

€1.26 MILLION RAISED AT RING OF KERRY CHARITY CYCLE

Awhopping €1.2 Million has been raised at the 2022 Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle.

Beneficiaries gathered at the Killarney Brewery and Distilling Company, Fossa on Friday evening last for the Cheque Presentation.

After a two year absence through Covid it was back on the road again on the 2nd of July.

"The event turned out to be a great success despite inclement weather especially down south, Cathal Walshe, Committee Member of the Charity Cycle told Killarney Outlook.

"Charities from all over came to to join in the celebration", he added.
The main beneficiaries were Ard Churam, Listowel, Banna Search and
Rescue, Cunamh Iveragh, Cahirciveen, Down Syndrome, Kerry, Irish

Community Air Ambulance and Breakthrough Cancer Research.

erry International Film Festival (KIFF) celebrated its 23rd Edition over this past weekend, 20 -23 October 2022. This year KIFF presented 30+ events in Killarney and Dingle. The KIFF team was overwhelmed with the level of interest and support they received across the four days of the festival as was evident via the number of attendees at screenings, events and KIFF industry talks as well as via the phenomenal support the festival received from local businesses, hoteliers, sponsors and supporters.



Velo Kenmare, Ireland's newest and toughest cycling event, took place in Kenmare on Saturday, with cyclists from all over Ireland taking on the challenging, mountainous course of 135km of Ireland's steepest climbs. Velo Kenmare is a timed loop route starting and finishing in Kenmare, with a total climbing distance of 1,650m.

Cyclists enjoyed fabulous autumn weather for this inaugural cycle with blue skies, sun and dry weather holding up for this scenic tour of Kerry. Overall fastest male cyclist was Jerry McCarthy who finished in 03:49:01, followed by Ewan Buckley in 03:49:14, and Bernard Sweeney in 03:51:35. Overall fastest female cyclist was Diane Behan in a time of 04:16:08, followed by Astrid Sasses in 04:41:39 and Regina Sheehan in 04:56:32. Fastest male and fastest female over four categorized mountain climbs (Molls Gap, Ballaghbema Pass, Ballaghasheen and Coomakista) were crowned King and Queen of the Mountains. The King of the Mountains was Ewan Buckley in 3 hours 49 minutes, and Queen of the Mountains was Diane Behan in 4 hours 16 minutes.

No stranger to cycling events, Velo Kenmare is managed by Elite Events

Management, who also successfully deliver the Ring of Beara Cycle, Ride Dingle and Wicklow 200.

Event organizer Ollie Kirwin said, "We are very happy to bring this challenging cycling event to Kenmare and support local business and community groups in the process. Kenmare has always proved a very welcoming and friendly host town for many of our events, and we hope to build on Velo Kenmare as a regular cycling sportive in the coming years. It was designed to be a tough event for the serious cyclist and by all accounts the feedback was it was tough enough! In this way, we were also able to showcase the most stunning parts of Kerry and the country to our visiting participants, via iconic views from some of Ireland's highest mountain passes and most scenic coastal roads."

The tough mountain climbs took cyclists over Molls Gap, Ballaghbeama Pass, Ballaghasheen and Coomakista. Participating cyclists were given €20 vouchers to spend ('Velo Dollars') in local shops redeemable against goods and services in Kenmare.

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney

Genuine worries in Killarney about Killarney need to be addressed at EU and MEP level

It is time for our MEPs to address worries about the numbers of refugees and direct provision applicants in this town and to point the way forward.

Ireland now has among the highest per capita number of refugees in Europe and only two countries, Germany and the Czech republic have higher numbers per head of population, in what is an EU-led programme for Ukrainian refugees, according to the latest figures obtained by me.

As of 29th September, Ireland with a population of five million has 54,826 Ukrainian refugees registered for temporary protection. Our nearest European neighbour, France, eight times our size and with a population of 67 million and with enviable health and housing services is hosting 105,000 Ukrainian refugees. Italy with a population of 59 million has over 157,000 while Spain with a population of 47 million numbers has under 145,000.

EU officials have confirmed that "the per capita figure in Ireland is indeed slightly above the EU average!".

Then according to the latest figures from the Department of Children, again on request by me, Kerry with 3,741 hotel beds to Ukriainans has the third largest number of Ukrainians in hotel accommodation in the country after Dublin and Donegal, with further numbers in other arrangements in Killarney and elsewhere. Longford has 84 and Monaghan has only 89 in hotels.

In addition Killarney is accommodating most of the refugee. It now also has around 600 direct provision applicants. No one is explaining the imbalance in the numbers in refugees internally in this country, or in terms of Ireland's position in the Europe nations. But those are the facts. Now with no extra services in Killarney and local people in the long queues for social welfare medical and other services, and rising energy bills, and deep concern about the hundreds of years old tourist industry, there is understandable local public disquiet. And most local politicians will tell you they are getting constant calls.,

Killarney councillors aside, The TD Danny Healy-Rae, is the only Kerry TD to come out on the matter. He is asking "a halt" be called, and a full debate on the issue because we have more than any other and no extra services.

But what of our MEPs, our EU representatives? We have a local MEP in Sean Kelly. What does be think?

There cannot be unlimited mass immigration. Without services. I for one do not subscribe to the notion that is slipped now into the public conversation by the Taoiseach and the Tanaiste that "we" are at war. "We" are

not. To reference the Lone Ranger, there is no "we" in this Tonto.

Until very recently, a lot of us thought the kraine was part of Russia after all! I am reminded of that old Killarney story about the local couple down the lane when they got the letter their son was wounded in the Dardanelles in 1915."Would you tell me what part of him is that?" the poor woman asked. I don't wish to be flippant, but no more than Gallipoli, is the Ukraine/Russian or the Afghan or any other conflict our war, though we are impacted.

And while Killarney will be happy to do its bit, and more than happy, because we all know about colonialism and emigration, is it fair on Killarney people and its tourism industry to be asked to do far more than anywhere else in the country? And to do this without supports and to have no one to have the courage to address the concerns? Apart from aside remarks that there is a war on? Earlier this week I emailed MEPs Seán Kelly and Deirdre Clune, for their views. I look forward to their response.

Land Development Agency is now looking at St Finan's and A public convenience at last for Killarney Courthouse

The Land Development Agency, the state agency coordinating public land for housing use is looking at St Finan's, it has emerged. Though what is to become of the listed building is the key question.

In response to a question by ClIr Maura Healy-Rae on an update on St Finan's" Martin O'Donoghue housing manager said the HSE did not want to subdivide the assets, that is sell part of the land without the building.

A valuation was done on the site but it was not his information to reveal, Mr O'Donoghue also said. There was significant annual liability in maintenance and the cost to retrofit the listed building would be "astronomical" and of the order of 100 million euro.

Notwithstanding the pressures for social housing in Killarney , "St Finan's is beyond the scale of what his local authority could do," the council official said.

