

# Yvonne's star will shine brightly

She lit up Killarney through her boundless energy and her great sense of enthusiasm when rising to any challenge so it is appropriate that the late Yvonne Quill will again shine brightly over her beloved hometown this Christmas.

The feature star at the top of the spectacular Tree of Light, on the grounds of St Mary's Cathedral, will take on an extra special meaning during the festive season as it will be dedicated to the memory of the remarkable tidy towns champion who passed away on September 30. A very successful businesswoman and master baker, Yvonne was the driving force behind the Killarney Looking Good project and the Killarney Tidy Towns Committee, leading by example at voluntary clean-ups and flower planting initiatives and donning the yellow bib and rolling up her sleeves at every available opportunity.

Killarney got serious about its commitment to the national tidy towns competition when Yvonne took over at the helm and her greatest achievement was inspiring the town to the prestigious overall title of Ireland's Tidiest Town in 2011, the same year that it topped the Irish Business Against Litter League.

Since then, Killarney has constantly featured among the top contenders, winning several gold medals and other accolades in the years since she brought home that landmark top

Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President and voluntary chairman of the Christmas in Killarney Festival, Niall Kelleher, said Yvonne is remembered with great affection and appreciation by everybody that has the best interests of Killarney at heart.

"Yvonne was a wonderful ambassador for Killarney. She worked with such dedication and with a real sense of purpose and she encouraged those around her to do likewise," he said.

"She was totally dependable and she was always willing to play her part, be it through implementing education programmes in schools, liaising with groups of residents or encouraging public representatives to take that extra step to give Killarney the edge," Mr Kelleher added.

"She led by example and she never asked anyone to do something she wouldn't do herself.

"Yvonne was a great businesswoman, a real motivating force and an undisputed community hero. Dedicating the star at the top of the tree to this great woman's memory is our small way of remembering such a very special person," Mr Kelleher said.

Yvonne was honoured with the title of grand marshal at the 2019 St Patrick's Day parade in Killarney and, in her role as a community stalwart, she was also invited to meet the then Prince of Wales and Duchess of Cornwall when they visited Killarney the previous year.

Yvonne, from Barleymount, passed peacefully after a great life and a short illness and she is survived by her husband, John, children Peter, Sandra and Sean, son-in-law Peter, daughter-in-law Mairéad, grandchildren Anna, Jake, Ted, Abby and Luke, sister Angela and many other relatives and friends.

Her family will join Mayor of Killarney and Chamber of Tourism and Commerce President, Niall Kelleher, and Killarney Parish

Administrator, Fr Kieran O'Brien, at a special ceremony to officially switch on the Tree of Light in the grounds of St Mary's Cathedral.

From that moment on, Yvonne's enormous contribution to her town will be fondly remembered by the appreciative local people each time they pass the spectacular tree this Christmas.

Over 4,500 twinkling bulbs will adorn the


magnificent 100ft Californian Redwood this year but the collective eye of the public will constantly be drawn to the sparkling feature at the top – Yvonne's star – which will remind everybody who knew her of a very special, dedicated and caring person.

Yvonne Quill might have passed on – but her indomitable spirit will live on this Christmas and beyond in the town she loved so well.

The switching-on ceremony for the Christmas in Killarney Tree of Light, on the grounds of St Mary's Cathedral, will take place immediately after 6.15pm Mass on Thursday, December 1st. Killarney Parish Administrator, Fr Kieran O'Brien, and the Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Niall Kelleher, will officiate at the ceremony.

The star at the top of the tree will be dedicated to the memory of Yvonne Quill, the Killarney Tidy Towns champion who led her home town to the prestigious overall award in the competition in 2011.

Members of the late Ms Quill's family will be in attendance on the night.

### KERRY PUBLIC REMINDED TO BE 'WINTER READY' THIS WINTER

Statutory and public bodies in Kerry are urging members of the public to be prepared for the winter months and to be 'Winter Ready.' The HSE, Kerry County Council and An Garda Síochána are encouraging households to make preparations for adverse weather and to ensure that neighbours reach out to older or vulnerable households at this time to ensure that they are prepared for any potential winter weather. The Kerry agencies are working closely with their counterparts in Cork as part of the Cork and Kerry Interagency Emergency Management Office coordination of the response to winter emergencies.

The local organisations are drawing the attention of the public to the winterready.ie website which has useful tips and information for members of the public, including advice on how to avoid trips and falls, and how to make sure your home and family are prepared for winter.

The HSE Department of Public Health for the region is encouraging the public to protect the health service this winter by taking up both the flu and COVID-19 vaccines when they are offered. Walk-in clinics are available for anyone who hasn't received the full course of COVID-19 vaccines, and certain groups are now being offered booster vaccines. The flu vaccine is also available at the moment free of charge to certain groups, including healthcare workers, those aged over 65, and children aged between 2 and 17.

# 'Impossible choices' for people in need this Christmas

as SVP South-West face 'toughest Christmas and New Year in decades' SOUTH WEST Covering Cork and Kerry CHRISTIMAS DRAWY

With over 1,150 calls for help per week made to SVP South-West in October, a 30% increase on last year and with crippling energy costs, soaring fuel prices, and unprecedented demand for food place severe strain on resources, the cost of living crisis is pushing lower income earners further and further into poverty trap.

St. Vincent De Paul (SVP) South-West says they are facing their most demanding Christmas and winter period in several decades as vulnerable people are being forced to choose between heating their homes or feeding themselves or their families this year.

With the cost-of-living crisis deepening, the charity is reporting that more people than ever are seeking help in the run up to the festive and winter season, and in a bid to raise money, they have launched their Christmas Car Draw.

The calls are expected to reach a peak of 1,400 calls per week in December as the Society has revealed significant numbers of people in Cork and Kerry are reaching out to them seeking assistance as they struggle to cope with sky-high energy costs, increased prices for fuel and dramatic rises in the price of food.

The charity has also revealed that the most significant increase in calls this year is coming from lower-income earners in full-time employment. Speaking to Killarney Outlook this week, Breda Dwyer, St. Vincent de Paul, Killarney Area President has thanked everyone who has supported St. Brigid's Conference of St Vincent de Paul during the year.

"Our shop, Vincent's in New Street Car Park is open 5 days a week Monday to Saturday and we are planning a special day, this Sunday

27th November for Christmas shopping and are inviting everyone to come along and enjoy a cup

of tea and a mince pie", Breda said.

"The shop is a great source of income which allows Volunteers to assist those who are in need of help in the following parishes Killarney, Kilcummin, Glenflesk, Fossa, Beaufort because of rising costs of everything", she added.

The main fundraising activity for St. Vincent de Paul is the Christmas Collection which takes place on Saturday 10th and Sunday 11th December at all Churches and the Christmas Jumper Day which is on 16th December and everyone is asked to support them both.

The key fundraising drive for SVP South-West across Cork and Kerry is the Annual Car Draw which has again been extended to Kerry this year and funds generated there will be used to support people in need in Kerry.

"Tickets are on sale for €5 each and 5 for €20 Euros and are on sale in Vincent Shop and from any of our members until 1st week of January", Breda added.

