

'It has been a long two years since NatWest announced that they were closing Ulster Bank down, and even though we were well prepared, this has been a tough week", Justin said.

€1.5 MILLION IN FUNDING FOR FREE SCHOOL BOOKS

FOR KERRY PRIMARY SCHOOLS

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D Norma Foley today announces payment of €1,557,504 to provide primary school children in Kerry with free school books.

The scheme will provide free schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks for all pupils in primary and special schools.


Thereafter the grant should be used to eliminate costs of related classroom resources such as pens, pencils, erasers, sharpeners, colouring pencils and whiteboard markers.

As part of Budget 2023, Minister Foley secured over €50 million in a landmark decision to provide free schoolbooks to primary school pupils within the free education scheme from September 2023.

This free schoolbooks measure will eliminate the cost to families for all schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks at primary school, including special schools.

The free primary school books scheme will benefit more than 558,000 pupils in approximately 3,230 recognised primary schools, including over 130 special schools.

Minister Foley said: "Schools in Kerry will receive over €1.5 million to provide free schoolbooks in all primary schools and special schools. This ground-breaking, permanent measure will ease some of the financial burden facing families with the back-to- school costs. The scheme will provide, at a minimum, free schoolbooks, workbooks and copybooks for



all pupils enrolled in primary and special schools in the 2023/24 school year. By providing our primary school children with free school books, we are enhancing their educational experience, not just in the classroom but reaching out into the family home."

he celestial surrounds of Muckross Abbey, along with the 6th century monasteries of Innisfallen Island and Skellig Michael, Co. Kerry, will provide the perfect amphitheatre to this years 'Dawn Chorus' - presented by the Conservation Rangers of Killarney National Park, National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) on Saturday 6th May, with live-stream beginning at 5.00am on Killarney National Parks facebook page www.facebook.com/killarneynationalpark.

The cloisters of Muckross Abbey (where it will be livestreamed) with its centerpiece 500 year old Yew tree, will come alive with bird song, just before 5.00am - 30 minutes either side of the sunrise in May.

The territorial call begins with a song of a robin, followed by the soft tones of the blackbird, then song thrushes, Photo: Valerie O'Sullivan wood pigeons, wrens, warblers, sparrows, and finches. This years Dawn Chorus is led by Regional Manager Southern

Division NPWS, Eamonn Meskell, Regional Manager Killarney National Park, Danny O'Keeffe, and Conservation Rangers, Mary Sheehan, Padruig (Brac) O'Sullivan, Sam Bayley, Jess Burkitt, Sean Forde and Tricia Beecher. The live-stream event will include bird expert Sam Bayley, identifying bird song of Skellig Michael - the popular puffin, kittiwakes, gannets and razorbills. Sean Forde and Jess Burkitt will identify bird song on Innisfallen Island. In addition to the bird song, Live music will be performed by Derry $\&\,Rosie\,Healy\,and\,renowned\,accordion\,player\,Bryan\,O'Leary.\,\,INEC\,Expert$ audio technicians Kieran Somers and Denis Lovett, will have installed

DAVID LOSES HIS BATTLE WITH CANCER



ust a few short weeks after a gofundme was launched to support Cork based Rathmore man David Saunders, the news has been announced by his sister Sinead that he has lost his battle with cancer.

On a message on the gofundme page which has raised over €160,000 for David's wife Anne Marie and his children Jack (2) and Aoibhín (4), David's sister Sinead said:

It is with great sadness, I have to share the news that David passed away yesterday, April 24th. David fought a valiant battle but now he's finally at peace. Thanks again for your

incredible donations and words of support. Your kindness has been amazing and provided David and his family with so much comfort in his final weeks.

The community of Rathmore and beyond had rallied around David (40) as he faced a mammoth battle against cancer following his third diagnosis with advanced sarcoma.

David was a former pupil of Meentogues National School and Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra, and was living in Cork where with his wife Anne Marie, who is from Castleisland, and their two children, Jack (4) and Aoibhín (2)

This was David's third battle with cancer, having overcome it twice as a child. Those battles resulted in him losing his leg but his positivity never waned and lived cancer free for 26 years.

David represented Ireland in the Amputee Football Team and was one of the first players to sign for the club's amputee team when it was launched in 2017, representing Ireland on 38 occasions.

All money raised will to to provide support for David's family.

Speaking about the gofundme before his

passing, David said "While I will continue to fight for every moment I get to spend with my precious young family, I have to face the reality that my time with them is limited. Naturally, as a husband and father, I want to do my utmost to ensure my young family are provided for when I'm no longer here and with that in mind I'm asking for your help".

Healy-Raes Rule out Joining a Rural party

Michael Fitzmaurice the Independent TD for Roscommon-Galway has said a new rural party is needed.

It is the last chance for rural Ireland, Michael said, clearly referring to the blanket EU led policies being imposed by all parties here to standardise and bring in "a one size fits all". urban and rural.

He pointed to the success of the farmers' and citizens' party in the Netherlands recent elections, where there are only 50,000 farmers. But one million people voted for them.

