KILLARNEY BUSINESS CLOSURES.....

Chamber: Reducing VAT rate again would be a good start

illarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce has pledged its full backing to a campaign to immediately reduce the VAT rate on hospitality to nine per cent – or less – as part of a suite of measures to support businesses struggling to survive in the current economic climate.

The town's business representative organisation said it is no coincidence that many operators started feeling the squeeze when the rate was increased to 13.5 per cent in September and that, in addition to the huge increases in the other costs involved in running a business, was leading to a sudden spate of closures.

"The VAT rise, combined with rising energy costs, food inflation, major staffing issues, wage increases and fewer people on the streets has, in many respects, created the perfect storm to force a business to close," chamber said.

"Some traders have raised the white flag and acknowledged that they can simply no longer absorb the costs and remain any way competitive," a statement issued by joint chamber presidents Pádraig Treacy and Johnny McGuire said.

The chamber has acknowledged that issues such as leases expiring, business premises being sold, difficulties in securing qualified staff and the dark cloud of warehoused debt having to be paid back in a matter of weeks have all contributed to a number of businesses pulling down the shutters.

But the business organisation stressed that there can be no argument that Killarney is also really feeling the impact of the very significant influx of asylum seekers and refugees which has resulted in considerable challenges for those involved in retail in the town.

Chamber said less people spending obviously means businesses, who operate on tight margins, are going to suffer and many involved in retail in Killarney have reported a dramatic reduction in footfall since so much of the town's available accommodation was snapped up by the International Protection Accommodation Service.

"That factor alone is impacting on business, it is impacting on services such as access to GPs and schools and it is putting traders on the streets under real pressure," Mr Treacy and Mr McGuire said.

The joint presidents said when Finance Minister, Michael McGrath, addressed the chamber president's lunch this time last year, he gave an undertaking that he would do everything in his power to extend the period of time for the lower VAT rate and he kept his word.

"Chamber led the way on that occasion and we would now appeal to the minister, once again, to consider reintroducing the nine per cent rate – or even lower – to give many businesses a fighting chance of survival. It would, at least, be a decent start.

"It's a big ask but it's a big problem and this is the only solution," Mr Treacy and Mr McGuire said, adding that it was imperative that jobs in retail, hospitality and other services are protected.

"Very few can be critical of the minimum wage increase as staff must be

looked after but having to also cope with a VAT hike and a drop-off in footfall as a result of lost accommodation will be the final straw for too many," the chamber warned.

The business organisation said in addition to reinstating the nine per cent rate, consideration should be given to a bespoke package of supports for businesses, additional breaks in terms of commercial rates, greater training opportunities for staff and agreeing to a phased repayment of warehoused debt.



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KILLARNEY WEATHERS THE STORMS

Killarney was battered by two storms this week with Storm Isha on Sunday followed quickly on Tuesday by Storm Jocelyn.

ESB crews worked tirelessly to try to get thousands of homes and businesses back on the grid.

However it took days for some homes in the Killarney area to get their power back as crews working were hampered by the arrival of the second storm on Tuesday. Muckross House and Garden Restaurant was closed on Monday 22nd January, as crews dealt with power outages and tree

felling in the aftermath of Storm Isha. Multiple trees are down across the Park and this week crews from Kerry County Council and the National Park worked tirelessly to clear them.

Following Storm Isha on Sunday Storm Jocelyn arrived on Tueday and it is the tenth named storm of the season.

In the past 10 years since storm naming begun, we have only reached as far as K once before, in 2016. One more storm to go to tie that!

Little focus on local business closures in the council

More attention given was to Palestine than to the tsunami of business closures in Kerry at this week's council meeting in Tralee. Much the same could be said about the Dáil this week.

I kid you not:The

scarf wearers in the Dáil are more exercised by Gaza than by the housing and small business crisis.

Certainly, the conflict in Gaza is awful. But I find the response to what is tragically just one of a number of terrible world conflicts by Boyd Barrett, Murphy, Smith and most of Sinn Féin these days perplexing.

I expected more from Kerry County Council. It has traditionally been a fairly sensible and courageous forum.

Johnny Healy-Rae had an excellent motion, given the worry in families and in the community in Killarney, Killorglin, Kenmare and even Cahersiveen about small enterprises closing.

He sought exact numbers. He also asked the council to identify "the main cause" for the cessations of several businesses in Killarney and across south Kerry in just weeks.

The council in a reply said one in five jobs in Kerry was tourist related. In fact, most employment in Kerry is in small enterprise, they told him.

'My fear is there will be a domino effect. When one closes the next will, and so on, and these businesses will not reopen. If it's happening in Killarney, what hope is there for Killorglin, Kenmare and Cahersiveen' Johnny said. People were losing jobs and council rates base would also be affected.

'Our bed space has gone down and it's time to say clearly it's because we are housing so many refugees and asylum seekers and others,' Johnny said.

But no one else said anything. Then it was on to Gaza - for the second time. There had already been a call for a ceasefire from Sinn Féin though why they would expect world powers to listen is beyond me.

Then, Mayor Jim Finucane (FG) had an announcement. He is organising a Palestinian solidarity day. Deirdre Ferris got exercised, speaking about ethnic cleansing and genocide.

This is loose talk and I hear it now across Sinn Fein and the so-called left. Personally I find it offensive. Historically, in any civilized society genocide is precise and historical. It refers to the deliberate, organised slaughter of six million Jewish people. I can't figure the one-sided interest in Gaza by some of our politicians, to be honest. There are other terrible conflicts, where children have been dying of hunger with years in Yemen, in Mali and elsewhere. Why are we ignoring these? Meanwhile, Johnny Healy-Rae also reminded us how not so long ago this State which is now to buy a hotel in Roscrea, sold off the Killlarney and Parknasilla Great Southerns. 'Are we going to have complete Governmentrun tourism in the future? Johnny asked.

