

## **WEATHER CHAOS IN KILLARNEY**



✓ illarney experienced torrential downpours, thunder and lightening and flash floods during an Orange Weather Alert on Tuesday.

Flooding under the railway bridge on Park Road caused chaos as did flooding at the junction of Loreto Road and Muckross Road.

Killarney was the third Kerry town in as many days to experience "biblical" rain with the heavens opening around 4pm on Tuesday, leaving locals and tourists including those in Killarney for the Citizenship Ceremonies running for shelter. Tralee and Listowel also experienced severe weather with many businesses destroyed over the weekend, including Dunnes Stores, where part of the

The junction at Loreto Road and Muckross Road was also heavily flooded.

roof came in and Tralee Omniplex who experienced severe flooding.

Train services in Killarney were halted for a number of hours due to signalling systems being affected by the weather, while Countess Road. Flesk Bridge and Abbey Cross were also severely affected by the flash flooding.

Over 2,000 homes were without power following the storms and Fire Brigade units from Killarnev. Killorglin and Tralee battled a house fire on Park Road which may have been caused by lightening strikes.



## St. Oliver's Produce final part of the Bono Bit Trilogy

he staff and students of St. Oliver's have produced one final chapter in a trilogy of videos called The Bono Bit – The Fallout. This final instalment is to launch the school's first Wellbeing Week, which was run from Monday the 19th June to Friday the 23rd. A staff group was developed to come up with a Wellbeing policy and strategies to support the wellbeing of the students, their families and parents, and the staff themselves. The group is led by Leana O' Brien who has organised the events being held in the school during Wellbeing week, and Noel O' Sullivan who wrote and directed the Wellbeing video.

Oisín O' Connor is another member of the Wellbeing group and he filmed and produced the video. He, along with his father Liam, got Marty Morrissey on board to give the video that something special, though it

was an emotional week for the O'Connor family having lost their good friend Christy Dignam to cancer. Various other members of the group arranged activities such as mindful reflections, mobility exercise videos, daily affirmations and meditations, visits by Patchino's Coffee and Treats, an ice cream van from It's My Party, a staff talk on nutrition by John O' Connor from Target Nutrition and two staff gatherings, at Hilliard's Restaurant and Iguana's Café.

Colm Ó Súilleabháin, principal of St. Oliver's has been proactive in developing the posts within the school to develop the area of Wellbeing and he has given the creative aspect of the staff plenty of space and support to develop initiatives to achieve the goals in the school's Wellbeing policy.

The video itself is about the fallout after the successful Bono Bit videos during Christmas. Issues such as disappointment, setbacks, bitterness and how to cope with them are dealt with in the video in a humourous way. Various staff members use healthy (and some unhealthy!) ways to cope with their own individual challenges, such as meditation, exercise, talking to a counsellor, and getting support from friends and family. These are important themes for the future and we hope that the children and adults in the school community develop awareness of the many healthy things we can do for our mental health when we experience difficulties. We try to model different ways to get support and we have a bit of fun with the area too, as it can be heavy for people. Marty Morrissey was very kind to help form the overall storyline with his contribution.

## Killarney embraces first full season since pandemic

Killarney is wholeheartedly and enthusiastically embracing its first full season since the Covid-19 pandemic and it's great to witness the energy and sense of purpose evident in the town at this time of the year, Chamber of Tourism and Commerce Joint President, Johnny McGuire, has said.

Addressing a members' lunch in the Killarney Plaza Hotel, on Wednesday, he said the energy and determination was particularly obvious this year with the outstanding success of the new outdoor dining experience at Kenmare Place and he congratulated all those who brought that project to fruition.

Mr McGuire also highlighted the enormous role the

Gleneagle INEC Arena plays in the success of Killarney and added that he is constantly overwhelmed by the amazing events that take place there, almost on a daily basis.

"It is a testament to the vision and foresight of the late Maurice O'Donoghue and it is ably captained today by his son Patrick.

"Thank you to the O'Donoghue family for everything they have done to make the Killarney season what it is," he said.

At the lunch, a presentation was made to Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Niall Kelleher, to mark his hugely successful two-year term as President of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

He was praised for devoting an enormous amount of time and energy to the role, for bringing ideas to fruition and, essentially, for getting things done.

Mr McGuire – who with Pádraig Treacy succeeded Niall as joint president earlier this year – said their predecessor spearheaded the organisation with great success and he has also worked tremendously hard for the betterment of Killarney and its people.

He said Niall brought the chamber executive together to implement a plan to completely restructure the business organisation and to prepare for the future.

"We were locked up at that meeting for 48 hours to get it done and it was like electing a pope – we had to wait for the white smoke. We came up with a document in association with a consultancy firm called Repucon and, since then, we have introduced a whole new structure," Mr McGuire added.

The chamber is now divided into six groups with Finbarr Kennelly heading up the membership sub-committee, Niamh O'Shea in charge of brand and reputational management, Cllr Niall Kelleher leads the advocacy sub-committee, Mike Stack spearheads the sustainability group, Anthony Walsh leads the retail group and Dermot Healy chairs the events committee.

Going forward, the chamber will continue to work closely with Kerry County Council and Mr McGuire lauded the hugely proactive and can-do approach adopted by the local authority.

A presentation of a framed montage of photographs, featuring images of the highlights of his two-year term, was presented to Mayor Kelleher as a token of appreciation.

## ALGAE WARNING FOR THE LAKES

In light of the current and on-going warm weather conditions, as a precaution, Kerry County Council has erected advisory signage at a number of locations along the shores of Lough Leane and Muckross Lake to advise members of the public of the potential for an algal growth in the water and on the shoreline.

While the overall levels of algae are not of particular concern at the moment, the Council has received reports of localised transient shoreline accumulations of algae at a small number of locations along the shoreline. Members of the public are advised not to bathe in water if there are visible signs of algal growth in the vicinity. They are also advised to ensure that they keep their dogs under control as such algal accumulations can be harmful on ingestion by small animals.

The situation is being monitored closely on an ongoing basis by Kerry County Council.

### **Minister Harris Turns Sod**

### on New Science, Technology, **Engineering and Maths Building at** MTU's Kerry North Campus

inister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation IV and Science, Simon Harris, TD, turned the sod on the new Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) Building at MTU's Kerry North Campus on Monday last.

The STEM building, 9,042 meters squared in size, will provide the capacity to expand MTU's portfolio of programmes and services in STEM disciplines. The construction of a STEM building on the campus will play a vital role in achieving the vision of MTU, significantly enhancing the number of STEM graduates for the region.

Speaking on the sod turning, Minister Harris said: "This is a really important development for higher education in the Munster region. The construction of these buildings will improve the educational experience for current and future generations of students. STEM is an area of great growth in Ireland, and it is important that higher education facilities like MTU are continuously developing the space for this learning."

These projects are part of the first bundle of six buildings in the Government's Higher Education PPP programme. The construction cost of the six buildings in the bundle is approximately €250 million. These developments will help MTU achieve its prospective vision of increasing

#### **Cuckoo says Goodbye**

The lament for the tardy arrival of the cuckoo in this column recently was ahead of its time! In French to say "coucou" is to say hello.