Two of our Kerry's five TDs are the Independent Healy-Rae brothers, Michael and Danny. They have ruled out joining a new farmers party and want to retain their independence, saying it works well for them and for Kerry.

In fairness, the Healy-Raes have what amounts to their own family party. They have three Healy-Rae councillors backing up two Healy-Rae TDs, which is more than some parties have. But the Healy-Rae machine is still very much a family affair.

The wider country and indeed the county would benefit from a new rural Irish party which would develop regional links and set down policy.

Such a party would be free of blood ties in more ways than one: The Civil War and the shedding of blood led to the creation of FF and FG, while the guerilla war in the North and the prolonged killings there led to Sinn Fein, it can be argued.

A brand new party would also be free of the historically inordinate influence of Labour and other parties in the public sector and Trade Unions - you could scarcely get a public service job in Kerry at one stage if you weren't tied in some way to Labour or the two other parties.

And let us not overlook how the highest paid civil servant in this country Robert Watt was a Labour party activist in UCD. Howlin appointed him as the first sec general of the

department of public expenditure and reform (of all things) and then wanted him given the job of governor of the central bank. I don't hear much from Ivana Bacik or indeed from Brendan Howlin on the too highly paid Mr Watt!

The Greens though born politically in Kerry have not cut it for rural Ireland and are now a party with an overwhelming large city

A new party for rural Ireland could set out to act on merit and need and not history, blood , pull or connections or centralised European thinking. It could set out to be a clean sweep with a clean modern outlook.

We fool ourselves into thinking that the differences between urban and rural have been ironed out by broadband. They have not. All the main cultural events and venues are still in Dublin. The health service is better in Dublin

Cork our second city has not been allowed to develop its potential. If anything Cork is not near as lively as in the 1980s or 1990s.

Dublin is where everything is at now. So we badly need a feisty rural party the south whose TDs will get more attention than dramatic sound bites.

Lack of public facilities in scenic areas highlighted

There are far too few public conveniences in beauty spots. While blue flag beaches have seen vast improvements, places like Kenmare pier badly need toilets.

This was the gist of what the Councillor Patrick Connor-Scarteen said at the recent county council meeting in Tralee. Kenmare pier has neither a public shower nor public toilet. Yet there is swimming and diving and now Kenmare has cruise ships calling. Patrick who lives in Killarney said it was a " ridiculous" situation and he also pointed out how inadequate the toilet and shower facilities are in the Killarney National Park. He is correct: all you have to do is sit on Dundag on a sunny afternoon and watch as people run for the bushes at Killarney's most popular and often crowded beach.

Elsewhere, mountain walkways could badly do with toilets and showers. These are public health issues and maybe it is time to involve the HSE?

Dog Ways

The death of Bród the President's dog was one of the most read stories on RTE all last weekend.

There is clear affection for dogs. But the messages are mixed. Dogs are banned from wildlife reserves even in dog loving France; here on Bull Island, an important bird reserve, they are not allowed. They are also banned from blue flag beaches in Kerry thanks to international criteria.

It will not be long before there are moves to ban dogs from at least the more sensitive deer and bird parts of the Killarney national park, is my guess.

So far the approach is carrot rather than stick, to use the words of senior conservation ranger Danny O'Keeffe last week on Radio Kerry.

Danny called for people to change "their habits" and not leave their dogs off the leash in the park. The policy now across all national parks was for all dogs to be on the leash at all times, he said. They cannot be allowed run wild and out of control because of the risk of disturbing wildlife, apart from the risk to people and especially to those fearful of dogs.

There are a number of offences under the Wildlife Acts to cover dogs worrying deer, birds and other wild animals and these days because there are more dogs than ever before there are more incidents.

However if dogs are kept on leads at all times there problems do not arise, there is no disturbance and the conservation rangers would prefer to change the habits and mindset of people thinking they could walk their dog without a lead, rather than slap them with prosecution and fines.

Meanwhile, a new toilet for dogs is being trialed in Dublin. The dog toilet has been introduced on Sean McDermott Street as part of a new move by the city council to promote responsible dog ownership with chronic dog fouling.

Perhaps it is time to pursue the motion by John O'Donoghue councillor in January for a dog park in Killarnev?

John said dog ownership had "soared" during the lockdown and larger breeds of dogs particularly benefited from sealed off areas where they could run freely. He also felt this would reduce the need for people to let dogs off the leash in the national park.

The council in January was not enthusiastic, pointing to problems elsewhere and difficulties in finding a suitable site in Killarney. But it maybe time to look again at the idea.

GREATER INVESTMENT CALLED FOR IN MENTAL **HEALTH SERVICES**

Ilr. Donal Grady has raised the following notices of motion at the recent meeting of Kerry County

It ws agreed that Kerry County Council would write to the relevant Ministers expressing the urgent need for greater investment in Mental Health Services

There is a severe shortage of Psychiatrics across the country, Ireland has 16 Psychiatrists per 100,000 people while other European countries have 28 Psychiatrists per 100,000 people.

Only 5% of Irelands Health Expenditure is allocated to Mental Health Services, Slainte Care recommends 10% and The World Health Organisation recommends 12% should be allocated to meet today's demands.