Tea and Toast

The first thing I did when the electricity returned after 36 hours was to partake of tea



and toast. Traditional sliced toast smothered in marmalade. And scalding tea that had been boiled in a kettle, not from a saucepan on a portable gas ring. The white bread had been in mortal danger in the freezer during the power cut.

Sliced toast and tea must be one of the great pleasures in life. I associate it with waking up in hospital having managed to miraculously survive something or other. Is tea and toast an Irish hospital tradition, and maybe an Irish religious hospital tradition I wondered? If so, I shouldn't talk too much about it because someone in authority will surely water it down to fit with our new global lack of identity Anyway, back to the power cut. I honestly wonder why we can't weather a storm on this Atlantic island without the whole infrastructure crumbling. Whether a fall of snow or a breeze, we are all locked in the cabin, shivering and wondering why we pay expensive standing charges to the electricity companies when a breeze can bring down a pole.

The council on Monday heard how it is carrying out reviews of trees especially along main roads. The reason the trees came down is because their feet are so wet they are easily uprooted and no amount of reviewing will cure that. Topping them severely may help. Proper drainage alongside them would help more.

Back to the tea and toast. If I have learned two lessons from the power cut it is : never buy an electric car and always keep an open fire. With an open fire, you can still cook and keep warm and with a diesel car and an inverter you can have some form of power generation. Not to mention you can move if you need to. As for the fire, I am looking out now for the old kettles and griddle pans and a long toasting fork and an old oil lamp so I won't be stuck again. Things that were thrown out not so long ago. So much green thinking can come unstuck in a winter storm!

Digitised display of Annals?

We could be inspired by the new red metal box in the yard in Trinity College. It contains a visual display of the ninth century manuscript such as you have never seen before. Normally just one page of the mad book - as I like to call it - is on display in the Long Room in Trinity. But while the room is being done up, Kells has been digitized and you see every page in large display.

The manuscript with its crazy, intricate psychedelic drawings gets over one million visitors a year.

The Annals of Inisfallen is a lot more sober but for me more interesting as a good chunk of it is about actual historical events. And while the Book of Kells was composed on Iona and brought to Kells for safety from the Vikings - the annals were largely composed on our Lower Lake. Would it not be a great idea to have a similar digitised display, of large interactive panels of the pages of the annals accompanied by music and perhaps scenic shots of the places referred to?

We could do so much with a little imagination. Not to mention technology. I often wonder if we are too taken with the natural history aspect of Killarney and not enough with the historic.

Killarney House could easily accommodate а metal box cabin for the annals, the luna and surrounding historical buildings from Aghadoe to Muckross Abbey and the three sisters in Lissivigeen. Any volunteers?

Kerry South Kerry Greenway

Kerry County Council has confirmed at this month's Council meeting, in reply to a Notice of Motion by Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill, that consultants have been appointed to prepare the Tender Documents for the mid-Section of the South Kerry Greenway between Mountain Stage and Kells Post Office, which contains the most complex and challenging elements.

"This progress report is gratifying in that we can at last see the steps that are being taken and the timelines around delivering this massive project to Mid and South Kerry. Kerry County Council outlined to me the steps required to bring about approval so that the Main Construction Contract can proceed to contract" stated Councillor Cahill.

"They envisage that following the Tender process and subject to the necessary approvals, a main contractor will be appointed to undertake a contract of approximately 2.5 years in duration" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The reality of the delivery to the people of this region, of the South Kerry Greenway project is finally sinking in. It is going to happen, we can see the machinery and works and we now have tangible timeframes" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Kerry County Council has also confirmed that the land acquisition process is underway and a number of advance work contracts are at construction. I will continue to press that all facilities and accesses are provided for affected landowners, to ensure everybody gets a fair deal and are treated with respect

and dignity. We will all look back on this as the best thing that ever happened for the people of Mid-Kerry, South Kerry /Caherciveen and lveragh and indeed for all of Kerry" added Councillor Cahill.





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

MEP Kelleher tables amendments to protect the right to use cash in retail grocery stores and pharmacies

Fianna Fáil MEP Billy Kelleher has said it is essential that citizens have a right to use cash in a wide variety of shops and public services.

Kelleher, a member of the European Parliament's Economic and Monetary Affairs (ECON) Committee, was commenting after tabling amendments to the new EU Regulation on the Legal Tender of Euro Banknotes and Coins, which enshrines the status of the Euro as legal tender and protects the right of citizens to access cash and use cash.

"My amendments are focused and to the point. I have tabled amendments to ensure that retail grocery stores, pharmacies, healthcare providers, public bodies and utility companies cannot refuse to take cash.

"I believe these are essential services for ordinary citizens, and we need to protect citizens' ability to pay for these services with the means they have available. Whilst there is a trend in Ireland towards a preference for digital payments, if we do not protect the ability to use cash in certain cases then we risk marginalising certain communities or excluding them completely.

"Many of our older citizens still collect their pensions in cash from the Post Office every week. They should have a right to be able to use that cash in these types of shops or providers. "I believe that my amendments will align quite closely with the legislation that the Minister for Finance, Michael McGrath intends to propose on access to cash and using cash in essential services.

"My hope is that my amendments will be supported by all political groups in the European Parliament, and that, once finalised, will give citizens both clarity and certainty into the future," concluded Kelleher.

