The Lily Daly Foundation's 1st fundraising event, "Lily's Pink Challenge" which took place on the 16th September last in Killarney raised  $\in$ 35,670. This enormous amount was raised following the registration fees paid by 432 individuals that took on Lily's Pink Challenge and also donations made by over 350 individuals and local organisations to the Lily Daly Foundation.

Lily's mom and managing Director of the Lily Daly Foundation, Caroline Daly said "The amazing goodwill, support and generosity shown from almost 800 people from all across Kerry, Ireland and beyond who either completed Lily's Pink Challenge, volunteered on the day or made generous donations has been truly phenomenal and way beyond our initial expectations and wildest dreams when we set off on this journey. The Lily Daly Foundation is now in a very fortunate position, thanks to the amazing support we received, to give back in a very meaningful way to our two chosen charities and the amazing work they do for sick children and their parents"

The Lily Daly Foundation has made a €25,000 donation to the new Ronald McDonald house currently being built at the New National Children's hospital in Dublin. This specific donation will sponsor a new bedroom within the new Ronald McDonald house, which will be called after Lily Daly. This room will provide accommodation to parents and families while their child is metres away from "When a child is seriously ill and in hospital it is vital for their parents from outside of Dublin to be able to stay close to their child and not have the worries of trying to find and secure accommodation. This is something we experienced ourselves when Lilv was sick and that is why we were keen that the Lily Daly Foundation would give back and make such a specific and significant donation to the new Ronald McDonald House that families can use long into the future", Caroline said.

Joe Kenny, CEO of Ronald McDonald House said "It is very special and unique that a past family of the house have sponsored a bedroom for future families. It's a room that will be very much loved". The Lily Daly Foundation also made a donation of  $\in$ 10,670 to the heart centre in Crumlin hospital, to specifically support the development of the Axial INSIGHT project that aims to enable medics and medical device companies develop a system that can generate a 3D personalised model of a child's own specific heart pre surgery and catheterization. This will enable the consultants within the heart centre to print 3D images of a child's heart which will assist with decision making on surgery.

"Supporting the purchase of this 3D printing machine is ground breaking and will make a difference in the area of children's heart medicine which is something the Lily Daly Foundation is keen to support going forward", Caroline said.

Speaking on behalf of the Heart centre in Crumlin hospital, Dr Adam James said "We are honoured that after the tough times the Daly family endured in Crumlin, that they were now giving back to future generations. Their strength is amazing given the difficult times they have experienced". Lily's Pink Challenge - involved a 60 km cycle through the Gap of Dunloe, and/or a 10 km run/ walk around Ross Castle and Killarney National Park.

The Lily Daly Foundation's primary mission and

purpose is to support children and their parents when in hospital with heart related issues. Lily Daly was born in 21 June 2019 and suffered from Pulmonary Vein Stenosis, a very rear condition affecting the heart

and surrounding arteries. Unfortunately, after frequent visits to Crumlin, major heart surgery in both Crumlin and the Presbyterian Hospital in New York, Lily passed away on the 26 February 2021.

### SADNESS AT THE PASSING OF ANNE HEALY

Anne Healy, 92, passed away peacefully at the Palliative Unit in UKH surrounded by her family on the 13th October. Anne was a beloved character and immersed her life in various avenues throughout the community. Born on May 13th 1931 and died on Our Lady of Fatima, Holy Day. This was very significant as Anne was a deeply religious person. She served as Eucharist Minister for many decades and devoted her personal time helping with many pilgrimages to Lourdes, Lough Derg and Knock. She also aided the Irish Wheelchair Association and distributed Meals on Wheels also.

Anne's life wasn't easy as she lost her dad when she was only 6. She was the eldest to her siblings Paddy, Mary, Catherine, Michael, Donal and John Joe and had to grow up fast. She assisted her mom on the farm, in Kilbrean and helped raise her younger siblings.

Her first job was working in Mulcahy's shoe shop. She was then accepted into St. Finian's as a student nurse. Upon qualifying as a nurse, she went to Walton, Liverpool to graduate in General Nursing. Returned home after graduating and started her long career as a nurse in St. Finian's. She furthered her career, to Assistant Director of Nursing, until her retirement in 1996.

Anne lived a busy and fulfilled life. She cared for her mother Catherine after a stroke in 1987 to 1993, all the time working full time. She loved a game of cards and was a member of the Bridge and Whist clubs locally. Went on various holidays with her many great friends and always had a smile on her face.