Yesterday I spoke with staff from a number of Mental Health Centres across the county, they informed me there's no vacant space available in any of the centres in Tralee or Killarney, investment is urgently needed as individuals and families are suffering as a result of lack of funding in this sector.



CALL FOR WAICER OF CONNECTION FEE FOR KILCUMMIN RESIDENTS

Ilr Grady has also requested that Kerry County Council and our project partners Irish Water would wavier the connection fee to the residents of Kilcummin that are eligible to avail of the new Sewerage Scheme for the inconvenience and disruption caused by the ongoing works and road closers affecting their everyday essential travels.

This is also having a huge impact on the many businesses in the area, the Woodline route isn't fit for the volume of traffic passing through it at present the road surface is in a bad state of repair and when the project is completed I would ask the Woodline would also be resurfaced.

Initially the majority of the proposed pipeline route was to be carried out through private lands, we shouldn't have misled the residents by giving a projected completion time until we were sure we had land secure to carry out the project without such disruptions. We should:

- · Wavier the connection fee or at least
- Reduce the connection fee by an agreed percentage





PLAN YOUR STRATEGY FOR THE WEEKS REMAINING BEFORE THE STATE EXAMS



TIME MANAGEMENT

As exam candidates attend school for the final term before the State Exams begin on the 7th June, they have already done a fair amount of work. Many exam candidates have worked diligently and consistently throughout the year. Others may have been less focussed and motivated as they travelled the road to next June's exams. But the fact remains that every exam candidate has a foundation of work. however solid or precarious, on which to build over the next few weeks. Efficient and careful use of the remaining time will be enough to get you safely over the finish line. No matter how little work you have done to date, you can still achieve a worthwhile result in your exam if you put your best effort into the final few weeks. It's also important to appreciate that you know a great deal more than you give yourself credit for.

SMART GOALS

The immediate priority now is to reassess your goals and make a plan of action for the run into the exam. The time for procrastination has well and truly passed. It's essential to have clear goals and an action plan to help you to be successful. If you are to achieve your academic goals, they will have to be SMART - specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and timelined. Your focus must now be on your total readiness for next June's exams. Avail of all the help that is at your disposal during the next few weeks to ensure that you are in tip top shape for the challenge of the exams.

ATTEND

The subject teacher at school, who after all is the expert, will guide you through the last few weeks in revision, exam techniques and overall subject strategy. Attend school regularly during the final term and maintain a diligent work schedule to give yourself every possible chance of achieving your goals. Be clear in your own mind as to what exactly your goals are. Have confidence in your ability to achieve them. Have a plan to accomplish your aim and, critically, execute your plan by doing the necessary work.

Carry out an honest review of your exam programme straight away. Make a decision about the level – higher, ordinary or foundation - of the paper you will answer in each subject. Set down a target grade in each subject. Convert each grade to CAO points and add up your six best scores. Now you have a target grade in each subject and an overall points' target to help motivate you. It's vital at this late stage to set realistic goals. For example, if you feel you may not be able for a higher-level paper in a particular subject, are you not far better off taking an ordinary level paper in that subject where you may achieve a decent grade? Consider what you would like to do after the Leaving Cert exam. A singular determination to achieve enough points to get a place in your course of interest is a great motivator. Perhaps, your primary motivator should be to do yourself justice in the exam and to achieve results that reward your ability and effort. Having clear and focussed goals will make your last term more productive and rewarding.

CHALLENGE

Regard the next few weeks and the actual exam as a challenge that you will meet headlong and with determination. Approach it with confidence and belief in yourself. Take total control of your life and channel your energy in a positive direction. Every time you have a doubt or a negative thought about yourself replace it with a positive one. You will feel better about yourself if you are in control of your situation. To assume that control set aside some time to make out a plan of action. Decide what topics you need to revise between now and the exam. Make out an overall time schedule, a weekly schedule and a daily schedule. Make out that plan of action over the next few days so that you will hit the ground running.



Sophia Physics National Finalists forCastleisland Community College

astleisland Community College had 3 different projects reaching the National Sophia Physics competition . The school has won the competition for the last three consecutive years. The Transition year students undertook their projects with guidance from their teacher Kellie Sheehy. The first group consisted of Bella Harmon. Emma O'Donoghue and Amy McCarthy. The girls decided to explore the physics behind soccer. They chose this particular topic due to their interest and involvement with the local soccer club for the last 5 years. They researched the physics behind the curve of a ball depending on how it is kicked. They learnt that when a soccer player kicks a ball off-centre it causes the ball to spin. The direction and speed of the spin will determine how much the ball curves during flight. The curve of the ball during flight is

The boys based their project on the sustainability of combustion versus electric engines. 'We learnt that combustion engines use fossil fuels and produce harmful

friction between the ball and air causes the

air to react to the direction of spin of the ball.

emissions such as carbon dioxide. Electric engines use lithium ion as their batteries and have no emissions, but the mining of the lithium is very harmful to the environment however. We also illustrated how they worked to show their differences. In conclusion we established that they are both harming the environment in different ways.' concluded Cathal and Seán.