But here it is a case of goodbye! Most have left already. As I write, one of the cuckoos tagged in Killarney on May 17th is already over Italy, another is in France. They have left early this year, it seems, and their route south is being carefully monitored. Bird tracking with small satellite packs has become a thing in recent years. When children used to read or be read to, Pigeon Postman of the stories would often be overladen with his backpack. It slipped out too in the recent high profile tagging project involving the British Ornithology Trust, the BOT, and the National Parks and Wildlife Service: four male birds were chosen because the males are bigger than the female and would carry the packs more easily.

Veteran birdwatcher and field ornithologist, Ed Carty of Tralee tells me it is not unusual for the cuckoo to leave this early. It means their business is done for 2023; they have mated and have enjoyed the best of the weather.

Ed has an interesting take on the cuckoo: they are not like the swift or the swallow and are not strictly loyal to place.

The swallow and house martin - as I know after a summer spent cleaning out the laundry one year, and foiling an attempt the following year by keeping the door closed - will return to the exact same corner year after year.

The cuckoo who has no loyalty to young or old is more of an opportunist: it will return to the same area but will look for the best accommodation available. It will be interesting to see if the Killarney cuckoo returns via Italy or takes the Spanish route in 2024

## Simon Harris leader in waiting at the Citizenship Ceremonies

Simon Harris may well be the next leader of Fine Gael, when there is a vacancy. There is none right now, he insisted during his visit to Killarney on Monday. He is easily more popular than Leo in rural Ireland and his commitment and follow-through to provide university status for Kerry and Killarney is commendable. He is also sorting out the lack of vets, nurses and medics scandal. He has vision, and is a resolver of issues. But he is also politically astute: he easily sidestepped a question on whether future citizenship ceremonies may be moved back to Dublin. Results of a looking-into were awaited, he said.

The vast majority of those attending citizenship ceremonies held in Killarney since 2018 live in the Dublin, Meath and Kildare region. However, most of the officials and indeed visitors to Killarney I spoke with this week are in love with the INEC ceremonies and with the huge effort the whole town and the Gleneagle makes.

"Everyone is so friendly in Killarney town," is how one official put it to me.

Gardai on point duty, and a friendly populace makes the event much more special than what could be hosted at the RDS , the official told me privately.

It is "absolutely seamless", the official said of the handling of 4,000 people from 180 or so countries at the Gleneagle Hotel / Inec over the past few days.

I have covered all the events at the INEC and they get better and better, is my personal experience.

The ceremonies give the town a great buzz. For one Israeli father and son, flying down to Killarney was very special. The father had "graduated" in March in Dublin and the son on Tuesday in Killarney.

"We love Killarney, this is our second time here," they told me.

In fact, many of the new citizens I spoke to in Killarney were only too happy to combine a break with such a significant event in their lives. But there were a few outliers, not because of accommodation, strangely, but transport: There is no early enough morning train from Dublin, was a complaint.

The low cost of air to and from Dublin saw a lot of business for Ryanair. So it does seem the airline is correct in maintaining the Kerry to Dublin route is commercially viable. It would be even more so - had we earlier flights.

## Will Kerry buck the national trend and elect Greens?

Killarney sent the first green councillors to a council in Ireland. That was in the 1980s and we had Green councillors in both Killarney and followed byTralee.

There has been none since the 1990s.

The Greens are not doing well in rural Ireland. A big part of the problem is leader Eamon Ryan. For years the party, whose real roots are German, eschewed any kind of leader. There is also the fact the green agenda has been taken on by other parties, to a greater or lesser extent. Malcolm Noonan would be more grounded.

And there is a tendency to talk in global terms rather than address local issues.

The party is to run candidates in all six local electoral areas in Kerry, it says. Yes, the Greens have strong local election roots in Kerry.

But other than an understanding of the need for public transport in Kerry, there seems to be a complete disconnect with the nitty gritty economic needs of the county. We have had protests and statements against oil exploration, and against Shannon LNG, but nothing on the controversial placing of wind turbines close to people's homes.

After the heavy rainfall which hit Kerry this week - I was caught in the Outdoor Dining Area and dogs even ran for cover - there may be a rethink by the Kerry electorate who will have seen the results of climate change on their doorstep. (Full marks to the outdoor facility, it neither budged or flooded in the dramatic thunder and lightning storm on Tuesday which reminded people of the mountains of Switzerland).

Yet, as much as climate change, that rainfall too needs a basic approach: we need to get the council to clean out the drains and renew the existing sluices and dykes and get the shovels out

Those running for the Greens in 2024 include GP Peadar Ó Fionnáin in the three-seater Corca Dhuibhne . The son of the late and much loved West Kerry GP and poet, Dr Micheál Fanning, Peadar should do well.

Former Kingdom journalist Cleo Murphy is seeking election in the Kenmare MD for the second time. A close friend of Green MEP Grace O'Sullivan, and from Kenmare, Ms Murphy polled just under 700 first preferences in 2019, surprising many on her first outing. She too will rattle a seat in an important coastal area.

Ironically, I am not sure about the chances for the Greens in Killarney where there are wider issues. This is a town where progress in most simple issues is painfully slow and people are really disillusioned over the loss of their town council and local planning and other offices and by the years' long failure to solve basic basic issues like a pedestrian crossing at the Monsignor O'Flaherty statue; the ridiculous lights at the top of Ross Road where nothing moves for half a minute and more; bypasses, traffic problems, not to mention a lack of affordable housing for locals - in spite of huge state land banks. And the Aras Phadraig!

It is no coincidence that Diarmaid Griffin the Killarney Green candidate has identified similar issues to those of the 1980s in Killarney: ongoing issues with the national park, sustainable tourism, the town's seemingly intractable traffic problems and severe lack of housing for locals.

## **CUACH TORC IN POLE POSITION** as mystery of the elusive Cuckoo is tracked

'he search for the elusive Cuckoo - Irish Cuckoo Tracking Project is well on the way to solving migration mysteries.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has commenced a cross-channel Cuckoo tracking project with the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) to find out just where Irish cuckoos spend their winter months. It is hoped the project will also answer if Irish cuckoos undertake a different migration strategy to their British counterparts across the Irish Sea. The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) at the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage linked up with the BTO Cuckoo team to satellite track four Irish Cuckoos: Three from Killarney National Park and one from Burren National Park, Co. Clare. The birds were given names and fitted with satellite tags and their movements can be followed on the new Cuckoo page on the Killarney National Park website. Using local place names the Cuckoos were named to the areas they were tagged, such as 'Cuach Torc' and Cuach Cores'.

As of earlier this week, Cuach Torc has leap-frogged Cores to take up pole position as our most southerly Cuckoo.

By early Monday evening, Torc had just crossed the border into Northern Italy and was close to the village of Olivetta san Michele in the Province of Imperia, in Liguria. You can follow the cuckoo's progress on:







# BACK TO SCHOOL CLOTHING AND FOOTWEAR ALLOWANCE

y child is going back to school in September and I need help with the costs. Can I get the Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance?

The Back to School Clothing and Footwear Allowance (BSCFA) is an annual once-off payment that can help with the costs of books and uniforms for school children. You may qualify for the BSCFA if you meet the income requirements.

How much can I get? In 2023, the BSCFA is:

• €260 for children aged between 4 and 11

€385 for children aged between 12 and 22

How do I qualify?

