

Killarney to celebrate INDEPENDENCE DAY

A merican-style razzmatazz, the likes of which has never been Aseen in Kerry before, will ensure Killarney is a riot of colour and excitement for this year's eagerly awaited 4th July celebrations.

This will be the landmark 10th year of the festival which will be more spectacular than ever before and the proof of that can be found in the incredibly packed and exciting programme of events lined up.

Festival Chairman, Diarmuid Leen, Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce Events Manager Katy Jacobi and their dedicated committee of volunteers have organised a wonderful celebration to mark Independence Day which, this year, will see great entertainment and fun-filled activities not only on Tuesday, July 4th but also on Monday, July 3rd.

An open invitation has been extended to everyone to celebrate America's big holiday in Killarney which is a town with a very close association with the US for generations.

The great celebrations will include a gala and colourful parade through the streets, open air concerts and music sessions, an outdoor screening of a movie classic, a bumper street party and so much more.

The festival will get off to a rocking start on Monday, July 3rd when hugely popular local band Truly Diverse will perform at an open air concert at Killarney House and Gardens from 9.00pm to 9.45pm and that will be followed at 10.00pm by an open air screening of the smash hit movie Mamma Mia with the audience invited to singalong to all the favourite ABBA hits.

The gates of Killarney House and Gardens will open from 8.30pm and tickets for the free admission event, which are in huge demand, are available from Eventbrite.

The Independence Day festivities on July 4th will get underway, appropriately, with the traditional raising of the American flag at the town hall with the Mayor of Killarney and the President of Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce presiding at 3.00pm.

The ceremony will be followed by a musical performance by the Three O's who will deliver a string of finger-clicking classics at Kenmare Place

from 3.15pm with all the old favourites from Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole, Dean Martin and Elvis Presley on the playlist.

Main Street, Killarney will take on a distinctive downtown Manhattan vibe all afternoon with the Statue of Liberty and Uncle Sam forming a perfect backdrop and selfie props as patrons can enjoy the atmosphere with an interactive drum show while street entertainers, balloon artists and face painters will be roaming the streets.

The local sheriff has been tipped off to expect an influx of colourful cowboys on the Tuesday afternoon but he expects them to be on their best behaviour as they join in the fabulous Independence Day party.

Brass bands will be performing on the streets from 6.00pm, a lively DJ will get the street party going from 6.45pm and at 7.00pm will be the great highlight of the Killarney's 4th of July celebrations with a big parade winding its way through the streets.



FAMILY LAUNCH THE LILY DALY FOUNDATION IN MEMORY OF A VERY SPECIAL LITTLE GIRL



A family from Ballyhar are about to embark on an emotional journey after the launch of The Lily Daly Foundation www. lilydalyfoundation.ie where they announced their first fundraising event which will take place in September.

Caroline and Mike Daly and their daughter Sarah launched the Lily Daly Foundation at the Killarney Race Course yesterday, June 29th in memory of their beautiful daughter Lily and in aid of two very important charities with Kieran Donaghy on hand to launch the event with the family. The first event will be Lily's Pink Challenge (https://lilydalyfoundation. ie/events/) which involves a majestic 60 km cycle through the Gap of Dunloe, followed by a 10 km run/walk within Killarney National Park. This event takes place on the 16th September 2023, starting and finishing at Killarney Race Course.

All proceeds from this event will go towards;

the Heart Centre in Crumlin Children's Hospital and, the Ronald McDonald house in Dublin, both of which help and support sick children and their families and have a very strong association to the Lily Daly Foundation and the Daly family from Firies.

Lily was born on the 21st of June 2019. When she was 7 weeks old she entered in to a world that became so familiar to both Lily and her parents for the next two years and that was the Heart Centre in CHI Crumlin. Lily had her first open heart surgery at 10 weeks old.

Her parents were told the outcome would be 50/50 but thankfully the surgery was successful, and Lily and her family returned home to Kerry in October 2019. Four weeks later, Lily and her parents were back up to Dublin in a traumatic ambulance blue light

journey supported by a Garda escort. Lily's parents were told the most devasting news that Lily had scar tissue around her heart resulting in a very rare condition known as Pulmonary Vein Stenosis a condition that unfortunately there is no cure.

Lily's parents were devasted and like any parent could not accept this news and did not accept it. Lily refused to give up and in conjunction with support from The New York Presbyterian hospital Lily underwent further Heart surgery that December in Crumlin. The best Christmas present was returning home to Kerry just in time for Santa on Christmas Eve.

Lily and her parents had several more trips to the Heart Centre in Crumlin after this and many overnight stays. It became a familiar and safe place for Lily and her Family. On each long term stay at the hospital Lily's family were fortunate to avail of the services of the Ronald McDonald House which became a Home away from home.

In August 2020 Crumlin advised that they had exhausted all medical options available to them. Thankfully Lily got to travel to New York Presbyterian Hospital in November 2020 and underwent extensive openheart surgery to remove the scar tissue. This was a challenging time for both Lily and her family who were on the other side of the Atlantic away from her sister Sarah back in Kerry and in the height of Covid but all that didn't matter once Lily was recovering. Lily and her parents returned to Ireland just in time for the New Year and had a second visit from Santa that year.