The final group consisted of Blaithín O' Mahony, Leah Whelan and Caitríona Murphy. They based their topic on the physicist Lisa Meitner. 'We picked Lise Meitner as we admired her for revolutionary discoveries and for her determination to succeed despite the odds being stacked against her. Lise Meitner discovered the element protactinium and nuclear fission, which is used in nuclear power plants and atomic bombs. Being a Jewish woman in Nazi Germany was an extremely dangerous position to be in, so she fled to Sweden to continue her scientific work there. After World War II, her research partner, Otto Hahn, won the Nobel Prize for Chemistry for the discovery of nuclear fission. Lise was not awarded this prize, although she was nominated 49 times for Physics and Chemistry Nobel Prizes' stated Bláithín, Leah and Caitríona.


















MUNSTER U14 A CHAMPIONSHIP FINAL

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.

OCULAR MIGRAINE

Retinal migraine (ocular migraine) is an eye condition that causes brief attacks of blindness or visual problems like flashing lights in one eye.

These episodes can be frightening, but in most cases they're harmless and short-lived, and eyesight goes back to normal afterwards.

people Some retinal get migraine every few months, although the frequency can vary.

Retinal migraine is a separate condition and should not be confused with headachetype migraine or migraine with aura, which usually affects the vision of both eyes.

The symptoms of retinal migraine may include:

- partial or total loss of vision in one eye - this usually lasts 10 to 20 minutes before vision gradually returns
- headache this may happen before, during or after the vision

It's unusual for an episode of vision loss to last longer than an hour. The same eye is affected every time in almost all cases.

Vision may slowly become blurred or dimmed, or there may be flashes of light. Some people see a mosaic-like pattern of blank spots (scotomas), which enlarge to cause total loss of vision.

Treatment for retinal migraine usually just involves taking pain relief for any headaches and reducing exposure to anything that might be triggering the retinal migraine.







FACILE FIRST STEP FOR KERRY FOOTBALLERS

Munster Semi-Final: Kerry 0-25 Tipperary 0-5

We've been bemoaning the facile nature of the Leinster Football Championship for quite a while now, and with good reason. Dublin have 61 titles, including the last twelve in a row. The exploits of Mick O'Dwyer and Páidí Ó Sé, as well as the great Seán Boylan, feel like a dim and receding memory now. But it's time to be honest about the Munster Football Championship as well. Kerry have won 83 championships, far more than the number of the five other counties combined (51). I genuinely had high hopes for Cork this year - I expected Kerry to beat Cork, but to get a very real battle.

More fool me, I suppose. Cork, admittedly missing their top two shooters, fell at the first hurdle to Clare, who in turn got an unpredictable tough test against Limerick before booking their spot in the Munster Final. I under-estimated Clare once in my lifetime - Seamus Clancy's finest hour is still a vivid memory - but frankly, I can't see it.

Back in those days I feared Tipperary much more than Clare. Declan Browne often ploughed a fairly lone but very deep furrow against Kerry, Browne was as good a forward as there was in the game. For that matter, I feared the Tipperary team of recent vintage built around the nucleus of their 2012 All Ireland minors and the scoring exploits of Michael Quinlivan.

This Tipperary team, although honest soldiers, simply haven't got a fraction of that talent. They won Munster in 2020, but that was a one-off of the covid era, one that both ourselves and Cork left slip. Bookies were giving 500-1 odds last Saturday and I'd say nobody was laying any money anyway. Not with Kerry in Killarney. We haven't lost here now in a decade - I remember that 2012 loss to Cork, but it stung slightly less. They had been better than us and had great players in the likes of Michael Shields, Paul Kerrigan, dual star Aidan Walsh, Colm O'Neill, and of course Graham Canty. We all knew that this Tipperary team was not of that calibre, and we weren't wrong. In fairness to Tipp, they didn't try any of the oul' plamás in the build-up. They were the Christians being sent into the lion's den, and it would take a very impressive miracle (I suppose by their definition that all miracles must be impressive) for them to come out unscathed.

The biggest talking point was the traffic on the road in - given that the attendance was listed as 6939 (I know I'm on a nostalgia kick, but I remember when spectators had to shuffle out of the way so that players could take sideline kicks back in the late seventies/early eighties), I suspect that the closure of the Kilcummin road had an impact on cars coming from the Tralee side. The game itself was, however sacrilegious it may sound the Kerry supporters, absolutely flat and lifeless. Sorry, but I was wishing I had brought a book to read. Fair play to the foreign students in the stand, who brought a bit of noise and excitement. Nobody who understands the workings of the new championship format was going to be shouting themselves hoarse frankly, I suspect that's even true of a lot of the players.


As expected, Tipperay retreated into a shell almost instantly. Kerry stayed patient, recycling the ball before launching probing attacks, some of which led to fairly careless turnovers. It took nine minutes for Paudie Clifford to open the scoring. Kevin Fahey did reply, a great kick from distance while off balance, but it was like the Norse King Cnut hacking at the tide with his sword (Cnut wasn't crazy; he was making a point about the fallibility of kings to his advisors). The water, like this football tide, was only flowing in one direction. With Tipperary pretty much toothless - Templenoe's Teddy Doyle had a good game, but as a supplementary midfielder rather than an actual forward) this was an exercise in patience and ball retention for Kerry. They picked Tipperary off with ease without needing to hit full throttle. It's awful football to watch, let's just be honest about that. Most


training sessions have more intensity.

