

ollowing the massive success of the inaugural Killarney Club 7s in 2022, Spa GAA are delighted to announce that their 7-A-Side Gaelic Football Tournament will be returning in 2023. ### "Ó neart go neart" -From Strength to Strength

Spirits in London were high on Tuesday morning as medals were awarded to the horticultural displays that wowed judges at the esteemed RHS Chelsea Flower Show which opens today. Ireland's Master Gardener Billy Alexander of Kells Bay Gardens was one of those who wowed the judges enough to receive a prestigious gold medal at the show. This is the third gold medal that Billy Alexander has been awarded by the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) for his rare and exotic fern displays, scooping golds at the 2021 Hampton Court, and Chelsea Flower shows respectively. Kells Bay Gardens is home to one of the largest private collections of exotic tree ferns which grow naturally in the tranquil microclimate at Kells Bay Gardens overlooking the Dingle Peninsula.

The inspiration for this year's display came from the Irish landscape, and in particular the wild surrounds of Co. Kerry. The design simulates a Kerry bog, and along with a myriad of fern varieties, native sphagnum moss

While there are considerable hurdles involved in showcasing at respected shows like the Chelsea Flower Show, around finance, logistics and maintaining a high quality of plant health it is worth every obstacle in moments like this. We are thrilled with where our exhibit is placed within the show, in a central position, and we hope to wow our many visitors over the next few days."

#### **Bowling for Killarney?**

Kerry has done well out of the Government 50 million euro community recognition fund for towns and villages taking arrivals from the Ukraine.

Killarney is to receive around €1.35 million euro for a variety of projects including office refurbishment for Kasi €250,000 and new street lighting for Christmas €40,000)

The Killarney Stars Club social and leisure activity hall for sport and fitness of special needs athletes at Ballydribeen will get the bulk of the money. The worthy project will include a community centre for Ballydribeen residents and clubs like the judo too

Marie Moloney who like Niall O'Callaghan and others campaigned for the Stars Ballydribeen facility, has welcomed the development and the inclusion of facilities for the community. It is not enough to build houses - play and other venues need to be provided at Ballydribeen for the community, Marie rightly said.

Separately, a Killarney skate park is hugely welcome and much credit is due to Donal Grady on this.

We badly need indoor facilities in the town for all ages and genders. And isn't it high time for an indoor bowling alley for Killarney town centre? It topped the wish list in last year's Chamber survey of 1,000 people. After all we have two cinemas, surely we can have two bowling alleys? Surely someone somewhere realizes that this town and all its age groups and all its nationalities would have great fun out of a bowling alley and coffee dock? A business person with an eye on a profitable indoor facility, and the right location, say in the old Torc Hotel site on the Park Road might have a go at it with a little support from the public purse, and from the next round of community recognition funding perhaps?

#### A very dignified leave taking

The people of Kenmare, and its parish priest and especially its St Clare nuns, have shown us all a thing or two in how they took their leave of their convent home of over 161 years. There are just two St Clare convents left now, the mother house in Newry and at Harold's Cross in Dublin.

It is a fact of life of a changing Ireland that convents everywhere, monasteries, and presbyteries too, will disappear and have disappeared. Churches too will go. The Church has had a troubled past, but it has also done great good was the message from Kenmare on Sunday.

Kenmare has not allowed their much loved nuns to go quietly into the ether. And to be fair the order itself has handled the very sad decision with openness and courage.

I attended the mass at Holy Cross, partly for reasons of work, but was glad to have been present for the historic occasion.

There were strong Killarney connections: Fr George Hayes, now parish priest of Kenmare is familiar from his time in Killarney. He was one of the driving forces behind the event. His homily was especially good, paying tribute to the "courageous women" who served the needs of the community.

One of the three last remaining nuns is Sr Assumpta Hegarty from Muckross and her nephew Liam Hegarty was invited to light a candle for the families of all of the nuns.

The seven original sisters of what was then the contemplative and enclosed Poor Clare Order journeyed to Kenmare via Moll's Gap in October 1861. This was so they could glimpse for the first and last time the famous lakes of Killarney. Don't forget this was just months after the hugely publicised August visit of Queen Victoria and her retinue.

Seven sisters of St Clare were present at the mass on Sunday and the symmetry was not lost on the current Abbess General Julie McGoldrick

It would now take five hours, not five days to reach Kenmare from Newry. However 'a more profound difference' had taken place in the changes in the church and religious life, the abbess said.

Having to leave Kenmare was 'a source of deep sadness'. This was a great loss to the

wiser congregation of St Clare in Ireland, but it was also a loss to Kenmare and the community in south Kerry. 'And there an be no disguising or denying this,' she said, ending with the words of St Francis of Assisi: 'We have done what was ours to do. May Christ show you what is yours.'

Local woman, Jean MacGearailt said "at a profound level, the nuns will never leave," Kenmare, as she detailed their immense contribution to education, the lae industry, culture and care.

'But it was Fr Hayes' homily which made me reflect most. The Church has had to struggle with some of the darkness of the past and take responsibility. However, 'let us not forget the good. Let us not forget the silent and often unseen contribution of countless religious women,' he said.

Kenmare has shown other towns the way to say goodbye to religious communities.