On Friday 26th February 2021 Lily Daly's amazing blue eyes closed for the last time. Her devasted parents vowed to keep her memory "alive" and inform the world of Lily's special character and difficult challenge and also to help other parents and families with sick children.

Lily's mom Caroline added "Some people never meet their heroes but I gave birth to mine. So from this The Lily Daly Foundation was born".

The Lily Daly Foundation is currently at an early stage but the aim is to support families going through similar challenges and journeys Lily and her family went through.

Lily's parents know what it's like to be in the hospital and to hand your child over to the medical team. It's the most traumatic experience a parent can go through and that's why The Lily Daly Foundation was established to assist and support similarly affected families.

The Lily Daly Foundation plan to run events over the next few years to build on the foundation and to support families in hospital with heart related issues. The first of these events will be "Lily's Pink Challenge" where all proceeds raised will be directed to both the Heart Centre in Crumlin Childrens Hospital and Ronald McDonald house two facilities which Lily and her family have a strong association with.

Killarney rises to mid-table position in IBAL summer survey

Killarney has risen seven points in the latest nationwide survey by business group Irish Business Against Litter and is now ranked in 21st place and is considered to be Clean to European Norms. The fact that Killarney received six A grades has been welcomed by the town's Chamber of Tourism and Commerce.

The busy tourist destination has been described as being clean to European norms by the adjudicators and it has increased its overall standing in the league by eight places to 20th position.

Joint Chamber President Johnny McGuire, who is also involved in the town's Tidy Towns campaign, said it was very encouraging and gratifying that a top grade was secured in six of the categories and that the judges were very impressed by the main streets in the town, with both Plunkett Street and Main Street securing an A grade.

"It was wonderful also that Lewis Road, the Maurice O'Donoghue Memorial Park and Riverwalk, the approach road to town from Muckross and the bring facility in the Mission Road car park were all deemed worthy of the top grade," Mr McGuire said.

"Great credit is due to the Killarney Municipal District Council's outdoor crew who are out and about every day to ensure the town is being well kept and thanks also to the volunteers and individual businesses who demonstrate great pride of place and give the town an extra polish," the Chamber President added.

He acknowledged that there were disappointing aspects in the latest IBAL report, some of which were quite surprising, but that it is encouraging to note that the council has plans to upgrade the problematic bin storage area in the Glebe car park which has been highlighted for criticism in the last two litter league reports.

"Keeping the town looking its best is a team effort and everybody has a part to play. The revamped Killarney Looking Good Competition is now up and running again, with great incentives on offer, and there will be

a great focus on that as the summer months progress with the winners to be announced in September," Mr McGuire said.

In the meantime, he has extended an open invitation to anybody willing to get

involved in the Monday night Tidy Towns Meitheal to come forward to help out and he said the more people that make themselves available, the better Killarney will look.

FREE-WHEELING INTO THE RING OF KERRY CHARITY CYCLE ON A PENNY FARTHING

Killarney man, Anto Cronin, will attempt to cycle the 175km for this years Annual Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle on his Penny Farthing in aid of Kerry Mountain Rescue Team.

This isn't Anto's first time taking part in the cycle on the Penny Farthing, as he did it previousy in aid of the Ian O'Connell Fund.

The Killarney Mountain Rescue Team are one of the beneficiaries for this years annual Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle. To date the charity cycle has raised \leq 1.26 million for 34 charities, The Charity Cycle will take place on Saturday 1st July 2023, for its 41st year. With Anto are Kerry Mountain Rescue Team members.

Kerry Mountain Rescue Team are gearing up to raise funds, The voluntary members are highly experienced mountaineers, and provide 24-7-365 'on call' assistance to climbers and walkers in distress on the mountains and upland areas of Kerry and West Cork. The team comprises of 38 volunteers from all walks of life who are available to respond to emergencies in the mountains at any hour of the day or night, and often in the harshest weather conditions. The team is based in Killarney with an area of

operation covering the mountains of the Iveragh, Dingle and peninsulas. Beara Team members train regularly in specialist disciplines rescue such as casualty care, technical ropework for casualty extraction, helicopter winching, search management, navigation, radio communication and 4WD techniques.

Rathmore Children Song and Dance Group staged Children's panto Little Red Riding Hood last March in Rathmore Community Centre.


It involved 42 children aged between 4-11 years old and they performed 2 sold out shows.

Its the talk of the town...

With Anne Lucey

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney



Any one for flower shows?

Minister Heather Humphreys has last week announced one million euro to support 122 summer shows across the country.

The grants from the Department of Rural and Community Development will support show committees in staging their events over the summer season. Five shows in Kerry will get a total of just under 38,000 euro. The Kilgarvan show will receive Euro 8,525.

Minister Humphreys is correct when she says the shows are a key part of life in Ireland with a social as well as serious food side.

'Our Agricultural Shows sum up all that is good about rural Ireland,' she said.

It made me wonder if could try and resurrect the Killarney show. This was held in the grounds of Killarney House where the cattle, sheep and ducks would parade, along with dogs. People would go directly into the town hall ballroom from the green door in the wall of McShain's for the flower show and the cakes. Women brought along their dahlias and sweet peas and apple pies and get them graded with lovely rosettes for the best. Alas, the town hall ballroom was sold off and there is now a road that is essentially a car park, the Mission Road. But the revamped Killarney House itself would be a suitable venue and there is no need to cross the road. Any volunteers?