Kerry had six points from five different scorers before Tipperary added to their tally with another fine score by Colm O'Shaughnessy. Both points came from defenders, no forward had even had a shot in anger yet. I'm not going through this game piece by piece, I stopped noting basic stats (kick-outs, frees conceded, etc.) early on. There wasn't enough analytical meat on these bones to make it worthwhile. By half-time it was 0-12 to 0-2. Kerry did have a penalty, Dara Moynihan and the outstanding Tom O'Sullivan (there's a player who revels in space to roam, and got plenty of it) combined to set up David Clifford. The big man jinked inside but was denied by a foot block. Tony Brosnan had been putting his hand up for responsibility all day and he stepped up to the kick. He went more for precision than power; fair play to Michael O'Reilly to read it well and get a strong hand behind it. That was the closest thing there was to a bit of excitement, though, and the game settled back into mindnumbing inevitability again within minutes as Jason Foley picked off a point.

Seán O'Shea slotted two frees to extend Kerry's lead on the restart..

Look, there are positives. Kerry subs did well and showed that they will be looking for places. I thought the likes of Dylan Casey, Donal Down, and Micheál Burns were unlucky not to get a run. Kerry didn't pick up injuries and didn't have to expend too much energy, I really believe that both those factors will be crucial to the eventual winners of Sam Maguire this year. Having eleven different scorers on the day is a positive sign, even in the limited circumstances. The lurking suspicion that Kerry are a bit too reliant on scores from David Clifford has yet to be really tested (David handled plenty of ball but every team we meet from here on in will be looking to choke him of space to operate) but five points from a livewire Tony Brosnan is very reassuring. I personally prefer Tony as a predator in the danger zone rather than a creative playmaker.

Look, Kerry basically learned nothing here and were never going to. These games are never anything more than potential banana skins. Kerry weren't going to set the world alight here. The real news would have been if Tipperary had given us a fright – I honestly believe that would have done us no harm.

Two weeks to a Munster Final with Clare. The Banner have always been able to give us a game in Munster (although those games were closer to the start of our training cycle than nowadays, which made a difference) and were fairly unlucky in Division Two after giving some top teams, including Dublin, very tough battles. I can only see one winner, but it should be a better spectacle than this. Frankly, I really hope so.

Elsewhere Dublin laid downa marker with an overwhelming victory over Billy Sheehan's Laois. No-one expected Laois to win, but Dublin's display and especially goal-scoring ability is ominous. Down had a big win over Donegal, who are in real disarray both on and off the field at the moment. As good as the great Michael Murphy was, his retirement and the injury absence of Paddy McBreary does not explain this total malaise. Tough times for Colm O'Rourke as defeat to Offaly sees them slip into the Tailltean Cup. That might be no harm for them in the long run; despite the hype, I was fairly sure that Colm O'Rourke did not have the talent available that he himself provided in his playing days. As expected, New York's fairytale, which included two Brosnans with their Knocknagoshel roots, Gavin O'Brien of Rahillys, Rob Wharton of Renard, and selector Kevin Moriarty of Castlegregory came to an abrupt end at the ends of Sligo, who feature Pat Spillane in their ranks.

Things are starting to get interesting. To be truthful, they would want to.

IMPRESSIVE U20S SEE OF CORK IN STYLE

Munster U20 Final: Kerry 2-12 Cork 1-6

I was worried about this one, and I'm pretty sure I wasn't the only one. Kerry coughed up four goals to Clare, and the truth is that we would always have feared Cork football teams more than Clare. Moreover, we had lost Rob Monaghan, one of Kerry's best players on that night, to suspension. Cork hadn't looked great in disposing of Limerick, but they looked a lot more convincing than Kerry.

I have to eat humble along with several other people. Now, I did say that this wouldn't be a foregone conclusion. I really thought (and still think) that Clare aren't getting enough credit. In the likes of playmaker Rouine and powerful midfielder McNamara, Clare had footballers who would walk onto any U20 team in the country. They were fit, fast, and hungry.

Cork....were not that. I'm not taking away from Kerry's display. This was a Kerry side who showed far more appetite than they did against Clare. Kieran Mackessy, whose questions I had no hesitation in questioning after a very shaky display last week, was hugely improved in both saves and kick-outs (not being mean, but the

kick-outs could still be a small bit finer). He also got more protection from a much more confident defence; I suspect that that hard game against the Banner was a steep and worthwhile learning curve for this Kerry team. Cork, understandably enough having seen us against Clare, went long with their kick-outs and pumped high ball down on the square early on, but Kerry were far more assured than last week. Caolan O'Connell, very quiet last week, was much more assertive. Right from the start he began the move that led to Jack Cliford (a very impressive addition) laying off for Cian McMahon to coolly slot past the keeper. Kerry fetched the kick-out, but Will Shine's radar was iust a fraction off. Once again Kerry turned over the kick-out, with Aaron O'Shea making it 1-1 to 0-0. Those kick-outs were significant. Cork had to switch to short kick-outs to defenders, and the good press by the Kerry forwards meant that they could never really get a foothold. It was also noticeable that Kerry's forward kickpassing was much superior to Cork's, who were relying on pace but running into a Kerry defensive brick wall.