St Vincent de Paul own 25 apartments will be refurnishing 6 apartments at St Anne's Road in Killarney. "We will distribute hampers etc before Christmas. If you need assistance or would like to volunteer please call (087)6164888 or write to SVP Ozanam House Green Lawn Killarney", Breda added.

### Bon Secours Hospital Tralee to be NEW HEALTH PARTNER TO KERRY GAA

Don Secours Hospital Tralee (BSHT) is to be the new health partner to Kerry GAA (KGAA) following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding, it has been announced.

Under this Memorandum of Understanding ('MOU'), KGAA and BSHT will collaborate across a range of mutually beneficial areas. This collaboration will include our elite players having access to Physiotherapy Services, certain diagnostic testing, DEXA scans and other diagnostics as required. The collaboration will also include BSHT basing their Physiotherapy Out-Patient Service in the Currans Centre of Excellence along with other office based staff.

The document was signed on behalf of the Bon Secours Hospital Tralee by Mr TJ O'Connor, CEO and on behalf of the KGAA by Kerry GAA Chairman, Mr Patrick O'Sullivan. The partnership has been agreed initially until 2027 and both the hospital and the KGAA are keen to see this partnership develop into a longer-term relationship.

Mr Patrick O'Sullivan, Chairman of Kerry GAA said that the new agreement will be of great benefit to KGAA saying "having access to the facilities, services and people in the Bon Secours Hospital Tralee for our elite GAA teams is an imperative in the modern game. Quick access to diagnostic testing and scanning plays a critical role in facilitating early

diagnosis, rehabilitation and return to play. Having this speedy access to these services and the range of specialist at the Bon Secours Hospital Tralee will ensure that our players receive the best possible care and are back on the pitch as soon as possible. This is hugely important to us and we look forward to developing and expanding our partnership with BSHT over the coming years".

#### **BIG NEWS FOR KILLARNEY**

A third level college is big news for Killarney. It is something this column has long called for, particularly for St Finan's which I still think would be an ideal third level college.

Still, the column received a compliment from Simon Harris Minister for Higher Education and we are flattered and won't raise too much dust over the choice of site. For now!

He had read some nice remarks, the minister said, referring to our description of him as "affable" while also vowing to hold him to account to provide a third level institution for Killarney. This was in the context of Minister Harris visit to Tralee last month with announcements for multi million euro campuses in Listowel and in Tralee - and nothing for Killarney

"What about Killarney?" I had asked.

This was recalled in High Street on Monday, much to my surprise, and delight. It is not often the media are remembered for anything good! Meanwhile, among those who must take a bow are Councillors Niall O'Callaghan and Marie Moloney, both members of the Kerry ETB. They actually put the suggestion of council owned Pretty Polly/Sara Lee on the table in October 2021 as a site for a college of the future.

The Killarney councillors had a very receptive colleague in ETB chairman in Jim Finucane, let it be acknowledged. The respected Tralee Fine Gael councillor pushed the idea for a Killarney

Meetings also took place between Brendan Griffin TD and Minister Harris with hospitality industry representatives.

Cork were in competition with Killarney and this warning note was sounded early. I have it on some authority that our Taoiseach himself was eyeing the multi million euro campus for his own constituency.

However, in the words of Brendan Griffin on Monday "Minister Simon Harris has been a very good friend to Kerry".

Monday's was the minister's fourth visit to Kerry in eight months, Brendan noted.

And while it will not focus solely on training for the hospitality sector - apprenticeships, and new energy will also be part of the parcel - this is a real start for Killarney. It is also a great boost for the Upper Park Road which has been suffering of late.

As for accommodation - more houses will be needed, that is for sure. But there is also money now for student accommodation.

When you think back to the Torc Hotel and its winter hotel training school - wasn't it an idea before its time? Was it not one of those good ideas that should never have been discontinued? Not alone had you excellent training, but you had accommodation for students from all over Ireland. Some ideas should never be allowed to die.

#### **PUMPKINS ARE NOT THE ONLY ISSUE IN THE KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK**

Big orange pumpkins are stark objects in the forests this time of year. And if it is not their stand-out colour that attracts attention - it's the smell. These things stink when decomposing.

Not so long ago the only pumpkin we came across was in tales of Cinderella and talk of pumpkin carriages. But pumpkins for Halloween are a growing trend and tonnes of the amber coloured squashes are bought for ornament now.

Pumpkin carcasses are being left in the woodlands in the mistaken belief that this kind of natural disintegration will help the environment, rangers say.

They have come across a number of huge rotting pumpkins in the woods this year.

Far from being of benefit to wild creatures, the discarded pumpkins are actually a menace - particularly to smaller animals going into hibernation.

This week the Killarney National Park Education Centre sounded a warning. Pumpkins should be chopped up and placed in compost bins or made into soup or pumpkin pie but not left on the forest floor to rot.

"Pumpkins are not native to the Irish woodlands, disposing of pumpkins in woodlands this time of year can have a very negative affect, making

small mammals very ill," Chris Barron of the National Park Education Centre said.

The thought of a hedgehog going into hibernation with severe indigestion should be enough to put anyone off dumping a pumpkin! But are pumpkins the only threat to the forest floor? This column has been made aware of the threat to the mushroom population in the park. Apparently mushroom picking has grown phenomenally. Removal of mushrooms or other material from the park is actually not allowed and reminders are probably necessary. There is some concern among wildlife rangers that indiscriminate picking of fungi is threatening a number of varieties.

#### **MORE B&BS NEEDED**

An appeal for more B&Bs in Killarney is not something we thought we would ever hear.

But apparently there is an acute shortage. And the wonderful organisation B&B



Ireland and its chief executive Helena Healy want people to open their homes and contact them and they will get all the advice they need. Demand is outstripping supply, Helena says.

Killarney has a long history of bed and breakfast, of opening family homes to business and of acting as ambassadors for Ireland to foreign guests.

The B&B traditionally was a woman's business at a time when women were not allowed work apart from a limited number of professions such as teaching.

It gave Killarney women a huge degree of independence. Sixty years ago it was not easy to set out on the road of revamping a house, making sure everything was perfect for guests as well as looking after and rearing a family. And making it all pay. There is no doubt there was stress as well as joy. But all life is a balance and overall women and their children benefited. There was resistance. I still recall the local reports of how one medic observing the growing B&B phenomenon in Killarney guipped: "The Friary steps and the bed and breakfast have the women of the town driven mad!" Doubtless these were the days when daily mass was a meditational and social outlet after the rush of clearing the breakfast tables and making the beds.

Now not alone has the attendance at daily mass declined, but the bed and breakfast itself is on the wane. And this at a time when homes have never been grander.

Who knows, there may be women - and men out there who will answer the call. At least for the B&B.

From tiny acorns...31,375 acorns to be exact

### A wonderful project by Killarney National Park

Over 30,000 acorns were gathered by National Park and Wildlife Service Outdoor Staff from the ancient Derrycunnihy native Oak woodlands and Muckross Gardens, Killarney National Park.