Kerry for two constituencies?

An Coimisiún Toghcháin The Electoral Commission

I was chuffed to see how veteran political pundit Frank Quilter had the same opinion as myself on the future of Kerry as a constituency in the submission to An Coimisiún Toghcháin, The Electoral Commission.

In a cogent submission, Frank from Ballybunion who is well got in Fine Gael and highly respected in political circles set out his stall for two three-seaters.

He used facts, figures and maps. In short: Kerry North and South physically, economically and historically differ greatly. (Which is what I said myself). Frank put it better illustrating how it took two hours on a good day to drive from Tarbert to Lauragh. **12** | **30**.06.23 In contrast for a TD in the Dublin 5-seater of Dún Laoghaire–Rathdown it takes 20 minutes to get from Dalkey to Kiliney.

'Due to Kerry's physical and geographical location it is well nigh impossible for TDs to serve their constituency to the same level as those in other five seaters,' Frank submitted. The Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce are of the same opinion.'It is Chamber's contention that, going forward, the county of Kerry would be best served by a return to a two three-seat constituency arrangement – Kerry South and Kerry North – as opposed to the single five-seat constituency introduced prior to the 2016 general election

'Key geographical concerns must also be factored in,' they said.

I referred also to the creeping centralisation in the county since 2014 and a growing sense of disenfranchisement in Killarney with the mess made of local government reform. There are submissions too, but not huge

arguments that I can see, to retain Kerry as a single constituency. A five-seater will suit Sinn Fein and the Healy-

Raes, is the thinking politically in Kerry. Two constituencies would make it very difficult for either Sinn Fein or the Healy-Raes to retain two seats. But observers are often wrong about the Healy-Raes!

The Limerick West TD Patrick O'Donovan wants Kerry to remain a five-seater, doubtless so he can shave off a bit of north Kerry into Limerick to suit himself!

The review of constituency recommendations will be presented to the Oireachtas no later than 30 August, 2023

The Dáil currently has 160 TDs. The Oireachtas has asked An Coimisiún to review current arrangements and make a recommendation of between 171 and 181 TDs for the next election. The constituencies are reviewed in line with the Constitutional criteria of 1 TD to represent between 20,000 and 30,000 people.

St Vincent De Paul Killarney seeing unprecedented demand and cost of rent and mortgages root cause

The Killarney St Vincent de Paul conference in Killarney has never seen anything like it: the demand for help from the working poor and the squeezed middle alongside that from an existing cohort of needy clients. Killarney - the area includes Beaufort,

Glenflesk, Muckross, Feries and Barraduff has a long established and highly respected branch of the charity which was founded in Famine times in Ireland.

'We never thought we would see numbers like this. The big problem is the cost of renting,' says Breda Dwyer, Area President of

SVP Killarney recently.

(Housing is being built everywhere but Killarney where not a single affordable house is under construction, a council meeting heard recently. It heard landlords are not keen to enter into HAP and other schemes, and prefer private arrangements).

St Vincent de Paul oversees 25 of its own apartments and are hoping to build another five or six, provided they get funding.

The apartments are for single people and vacancies are filled immediately.

An old respected organisation in Killarney, St Vincent de Paul also runs a shop which is now very busy.

' We are dealing more and more with the working poor,' Breda said.

Some are professional people who have reduced working hours and can't meet the increases in rising electricity and other bills.

Mortgages and their high cost of rental in Killarney are the issues. Pensioners are hit with property tax and insurnace costs.

Solve the housing crisis, and much of the challenges would be met, St Vincent de Paul thinks.

'We never thought we would see such numbers,' Breda said.

Last Christmas Euro 22,000 was given out in food vouchers. Other demands are for education. Killarney has always been a very generous town to St Vincent de Paul but local support is hardly enough anymore.

The RISE Community Fund, supported by National Broadband Ireland (NBI) made a €25,000 donation to the South West Region of the Society of St Vincent de Paul (SVP) in December last year and from this has provided direct financial support to 295 families in the Killarney area in recent months to help alleviate their energy and food costs. Because demand for help with energy, food and education costs was so great that the SVP West Killarney Area Council added €20,000 to the NBI donation to ensure that all requests for help were met. The funds were distributed before the end of February. 14 families received help with oil, 31 families with coal, 50 families with electricity costs, 20 families with gas and 285 were assisted with food hampers, vouchers, and education and transport costs over the period.

JFK REMEMBERED IN KILLARNEY 60 YEARS ON

Historian and collector Brendan O'Sullivan from Fossa has a vast collection of memoriabilia and among them is a book about John F Kennedy's visit to Ireland 60 years ago this year.

The book is an official record of the President of America's visit to Ireland from June 26th to June 29th 1963.

President John F Kennedy made the emotional trip to his ancestral home in Co. Wexford 60 years ago this week, where he was greeted by thousands of people. His wife, Jackie Kennedy was unable to make the trip with him as she was expecting the couple's son Patrick, who sadly died after he was born. Throughout the visit he was greeted by crowds young and old and was greeted in Dublin

by President Eamon de Valera.

At the time of his visit he was just 46 years old and the second generation Irish American was the first Catholic elected President of the United States.

When he was leaving Ireland he promised he was going to come back and see old Shannon again and "as I am taking, as I go back to America all of you with me".