The STEM Passport for Inclusion Certificates were awarded by Munster Technological University (MTU) to 23 senior cycle female students of Castleisland Community College. They participated in the Stem Passport for Inclusion -an MTU initiative that Cáit McEllistrem (Biology and Agricultural Science teacher) helped facilitate. The aim of the project is to encourage more girls to study STEM subjects (science, technology engineering and maths). The project allowed them the opportunity to develop important, fundamental skills that are needed to pursue STEM degrees (e.g. computer science, technology, maths, physics, chemistry, biology and engineering).

The students completed three lab days and an assignment. They now receive 50 bonus points for their CAO that they can use to apply for stem related courses in MTU or Maynooth university. It's an NFQ level six module, so they have a pathway to university and it also acts as a connection for industry and internship opportunities.

Women in STEM careers from Microsoft and Accenture became mentors to the students throughout the duration of the project. They provided the students with an identifiable role model.

'The girls were inspired by these mentors who discussed their own careers in science and technology. They explained how to support students into and during their STEM careers and considered how to develop and advance this into the future,' stated Ms Mc Ellistrem.

TIME TO FINISH FINNEGANS CROSS

Cllr. Brendan Cronin has called on the Killarney MD Roads Department to confirm how much funding is required to finish improvement works on Finnegan's Cross and is that funding secured.

"Substantial work has been done improving visibility at this very dangerous junction at Finnegan's Cross and it is critical now that the required funding is provided to finish all the junction works properly. In response the council said that to complete the outstanding works at the location, Kerry County Council has made a funding request to the Department of Transport to the value of €600,000 via the Specific Improvement Grant. 
Ní Ríordáin urges vigilance regarding charity collections

Widows and Widowers can now **PURCHASE THEIR HOMES**

A Kerry County Councillor has welcomed the changes announced by Minister for Housing, Darragh O'Brien to the Tenant Purchase Scheme. "Amongst the changes to the Scheme that will come into effect on the 29th of January is a reduction in the minimum qualifying reckonable income from €12,500 to €11,000 per annum. This will enable more older tenants to qualify to purchase their home and the Widows/Widowers/ Surviving Civil Partner's Pension will now be included as primary reckonable income when determining eligibility for the Scheme" said Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill

"I stated previously on a number of occasions that Widows, Widowers and Surviving Civil Partners were being blatantly discriminated against and that this was an anomaly in the scheme criteria that had to be addressed" said Councillor Cahill.

"I am delighted to see that Minister O'Brien moved to correct it following I raising it publicly and directly with the Minister and his officials" stated Councillor Cahill.

"My Party colleague, Councillor Mikey Sheehy also raised the matter" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

The Blind Pension, Invalidity Pension and Disability Allowance will also be included as primary reckonable income when determining eligibility from 29 January. This is in addition to the contributory and non-contributory State Pension and will enable applicants in receipt of these long term Department of Social Protection payments to qualify to purchase their home under the Scheme, subject to meeting all other eligibility criteria.

"This will open the window of opportunity for a lot more tenants to purchase their homes and will have a knock on affect hopefully to enable Kerry County Council to provide more tenancies for those on our waiting list" added Councillor Cahill.

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STAFF ABSENCE & CLOSURES DURING EXTREME WEATHER EVENTS

When an employee cannot attend work because of extreme weather events, is the employer obliged to pay the employee?

In general, there is no statutory entitlement for an employee to be paid if they cannot attend work because of extreme weather. Any more beneficial arrangement is a matter for agreement between the employer and the employee.

Employers are encouraged to take a long-term view of the working relationship, recognising that demonstrating concern for the welfare of employees and treating employees fairly translates into a better working environment to the benefit of both the staff and the employer.

Can an employee take annual leave days to cover

the unforeseen absence from work?

Employers may allow employees take annual leave for the day or days covered by the event in which case they would be paid. It is best that this would be specified in company policy.

What happens where a roster needs to be changed at short notice?

Normally, employees are entitled to notice of at least 24 hours of a roster change. However, this does not apply in exceptional circumstances as with extreme weather events.

What happens where the employer is unable to either open the premises for a few weeks because of the emergency or where there is no work – for example when there is a flood?

In these circumstances the employer may put employees on a period of 'layoff'. An employer may lay off employees when there is no work available for a temporary period with that employer. If employees are laid-off then the employer is not obliged to pay employees. Laid-off employees may be entitled to Jobseekers Benefit or Jobseekers Allowance from the Department of Social Protection for the days they are not working.

Terms and Conditions of Employment (Contract & Handbbook)

Employers may have included policies and procedures in their contracts of employment to cover severe weather events which may include: The taking of annual leave for the days absent to avoid

employee loss of earnings

Agreement to work back the hours / days lost

- Alternative opening days on a day where the business is normally closed
- Working from home where feasible and practical Working from an alternative location where feasible and practical
- Or other beneficial arrangements

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





VISUAL DISTURBANCE

What is visual disturbance? Visual disturbance is when vou experience a short spell of flashing or shimmering of light in your sight. The symptoms normally last around twenty minutes before your sight returns to normal. Usually, there is no headache during the visual disturbance. A visual disturbance should not be confused with a retinal or ocular migraine where there is a partial or total loss of vision in one eye, normally with a headache.

Who is affected by visual disturbance?

disturbance is a Visual common condition among people who are affected by migraines, although they can affect anyone.

Visual disturbances tend to be more common in:

- women
- people aged under 40
- people aged over 60
- people with a personal or family history of migraines

What are the symptoms of visual disturbance?

Flashes of

light

These may start in the periphery of your sight, and become larger and more central (Some people experience the opposite, starting as a tiny dot centrally and become a bigger arc as they reach the periphery) They may be black and white or brightly coloured

Typically described as a

zigzagging pattern, or giving the appearance of shards of alass

They may be apparent when vour eves are shut

 The disturbance affects your sight and both eyes are affected

• There is no headache during the disturbance

 The visual disturbance last around 20-30 minutes

How do you treat visual disturbance?