Let's not kid ourselves, though. The scoreline was as much about Cork's paucity of scoring instincts as much as Kerry's resolute defence. Darragh Murray got in on goal but it was a poor effort in the circumstances. That would have been a goal at the other end, and Cillian Burke proved it by finishing off another lightning Kerry move. Paddy O'Driscoll finally got Cork off the mark with a point, but Will Shine won and converted a good free. Shine is an apt description of this lad's talent. He added another after Cillian Burke was fouled. Cork were at sixes and sevens; Kerry were ruthlessly purposeful.

Paddy O'Driscoll, who tried very hard for Cork to little enough effect, had a great goal chance but skewed the shot completely. Tommy Walsh, probably Cork's best player, drove forward to win a free for Hugh O'Connor. At the other end Dan Twomey made a great block on Aaron O'Shea, but Will Shine smoothly snapped up the rebound to fire over and he added another after brilliantly spinning to lose Jacob O'Driscoll. Paddy O'Driscoll won a free for Hugh O'Connor to convert, but Cork's hopes were already flagging. They needed a goal but did look capable of it. Joey Nagle dealt superbly under pressure with a high ball down on the Kerry square and Kieran Mackessy denied Tom Cunningham with a great save.

Half-time Kerry 2-5 Cork 0-4

Cork probed at Kerry on the restart but the environmentalists in Kerry's defence forced them to keep recycling until an inevitable turnover and Will Shine showed them how it's done by splitting the posts. Niall Kelly, very effective off the bench for Cork, scored his team's third point from play – he could have gone for goal.

Keith Evans was a fantastic playmaker for Kerry, and the Keel man showed that he is quite comfortable at taking his own shot as well. Joey Nagle, in a rare enough and well-judged foray up the field, slotted over to make it 2-8 to 0-5. Yet again, Cork got through for a goal chance., This one was a great run by Hugh O'Connor,

whose shot beat the emerging Mackessy....only to be caught on the line by Andrew Moynihan. One of those things that looks lucky but most certainly isn't – the Rathmore man had read the situation and moved to close off the danger. Great positioning, great defensive instincts. Niall Kelly did pick off another point, but Kerry were already running their bench and there was a certain inevitability about it now. Kerry simply had a higher gear, as Keith Evan showed by despatching another point. Cian McMahon was just inches wide from goal./ At the other end Mackessy was once again at his best to deny Liam O'Connell.

Will Shine made it 2-10 to 1-5. Luke Crowley, who was outstanding on his introduction, added another point and struck for another before the finish.

Niall Kelly did finally get in for a Cork goal. Had it arrived earlier, it might have changed the narrative. As it is, it was a mere coda.

Kerry will face Sligo in the All Ireland semi-final. That's the Sligo team who beat Roscommon, Mayo, and Galway to win Connaught for the second year in a row. They are the form team of the whole competition so far -although 'form' is too strong a word for a knock-out competition involving teenagers. They feature a number of the Summerhill College players who reached the Hogan Cup Final this year, defeating St. Brendans in a high-octane thriller along the way.

McDonagh Cup: Kerry 1-17 Kildare 0-14

What have the Kerry hurlers and Max Verstappen got in common? They have both turned corners brilliantly in recent times. I saw the Kerry hurlers in the Munster Senior League, and to be truthful we were bad. We stank out the place. We had literally nothing up front. I don't mean poor players; I mean we didn't play

any forward line. The likes of Shane Conway back toiling in midfield....lads, games are won on the scoreboards. It doesn't matter how well you play (and we were playing poorly anyway, albeit without some top guns who have since returned to the fray) if you don't make the umpires bend their backs. The National League was only a little bit more reassuring. Kerry were definitely playing better, but we were still leaving a lot of scoring chances behind and were prone to occasional lapses.

The McDonagh Cup has been a very different story. Kerry look far more assured. That hard-fought draw with a very in-form Carlow spoke volumes, that took real character and no little skill. Kildare, who were really turning heads in the National League, may have peaked too early in the season and have been struggling to repeat that form in the McDonagh Cup, but that's still a big scalp to come away with.

Kildare's Brian Byrne forced John B. O'Halloran into a good save right at the start, and a David Qaulter free soon put them ahead. Kerry took over, though, with Fionán Mackessy and Eoin Ross outstanding. Sahne Coway (2f) nudged us in front and a sparkling Darragh Shanahan (his return to action seems to have galvanised his team-mates) and Padraig Boyle had Kerry in front. Kevin Cronin Unlucky Not to Claim Irish Title

The first fight between Kerry's Kevin Cronin and Limerick's Jamie Morrissey for the Irish Lightweight Heavyweight title was a cracker, with the Kingdom Warrior just missing out by a fraction. Calls for a rematch were inevitable and, much to both fighters' credit, there was no messing around, they got a deal done fast.