The Oak woodlands at Killarney National Park form the most extensive and oldest areas of native woodlands in Ireland and Northern Europe. It has the largest Yew woodland, which occurs along the Muckross Peninsula. The work carried out was supervised by Horticulturalist Gerry Murphy and Gardener Stephen Moore. The Outdoor Staff painstakingly potted or sewed 31,375 acorns to be exact, mainly Sessile Oak, which is native to Ireland. The mammoth task will ensure that our native woodlands will continue for generations and centuries to come. Stephen Moore, Head Gardener, said "What we have here is the forest of the future, germination will take place in early Spring, and come Summer time, the pots will be on benches outdoors for at least two more seasons before being planted out"

The precious acorns were all collected from registered collection areas of local provenance within the Killarney National Park. Other plant species for future gathering will include, Yew, Birch, Holly and Alder.

The Outdoor Staff working in the National Park onsite poly tunnel, included, James Doherty, David Fitzgerald, Sjoerd van Wierst, Luke O'Sullivan, Brendan Lynch and Cathal Sexton. They also seeded English Oak, and Arbutus tree on Muckross Peninsula, one of the few places it grows in Europe. Horticulturist Gerry Murphy explained "We're encouraging the planting of more native trees in Killarney National Park. Going back to the original owners of Muckross Estate, the Herberts of

Muckross, they had their own extensive nursery for planting native trees. Today the 300 year old champion Oak tree in the landscaped garden is still growing strong...Sometimes Nature needs our help from time to time"

Killarney National Park has over 610 hectares of the most important ancient native oak woodland in Ireland. Oak can live for over 500 years and one of the biggest oaks in Killarney National Park is the Royal Oak on the shores of Lough Lein. The Yew woodland on the Muckross Peninsula is one of the three largest natural yew woods in Europe. The centrepiece iconic Yew in Muckross Abbey is believed to be over 550 years old.

### 10 YEARS OF THE 54321 CHALLENGE SEES €100,270 RAISED

With one man completing the challenge in 24 hours the 54321 Challenge has raised €100,270 for 10 very deserving Kerry Charities.

Jamie O'Sullivan from Dromid brought the challenge to new heights completing all events in 24 hours.

The 54321 Challenge started 10 years ago with a team of 5 People over 4 DAYS, completing 3 CYCLES, and climbing 2 MOUNTAINS for 1 Cause – a local charity.

This year 50 participants undertook the 4-day challenge, which took place from Thursday 18th to Sunday 21st of August 2022 inclusive.

This included the following.

Day 1 (Thursday 18th) - Cycle the Ring of Kerry. Day 2 (Friday 19th) - Climb Carrantuohill.

Day 3 (Saturday 20th) - Cycle from Killorglin via the Ballaghasheen Pass to Cahirciveen and climbed Cnoc Na Tobair.

Day 4 (Sunday 21st) – 70km Cycle starting on the Skellig Ring and finishing in Killorglin.

Day 1- Saw the team taking on the Ring of Kerry leaving Fossa GAA Pitch in the early hours of the morning. Initially there was very heavy rain but this could not dampen the spirits of the team. They were met with great support along the route and all arrived home safely.

Day 2 - Saw the team climbing Carrantuohill, despite heavy rainfall on reaching the top of the mountain, the heads were up, and the singing voices were on and a massive thanks to our Guides Donal Cronin, Connie Doyle and Damien Quigg on the day who knew the mountain like the back of their hands. The clouds lifted for a descent of the mountain and we had some of the clearest views to be seen on the reeks.

Day 3 - Saw the team cycling to Cahirciveen via the Ballaghasheen Pass this was definitely not for the faint hearted and was a fair test of all participants on reaching Cahirciveen they

then climbed Cnoc Na Tobair, some participants thought let's relax the muscles with a swim in Coonanna Harbour.

Day 4 - Saw the team start on the Skellig Ring and took in Valentia, Portmagee and then headed on route to Cahirciveen to return to Killorglin, the sun was out and the spirits were high and the sights were on the finish line.

Testament to the popularity of the event is the fact that over 80% of this year's participants had completed the challenge previously over the first 9 years some who have not missed a year since its commencement in 2013. But as always the new participant added a new lease of life and added to the 54321 Challenge experience which is predominately all about people the people who are doing it and the people we are trying to raise much needed funds to support.

The Aim of the 54321 Challenge 2022 was to raise €100,000 and this was exceeded by €270. This is greatly appreciated by the 10 Kerry Charities who benefited The Irish Pilgrimage Trust, Kerry Hospice, Comfort for Chemo Kerry, Adapt Kerry, Skellig Stars, Cystic Fibrosis Kerry, Sera Huskey, Heartbeat Killarney, Alannah and Polly's Fight for Sight and Scoil lognaid Ris Dingle.

For the 10th year, one man decided to bring the challenge to new heights and test the theory can this be done in 24 hours, this man was Jamie O'Shea from Dromid who had previously completed the challenge over four days decided to attempt it in just 24 hours and he knocked it out of the Park by completing it in just 22.5 hours. He did so in true style Jamie started at 15.00 on Saturday the 20th August with his back up team by cycling the Ring of Kerry, climbing Carrauntoohil in the Dark, cycling on to Caherciveen in the Dark and climbing Cnoc na dTobar to see the sun rise, He then joined the rest of the 54321 Challenge team on the Sunday

morning to complete the fourth day of the task to finish in Killorglin. Jamie decided to fundraise specifically for Skellig Stars Athletics Club which is very close to his heart.

A major contributor to this year's fundraising efforts were a number of Spinathon Days where this year's participants, volunteers from all the Charities, family and friends took the streets in different locations around the county on spinning bikes. These events took place in Cahirciveen, Killorglin, Listowel, Dingle, Killarney and the final one in Tralee on Saturday the 27th August 2022. Thanks to everyone who made these Spinathons possible, to all the volunteers, and thanks to all the members of the public who gave their support and generous donations, and finally yet importantly thanks to An Garda Síochána and especially James Foley for his help with the organisation of the Spinathons.

This brings the total raised to date by the Challenge to €400,250 supporting a number of very deserving Kerry Charities over the years.

The 54321 Challenge Committee and Participants came back together again on Friday 11th November at Francie Sheahans in Killorglin to present the cheque to the 10 Charities.

### Donie O'Sullivan

### A Footballer, Once

onie O'Sullivan - A Footballer, Once is set to be launched on Friday 2nd December at 7.30pm in in the Spa Clubhouse.

The book, which is co-written with Jimmy O'Sullivan Darcy charts the life of Donie O'Sullivan who came from a small farming family in Tiernaboul. Small for his age, he never really made a Sem team, although at least one good judge of football in the school prophesied that the small lad would be the best of them all yet. With Spa practically defunct because of a lack of playing numbers, Donie joined Dr. Crokes. He was already starting to fill out and stake a place on a senior team when he entered Maynooth. There, in the company of other major talents of the era and with a heavy focus on sport and study, Donie filled out and was soon recognised as one of the best footballers in that somewhat insular colleges of those days Maynooth students did not compete in the Sigerson in those days and the idea of being released from study to play football was simply

In his free time, though, Donie was becoming firmly established as a midfielder with Dr. Crokes. They could never quite get past the mighty Mitchels team of that era, but Donie's all-round ability, but especially his prodigious kicking, brought him to the attention of intercounty selectors. He was an unused sub with the Kerry Juniors. Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan was looking to supplement his defence and Donie made his senior inter-county debut in a famous baptism of fire against Cork in the Munster Final of 1962. He gave a tremendous display against the legendary Kevin Heffernan in the All Ireland semi-final, but was back in Maynooth and listening to the match on an illicit radio when Kerry beat Roscommon in that final.