## Horse Dung back on the agenda

It is over two decades since my children were young, when I first wrote about the scourge of horse dung and about trying to clean buggies and shoes after trying to go for a walk in the national park meant for everyone. Other women too highlighted the difficulties of cycling through the dung on the Muckross Road and there was a long campaign - by women, it has to be said, to get the thing tackled.

A campaign that hit against legal and other stand offs before the successful and commendable nappy introduction. Well, it has not gone away and is back, I regret to say. Last Saturday in advance of the Mayo match, there was "a charming leaving" of a horse, right at the entrance to Scott's Street. On Sunday you could hardly walk in parts of the Demesne, with the stuff. I have seen it on Ross Road, on Mission Road, on the main Muckross road near the Abbey, and around Muckross House in recent weeks. Since the one horse can't be responsible for accidents everywhere - unless he has a serious problem and is seriously over-worked - I did have to ask myself whether the reins have slackened on the whole horse equine sanitary device project?

So I put the question to the council and they told me that, "no", it was still very much the regulation.

"There are bins. Ultimately, each horse owner and jarvey is responsible for the collection and disposal of dung,' was the response.

There is no jarvey inspector these days but the council liaises with the jarveys.

So, if you see a little horse, dropping a you know what, it shouldn't happen and it must be cleaned up.

### Pupils enjoy the Spanish Lifestyle for their annual School Tour

A trip to Bunratty Castle and a jaunt around The Crescent Shopping Centre was the classic school tour in the past.... but not anymore!

Pupils from "Glenflesk NS and Raheen NS swapped their normal routine of school work and homework for 6 days in Spain recently. A travelling party of 48 made up of children, parents and staff from both schools enjoyed cultural, educational and beach activities as part of an Erasmus Project with a school in the city of Cartagena, one hour south of Alicante. "Our trip to Spain was delayed due to Covid but it was well worth the wait" commented a delighted Paul Favier, Principal of Glenflesk NS. "It's not too often children get to travel abroad with their classmates in primary school so we think they will remember this trip for a long time. We were delighted to have a lot of parents with us and they were able to witness first-hand the benefits of such a trip". The purpose of the visit came about after both schools secured funding from The European Union for an Erasmus Project. The children from Ireland and Spain have been working together over the last 2 years on various projects. This has culminated with a trip to each other's countries. While in Spain the Irish children met with students from Salesianos School, Cartagena and over the six days enjoyed paddle boarding, kayaking, snorkeling, an open top bus tour of the city, an interactive visit to the ancient Roman ruins, lessons on sea and marine life and a full day in school. Every afternoon when all the work was done the children went to the beach for a dip in the sea and some games. When asked about the trip one child said "it was the best sleepover I've ever had" while another said the best thing about the trip was "I got to go to the beach every day with all of my friends". "It was the first time both schools undertook a project of this size and we are delighted with how it worked out. It was also the first time a lot of our pupils had been on an aeroplane", said Joan Mullane, Prinicpal of Raheen NS. "We are very grateful for all the support from our parents and staff, who helped to make the trip such a success. Our aim is to make this a regular event for both schools. Preparation is already underway to take a similar sized group to Rome in 12-18 months' time". However, before the children can start thinking about Rome, they must first host their new friends from Spain for a week in June. Paul & Joan both agreed that we are lucky to have such natural beauty on our doorstep here in Killarney and they look forward to hosting 30 children, 6 teachers and showcasing our town and schools to the Spanish. Paul suggested that "when the children and teachers from Spain come to Killarney they will have a busy few days. We are planning a mixture of cultural and educational activities. As Killarney has so much to offer, we're sure they will have a great time".



## Botanists gather at Killarney **National Park**

Botanists from all over Ireland and Britain gathered in Killarney for the Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland (BSBI) botanical 4 day summer field event to appreciate the bountiful botanical wonders of County Kerry.

Killarney National Park - National Park and Wildlife Service are among the hosts of the biggest field meeting of the year, which coincides with the start of National Biodiversity Week.

The earliest recorded botanical visit to Kerry was in 1699 and over three centuries later, County Kerry continues to interest Irish and British botanists due to the diversity of plant species and habitats. Killarney is famous for its Atlantic oak, yew and wet woodlands and the surrounding region has specialist plants in the peatlands and mountains.




### **Another Successful Day** for Muckross Rowing Club










## FLYING HIGH:

#### **KERRY OUT IN FRONT WITH 15 BLUE FLAGS FOR 2023**



Kerry has secured the highest number Blue Flag beaches in the country.

The sustained exceptional standard of the coastal and beach environment in Kerry has been acknowledged again this year with the awarding of 15 Blue Flags for Kerry beaches and coastal amenities for 2023.

It was announced by An Taisce and the Blue Flag adjudicators today that Kerry has retained its current 15 Blue Flags, including 13 at beaches and one each at the Portmagee Pontoons and the Fenit Marina. The following beaches and marinas awarded Blue Flags for 2023: Rossbeigh, Ballybunion South, Ballybunion North, Ballyheigue, Fenit, Maherbeg, Kells, Doire Fhíonáin (Derrynane), White Strand, Baile an Sceilg (Ballinskelligs), Banna, Fionntrá (Ventry), Inch, Fenit Marina and Portmagee Pontoons.

Meanwhile, four Green Coast Awards have been presented for Ballinskelligs, Béal Bán, Castlegregory and Littor beaches.