Unfortunately that was not to be and five months after his visit to Ireland, in November 1963, he was assassinated while riding in an open car in Dallas Texas having just served 1,036 days in office.

Brendan, also has a portrait of the couple who were hugely popular both in America and in his homeland of Ireland.

ollowing sampling of water quality which shows elevated levels of bacteria in the water, and further to consultation with the HSE, a prohibition has been placed on bathing and swimming at Ballybunion North and South beaches, with immediate effect.

Signage advising of the prohibition is being placed at the beaches.

Further sampling will be carried out and the prohibition will only be lifted on receipt of improved water quality results.



O'CARROLL To Try Four-Wheeled Hillclimb Racing

Motorcycle racer Anthony O'Carroll is already a hillclimb champion on two wheels. He is now going to try his hand at hillclimb racing on four wheels.

Last September the Ballyduff rider won the West Cork Motorcycle Club annual Hillclimb at Twohig's Hill near Clonakilty.

The Kawasaki ZXR600 rider won the event outright and was also declared King of the Hill after a thrilling day's racing where he faced big competition the 2023 600cc Senior Support Irish

Road Racing Championship winner Keelim Ryan from Offaly.

The event was the last big closed-road motorbike event of the year and given the current insurance crisis was the last 'between the hedge's race to run in the Republic of Ireland.

Next month, Kerry Motor Club and the Ballyfinnane Community Hall Association will celebrate 120 years of closed road motorsport in Kerry with the Brian O'Neill Garden Equipment and Trailers Ballyfinnane Festival of Speed.

Although the organisers did try to include motorcycles in the competitive element of the event, the necessary permissions were not granted.

O'Carroll, who made his rally driving debut at the Banna Beach Resort



Kerry Winter Rally last October, has decided to enter the event anyway. He will drive his father Neilus's Ford Escort G3 in the July 16 hillclimb. The Ballyfinnane event takes place just two days after the Southern 100 Road Races on the Isle of Man.

This is O'Carroll's penultimate preparation event before he tackles the Manx Grand Prix in August but despite his busy schedule, he will put his race bikes on static display during the Festival of Speed.

"I won't even have time to clean them," he said. "They will be on show with all the road grime from the Southern 100. My last race is on Saturday [July 15] and I get into Belfast ferry port around midnight. I will go straight down the road to Kerry, set up the bikes [for display] and jump into the rally car for the day."

COLLEGE IS EXPENSIVE SO APPLY TO SUSI FOR YOUR COLLEGE GRANT BY THE CLOSING DATE OF 6TH JULY



COMMUTE

It's not easy to integrate into college life if you're making a daily return commute from Kerry to Limerick or Cork. But that's the only option facing many students who can't afford to meet the cost of accommodation. Rental accommodation, alone, has increased by 60% in the cities during the past five years, putting most of it beyond the reach of students. With rent spiralling out of control, deserving students, who have studied hard to achieve a college place, struggle to pay for college.

EXPENSIVE

Further and third level education is very expensive. The financial burden is eased a little for students who qualify for a partial or total grant. Even so, many college students have to work part-time or depend on their parents to make ends meet. Thousands of students who are ineligible for funding must come up with about $\leq 12,000$ annually if they are living away from home or about $\leq 5,000$ if living at home. The student contribution also has to be paid. **SUSI**

Student Universal Support Ireland (SUSI) is Ireland's higher and further education grants awarding body. Student grants are divided into maintenance grants and fee grants. Maintenance grants are paid directly to the student's bank account. Fee grants pay tuition fees, the student contribution and the cost of essential field trips. SUSI grants are available at PLC, undergraduate and postgraduate levels. **ELIGIBLE**

To be eligible for funding, your total household reckonable income must fall below specific income thresholds. The SUSI website contains tables outlining the income thresholds and the associated maintenance grant rates for applicants. Income thresholds increase by \notin 4,950 for each additional family member in college. The amount of non-assessed income that a student can earn per annum is \notin 6,552. The gross income threshold for standard grant eligibility is \notin 40,875 and the distance from home to college for the higher grant (non-adjacent) is 30km. About 75,000 students are eligible for some level of standard maintenance grants ranging from \notin 500 to \notin 3,677.

GRANT

The maximum standard non-adjacent maintenance grant payable in the 2023/2024 academic year will be €3,677. For students who live less than 30km from their college, the standard maximum adjacent grant is €1,613. The gross annual income level for grant eligibility is €40,875 (less than four dependent children), €44,810 (between four and seven children) or €48,575 (between eight or more dependent children). There is also a special maintenance grant for applicants whose annual gross income is less than €25,000 (less than four dependent children), €27,400 (between four and seven children) or €29,702 (eight or more dependent children). That payment is now €6,971, non-adjacent and €2,936, adjacent, respectively.

PRIORITY

SUSI is prioritising new grant applications until 6th July. SUSI will process late applications but its best to be on the priority applications list. Submit your online grant application as soon as possible. Applicants are assessed on gross income from all sources in the 2022 financial year. Applications are assessed as either a 'dependent,' 'mature dependent' or 'independent' application. A dependent applicant is assessed on the income of parents or guardians, while an independent applicant is assessed on personal income and that of her/ his partner.