In 1963 he started teaching in Dublin and soon enhanced his national reputation with Clann na Gael in the fiercely contested Senior County Championships. He was an automatic starter for Kerry alongside the likes of Johnny Culloty, Niall Sheehy, Mick O'Dwyer, Tom Long, and of course the great Mick O'Connell, one of course the

his closest friends to this day. As great as that team was, they struggled against the Mayo side of that era, losing three years in a row. Players were mostly responsible for their own training in those days – collective training was a rarity and only for major games. Donie didn't drive at the time but a friend of his from St. Pats teaching college did and would bring him to train – it was Micheál Ó Muircherataigh's first direct involvement with Kerry, though far from his last!

The tide began to turn his way in the late sixties. Donie was playing for his native Spa by then – Dr. Crokes willingly signed the transfer – and Donie inspired them to a famous O'Donoghue Cup victory in 1966, the year that the club was first re-constituted. With the likes of the Gleesons, Pat Casey, Johnny Doolan, John Kelly, and Johnny Batt Cronin on board, Spa quickly established themselves as a real force. Mick Gleeson and Eamonn Fitzgerald would often travel down from Dublin in Donie's car before they togged out on different sides in O'Donoghue Cup matches!

Donie spent a lot of 1966 studying in New York. Even there he caught the eye, with the New York Jets keen to sign up this Irish kicker. Donie gave it real consideration, but the lure of his áit duchais proved too strong, a decision he has never regretted.

East Kerry already had one County Championship to their name in 1965 and were clearly a growing force. Ireland was abandoning the old principles of economic and religious insularity and it was leading to booms in manufacturing and tourism (supported by international investment), law, education, and especially living standards. The constant flow of emigration had slowed enough for communities to prosper and GAA clubs were a huge beneficiary as players were able to earn a living in Ireland. It was yielding rewards on sports fields, especially in East Kerry, who claimed three County titles in a row and the first ever All Ireland Senior Club Championship in 1971. A great and too often forgotten Offalv



team that included Willie Bryan and Paddy McCormack among other notables won that All Ireland, but Donie's performances along the way were recognised with Kerry's first ever All Star Award – he already had a Cúchulainn Award, making him one of the very few to win both. Donie was there four years later, four years in which Cork claimed one All Ireland and looked set to win many more, sitting on the bench when a young Kerry team embraced their destiny and changed football forever, challenged all the way by a great Dublin team under Donie's old playing opponent Kevin Heffernan.

To imagine that Donie was ever just a footballer does and enormous disservice to a great family man on some very hard days, a dedicated teacher who inculcated his values into generations of young students, and a highly educated patriot who lectured for many years on Irish studies in San Diego and worked with the Glucksman Institute in New York on Irish projects. Donie O'Sullivan is and has always been far more than a footballer, but he was indeed A Footballer Once.

His biography, co-written with Jimmy O'Sullivan Darcy, will be launched on Friday, December 2nd, in the Spa Clubhouse at 7.30pm. All are welcome.

### THE COST OF REBUILDING A HOUSE CONTINUES TO ESCALATE

#### JOHN HEALY FROM HEALY INSURANCE ON THE AVERAGE COST OF REBUILDING A HOUSE

The average cost of rebuilding a house in Ireland has risen by an average of 21% over the past 12 months according to the most recent rebuilding guide issued by the Society of Chartered surveyors, SCSI.

The causes for the continuing acceleration of costs are many and new challenges such as energy

costs are adding to the issues.

The construction sector has battled shortages of materials, labour shortages and overall inflation in the wider economy. The war in Ukraine and the current energy crisis are going to have consequences on the cost of materials which in turn will feed into rebuilding costs as the winter progresses.

Your property should be insured for the reinstatement cost and not the market value. In other words the cost of rebuilding the house excluding the site value. Bear in mind that currently the rebuild cost could be higher than the market value.

The base rebuilding costs in the Kerry region are running at an average of €220-€240 a square foot (or €2435 per square metre for a 4 bed detached house of 119 square metres) in the most recently published guide.

Bear in mind the guide is based upon estate type houses built since the 1960s. The calculation should account for the most recent building regulations, professional fees, demolition costs and VAT, and should make provision for higher than average fittings, built in wardrobes, fences, walls, and garages. It is very important to note that "under insurance" can

have a serious effect on any future claims settlements. Most policies include an "Average Clause" which means in the event of "under insurance" any claims settlement can be reduced in value in proportion to the degree of under insurance. Where the Sum Insured is only 75% of the total reinstatement cost, you will receive 75% of the agreed cost of reinstatement, whether the claim is made for partial reinstatement or total loss. I would recommend that you review your reinstatement sum insured sooner rather than later and continue to review during the year. In order to get a definitive individual reinstatement value on your house you should contact an independent qualified surveyor.


Patrick O'Sullivan Greene has worked in business and finance for most of his career, and is back in his native Killarney after living in Dublin, London, New York and France.

There were 9 schools in total from Kerry, with projects shortlisted for the national final in Dublin.

The first project titled 'M.S.- getting on your nerves' has Amy Mc Carty, Bella Harmon, Emma O Donoghue and Katie Kerins in the group. The project involves an investigation into viral marketing and what form of media is best received by young people. They will then examine what means is most effective to spread awareness of MS (Multiple Sclerosis).

The students are presently working with MS Ireland and have already become MS Ambassadors. This has involved presenting workshops to primary school students about MS and to encourage them to take part in the MS Readathon in November.

The second project is as Gaeilge and is being undertaken by Caitríona Murphy. An tideal ar an tionscnamh ná 'Anailís Staitistiúil ar Dhearcadh Déagóirí na hÉireann vs Déagóirí na Breataine Bige i Leith foghlaim a dTeangacha Dúchais. ( A Statistical Analysis on the Attitudes of Irish Teenagers vs Welsh Teenagers Towards Learning Their Native Languages.) The results of this project will provide some very interesting reading for Irish educationalists. The new Junior certificate in Irish has been criticized by

virtually every Irish language teacher in the country due to the very strong emphasis on literature. Students attending a Gaelcholáiste now sit a different Irish exam to English speaking secondary schools. They have to study even more literature and are marked at a higher standard. The optional oral exam that was worth 40% for the Junior Cert has been removed much to the dismay of Irish language teachers. Both teachers and students struggle to provide a positive review of the course. We await in anticipation to find out what the youth of this country will have to say and how it compares to young people studying Welsh..... Two very interesting and topical projects. ### TAKE THE NON-STOP ELEVATOR OR CLIMB THE LADDER TO AN HONOURS **DEGREE AT LEVEL 8**



#### **DECISIONS**

As soon as the CAO facility opens for applicationseach year, the minds of college aspirants begin to focus. All of a sudden there is a sense of urgency about getting the course choices in order. The clock is ticking. Decisions have to be made. The closing date is fast approaching. The conversation is top heavy with third level choices, college locations, distance from home, types of accommodation and all matters relevant to moving on to higher education. Of course, all of that is very understandable. While it's an anxious time for young people, it's also a very exciting time as they begin to realise that the end of the beginning is drawing near. The next phase of the journey, leaving home and moving on to independent living and learning, is not very far away.