There is better news for the Killarney Courthouse. After a decade-long battle for a public convenience at the courthouse, civilization has landed. Works are at last underway for a toilet and roof repairs and are due to be completed by the end of November, both the courts service and the council confirm.

The indicative cost at this stage is around 175,000 euro plus vat.

Beware the Stags!

Beware the red stags is the advice from the NPWS. They advise the public to keep a very safe distance. This is after two large mature red stags died in combat within days of each other, each gored to death in battle.

The battles occurred at Muckross. One was found dead in a large field on the N71 opposite the main tourist entrance to Muckross House, an area frequented by dozens of photographers and spectators in town to catch the rut.

Just days later, a second large stag with several points to his antlers was found dead nearby also in the Bog field in the Muckross/ Torc area. He too had been gored to death by a rival.

Rangers suspect the vanquished stags were sent off by a third stag "in separate combat" for the favours of a large harem of hinds. The battles may have lasted several hours.

"At least" two have died so far is the thinking. Exactly how many stags die is unknown and rarely are the stags found until well afterwards when walkers and rangers come across their skeletons.

Some years ago a pair of locked antlers were discovered in the reed beds of the lower lake near the Caslterosse Hotel and Killarney Golf and Fishing Club. It is believed the pair fought their way into the water and drowned there.

Meanwhile, The Grand Master, believed to be Ireland's biggest stag weighing in at 250 kgs and with over 20 points on his antlers has also been sighted in recent days. However his location in the remote uplands is again not being disclosed for fear of trophy hunters.





WORKS TO COMMENCE ON

MUCKROSS CARPARK UPGRADE

The carpark at Muckross House and Gardens at Killarney National Park is to undergo an upgrade.

Visiting Killarney at the weekend, Minister Malcolm Noonan TD, Minister of State for Heritage and Electoral Reform, along with Niall O'Donnchú, Director General of the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) and the Trustees of Muckross House, announced the commencement of works.

This is a significant project involving upgrading of the existing car park, extension of the existing bus parking area and the upgrade of the overflow car park. Furthermore, a new surface water drainage system is to be installed to serve the entire car parking area. These works will allow for the current and expected increase in visitor numbers to the wonderful surrounds of Killarney National Park, and to Muckross House and Gardens in particular.

Announcing the commencement of works, today, the Minister said



BETTER LATE THAN NEVER FOR KERRY'S 1,984

CANDIDATES, AS JUNIOR CYCLE EXAM RESULTS TO BE RELEASED ON THE 23RD NOVEMBER



CERTAINTY

So much time has passed since last June when 68,408 candidates sat for the Junior Cycle exam, that many of them may have forgotten all about it. They will have settled into Transition Year or 5th year and, perhaps, have despaired of ever getting their exam results. But, as the saying goes, the result is far more important than the contest. So, there is no doubt that the young people who took their first public exam last June, were delighted to learn last week that their results will be published on Wednesday, 23rd November. It's still a long way off but, at least, the young people concerned now have certainty.

PRESTIGIOUS

The Junior Cycle exam is a prestigious exam of the State Examinations Commissions (SEC) and it's the first opportunity for second level students to engage with a public exam of this nature. To suggest that the status of the Junior Cycle exam has been diminished in a more educated society is not totally fair to those awaiting results. While it's true that very few students nowadays drop out of formal education after Junior Cycle, it's still a major milestone for those taking the exam.

FIRST EXAM

All of us remember the great joy we felt when we got the results of our first ever State exam. The sense of achievement made us very proud of ourselves. We realised that diligent study reaped the reward of good exam results. We celebrated in a manner that was appropriate to our time. My celebration was a bottle of Nash's lemonade and two Barry's vanillas in Denna Fitzgerald's Mineral Bar in Rock Street, Tralee with my friends. But it was a memorable gathering of young people who were overjoyed to have achieved the prestigious Junior Certificate. The Class of 2022 are similarly entitled to their celebration when their results are finally released.

IMPORTANT

The importance of the Junior Cycle exam results in modern education, is in subject selection for Leaving Cert. Subject selection is the first step to college. While this is not an immediate concern to students taking the optional Transition Year, its vital for 5th year students to select a subject grouping that will enable them to achieve a competitive Leaving Cert exam result. The subjects they select and the quality of their Leaving Cert results will determine the college course that will be offered by the CAO.

COMMENDED

In fairness, the SEC must be commended for providing a Junior Cycle exam for the first time since 2019. The SEC had very significant examiner shortages which delayed marking at both Leaving Certificate and Junior Cycle. The SEC also deserves great credit for providing a deferred sitting of the Leaving Cert exam in July for students unable to sit exams in June due to serious accident, injury or illness, close family bereavement or Covid-19. A total of 397 candidates sat the deferred exam, having missed out in June - 270 due to Covid, 43 due to a bereavement and 84 due to serious illness.

LATE RESULTS

Consequently, the Leaving Cert results were published much later than normal, on 2nd September, and the Leaving Cert subject appeal results came out five weeks later on Friday, 7th October, in time for the CAO offers. The number of candidates who sat for the Junior Cycle exam this year was also 3,500 or 5% up on the 2019 figure, when the exams were last held for all candidates.

CREDIT

While the Junior Cycle results are very late, great credit is due to Minister Norma Foley and the SEC for running the State exams in a fair and efficient manner despite very difficult circumstances. The quality and integrity of the exams was as good as ever and the number of

CAO and PLC offers was very reassuring.

CELEBRATE

Junior Cycle exam results will be available in schools on Wednesday, 23rd November and candidates can also access their results online from 4pm on that date. As a gesture to the long-suffering candidates, perhaps Minister Foley might intervene to have the results available online at 9am rather than 4pm so that the young people can celebrate on their special day and shoot the breeze for a few hours with their friends over a cappuccino and pizza!

Senator Daly said: "As Cathaoirleach of Seanad Éireann, it is a great honour to be awarded the Order of Prince Yaroslav the Wise, II Degree by President Zelenskyy of Ukraine. The Irish people and the Houses of the Oireachtas have been steadfast in their support of Ukraine and its people since the brutal and illegal invasion by Russia eight months ago.

"During my visit to Kyiv with the Ceann Comhairle in May when we met

Ireland, our partners in the European Union and our friends in the United States and the United Kingdom are unyielding in our support for democracy and the rule of law over tyranny and brutality."



FOCUS ON EAST KERRY

Even before a ball was thrown in for this year's County Championship, all eyes were on a powerpacked East Kerry, especially the forward talent. It didn't do Jerry O'Sullivan and his selectors any favours. In many ways it amounted to an incredible burden of expectation – but it can'#t be considered unfair, given the stellar talents and the huge population base. They had lost Spa, who had gone up to senior, but you were adding Kilcummin, Kilgarvan, and Tuosist. Of course the 2019 and 2020 champions were raging hot favourites. It is not unfair to Austin Stacks to suggest that Esat Kerry were caught cold in the opening game of a knockout covid championship last year. With the addition of a group stage, divisional teams would have the opportunity in 2020 to bed in a playing style.