Firstly, do not panic; visual disturbances can he frightening, but in most cases are short lived. If you are driving or operating machinery, stop what you are doing and wait for the symptoms to go away. Make a note of your symptoms, how long they lasted and what you were doing just before they began. In most cases, there is a common trigger and keeping a diary of symptoms can help work out what the trigger is. Simply avoiding the trigger, where possible, may be all you need to do.

Common triggers include: stress

tiredness

• flashing or flickering lights (including driving through a row of trees in bright sunlight) glare

- exercise
- bending over
- dehydration
- certain foods such as
- chocolate, cheese or alcohol. excessive heat

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





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KERRY WIN THE BATTLE OF THE CHAMPIONS

Kerry 1-8 Dublin 0-6

Emma Dineen struck 1-3 at Parnell Park on Saturday evening as Kerry won the battle of the champions in the opening round of the new Lidl National Football League Division 1.

Whereas Kerry got the better of Galway to claim NFL top-tier honours at Croke Park last April, Dublin recorded a 0-18 to 1-10 win at the Kingdom's expense a little under four months later to reclaim the TG4 All-Ireland Senior Football Championship crown. Although it doesn't necessarily make amends for their defeat in the latter game, Kerry will undoubtedly take great confidence from this victory as they look to defend their Division 1 title.

In their first clash since that All-Ireland SFC decider, Kerry squeezed in front with a point from Jadyn Lucey after just 27 seconds. The Jackies were welcoming Olwen Carey back following a two-season absence, but even though they created a number of scoring chances early on, Katie Brosnan ultimately doubled the Kingdom's lead on seven minutes. Dineen also found the range just shy of the first-quarter mark to offer her side further breathing room and while Dublin finally opened their account with a point from centre half-back Martha Byrne a little over 21 minutes into the play, this was immediately cancelled out at the opposite end by Lucey's second of the half.

Kerry did receive a let-off when Dublin fullforward Niamh Hetherton subsequently fired wide off a goalscoring opportunity, but a second point from her opposite number Dineen ultimately ensured the Kingdom brought a 0-5 to 0-1 cushion into the interval.

In a bid to eat into their deficit, Dublin (who had eight starters from the 2023 Brendan Martin Cup showpiece, as opposed to five from Kerry) introduced team captain Carla Rowe and Kate Murray on the resumption. However, after Dineen and Hetherton swapped points in an initially cagey third-quarter, the Kingdom's own substitute Hannah O'Donoghue released Dineen for a palmed goal off a quick break in the 41st minute.

This was followed by a brace of points from new skipper Niamh Carmody to leave Kerry nine points to the good with just 13 minutes remaining, before Dublin finally developed a purple patch that yielded scores from Hetherton, Rowe (free) and Murray. This left Mick Bohan's charges with a fighting chance of getting something out of the game, but even though Murray added a second point, Kerry had already done enough to claim the three points on offer.

MCGRATH CUP FINAL Cork 1-14 Kerry 1-14 (Cork win 4-3 on penalties)

First silverware of the year to Cork. What's more, they had to battle for it and they did - you'll measure no team's ability for the crunch games so early in the year, but hunger is a mark laid down at any time. Of course I wouldn't read too much into this defeat, especially on the basic coin toss of a penalty shootout. I wouldn't be reading much into any victory either if it had fallen our way. But I do think that John Cleary will be the happier of the two managers after this one, and not because the McGrath Cup is such a coveted prize. Kerry have won nine of the last ten Munster Finals – for that matter, the one we lost was won by Tipperary – but Cork have been edging closer all the time and this one will give them another layer of confidence. Remember the group game last year after the Munster Final? Cork had us on the ropes in the last twenty minutes but just couldn't take enough of their chances.

Kerry actually started well and I thought they were looking slightly the sharper side, although admittedly the scoreboard will tell a different story and we had the wind advantage. But I thought we were pressing Cork's kick-outs well and were winning a lot of key duels. Killian Spillane, who looked absolutely razor sharp from the off, clipped over a great score to open our account.

Ruairí Deane and David Buckley slotted a free each in reply. Nothing too much to worry about as yet, but Buckley in particular was showing absolutely no fear of going at Kerry. Dylan Geaney picked off a point in reply – for me, Dylan has been the main one of the relative newcomers to stake a claim to a championship jersey – but Eoghan McSweeney cancelled that out in fine style. Killian brought Kerry level. I felt that Kerry would have profited by sending the ball in early to Killian and Seán O'Shea, with Dylan operating like a false ten in soccer behind them. It looked to me like we could have played a high risk/high reward game with the players that we had rather than the opposite. For me, the McGrath Cup is exactly when you test that sort of theory and it might have been an opportunity missed.

Cork weren't playing the better football, but they were giving their forwards more to work with, and Buckley won and converted another free while Chris Óg Jones clipped over a real beauty. These, along with the outstanding Matty Taylor and Patrick Doyle (not sure about those forays forward and he does need to work a bit on kick-outs, but that's a commanding presence) are players to watch out for when the ground hardens.

Killian slotted his third point with aplomb but David Buckley won and nailed another free. Kerry were playing decent football but it wasn't showing on the scoreboard; Buckley was playing superbly and it was showing.

Sean O'Shea trimmed the gap and Cillian Burke levelled matters. I'm not looking for Cillian to be imposing himself on a game like this already, but these are the games where you will find out a lot about yourself at this level. Burke cemented himself as an option but isn't in pole position for a championship jersey just yet. On the right road, though.