Cathaoirleach of Kerry County Council, Cllr John Francis Flynn warmly welcomed the announcement as a very significant acknowledgement

of the quality of beach environments in Kerry: 'Blue Flags are a hugely important internationally recognised indicator of the quality of a beach environment, and it is encouraging that Kerry continues to be the national leader in this regard.'

Cllr Flynn said that the awarding of the Blue Flags is a result of a collaborative approach between Kerry County Council, local community groups and beach users who work together to maintain our beautiful beaches and bathing waters.

Director of Services with Kerry County Council, Paul Neary added: 'The local authority invests tremendous effort and resources in keeping County Kerry at the top of the Blue Flag list and will continue to ensure the sustainable management of the magnificent beaches along the Kerry coast.'

'We would appeal to all beach users this summer to continue to be responsible by acting responsibly and leaving nothing behind on the beach except their footprints,' he added.

## NEARLY HALF OF ALL DRIVING LICENCE APPLICANTS HAVE CONSENTED TO ORGAN DONATION

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) is supporting the Irish Kidney Association (IKA) in encouraging road users to register as organ donors (should they so wish) ahead of this year's Organ Donor Awareness Week, taking place from 20-27 May.

Since its introduction 10 years ago, over 1.48 million people have recorded their consent to organ donation which is indicated by having Code 115 printed on their licence. Currently, there are 3.2 million individuals with either a driving licence or learner permit in Ireland, with 1,485,988\* (46.3%) motorists registered as an organ donor, according to the most recent figures available to the Road Safety Authority.

The Irish Kidney Association believes that this indicates an extremely positive public attitude towards organ donation given that there has been no dedicated public awareness campaign since the introduction of the current licence format in January 2013.

This announcement was highlighted by the Road Safety Authority (RSA) and the Irish Kidney Association (IKA) to mark Organ Donor Awareness Week (20-27 May) as they jointly encourage motorists to be aware that they can use the driving licence or learner permit application or renewal processes as one of many ways to indicate their consent for organ donation.

Senator Mark Daly, who has been the IKA's nominee to the Seanad since 2007, said that "Given that there is a legislative provision for some

aspects of driving licence data to be shared with organisations like the Gardaí I believe that there is merit to further exploring how legislation can be drafted to include data sharing of Code 115 information with healthcare professionals to facilitate a more informed discussion with families considering the wishes of a loved one. This would be a ministerial decision".

# GOOD EXAM TECHNIQUES WILL IMPROVE YOUR GRADES IN THE STATE EXAMS



#### **HIGHLIGHT**

With the state exams on the horizon, it's time to focus on your exam techniques. By planning your approach to answering the exam papers you will perform better. Begin by highlighting your exam subjects on your personal copy of the exam timetable.

#### **MARKING**

The State Examinations Commission (SEC) is gradually rolling out online marking. Twenty-six Leaving Cert. subjects and 16 Junior Cycle subjects will be marked online this year. To facilitate the scanning of the scripts, there are some changes to the appearance of both the exam papers and the stationery such as the addition of barcodes to the cover and to each page, L-shaped marks in the four corners of each page and 'hatching' along the centre spines.

#### **ANSWERBOOK**

A 36-page answer book will be used in all Leaving Certificate subjects where a separate answer book is required. In addition to the front cover and some instructions on page 2, the answer book has 34 lined pages. Candidates must shade in fully the circle for the subject, the level, and the language that they are answering through. They must also fill in their exam number and date of birth on the front of the answer book. Specimen answer book and specimen exam paper design can be viewed at www.examinations.ie.

#### **FORMAT**

Be familiar, well in advance of each exam session, with the format of each paper you will be sitting. Know how the paper is presented. What topics are examined? How many questions must be answered? What styles of question can you expect on any exam paper? Familiarise yourself with the choice available on the paper. Are some questions compulsory or is there an open choice? Be careful with a paper, which is subdivided into subsections. Without prior knowledge of such a paper you could easily fail to address the relevant number of questions. Over the next few weeks, as you do past papers, and again at the exam, read the instructions carefully.

**LEGIBLE** 

Write your answers in blue or black pen. Use pencil for graphs and diagrams and work neatly down the page. Write clearly and legibly. Use diagrams, sketches and illustrations if they enhance your answer. Use decent size diagrams, as they are quicker to draw and allow more detail. The presentation of your answering won't merit extra marks but a well-presented script makes a favourable impression on the corrector.

#### **QUALITY**

The core of any exam is the quality of your answering. The content of your answer must be relevant to the question asked. Read each question carefully before deciding which ones to answer. Tackle a good question first to settle you down. Before answering a question, list the key points around which you will build your answer. Be concise, accurate and relevant. Don't be long-winded or wordy. Waffle and repetition will not impress the corrector.

#### **TIMING**

Doing well in any exam involves knowing the course material but also in presenting your answers within the time allowed. Attempt the required number of questions. If you don't attempt a question, you can't possibly earn any marks for it. Be familiar with the marking scheme for each paper and work out in advance the approximate time you can spend on each question. The time allocated to each question should be in direct proportion to the marks available for that question. The candidate who attempts the required number of questions is the one who has the best chance of maximising her/his grade in that subject.