They were drawn in the toughest group, but that may well have stood to them in the long run. Kerins O'Rahillys were dismissed by 2-20 to 1-11 in the opening game. It's fair to say that Rahillys didn't exactly throw the handle after the hatchet in the second half – I suspect that they were holding in reserve for later games. Interestingly, Kerry keeper Shane Ryan lined out in the forwards (where he plays for Rathmore) in the absence of David Clifford, with Marc Kelliher deputising admirably. The talking point afterwards was the sparkling display of Ruairí Murphy, who finished with 1-5.

Next up was a Spa side who had coughed up four goals to a rampant Dingle in the opening round. Spa had players back from injury, though, and moreover had a defensive gameplan that stymied East Kerry. Both sides could be grateful to their goalkeepers for some top drawer saves. It was significant that while Spa were always second best here, they could well have eked out a hard-earned victory. It didn't throw East Kerry off their stride long term, but it did remind everyone that a Kerry

County Championship is always a climb, never a procession.

The round three games in the group stage of the County Championship ended up being moot. Three of four groups were already settled by then, with two teams having two wins and two teams having none – it's a problem that the County Board will have to consider for next year. It wouldn't be fair to say that this game had the atmosphere of a challenge game – there was more bite and battle than that - but euphoria or despair were never going to be on the menu. Both sides gave it everything, though, there was no shadow-boxing. Again East Kerry struggled to pull away for 45 minutes. A Paul Geaney goal left just a point in it but East Kerry once again were able to push on at the finish and win by a 2-13 to 1-11 margin that was flattered by a very late Ruairi Murphy goal.


The road wasn't going to get any easier. East Kerry were drawn against Kenmare Shamrocks, for whom Seán O'Shea was probably the best player of the County Championship to date. Kenmare didn't disappoint. This was a thriller from start to finish. Paul O'Connor's early penalty put East Kerry in front, and they still led by 1-3 to 0-5 at half-time. East Kerry's heralded full forward line were creating chances, but not executing them.

An early Paul O'Connor penalty put the cat among the pigeons, especially with Kieran Fitzgibbon superbly denying Paudie Clifford at the other end. Kenmare led by 1-3 to 0-5 at half-time – the third East Kerry game in a row with a relatively low scoreline halfway through. Darragh Roche and Seán O'Shea had three dead ball conversions each as the sides were level after forty minutes (that's been a very discernible pattern of their games, and one that must be a worry at this stage), but two David Clifford scores gave East Kerry the ascendancy, 0-11 to 1-6. David Hallissey pulled one back but


David Clifford hit another brace to put three points between them. They had to survive a nervy finish, though, with Dan McCarthy's fisted effort at goal just shaving the wrong side of the post and a possible penalty claim after Seán O'Shea appeared to be held back. Very fine margins!

Dingle had stumbled early on in the Club Championship - it's worth noting that they played their championship games without the proven scoring ability of the injured Conor Geaney - but really found their feet in the County Championship. Where East Kerry were stumbling over finishing lines, Dingle were assured and capable in their games and the likes of Mikey Geaney, Tom O'Sullivan, Barry Dan O'Sullivan, and especially Paul Ghaeney in top form, while the return of AFL winner Mark O'Connor was a huge boost. This one had an ominous feel about it, and it lived up to all the billing. Three points from the stellar Paul Geaney had Dingle leading by 0-5 to 0-3 at halftime, but a profligate East Kerry had left nine decent scoring chances behind them. On the restart Ronan Buckley and Cian Gammell tied things up. Great work by Paul Geaney set up Dylan Geaney for a goal, but East Kerry swept down the field in reply - Gavin Curran made two great saves but couldn't prevent Paudie Clifford finally fisting home the rebound. Paul Geaney and Ruairí Murphy exchanged points. Barry O'Sullivan burst through for an important point, but Paudie Clifford replied in kind. Tom O'Sullivan fisted over a well-worked score to put Dingle back in front, but sub Paul O'Shea nervelessly kicked a great score to level. With the game on the line, a magnificent score from very long range by Paul Murphy saw East Kerry through to the final.


East Kerry have scored 5-69 in five games (3-22 in the first half of games) and conceded 4-46 (just 1-14 in first halves).













Shane Ryan is almost a certainty to pick up an All Star this year in goal. Pa Warren and Chris O'Donoghue have tenacity and pace, but the anchorman in defence for me has been Jack Sherwood. He has been imperious all through, apart from that enthralling duel with Paul Geaney. Frankly, if I was Jack O'Connor, I'd be considering a return to the green and gold for the big man. Likewise Paul Murphy is county class all the way - that winning point against Dingle is the score of the championship so far, but Murphy has been playing like that all through and a real leader of the line. Daniel O'Brien, Cian Gammell (who is another that is worth a look at a higher level) and Jonathan Lyne are quietly and calmly efficient, understated excellence. These are the kind of players you need to win county championships. Ronan Buckley is big and robust - he may have picked up a few slightly careless yellow cards along the way, but he has also picked up a huge amount of ball and kicked some great scores as well. Darragh Lyne is another with a bright future - his hard work pays unseen dividends and he is invariably in the right place at the right time. Ruairí Murphy has generated a huge amount of hype ever since he burst onto a star-studded but ultimately under-performing Kerry U20 team and showed what hunger and drive can bring to the table. It's no secret that he's a player to watch. Paudie Clifford is the oil in East Kerry's engine just as he is for Kerry. Up front you have a starting trio of David Clifford (no words necessary), Darragh Roche, and James O'Donoghue. Lightning. They haven't really cut loose to full effect yet, but once the ball gets there, these players are capable of incredible damage. Paul O'Shea against Dingle showed why he would be starting on any other team, while Donal Down O'Sullivan is a match-winner in his own right. With that kind of arsenal, of course East Kerry are going in here as favourites.

FOCUS ON MID KERRY

I'm not being smart in hindsight here. I predicted East Kerry to play Mid Kerry in the final before the championship even started; I'm very surprised that more people didn't. Yes, Mid Kerry have had a fair bit of turnover since the

2019 Final, with the likes of Darran O'Sullivan and Peter Crowley stepping away. But look at the young guns, especially from Beaufort and Laune Rangers, who have come through. Éanna Ó Conchúir surprised me. I remembered a very accurate but light predator from his younger days – that late goal to win the Hogan Cup for Coláiste an Sceilge was reminiscent of Mikey Sheehy's famous goal to snatch a draw against Cork in 1988. Éanna is still deadly accurate =but he is also a big and robust footballer now, well able to mix with the best of them. He is a massive addition. Mid Kerry were very well organised - the biggest factor for a divisional side is 'buy-in' from club players, and the Mid Kerry players bought in.