Anne was surrounded by her 32 nieces and nephews and it was rarely you would see her without children. She loved them all dearly and affectionately called them her little Tankereens. Her eldest nephew, Denisín, christened her Auntie and it stuck with her with family, friends and neighbours. She was extremely kind and very generous to them. She also had an adopted family. The O Shea's, Mary and Mike, were neighbours and became firm friends. She often babysat the children Michael, Mark and Clare and treated them like her own. She would have loved that Clare said the first reading of her funeral mass and the boys were pall bearers. While Mike and Mary were the funeral directors of MD O Shea's Funeral Home. Her mass was very personal as it was served by her friend Fr. Kieran O Brien and family friend Fr. Martin Spillane



in St. Mary's Cathedral. The readings and Prayers of the Faithful were said by her nieces Celine Sky, Anne Holland, Anne Marie Healy, Evelyn Murphy, Elaine O Loughlin, Geraldine O Sullivan and Stephanie O Connor. The personal gifts were given up by Kathleen O Donoghue and Kathleen O Reilly. While the offertory gifts were brought up by her Grandnephew and Grandniece Noah Murphy and Ciara O Connor. The pallbearers were her many nephews. Eulogy was presented by her niece Marion Kervick and nephew Colm Healy. Both gave stories of their memories of Auntie and were met with both laughter and tears. A heartfelt ceremony and a very honourable guard of honour from her friends of St. Finian's and Card Clubs.

In the past few years Anne's health had started to slowly deteriorate and sincere thanks to her many carers who visited her home. Her last few days were in the wonderful facility of the Palliative Unit in UHK and the staff was so kind and helpful. Her fantastic neighbours in Muckross Grove were extremely kind to Anne and she couldn't have wished for better ones.

Anne, is now at peace in Muckross Abbey, with her mom, dad, brothers Donal, Paddy, sister Catherine. Also her nephew John C Healy and niece Tara Healy Kenny along with her brother in law John Michael Spillane and Sister in Law Máire Healy. As in the words of her niece Marion Kervick, said in her eulogy "her smile was made of sunshine and her heart was solid gold". "Death ends a Life but not a relationship". Anne's memory will always live on in her work and her kindness to others.

May her kind soul Rest in Peace.

### Passing of Kerry Way walking trail founder Seán Ó Súilleabháin



Seán Ó Súilleabháin's passing has been met with sadness by the people of Kerry in particular Killorglin his home town on Wednesday morning.

Seán was regarded as one of Ireland's foremost walking experts. He was an avid hiker/walker all his life. He founded the premier long distance waymarked route in Ireland - 'The Kerry Way' in the 1980's thus conserving earlier lines of travel and access to historic sites, and was chair of the voluntary committee that aims to maintain and extend the route.

Noel Spillane, CEO, South Kerry Development Partnership remarked -

"Seán was a wonderful community stalwart, who gave very generously of his time to SKDP, both as a former board member, member of the SKDP LEADER Evaluation Committee and former chairperson of the RSS/Tus working group.

He was great attender and contributor to our meetings and was always prepared to give his time - whether it was chairing sub-structures of SKDP or participating on interview panels. He was of course a pioneer and founder of the Kerry Way and his vision and hard work led to the establishment of the Kerry Way. Up until his health permitted he attended our SKDP/Kerry Way Committee Meetings and we always appreciated his very valuable contributions.

I want to extend our deepest sympathies to Seán's family and the Kerry Way Committee on behalf of the board, management & staff of South Kerry Development Partnership."

"it is with a heavy heart that we write this post. Seán Ó Súilleabháin our Chair and Founding member of the Kerry Way has sadly passed away on Wednesday. The Derreen Sports Cetnre unveiled by students from The Pres and The Sem before Education minister Norma Foley at St Brendan's College last Friday is a stellar project. Some 115 athletes 'will finally have a home'. As will co-leaders St Paul's basketball and the Killarney Judo club, along with several others.

Kerry star Martina McCarthy after viewing the model lead-designed by architect Davide Mosca remarked 'Is this really for us?' Martina later delivered the thank you address and was warmly praised by Minister Foley.

Cllr Niall O'Callaghan, a patron of the Kerry Stars Club has been the driving force, it was acknowledged.

'I want to thank Niall O'Callaghan. He has been the heart and soul in this project,' an

Cllr Maura Healy Rae has hightlighted the need 'to recognise and act on the serious dangers being posed at Torc Waterfall'. Cars are being parked on the public road which is limiting the road way for passing vehicles, jarveys, pedestrians and cyclists 'and therefore, leaving all of them in a perilous situation', she told a Killarney Municipal District meeting.

However, the national park has ruled out any widening of the car park at Torc given its location within a Special Area of Conservation (SAC), the council told her.

The response will come as no surprise to hundreds of landowners who last week received information packages from the Department. The ' formal element' in the statutory designation of the Killarney National Park, Macgillycuddy's Reeks and Caragh River catchment as a SAC is now complete. Between the Cork border and Hog's Head Waterville, 38 separate activities now require permission.

Some of the crackdown is welcome, but other measures are simply cracked!