Your child must be aged between 4 and 17 on 30 September 2023. If they are aged 18-22, they must be returning to full-time second level education in a recognised school this autumn.

You must also meet other conditions:

• You must be getting a qualifying social welfare payment or taking part in an approved employment, education or training scheme

• You and each child you are claiming for must be resident in Ireland

 Your household income must be within the BSCFA income limit

What is the BSCFA income limit?

Your total household income must be less than the weekly income limits. All dependent children are counted when the income limit is applied, including children who do not qualify for BSCFA because they are under 4.

Income you get from certain other social welfare payments is not counted.

The weekly income limits for 2023 are:

1 child = €642

2 children = €692

• 3 children = €742

• 4 children = €792

The income limit goes up by €50 for each additional dependent child.

How do I apply?

The BSCFA is paid automatically to many families. If you are paid automatically, you don't need to apply for the BSCFA. You should be notified of your automatic payment by 8 June on MyWelfare or by post. Your BSCFA will be paid the week starting 10 July 2023.

If you do not get an automatic payment, you can apply for the payment online through MyWelfare. You can apply until 30 September 2023.



# CAO APPLICANTS HAVE A LAST CHANCE TO REGISTER A CHANGE OF COURSE CHOICES ONLINE BY 5PM ON SATURDAY, 1ST JULY



#### **FINAL TASK**

The state exams conclude next Tuesday, 27th June and the thoughts of exhausted candidates are no doubt turning to holidays, travel or summer jobs. But there is still one very important task to be done. The 83,697 applicants, who applied to Central Applications Office (CAO) by the late application deadline of 1st May, must now turn their attention to the CAO course change of mind facility. This provides each applicant a last chance, if s/he wishes, to register a change of course choices online by 5pm on Saturday, 1st July.

#### **OPTION**

Not all applicants to CAO avail of the change of mind facility. Many applicants are happy with the course choices they submitted by 1st February. On the other hand, others will have changed their minds about the courses they would like to study. Whatever your reason for submitting a change of mind form, make sure you know exactly what you are applying for. Don't list any courses which you haven't researched. Don't apply for any course which you know that you won't accept if it's offered to you. Most important of all, never apply for a course in which you haven't the slightest interest just because your friends are applying for it.

#### **CALMLY**

If you decide to submit a change of mind form, work calmly on your choices before going online. Start from scratch and write out your new list of courses. Don't tinker with your original list while online as it's very easy to make a mistake. Check the minimum and special requirements for each course you are including on the change of mind form.

#### **CHANGING**

When you are happy with your revised choices, open up your CAO account via the "My Application" facility. To make changes to your existing course choices click on the 'Change

Level 8 Course Choices' tab and/or the 'Change Level 7/6 Course Choices' tab. If you haven't entered any courses on your application up to this point this tab will be called 'Add Level 8 Course Choices' and/or 'Add Level 7/6 Course Choices.' Your current course choices are listed to the left and you are given a blank preference list, headed 'New Choices,' to the right.' Enter all the courses that you wish to apply for in your order of preference on this list. Your existing choices are cancelled out. The same process applies for the Level 7/6 list. Every choice is important so fill up all ten choices in each category. Then click on 'Continue with Course Changes' to save the information. You will then be brought back to the screen containing the updated details CAO has on file for you. Check that your course choices are listed in correct order and that the codes are correct.

#### **SEPARATE**

The two course categories – Level 8 and Level 7/6 - are totally separate from each other for the purpose of submitting a change of mind form. You may change one category and leave the second category unchanged or you may change both. On the other hand, you may decide to stick with the choices you submitted by 1st February last.

#### **UPDATED**

If you change courses online, CAO will send an acknowledgement to your email address. Check that your courses have been updated by using the "My Application" facility by 5pm on 1st July. You may change your course choices free of charge as often as you wish up to the closing date. The final change of mind form that you submit is the one that will count for your CAO offers. So, be sure to check online before 1st July to make sure that all is in order.

#### **WINDOW**

After the 1st July you can make no further changes to your CAO application form. So, the remaining days provide you with a valuable

window of opportunity. Use the time to put some serious thought into your choice of college courses. With the state exams done and dusted, you can give your undivided attention to submitting a 'change of mind' form that truly contains your course interests. It will be time well spent if you achieve your course of choice when the college offers are issued on the 30th August.

#### **CHECKLIST**

- You have until 5pm on 1st July to avail of the CAO "Change of Mind" facility
- Not all applicants to CAO avail of the change of mind facility
- Don't list any courses which you haven't researched.
- Don't apply for any course which you know that you won't accept
- Never apply for a course in which you haven't the slightest interest
- Work on your new list of course choices before going online
- Check the requirements for the courses you are including on the change of mind form
- The two course categories are separate from each other on a change of mind form
- The remaining days provide you with a valuable window of opportunity
- After the 1st July you can make no further changes to your CAO application form
- The Leaving Cert (LC) exam concludes on Tuesday, 27th June
- CAO 'Change of Mind' Form closes at 5pm on Saturday, 1st July
- Leaving Cert results will be published on Friday, 25th August
- CAO Round One offers will be available at 2pm on Wed., 30th August



# Kerry Short Film Bursary 2023 €10,000 awarded to "Save the Last Dance"

The 2023 Kerry Short Film Bursary of €10,000 has been awarded to Writer/Director, Dónal Dineen, and James Kelly of Feenish Productions for the short film "Save the Last Dance". This is the first year a documentary film has won the bursary with the interviewing panel particularly impressed with the ambitious approach of the team. Kerry College Monavalley Campus, a centre of excellence for film skills training, will provide support to the production. Dineen is delighted to get the opportunity to make this film in his home county and believes the time is right to make it now. Music has been

a guiding force in his life and career to date, yet the local traditional music of Sliabh Luachra, much loved by his late father,





was easily dismissed by him in his youth. In more recent years, he has come to realise the power this music holds.

Producer, James Kelly, is looking forward to working with Dónal to bring this short film to the screen. James has experience working in the creative documentary space having produced a number of arts documentaries. His company has also produced a range of music videos including ones for the Rubber Bandits, Lisa Hannigan & Mary Coughlan. Both of the team are relishing the challenge ahead and describe winning the bursary as "a real honour". # Valentia Island Transatlantic Cable Project Announces Online Auction Fundraising Initiative

Funds needed for major works to restore historical site and secure UNESCO World Heritage status

The Foundation committed to restoring the Valentia Cable Station to its former glory announced its 2023 Online Auction initiative in aid of the Valentia Island Transatlantic Cable Project today. The aim of the auction is to raise funds essential to the restoration and preservation of the original building where the first ever transatlantic telegraph message was transmitted and the Cable Station, the first of its kind in the world, which served as the communications hub across the Atlantic from the 1870s right through to the 1960s. As well as an exhibit and museum on the ground floor, the upper floors will be converted into a bespoke digital hub to serve the community.

The story of the Station goes back to 1858, when Europe and North America were connected for the first time via a 3,000km undersea transatlantic telegraph cable. The cable reduced communication times from weeks to minutes - a revolutionary achievement now considered the 19th century equivalent of putting a man on the moon.