Group Stage

West Kerry, with Dara Ó Sé back from Cork, were something of an unknown quantity. They asked hard questions, especially after Cian O'Grady hit an early goal. Mid Kerry were faltering slightly as they trailed by 1-8 to 0-4, but they came off the ropes swinging late in the first half and a Kieran Dennehy goal (Dennehy has turned into a very serious operator this year, I imagine he will be getting a call from Kerry U20 manager Tomás Ó Sé if he hasn't already) trimmed it before the break. With the wind (and it was a savage wind) at their backs, Mid Kerry never looked back after that. Seán Coffey has been the top keeper in this year's County Championship and laid down early markers here with two fine saves In the end Mid Kerry had four points to spare, 1-14 to 1-10. That West Kerry team were undervalued; it took a good team to put that scoreline on them.

Na Gaeil made their championship debut this year and acquitted themselves in fine style. Tralee's youngest club made Mid Kerry work very hard for victory and could quite well have won this if they had scoring forwards. Quite simply, while the likes of Jack Sheehan and Dan Goggin are great players, they don't have a sharpshooter who is consistently coming out with 0-6 or 0-7 in games. Diarmuid O'Connor, with 0-5, 4f, was their top scorer, and they just had to work that bit harder for their sixteen points than Mid Kerry did for their twenty.

The third game was another dead rubber, with both sides already qualified. A quick-starting

Mid Kerry opened up a three point lead and drew two great saves out of Wayne Guthrie. At half-time Mid Kerry had stretched that lead out to 0-7 to 0-3. With Colin McGillicuddy cutting out long ball into Kieran Donaghy, Stacks were struggling for penetration, but a great goal by Michael O'Donnell in the 37th minute cut the gap to two points and gave them real hope. The excellent Liam Carey pointed but Stacks levelled matters through Shane O'Callaghan, Conor Horan, and David Mannix. However Mid Kerry finished the stronger of the two sides with five points on the trot before a late goal by Fiachra Clifford gave the final scoreline a slightly flattering margin of 1-15 to 1-7.

Mid Kerry went into the quarter-finals as favourites and justified it by taking a 0-5 to 0-1 lead despite the challenging weather. Then it all started going wrong for them. Templenoe were dogged and tireless and Mid Kerry found themselves drawn into the mire - to be fair, the weather did neither side any favours. Éanna Ó Conchúir's third point gave Mid Kerry a one point half-time lead. Templenoe started the second half in whirlwind fashion, the Spillane brothers and Tadhg Morley putting them three points clear. Alarm bells were quite sounding, but they were definitely being readied. Mid Kerry's response spoke of character, with Jack O'Connor and Fiachra Clifford scoring vital points. Colin Crowley stretched the lead to two, but Darren Houlihan swiftly cancelled those out and Fiachra Clifford put Mid Kerry in front. With Templenoe pressing for a late equaliser, it was Clifford again who hit the insurance point in injury time to put Mid Kerry through.

Feale Rangers had been the story of the championship so far, defying all predictions to get this far. However, this was definitely a bridge too far. Mid Kerry completely dominated from start to finish, and the harsh truth is that Feale Rangers only made the final scoreline respectable after Mid Kerry stepped off the throttle. Mid Kerry had four opening points in as many minutes, stealing Feale Rangers' increasingly desperate kick-outs with consummate ease and led 0-5 to 0-0 before Martin Stack pointed a free. By half-time it was 0-11 to 0-2 and done and dusted in all real respects. Feale Rangers did show defiance all

the way to the end, with Eamonn O'Flaherty kicking two points and Barry O'Mahony three, but this is not the kind of game you want before a final.

Mid Kerry have scored 2-77 in five games (1-43 in first halves) and conceded 2-53 (0-22 in first halves). The Feale Rangers game is a bit of an outlier in those stats, and the fact that both sides played different teams with different strengths devalues them even more.

PREDICTION

It's hard to look past East Kerry here. They just have too many aces in key areas. No, they haven't really opened the throttle in any game and have only gotten their noses in front late on in several games, whereas Mid Kerry's victories, Templenoe aside, have been more convincing. Match-ups will be key and managements have a lot to think about. I expect Jack Sherwood to pick up Liam Carey. I'd be tempted to put Daniel O'Brien on Éanna Ó Conchúir and give Paul Murphy a playmaking role, but that would be a big call. Jack O'Connor has been edging closer to peak fitness all year and I rate him hugely as a player - as in, I want him in with Kerry. His long range shooting could be a nightmare. Gavan O'Grady is expected to be on the bench for Mid Kerry, that's another deadly predator. If Mid Kerry need goals late on, they have players who can get them. Éanna has been making and deserving a lot of headlines. He's a proven performer on the big stage. But Fiachra Clifford is a bit of an unsung hero for me and Keith Evans was one of the cleverest playmakers I ever saw at underage. This guy has Colm Cooper's eye for a defence-splitting pass. Midfield will be a battleground. Colin McGillicuddy is a proven performer but one of

the stories of the championship for me has been Darren Houlihan. The Cromane man has been more than rock solid; he's a virtual certainty for my team of the championship. He struggled in the West Kerry game against Roibaird Ó Sé, but he has been outstanding ever since. The likes of Fiachra Clifford and Seán O'Brien will also snaffle up a lot of ball around the middle – Mid Kerry will be hoping to make hay here.

Mid Kerry have a very good defence. Again, I can see David Mangan playing at a higher grade. I expect Mangan to pick up David Clifford and he'll have to break the ball away from the big Fossa man – we all know how accurate David is with marks. Like Liam Carey, Pa Kilkenny was unlucky with injury in terms

of Kerry but he leads the line superbly. I think he'll stick to Paudie like glue, with Nathan Breen guarding the space in front of the danger area. Pa Wrennwill likely pick up James O'Donoghue, but I'd be advising the Legion man to draw him out – space inside is manna from heaven for David and Darragh Roche. I don't think they'll have too many goal chances, but they will create a couple. Of course, Seán Coffey has been nothing short of spectacular in his own right so far.

The bottom line is that Mid Kerry will need at least two goals to win this, while one would suffice for East Kerry. I expect them to make it three titles in four years.

All Ireland winner Paul Geaney was on hand to launch the initiative in Croke Park

UPMC Hillman Cancer Centre, Breast Cancer Ireland and the GAA/GPA have partnered together to promote Breast Health Awareness in GAA clubs across the Country, through seminars nationwide to club members in their own community.