The rematch took place in Galway and it didn't just live up to the billing; it far surpassed it. The fight is up on you tube, and I strongly recommend that those of you who haven't seen it have a look.

Morrissey came out fast and dominated the first round, with Kevin struggling to get to grips with deadly left jabs that kept him off balance. Round 1 to the reigning champion, but nothing major landed.

It took a minute for things to heat up in round two, but a good right hand from Morrissey saw him start to get on top. Kevin landed a good left in return. Both men were starting to land their shots now, with Morrissey landing a few more and drawing a nosebleed from the Millstreet boxer.

Morrisey landed two good shots early in the third but Kevin replied with agood right. A minute into the round there was an unfortunate clash of heads that led to an interruption. Kevin was trying to get in close but Morrissey still had the dangerous jab going and edged another round. Kevin was slowly starting to read the Limerick man's rhythm, timing his counters a lot better. He was on top but got caught by a good right hand from Morrissey that interrupted his momentum. Late in the round Kevin unleashed a rapid whirlwind of punches. Morrissey hit back with a good right but Kevin probably shaded that round by a fraction.

Kevin was getting more aggressive and it was paying dividends in the fifth, but Morrissey was still that bit more accurate and clinching cleverly any time that Kevin pushed forward. Heading into the final minute of the first half Kevin landed a great punch and, to be honest, I think he needed it. At the break I had Morrissey winning four rounds to one.

Morrisey was clinching again in the sixth but Kevin was visibly growing into the fight and landed some good ones. Morrissey tried to change his tactics and go more toe-to-toe in the sixth, maybe he thought a finish was on the cards. It was a mistake; that's meat and drink to Kevin. Morrissey picked up a point deduction for a punch below the belt and then lost his gumshield for the second time. I don't want to be too cynical, but these delays arrived when Morrissey was on the back foot, never the other way around. And Morrissey did need the delay here; Kevin was really starting to land hard ones now. A great left right had Morrissey reeling but in fairness, he managed to hold on - and it was just holding on, Kevin won that one with plenty to spare. The eighth round was even better, with Kevin looking the fresher of the two fighters and landing repeated punches. This was a complete role reversal, with Kevin now completely on top and, moreover, landing punches with more power than Morrissey had during his own spell of dominance.

It looked as if Morrissey needed a clear win in the ninth to balance the scorecards. The opposite happened, with Kevin catching him repeatedly with his left. Beautiful skill; I wasn't sure if Morrissey would make it to the end of the round. He's a tough customer, though, credit to him.

Last round. Kevin ,despite his slow start, was surely ahead on the scorecards now. He also started the tenth much stronger, pursuing Morrissey relentlessly. Three times Morrissey got a respite after losing his gumshield – I'm sorry, but that's a little bit ridiculous.

Kevin clearly felt that he had won, and so did most people watching. Somewhat inexplicably, the judges ruled it a draw. I don't ever go in for this "Kerry was robbed" guff. It was





certainly going to be tight enough – remember Morrissey dominated the first half. But I genuinely thought that Kevin landed more and better punches overall.

On Friday evening Kerry FC were back home again as they welcomed league leaders Galway United to Mounthawk Park for the first time. Galway came into the game obvious heavy favorites winning nine out of their nine games this season, and Kerry were still looking for that desired first win of the season. The previous meeting between the two sides was on the tenth of March when Kerry suffered their heaviest defeat this season in a game that finished 9-1 to United. With Kerry being at home, a result like that again would be very unlikely. A sold-out Mounthawk Park crowd never disappoints, and the home faithful had their voices heard from minute one.

In the program's dugout notes Manager Billy Dennehy did not shy away from the huge challenge that faced his side but said these are challenges that need to be embraced, as these are games and nights the club has dreamed of for a very long time.

Kerry defended excellently last time out away to Waterford, and it seemed if Kerry could keep the same composure at the back on the night as they did last week, they could make it very tough for the top side in the league.

First Half: Kerry started the first half well in possession and equaled Galway's intensity on the ball. They were not being pressured to start off by Galway and seemed to be the more comfortable of the two. The first big chance of the game came in the way of Kerry when a kick out from Wayne Guthrie was flicked on brilliantly by Ryan Kelliher. His header pushed out wide to Leo Gaxha who played the ball inside the box to Seán McGrath. He got his shot off and aimed it for the bottom left corner. The effort, however, was unfortunately saved well by Brendan Clarke.

Kerry were not letting off and kept going at the league leaders. Sean McGrath picked up the ball just over the halfway line and gave a ball over the top which stretched Gaxha to the max. Gaxha picked the ball up down the right close to the byline and drilled a half volley across the box but there was nobody inside to take advantage and Galway narrowly escaped. Galway started to get a foothold on the game and a corner for United was first cleared but the ball back into the box flew through the crowd and was eventually cleared off the line but was ruled to be offside, easing the minds of the home crowd for the time being.