Kerry struck for a goal on the half hour mark. Patrick Doyle was called for time-wasting on the kick-out after the ball blew off the tee. I thought it was a harsh call, but that will happen in games. Calls will go for or against you; it's how you react that matters. And Cork....well, to me they fell asleep a little. Joe O'Connor rose high to punch the ball forward – Joe put in a colossal shift in terms of work, even if Ian Maguire was the most efficient midfielder on the day. On this occasion, Cork should at least have been aware of the possibility. Instead, they had left Dylan Geaney, of all players, plenty of space to pick up the breaking ball and neatly drill it home. Well executed from Kerry's perspective, but Cork's defending....that's exactly the kind of mistake that separates real contenders from the chasing pack. Ye'll be seeing that one on video plenty of times in yere training sessions, lads.

Ronan Buckley, another with a solid rather than spectacular outing, pointed before the break but David Buckley kicked his fourth point to leave that goal between them at the break. Half-time Kerry 1-7 Cork 0-7

Both sides rang the changes at half-time. Kerry made six changes, and no harm in that. Minutes on the field in a real game is better than hours on a training ground at this time of year; January training is enough of a slog anyway.

Brian O'Driscoll opened the second half scoring, but two points by Seán O'Shea had Kerry looking good at 1-9 to 0-8. Then came a bit of a disaster. If I'm going to criticise the Cork defence for being far too loose for Kerry's goal, I have to play fair and say the exact same about Chris Óg Jones' goal. A superb ball by lan Maguire and a brilliant finish by Jones, but there was far too much space available for that pinpoint pass. Has to go in the error column.

Eoghan McSweeney with another good point to square things up. Kerry's subs were looking lively, though. Micheál Burns brought a sense of ambition to the half forward line, a bit more cut and thrust, and he was only denied a goal by a good save from Patrick Doyle.

Luke Fahy fisted over from a tight angle and Cork were in front. Dara Moynihan had been consigned to the vital but too often undervalued spadework for a lot of the hour levelled, for Kerry. Cork were growing in confidence, though – I felt and I suspect that they felt that Kerry were vulnerable. David Buckley once again split the posts from a free and Mark Cronin put Cork two in front.

Conor Geaney picked off a point and Darragh Roche slotted two close range frees. Blake Murphy levelled – I rate Murphy highly ever since that famous U20 final and I'd have liked from a Cork perspective to have seen more of him here. Micheál Burns nudged Kerry back in front but Darragh Cashman came up with a superb equaliser and I don't think any Kerry supporter could be so curmudgeonly as to begrudge it to Cork. Actually, I probably could, but I'm not going to.

A draw was a fair result, but that crowded modern schedule doesn't allow for replays. Hardly allows for breathing space. I repeat and will repeat ad nauseum, the split season is not the problem; it's the rush to cram as many games into the season that's causing the problems.

On to penalties. I'm not reporting on those. I accept that I don't have a fairer or better way to decide a game (I'd prefer to simply share the title for a year – we did it for a National League and nobody ever fought over a McGrath Cup medal yet). Cork won on penalties and fair play to them. They'll take a lot from this game and Kerry will have to take deeper lessons than from last year's defeat at the same stage. This was a much stronger Kerry – granted, the Cliffords, Tadhg Morley, Tom O'Sullivan, the eldest Geaney (Paul is going to absolutely hate that description!).....Kerry have plenty to come back. Mind you, Seán Powter, Brian Hurley, Stephen Sherlock...it's not like that Cork team is set in stone either.

But right now – and I do stress that no team should ever be judged in January – Cork look like being up among the contenders.

PROVINCIAL COMPETITIONS

Yeah, none of them are headliners. I wouldn't even say they are a decent measure of a team's potential for later on. Bit for the little that it's worth, here's how the other pre-season tournaments panned out.

CONNAUGHT FBD LEAGUE Roscommon 2-25 Galway 0-13

You might be thinking that Galway pushed Kerry right to the brink in an absolutely gripping All Ireland Final two years ago. Have they gone back so far already? Nope. Padraig Joyce had an experimental team out, very experimental, and Roscommon, even without the St. Bridgets players, had their big guns on show. I suspect that Roscommon will be hitting the National League running and hunting points, while Galway might be playing a longer game. Again, I might be reading Shakespearan sonnets into a monkey's typewriter tappings. The interesting thing about the Connaught FBD League this year was London's first ever win over Mayo in the quarter-final, with vicecaptain and full back Matt Moynihan playing a leader's role as they won by 0-12 to 1-8. That was no bad Mayo side, either, with the likes of Rob Hennelly, Eoghan McLaughlin, Jordan Flynn, and Cillian O'Connor in action. Add it to New York's exploits last year, and maybe this crowded schedule is encouraging minnows to nibble at giants, never a bad thing in any sport. Which brings us neatly to the O'Byrne Cup. Let's be completely honest, the Delaney Cup can only be considered a mere trinket for players from one particular county. I can vaguely remember the game back in July of 2010 when Meath ended Dublin's five in a row of Leinster titles, putting five goals past them. The general consensus was that Dublin had it too easy in Leinster and were coming into the latter stages untested and vulnerable, whereas Meath were a team with a bit of real bite about them. You couldn't fault Dublin's seasoned goalkeeper for any of the goals - he was already eight years waiting for a celtic cross and you'd say time was running out for the Cluxton lad. I wasn't gone on the corner back either. Fitzsimons could play but, ironically enough, I wasn't sure he had the stamina or staying power for the hard games. Longford claimed their second O'Byrne Cup in a row over Dublin. A big lift for Longford, who will compete in Division Four and almost certainly the Taillteann Cup. For Dublin? Meh. Business as usual. It literally means nothing in terms of going forward.