The first ever message was sent from Valentia Island to Trinity Bay in Newfoundland. It was a note of congratulations from Queen Victoria to President Buchanan of the United States. The 98 word message took 16 hours to transmit and the President's response of 143 words was sent in

just 10 hours.

This was the first step and a permanent connection was established in July 1866 between Valentia and Hearts Content in Newfoundland. Instant communication was now a reality – and Valentia was at the centre of the revolution: a small island off the coast of Ireland became the point at which modern globalisation began.

The auction website is open for bids on www.valentiacable.com. The project team invites individuals and companies to bid on diverse, fun and fabulous auction items ranging from exclusive hotel accommodation experiences to private whiskey tasting to much sought-after match tickets and other unique items.

Bids will be taken up to July 28th during the annual Valentia Lecture event at the Cable Station which this year will discuss the theme "A vision for Ireland and its place in a digital world "which will include an exciting panel of speakers including Leo Clancy, CEO of Enterprise Ireland, Norman Crowley chairperson of Cool Planet and Nicola Millard, Principal Innovation Partner at BT Ireland together with cable security expert, Dr Camino Kavanagh.





# HOPE FOR WORKS ON MUCKROSS ROAD TO BEGIN IN SEPTEMBER

ollowing continuous representations by Danny Healy Rae TD and Cllr. Maura Healy Rae regarding funding for the Muckross Road as this road is in complete disrepair, the following is the up to date position with the works.

Funding from TII has been approved in this years Road allocations. Kerry County Council have informed me that the works will go to tender by the end of June. It will then revert back to the TII for final signing off and once a contractor is appointed, it is hoped that works will begin in September of this year. I know that this has been very frustrating for locals who have had to endure the poor road surface for a significant amount of time and indeed is a very poor impression for the many visitors who come to Killarney and visit the many amenities in this area. Kerry County Council will continue to carry out maintenance until full resurfacing works begin in September of this year.



# Public Toilet Facilities needed at Dundag Beach

undag beach is a very popular gathering place on the lakeshore at Muckross in Killarney for sunbathers and swimmers alike, but it is not served by any Public Toilet facility. Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has contacted Kerry County Council in this regard following representations made to him by Killarney residents.

"Killarney is the most important tourist town in Ireland, with it's stunning scenery, it's National Park and it's lakes and yet the basic human need of toilet facilities is not provided at Dundag beach, which is thronged

during the fine weather by both residents and visitors. Kerry County Council advise that they provide Public Toilets at Blue Flag beaches only, which immediately rules out Dundag" stated Councillor Cahill.

"I believe that a total review of where these facilities must be undertaken now, to include places like Dundag, places like Mountain Stage, places like Bray Head, Valentia Island, places like Coomakista Pass and many more. We must provide year round Public Toilet facilities wherever people gather, not alone in our towns and villages, but at beauty spots throughout the county" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The Health and Safety requirements of modern society, demand that proper year round toilet facilities be provided wherever people gather regularly in numbers. Many such places have no facilities whatsoever, some have limited facilities. In this world of increased outdoor pursuits, people are in the open air all year round and a basic requirement is a public toilet. As we all know it is illegal and unseemly to do one's 'business' in public and therefore it is incumbent on the powers that be, to build public toilets to cater for the people's needs" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Dundag beach is a case in point, on the outskirts of Killarney town and a very popular place for young people and families during the warm summer weather and Kerry County Council should provide basic facilities such as public toilets and showers at such locations. We are after all supposed to be the premier tourist county in Ireland" added Councillor Cahill.

# TREATMENT ABROAD SCHEME/EU CROSS **BORDER DIRECTIVE**


ollowing the recent critical report by the Ombudsman, Ger Deering on the Health Service Executive's refusal to reimburse legitimate expenses for Irish patients getting treatment abroad under the EU Cross Border Directive, Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill called on the Minister for Health to initiate a full review of all historic cases to ensure that all medical, travel and accommodation expenses are reimbursed in a timely manner.

"Under the Treatment Abroad Scheme, treatment not readily available at home and that can be accessed in another country, you may qualify for HSE reimbursement. There are cases where reimbursement takes much too long or doesn't happen at all, and this must be corrected" said Councillor Cahill.

"I am aware of a number of cases in Killorglin Glenbeigh, Cromane, Beaufort and Killarney where patients who travelled to Belfast under the EU Cross Border Directive for their cataracts have been left waiting months for their money. I am aware of one particular case where a lady in Caherciveen has been left waiting over 8 months for her payment" stated Councillor Cahill.

"These people have paid in full for these procedures at great expense to themselves and they should not have to wait any longer than a couple of weeks to be reimbursed" stated Councillor Cahill at this month's meeting of Kerry County Council. "It is after all the taxpayer who is

footing the bill for this scheme" added Councillor Cahill.



"Patients have borrowed money to fund such trips and sometimes find that they will not be refunded, leaving them in sizeable debt. Accommodation costs are covered if booked by the hospital at the other side, but if you have to book it yourself, the cost will not be reimbursed to you and this is outrageous" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"If your luggage is included in flight costs by the airline, you will be reimbursed, but if the airline lists it separately, you will not. Is this not the ultimate in Red Tape and bureaucracy" asked Councillor Cahill.

"This is a rubbish approach and this is why I have put down this Notice of Motion and I am asking Kerry County Council to write to the Minister calling on him to rectify it, retrospectively" added Councillor Cahill.

# WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

**Taxable Cash:** You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

**Annual Pension:** This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

# **BLURRED VISION**

When you have blurred vision, : your eyesight is less sharp and objects, images and words seem to be out of focus.

### Who is aaffected by blurred vision?

Anyone can be affected by blurred vision. It could be a sign of getting older and/or needing new glasses, tiredness, or too much sun. But there are many other causes, and it could be one of the symptoms of a range of conditions including:

- Short-sightedness (myopia), long-sightedness (hyperopia), astigmatism and presbyopia

# Irish hillclimb championship frontrunner Ben O'Brien commits to Ballyfinnane Festival of Speed

One of Ireland's top hillclimb racers has confirmed his participation in the Brian O'Neill Garden Equipment and Trailers Ballyfinnane Festival of Speed.

Ben O'Brien from Limerick will race his Gould GR37 Hillclimb Special in Kerry on July 16.

This new event is jointly organised by Kerry Motor Club and The Ballyfinnane Community Association. It will celebrate 120 years of closed-road motorsport in County Kerry. The first-ever event in the Kingdom was won by Charles Rolls, who later became a founder of the Rolls Royce Motor Company, on July 15, 1903.

Almost 120 years to the day, racing cars and rally cars will once again go against the clock on a closed road in the famous mid-Kerry village.

O'Brien will drive his 600bhp – fitted with a Judd Formula 1 spec engine in the commemoration event. The former Irish hillclimb saloon class champion is one of the first drivers to commit to the event.

"It has over 600 bhp on tap and weighing in at just over 500kgs it's a ball of fun to drive and certainly keeps me on my toes," said O'Brien.

"I have only recently purchased the car and pre-Ballyfinnane only competed in one Hillclimb in it, a masters' event in France where I came first overall and was the first Irish person to win this event. No pressure in Ballyfinnane then!"

"I love the ultimate and extreme cars that Hillclimbing attracts and allows."