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

When your exam paper is handed to you read the instructions. Then spend about five minutes reading the entire paper. This preliminary scrutiny of all the questions gives you the feel for the paper. It allows you to settle down and gather your thoughts. Stick to your own preprepared answering plan and once you have made your choice of questions, start with a question you can answer well. As you warm to your task, you will be pleasantly surprised at the font of information that comes to mind, as you need it.

#### REREAL

When you have finished answering each question, reread it to ensure you haven't omitted any part. Allow at least five minutes at the end of the exam to read back over your answers and to check your overall presentation.

#### **CHECKLIST**

- It's now time to focus on your answering strategy
- A planned approach to answering leads to success
- A well-presented script makes a favourable impression
- Number your questions clearly and write neatly and legibly
- Read the entire paper before deciding which questions you will answer
- Keep your answers concise, accurate and relevant
- Familiarise yourself with the logistics of each exam paper
- Be careful with a paper which is subdivided into subsections
- The time spent on a question must be in proportion to the marks for the question
- Proper allocation of time will enable you to attempt the required number of questions
- Reread the question when you have answered it to ensure you haven't left out a part
- Remain in the exam hall until the end of each session
- Examination timetables are available on www.examinations.ie.




## IT'S TAKE TWO FOR KILCUMMIN AND GLENFLESK GAA CLUBS WITH OSKAR FUNDRAISER!

hear from Kevin Rowe, the events company helping with fundraiser and chat to people who took part previously. Following on from



### SUMMER EYES







### More must be done to protect Gardaí from attacks - Pa Daly TD

Sinn Féin spokesperson on Justice, Pa Daly TD, has welcomed moves to increase sentences for assaults on Garda and warned much more must be done to protect them on the frontline.

His comments came as measures were brought to cabinet today on increasing sentencing.

Speaking today, Teachta Daly said: "Gardaí work on the frontline, protecting and serving communities. Recent high profile attacks on officers have exposed some of the appalling and unacceptable violence that they face in the line

of duty.

"I welcome moves to increase sentences for people who assault Gardaí. This should be expanded to all service personnel to send a clear message that this sort of violence is not acceptable.

"However, this is only one aspect. We must ensure that Gardaí have the resources and staffing levels to do their jobs safely as well. Fine Gael have consistently failed to invest in the service over the course of the last decade, resulting in many Gardaí feeling demoralised and unsupported."

### TREATMENT ABROAD SCHEME/EU CROSS BORDER DIRECTIVE

ollowing the recent critical report by the Ombudsman, Ger Deering on the Health Service Executive's refusal to reimburse legitimate expenses for Irish patients getting treatment abroad under the EU Cross Border Directive, Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill called on the Minister for Health to initiate a full review of all historic cases to ensure that all medical, travel and accommodation expenses are reimbursed in a timely manner. "Under the Treatment Abroad Scheme, treatment not readily available at home and that can be accessed in another country, you may qualify for HSE reimbursement. There are cases where reimbursement takes much too long or doesn't happen at all, and this must be corrected" said Councillor Cahill.

"I am aware of a number of cases in Killorglin Glenbeigh, Cromane, Beaufort and Killarney

where patients who travelled to Belfast under the EU Cross Border Directive for their cataracts have been left waiting months for their money. I am aware of one particular case where a lady in Caherciveen has been left waiting over 8 months for her payment" stated Councillor Cahill

"These people have paid in full for these procedures at great expense to themselves and they should not have to wait any longer than a couple of weeks to be reimbursed" stated Councillor Cahill at this month's meeting of Kerry County Council.

"It is after all the taxpayer who is footing the bill for this scheme" added Councillor Cahill.

"I raised the matter with Minister Donnelly during his recent visit to the county and he confirmed that he was aware of the delays and he asked me to forward on the details of the

patients involved" said Councillor Cahill.

"Patients have borrowed money to fund such trips and sometimes find that they will not be refunded, leaving them in sizeable debt. Accommodation costs are covered if booked by the hospital at the other side, but if you have to book it yourself, the cost will not be reimbursed to you and this is outrageous" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"If your luggage is included in flight costs by the airline, you will be reimbursed, but if the airline lists it separately, you will not. Is this not the ultimate in Red Tape and bureaucracy" asked Councillor Cahill.

"This is a rubbish approach and this is why I have put down this Notice of Motion and I am asking Kerry County Council to write to the Minister calling on him to rectify it, retrospectively" added Councillor Cahill.

### Time to take a look at the Judicial System

Michael Cahill has once again called for a full re-appraisal of the penalty regime within our Judicial System. He believes millions of Euro can be saved, if we just look at why we are allowing our prison system to come under unnecessary pressure by committing offenders for minor infractions.

"As I said before, our Judicial System is totally clogged up at present with repeat offenders who are appearing before the courts on a regular basis, on petty crime, public order and/or road traffic violations" said Councillor Cahill.

"Many receive fines and jail time in default of payment and then after maybe seven court appearances during the year, having declined to pay, warrants are issued and they are conveyed to prison. When these warrants are then reviewed at the prison and if adjudged to be minor in nature, many are released immediately with a newly cleaned slate" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"It should be possible through legislation, to bring in a regime where we identify certain offences which are not punishable by jail time. Fines could be deducted, over time, from income, while our Gardaí and Prison Service members could be redirected to more productive duties" said Councillor Cahill.

