same, "I must do it but have not got around to it". I am now calling on the Minister to tweak the scheme slightly. and make it an 'opt-out' scheme, whereby everyone is automatically signed up to

receive an e-slip, as the electronic email is called, and those who wish may apply to have it posted to them. This has proved very successful in organ donor schemes around the world, and I feel it would also work in this instance"

LAST GASP SCORE SEES OFF MAYO CHALLENGE NATIONAL LEAGUE

Kerry 0-16 Mayo 0-15

Job done. That's the bottom line. It wasn't particularly convincing as a display, but the scoreboard was tilted a fraction in our favour at the final whistle, and that's the bottom line. I don't believe in wasting too much tie trying to gauge championship form so early in the league – frankly, I don't even think a weak Munster Championship is much of a benchmark for that.

Mayo make two changes before the throw-in, Brickenden and Callinan, both of whom played in the Sigerson Final mid-week, are starting. Kevin McStay clearly wants to take something from this game – fair enough. It would be a third victory over Kerry on the trot and a bit of a marker laid down, but I wouldn't be losing sleep over it.

There was huge demand and a big crowd in Austin Stack Park. No parking in the Horans' car park, but it was a fine night for a short walk. It might have been a different issue in bad weather, and the stand fills very quickly – very quickly indeed.

Mayo made a bright start, Fergal Boland fisting over neatly. Mayo drove at us with pace and power – they overwhelmed us last year in the Fitzgerald Stadium with that sort of football, and it is great to watch compared to the defensive closed shop of most modern teams. Kerry had numbers back in defence, but when they moved the ball quickly with good kickpasses (like a lot of teams nowadays, we are guilty several times of an extra hand-pass or two at the back for safety) to exploit the gaps left by Mayo's raiders, it was yielding scoring opportunities. Cillian Burke sent a lovely ball

into David Clifford and we were level on the scoreboard. Kerry, with all that space to attack, were relishing this. Cillian Burke, who looked superb early on, won a free for Sean O'Shea but it tailed off to the left and Dara Moynihan was also slightly off after taking a good mark. Paudie Clifford showed them how it's done, cutting in for two good points. The direct route was working.

Mayo, who aren't at full strength here, have a nice bit of steel about them. I'm impressed with Sam Callinan, who drives forward for an excellent point. David Clifford has a go from long distance but that, too, tails off. Three wides already for Kerry – it's not a major issue when we are playing good football, but it's not something to completely ignore either.

A good ball from Joe O'Connor and David had a chance at a goal, but couldn't get the power behind the shot and Colm Reape gathered easily. He might have been better off with taking a point in the short term, but you won't win anything long term without players willing to back themselves.

Mayo's Tommy Conroy evaded a couple of what I consider half-hearted tackles but couldn't put his shot between the posts. A let-off. We had plenty of bodies back but nobody really stuck a hand in.


Diarmuid O'Connor (the superior Kerry version!) picked up a yellow card, but the referee also gives Kerry a soft enough free for holding inside and Sean O'Shea duly tapped over. Sean was doing a lot of tracking back, more than I would prefer him to be doing. Mind you, Mayo had realised how open they were leaving their defence and keeping more numbers back there. Right tactic; Kerry had chances to push well ahead by then but hadn't executed them well enough. A free for the lively Ryan

O'Donoghue meant that Kerry were just a point ahead, 0-4 to 0-3. David Clifford gathered from Dara Moynihan, who is doing trojan work in the trenches, and doubles our advantage.

Sam Callinan was covering a lot of ground and sprinted forward for another fine score. Sean O'Shea replied after Dara Moynihan was fouled, but Ryan O'Donoghue gathered a neat flick on by Aidan O'Shea to reply. Shane Ryan was very nearly caught out in midfield as the ball is turned over, but the Kerry defence react quicker than the Mayo attack and the danger is averted. I don't mind a goalkeeper coming out to stretch the defensive line, but anywhere beyond that zone, the risk/reward ratio makes no sense to me. Jason Foley got up on the overlap to pick off the last score of the half, although Kerry could be grateful for a bad miss by Tommy Conroy after a very good run.