#### **REGISTER**

CAO encourages applicants to register early to avoid a late January rush. A discounted application fee of €30 applies for those who open their accounts by 20th January. Thereafter, until the normal closing date of 1st February, the application fee is €45. A discount of 33.3% is very generous and not to be sniffed at, especially when dosh is scare in these inflationary times. As the CAO form is interactive, an applicant can log on at will until the closing date. Other than that, the remaining two months should be devoted to course research.

#### **SCHEDULE**

It's important to maintain the study schedule right up to the Christmas holidays. In fact, for those who haven't done so already, target grades and points should be set for the Christmas in-house test. For example, a student who hopes to achieve 450 points in the Leaving Cert exam should be in the 400 to 425 range by Christmas. End of first term is also a time for review and reflection. In the immortal words of Agatha Christie's most famous detective, Hercule Poirot, order and method are vital in bringing a project to a successful conclusion. That sentiment is very relevant to

exam preparation. So, the Christmas holiday period should be used to review one's time management of the first term. Consider what you did well and where improvements can be made going forward.

#### **CHOICES**

During January, CAO applicants will need to focus on course choices. Courses which are restricted must be included on the form by normal closing date of 1st February. Other than that, courses can be added or withdrawn during the change of mind facility which closes on 1st July. In fact, thousands of applicants don't list any courses by 1st February, preferring to do so later on. My personal view is that course choices should be listed by 1st February. It brings the psychological closure of having the task done and dusted until the Leaving Cert exam has been completed. The choices can then be revisited, if required, up to 1st July.

There are two paths to an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8). Option one is the ab initio Level 8 course. That option is now available in all CAO colleges as the Institutes of Technology, now Technological Universities, have been expanding the number of Level 8 courses available in their colleges, Most of the Level 8 courses are of four years duration, although some are three or five years long. The risk factor is that no award is made until the course has been successfully completed. If you drop out on route, you get no qualification.

#### STEP-BY-STEP

Option two is to take the step-by step-route by signing up for a two-year Higher Certificate (Level 6) or a three-year Ordinary Bachelor Degree (Level 7). After two years, a successful student is conferred with the award of Higher Certificate. Those who successfully complete a third year are conferred with an Ordinary Bachelor Degree at Level 7. They can then progress to an Honours Bachelor Degree at Level 8. This is commonly referred to as 'the ladder system' and suits those who aren't ready to commit to a Level 8 degree or who may have come up short on Leaving Cert points.

#### **COMFORT LEVEL**

The two options allow people to enter higher education at their own comfort learning level. The traditional big seven of UCD, TCD, DCU, Maynooth, University of Galway, UL and UCC, with a few exceptions, offer Honours Bachelor Degree courses only but the new Technological Universities of TUS, MTU, ATU, SETU, TUD and DkIT offer the three levels. In addition to the other colleges in the CAO system, there is plenty of choice for each and every applicant. Use it well and wisely.

# **GREEN LIGHT FOR COLLEGE** OF THE FUTURE AT OLD PRETTY POLLY SITE

here was a widespread welcome for the news that Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, Simon Harris TD has given the green light for Kerry ETB to proceed to the next stage in developing a College of The Future (COTF) Campus in Killarney this week.

On February 14th 2022 the Minister announced a new €430 million capital programme for the further and higher education sector. In responding to a call for submissions, Kerry ETB prepared and submitted a Strategic Assessment Report (SAR) for the establishment of a Kerry College Killarney Campus. The development of a Further Education and Training (FET) Campus in Killarney has been a long-held ambition for Kerry ETB.

The proposed campus when developed will include, a National Centre of Excellence for Hospitality training, a National Centre of Excellence for Renewable Energy and Sustainable Green training, a Regional Centre of Excellence for Apprenticeship training and a Regional Centre of Excellence for Lifelong Learning, providing training opportunities with capacity for over 3000 learners per year.

The project proposal involves the repurposing of the existing buildings of the former Sara Lee and Pretty Polly factories in Killarney. The site is circa 2 hectares (4.94 acres) with existing buildings footprint of circa 11,000 square meters, primarily comprised of the original single-story factory building which as constructed in the late 1960s with production ceasing in 2009.

Speaking today, Minister Harris said: "This is a brilliant day for Kerry. Killarney has been chosen as one of ten locations to proceed to develop a further education College of the Future. "The College of the Future Major Projects Fund will support the implementation

of the vision set out in the Further Education Strategy. This Fund, and proposed for development in Killarney has the potential to deliver on a range of strategic objectives, including driving economic growth and social development, providing digital teaching and learning facilities, the expansion of courses delivered and the creation of centres of excellence. It is great that the Killarney proposal will now proceed to a business case. The site is located just off the N22 National Primary Road offering ease of access from all major road routes into Killarney. The site also provided for ample onsite parking with less than 2 kilometres access to the Killarney town centre and Bus/Rail stations.

Courses on offer in the developed campus will include courses such as Culinary Arts, Hospitality Management and Operations, Bar Skills, Barista Skills, Passive House Retrofitting, Smart Meter Installation, Wind Turbine Blade Repair, Electric Vehicle Motor Maintenance, Fibre Installation, Welding, various Apprenticeships, Pre-apprenticeships, Software Development and a full range of evening/part time course provision.

### ON THE FUTURE OF THE PRETTY POLLY **PROPERTY**

Jerry O'Grady, Former Director of the Company looks back at Pretty Polly in Killarney

> ow gratifying to see that the longrunning Pretty Polly property saga is finally to what appears to be a most welcome and very satisfactory conclusion.

In June 1996, after 30 very successful years trading during which employment figures peaked

at c.1200 people, Pretty Polly (Killarney)/Sara Lee (Killarney) ceased operations. As part of the closure arrangements made by Pretty Polly/ Sara Lee Management, the property consisting of a 120,000 sq. ft factory on a 13-acre site was offered on a "free gift basis" to the IDA to facilitate quickly establishing a replacement industry. Unfortunately, it was not possible at the time for the IDA to accept the property so a three-person Board of Trustees was established to hold the property in trust "For the purposes of benefiting the general community of Killarney and its surrounding area". The Trustees were the UK based Group Financial Controller Sam Sturgis and former Pretty Polly Directors, Jerry O'Grady and the late Tom O'Donohoe RIP.