"Building more Prisons is not the answer to overcrowding, we need to think outside the box to find common sense solutions" added Councillor Cahill

## MAYO SEND OUT SIGNAL OF INTENT

#### Group Stage: Mayo 1-19 Kerry 0-17

There were questions swirling around this Kerry team after getting well beaten up in Castlebar in the National League. And yours truly had a wry smile on his face – I have literally lost count of the amount of times over the years that Mayo have looked almost unbeatable in the National League, only to come a championship cropper when other teams start warming their engines later on? No, I was quietly confident coming into this one, even if I wasn't going to say it out loud., I thought Kerry looked business-like and purposeful against an admittedly toothless Clare and I felt that we had a fair bit of dry powder kept in reserve.

A small crowd. A small enough crowd to worry the GAA, I'd imagine. After all the usual talk about a sell-out, the official attendance hovered around 22,000. I imagine people were budgeting for this elongated and expensive championship format; I suspect that it's a bit too elongated, but I'll reserve judgement just yet.

Referee Seán Hurson threw in the ball....and Mayo simply, absolutely, and most certainly took us to the cleaners. Right from the start they sliced through our defence, with Shane Ryan making a superb save from close range to deny Mattie Ruane a certain goal. Instead Ryan O'Donoghue settled for a point. Tadhg Morley made a good block. James Carr, whose movement drew a frazzled Jason Foley out the field and opened space for Mayo to target, dropped a good chance short. Ruane, switching in and out of midfield, drove into that space and laid off to Carr – once again, Shane Ryan's reflexes saved Kerry.

At the other end I got the impression that Mayo's strength and conditioning was better than ours. Certainly they were much faster onto every breaking ball and well able to physically match Kerry, with players dropping deep to swarm Kerry attackers before breaking

at speed, a pace that Kerry never looked comfortable with.

Aidan O'Shea was acting as a target inside and it was working. The truth is that while Dylan Casey is a serious talent and has great potential, he wasn't ready for a big gun like O'Shea just yet. The big man won and slotted a free himself. That was an interesting one, I had assumed that O'Donoghe or possibly Flynn would be on the frees, but O'Shea was clearly the designated taker and that might be another shrewd move by Kevin McStay, bolstering O'Shea's confidence.

Paul Geaney, who actually had a good outing in the circumstances, opened Kerry's account in the 8th minute. Aidan O'Shea responded with another free. David Clifford was the one Kerry player who looked a viable and constant threat, and he laid off to a speedy Tom O'Sullivan for a fine score before adding a beauty himself. 0-3 apiece.

Pádraig Ó hÓra made a fantastic run before notching his first ever championship score – again, Kerry just couldn't live with the speed. Straight from the kick-out James Carr won possession and clipped over. Kerry were at sixes and sevens here. A foul on Jason Doherty saw Ryan O'Donoghue point a free. Aidan O'Shea, always a huge influence, drew another foul off Dylan Casey and converted it himself.

Tadhq Morley went off briefly to receive treatment - I felt that it affected him for the rest of the game, but the truth is that his shielding role in the tactical set-up designed by Paddy Tally that was crucial to us winning last year's All Ireland is an open book to other teams now. Where other forwards were roving into space and forcing defenders to follow them, Tadhg was man-marked from start to finish and it meant that he couldn't be deployed in the free role he operates so well. At one stage, our last line in defence was comprised of Paudie Clifford, Seán O'Shea, and Paul Geaney, all dropping deep to fill in gaps as our actual defenders were following their men. Credit where due, this wa a tactical masterclass by

Kevin McStay and Donie Buckley.

Dara Moynihan and Sean O'Shea combined to feed Paudie Clifford, who won a free converted by Seán O'Shea. Kerry badly needed that score. Conor Loftus got penalised for over-holding the kick-out – harsh enough, I thought – and David added another free. 0-7 to 0-5. We were being well outplayed, but that was no big gap on the scoreboard.

Kerry were switching defenders around now in an attempt to improve the match-ups, but to no real avail. James Carr fired over a superb score, with Dara Moynihan quickly replying.

David Clifford was the one leading light for Kerry, the only outfield player to really dominate his individual duel. Like Dylan Casey on Aidan O'Shea, having David McBrien on the reigning Footballer of the Year was too much to ask of the relatively inexperienced defender, with David winning and pointing another free. Ryan O'Donoghue replied after a quick Mayo kick-out and the gap was back to two points again, 0-9 to 0-7.

Dylan Casey made a good break forward but went for goal when he might have been better off to take a point – as it was, he couldn't get any power into the shot and it was gathered harmlessly. Tom O'Sullivan had another effort just fail to curl inside the post, good effort.

Mayo put on a strong burst as the first half started drawing to a close. Jack Carney split the posts. Once again Mayo gobbled up the kick-out and Ryan O'Donoghue slotted over, followed rapidly by James Carr. Carr also had a goal chance, with Shane Ryan once again saving Kerry's bacon and Colm Reape narrowly wide with the '45.

Half-time Mayo 0-12 Kerry 0-7, and Mayo were full value for every bit of their lead.

Paul Murphy came on for Dylan Casey at halftime. The stacks man will have better days in the jersey. Tony Brosnan was sacrificed for Adrian Spillane – Tony hadn't done much wrong with very limited possession, but we desperately needed to shore up a flatlining midfield. That was clearly emphasized when Mattie Ruane

deftly robbed Jack Barry and slotted over to maker it a six point game. David Clifford won and converted another free but another Mayo turnover saw Jason Doherty notch a point.