Half-time Kerry 0-7 Mayo 0-5

Kerry had played the better football in that first period and they came quickly out of the blocks in the second half as well. Dylan Geaney opened the scoring to put a goal between them. Fergal Boland replied with a real beauty. Sean O'Shea, staying closer to his full forward berth in this half, pointed from play, with Jordan Flynn replying. It was pretty much honours even in terms of the midfield battle, with neither side having much of an advantage in the middle third. A foul on Gavin White saw Seán O'Shea stretch our lead to three again. Mayo refused to be shaken off, though, and Ryan O'Donoghue and Bob Tuohy trimmed the gap back to a single score again, 0-10 to 0-9. David Clifford and Mayo's Diarmuid O'Connor exchanged points. David had another goal chance but again it was gathered fairly comfortably. Paudie, the captain very much leading by example, raced in again for a superb score, showing brilliant kicking







Two points in it and deep into injury time. Everybody, including all the Mayo players, know exactly who Kerry is looking for, and they aren't wrong. Once David Clifford gets it, he dummies just once to open a fraction of space and launches it with a perfect trajectory. That one will be viral on social media within minutes, and with good reason. For once (it's a rarity with social media), the substance is worth the hype.

Fair enough, this definitely can't be called grand larceny. But Mayo supporters could probably make a case for trespass. Kerry were the better side overall and that would have been a worthy winner of any game. But to be quite honest, I would say that Mayo deserved a point for a draw. As Clint Eastwood pointed out in 'Unforgiven', "deserve's got nothing to do with it".

A bit of a curate's egg from Kerry, very much good in parts. I enjoyed the football - patches of that first half especially were a far cry from the ultra-defensive game we see far too much of these days.

As for championship form? Arrah, whist. We can be looking at that after Scaraveen, the late April/early May weather of the cuckoo. I haven't even seen a swallow yet.

AROUND THE GROUNDS

In Division One, Derry are the early leaders with three wins. They put Monaghan to the sword fairly comfortably. I wouldn't read too much into that, but the three goals from three defenders....Derry defend in numbers and attack at speed. That and McGuigan's accuracy will take you a long way...but it won't win you an All Ireland. Dublin outplayed us last year, just like we outplayed Galway the year before. I know Derry gave us a fright last year and beat us in the opening game of this year's league, but they played their full hand to do so. Like Mayo last year, I think it's too early to be going so strong, especially when the Ulster Championship is so testing. Dublin just have a single win on board, but Dublin are definitely not pressing pedal to metal just yet. This weekend's contest against us will be an entertaining game, but I'm not sure either side will show their full hand. Dublin won't be real candidates for any relegation, not that Division Two did them any harm last year. Injury hit Galway needed that narrow win over Tyrone. I suspect that their Round 5 game against Monaghan will ultimately send the losers down alongside Roscommon.

Division Two actually has a bit more drama to it. I think the spectre of the Taillteann Cup gives it a lot of extra bite. I very much dislike that round robin pre the pre-quarter-final nonsense that has been crudely inserted into the All Ireland Championship format (at a time when incoming President Jarlath Burns, whom I admire, is talking about amateur workload and size and cost of county panels) but I'm actually a big fan of the Taillteann Cup. Achievable goals. Interesting that three Ulster counties, Armagh, Donegal, and Cavan are leading the way. Frankly, despite the negative approach of teams, the Ulster championship is the only one worth paying into.

I arrived home on Sunday in time to throw on the last ten minutes of Meath versus Louth, and I was so happy I did. I gather that most of the game was more about efficiency than panache, but the finish was absolutely gripping. Just when it looked like Meath were carefully nursing possession to run down the clock, Matthew Costello took a completely opposite approach, sliced through the whole defence superbly, and buried not just the best goal I've seen this year, but probably the best one I will see. That put them five points. Game over until Tom Jackson goaled at the other end - not as brilliantly created, but the actual shot was truly stunning. Meath held on to win, but they were sweating at the finish. This is what gaelic football could and should be.