"In a day and age where such strict guidelines are enforced in so many motorsport disciplines, it's amazing to see these cars out in force and being used as they were designed."

"This is sure to be an unforgettable weekend of motorsport."

As well as the speed hillclimb the organisers have laid on a host of other activities in the village on the day including an extensive classic car display laid on by the Killarney Valley Classic and Vintage Club.

Louise Ní Mhuircheartaigh amassed a magnificent haul of 1-6 at Parnell Park as Kerry withstood a late surge from Dublin to seal victory in the opening round of the TG4 All-Ireland Senior Football Championship Group 3.

2-8 to 1-4 in arrears with eight minutes gone in the second half of a physically demanding encounter, Mick Bohan's Leinster champions posted five points without reply before ultimately coming up just short. Following traded points between Ní Mhuircheartaigh and Dublin's Kate Sullivan in the early moments, a quick 1-1 salvo from the Corca Dhuibhne ace moved the Lidl National Football League Division 1 champions four points clear by the fifth minute.

Dublin had a goal of their own after a superb run by Caoimhe O'Connor put Orlagh Nolan through for a neat close-range finish, but a brace of pointed frees courtesy of Ní Mhuircheartaigh kept Kerry in the driving seat.

The three-time All Star added two more points to her already impressive tally as the opening half wore on, though Hannah Tyrrell knocked over a free for Dublin in between these efforts.

Dublin captain Carla Rowe also kicked a fine point off an extended move, only for a majestic Hannah O'Donoghue score with the outside of her right boot to give Kerry a 1-6 to 1-3 interval lead.

Although Niamh Ní Chonchúir stretched the Kingdom cushion on the resumption, Dublin looked set for a major lifeline when they were awarded a 34th-minute penalty.

But Rowe's strike was saved by Kerry goalkeeper Ciara Butler and while Tyrrell converted another free, Kerry swiftly raised their second green flag of the tie when Cait Lynch passed inside for team captain Siofra O'Shea to palm home.

Another place-ball effort by the outstanding Ní Mhuircheartaigh had the Munster outfit within sight of a big win, before Dublin finally built up a head of steam with four points on the bounce – two each from Tyrrell and Rowe.

Kerry lost defender Emma Costello to a yellow card with 14 minutes remaining on the clock and full-back Kayleigh Cronin also ended the contest in the sin bin as the tension began to ramp up in the Donnycarney

Tyrrell registered her fifth point of the action on 50 minutes, but in spite of their numerical deficiency in the final-quarter, Kerry held out to take a firm grip on the Group 3 table.

#### KERRY HIT THE GROUND RUNNING

All Ireland Championship: Kerry 5-24 Louth 0-11

I always expected Kerry to win this, but in all honesty, I wasn't remotely expecting this kind of display. Kerry more or less stuttered to safety in the National League but, with midfield struggling, Seán O'Shea not really hitting top gear, and Tadhg Morley being targeted (legitimately) to force him to man-mark instead of sweep, Kerry looked a shadow of last year's team. The Clare performance was better, Kerry looked purposeful that day. Then came the Mayo game, and that one was close enough to humiliation. We were outrun, outmuscled. and, worst of all, out-thought. That day, one team looked like All Ireland champions - and it wasn't us. We got past an under-rated Cork, but weren't convincing. Mind you, Cork are a better team than their results over the last few years indicates, but the questions definitely lingered over Kerry.

Did Jack O'Connor play us all like fiddles in terms of timing the run in to peak form? This year was always going to be very different in that respect. I thought Kerry were deliberately building slow during the league, but that Mayo game really had me worried - it was a bit late to be that stuck to the ground comparatively. Heading up to Louth, we didn't seem to be in a good place. Louth had lost their games, but, apart from getting schooled when they tried to play one on one with Dublin, they had been really competitive. I was expecting Kerry to win by about five, with David Clifford being the main difference. A slight over-reliance on David has been singled out far and wide as a Kerry weakness.

I was not expecting what we got. Yes, David was absolutely brilliant. The finish for that first goal...believe me, that was technical perfection and it's an awful lot harder than it looks. Those two booming monster points at the end of the first half....take another look at the other games

played last weekend. There was no other player even shooting from that kind of range (Galway and Armagh comes to mind – great football, but only sure thing shots).

The thing is, as incredible as David was (it was hilarious to see him being escorted to 'safety' because the gardaí had a legitimate concern that he would draw a big and therefore accidentally dangerous crowd after the game – that's supposed to happen to Taylor Swift or Harry Styles, not David Clifford), he could actually have just brought a book to read. Even if you took him out of the equation, Kerry were simply that good.

Look, it's easy to get carried away. There's a long road ahead and much bigger obstacles. Louth seemed toothless once big Sam Mulroy was nullified by a tight and disciplined Jason Foley. Their Plan B seemed to be keep repeating Plan A and hope for a different outcome

Paul Murphy and Tadhq Morley have developed on understanding of switching that defensive shield role. Shane Ryan, one early and reckless foray outfield aside (I hate to see it by any keeper; the risk is always far higher than the reward) hardly put a foot wrong and his kickouts are arguably the best in the country right now. The middle was a huge bonus for Kerry. Louth had big men and would have fancied themselves to at least break even in this area,. They didn't even get a sniff. Jack Barry doesn't dominate in the manner of Darragh Ó Sé or David Moran, but his industrial reliability is under-appreciated. Gaudí was one of the greatest architects of all time – but he didn't lay any of the blocks.

Diarmuid O'Connor is the Gaudí in this story. Like Seán O'Shea, he has had to face some justified criticism this year. That pair, along with the Clifford brothers, were Kerry's best players on a day when every Kerry player looked good. David Moran left a big whole in our middle and neither of our starting players was stepping up (personally I was surprised that Ronan Buckley in particular didn't get more game-time earlier on, but I'm not at the weekly training grind)

but last Sunday Diarmuid was as high-flying, combative, and accurate (he kicked a couple of monsters himself). Up front Seán O'Shea moved inside along with David, with Tony dropping a bit deeper as a playmaker, but still in the danger area. I always want the likes of Tony or Geaney (it's getting late for Killian to be in the running for a start, though he's always a serious bench option when fit) near the scoring zone. Paudie Clifford as always went out as a deep centre forward and, as always, his pace and power were explosive. It's not so much that he does any one spectacular thing; it's just that he does so much and does it so consistently well.

I'm not going through the game score by score. I'll spare everybody that; it's superfluous after a victory of that magnitude. We hit the post twice early on before Jack Barry won a free to get Seán O'Shea off the mark. He had three and Paudie another, while a stifled Louth had just one score from Conor Grimes, who showed great heart but got nothing off Mike Breen. Kieran Downey kicked a good point but the Louth bulwark was obviously already creaking. Let us cut the tale short. Kerry then went on to kick 2-10 without reply. David kicked two from long distance and added a free to supplement his neatly drilled goal after a pass from Tony. David also set up Paudie's goal. Diarmuid had two points. Paudie and Dara Moynihan were both on target. Seán had two and set up Mike Breen for his goal. Kerry could have had two more goals by then. Sam Mulroy did win and point a Louth free, but it couldn't even count as a gesture of defiance by then. Dara Moynihan closed out the first half, with Kerry leading by 2-15 to 0-3. By then there were updates on the Mayo/Cork game happening and it looked possible that Kerry, who had gone into this game aspiring to seal a home 'pre-quarterfinal' (that ridiculous phrase will always have apostrophes as far as I am concerned. 'Prequarter-final'. Jaysus.), and now had a chance to top the group.