Between 1996 and 2000, the Trustees and the IDA jointly promoted the property internationally hosted a number of site visits by interested parties. Unfortunately, for various reasons, none of these expressions of interest were converted into occupation. In an ironic twist of fate, in early 2000, Sara Lee Branded Apparel Europe management were seeking a suitable location for a new shared manufacturing operation for various European based lingerie brands. As the Pretty Polly

property was still unoccupied it was offered to Sara Lee Europe. Following negotiations and a multi-million Euro refurbishment investment by Sara Lee Europe, manufacturing operations began once again in Killarney. Plans were in place to grow employment to 300+ within 3

The Transfer Agreement between the Trustees and Sara Lee Europe included a "buy-back clause" whereby if within a specified period, the new Sara Lee operation did not meet mutually agreed job creation/retention targets and/or ceased to operate, the Trustees would regain ownership on re-paying Sara Lee Europe an agreed proportion of their 2000/2001 buildings refurbishment expenditure. Sadly, these circumstances came to pass in 2005 and ownership was set to revert to the Trustees. Considering the key 1996 objective in setting up the Trust i.e., "For the purposes of benefiting the general community of Killarney and its surrounding area", the Trustees decided to

offer the entire property (buildings and c.13 acres) to Killarney Town Council and a threeway agreement was made to transfer the entire property to Killarney Town Council for what was a fraction of its then market value.

In the intervening 16 years, there were a number of "false dawns" and disappointments while the fabric of the building and its facilities rapidly deteriorated. But "all's well that ends well" and we are greatly heartened by Minister Harris's announcement today of the planned transformation of the Pretty Polly property into a Kerry ETB third level National Centre of Excellence for the hospitality and related sustainable energy industries. Great credit is due to all involved in the Kerry Education & Training Board and the Local Authorities in arriving at this exciting and progressive plan. It is most appropriate that Ireland's tourism capital should become the home for the industry's future sustainable development.



#### **GLAUCOMA**

This week is World Glaucoma Week.

#### WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged, it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage to vision can be prevented.

Glaucoma may not have symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests.

#### **Risk factors**

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma

#### Symptoms

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow onset) is that, in the early stages, your



eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as open-angle glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

#### **TREATMENT**

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with openangle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.



### MICHAEL MURPHY RETIRES

Words like 'icon' and 'legend' are tossed around a bit too easily for my liking in the GAA, or in any sports to be honest. For me, there has to be at least a likelihood that your name will be remembered among your own people in a hundred years time. Dick Fitzgerald, Paddy Kennedy, Austin Stack (not just for football), Con Brosnan, John Joe Sheehv....vou can make a strong argument for Paul Russell, the Landers, the Lynes, Murt Kelly. A generation later you have Johnny Culloty, Tom Long, Donie O'Sullivan....and O'Connell, the most skillful of them all. Be fair – any list without Purcell and Stockwell, the 'Terrible Twins' would be superfluous, Moclair and Langan with Mayo, Go further forward and you have a fair host from both Kerry and Dublin. Jimmy Barry Murphy, of course, that was a great Cork team. Babs Keating - people forget his football because of the hurling. The Earleys of Roscommon. Lyons and O'Rourke in Meath. Giles and Geraghty

They will talk of Michael Murphy a hundred years from now in Donegal. They will, and they should. I hope they talk about him in the Kerry football stories too, I hope we never become that insular. I liked Michael Murphy as a footballer. He had everything. Big (and 'big' does count, I'm afraid), a great fielder, deadly off both feet. A leader for Donegal on the hard days – and that county ravaged by emigration has seen plenty of hard days. Murphy was a positive footballer, not only able but eager to face one-on-one challenges. It's fairly undeniable that Ulster in recent years has had a culture of heavily defensive football. In fact, let's be honest, the success of the approach has led to the likes of Kerry, Dublin, and Mayo adopting variants of it (albeit with more of a willingness

to commit to attack, which has generally been even more successful). It doesn't make for a great spectacle, but it works.

A good few of those Donegal footballers were under-rated (McFadden in particular) – there was a certain element of 'Stepford Wives' about the public emphasis on the collective rather than individual flair to me. Michael Murphy was simply so good that his individual skill thrived even in that environment. He was Donegal's best footballer – he proved to be a great midfielder, but what a waste of scoring power. Would Kerry consider moving David Clifford back to midfield? To be honest, I hated seeing Colm Cooper dropping back, despite the uncanny prescience of his passing.

For me, Michael Murphy was quite literally the best of a generation. I'm not decrying any of that great Dublin team – James McCarthy and Bernard Brogan belong in the conversation (Connolly was genuinely brilliant but too mercurial for me, a George Best rather than a Maradonna). Colm Cooper and Declan O'Sullivan were an earlier generation, Kilkenny and Fenton a later one (with plenty of overlap, of course). But Michael Murphy had a heavier load to lift than any of them and the absolutely best feature of his game was that his brilliance was consistent. He brought it in every single game.

Michael Murphy confirmed his retirement from the inter-county scene. It's a loss to the game that will be felt well outside his native boundaries. A genuine icon of gaelic football.

## EAST KERRY CHAMPIONSHIP

**Quarter-Final:** 

Killarney Legion 0-15 Kilcummin 0-9 Kilcummin had the strong wind in their favour in the first half and opened strongly with points from Noel Duggan and Philip Casey.





James O'Donoghue opened Legion's account with a free but Cian Foley replied from play. Legion squared things with a Ryan O'Grady mark and another O'Donoghue free before Kieran Murphy pointed a '45. Legion went in front with two more frees O'Donoghue frees and a Thomas Moriarty point, with Padraig Lucey beginning to dominate the middle third, before Philip Casey (f) pulled one back to leave his side trailing by 0-6 to 0-5 at halftime – not a good omen, given that wind. Both sides were reduced to fourteen men for the second half after an altercation and Kilcummin lost another key player to a black card. Noel Duggan did level matters on the restart but five points on the trot by Legion saw them take effective control. The unstoppable James O'Donoghue had four of those and Thomas Moriarty another. The excellent Philip Casey pulled one back after Noel Duggan was twice denied by Legion keeper Brian Kelly, but Legion added two more points from Thomas Moriarty and Finbarr Murphy to make it 0-13 to 0-7 with ten minutes remaining. Kilcummin added two more points from frees by Noel Duggan but Legion never really looked like relinquishing their lead.

### Quarter-Final: Dr. Crokes 2-21 Fossa 0-6

Fossa, understandably enough, lined out without a number of regulars, including their two All Stars and Footballer of the Year. In the circumstances, they put up a decent battle, but points from the excellent Tony Brosnan, David Shaw, Mikey Casey, and Daithí Casey gave Crokes a commanding 0-9 to 0-5 lead at half-time. They upped it a gear in the second half and simply blew Fossa away at that stage, outscoring them by 2-12 to 0-1. A goal from Tony Brosnan helped him finish with a tally of 1-9, with Gavin O'Shea adding another to finish with 1-2.

### First Round: Gneeveguilla 4-13 Firies 2-14

An early goal from Paraic Finnegan set Gneeveguilla on their way and points from Conor Herlihy and Seán O'Keeffe had them 1-2 to 0-2 in front. Once again players like Ruairí Murphy, Jimmy O'Leary, Aaron O'Shea, and Joe and Damien Clifford stepped up to the mark. They led by a single point, 0-7 to 0-6, at half-time and it was still deadlocked at 0-10 to 1-7 after John Curtin goaled for Currow. However, that just seemed to spur Currow on and a goal from Aaron O'Shea plus two more from Joe Clifford saw them pull away for a convincing win.