'Activities requiring consent' from now on include removing and cutting plants, driving

emotional Tom Tobin, vice-chairman of the Kerry Stars Special Olympics said in his speech telling the minister he would be knocking on her door for funding for the long dreamt of facility.

Phase one at a cost of Euro 2.2 million will see the construction of the main building with cafe and theatre square. 'It is the biggest project in my lifetime and we will be giving it 100 per cent,' Brendan said. 'We soldiered together before you went to mighty green pastures!' Brendan reminded Minister Foley before telling her he would be back to her for money for the project.

a new stake into the substrate and using herbicides and pesticides.

Burning is also banned, (hopefully).

'Drainage works including digging, deepening, widening or blocking a drain, watercourse or waterbody' come under the restrictions.

'Organised recreational activities' on uplands and waterways also now require advance permission. This is very welcome. Certainly there has been too much overlooking of the wanton destruction of wild areas. This includes authorities giving the go ahead for burning. From ancient Rathmore to Killarney

paths and roads have been driven by landowners through archaeological sites of great potential. And wells have been filled in and destroyed. And how hundreds of runners can be allowed through uplands during the deer rut is beyond me.

But much of the new regulation is downright ridiculous.

and that instead gardai in units were also expected to keep an eye on specific areas. This very serious issue was raised by Cllr Niall O'Callaghan, at the Joint Policing Committee meeting in the Plaza Hotel last Friday.

What that means of course is there is no one on the ground to keep an eye on youths and their elders running wild.

(Theft in shops in Kerry has gone through the roofs too and juveniles as well as individuals are involved, the meeting heard).

'I am very unhappy with community policing in our town,' Niall O'Callaghan addressed Chief Supt Padraic Powell and other senior gardai at the top table.

Cars on the bypass were getting stones thrown at them and ' the same groups of young people' were involved.A gate was thrown at a car last week.

The anti-social behaviour was getting out of hand. 'That stuff stops when you have community police on the ground,' Niall said.

Supt Powell conceded community policing in Killarney 'wasn't happening at the moment.' But he was only a year in the top job and was 'seeking to make significant changes' This included adding gardai to Killarney and mapping the county for community policing, Supt Powell said.

Niall O'Callaghan said he would want the names of two gardai assigned to community policing at the next JPC meeting.

Consent must now be sought from the Minister for 'the removal of dead wood' from land.

New plants can't be introduced without permission. Doubtless this is to stop the entry of more invasive species. Bolting the stable door after the horse has gone, comes to mind. Or using a sledge to crack a nut?

Waterville based county councillor Norma Moriarty has called on the National Parks and Wildlife Service - NPWS rangers will be called upon to inspect and authorize as well as initiate prosecution - to exercise a common sense approach.

### New book records 500 species of fungi in KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK

Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform, Malcolm Noonan TD, has launched a new book titled 'Fungi of Killarney National Park' in Killarney.

Researched and produced by Louis O'Toole and published by the National Parks and Wildlife Service, the book is the most comprehensive inventory of fungi recorded in Killarney National Park, documenting almost 500 species of fungi through photographs and text. The Minister launched the book at the annual National Parks and Wildlife Conference, which takes place in Killarney this year. He said:

### Take the CAO's ab initio route or climb the ladder to an Honours Degree at Level 8



#### DECISIONS

As soon as the CAO facility opens for applications each year, the minds of college aspirants begin to focus. All of a sudden there is a sense of urgency about getting the course choices in order. The clock is ticking. Decisions have to be made. The closing date is fast approaching. The conversation is top heavy with third level choices, college locations, distances from home, types of accommodation and all matters relevant to moving on to higher education. Of course, all of that is very understandable. While it's an anxious time for young people, it's also a very exciting time as they begin to realise that the end of the beginning is drawing near. The next phase of the journey, leaving home and moving on to independent living and learning, is not very far away.

#### REGISTER

The 2024 CAO Application season opens at 12 noon on Monday, 6th November and CAO encourages applicants to register early to avoid a late January rush. A discounted application fee of  $\in$  30 applies for those who open their accounts by 20th January. Thereafter, until the normal closing date of 1st February, the application fee is  $\in$  45. A discount of 33.3% is very generous and not to be sniffed at, especially when dosh is scare in these inflationary times. As the CAO form is interactive, an applicant can log on at will until the closing date. Other than that, the remaining three months should be devoted to course research.