Glenn Ryan is coming under appalling pressure as Kildare manager, both inside and outside the county. There's no question but that the Lilywhites have been very underperforming compared to their underage success and their talent on paper. But that long predates Ryan's arrival as manager. Teams need a good manager, but this modern myth of managers as transforming magicians is rubbish. The County Board could take a harder look at their own structures for bringing players through to senior rather than taking cheap shots at the manager. The truth is that Kildare definitely look to be in freefall, but even in the unlikely event that it is all Ryan's fault, I still consider the abuse he is getting - and yes, it absolutely is abuse - to be utterly disgraceful.

Cork are similarly adrift but Cleary - and Cork supporters deserve credit for this - aren't looking for easy villains or throwing toys out of their prams. See how it's done, Kildare? Cork so far have been starting games well but running out of steam and leaving too many scoring chances behind them. It's not a crisis, but it's ominous. Not just for Cork, but for us. I used to have to argue that Cork football being weak is, however counter-intuitive it may seem, bad for Kerry. Technically we could be the only Munster county guaranteed a chance at Sam Maguire, but we would be coming into the Round Robin whatever-it-is (sigh) cold. That ain't the time to be finding out your weaknesses. Of course the loser of the provincial final would join us. Which in turn would demote another Division Two team from the top sixteen. If Cork drop into the Taillteann Cup, I could see them taking the likes of Fermanagh with them yet. Division Two has plenty to play for - which is great.

Sineád Cafferky's effort at the other end had more legs on it and an even better kick from long distance saw Cannon bring the sides level. Mayo were very much hitting their stride now, with Cafferky doubling her tally and nudging the visitors in front. Both sides had a few chances but had no joy - Niamh Ní Chonchúir had an effort signalled wide after much discussion. Just before half-time Amy Harrington got Kerry back level. Mayo will have been the happier team going in at the break, having contained a Kerry attack that had been racking up strong totals in all their games so far, but both managements needed to adjust the tempo to spark this one into life.

Kerry started running their bench at the break. One of those introduced was Kerry captain Niamh Carmody and she announced her presence with the opening score of the second half. Kerry had already been somewhat unlucky after good work by Niamh Ní Chonchúir opened a gap for Hannah O'Donoghue but she was denied by a superb block, with Laura Brennan once more clearing her lines. Maria Cannon had another point from a free for Mayo but Emma Dineen had another Kerry score after more good work by Ní Chonchúir – another one that could well have billowed the net. With three minutes of injury time played, Mayo found Sineád Walsh in a tiny pocket of space. She had very little room to manouevre,

but somehow got a shot away and it curled perfectly between the posts. I won't say that it was as dramatic a winner as David Clifford would score later in the day, but it wasn't far behind it either.

One that got away, but I suspect that Darragh Long and Declan Quill won't mind the chance to iron out some of those kinks. The most famous subs bench of them all has to be the Kerry mens' team in the 1988 Munster Final. Paidí Ó Sé, Eoin Liston, Denis 'Ogie' Moran, Ger Power....and players like Donal McEvoy, Joe Shannon, young Timmy Fleming, Eamonn Walsh of the great Knocknagoshel family. But the first four already had 29 All Ireland medals between them. You won't see a subs bench like that too often.

I know the circumstances aren't remotely comparable – the Kerry ladies are quite rightly trying players in different positions at the moment – but take a look at the subs Kerry brought on last Saturday. That's no bad hand of cards to have in your hand!

SOCCER

FAI

When a Pope passes away, or more recently retires, the College of Cardinals gather in The Vatican to elect his successor. They are not allowed to leave until they elect one of their number to be the new Pope, no matter how many rounds of voting are required or how long the process takes. At the end of each vote, the proto-deacon of the College lights a flame so that the waiting throng will know the result. White smoke means that a Pope has been chosen, whereas black smoke means that another vote is required. Eventually, white smoke will be lit and the proto-deacon will declare in latin 'habemus papem'. "We have a Pope".

At this stage, I strongly suggest that the FAI Executive be locked up somewhere until they can make a similar declaration (PAC meetings excepted). It sounds like the public favourite Lee Carsley couldn't agree terms on the position of Irish manager - for all I know, it could be a negotiating tactic. It's not like Carsley isn't holding all the cards. Last Monday national media claimed that betting had been suspended on Chris Coleman, so certain were they of him taking up the role. The betting hadn't been suspended, by the way, I strongly suspect that it was the betting chains themselves that put that story out to get people to check and encourage business (and if I was a bookie, I would absolutely have done that). On Tuesday, we were told unequivocally - by many of the same media outlets, so 'unequivocally' might not be guite accurate that Coleman had declined the role. As far as I can see, journalists are surmising that he felt that reversing Ireland's decline to match Irish expectations wasn't really an achievable goal.