To be honest, I didn't pay too much attention.

I'm not a believer in the value of calculating scoring difference before group conclusions. Just focus on winning your own game. The rest will happen regardless of you worrying about it, so that worry is just dead energy. Now, it's different obviously for a player – you do need to know whether you have to attack or hold late on. Do you need a goal or will a fisted point secure advancement?

The second half was more of the same. It wasn't Louth's fault, but they were out of their depth. The main attribute that Kerry showed here was speed. Some-one has put a lot of very hard work in the background on strength and conditioning and it looks like it's starting to pay dividends. Just as impressive, though, was their accuracy. Kerry had their first wide of the entire game in the 42nd minute, a Jason Foley effort off the post and out. Paudie had the third goal with a perfectly timed run. Seán won a foul for David to calmly slot home a penalty (and Kerry don't actually have a great history of converting penalties) and Seán notched the fifth himself after Louth keeper James Califf went a-wandering. Louth did pick off a few points towards the finish, the likes of Dylan McKeown and Liam Jackson impressing, but the difference in the teams was summed up around the three quarter stage, with Sam Mulroy departing in muted fashion with his shoulders bowed, whereas David Clifford was greeted with rapturous applause as he was substituted. The other unusual and perhaps slightly amusing note was the Kerry supporters shouting for the rebels as word filtered through of Sherlock's late tour de force. That gives Kerry a weekend off and the likes of Gavin White, Paul Geaney, Killian Spillane, and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch a bit more recovery time and others a chance to rest and recharge. I've believed from the start that the winners of this year's All Ireland will Tougher days ahead, but this was a good day for Kerry. A marker laid down? Definitely maybe. There was a fair bit of grumbling coming into the final weekend. There were two main talking points. The first was the failure by RTE or GAAGO to broadcast the Kerry v Laois match. I have no sympathy. Yes, we are All Ireland champions and people do want to see us. But there have been plenty of options to see all of Kerry's other games, so missing one, where a Kerry win was always expected, is not the major scandal that a few people tried to foment. Radio Kerry had Tim Moynihan and Ambrose O'Donovan give full coverage of the game, and Radio Kerry is the best local radio for sports in the country - as some-one who follows a lot of minor competitions, etc, I listen to the likes of Cork103, Shannon FM, Highland Radio, Midwest, Galway Bay, etc. To be fair, Highland give very good coverage of Ulster games as

Anyway, you, I, and everybody else had the option of going to the game (and there was a big and good-humoured crowd, so kudos). Some hero is going to start going on about "will we not think of the children and the old people". The children have more opportunities to watch - and, more importantly engage in sport than at any other time in history. When I was a child 'Sports Stadium' was the bible. You got the Munster Final, the All semi-finals, and the final. That's it. Go back a generation before that, and people would make their way to the abode of some-one in the locality who would have one of the old wet-and-dry battery radios. It was the Riordans in my own area, but every neighbourhood had the house where they would gather - not that house gatherings were rare back then in terms of card games and dances. You think that old people somehow need your self-appointed heroism to be their voice? Most old people are smarter than you and me and they are by definition more experienced. You know that modern world with electricity and the internet and highspeed travel? They built it.

I do have a gripe with that insistence on no cash at the gates. That's just petty and incredibly inconvenient for a lot of people. Some-one might want to tell Croke Park, who do seem to be increasingly corporation rather than community based, that those old people? They quite literally built the GAA too.

The other talking point prior to last weekend was the drawn out nature of the championship format. That has been muted after the thrills and spills of a genuine rollercoaster weekend of games, but I hope the pointless tedium of the last couple of months isn't forgotten when things are reviewed. Frankly, I'm starting to feel like ignoring the provincials and group stage - call me for the knock-outs. Teams do seem and I realise it's early to justify the conclusion - to be evolving from the stifling nature of the blanket defence. The biggest shock was Cork beating Mayo, who have been the form team all year. I suspect that Cork will be dangerous yet with that little injection of confidence. They'll have their hands full with a durably effective Roscommon, but I can see Cork taking it narrowly (their conversion rate is the key factor). In the long term, I really believe that Cork's victory could be a crucial turning point for Kerry as well. I have to say a fond farewell to the departing Clare manager Colm Collins – innovative, relentless, ambitious for his county (he elevated them during an incredible tenure and rattled us often) but more than anything, the heart and soul always of a gentleman.

Armagh and Galway served up an entertaining battle. Great football, even if I felt that there was a notable reluctance to actually take shots on at times. Galway were probably fractionally the better team, but Rafferty's penalty save was crucial and they had nerve to hold on at the finish. Galway are still one of the biggest contenders, but a gruelling battle between themselves and Mayo (and those battles are always as gruelling as they are enthralling) will sap an awful lot of energy out of the winners.

Your heart has to go out to Westmeath. The Taillteann Cup winners were a surprise package, very highly competitive in all of their games, and don't really deserve to depart. Heslin was just the width of the post from eliminating Tyrone with the last kick of the game – that kind of scalp could enervate a county for at least a generation. It's nothing against Tyrone, but you just love a happy underdog story. Ah well. As Clint Eastwood said to Gene Hackman, "deserve's got nothing to do with it".

**Kerry, Dublin, Armagh, and Derry** are all straight through to quarter-finals. Armagh leapfrogging Galway is the only surprise there, and it,'s hardly any major shock. The 'prequarter-finals' (ah no) are actually much harder to read. Nice couple of banana skins in there.

#### Kildare v Monaghan

Kildare are always a superb team for an aggregate of 40 minutes. If they can put a full display together, they have the players and especially the bit of shooting magic.

#### Cork v Roscommon

If Sherlock and Hurley can dovetail and Powter is encouraged to drive at them, I see the rebels getting to the last eight.

#### **Donegal v Tyrone**

Donegal have stabilised, and that's a good thing for the game in general, but I just think that Tyrone have better scoregetters in a game where they will be few and far enough in between.

#### Galway v Mayo

Two great teams and genuine contenders. Are Mayo holed below the waterline by that Cork defeat? Not at all. Mayo have taken harder punches and stayed standing. But Galway, even with Shane Walsh failing to quite live up to the hype of his All Ireland display, are just that fraction better footballers in my opinion. The Tribesmen to shade a gripping contest.

## KERRY LADIES HANG ON FOR PRECIOUS VICTORY

After their chastening defeat to Cork in the Munster Final, Kerry really needed to lay down a marker here and did so in style. I still don't consider us to be the favourites for the All Ireland, that's a tag that's too easily bestowed on league champions and is harder earned

in summer, but we have shown the football and, more importantly, the character of real contenders. Because in the end it was character - not necessarily composure; that's an entirely different thing - but character that saw this one over the finishing line. Mind you, I was sweating as much as any player by that stage, more from drama than exertion!