#### SCHEDULE

It's important to maintain the study schedule right up to the Christmas holidays. In fact, for those who haven't done so already, target grades and points should be set for the Christmas in-house test. For example, a student who hopes to achieve 500 points in the Leaving Cert exam should be in the 450 to 475 range by Christmas. Midterm break is also an opportunity for review and reflection. In the immortal words of Agatha Christie's most famous detective, Hercule Poirot, order and method are vital in bringing a project to a successful conclusion. That sentiment is very relevant to exam preparation. So, the Halloween holiday period should be used to review one's time management of the past few months. Consider what you did well and where improvements can be made going forward. **CHOICES** 

During January, CAO applicants will need to focus on course choices. Courses which are restricted must be included on the form by normal closing date of 1st February. Other than that, courses can be added or withdrawn during the change of mind facility which closes on 1st July. In fact, thousands of applicants don't list any courses by 1st February, preferring to do so later on. My personal view is that course choices should be listed by 1st February. It brings the psychological closure of having the task done and dusted until the Leaving Cert exam has been completed. The choices can then be revisited, if required, up to 1st July. **PATHS** 

There are two paths in the CAO to an Honours Bachelor Degree (Level 8). Option one is the ab initio Level 8 course. That option is now available in all CAO colleges as new Technological Universities have been expanding the number of Level 8 courses available in their colleges. Most of the Level 8 courses are of four years duration, although some are three or five years long. The risk factor is that no award is made in the non-technological colleges until the course has been successfully completed. If you drop out on route, you get no qualification.

#### STEP-BY-STEP

Option two is to take the step-by step-route by signing up for a two-year Higher Certificate (Level 6) or a three-year Ordinary Bachelor Degree (Level 7). After two years, a successful student is conferred with the award of Higher Certificate. Those who successfully complete a third year are conferred with an Ordinary Bachelor Degree at Level 7. They can then progress to an Honours Bachelor Degree at Level 8. This is commonly referred to as 'the ladder system' and suits those who aren't ready to commit to a Level 8 ab initio degree or who may have come up short on Leaving Cert

#### points. COMFORT LEVEL

The two options allow people to enter higher education at their own comfort learning level. The traditional big seven of UCD, TCD, DCU, Maynooth, University of Galway, UL and UCC, with a few exceptions, offer Honours Bachelor Degree courses only but the new Technological Universities of TUS, MTU, ATU, SETU, TUD and DkIT offer the three levels. In addition to the other colleges in the CAO system, there is plenty of choice for each and every applicant. Use it well and wisely.

### BREAST CANCER SURVIVOR gives advice for those facing treatment

A young Kerry woman is reaching out and sharing advice for breast cancer patients facing treatment, based on her own experience. Lauren Barrett, who was just 21-years old when she was diagnosed with breast cancer, has teamed up with CarePlus Pharmacy to help raise awareness of the disease this October.

In July 2021, Lauren started five months of chemotherapy treatment a month after her diagnosis. She also underwent a double mastectomy and reconstructive surgery due to the confirmation of the BRCA gene mutation. She has this advice for anyone going through the treatment: Don't isolate yourself: "It can be a difficult time for family and friends as they're unsure of how to act or what to say when they're around you. But I wanted them to tell me everything they were doing as I wanted to be part of their lives. If I didn't want to talk about my cancer, I'd let them know so they didn't have to feel awkward about it."

Listen to your body: "If you need to rest then rest and don't feel bad about it. People will understand that there are certain things you won't be able to do. Likewise, you will have times in between treatment cycles when you will feel good and it's important to get out and meet people when you can."

Try to stay positive: "I had moments when I felt really down about what was happening, but my family was a tremendous support. Most of the time, though, I tried to stay positive, and I think that really helped. I also stayed away from Google! Sometimes we can get bogged down in too much information and that can make the situation worse."

Don't let it take over your life: "It is a lot to go through, from the diagnosis to the treatment, and it can be very difficult to get your head around what's happening. But it's important to remember that there's life outside cancer and if you can enjoy other things when you're feeling up to it then make the most of all those opportunities. I didn't want cancer to define me as a person."

Lauren, who is originally from Tralee but living in Cork City, is 24 now and has started a PhD in neuroscience with a particular focus on Parkinson's Disease. She plays Gaelic football and has taken part in a number of runs to raise awareness for breast cancer, such as The Great Pink Run and 100 Km in 30 Days.

"I'm so delighted that I didn't give up when I was told I was too young to be considered an urgent case. I

knew deep down that something was wrong. Getting the diagnosis



saved my life and I am now fully recovered. I try not to think about it ever coming back. I just like to get on with the things I enjoy as best I can. I can't emphasise enough the importance of getting checked if you suspect there's something wrong."

Lauren, who was studying neuroscience in UCC at the time of her breast cancer diagnosis, says it's vital that people get checked if they have genuine concerns, regardless of their age.

"I would really encourage women of all ages to do a regular breast check. CarePlus Pharmacy have really helpful tips on how to do a breast check on their website and social media. If anyone does find a lump or anything out of the ordinary, then it's crucial that they go to their GP as soon as possible. In a lot of cases the lump may be benign, but I can't stress enough the importance of getting it checked out."