Paul Geaney, one of the few players who did impress, picked off a good score. Diarmuid O'Connor (the Kerry one) had an effort drop short before David Clifford drew a brilliant save out of Colm Reape.

Paudie Clifford did well to find his brother again and David showed phenomenal skill to get a rocket shot off in a crowded square – I'm not sure people appreciate how much technical skill that required – but it came off Sam Callinan on the goal-line. Some days Kerry have no luck at all if they didn't have bad luck, but at this level the truth is that you make your own luck. Sean O'Shea pointed the '45 and it was back to a four point game, 0-14 to 0-10.

A great catch by Jack Barry set up David Clifford with another goal, chance. This time it went agonisingly wide. At the other end Mattie Ruane should really have goaled after James Carr laid off to him, but once again Shane Ryan managed to defy him.

David Clifford blasted a point from close range – the expression on his face said that it wasn't a point he had been looking for – with Donnacha McHugh fisting over the Kerry crossbar in reply. David laid off to Paul Geney for another Klerry score. 0-15 to 0-12 – frankly, we did not remotely deserve to be within one score of a much superior Mayo team.

Once again you have to credit Kevin McStay. I had initially been somewhat sceptical about the idea of two debutantes in the full back line against the All Ireland champions on ground where they hadn't lost in 28 years (much overused though that stat has been last week), but when you saw the likes of Paddy Durcan and Enda Hession coming off the bench, you realised with a sinking feeling that Mayo were going to be finishing with a stronger team than they had started.

Durcan had an immediate impact – again, his pace just killed us – winning a free converted by Ryan O'Donoghue. David Clifford somehow found room near the sideline to swing over another brilliant score despite being tightly marked, but it was individual brilliance, whereas Mayo were playing team football. Ruairi Murphy was narrowly wide with a good effort. It still felt like Kerry could take something from this game, especially with David's dangerous presence around goal.

Mayo shut that door firmly with a goal of their own, a fine finish by Eoghan McLaughlin after they once again opened us up at speed. Not undeserved, in fairness. 1-16 to 0-13.

David pulled another one back – there's no question who was by far and away Kerry's best player, with Shane Ryan in that conversation as well. Colm Reape got turned over as he came out of goal – I disapprove of the modern tendency to use keepers as an extra man – but Kerry couldn't get it in fast enough and David had to content himself with another point.

Paddy Durcan once again was too fast for flailing defenders and fisted over, with Mattie Ruane adding another. Aidan O'Shea, absolutely trojan all day, was named man of



the match. He was absolutely brilliant, but I thought Ruane was at the epicentre of Mayo's success as well.

Seán O'Shea and Tom O'Sullivan kicked late scores for Kerry, but it was just empty defiance at that stage and Jordan Flynn (who had a great battle with Gavin White all day, preventing the Crokes man having his usual influence in the opposition half) closed out a memorable and thoroughly deserved Mayo victory.

This was a bad day for Kerry. I'm not too bothered by that unbeaten home record - that sort of thing is great as a hook for media stories and can all too easily become a monkey on the back, but we were taken to school. Mayo have announced themselves as genuine contenders - I hope for their sake that they keep their feet on the ground. It's early days yet, but they have pace, power, real scorers even in the absence of Cillian O'Connor (and scoring power has been their achilles heel in the past) and a great tactical set-up. They switched from blanket defence to all-out attack at speed and made good Kerry players look ponderous. We are better than that. We need Adrian Spillane as a third midfielder, and that means sacrificing a starting forward. We need our full back line, especially Jason Foley, to mind the house more than marking a man. We need other forwards to take some of the burden off David Clifford's broad shoulders. Without him or Shane Ryan's superb saves, this would have been an absolute hammering. I'm not sure we can do a lot about strength and conditioning in the time left. Hopefully it was just a one-off, but we were second best all day and that's a huge worry going forward.

Even if we fix the manifest problems – and Jack does tend to be good at unorthodox solutions, third choice midfielder Donaghy to full forward in 2006 being a prime example – the road just got a lot harder. Assuming that we beat Cork (and I am worried about a full strength Cork, look at the players they were missing against Clare) and Louth, we would still be most likely facing a home pre-quarter-final ('pre-quarter-final'. The concept is ridiculous) while group stage winners get a weekend off. That's a big disparity in energy expenditure in what is already a very gruelling schedule. Right now,

we look a bit behind Galway, Mayo, Dublin (who have a comparatively easy group). Indiscipline cost Tyrone but they have dangerous potential while both Derry and Armagh look good.

Early days, and this was an obstacle rather than a road block – I remember the days when a single defeat to Cork would end Kerry's year. Maybe the lessons learnt last weekend will pay off in the long term.

But right now, that looks like a very big maybe. ## UNCONVINCING KERRY SEE OFF LIMERICK

Munster Minor Semi-Final: Kerry 1-19 Limerick 1-2

Talk about a mixed bag. When I saw this year's Kerry minor panel, I have to say that I was quietly confident. There's a lot of talent there, I saw a lot opf these lads at underage. A fair bit of muscle as well, and the hard reality is that size does matter, people.