MCKENNA CUP

Ulster is most definitely the best provincial championship. There are suspicions that it may decline as counties realise that the back door can actually be an easier route nowadays once you secure your Sam Maguire berth with league status, but for now you'll never see a casual Ulster game. With Mickey Harte and Jimmy McGuinness both in a hurry to lay down firm markers as they take or re-take the tillers in Derry and Donegal respectively, it seemed almost inevitable from the get-go that they would meet in the McKenna Cup Final. And for once, Ulster didn't throw up any major shock or casualty as both sides duly reached the final.

That final I am paying attention to and I think there are real markers for the forthcoming year laid down in that game. There were fears expressed in some corners of social media that Mickey Harte would regress Derry from their open, attacking style. To which I could only reply at the time "Exactly what open, attacking football are you seeing? Because I'm seeing a packed defence that breaks forward at pace. McGuigan was often the lone Derry player in the opposition half. When did we start calling that attacking football?" Seriously, stop peddling that myth about Derry – or Kerry either, for that matter. It simply isn't true.

Derry won the McKenna cup Final, and won it fair and square. But – and how much responsibility Mickey Harte bears for it remains open to question – their top scorer from play had the sum total of 0-1. Mind you, no Donegal player managed to beat that from open play, or ever looked likely to do so. The most exciting thing about the football on view was the three red cards, one for two yellows. This is most definitely not the kind of football I want to see winning All Irelands. In fact, this is not the kind of football I want to see, period.

ALL IRELAND CLUB FINALS Watty Grahams The Glen 2-10 St. Bridgets 1-12

Most neutrals were rooting for the Glen after last year, when Kilmacud Crokes finished with sixteen players on the field. I thought it was much overblown at the time – to be blunt, papers don't refuse ink at this time of year. Mind you, I think that managements have the responsibility to know the rules and a failure to apply them should attract sanction – managers will always try to push that envelope a small bit (as I would myself in their position) so the line has to be firm. I'd have awarded the Glen a replay last year – the extra man made no material difference in that game but the message should go out loud and clear. Get it right or pay the price.

I thought St. Bridgets actually played much the better football for most of this game. To be fair, the Glen kicked a fair few wides, but St. Bridgets were much more fluid and adventurous. The Glen were punting the ball in more often than not and were very lucky to still be level at halftime, having trailed by four early on and the gap should have been wider. Shooters on both sides looked a bit nervous early on. The Glen were still four behind as the game entered the closing stages and frankly, St. Bridgets looked completely in control. Enter Conor Glass. I'm sure a lot of people reading this will remember the Hogan Cup Final that featured two of the best young footballers in the country (actually three of them, but a lot of people underestimated Shane McGuigan at that time), David Clifford for the Sem scored 2-5 but a hotly disputed red card for Conor Glass was the big talking point for St. Pats Maghera.

Glass has always and ever shown that touch of something extra that the great ones have. Brendan Rogers got the All Star and was in the conversation for Footballer of the Year last year. Shane McGuigan also won an All Star and deserved it, he was point, post, and fulcrum for Derry's attack. Rogers was great at driving forward and kicking scores himself, much like Seán Cavanagh or Ciarán Whelan used to do, but I think that he got a lot of that freedom because of Glass' unselfish excellence at doing the hard work behind.

This was Conor Glass' finest hour. Should St. Bridgets have closed it out? That great Kerryman Jerome Stack won't need me to tell him that they let this one slip from their hands. That doesn't take away from Glass and his Glen team-mates, who won it more on character than ability. I'd expect the likes of Glass and McGuigan to be taking a well-earned break after their win. I certainly hope so; I don't want to see them in action against Kerry next weekend!

St. Thomas (Galway) 0-18 O'Loughlin Gaels (Kilkenny) 0-17

This wasn't a game for the hurling purists - I don't care what anyone says, hurling is as much about physicality as skill at the top level nowadays, and that's not denying that there is plenty of skill on view. This was extremely physical but plenty entertaining – and thank God for that, because I wasn't leaving the house with the weather last Sunday. The referee showed one player a red card to a St. Thomas player at the start of the second half and both managers disagreed with that decision. Well, I disagree with the pair of them, admittedly based on TV cameras rather than my own view. That contact was so late and so reckless he had plenty of time to adjust if he wanted to do so. Frankly, I thought the referee could and should have dished out a lot more cards throughout the game.

COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP TERMS OF REVIEW AND COMMITTEE

The format of the County Championship

ALL THINGS...SPORT

has been a huge talking point last year. Understandably so - Austin Stacks, Kerins O'Rahillys, Killarney Legion....these are not Intermediate standard teams in any other county. Meanwhile, you have a dominant team compiled of an amalgamation of eleven clubs, five of them with genuine ambitions of winning an Intermediate title in their own right. Meanwhile, their closest challengers over the last number of years have lost Milltown/ Castlemaine, who have deservedly gone senior in their own right. Last year I confidently predicted the winners of the Bishop Moynihan Cup before the start of that competition. It's a less impressive trick than it sounds - because so did everybody else. It wasn't exactly hard to predict the favourites. Anybody doubt me? Because I'm pretty sure I can repeat the feat this year as well. And predictability is stagnation for any competition.