### REFORM OF KERRY GAA COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIPS NEEDED - Kelly



Seán Kelly MEP, a former GAA President, has called for the reform of the Kerry GAA County Championship format. MEP Kelly pointed to the efficient management of the Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Club

Championships, highlighting the rejuvenation they have brought to these competitions. "With the Junior Intermediate Champions going forward to represent Kerry at Munster and All-Ireland level, it has given a new status and a new lease of life to those competitions," he said.

However, Kelly pointed that because the "Senior County Championship is run with divisional teams as well as club teams, we now have a situation where we have reached the finals of the June Intermediate were postponed for five weeks to accommodate the Senior County Championship.

"That does not make sense to me. Neither, does it make sense to me that Kerry, the strongest and most successful county in football in Ireland, has only eight Senior Club teams. This does not make sense and any team could be relegated any year, as we saw last year with Austin Stacks", the Ireland South MEP said. Proposing a tangible solution to these problems, Kelly stated: "What I'm suggesting is that we must change the format. We have to consider taking divisional teams out of the Senior County Championship."

He underlined that such a shift would allow for the simultaneous and earlier organization of the Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Championships, "giving Divisional Boards an opportunity to run their competitions, as they have traditionally been almost as important as the County Championships".

Regarding the role of divisional teams, Kelly offered an alternative perspective. "I don't think the need for divisional teams is what it was before." He highlighted that the rise of the Junior Intermediate Championships, coupled with development squads, now ensures that players from weaker clubs have the opportunity to showcase their skills and be considered for the county team.

Kelly suggested a special competition for divisional teams, "in the latter part of the year, without interfering with Divisional Board Championships or Club Championships".

This adjustment would ensure that the Senior Club Champions consistently represent Kerry at the Munster and All-Ireland level, irrespective of the outcome of the Senior County Championship.

# WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

ou can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

**Tax Free Cash:** Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

**Taxable Cash:** You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.

**Annual Pension:** This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

I think they will be stung by being on the wrong side of a few bruising encounters last year and will be looking to make amends. On the other side I can't really see Roscommon stopping Mayo, who looked like national favourites for Sam Maguire for a lot of last year but just couldn't maintain the high energy pace for such a sustained campaign.



#### NEW RULES TRIALLED IN GAA

The GAA's own statistical analysis showed there were on average just 29 turnovers per game in the 2023 Championship compared to 59 per game in the 2011 championship. That same study found that 64% of all kick-outs were uncontested in 2023 and that 59% of them went past the '45, compared with 86 per cent going past the '45 in 2011. Almost half (46%) of foot-passes from sideline balls were played backwards in 2023.

Now, I'm always suspicious when particular individual years are singled out, e.g. why not a direct comparison with ten years ago? My understanding is that they do this kind of analysis every year. Nor do you get a breakdown on particular levels, e.g. does it increase as the elite teams reach the knockout stages or decrease? Is Ulster's reputation for an overreliance on blanket defence and counter-attack justified? Do Kerry, Galway, and Mayo really live up to their great traditions of catch and kick and one-on-one skill-based football? Because I don't keep stats to anywhere close to that level in games (I do kick-out possessions, which is remarkably significant in pretty much any game I have done) and chance conversion (I genuinely believe that the difference in grades is not based on overall skill or fitness, but on chance conversion) but I can guarantee you that no, none of those counties play a game anything similar to the fifties and sixties. Every team hunts in packs nowadays.

Naturally, you want your game, whatever it

may be, to be exciting. In fairness, it's not the only factor, but one dominant team, be it Kerry in the seventies and eighties or Dublin more recently, isn't alluring for spectators. Sport must be dramatic and that requires unpredictablility. Dublin attracted declining numbers during their cakewalks in Leinster in recent years, including Leinster Finals. We may have loved the Kerry of the Golden Years, but crowds outside of the Cork and All Ireland Finals games were dropping rather than increasing. Feel free to double-check; that was a statistic, not an opinion. For that matter, there is no question that attendances at County Championship games have been dismal. Admittedly, Clubber's genuinely brilliant coverage is probably a factor and the never-ending schedule of games becomes more mundane than thrilling after a while. You also have a Rugby World Cup, a basketball season commencing, international soccer qualifiers for both women and men, the behemoth of the English Premiership (frankly, I'll offer my congratulations to Man City on the 2023/24 title right now - money doesn't talk in that code; it shouts), Kerry Ladies Championships.....

But I believe that having one team as red-hot favourites right from the start – and I know they won't thank me for it, but the ranking is justified in terms of player resources – definitely robbed the competition of a lot of intrigue. I suspect that we all are fairly sure who is going to win Munster and Leinster next year. It's one of two in Connaught, and Galway have the easier road (a big advantage overall; the All Ireland is definitely a marathon, not a sprint). Ulster, to be fair, can go any which way, but they'll all take the same approach.