I wasn't even that worried about the defeat to Cork. Kerry were very slow out of the blocks and gave away a few soft enough scores, including an unnecessary penalty, and we still looked the better team in the second half. Cork were very good – that was exhibition stuff by Dara Sheedy – but I actually felt that Kerry had slightly more long-term potential.

Then came the Limerick game. And slow out of the blocks doesn't even begin to describe it. After nineteen minutes the score was 0-1 to 0-0 in favour of Limerick. Both sides had three wides, none of them great chances. Kerry were very much second best. Limerick, in fairness, had clearly put in a lot of work. They were fast,. Determined, and much, much sharper onto loose ball. Kerry were huffing and puffing. The problem for Limerick, and I say this genuinely respectfully, is that their club and schools football simply isn't of the same calibre as Kerry's. They just weren't technically skilled enough to take advantage of the possession and put it on the scoreboard. Gaelic football is one of a number of hobbies up there, whereas down here it's practically a religion. You could argue the reverse in hurling - Tralee CBS and Mercy Mounthawk compete in Limerick competitions in hurling and camogie and it has paid good dividends this year. I do sometimes wonder if a combined Kerry colleges team could possibly compete in the Harty Cup, just as West Clare colleges used to do in the Corn Uí Mhuirí.

In the 19th minute Dara Hogan kicked a good Kerry point. I have to be honest; the cheer from the Kerry supporters was a little bit ironic. They weren't impressed, and I include myself in that. Limerick came back straightaway and Pádraic Murphy scored a very good goal. No harm at all, thought I. It was already obvious that Limerick weren't going to be working the scoreboard too much, so there was plenty of time for Kerry to get up to speed and claw that back.

Kerry did rev up a gear. Sadly, and I really think it it a pity, Limerick faded away faster than a cheshire cat in a Lewis Carroll novel. Kerry clipped over five points on the trot, four of them from the outstanding Paddy Lane, to lead by 0-6 to 1-1 at half-time.

The third quarter was more of the samne. Ben Murp[hy tore up from full back (personally I'd have Mulvihill or Shane Clifford at full back and release Murphy further out to utilise his pace), Lane again, the outstanding Evan Boyle, Lane with a free, sub Stephen Gannon, who could have gone for goal....Limerick were being coolly dismantled, and their cause wasn't helped by a second yellow card.

Dara Hogan had a shot stopped on the line, withg James Hoare slotting the '45. Lane and Ronan Carroll made it 0-14 to 1-1. Limerick sub Eoghan Beston kicked their first point from play in the 49th minute.

Stephen Gannon kicked two more points, both of whom could have been goals. You won't get that many goal chances against Cork, I firmly believe that you need to take every single one. At this level you need to be instinctively ruthless. Limerick had a second man dismissed – it wasn't a dirty game by any means.

Kerry tacked on more points. Frankly, they could have run riot here if they wanted. Dara Hogan did finally get the ball in the net and Evan Boyle drew a great save out of Sam Guerin before Stephen Gannon closed out a victory that won't have instilled too much confidence

in Kerry. The big takeaway for management and players will be that 19 scoreless minutes. You won't get away with that again.

#### CHAMPIONS CUP HEARTBREAK FOR LEINSTER

Champions Cup Final: La Rochell 27 Leinster 26

Last year Leinster could rue their luck after bowing out at the hands of Ronan O'Gara's La Rochelle. This year must feel far worse. This was as cruel a defeat as you can imagine.

Leinster were already smarting after losing out to Munster and a late Jack Crowley penalty that ended their hopes of a double, but Leinster could at least say that they hadn't used all their big guns in that game. Lining out at full strength here apart from Sexton, they looked a very different proposition in front of a boisterous home crowd. That crowd had a reason to cheer right from the start, Jack Conan sending Dan Sheehan in for an instant try, with Ross Byrne nailing the conversion.

Conan was cutting wreck here. After just six minutes Leinster were in again, lovely play by Gibson Park to Jimmy O'Brien, who powered over. This time Byrne's kick hit the post. La Rochelle looked constantly jittery (hard to blame them in these circumstances) and they lost a man to the sin bin. That's meat and drink to a team of Leinster's experience and they promptly took advantage with another try, Gibson park again brilliant in lining it up for Dan Sheehan to once again power over. Byrne again hit the post with the conversion - Andy Farrell will have decisions to make soon enough, but that's a problem for another day. 17-0 already. This could be a slaughter before Leinster sew on that coveted fifth star on their jerseys.

One of the things I always enjoyed about the rivalry between O'Gara and Sexton back when they were vying for the Irish jersey like Ward and Campbell a generation before them was that, unlike Tony and Ollie, they were doggedly stubborn. They didn't particularly like each other and weren't good at hiding it.

I'm not criticising it; I liked it. They never gave each other a single inch. It takes a lot to finish O'Gara, and La Rochelle obviously understand his mindset. They got into the game. Didn't get over the line, but forced Leinster into some good defending and asked guestions.

In the 20th minute they won a scrum and Danty danced through to finish it one-handed. Lovely skill, and Hastoy slotted the extra points. 17-7. This game wasn't over.

Leinster with a penalty, and Byrne coolly puts it over. The game began to get a bit physical, with James Ryan as you would expect putting his body in the way of everything and he eventually goes off for a HIA. A blow for Leinster, but they are still in control, with Byrne adding a penalty. Just about, though, as they give some careless ball away. Keenan manages to stop a La Rochelle try at the last second, but the French team are visibly growing in confidence. This is turning into a bit of a dogfight, and I never saw a French team hesitate when it comes to playing that game.