RECKONER

As the grant is means-tested, visit the eligibility reckoner on www.susi.ie. This facility provides potential applicants with an approximate indication of whether or not they are likely to qualify for a grant. However, it's always advisable to submit a grant application. Even if you don't currently qualify, your financial circumstances may change going forward. **REGISTER**

Begin your SUSI grant application by registering for an online account where you can set up your username, password and security pin. Then carefully complete the interactive application form. Once you have submitted a grant application you can follow its progress on the SUSI Online Application Tracker.

FUNDING

Further information on state funding can be found on www.studentfinance.ie. Most of the institutions also offer a range of scholarships for excellence in areas such as academic, sport, creative arts and entrepreneurship. Colleges also operate a Financial Assistance Fund for students experiencing financial difficulty during term. Go to the relevant colleges' websites for further details. Watch out also for local scholarships such as Credit Union Scholarships available to members. If at all possible, avoid taking out a student loan, but if you must then the best rates are available from your local Credit Union.

"Cork City FC have been extremely good to our FFA team and 10 years







IS **GAAGO** A CONFLICT OF INTEREST?

Deputy Danny Healy has raised the issue of GAAGO in the Dail this week with An Taoiseach Leo Varadkar.

"Taoiseach the Kerry senior football team are to play Tyrone on Saturday in the quarter final of the championship, however thousands of supporters in Kerry who have paid their TV licence fee won't be able to watch this match on RTE they will have to pay for GAAGO if they can master the technology and to get through on it. It has been pointed out to me Taoiseach that Dee Forbes the former director general of RTE was also the director of GAAGO and they are saying and asking the question is there or was there a conflict of interest ? and if there are to be new appointments in this regard I am asking that separate people be placed in these and at the same time Taoiseach I am saying that people who pay their RTE TV Licence should be able to watch these matches on RTE".

RAW DEAL BY RTÉ

Rural counties of Ireland are being given a raw deal by RTÉ, when it comes to coverage of our national GAA sports, according to Kerry Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill

"Our National Broadcaster RTÉ, to whom each household pays an annual licence fee, has done a deal with the GAA to show only a limited number of games on television and want to extricate more funds from us to watch our games on a streaming service they themselves have set up. This hits rural communities far away from Dublin, the hardest. The costs involved in attending games is enormous, with travel, accommodation, food and tickets exorbitantly expensive and now they must pay extra to watch online. Online streaming is not an option for many who lack modern day tech skills" stated Councillor Cahill.

"This, at a time when RTÉ is under investigation over the payment of large,

unreported fees to one of its own

broadcasters. The GAA have scheduled all football quarter, semi and final games in the All-Ireland series to be played in Dublin, meaning that only the Dublin supporters do not have to shell out for travel, accommodation etc. The quarter finals at the very least could have been scheduled for regional venues, to reduce the expense for over burdened supporters" said Councillor Cahill.

RTE

"I am calling on the Ministers for Communications and for Sport, to include this breach of trust to the Irish taxpayer in any reviews of the operations of RTÉ now being put in place. Our National Sport belongs on our National Television Service, for which we already pay a licence fee" added Councillor Cahill.





 Negativity often comes from a place of hurt and this is what they then direct outwards.
 If you can, try to observe their behaviour with a sense of neutral observation and detachment. Remember that their feelings belong to them. You are not responsible for how someone else feels.

• If you have to spend time with people who are negative on a daily basis, be mindful of how much time you actually spend with them. Set boundaries and allocate certain amounts of time to be spent with that person and don't exceed it.

• Refuse to be drawn into someone else's drama or negative thinking. Their negative mindset does not belong to you. Refuse to allow it to darken your day and instead, focus on uplifting thoughts. A lovely tip is to quietly say to yourself, "delete and cancel" when listening to someone else's negative thoughts. You can also do this for your own!

DIABETIC RETINOPATHY

Diabetic retinopathy is complication of diabetes. It's caused by high blood sugar levels damaging the back of the eye (retina). It can cause blindness if left undiagnosed and untreated.

The retina needs a constant supply of blood. It receives this through a network of tiny blood vessels. Över time, a high blood sugar level can damage these blood vessels in 3 main stages:

Stage 1: Background retinopathy Tiny bulges develop in the blood vessels. These may bleed slightly but do not usually affect your vision.

Pre-proliferative 2: Stage retinopathy

More severe and widespread changes affect the blood vessels. These include more significant bleeding into the eye.

Stage 3: Proliferative retinopathy Scar tissue and new blood vessels, which are weak and bleed easily, develop on the retina. This can result in some loss of vision.

If a problem with your eyes is picked up early, lifestyle changes and treatment can stop it getting worse

Risk of diabetic retinopathy Anyone with Type 1 or Type 2 diabetes is at risk of developing diabetic retinopathy. You're at a greater risk if you:

 have had diabetes for a long time have a persistently high blood

glucose (blood sugar) level

have high blood pressure

have high cholesterol

• develop a serious illness such as sepsis or pneumonia

 are pregnant are of Asian or Afro-Caribbean

background Reduce your risk of developing diabetic retinopathy or help stop it getting worse. Keep your blood sugar levels, blood pressure and cholesterol levels under control.

Symptoms of diabetic retinopathy You will not usually notice diabetic retinopathy in the early stages. It does not tend to have any obvious symptoms until it's more advanced. Early signs of the condition can be picked up during an eye examination.

Treatments for diabetic retinopathy

Treatment is only necessary if screening detects your vision is at risk.