Kerry kept to their game plan excellently in the first half and went toe-to-toe with Galway

showing no sign of weakness. They defended well and attacked even better. In the 40 th minute they got their reward for their excellent work and sent Mounthawk into hysterics. A short-taken corner was played in and out with great feet from Leo Gaxha to lose the defender, he chipped his cross deep into the back post for Ryan Kelliher who nodded home to give the Kingdom a hugely

deserved lead.

A lead in at halftime would have given Kerry fantastic confidence going into the second half, but the great form and resilience that Galway have shown throughout the course of the season so far to be where they are in the league table was conveyed right on the stroke of halftime. A floating ball into the box by Conor McCormack was attempted to be punched out by Guthrie but he unfortunately mistimed the flight of the ball and David Hurley got there before him to head home into the empty net, closing out the half 1-1.

Second Half:

From the late equalizer in the first half, Galway

really drove on. A free kick from a decent position 25 yards away from the goal was taken by David Hurley. It was laid off for him and his left foot shot whipped around the wall and smashed off the crossbar. It was dealt with by Kerry in the end, but they could not hold off the pressure for that much longer. Maurice Nugent gave the ball to Stephen Walsh inside the box after Kerry gave away the ball very easily. Walsh twisted and turned to open a shot for himself before burying the opportunity to give Galway the lead on the night.

Galway were starting to kick into a new gear and find space in all areas of the pitch. One of those instances came when full-back Colm Horgan went forward well and found some of the said spaces to run into. He gathered enough room and rifled a right-footed shot from just outside the left side of the box into the bottom right corner, giving Guthrie no chance in goal.

Just twelve minutes later things worsened for the home side. A corner swung in from David Hurley at the right corner flag was found by Sean Walsh who headed the ball back the way it came and into the bottom right corner.

Although Kerry found themselves down by three goals they kept pushing and showed great fight. A free kick delivered superbly out from the left wing by Leo Gaxha had his cross flicked on by substitute Trpimir Vrljicak. His header hit the bar and the follow-up acrobatic effort from Samuel Aladesanusi went just wide of the post.

Even with Kerry's late pressure with another chance coming from Kevin Williams, Galway were able to see the game through and they went away 4-1 victors.

Although Kerry were unable to keep up the pace with Galway, they can feel immensely proud of their first-half performance and keep that in their locker as something to build on, especially with a tough week ahead with a double game week. First off, they face Treaty United away in Limerick. Then they have a trip to Cobh just three days later on the bank holiday Monday to face Ramblers. If the Kingdom can put in a good shift in those two games, there is nothing to say that they cannot walk away with maximum points.



TREES FOR SMALL GARDENS

There are a lot of trees suitable for smaller gardens and they come in all shapes and sizes, evergreen or deciduous.

There are a lot of things to consider when choosing a tree for a limited space, the most important being the eventual height and spread fo the tree.

Some ornamental small trees can still reach a height of 20/25 feet.

Sometimes even these small trees can be too big for a small garden but there is still a lot of choice out there.

Examples would be a weeping tree which never gets too tall and is very easy to prune back if need be. On the other hand you can choose a tree that is columnar in shape and it won't spread out too much. There is also the option of standard trees. These trees are usually about 3ft to 4ft in height and grow from the top to ground level, staying at the height you plant them at.



God hates offence because it separates people from Him and from others. Unforgiveness can stem from unresolved past trauma and painful experiences. "Return to your rest 0 my soul, for the Lord has dealt bountifully with you. For You have rescued my life from death, my eyes from tears and my feet from stumbling and falling...." (Psalm 116:7-8). Jesus taught much about forgiveness — it is a Kingdom principle upon which our Salvation is based. God forgave us our sin because His Son Jesus laid down His life for every man woman and child to be saved and brought back into God's family by taking our sins and offence making us right with Him. The Lord Jesus is the 'Light of the world', and His Glorious Light and Love exposes, and overcomes darkness. "For God so loves the world that He gave His Only Begotten Son so that whoever believes in Him shall not die but have eternal life" (John 3:16-20; John 8:12).

In the same way that God has forgiven you and me, He expects us to forgive others (Mark 11:25). "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us" (Matthew 6:12). Some people do not like to focus much on this part of Salvation because they find it difficult to forgive. It is natural to want to be vindicated and to protect oneself from being hurt, but at what cost? Jesus often taught Biblical concepts in easy-to-understand parables. Peter asked Him one day how many times did God expect us to forgive someone who sins against us - he cautiously suggested perhaps seven times? Jesus replied 'no, not seven times, but seventy times seven." Ouch! I see you multiplying inside your head friend.... that is four hundred and ninety times a day! Jesus then went on to teach the parable of the 'unforgiving servant', who was forgiven an enormous debt by the King (equal to a few million euro today) and was saved from prison because of the King's mercy. But this servant then went off and imprisoned a fellow servant because he owed him a measly twenty euro. The King was told of this and severely chastised the unforgiving servant and handed him over to be tortured and tormented in prison until the debt was paid which, given the amount owed, would be generations (Matthew 18:21-35). Unforgiveness is poison, it imprisons individuals and families in utter torment. It is just not worth it. God wants us to live differently (Ephesians 4:30-32).