The GAA have been trialling two new rules in freshers' football in an effort to re-introduce more positive, attack-based football rather than possession-based. A big weapon used by every team now is short kick-outs, and one of the new rules simply requires that a kick-out must travel beyond the near 45m line before a team-mate of the kicker can play it. Basically, no more short, short kick-outs. I don't know. Everybody has a natural resistance to change, but this may actually help. It's worth trying, at least, but I think most of the top teams will still play a defensive shield system (like a zone in basketball) rather than a full press on the opposition kick-out. The other one is that a dead ball, i.e. mark, free, or sideline within 20m of the end-line must be played forward. The first problem I see with that is that I'd be borrowing from rugby. It's well worth your while to kick a ball out just inside the opposition corner flag; they'll have to kick it out towards you and it means that effectively the kicker is temporarily a pawn out of play. Advantage the attackers. Again, to be fair, I think the forward mark robs the game of inside forward skill anyway, so I have subjective bias there. But a worse thing is that a defender under pressure can actually relieve it by kicking the ball out just inside his own corner flag. The opposition have to kick it forward, but if they commit men forward, they are leaving space to counter-attack behind and that will suit the defending team. And yes, we have all seen players kick one over from very, very tight angles. And we all applauded them, even if it was an opposition player, because even with your David Clifford, Conor McManus, Cooper, Canavan, it only succeeds maybe 1 in every 20 attempts. It's not a tactic; it's a roulette wheel. I'm really sceptical about that rule.

Look, I'm not complaining about the proactive attempts to improve the game; I applaud it very much. And while the game is more efficient than entertaining nowadays, I genuinely think that it is still much better than many critics seem to think. I'm not accusing anybody, and I certainly throw out enough criticisms myself, but it's easier to condemn than praise. Take another quick listen to the likes of Piers Morgan or Simon Jordan - and I respectfully suggest that you think about how sincere those hysterical rants and carefully selected 'selective' statistics really are. I personally believe that some RTE pundits of yore in both soccer and football felt that their job was to generate headlines and social media, not analysis.

All the same, I think the GAA need to think about the ongoing adjustments to the rules. A lot of it feels like tinkering and the edges. Applying band-aids when the patient needs surgery. Look at the overall game, decide the game we want, and aim directly for that.

I make one exception. I think we all know about a club who objected to a particular referee in a match and refused to play it, the argument being that there was no specific rule against what they were doing. Look, if my own club, whom I care deeply about, were to do such a thing I would withdraw my membership. I really would. And frankly, I genuinely think that the GAA should try to introduce a rule at all grades (and yes, I most certainly would include All Ireland Finals and district juvenile championships; I literally mean all grades). If you refuse to fulfil a fixture because of the selected referee or venue, unless there are demonstrable health and safety concerns, you forfeit the game. End of story.

#### **BOBBY CHARLTON RIP**

In very different ways, they were the symbol of their social era. George Best embraced a growing sense of liberation, a rock and roll and fashion and most especially a political consciousness revolution. He was dazzling both as a footballer and a personality. He always had the skill of a Messi or Ronaldo, the popularity and public fascination of a David Beckham, and the lifestyle of a young Charlie Sheen. George was born for social media before such a thing really existed, and in many ways, the intensity of those flames burned him out too young.

Bobby Charlton, and I will say Sir Bobby in deference to the man, did not so much fascinate a generation as epitomise it. I really think a guick diversion into the social mores of English is worth discussing briefly. Charlton was born into a working class family when that was a very literal classification. England's agricultural revolution had led in turn to an industrial revolution that literally transformed the world and a 'Golden Age of Parliamentary Democracy' that saw incredible advances in living. The original Crystal Palace was not the marvel of that age; it was in homage to them. It also saw the industrialists and financiers overtake the land-owning nobility in economic power for the first time ever. Then came a war that was different to any that had ever been fought before. This was no war of kings; this was a war of nations, and every bit as bad as a young Churchill had predicted. Chesterton wrote of the English gentry being "stricken at Waterloo" and the rise of the "silent people" (it's a fabulous poem, by the way, one of my all-time favourites). I would suggest that the real damage to England's entrenched class divisions owed as much to the Somme. A lot of a generation of upper class young men died there and meanwhile, the working class soldiers who had died alongside them, often because of the stubborn reliance on trenches of those upper class generals, were not going to be doffing their caps as much and certainly not tolerating the treatment of servants of yore (it was much more dismissive and degrading than the likes of that histrionic soap opera 'Downton Abbey' makes it seem). No, the miners and dockworkers and tradesmen had a better sense of their own worth. Then came another war, a worse one, while Bobby was just a growing child. I do not think any modern generation can truly imagine that worldwide general slaughter that was so much worse than the 'Great War'. The threat to civilian from aerial bombing meant that it wasn't just about supporting the soldiers. In a real sense, everybody was one.