### First Round: Spa 1-12 Rathmore 0-8

Rathmore lined out without big guns like Paul Murphy, Shane and Mark Ryan, and Brian Friel. Ryan O'Carroll and David Spillane traded early points with Darragh Rahilly (2), but two Evan Cronin points, one from the outstanding Dan O'Donoghue, and a goal from Liam Kearney put Spa in control - although Rathmore missed a goal by inches themselves. ### SOCCER

### World Cup

This is turning rapidly into a bit of a joke. Qatar is slightly smaller than Cork and Kerry combined. It has fast-tracked seven stadiums around the capital city of Doha and fairly spartan and expensive (over €350 a night) accommodation for an influx of supporters. None of those supporters would be advised to be unaccompanied women (not illegal but heavily discouraged) or gay (extremely illegal - and Qatar have stopped their previous softsoaping around that particular issue). That fast work has led to an acknowledged 6,500 deaths of migrant workers in the intense heat (it's accepted that this is an extremely conservative estimate; the real number is probably closer to double that). Others have gone unpaid or, at the absolute best, underpaid in the Kafala employment system that heavily favours the employer. It was supposedly ended two years ago, when all the negative publicity started making international headlines - reports on the ground say differently.

Because of that intense heat, FIFA decided belatedly to switch the World Cup from summer (when most leagues have finished their playing season) to winter (when most of the world's big leagues are in full flight). As a result, the likes of Ballon d'Or holder Karim Benzema, Paul Pogba, N'Golo Kante, Christopher Nkunku, Sadio Mane, Timo Werner, Diogo Jota, Tecatito Corona, Lo Celso, Marco Reus, and many more aren't able to play here because of injury. Gee, that wasn't foreseeable at all!

Two days before the start of the tournament,

Qatar reversed it's earlier decisions on serving alcohol. That's not a big deal to me, to be honest - if you need alcohol to enjoy an occasion, it probably wasn't all that great an occasion to start with - but it's a big deal to make it so late, especially when Budweiser paid \$70 million for the right to sell beer in stadiums at this World Cup, and around \$75 million for the 2026 World Cup. As the company itself tweeted drily, "Well, This is awkward". My own suspicion is that Qatar spent billions on this (quite literally billions) in the expectation that it would enhance their standing in the world and were willing initially to compromise their own values for it. In light of the enormous global backlash, I think someone decided that the sale of alcohol was a compromise too far. Likewise with a Qatari 'World Cup Ambassador' stating publicly that homosexuality is a 'disease of the mind'. None of this should be particularly surprising, by the way. Qatar's stance on all these matters was well established at the time of FIFA awarding them the tournament.

The 2020 World Cup went to Russia, by the way, not exactly a bastion of equality or human rights either. The hosts of the last World Cup are now banned from this Tournament. None of this is new. Go back to the awarding of the 1978 World Cup to Argentina - they were literally washing the blood of thousands of 'political dissenters' off the walls of the stadia that matches were due to be played in.

Why did FIFA award the World Cup to Qatar? Well, both Qatar and FIFA deny bribery, despite a number (i.e. a lot) of credible whistle-blowers saying differently. The fact that most of the FIFA officials who made that decision have been convicted for financial misfeasance and corruption in the meantime tells a tale.

Absolutely no situation was helped by Gianni Infantino's truly amazing speech about how he feels Qatari, Arabic, African, gay, disabled, and a migrant worker. There might be some small truth in the latter - the man has clearly been out in the sun too long. This was Trump-level gibberish, it really was.

I haven't seen any credible substantiation of reports that Oatar tried to bribe Ecuador in their opening game. Apart from that unbelievable VAR decision to rule out Ecuador's first goal for offside. Just watch it on social media (which is how most people will consume the occasional highlights of games now). 'Unbelievable' really is the appropriate word.

Kudos to the likes of Rod Stewart, Dua Lipa, and Shakira on turning down seven figure sums rather than feature in this travesty. Shame on the likes of David Brand Beckham and the selfproclaimed hero of the masses Gary Neville for their paid participation - Ian Hislop's dissection of Gary Neville on 'Have I Got News For You' is both succinct and apt.But look, if we are calling out people for hypocrisy on this matter, you have mention the likes of Morgan Freeman. For that matter, Roy Keane calling out England and Wales for capitulating in regards to wearing One Love armbands would be an awful lot more meaningful....if he wore it himself. No-one in their studio, or most others, are doing the things they claim countries and players should be doing.

I think France are missing too many top players through injury. Realistically, I expect Brazil to win the title, not least because they should acclimatise to the searing heat that little bit faster than most. Brazil look the best all-round team. I thought Argentina would be very close, coming in on a 36 game run, while Martinez's finishing ability complements Messi perfectly – that loss to Saudi Arabia astounded me. I didn't watch it (of course) but with Poland and Mexico to come, Argentina could be an early casualty. Spain have a very good team but not enough goals. Belgium are missing Lukaku for their first couple of games, which puts them under pressure. The US are in that mix as well, even though they deserved a victory instead of a draw against Wales. England think that Harry Maguire and Alexander Trent Arnold can defend, so that's that. Scoring six against Iran helps Southgate, but conceding two in a cakewalk like that? They'll get out of the group, but fall to one of the big guns. Ronaldo, despite aging extremely ungracefully, is still a great player, but Portugal have been going backwards of late.

I'm just speculating. I have no intention of watching any of this nonsense.

### **IRELAND**

has been strident of late in warning countries against 'political interference' their control over domestic leagues. Funnily, silent when the Irish Government bailed



out the FAI, who had somehow managed to accidentally displace some \$50 million in their accounts. We have been slipping downhill ever since. People are starting to complain about Stephen Kenny's management of the Irish team. Who do they think Ireland can afford? No big name manager is taking on a team with a very limited panel depth - very, very limited without major financial resources and without the potential to develop players domestically. I actually like the style of soccer that Kenny is trying. But the likes of Coleman and McLean were great players in their heyday, not now. Connolly and Robinson try very hard up front, but the simple fact is that neither are consistent goalscorers, or even consistent starters for their clubs. Troy Parrott gives it everything too, but he's not the answer. There's a lot of noise about Evan Ferguson, the latest 'wunderkind' who is barely starting with Brighton. I have said it before, we didn't fully appreciate the poaching expertise of Robbie Keane until he was gone. Brexit and England's non-European work status

has made it harder for Irish players to get signed in England, while the Premiership now has a global recruiting stage (prior to 1990, it's recruitment base was almost always the 'home' nations, including Ireland).

None of these are problems that Stephen Kenny can fix. In the circumstances, a 2-1 loss to a Norway that didn't have Erling Haaland isn't that bad. What was bad, though, was the extreme conservatism in the team selection and the use of the bench. You won't find answers unless you ask the questions, Stephen, and we have emphatically seen that our current squad are just not up to the level we aspire to. Mind you, Irish soccer aspirations have never really matched reality, have they? The heady triumphs of Jack Charlton's long ball days are a fading memory. The 1-0 win over Malta is much more concerning than the Norway game for me. I had it on in the background and it was hard to actually watch it. Against a side that we should be hunting and hurting, we were timid and listless. We only won it because of a goal gifted by a defender. We did hit the post, but Malta had their chances too. We seem to be going nowhere, and heading there very fast. It's not that Stephen Kenny is doing much wrong -

if Busby, Stein, or Alex Ferguson were drawing from our kind of talent pool, you'd never have heard of them.