It's not just the participating teams that need a serious look. The scheduling is a problem in its own right. The GAA have absolutely packed the inter-county side of the calendar to a fairly ridiculous degree - I still loathe and despise the Super 8s, no matter what token name change they put on them. Which all means that for a county with both a county and a senior club championship, things definitely get run off very hard and fast. Look, I agreed with the previous review board that divisional teams are an important part of Kerry's structure and serve a vital purpose (especially with the effective elimination of junior inter-county football). But I strongly disagreed that the structure of those divisional teams was kept out of that discussion, that was always going to store up a problem for the future. Right now players are going straight after an All Ireland into a club championship (the main ambition for virtually every club) and straight from there into a county championship. Teams were out ten and eleven weeks in a row. I'm not remotely begrudging Cill na Martra when I say that fatigue played a big role in Milltown/Castlemaine's loss. The County Championship dropped in revenue by almost €200,000 this year. Why? I believe that the deserved success of clubber plaved a role, but the biggest factor was simply too many games coming too thick and fast and too many of them fairly meaningless. Surely going back to one simple back door option would be simpler and bring more of a do-or-die element? But look, all of that needs to be on the table and this committee will have a broad remit as below. They have the right people looking at the right questions. Unfortunately, it looks like it comes too late to implement any changes for this year. I think it's more 'festina lente' ('hasten slowly', i.e. take your time and do it right) than kicking the can down the road.

The committee will be chaired by Dara Ó Cinnéideand will include Fergus Clifford from Laune Rangers, Beale's Fergus Stack, St Senans' Eamon Whelan, Barry O'Shea from Kerins O'Rahillys, Rathmore's Dónal Murphy, Mary Jo Curran from Beaufort, and County Board representative, Terence Houlihan, CCC chair. I don't think anyone in Kerry GAA needs to be told who any of those people are, let alone examine their credentials. Their stated remit is as follows:

"(1.) To view the option of increasing the number of senior clubs in the championship and how best it can be achieved.

(2.) To decrease the number of divisional teams and how best this can be achieved.

(3.) The timing format of both club and county championship considering the window available in the fixtures calendar to the CCCC to finish these competitions in time for the provincial championships.

(4.) To examine the load on inter-county players and club players during this period and how best it can be managed.

(5.) The impact on the championships other competitions have such as the SHC and district boards."

ATHLETICS

Adeleke Smashes More Irish Records

When it comes to Irish records, Rhadisat Adeleke the proverbial is bull in a china shop. She smashes a few of them practically every time she sets foot on a competitive track. In her first open meet of the year in Albuquerque, she smashed another

two records. She finished the Indoor 60m in 7.15 seconds, beating her own previous record, and then finished the Indoor 200m in 22.49. Of course, being an Olympic year means that the spotlight and pressure will be on her non-stop, but there's no question that the raw talent and personal discipline are there in abundance.

She certainly won't have it all her own way, though, and there are plenty of athletes in Ireland that can push her on to greater heights. One of them is our own Sarah Leahy, reigning Irish 60m champion, who opened her own season with a time of 7.38.

SOCCER

Pre-Season Friendly Kerry FC 0 Galway United 3

It was just a pre-season friendly, but one from which Conor McCarthy and his team can take an awful lot of positives. Contrast this display with the 9-1 thrashing that Kerry received in their first game against Galway last year, and there is simply a gulf in class in between. On this occasion Galway were coming down as a Premier outfit, and one that will have serious ambitions of tagging on to a European place.

Leo Gaxha, probably Kerry's best player last season overall, was well shadowed by a Kerry side that started four new signings, including Galway loanees Daire McCarthy and Stephen Healy, as well as incoming captain Andy Spain (signed from Treaty United) and Jack Kavanagh (signed from Athlone Town). All four played well and, most importantly, were in synch with their team-mates. I know it's early to be judging such things but we know from last year how little chance you get to actually settle a team and I don't think any Kerry supporter can argue that we weren't vulnerable to giving away bad goals. Awful goals, in some cases.

Galway had to work for everything they got here – which, of course, is exactly what they will have wanted from a challenge game as well. Both defence were on top for the opening half hour – given Galway's pace, that's actually a great sign for Kerry. The visitors did take the lead at that stage, Stephen Walsh volleying home a good cross. 1-0 at half-time, and I'd be very happy with that scoreline.

Mind you, it was 2-0 just six minutes into the second half, and if Karl O'Sullivan can repeat that kind of shot in the league, then Galway are definitely going places. That was an absolute stunner, and new keeper Antonio Tuta (signed from Finn Harps) could do absolutely nothing about it. The third goal arrived soon enough after that, a speculative enough effort taking a wicked deflection.

Significantly, Kerry didn't drop their heads. In fact, Kennedy Amechi was only denied a goal by a good double save by the Galway keeper.

Overall, a 3-0 loss. Challenge games are a curious entity of their own. The last thing any manager wants is his team winning easily. Sem Book their Place in the Corn Uí Mhuirí Semi-Finals



Corn Uí Mhuirí Quarter-Finals

The weather played havoc with fixtures – that's unfortunately becoming an annual issue with the colleges games. Mercy Mounthawk played their semi-final against St. Francis Rochestown on the astroturf in Pairc Uí Chaoimh last week and recorded a very impressive victory. Tralee CBS played Abbey CBS in the astroturf in UL and likewise booked their last four berth in fine style. That left holders St. Brendans and Clonakilty to play their match last Tuesday in Banteer, with the astroturf there accommodating a double header of the Coláiste an Sceilge v Patrician Academy Mallow.

Unfortunately there was no joy for Coláiste an Sceilge, who lost out on a 2-11 to 1-10 scoreline. They had a lot of factors against them, not least the absence through injury of full forward lan O'Sullivan, definitely one of the top forwards in the whole competition this year. Playing in a Cork venue within comfortable reach for Mallow while travelling for two hours themselves doesn't help any team either, and most of the na Sceilge team had never played on a 4G pitch before. I strongly suspect that latter fact played a part in goalkeeper David Murphy being beaten to the punch for a soft enough goal in the first half after mis-timing his leap. Mallow's superb free-taker Ben O'Shea had five points to his name by half-time as they led by 1-8 to 1-5 at the break, with their half back line of Eoin Walsh, playmaker Gearóid Daly, and the outstanding Pádraig Britton dominating the play. Emmet Daly was Coláiste an Sceilge's top performer, with Shane Goggin and Tadhg O'Sullivan also impressive, but their full back line looked in real trouble any time the ball came in.