I never really thought Carsley was likely – the FA are going places that the FAI are not, and

his star is high enough to be in the mix for club positions that are far more lucrative and achievable than the Irish job. I did think Coleman might bite. Neil Lennon is a non-runner with the Irish supporters (perhaps a bit unfairly). The notion of Roy Keane as Irish manager is an easy media headline but ridiculous in reality. There's too many bridges burnt there on both sides. Chris Hughton wouldn't be my first choice but I've always considered him a safe pair of hands and we need his kind of stability.

I actually sympathise with the FAI in regards to Eileen Gleeson's role. Right from the start, she made it very clear that she was interested in a long term development plan for womens' soccer in Ireland. The FAI needed to get the negative headlines about the poorly handled dismissal of Vera Pauw out of the way, and having insider Gleeson step up was the obvious choice. In those circumstances, absolutely skippy I'd be insisting on guarantees about the job I had actually desired and signed up to do. It's the ludicrous denials and question-ducking by both Gleeson and Marc Canham (whose own developmental plan for mens' soccer is basically Ruud Doktor's reprinted – are we really throwing that age-old chestnut of switching to summer soccer on the fire again? Good luck with that) that is giving that story 133gs that it simply doesn't deserve.

But this whole situation is dragging on and it's getting ridiculous at this stage. At this stage I really think the FAI would be a lot better off appointing John O'Shea (who is familiar with the current set-up) on a temporary basis and getting out of the increasingly negative headlines. Non habemus papem, and the longer it goes on, the less credibility the incoming manager will have afterwards.

LEAGUE OF IRELAND Cork City 2 Kerry FC 0

There was over 5000 people in a buzzing Turners' Cross to see Kerry and Cork open their Division One campaigns. It's a bit of a strange one – for many years, Kerry people travelling to this venue were supporting the home team. Cork City, in various guises and different names, have been a power in the League of Ireland. In recent years, under John Caulfield's management (now with newly promoted Galway) they were the biggest rivals to Stephen Kenny's Dundalk. Losing that relegation game to Waterford last year and

dropping down to Division One is a big fall for them, whereas going head to head with the former powerhouse is a huge incentive for Kerry FC supporters.

Kerry actually started brightly. Seán McGrath drew an early save and Daniel Okwute got to the resultant corner but just couldn't quite direct the shot on target. A bright start, though – Kerry were not going to defer to their hosts. Cork were settling, though, their one-touch passing that little bit more astute. Harry Nevin worked a little bit of space down the right wing and crossed. Kerry had bodies there but Cork's Jack Doherty got his foot on it. I assumed he was going to lay it ooff for a piledriver, but instead he swivelled and poked it home. No fault to the defenders; it was well crafted and excellently finished.

The second goal was beautifully crafted. A Kerry attack was neatly swallowed up and Cork played it swift and sure down the left wing - again, the one-touch passing was sublime. When the ball arrived to Doherty with the defenders forced to back pedal, he took one touch to cut inside and gave the hapless Antonia Tuta no chance. Kerry were perfectly competitive -I think they'll actually be reasonably happy with their overall display - but never carried the same kind of goal threat as Cork. Andy Spain did have a header cleared off the line early in the second half and Nathan Gleeson skewed a shot wide, but Cork settled again. They had a real thunderbolt from distance go just barely wide and had a reasonable shout for a penalty - at the time I thought unlucky defender but dewfinite penalty. Looking at the replay I'm a lot less sure. In the end 2-0 to City was a fair result. To be honest, Cork City will be right up among the favourites for promotion. We aren't at that level yet but we are on the right road. We could have taken a goal ourselves and, crucially for me, we didn't give up anything soft. If we can keep replicating that in upcoming games, I'd be very hopeful.