### **KERRY FC**

The good news is that steps are being taken domestically to improve Irish soccer, and Kerry will be playing a big role in it. The LOI, neglected for years, is finally beginning to stir itself. Treaty United have been a huge success story since their recent return under the new name, and that's a model that can be followed. Kerry, thanks to Steven Conway, Brian Anscough, and Billy Dennehy, there is a clear team structure in place. The team will be all-amateur and will draw largely from Kerry's U19 team and local junior clubs (whose buy-in and willingness to send their players is likely to be crucial). It's likely to be a tough step up, but there should be decent crowds. I'd be hoping for an average of 2000 for home games against the likes of Waterford United, Treaty United, Cobh Ramblers, Athlone Town, Finn Harps, Galway United, Bray Wanderers, Wexford Youths and Longford Town. First division games are scheduled for Friday nights, which means that they won't clash too much with GAA or basketball fixtures. Mounthawk Park will be upgraded but is already close to the standard for an League of Ireland game - actually, it's in better shape than many of them.

As the old sporting adage goes, this is a marathon, not a sprint. I wouldn't have

aspirations of anything more than mid table respectable for the first two years - that will be a big challenge in itself. Get a core panel established. Most importantly, get a strong support base established. A part of that is getting branded merchandise on the shelves for Christmas, and I'm told that's well in hand. The truth is that financial viability is key to the whole process. Once the foundation is established, Kerry FC can start aiming higher. The sheer fact that a Kerry team is being established is a huge success story in itself. Kerry has been basically a soccer by-water for years (the League has been famously Dublincentric in general with outposts in Galway, Sligo, Cork, and Dundalk, while Waterford, Longford, Monagahn, and Limerick have seen waves and troughs over the years). That kind of thing needs to change. The truth is that there is an untapped reservoir of playing talent that has lacked an outlet in places like Kerry. Most of our best soccer talents at adult level play a number of sports, often abandoning soccer altogether. Nothing wrong with that in itself – but nothing wrong with aiming to compete at the higher levels either at a sport where we are starting to shine instead of relying on occasional comets to light the way, the majority of whom had to leave Kerry to progress.

### **RUGBY**


Congratulations to Josh van der Flier, who has been named World Player of the Year. To be

honest, it's a little bit of a poisoned chalice, putting a target on a player's back heading into a World Cup year. Still, no harm, Van Der Flier has broad enough shoulders for it! Johnny Sexton, Tadhg Beirne, and Tadhg Furlong join him on the Team of the Year. All fully deserved - I hope it isn't parochialism that makes me say that Garry Ringrose can't have been far away. Irish rugby is on top of the world right now. They had to scrap to get past a limited but dogged Australia - no harm at all in having to dig out a tough win in a friendly (call it a 'test' if you must - it's a friendly). Andy Farrell was without a number of injured players for these games Jack McCarthy appears to have leapfrogged Ross Byrne in the pecking order for outhalf. Hmmm....I'll reserve judgement. After all, the Six Nations is a much more realistic testing ground. With respect to some of the greatest servants ever for Irish rugby, I want real and reasonably experienced replacements for the likes of Johnny Sexton, Conor Murray, and Bundee Aki in place before the World Cup. But for now, let's enjoy the good times as long as they last.

### Rathmore 0-8 Spa 1-12

Spa started their campaign to atone for last year's final defeat, as they came away from Rathbeg with a seven point win over an understrength Rathmore side, in the opening round of the O Donoghue Cup.

## HARDWOOD CUTTINGS

Hardwood are a pretty easy and a very reliable method of propagating a wide range of deciduous shrubs, climbers and fruit bushes. Most deciduous shrubs are ideal for taking hardwood cuttings, for example Buddleja (Butterfly Bush), Rives (Flowering Currant), Viburniums or Forsythia and the same applies to a lot of deciduous climbers like honeysuckle and Jasmine plus fruit bushes like blackcurrants and gooseberries.

The best time to take hardwood curling is when the plant is dormant which is about from mid Autumn to until late Winter but the ideal time would be just after the leaves fall off the plants or just before the buds start to burst in early Spring. These types of cuttings may be slow to root however it is very successful.





Welcome back dear student "give thanks to the Lord for He is good, His faithful love endures forever" (Psalms 107:1). This week our American friends celebrated Thanksgiving. What a wonderful way to connect with loved ones by gathering together to thank God for His goodness and His faithfulness. Faithfulness is not so common anymore. But God is Faithful. It's one of the names that we will recognise the Lord Jesus by when He comes to destroy the Anti-Christ and begin His Millennial Reign. "Then I saw Heaven opened, and a white horse was standing there. Its Rider was named Faithful and True, for He judges fairly and wages a righteous war. His eyes were like flames of fire, and on His head were many crowns. A name was written on Him that no-one understood except Himself. He wore a robe dipped in Blood, and His title was the Word of God" (Revelation 19:11-13). What does it mean that God is Faithful? Another translation is 'steadfast' which means immovable and un-wavering. Know this friend - God is loyal and dependable and you can trust Him to do what He has promised (Romans 4:21). God will always keep His Word. People don't always keep their word. Some have no word at all. It can deflate us when others let us down, causing us to wrongly assume that God must be like that too. We compare the validity of God's Word with the experiences we have had with human beings and it fosters unbelief. But God's ways are higher than man's ways. He always watches over His Word to see that it is accomplished (Isaiah 55:8). Not one of God's promises in His Word have failed - and never will; "the grass withers and the flowers fade, but the Word of our God stands forever" (Isaiah 40:8). So, as our knowledge of God's Word increases, our trust in Him deepens. And our faith is rewarded by receiving His love and promises.

Luke tells of an encounter that the Lord Jesus had while being entertained at the home of a Pharisee named Simon (Luke 7:36-50). A woman came into Simon's house and anointed Jesus' feet with precious oil from an alabaster jar. The other Pharisees judged both Jesus and the woman. They figured that Jesus was not from God or He would've known this woman who was kissing His feet and wiping them with her hair was a 'sinful woman'. But Jesus knew what was in their hearts, and He challenged his host. I love that about Jesus. He brings everything out into the open - because what's hidden in darkness is the devil's playground. Jesus told Simon a parable about two individuals who owed a man money that neither could pay back. One owed him a fortune, the other not so much. But the man decided to cancel both debts. Jesus asked Simon 'which one of the two forgiven do you suppose loved him more after that?'Simon answered 'the one for whom he cancelled the larger debt.' Jesus told Simon that he was correct, and then He rebuked him for his prideful lack of love in the way he had disrespected Jesus as his guest. The sinful woman however, had humbled herself and showed such grateful thanks to Jesus by honouring Him. Her faith in Jesus was rewarded with her sins being forgiven by Him, releasing her into a new life of peace with God. "Give thanks to the Lord for He is good, His faithful love endures forever" (Psalms 118:1).