If the condition has not reached this stage, you should continue to manage your diabetes.

The main treatments for more advanced diabetic retinopathy are: laser treatment

 injections of medication into your eyes

 an operation to remove blood or scar tissue from your eyes

Regular eye examinations and diabetic retinal screening are essential to minimise the risk of diabetic retinopathy.

THE QUEST FOR SAM

At last. People may not like me saying it, but this has been the longest championship I can remember, in the sense that it feels very drawn out. There has been excitement, no guestion about that, but it has been spread fairly thinly overall. This feels like the start of the exciting bit, to be honest. Sixteen teams have somehow, almost miraculously, been whittled down to eight. How many games did that take again? The likes of Louth, Sligo, and a very gallant Westmeath leave with their heads high, but the truth is that they were always almost certain to be leaving. Galway are the only real surprise departees so far to me, and I'd say that Cork are the only surprise package – except that I am less surprised that people might have expected by Cork.

Kerry v Tyrone, Saturday, 3.00pm

Kerry learned their quarter-final opponents last Monday and we got Tyrone. Alright, it's a tough enough draw but it was always more likely than not that would be meeting Northern opposition – they had four teams in eight and the draw was skewed in purely mathematical terms because of the avoidance of repeat pairings. No big deal. I didn't want Dublin at this stage – Dublin haven't really been tested down at the core yet, but they are dismissing decent teams with ease.

Ourselves and Tyrone. There's obviously a certain generational history there. Right from the day Mickey Harte took the helm and changed the way that every team played the game – I may not particularly enjoy watching blanket defense football, and it so happens I really don't – but it maximises a team's collective effectiveness at the expense of skill and flair, and it requires an admirable selflessness from every player. There is a perception up there that working class heroes saw off Kerry's aristocratic arrogance during the 2000s, while there is a

perception among some Kerry supporters that Tyrone are coldly ruthless and have a nasty edge. Both sides are completely wrong, of course, they really are. The likes of Dr. Eamonn O'Sullivan or Mick O'Dwyer or quiet-spoken Maurice Fitzgerald are aristocratic arrogance? Really? But the idea of Tyrone playing dirty football is equally preposterous. Yes, they are tough, and there's nothing wrong with that. Have you ever seen a shrinking violet in a Kerry jersey? Because I haven't. Tyrone is actually a great place to travel to for a game; they really and truly are wonderfully welcoming and genuine people.

No. People may not like it, but the undercurrent of antipathy "puke football" etc. was always born out of respect. Of our last eight championship meetings, it's four wins each. That 2021 semifinal had a background narrative all of it's own, and that one does linger in Kerry. Were we tricked? Should we have refused to put the game back? At the same time, Tyrone also still feel the sting of their failure to even put up a real defence of that All Ireland a year later; that was a little bit mystifying. Arrah, hindsight has great generals.

Not that memories or imagined grudges will matter on the day. What matters next Saturday is which team brings their full A game, and which team has the better A game.

This will be tough. This will be very, very tough. I wouldn't even promise a 'great game' in terms of entertainment value. Both teams – us as well as them – will be out to win. This is not and will not be show business. This will just be business, as in getting it done. It won't be dirty, not a hope – neither team can afford to indulge in that kind of foolishness in terms of winning – but there won't be a single backward step either and no player will come off that field without bruises.

Tyrone bring a massive amount to the table. I don't believe that they have shown their full hand yet, they certainly and correctly weren't going to go all-out to win an Ulster Championship this year and they went within seconds of elimination against Westmeath, but we saw glimpses of real power against Donegal. As I keep saying, I believe that the elongated fixture list in the tightened calendar makes timing your peak the most vital aspect of management this year.

Niall Morgan is a very good keeper, and his accuracy from long range frees is a dangerously effective weapon. I expect both teams to go with a short kick-out strategy

Tyrone, obviously, don't have specialist defenders in the sense of a sweeper role like Tadhg Morley or Jason at full back. On Tyrone's team, everyone defends en masse and they are physically very strong. We have made the mistake previously of having lighter ballcarriers running directly at them, only to be rebuffed by an immobile wall of strong bodies or channeled neatly into cul de sacs. That tactic is meat and drink to them. It's possibly the oldest GAA cliché of them all, but we really so need to let the ball do the work. I expect Pádraig Hampsey to pick up David Clifford and look to break incoming ball, but a one-on-one duel would be anathema to Tyrone. That's just not how they work.

Kennedy and Kilpatrick will be expected to have the edge on midfield. Two big men, strong fielders. No, neither is the guy who scores monster points on the run or the gamewinning goal, but they are just really good at getting the job done. Diarmuid and Jack will need help, and 100% that means that Adrian starts.

I've only ever – and I do mean ever – seen one team win the Sam Maguire without a really outstanding scoring forward, and Cork in 2010 were absolutely deadly with frees, but it was Dublin's Bernard Brogan who became the Footballer of the Year. Tyrone for many years



had Peter the Great, and I am not using that affectionate nickname in any ironic way. That was one of the greatest players in the history of the game. I could be wrong here, but I don't think Ruairí will start. Tyrone will want a targetman to keep Jason Foley's hands full and Mattie Donnelly, one of the most under-rated footballers out there, is the player I expect on the square in the absence of McKenna or McShane. And Darragh might not be quite at that level yet, you would know him instantly for his father's son. Darren McCurry is deadly as well – I expect Tom O'Sullivan to pick him up and that to be an enthralling duel.