Research from earlier this year by Breast Cancer Ireland indicated worryingly low levels across all age groups of self-checking behaviours and knowledge of the eight signs and symptoms of breast cancer, proving the sheer scale of the challenge when it comes to driving awareness and education. **Key findings show:**

Heart, Grit and Determination get Lakers over the Line

SCOTTS LAKERS ST PAULS 73 LIMERICK CELTIC 65

Hard to know where to start with this one. Do you eulogise the fluidity of the Scotts Lakers performance in the first quarter? Or would it be the scrappiness of a third quarter where both teams spluttered like an old engine to get anything going? Or was it the tension of that final quarter when one would be reaching for the blood pressure tablets? The truth is probably somewhere in between those questions but the bottom line would be that Limerick Celtics came to the Killarney Sports and Leisure Centre with a 100% record but went home without it. Coach Jarlath Lee had the look of a man who didnt know whether to laugh or cry after the game but when he reflected on the game over his Sunday morning cornflakes he couldn't be but satisfied with the heart, grit and determination his team exhibited even when their basketball prowess deserted them.

" Our hustle and defence has been superb this season and I've no doubt that is down to having Rui(Saravia) in there leading it. The whole team has stepped up in that regard and you can see in the likes of Jamie O Sullivan a huge improvement ". The second half irked him slightly though. "Our offence was really good first half but we lost our way in the second. We'll work on that Monday night at training because we have to learn to keep our foot on the gas". Ronan Collins and Jack Ferguson came in for special praise. "Ronans a great player, who can get even better as he continues to progress with us. Jack had a tough night tonight, up against a good American in Reynolds and also being double teamed but he got through a huge amount of work for us. He's a great lad."

The Celtics had come to Killarney having averaged 103 points in their three games and in Scott Angus and Joshua Reynolds they had the inform duo in the League. But the Lakers defended with huge intensity, limiting Angus to just 11 points before he was eventually fouled out in that scrappy third quarter. That he did not perform could be put down to the contribution of Lakers new signing Aron Walker whose imposing stature may have slightly deterred Angus from exerting his usual influence. That left Reynolds ploughing a lone furrow at times, which he did manfully, but he too was limited to a season low 23 points. So defensively with Mark O Shea pivotal the Lakers had dug a solid foundation.

The first quarter was their best with Walker dominating around the key and Ronan

Collins probing for every weakness. The duo accounted for the Lakers opening scores, leading 11-6 before Jack Ferguson joined the party and the home side led 18-10 and the Celtics had run into team foul trouble as well. Jack Ferguson , Jamie O Sullivan with a three and Jack O'Sullivan made it 28-14 before Reynolds kept his side in touch with some points late in the quarter to get the Celtics total to 19.

Walker started the second quarter like a house on fire hitting three in a row, Jack Ferguson hit from downtown and it was now double scores, 38-19. Eoghan Donaghy, starting to impose himself in the game, and Reynolds cut the gap to 42-28 but indiscipline once again crept into the Celtics as they were again called for a technical foul. Captain Rui Saravia got a well worked score, it had to be with only two seconds on the shot clock, but Reynolds kept the Celtics in the conversation with support from Seanmus Hickey and the deficit was now down to a more manageable 12 at half time, 47-35.

The quarter horribilis for the Lakers started in bright fashion with Mark O Shea and Ronan Collins with a three stretching it to 52-35. But incredibly the Lakers would fail to register a single point for the remainder of the quarter. The Celtics were not exactly firing on all cylinders either but Felletti , Reynolds and the increasingly influential David McCarthy drew the game level at 52-52, McCarthy hitting a buzzer-beating three pointer to equalise.

The only thing the Lakers could do with that quarter was file it in the forget about it section, and Ferguson hit an early note with a three. Reynolds and Seamus Hickey with a three put the visitors in front for the first time, a lead they pushed out to 6, despite Saravias basket. But credit where it's due the Lakers turned up the temperature and

Ferguson had the massive home support on their feet with a superb three, soon followed up by a bustling two. Ronan Collins powered into the game as well with a basket, set up by the diligence of Mark O Shea, and then went two for two from the free throw line after another Celtics intentional foul. The Lakers now lead by one and Ferguson inched it to two before Saravia, playing a leaders role, nailed two free throws and netted another basket to make it a six point game, 71-65. The win was cemented from the free throw line with two more by Ferguson and the cheers of relief echoed around the centre. Nobody expected this game to be easy and it certainly wasn't.

American Jack Ferguson paid a warm tribute to the Lakers fan base and joked "We had to make it an exciting game to keep the fans coming back!". He went on. "The supporters can be the difference between a win and a loss in games like that. The crowd were amazing, and we cannot thank them enough. Rui (Saravia), Mark(O Shea) and Ronan(Collins) made winning plays toward the end of the game, and that propelled us to a victory. It shows who we are as a team and the character we have. We are slowly but surely figuring out our identity as a basketball team."

For the Celtics Joshua Reynolds had 23, David McCarthy shot 15, Scott Angus checked in with 11 and Miles Felletti had 5.

The Lakers are at home again this weekend coming, with Fr Matthews making the trip over the County bounds. The Cork side have a 50% record with wins over the Killarney Cougars and Team North West whilst they

went down to the Limerick Celtics and SETU Carlow. A familiar face will be Brian O Neill, a former Laker, and everyone knows about his shooting prowess. He made 9 three pointers in last weekends win over Team North West. Diego O Herlihy and Jonathan Garcia will also need close attention in what is always a physically durable outfit.

The game is ,at the time of writing, currently fixed for Sunday 30th October at 3pm but this may be subject to change. It will be confirmed locally and on the clubs social media.

RAHILLYS TAKE THE TITLE IN TIGHT DECIDER

Senior Club Final: Kerins O'Rahillys 0-15 Templenoe 0-14

There were two Tralee sides in action in the Fitzgerald Stadium last Sunday, and to say that they had very contrasting fortunes would be a huge understatement. Rahillys have been knocking on the door of senior success to no avail in recent years, watching their arch-rivals lift three Club titles in the trot and, even worse surely, losing to them in last year's County Final. Rahillys are an old power in Kerry football ever since their foundation as Strand Road in 1928 (the name was subsequently changed to honour rebel martyrs Charlie Kerins and the O'Rahilly). Templenoe, obviously, are drawing from a much smaller base and population and, like most ostensible neutrals, I had a sneaking sympathy for the underdogs. I saw Templenoe claw their way out of Division Five just over a decade ago - I never thought, not even on their day of triumph in Croke Park, that I would see them at these heights.

Rahillys burst into a 0-5 to 0-1 lead. Killian Spillane was proving Templenoe's only threat up front, but my word what a threat he was. He almost single-handedly hauled Templenoe back to within a point. Barry John Keane nudged Rahillys back into a four point lead, but Killian set to work again and that lead was reduced to 0-10 to 0-9 by half-time.

There was no doubt, from start to finish, about the star of the show. David Moran finally looked completely injury-free and unencumbered and showed exactly what a power he is. There have been a few eejits rushing to retire the man prematurely from Kerry because of his age – jaysus, I'd be holding on to him for his football. I'll predict with confidence that himself and Paul Geaney are going nowhere, both are playing brilliantly and there's another All Ireland in this Kerry team. Adrian Spillane did make much more of a contest of things in midfield in the second half, but in fairness the man of the match award was a unanimous decision.