Dublin had the first effort, and it was very narrowly wide by Hannah Tyrell - she doesn't miss many. Louise Ní Muircheartaigh basically doesn't miss any, and she followed up the scoring after a hard-working Danielle O'Leary was blocked down. At the other end Carla Rowe won a soft enough free and found Kate O'Sullivan for an equaliser. Dublin were dropping Lauren Magee deep, almost like a quarterback, and relying on the direct pace of top class performers like Caoimhe O'Connor, Jodi Egan, and Carla Rowe. The problem for them was that Kerry had defenders to stick with them, most notably Emma Costello, Ciara Murphy, and Aishling O'Connell, while Kayleigh Cronin kept a very tight leash on the dangerous Tyrell.

Forwards win battles, but defenders win wars, and this was unspectacular but absolutely brilliant defending by Kerry, with Dublin being steered into empty channels and repeatedly caught for over-carrying.

At the other end Louise Ní Muircheartaigh lofted a ball towards the goal – to everybody's surprise (including, I'd say, her own) it caught Dublin by surprise and dropped into the net. That move typified Kerry - three kick-passes straight down the length of the pitch. Kerry knew the pace of their forwards and were happy to kick forward at every chance.

Siofra O'Shea was only denied a goal by Dublin keeper Abby Shiels before Louise kicked over a beauty with her left leg. 1-2 to 0-1, a perfect start for Kerry.

Jodi Egan had two wides - they weren't far away, before Caoimhe O'Connor did really well to weave through the Kerry defence and offload to Orlaith Nolan. Credit where due; that was a superb goal.

Hannah O'Donoghue won a free converted by Louise - personally I thought Leah Caffrey was fairly lucky not to get a yellow. Hannah Tyrell replied in kind before Louise swept over another beauty. Ciara Murphy and Carla Rowe both had dangerous chances, but neither could get a full shot off at speed. Magee from deep and Rowe up front were starting to get into the game now, with Rowe notching a good score, but Hannah O'Donoghue closed out the first half with a fine point to give Kerry a fully deserved 1-6 to 1-3 lead, 1-5 of it from Louise Ní Muircheartaigh.

Hannah Tyrell slotted a Dublin free but Niamh Ní Chonchúir followed up after Danielle O'Leary was blocked down to preserve the three point gap.

Then came by far and away the pivotal minute of the game. Not every game has a single turning point. In fact, the majority have a rolling narrative. This one, though....there is no question on where this game was won and lost. Caoimhe O'Connor sliced through again and drew a foul as she bore down on goal. Carla Rowe hit a great penalty, low and left.... and somehow Ciara Butler got there. As good a save as you will see. And this got instantly and dramatically even better as Kerry once again moved the ball smart and fast down the field, Cáit Lynch using her speed to ncut through the cover before giving to Louise, who time a perfect handpass for Siofra...it was like an owl swooping on its prey as she rose high to fist smoothly home. Siofra has the knack of making those look remarkably easy (and they aren't). From a Cork penalty to a Kerry goal, a six point swing. Siofra won a free converted by Louise, and it looked like game over, 2-8 to 1-3.

Dublin are Dublin. They may have been caught of late by Meath, but they are the most recent superpower of the ladies game and the likes of Caffrey, Magee, Tyrell, and Rowe are the reason why. They went to work.

And Kerry.....I don't know. Suddenly we were at sixes and sevens in midfield - was the substitution of a tiring Louise Galvin a factor? Did Dublin simply have too much acceleration in their legs for us by then? Was there a lack of a player to slow it down and give Kerry a foothold? Unlikely, with the likes of Kayleigh, Emma, Cáit, Loraine, Anna...a lot of these players have proven themselves in tougher battles. But whatever it was, Dublin took over completely and ran at Kerry in waves. We just couldn't get a ball to stick.

They had three points on the trot, two from Tyrell and one from Rowe, and then Emma Costello picked up a yellow and an enforced ten minute break - fair decision. There had been no malice in the body collision, but it's a yellow. Hannah Tyrell clipped over three frees on the trot. 2-8 to 1-9, and the game being played almost entirely in Kerry's half. Dublin were lording the middle now.

Kayleigh Cronin picked up a yellow, and that one was as mystifying a decision as I have ever seen. Kayleigh was at least as much fouled as fouling. I would like to ask the referee (respectfully) what he thought had happened. Thankfully Emma was back on shortly afterwards, and we got another break when Louise Ní Muircheartaigh shouldered a player over the sideline but the referee called play back - by right he should have issued the yellow. I suspect that Louise knew what she was doing, by the way - a touch of "thou shalt not pass", and badly wanted at the time. Spare me any moral purity nonsense - we literally had to battle for seconds at this stage, and the likes of Louise and Lorraine Scanlon, who emerged from the Kerry square in possession, are the warriors you need for this kind of trench.

Two point win. Flattering enough, but Dublin are one of the best teams in the country. I'll happily take that.


#### **GOLF**

#### Talk about a great weekend for the Irish!

Bizarrely, people are talking about Rory McIlroy finishing second in the US Open as if it was some kind of a failure. Really? 'Cause that failure is our second best ever result for an Irish golfer at this major. Seriously. Darren Clarke was a good player but never in real contention. Pádraig Harrington knocked on the door loudly for twenty years and was a regular in the top ten for most of a decade. Only one golfer from this island has beaten Rory McIlroy's 2023 second place finish (said glorious failure, by the way, earned him \$2.16 million). That particular golfer beat the field by eight shots in one of the most emphatic triumphs ever in 2011. His name was, of course, Rory McIlroy.

Shane Lowry tied with five other players in 20th spot to win a not-be-sneezed-at \$200, 152. Pádraig Harrington ended up joint 27th (remember, this is literally among the best golfers in the world) to earn \$143, 295.

Leona Maguire went one better by winning outright, although to be fair the Meijer LPGA

Classic in Michigan is a less prestigious event. Ireland's best ever female golfer (our own Mairead Martin is up there with anyone, but Leona is on a different level) had an incredible finish, with an eagle and four birdies in her last six holes to take top spot and the trophy, as well as a cool \$375,000 that more than doubles her earnings this year. She went from two behind at the start of the day to finish three clear of the

Look, I could go on a big rant here, but let's be honest. It would merely be flogging a dead horse. Everyone knows that we were absolute muck, embarrassingly bad, against Greece. To be fair, Greece were better than I had expected, with some really clever and fast build-up play. But they were actually very poor at finishing those chances. They really should have won that game by five or six. How many corners did we concede in the opening ten minutes? Darragh Lenihan was in trouble from the start, but he got no help at all. Smallbone worked hard off virtually no service up front (did well for Ireland's goal) but was completely missing in action in terms of tracking or cover. Callum O'Dowda had a bit of a nightmare - I know he was in a slightly unfamiliar position, but he always looked like a chink in our armour. I don't blame him so much for the second goal – Greece did that well – but the penalty concession was clumsy. Matt Doherty....I'm sorry, I know these players give their heart and soul, but the best we can do is allow the dignity of silence here. Idah has pace and heart, but skill and positional sense, not so much. But our enormous problem – and I see no real fix on any horizon - is an absolute absence of any midfield presence. We were utterly cleaned out there. I know we don't have any Roy Keane, but these days I'd snap your hand off for Alan McLoughlin. Look, Stephen Kenny has tried very hard to get Ireland playing a 3-5-2 formation, but the truth is that it always turns instantly into a 5-4-1 game, with us defending stoutly and hoping to nick a goal.