Women were not just allowed to work; it was actively encouraged. And they were so good at it, they never went back to corsets and pinafores.

The class divisions were all but broken, though the deference to the royal family remained. Let's not pretend that times weren't hard, with poverty endemic and workers exploited and misogyny and racism were fairly standard. But Bobby Charlton grew up with both a sense of obligation and duty, and an awareness that he and his were a proud people.

Anyway, though they were a mining family – and the mines supported hundreds if not thousands of families. Not only that, but his mother was Milburn, a first cousin of none other than Jackie Milburn. You know how revered Bobby Charlton was to this and the last generation of England supporters? Yeah, Jackie Milburn was that for Bobby's generation.

Bobby's older brother was always expected to go into the mines, and when he didn't like that (Jack always had common sense; it was a very tough and dangerous job) he applied for the police. But Bobby? Bobby started off good at the game and never stopped getting better. He had supported Manchester United while he listened to the 1948 FA Cup Final on the radio and by 1956 the 18 year old was a regular starter with them. He was good. Imagine a combination of Bryan Robson and Graeme Souness. I respect both, but I don't believe either would have come close to Bobby Charlton. He led every team he played for. Oh yes, and he could score. Leave a pass and he would find it. Leave a gap and he'll be through it. He gave the air of a gentleman - you could always imagine Jack down the mines, but you could imagine Bobby debating at Oxford or Cambridge. The thing is, where Jack tended to be obvious about his occasional fit of temper, Bobby was actually a little bit more cold-blooded in that regard. In those days, if a player needed to be 'done', you were expected to 'do' him. Both the Charlton brothers genuinely concentrated on the playing side of the game (actual hatchetmen was more a seventies thing) but neither was ever pushed off a ball either.

He survived the Munich disaster in 1958 - he was saved by Harry Gregg. That gave him and the club a stature beyond mere soccer (please don't ever fall for the urban myth of Americans calling it 'soccer' and Brits calling it 'football' - it's as nonsensical a myth as the story of English archers at Agincourt inventing the middle finger salute to the French because of the effectiveness of their archery against chainmail). In 1963 he won the FA Cup, and that was much, much more important than the league back then. In 1965 Manchester united won the league - again, Munich rightly gave that one a resonance beyond other teams. He had already been selected by England for two World Cup squads in 1958 and 1962. Four years later England would be hosts and everybody in the world knew who their midfield general would be. West Ham's Bobby Moore would captain the side (deservedly) and Geoff Hurst would be the one to ensure that when they

thought it was all over, it really was, but the Charltons.....Bobby's goals got them to that final but in all fairness his more awkwardlooking older brother was a linchpin as well (a holy terror to defenders when he came up for corners - and that was before any ball got there!).

He won the Ballon d'Or that year. Stanley Matthews had actually pipped Di Stefano in the inaugural year of 1956 (Matthews was brilliant, but c'mon. Di Stefano?) and Billy Wright of Wolves had won it in 1962. Bobby was actually the runner-up in each of the next two years. He added another league title in 1967 and a European Cup (the first for an English team) a vear later.

His latter playing days were tough going. Man United were very much in decline and their greatest midfielder could not arrest the slide or his own inevitable decline as the years began to take their toll. He could appreciate the intuitive ability and genius of George Best but could not attune to him and the two pair were never close. Charlton left in 1973 to join Preston North End, and later become playermanager. He came back as a Director of Man United in 1984 and in fairness, even the likes of Liverpool's Kop always respected him, for character just as much as career.

Roy Keane used to tell a story about Charlton emerging to criticise their conduct as he and a team-mate had a late drink-laden row in a hotel. That one says something about behavioral changes in society. To Roy, it was none of Charlton's business. To Sir Bobby, it was exactly his business.

He was Bobby Charlton. Roy would tell, you as a simple matter of fact rather than a boast, that he set the standards in the Man United dressing room. But this was Sir Bobby Charlton. He set the standard for an entire club – and no. it wasn't Busby, though he was a genius as a manager. Bobby Charlton was the benchmark. Not just for a club, or even one sport. Arguably for an entire country.

# CALL FOR EMERGENCY MEETING ON DRUGS

At this month's Joint Policing Committee meeting, a Kerry County Councillor called on the JPC to organise an Emergency Meeting on Drugs where all stakeholders will be invited and to explore what improvements can be made in regard to this major problem in Kerry.

Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill who raised the matter said "Drug use is on the increase with increased numbers before the courts for possession of drugs for their own use and/or supply, there is a massive increase in recreational use, there are increases in Drug driving detections, reports of drinks being spiked, etc. Knowing the devastating effect this is having on society, on families and especially on our youth, I propose the JPC organise an Emergency Meeting where all stakeholders will be invited and to explore what improvements can be made in regard to this major problem in our county."

"As for all those involved in recreational use, it needs to be pointed out what harm they are actually causing, to themselves and their families. Recreational drug use causes addiction and no it's not as simple as saying 'I can stop any time I want'. The knock-on affects of Drug addiction need to be pointed out and explained. How it starts with 'borrowing' from family and friends, until there is a dependency on the substance. The



need to obtain drugs can take over one's life and funding the habit is very difficult to keep up with. Before a drug user knows it, there is a large debt owed to dealers. Parents are often helpless, with threats of violence, etc." said Councillor Cahill.

"We must educate our youth on the dangers of recreational drug use and we must lead by example for the sake of our children and our children's children. What we are seeing is a very dangerous situation developing for all of our society, where criminal drug suppliers will take control of the lives of many. In fact, if they are allowed, they will make all our lives 'Hell on Earth" added Councillor Cahill.

# **Educate Students on Driving Safety**



Councillor Michael Cahill has stated that he is delighted that his proposal to educate students in the secondary school cycle on driving safety has found support across the political spectrum. "The vast majority of young people aspire to drive a car and I have previously proposed that Driver Theory should be part of the Secondary School syllabus, possibly at the Transition Year stage. It makes a load of sense that these important skills would be taught under the auspices of our professional teachers" stated Councillor Cahill

"I am beyond delighted now that members of Dáil Éireann, even outside of Fianna Fáil, are now supporting my proposal and I look forward to bringing this forward to being a reality in all schools in Ireland. Our Minister for Education, Norma Foley understands how important it is to teach our young people all life skills, including driving and road safety and I believe this will be taken on board for our schools into the future" said the Fianna Fáil man.

# **CLLR. HEALY RAE CALLS FOR** Funding for persons with disabilities

Speaking in Dail Eireann last week, Deputy Danny Healy Rae, TD thanked Sinn Féin for bringing this very important motion to the Chamber tonight. As the Minister of State is well aware, we have a lack of residential care places for people with disabilities in County Kerry. There was some mention in the budget that 90 new centres would be opened. We have had a centre for many years in Whitefield, Beaufort in Kerry, known as St. Mary of the Angels, which was donated by the Doyle family. An awful lot of fundraising has gone on through the years to help this place develop and keep going. Sadly now, however, it has been closed by stealth. As a patient dies, that bed is closed down and not used anymore. The Minister of State is well aware of the case I brought to her regarding a person who was looking for residential care when her husband died. She could not mind the strong daughter she has of 32 or 33 years of age. The only offer of a residential care place she got at that time was in County Meath, up against the Six Counties of Ireland in the North. In fairness, I appreciate the Minister of State's intervention. I don't know , but she is there all the time but she is only there on a temporary basis as such.

I am asking now that St. Mary of the Angels be redeveloped. There are a lot of dormitory-style beds and stuff like that. I am, therefore, asking for new separate units to be built on the grounds. There are acres of land there. The peace and tranquillity of that place and the expertise

of the care workers who are working there could not be touched anywhere else. It has been handed down to them over generations. I am appealing to the Minister of State. Whatever about this de congregation model, there is a need for a place like this where there are pools and therapies of all types to be had. It is being closed by stealth. I am asking the Minister of State not to do that on these grounds. Saint John of God Kerry



Services workers have been doing great work and are doing great work as we talk today, but the place is being closed down by stealth. If we are talking about new residential care places, I ask that Whitefield in Beaufort be developed and made into a state-of-the-art place. As I said in the first place, it was donated by the Doyle family. A whole lot of voluntary work has gone on and much fundraising has been done over the years. We cannot let that place close down. I am appealing to the Minister of State now. She is saying it will not. I am asking her to address it. Will it be one of the places the Government talked about in the budget? It has to be.

# BARE ROOTED PLANTING

We are entering a great time of the year for planting bare rooted trees, hedging, fruit bushes, roses and root balled conifers.

The bare rooted planting season lasts from November until March. The reason for this is that the trees and hedging are dormant at this time of year, so you can't really do any damage when you are lifting or planting. When planting bare rooted, as a general rule, plant about three plants per meter, roses can also be purchased and planted bare rooted as can fruit trees and fruit bushes. The main thing when planting bare rooted trees and hedging is that when you purchase them and if you are not going to plant them straight away, you will have to heel them into the ground. By this I mean you will have to dig a hole, place the plant in and cover the roots with earth to stop them drying out.

When hedging plants, roses and fruit bushes, they will usually come in bundles and will be tied together, so you don't have to separate them, just put the whole bundle in the around