Jack Savage and Cormac Coffey were both back

from foreign climes and were key additions. Cormac is lightning fast and a playmaker - I felt he was worth more of a look from Kerry in his time – but the truth is that Jack Savage practises that rarest of football arts in the same manner as Killian Spillane, Tony Brosnan, James O'Donoghue, Ivan Parker with Churchill, Liam Carey with Beaufort....he scores the majority of what they put on the scoreboard. It's an underestimated art, consistently putting away all the bread and butter chances. Three in a row from Jack saw Rahillys lead by 0-15 to 0-12 with eight minutes left. Plenty of time, but Templenoe were starting to feel the weight of a very hard, action-packed game in their legs. Points from Killian and a comparatively subdued Stephen O'Sullivan (he very nearly fisted a dramatic late goal) made it a one point game. In the dying seconds an exhausted Killian stepped up to one last free. It lacked just a tiny fraction of power, crashing back off the junction of post and crossbar, with David Moran quickest to grab it and avert the danger. A heartbreaking way for Templenoe's journey to end, but what a journey. Rahillys' is only beginning as they prepare for a Munster Championship.

Austin Stacks 1-15

Empires are finite, and thus do empires fall. One can argue very strongly for either Ballymac (Jack Hussey and the Bailey brothers) or Killorglin (JP 'Champion' O'Sullivan) as the baptismal font of Kerry GAA, but I don't think anyone can argue that Tralee is the cradle in which it grew, and Rock Street played a huge role in that. You had Joe Barrett, Pluggy Moriarty, the famous Landers Limited brothers, and so many more. Tralee Mitchels, and later Rock St., dominated Kerry football in the twenties and thirties and helped Kerry to dominate football everywhere else. Austin Stack himself is one of the oldest names in Kerry GAA - in fact, his father is another who could fairly be described as the original founder.

Like Connaught in the old song, they were "in slumber deep" from 1936 to 1973 in terms of titles. Quiescent, but never comatose - they were always and ever dangerous; they just couldn't get over the line. You had a coterie of adults who took the juveniles of the area in hand, the likes of Dan Ryan, James Hobbert, and especially primary schoolteacher Micheál Haves. Interestingly, they weren't rooted solely to the GAA tradition, basketball was fostered just as much as hurling and football. Once those roots started paying dividends, the harvest was rich. Austin Stacks were the top club in Kerry in the seventies, including becoming the first club side from Kerry (as opposed to the East Kerry divisional team of 1971) to win a Club All Ireland.

This isn't any state of mourning, by the way, even though I have always and ever had a bit of a soft spot for Stacks – they have obliged me many a time. Last Sunday saw Austin Stacks consigned to Intermediate status for the first time ever. Listen, the phrase 'first world problems' comes to mind – I can name a dozen clubs who can only dream of intermediate status. This isn't the ending of Stacks' story; this is just a different chapter.

They can't have any complaints about the result. Kenmare Shamrocks were the better side on the day, and full value for their win.





It was a strange game, to say the least, but a hugely entertaining one.

Stacks made the early running, but left a few chances behind them. Their main tactic was lobbing the ball in on top of Kieran Donaghy - it's a bit worn around the edges at this stage, and as much as I hate saying it about a true Kerry legend, he is not the focal point that he was. Roman emperors were reminded during triumphs that they are mortal; so are the rest of us. Shane O'Callaghan was actually a better razor in Stacks' attack. Armin Heinrich opened their account and Seán Quilter added two good frees. Seán O'Shea had opened Kenmare's account and Shane O'Sullivan added another before Shane O'Callaghan made it 0-4 to 0-2.

In the 13th minute, Stephen O'Brien finished a brilliant Kenmare move to the net. Stacks have been a defensive team for the most part of three years now - I can't help wondering if their focus on defence rather than attack was horses for courses (the likes of O'Callaghan, Quilter, Mangan, and Mannix have been frustratingly inconsistent and occasionally brilliant in recent years), or whether the tactic lends itself to attacking inconsistency. Regardless, that usually seamless defence that leads unwary attackers down pre-ordained and secure channels misfired badly. Kenmare simply went very direct very fast. Stacks had spare defenders around their own forty, but attackers peeling off them into space to receive quick and accurate passes. Done right, i.e. quickly enough, it'll open any defence. Frankly, it was masterfully executed by Kenmare. Goal number two arrived just seconds later. Kenmare pressure forced a good turnover, with Paul O'Connor passing forward to James McCarthy. The pass was a fraction too far, the defender dived forwards to intercept, and the ball bobbled up between them....leaving McCarthy with a clear path in, neatly jinking it home. Incredible as it seems – and saying it out loud, it does seem incredible - David Hallissey was on the end of another great flowing move to sweep home a third goal in as many minutes. 3-2 to 0-4.

Plenty of time left. Plenty of drama, too, for that matter. Michael O'Donnell was probably the most influential player on the pitch at that stage and he got a fine goal as Stacks made it 1-8 to 3-3. Seán O'Shea has a magic all of his own, though, and he sent two difficult enough free kicks straight over the black spot to make it 3-5 to 1-8 at half-time.

Kieran Donaghy collapsed with a shoulder injury early in the second half, with Kenmare kicking the first three points of the second half. Seán O'Shea....if you had Mick O'Connell, Maurice Fitzgerald, Bryan Sheehan, and Seán O'Shea lined up for a difficult free, who would you bet the house on? Difficult choice (but if Mick O'Connell was just one decade younger, I'd back him every time). Certainly Seán doesn't miss, and I'm not just talking about the bread and butter ones.

It was 3-10 to 1-9 with ten minutes to go. Stacks were determined to fight to the end. The absence of Kieran Donaghy actually improved the flow of their attack - with route one effectively closed as an option, they played a more expansive and effective game. David Mannix came off the bench for four points on the trot (in fairness, I'm pretty sure he meant to drop at least one of them into the square late on when they needed a goal). Donaghy did come back on, apparently at his own insistence - I couldn't help think of Dylan Thomas' famous poem about raging against the dying of the light. I suspect that we may have seen one of Kerry's greatest players When the chips were down, though, Seán O'Shea was able to land one more monster kick to secure safety.

Stacks will play in next year's Intermediate, and that's notorious hard ground to get out of, but with Joe O'Connor, Brendan O'Sullivan, and Dylan Casey to come back and young talent like Heinrich, Horan, Purcell, and Kissane to call on (and even more talent coming through to senior in the next few years - seriously, watch out for them), Stacks will not be down for too lona.

CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP TALKING POINTS

The relegation of the three time reigning Kerry club champions and reigning County champions has reinvigorated conversations about Kerry's championship formats. Should we have more club teams and less divisional sides, e.g. 10 clubs and six divisions? It's an idea that's growing in popularity. Is the playing schedule contributing to the many injuries to Kerry players who have already had a long year that we have seen this year during the domestic championships? North Kerry has been a huge success at underage and Feale and Shannon Rangers had been floundering in recent years,. But Feale Rangers' impressive march to the semi-final probably scuppers that debate. Are East Kerry too big an amalgamation and are too many good players missing out on that playing panel?

Look, I don't have answers and I don't think there are any easy answers. But there are conversations to be had and decisions to be made. Things will get interesting...

NOVICE FINAL Kilgarvan 2-15 Beale 1-9

Kilgarvan claimed the first senior county title of the year, lifting the Hickey/Quirke Memorial Cup after defeating Beale in the Novice County Final, but there was only one talking point after the game. Donal Down O'Sullivan kicked an astonishing 2-13 out of that 2-15, sending over from all distances and angles. An argument could be made that the level of defending at novice level would not be of the calibre he would be accustomed to in Kerry training or in the Senior County Championship. I don't know, lads....the Novice is harder fought for than ye think, I've seen plenty of County Championship players and a few Kerry players throw their hand at it before, and I never saw the likes of this. Their only other scorers, by the way, were Cian O'Connell and veteran Connie Cremin with a point each. One thing is certain, the East Kerry selectors will have some very tough decisions to make before the County Final. For that matter, I genuinely was hugely impressed with midfielder Gearóid Fennessy for Kilgarvan as well.

LADIES GAA

For the first time since the 1980s, Kerry have legitimate contenders for the Footballer of the Year in both the womens and mens' categories. David Clifford is a virtual certainty for the male Footballer of the Year, while the news broke this week that Kerry's Louise Ní Muircheartaigh is a contender for the ladies' equivalent. She will be up against Emma Duggan of champions Meath (it would surely be a major shock if Emma doesn't get it, following in team-mate Vikki Wall's footsteps, after Meath won the double) and Niamh McLaughlin of Donegal (she helped her team to a League Final and a narrow All Ireland semi-final defeat).

SOUTHERN GAELS BOW OUT

Munster Ladies SFC Semi-Final: Ballymacarbery 3-9 Southern Gaels

The Waterford side, who had already made national headlines by defeating hot favourites Mourneabbey, saw off the challenge of the Kerry side, but not without being asked some hard questions along the way. Waterford legend Michelle Ryan slotted an early goal and Ballymacarbery led by 1-5 to 0-4 at half-time. It would have been more but for a spectacular save by Mary Ellen Bolger in the Southern Gael goal. In fact Southern Gaels could justifiably rue their luck as Rachel Dwyer found Siofra O'Shea with a great pass to her Kerry team-mate, but Siofra's effort crashed back off the woodwork. Instead it was the Waterford side who added a goal from Sdabh Hallinan for effectively a six point turnaround and there was no way back after that.

SKY GAA DEAL ENDS



Good. I'm not going to beat about the bush here. That TV deal with Sky that put GAA games behind paywalls was little short of disgraceful, not least because it was the first time that Croke Park appeared to show open contempt for the very obvious feelings of the grass roots on the matter. Claims that the games could not otherwise be shown are spurious -they couldn't be monetised, which is a different thing. For that matter, I'd love if clubs could pay a reasonable fee to County Boards and stream their own games. The technology is relatively widely available now and I for one would gladly pay to watch a lot of the games in this year's enthralling club championships again. Clubber TV have done a great job (a vast improvement on the very unreliable service of recent years, to be honest) but the packed schedules mean that only a small percentage of the games are available, even allowing for the expanded coverage under RTE's new deal.

I have nothing against Sky. In fact, I think that they did a very good job at presenting the games. But the GAA from the very first took a strong stance in regard to the promotion of Irish culture, not just in sport. There were instances of motions being thrown out because they were written on non-Irish notepaper (I'm not joking; that really happened). That kind of thing bordered the line between patriotism and bigotry, to be honest. But the decision, taken behind closed doors by the way, to sell the games off to the highest bidder was the exact opposite in every way. It reeked of a corporate decision in what is supposed to be a democratic organisation. Croke Park pointed to the inclusion of Australia's Channel Seven in the deal as justification - "tis all about the diaspora, not the money". Paul Rouse, Ireland's foremost expert on media communications, immediately called out that nonsense and sure enough, Channel Seven were quick to drop the broadcasts. There is talk - tentative enough talk at the moment - that the BBC have expressed an interest in showing the finals. Now, that really would be a PR coup - I honestly believe that the GAA should follow the lead of Aussie Rules a generation ago and literally give away their highlights packages to foreign domestic stations – that kind of exposure was vital to growing AFL and would certainly do no harm to the GAA.

The GAA have gotten a lot of decisions right in recent years. There was a desperate need for some kind of split season – that was very much a grassroots-driven project and the now-defunct Club Players Association deserve a lot of credit. But they have gotten a number of decisions wrong. The decision to sell broadcasting rights to Sky was clearly against the wishes of the grassroots, and I'm happy that it has been reversed. The change of age grades to odd rather than even ages was also driven strongly by the top table rather than supporters – I for one would like to see that particular decision follow suit.

SOCCER

Well, the truth is that the draw for the groups in the Womens' World Cup was never exactly going to be kind. Let's face it, it was a massive achievement for Ireland to get to this stage. When teams are looking around nervously and silently hoping that they are drawn against a minnow....well, I'm sorry, but we are exactly the kind of minnows that they are thinking of. The draw could actually have been worse. Still, Australia, Canada, and Nigeria....ouch.

Much will be made of Ireland beating Australia 3-2 last year in a friendly. That was a fantastic result, one that made this writer for one sit up and think "hold on, maybe there's real substance underneath all this". It wasn't so much the goals that Ireland scored (Australia won't give chances that soft again). It was the fact that there was a bit of bite and snarl about an Ireland team who were willing and ready to go toe to toe for it when the game came to a crunch. But look, there's a massive difference between a meaningless friendly at home and facing the Socceroos in Sydney in the opening game of the World Cup. Australians go mad for sport; they will get behind their team in a big way. You can try igniting a media storm over a song in a dressing room over there if you want; they have a low tolerance for that kind of nonsense in Australia.

Apparently the Australian womens' soccer team aren't known as 'Socceroos'. They are known as the 'Matildas' because of the famous waltzer in the song – that's the kind of casual lunacy that makes me look forward to Australia hosting a World Cup. You won't get that happening in Oatar

Canada are the Olympic champions, having shocked (and it was a colossal shock) Sweden on penalties in the Olympic Final. They are ranked seventh in the world, which makes me assume that they will be an even more



formidable proposition.

I have read a number of Irish previews since the draw, all of which say things like "Nigeria are the best ladies' team in Africa" and were "undoubtedly" the best team in pot four. Let's get real. We know next to nothing about the Nigerian Womens' team, but we have plenty of time to find out.