Over €30 million for regional and local roads across Kerry





TREES

Trees are beautiful in any garden and their long life makes them a wonderful garden feature. A tree should be the first think you plant in your garden after the hedging — they can be underplanted afterwards with bulbs and shrubs. Trees are interesting in all four seasons with attractive unfolding of leaves in spring, full foliage in summer, good Autumn colour followed decorative bark in the Winter. The first and most important think you need to know when buying a tree is what's the height and spread going to be when it is mature. There are many varieties of trees to choose from and there is a tree suitable for most areas.

Trees can be planted all year round but as with hedging, trees can be planted when they are dormant between November and March.

With these bare-rooted trees you will still have a few weeks left to plant them. If you plant before the end of March it will give the tree a better chance of rooting into the ground that bit quicker. When planting your bare rooted tree, dig the hole big enough that you can spreads out the roots all around the hole. Then drive your stake into the hole roughly about 6 to 8 inches below the bottom of the hole, place your tree and spread the roots out well. If possible place your stake on the side of the prevailing winds as this will ensure that the tree is blown up against the stake when the wind is high. Fill in the soil mixed with compost around the roots and firm in with the heel of your foot. Lastly place your tree ties on — one near the top and one at the bottom with a spacer in between to stop the bark being damaged by the stake.

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









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












Welcome back dear student through this weekly study you are growing in wisdom. 'Wisdom is the principal thing' (Proverbs 4:7). No matter what age, in everything we do, we all need Wisdom. Wisdom, or the lack of wisdom, is a key factor in how one's life plays out. Many associate it with older generations, but that's not always the case; younger people are often far more astute than given credit for. Certainly, as we grow older we become more experienced: learning 'I won't do that again!' - for hindsight is a wonderful thing.

But what is Biblical Wisdom? "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom" (Proverbs 9:10). Really Wisdom is God's knowledge given to us through the Person of the Holy Spirit Who lives inside of every believer in Christ. So, it's like an internal antenna wired direct to God bringing discernment, understanding and intelligence that's supernatural - not from the flesh. It's the Power of God to help us navigate this life to make smart and right decisions as a result of our Creator's input.


James put it this way ".... if you need wisdom, ask our generous God, and He will give it to you. He will not rebuke you for asking. But when you ask Him, be sure that your faith is in God alone. Do not waver, for a person with divided loyalty is as unsettled as a wave of the sea that is blown and tossed by the wind. Such people should not expect to receive anything from the Lord. Their loyalty is divided between God and the world, and they are unstable in everything they do" (James 1:5-8).

Later James went on to lay out the difference between earthly, sensual wisdom and God's Wisdom.... "If you are wise and understand God's ways, prove it by living an honourable life, doing good works with the humility that comes from wisdom. But if you are bitterly jealous and there is selfish ambition in your heart, don't cover up the truth with boasting and lying. For jealousy and selfishness are not God's kind of wisdom. Such things are earthly, unspiritual, and demonic. For wherever there is jealousy and selfish ambition, there you will find disorder, and evil of every kind. But the wisdom from above is first of all pure. It is also peace loving, gentle at all times, and willing to yield to others. It is full of mercy and the fruit of good deeds. It shows no favouritism and is always sincere. And those who are peacemakers will plant seeds of peace and reap a harvest of righteousness (James 3:13-18).

Wisdom doesn't mince her words. The world's culture has sugar coated truths, lulling people into a false sense of security when they should've been alerted to the danger they're in. Perhaps this is the reason reality tv shows are so popular – it's much easier to analyse, judge and mock others instead of examining oneself. God's Wisdom, which is more to be desired than gold, calls out to each of us daily – 'alerting the inexperienced and those easily misled to seek common sense and prudence, warning those who are closed-minded (self-confident fools) to seek the insight and self-discipline that leads to godly living' – "... for I speak the Truth and detest every kind of deception. My advice is wholesome. There is nothing devious or crooked in it. My Words are plain to anyone with understanding, clear to those with knowledge. Choose My instruction rather than silver, and knowledge rather than pure gold. For Wisdom is far more valuable than rubies. Nothing you desire can compare with it" (Proverbs 8:1-11; Proverbs 3:13-26).