Emmet Daly's intercept and pass to Ben O'Donoghue with a goal on was well intercepted – Colaiste na Sceilge had no luck at all in this game – and Mallow gradually opened up a 1-11 to 1-7 gap, two of their points coming from very carelessly conceded frees. That was a bit of a killer blow, but na Sceilge showed tremendous heart and courage to cut the gap back to a single point. However, Mallow were very good at slowing the play down – they were and are a crafty team and very impressive to watch in their own right and a late goal from Dylan O'Connell sealed a 2-11 to 1-10 victory for them.

St. Brendans 2-18 Clonakilty CC 1-11

For me, this was the Sem's most convincing display so far in this campaign. The impressive performers so far in the likes of Dara Stack, Keelan O'Shea, Jamie Moynihan, Callum Cronin, and Alex Hennigan all lived up to their billing. But Maidhcí Lynch brought a real attacking dimension as well as assured defence on his return from injury. Luke O'Neill and Luke Daly grew into the game and were imperious by the finish. Oran O'Neill stepped up in the absence of Jack O'Sullivan and battled superbly throughout. He didn't win everything he contested, but he certainly contested everything. Fellow midfielder Jamie Moynihan was easily man of the match - any midfielder who scores 1-6 from play without neglecting his primary duties is an automatic selection, but I've seen few players dominate a Corn Uí Mhuirí like this one. 1-6, and almost all of them scores out of the top drawer? You won't see it often. Alex Hennigan had 1-5 himself and, arguably most encouraging of all, Pádraig O'Donoghue clipped over three good scores from play.

It was point for point early on, Alex Hennigan (2) and Oisín Fleming exchanging scores with Darragh Gough and Olan O'Donovan (2). Jamie Moyniha cut loose with 1-3on the trot at this stage, the goal coming after great work by Luke O'Neill. That had the Sem in a commanding position. Dylan Harington and Callum Cronin (f) exchanged scores, as did Darragh Gough (no cribbing, but it did look more like a free out to the Sem for me) and Robbie Harnettt. Alex Hennigan and Maidhcí Lynch on the burst had the Sem ahead by eight points before Darragh Gough reduced the gap with the final score of the first half.

Half-time St. Brendans 1-11 Clonakilty CC 0-7



DIVIDING

HERBACEOUS PERENNIALS

If you divide your herbaceous Perennials regularly it will ensure healthy, vigorous plants that will look good and should perform year after year. It also gives you the opportunity to multiply your plants.

Every two to three years should be enough to divide most perennials to maintain good vigor and healthy plants but if you want to divide them for the purpose of propagation, it can be done more regularly.

The best time to divide herbaceous Perennials is when the plants are dormant, so anytime from November to mid March.

A lot of spring flowering plants such as Irises, are best divided in summer after flowering when they produce new shoots.

When you have divided your plant and you have either planted some in the border or in pots, remember to keep well watered until established.

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A Word of Victory


Welcome back dear student "...I tell you the truth unless you turn from your sins and become like little children you will never get into the Kingdom of Heaven. So, anyone who becomes as humble as this little child is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven" (Matthew 18:3-4 NLT). Jesus said this to His disciples when they asked Him who is the greatest in His Kingdom. They weren't expecting that answer! It's an ongoing battle of the flesh to be the greatest. It fuels many people's lives. Yet the Lord Jesus warns that only those who humble themselves and look unto God, trusting Him for help (as a little child looks to his or her parents for every need) will enter His Kingdom. This is a difficult pill to swallow. People like to be independent. Self-sufficiency is a buzzword used by those seeking to live self sustainably free from society's restrictions. But spiritually many have rebuffed God's paths in a similar way because the flesh likes to do what it wants, rather than live within God's boundaries. Living apart from God is not freedom at all: it can cause people to fall into deceptive traps and snares.

In studying little children, we see they aren't puffed up in their own ability - they know they need support and help to survive, and, when they get rebellious it is their parent's job to correct and discipline them, so they learn right from wrong to live a successful life of purpose. Jesus taught to be successful in the Kingdom of God, one needs to lay aside the fleshly desires to be 'top dog' - and instead, serve God and others in humility. Some believe that to please God you must be penniless and wretched - but God never said that. It's 'the love of money' that is the root of all evil - not money itself - it's only a tool that can be used to do good or bad (1 Timothy 6:10). Poverty stinks, causing untold suffering. Therefore, humility as God teaches is not humiliation. Meekness does not mean weak or helpless. In demonstrating humility as He washed the disciples' feet, Jesus showed that the true character and nature of a Kingdom believer is to serve others in love because of our love of God desiring to honour Him in how we live (Colossians 3:17). The humble will not lord it over, or wrong others, because that is unkind - the opposite of the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22; 1 Corinthians 13:3-7). The godly will treat others as they themselves wish to be treated - the golden rule in God's Word "do to others whatever you would like them to do to you" (Matthew 7:12).

However, this doesn't mean that in an abusive relationship you sit and smile and take it. Again, humility is not weakness, God's Word is quite clear. "If it is possible, as much as depends on you live peaceably with all men" (Romans 12:18). If it's not possible to live in peace you need wisdom from God – and help or advice from professional services. God is our Deliverer and when we lean upon Him and His Word, calling upon Him in trouble, He will deliver (Psalm 91:15). The Lord Jesus said, "apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:5) so it's important to get God's perspective from His Word for every situation you face. Paul said it like this "we are confident...because of our great trust in God through Christ...not that we are sufficient of ourselves, but our sufficiency is of God" (2 Corinthians 3:4-5 NKJV).

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