A few people were criticising Kenny for that three centre back formation against lowly Gibraltar. People need to acknowledge the cold reality that Gibraltar were playing lowly Ireland, and I'd have been cautious initially in these circumstances as well. The introduction of Mikey Johnston did make a difference, but people applying the Wes Hoolahan playmaker tag are way too early - looking good against a country that includes a Dundalk player (no LOI player is getting a genuine look at action for Ireland, as bad as our national team is – therein lies the obvious problem at the root of Irish football, England are no longer supplying us with players) is not the measure going forward. Stephen Kenny is walking wounded, almost certainly fatally so in managerial terms. People always like to blame the manager. But in all honesty, I don't really see too much that he could have done different. Most of our players are on the bench for lower division teams. We are just drawing from a very shallow pool - the days of Ireland teams packed with top Premiership players like the Keanes or Duff are long gone. My God, I honestly remember a time when we could have Liam Brady on the bench - not even starting, but on the bench unfathomable riches compared to now. RTE tried very hard to evoke sentiment with their pre-match tribute to Brady on his retirement as a commentator. Lads, ye are about as effective at evoking real emotion as one of those eejits on Love Island, so please just never try to do that nonsense again.

James McClean picked up his 100th cap and was one of Ireland's best players on the night. Don't get excited - we're still talking about Gibraltar, who have roughly the same population as the Killarney Valley (around 33,000, and no, I'm not joking). Gibraltar actually has one of the most interesting histories and polyglot cultures of anywhere in the world, but it's better known as a retirement home for British ex-pats than soccer, so let's get real. I like McClean – I don't necessarily agree with his politics but it stems from his personal experiences and I appreciate his honesty. But if you were picking between a prime Liam Brady (who was a much better tackler than is remembered now, and probably the best passer we have ever had) and James McClean, it wouldn't be a long debate.

Blaming Stephen Kenny for Ireland's woes is an easy answer, but it is absolutely ludicrous. I don't know what magic pill people expect a new manager to bring in. Chris |Hughton is favourite to get the role, and I rate him hugely as a manager who gets the best out of limited team. John O'Shea is young, but I wouldn't be afraid to give him a shot. Someone whom nobody has mentioned and I would be genuinely considering would be Vera Pauw, 'cause that's easily the most successful manager of an Irish team since the pragmatic days of Bobby Charlton's older brother. There's talk of Lee Carsley, but why on earth would the successful English U21 manager remotely want the job? Denis O'Brien ain't providing any big supplement to the salary anymore; the Irish senior team doesn't even have a main sponsor. The problems are deep and largely self-inflicted.

I don't really see why anyone would take on that job. The public expectations on an Irish manager are so far out of sync with the reality that I actually genuinely admire Irish supporters' seemingly endless capacity for selfdelusion.



#### RIGHTS OF YOUNG WORKERS

I just turned 15 and have finished school for the summer, can I get a summer job?

You can get a summer job, but if you are a young worker and in full-time education, you are protected by different employment laws than adults. The

If you are aged between 14 and 18 and work for an employer, you are a young worker. The law sets out different rules for young workers depending on their

Workers aged 14 and 15 are classed as 'children'
Workers aged 16 and 17 are classed as 'young persons'

What do I need to give to the employer so I can work? You must show the employer a copy of your birth certificate or provide other

Because you are under 16, you must also get written permission from your parent or guardian.

How many hours can I work?
The number of hours you can work and the types of jobs you can do, depends

Employers can employ children aged 14 and 15 years on light work as follows: Children aged 14 or over can work during the school holidays, up to 7 hours in

on an approved work experience or educational programme. Children under 16 must have at least 21 days off work during summer holidays.

#### What breaks am I entitled to?

4 hours of work, and 14 consecutive hours off between shifts. You must have 2 days off a week.

Most herbs are very easy to grow. They can be grown in the garden in vegetable beds or raised beds or in containers like a window box on a window sill. There are a lot of different types of herbs, but the most commonly grown herbs for culinary use are the likes of basil and dill which are annuals and have to be sown every year, parsley and chervil which are biennials last for two years while herbs like fennel, mint, tarragon are perennials.

If you want to grow mint, make sure you plant it in a container and not in the ground as it is a very invasive herb.

Even if you are not using your herbs for culinary use, it is important to pick them regularly, otherwise they tend to go to seed very guickly.


Welcome back dear student. "There is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus, who do not walk according to the flesh, but according to the Spirit. For the law of the Spirit of Life in Christ Jesus has made me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 8:1-2). Last week we saw how difficult earthly relationships can hinder one from receiving God the Father's tender Love (Psalms 103:13). Another obstacle stopping one from coming into the fullness of the Love of God is condemnation or feeling unworthy - stemming from rejection or inferiority experienced during childhood, or a sense of guilt over sin, or shame from a painful past. These toxic emotions prevent people from having relationship with God. The Bible calls Satan 'the accuser of the brethren' (Revelation 12:10). He constantly accuses us in the Court of Heaven in the same way that a prosecutor brings a case against the defendant. God is the Judge and Satan (which incidentally means: 'an adversary who opposes in a court of law'), builds his case by recounting all the times each one of us sinned and broke God's Commandments.

Ok - I know your 'halo' is glittering friend — but seriously, we have all sinned and fallen short of God's Glory (Romans 3:23). However, this is where our adversary Satan thinks he holds the trump card — the threat of exposing secret shame. But the devil has no answer for what God did through His Son Jesus! (Colossians 2:13-15) If Satan had grasped God's brilliant plan of Salvation, he would never have allowed Jesus to be crucified (1 Corinthians 2:8). Because Jesus had never sinned, His Blood was perfect, like the unblemished Passover lamb in the Old Covenant. So, Jesus became the Lamb of God. There is no more need of continual sacrifices or offerings to appease for sin because Jesus paid the full price that was due for every human being to be forgiven and set free when they simply repent of sin and believe in Him as Lord and Saviour (Hebrews 7:26-28; Hebrews 10:10-18). "For with the heart one believes unto Righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto Salvation" (Romans 10:9-13). This means that when anyone calls upon the Lord Jesus for Salvation, believes in their heart that He is the Son of God, that He was born of the virgin (i.e. God is His Father, not a man), and that He died for us to pay the ransom that was due for our sins so that we could be redeemed from the curse of sin and death, we become part-takers of God's Salvation - brought into His family as sons and daughters (2 Corinthians 6:18). It's a free gift, Hallelujah!

At that moment of restoration - and let's go back to the court of Heaven for this -God, the Judge, bangs down the hammer and declares to Satan: "Not Guilty - Case Dismissed!" Why? Because the Blood of Jesus is still upon the Mercy Seat in Heaven. And Jesus Himself is at the right hand of God interceding for you and me. It goes something like this.... 'Father, the accuser is bringing charges against your child but Father...My sacrifice.... My Blood brought Mercy, Forgiveness, Redemption, Reconciliation and Peace for him and for her.' "They overcame him with the Blood of the Lamb and the word of their testimony" (Revelation 12:11). Friend, God your Father is reaching out to you today in Love — receive Jesus, and let His Peace eradicate all shame and condemnation. Case dismissed - Forever!