GOLF

Rory McIlroy Returns to Number One Rory McIlroy has probably made more

headlines for his statements about LIV, but his golf has actually been very impressive as well. A one shot victory this week in the CJ Cup in South Carolina, his final round 67 including seven birdies that meant he could afford to bogey the last two holes, sees him dislodge Scottie Scheffler as World Number One, his ninth time on top of the list.

Kilcummin were first up in the shootout and an astonishing save from Shane O'Sullivan in the Fossa goal ensured Fossa got off to the best





CALL FOR MINISTER TO LOOK AFTER FAMILIES



CHILD & ADOLESCENT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

A Kerry County Councillor has called on the Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly to urgently ensure that all family members affected by the Child & Adolescent Mental Health Service 'deficit of care', in Kerry and accepted as such by the HSE, are included in the non-adversarial compensation package offered as their exclusion will force them to take the adversarial route.

Speaking at this month's meeting of Kerry County Council, Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill said "Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group have welcomed the compensation scheme in principle but advise that the exclusion of 'first degree family members' from the non-adversarial option, is a major

stumbling block which will scupper the whole scheme and will direct families to the Courts for redress".

Councillor Cahill who attended a meeting in Dail Eireann earlier in the year with the Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group has called for an immediate release of funds to families affected under the CAMHS redress scheme who were awarded compensation.

"Withholding funds from families who are already traumatised by the mistreatment of their loved ones, is just piling on more abuse" stated Councillor Cahill.

"These patients and their families cannot be subjected to any more pressure. Pay out the funds that they are entitled to so that their lives may be somewhat easier than what they have endured to date" added Councillor Cahill.

The scandal that befell the patients and the families of the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service in South Kerry continues to torture all those affected, according to Councillor Michael Cahill.

"These families have been subjected to an appalling mistreatment over a length of time that means their whole family unit can never recover. And this has happened under the watch of our Health Service Executive" stated Councillor Cahill.

"You have got to understand that everyone in all of these households has been negatively affected because a family member was overmedicated by the State. Their lives will never be the same, they cannot ever get this time back" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"Compensation was welcomed, but it does not appear to be accessible to the families or include everybody affected. Stop torturing these people further, release funds to the parents and guardians now" stated Councillor Cahill.

The Rossbeigh based Councillor said "Under the Compensation Scheme, the HSE offered families €10,000 to access therapy and €5,000 for reports. One South Kerry mother said to me 'As a family we can't access this money because the child is a Minor and why we are signing for the Scheme when the HSE has no intention of releasing the funds to us'.

"Compassion and Common Sense is called for here and obstacles need to be removed" added Councillor Cahill.



Funding for Woman's Sheds welcomed

"We have all heard of the phenomenon that is the Men's Shed. These gatherings have popped up all over the country and they provide

a very important outlet for men who wish to socialise and share their hobbies with others with similar interests" stated Councillor Cahill.

"Now, Women's Sheds have begun to appear and because they do not come under the umbrella of a single national representative body, like the Men's Shed movement, they find it more difficult to access Government funding.

With this in mind the Minister for Rural and Community Development has announced grants which will be in the region of €1,000 - €2,000 could be used to assist Women's Sheds to expand within their communities, to run activities or to help them with their running costs such as insurance or rental costs" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"The Men's Shed has proved itself a very welcome addition to our communities and a similar venture like the Women's Shed is also a great initiative and I am delighted it is being supported with Government funding" added Councillor Cahill

CHURCHTOWN BURIAL GROUND

This week's announcement that Kerry County Council are commencing the Part 8 Planning process for the extension of Churchtown Burial Ground in Beaufort has been warmly welcomed by Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill.

"I am delighted to see this project progressing to the next stage because there was a lot of worry and anxiety in Beaufort as the present facility at Churchtown was reaching capacity. It didn't bear thinking about that the remains of deceased members of the Beaufort community, would have to be interred outside of their native parish" stated Councillor Cahill.

Rossbeigh based Councillor.


"I have been making representations on behalf of the






Welcome back dear student, last week we spoke on Joy. "You have turned my mourning into dancing; You have taken off my sackcloth and clothed me with Joy, that my soul may sing praise to You and not be silent, O Lord my God, I will give thanks to You forever" (Psalms 30:11-12 AMP). Joy lifts people; it's like the wind something we feel in the atmosphere without seeing anything tangible. Joyful people are magnetic - they light up the place. No one wants to hang out with someone who makes them feel miserable. But a person who has joy brightens day or night. Many joyful folks have endured dark times but you would never know it. Sadly for generations, people have been taught that it is a shameful thing for them to enjoy themselves. It's an evil religious spirit that drives perfectionism through guilt. No one is perfect but God, and He is good all the time (Luke 18:19). We are saved only by His Grace - not by our works (Ephesians 2:8-9).

Some people believe that they should derive no pleasure from life - that God is happier if they are sad and struggling. This is a lie from the devil to steal their joy. Jesus quite clearly said that He came so that whoever would believe in and follow Him would enjoy abundant life (John 10:10). Do you hear that? God desires that you enjoy your life! We need to renew our minds by erasing the religious mindsets that teach that God wants us to be solemn and cheerless, and replace them with the Truth; that knowing Jesus brings us fullness of Joy. Jesus mentions joy numerous times so it must be important (John 15:11; John 16:24). Proclaim it out loud with me friend: 'Lord Jesus thank You for saving me and filling me with Your joy so that my joy may be full - complete and overflowing!' Nehemiah declared 'the joy of the Lord is your strength and stronghold' (Nehemiah 8:10). A stronghold is a solid fortress wrapped around, sheltering and protecting those inside so that their enemies cannot overpower them. The Joy of the Lord brings hope to the heart and stability which allows one to overcome adversity.

Psalm 30 is a tonic for sadness and weariness...."Weeping may endure for a night, but a shout of joy comes in the morning" (Psalms 30:5). God's Word brings hope to lift the heavy heart. "The entrance of Your Word brings Light, so that even the simple understand" (Psalms 119:130). Light always overcomes the power of darkness (John 1:5). This time of year many struggle with heavy hearts. It's more than the dark nights. The atmosphere is dark. When demons, death and the occult are lifted up, deep darkness enters. The festivals of Halloween and Samhain are being celebrated in the coming days. Many people are fooled into thinking that it is a fun cultural event. It is not! It opens the door to evil spirits. Its roots are based in paganism - promoting witchcraft as something warm and cuddly. Have nothing to do with it. "You who love the Lord, hate evil; He protects the souls of His believers, He rescues them from the hand of the wicked. Light is sown like seed for the righteous and illuminates their path, and irrepressible joy is spread for the upright in heart who delight in His favour and protection" (Psalms 97:10-11 AMP). Don't glorify the devil - instead: Rejoice in the Lord Jesus and praise Him!