At the other end Seán O'Shea had the proverbial stormer in the inside line against Louth, but I think he will be on the forty for us. Dara Moynihan and Adrian Spillane would seem to be obvious choices, and Paudie Clifford as a tenacious linkman is unquestionable. The other jersey is up for grabs. Too soon surely for Killian and I'd expect Stephen O'Brien off the bench rather than starting. It looks a straight choice between Tony Brosnan and Paul Geaney.

At the back Mike Breen is a very real starting option, and a fully fit Brian Ó Beaglaíoch would be a big plus, his strength and pace would be a great asset for a contest in which sheer running is going to be paramount.

The bottom line is that I fancy Kerry to see this one out. I know that Tyrone didn't break any hyuge sweat in seeing off Donegal (that may be ominous in itself; Donegal were not the force of old but Tyrone were worryingly comfortable) but that two week's rest was a massive plus for Kerry. If we are ending up celebrating a win next Saturday, I hope ye will all have the decency to raise a toast to our near neighbours; they did us a colossal favour against Mayo.

Dublin v Mayo

Like Kerry and Tyrone, this one comes wrapped up in a big dollop of history. Mayo have been the form team pretty much all year, League champions etc. And that hammering – and the scoreboard did not reflect their superiority on the day – of Kerry rang like a bell, and not just in this county. Dublin have been quieter in a sense. Apart from them, Leinster has not been strong in quite a while and it very much looked like Dublin could afford to win it without ever really blowing petrol through the engine. They were in cruise control. The truth is that Dublin are proven quality, but haven't needed to prove it so far.

I admire Mayo, always have. They have suffered more from immigration than the majority of counties and have knocked so hard on that door, and somehow they always find the resilience to come again. I had Galway as favourites last weekend. In fact, I thought Galway would have quite a bit to spare. I know that wind was a factor and there were a few unseemly incidents, but Mayo managed their game plan very well. But again, that sheer amount of effort at this kind of elite sporting level does take it's toll, and I think Dublin will have the deeper tank when it's in the lungsearing last ten minutes.

Derry v Cork

I honestly expected Cork to be facing Kerry this year and I honestly expected that to be a tougher battle than most Kerry supporters were expecting. The likes of Powter, Sherlock, and Hurley would walk onto any team and I have always rated Cleary as a manager. Frankly, I would have appointed him well before they did and I know for a fact that a fair few Cork supporters felt that it was administrative politics rather than merit that saw him overlooked previously.

Then Cork lost to Clare. Not in any surprise 'underdog' story. Cork were well outplayed in that one – granted, two of their top scorers were absent through injury, but that was a real lesson.

Cork took it on board. While Kerry were still reeling from that Mayo defeat in the Fitzgerald Stadium, Cork were building slowly, and sure enough they gave us a real fright in the second group game. They started slow but were definitely the better team in the last twenty minutes, they could easily have taken two goals. Cork do need to start Sherlock.

Derry's rise is no surprise. Most of us saw the lads like McGuigan and Glass coming along because of the intersection of their paths with both the Kerry minors and the Sem in the Hogan. They have gone on to fulfil that early promise. They will start as favourites, but have had a bit of luck along the way in surviving a few scares. I actually think Cork can pull off an upset here.

Armagh v Monaghan

Armagh have very good footballers, but they always seem to make very hard work out of games that they could and probably should be winning easier. Rian O'Neill is an outstanding footballer, but deploying him in midfield is just....l don't know. Imagine if we put David Clifford back in midfield, what Kerry supporters would be saying? It's not a nice thing to say, but it looks to me like Armagh are more afraid of losing a game than ambitious to go out and win it. They do have the desire, in fact they bring a fierce intensity, but too often it results in unnecessary and costly indiscipline. I'm not saying that they are always sinning and never sinned against, but I am saying that there are simply too many games involving them that end up with incidents.

Monaghan are a very solid side. Respectfully, I don't really think they are up among the top contenders this year, but Monaghan were a very hard challenge back in the days when Ulster football was not a huge force. Conor McManus has been hampered by injury so far this year but he is who he is - and I mean he belongs in sentences that include names like Peter Canavan, Oisín McConville, Michael Murphy. Monaghan was never a one man show, of course, but there were times that it felt like it. And other footballers have been stepping up to the Monaghan rockface too. Darren Hughes, Dessie Ward, Conor McCarthy, Ryan McAnespie, Jack McCarron.....these are very serious players. Armagh will be expected to shade this game and with very little to spare, but Monaghan make very few errors and do punish any of yours. I really expect this game to go all the way down to the wire and it could well be decided with the last kick.

Ah well. The end of the road arrived up in Tullamore, and Kerry can't really have any complaints. I don't think either team played to their best on the day (absolutely no lack of heart or effort). If we wanted to scramble around for excuses - and I don't indulge in that nonsensical self-pity - we can certainly say that Monaghan's goal was extremely luck, to say the least. But at the top level, I do not believe that games hinge on one moment of good or bad luck - a team can't control any one instant but they can control the rolling narrative of a game. It's true that Monaghan only got three points from play, and it is very true that it should never be enough to win a football game. But it was enough, because we only scored 0-11, and 0-11 in total shouldn't be winning any All Ireland semi-final. I also reject any notion, and the suggestion has arisen, that Monaghan had an unfair advantage because their seniors were playing afterwards in the double header. That's something I support and encourage. I want, actively want, these young players to have supportive and excited crowds cheering them on and I want people getting to see both their senior and minor teams live as much as possible. The game lives and breathes in the turnstiles, not the televisions and not the money tills. And aside from that, there was actually great Kerry support in Tullamore.