Just before half-time La Rochelle get in again, good pressure seeing Ulapano Seuteni find just enough of a gap. Hastoy slotted the conversion and it's 23 – 14. Leinster would obviously be the happier side at half-time, but La Rochelle are giving themselves a real chance here.

Leinster absorb early second half pressure well but a great break by Seuteni puts La Rochell on the front foot and they end up with a penalty put over by Hastoy. Gibson Park almost got in for a try before Byrne adds a penalty for Leinster to restore the nine point gap. Hastoy with another penalty and he takes the points I'd say he thought a bit about going for it, but I think cutting the gap to a single try and conversion was the right move. La Rochelle's physical strength is starting to show, but Leinster, especially Andrew Porter, are very composed in defence. Fifteen minutes left. La Rochelle look more and more ominous, with Leinster starting to cough up penalties. It's a matter of hanging on now.

Eight minutes left. Disaster for Leinster as Colombe Reazel gets over. You can't say it wasn't coming. To compound matters, Kelliher is sin binned just when Leinster need all hands on deck. Hastoy slots the conversion and La Rochelle are in front for the first time.

Injury for a La Rochelle player and a red card for Ala'Alatoa. Can't really argue, and it's costly as it takes away Leinster's momentum.

In the end of an incredible match, it's heartbreak for Leinster and delirium for one Munster man as La Rochelle take the Champions Cup by a single point.

Long term it will be interesting to see if this affects the Irish players heading into the World Cup, but for now it's La Rochelle's day after an amazing comeback.

# NG WINDOW BO

Again there is a large range of different types of window boxes and containers. The most popular ones are the plastic. If it's a plastic window box that you have the first thing you must do is sort out the drainage.

Turn the window box upside down and you will see holes marked out. You can either use a screw driver or a drill to punch out these holes. Turn the box back up and put some small stones or polysterine around the holes. Fill the box with compost and a slow release fertiliser to about half an inch from the top of the box and firm in compost. When choosing the plants for the window box make sure that the taller plants are at the back trailing plants towards the front and medium sized plants for fillers inbetween.

A good example for tall plants at the back of the box would be upright geraniums or upright fuchsias. Good trailing plants for the front of the box would be trailing geraniums or trailing petunias. Other examples of good trailing plants for fillers would be trailing lobelia, bacopa and bidens.

When you box is planted, water in plants well and don't put into position for a few days. Remember that all window sills slope so when your trailing plants start to grow you will need something to hold you box in position.


Welcome back dear student, let's talk about thorns. Thorns hurt, and they choke good plants. In God's Word they symbolise curse. After Adam and Eve disobeyed God, the Lord announced that the ground would no longer produce for Adam as it had in the garden (Read Genesis chapter 3). Now his work would be marked by toil and strain, forever fighting a battle to survive. "Cursed is the ground because of you; through painful toil you will eat food from it all the days of your life. It will produce thorns and thistles for you, and you will eat the plants of the field. By the sweat of your brow, you will eat your food until you return to the ground, since from it you were taken; for dust you are and to dust you will return" (Genesis 3:17-19). Adam and Eve's sin had disconnected them from the Spirit of God. And when God's Spirit departed from them, so did His blessing. Up to then they never had to strive for anything. Everything was provided by God. But because they listened to the lies of the serpent, they were tricked into exchanging their master from God to the devil. Everything that Satan is involved with is cursed, but blessing comes from the LORD (James 1:17).

Jesus told the parable of 'the Sower' to His followers (Matthew chapter 13). None of them understood it. He explained that the Sower – God – sows the Word as a seed into our lives, but the Word is not always fruitful in the same way as a garden seed doesn't always produce. One reason a seed is unfruitful is because thorns grow up sabotaging the harvest, choking the plant, making it unfruitful. So, thorns bring curse and extinguish blessing. Jesus wore a crown of thorns for our Redemption from curse. Our sin separated us from God's Presence and curse entered as a result, but Jesus' death and His sinless blood paid our ransom.... "the wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). That's the Good News! (1st Peter 1:18-25) The soldiers humiliated and mocked King Jesus with the crown of thorns. "Then the governor's soldiers took Jesus....and gathered the whole company of soldiers around Him. They stripped Him and put a scarlet robe on Him, and then twisted together a crown of thorns and set it on His head. They put a staff in His right hand. Then they knelt in front of Him and mocked Him. "Hail, king of the Jews!" they said. They spit on Him and took the staff and struck Him on the head again and again" (Matthew 27:27-30 NIV).

What does this mean for you and me? The crown of thorns was the symbol of curse which Jesus bore upon His head so you and I could be set free from curse, rejection, hopelessness and all stress. Where is the first place we experience stress and fear? In the head! Jesus shed His blood there as they mashed that painful crown onto His head, so that our heads could have Peace. "He was pierced for our sin, He was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on Him, and by His wounds we are healed" (Isaiah 53:5) It's interesting as we celebrate Pentecost this week - when the Holy Spirit came — that, because Jesus took the curse on His head, the Spirit of God could now come and rest upon the heads and live in those whom He delivered from curse and death forever (Acts chapter 2). Hallelujah!