We played fine. In fact, I would honestly say that Kerry probably had the better football overall. But Monaghan were simply more efficient and did a really good job moving such that they were steering the game towards their own strengths. That's a real art form in itself, and to be honest one that usually can take me up to forty minutes to decipher in play.

They drew first blood through Seán Óg McElwain, one of their best players. Paddy Lane was already being shielded by a very deep 'corner forward' as well as his own marker. That can't have been a huge surprise, given his scoring exploits so far, but Kerry's main dangerman always struggled to escape the double shackle. He did manage to create space for Paudie Fitzgerald, though, who swept over a confident left leg score. Max McGinnity slotted a free - Monaghan were getting on top in midfield (again, a problem we never quite overcame) and getting space to run directly at Kerry. Oisín Healy replied with a well-taken mark before Daniel Kirby boomed over a monster free - his dad was always good for a score from midfield as well. McGinnity added another free before Seán Óg McElwain was deemed to have won another one and converted. The referee, respectfully, made a few decisions I didn't agree with (on both sides), and that was one of them. Paddy Lane levelled matters with a free before Monaghan's number six (he actually played in midfield, really, with players dropping back into the space) ran forward for a great score.

Paddy Lane kicked three in the trot, 2f, as Kerry kicked up a gear. That put us up two points and I was quite happy with it. Monaghan probably deserved to have had that lead in terms of possession and play, and this Kerry team have saved their best displays for the second half of matches.

Only then it all went wrong. A free out around the middle for Monaghan – I didn't keep count, but Monaghan played for frees and we fell for it too often. This one looked innocuous enough as James Hoare rose out of goal to gather..... and it slipped out of his hands and a late lunge by a defender couldn't stop it slipping into the net. I'll get three Hail Marys and and Our Father minimum for the words I said; it could be a full decade of the rosary.

Half-time Mayo 1-5 Monaghan 0-8

It's not that the goal knocked the stuffing out of us. We just couldn't seem to find top gear and Monaghan always had that bit of a gap. Monaghan slotted the first two points of the second half to put five between us, and I still wasn't unduly worried. Obviously, in hindsight I should have been.

Ben Murphy began making his trademark drives forward and found Stephen Gannon for a good score. Tomás Kennedy kicked a nice point off his left. But Monaghan were picking off their scores too, McElwain making it 1-10 to 0-10.

Kerry dominated the last ten minutes and drive forward repeatedly. But there was grit in our mechanism. With Paddy Lane getting bottled up and not getting enough options available, the clock was beginning to kick louder. Paddy did make one great catch and jink to send a stinger at the goalmouth, but the keeper stopped it, and he was denied subsequently by a diving block. There were some half-hearted calls for a Kerry penalty....yerra, the wish is not always father to the thought and the referee quite rightly didn't even pretend to raise an eyebrow at that one. All of that late dominance translated into just one point, a free from Paddy, on the scoreboard, and Monaghan did as much with a McElwain kick on the scoreboard to put a goal between them again.

No shame in it, far from it. The Kerry minors were never expected to get past Cork this year and you could see their football develop as the team progressed through their games. Another loss, but this one was a lot more encouraging that previous ones as Kerry definitely deserved something. Kerry coughed up a goal after just three minutes and, really worryingly, it was a Kerry mistake as we got intercepted in possession too easily. Cracking finish, though. To be honest, I had visions of getting an almighty thumping at that point as an enervated Bray would now go on to destroy a deflated Kerry.

Bray did try to do exactly that. Except that Kerry remained perfectly calm and focussed. No shouting at each other and pointing fingers. No retreating into a defensive shell. They were always happy to get their foot on the ball and pick their pass. No hoofing - safety first is grand as a general maxim, but hoofing it is a sign that a player doesn't have any better idea and you won't get away with that at this level. Kerry's goal is a perfect example. Good header on by Ryan Kelliher and Seán McGrath's pass was perfectly measured, hooking it beautifully over the defender. It's one thing to have the ability to kick that, it's another to have the selfbelief to know that you can do it. The fact that Gaxha was ready for exactly that says a bit as well; management are obviously encouraging this kind of play. Leo slotted home smoothly and Kerry were level. In fact, we were level until seconds from the half-time whistle, when Ben Feeney fired home the second, curling it beautifully. To be fair, Bray had somehow managed to get offside with a tap-in goal on hand and they had also hit the post, so we can't claim that it was against the run of play at all. Bray went 3-1 up ten minutes into the second half....well, look, there has been a fair amount of criticism of some of the refereeing in the LOI this year (Damien Duff wears his heart on his sleeve, but after every single game? Ah, c'mon, lad). A lot of Kerry supporters were and still are adamant that it was offside. Except that it is there on video, plain as day, and the Bray lad timed his run perfectly.

And still the abiding memory is Kerry's courage in the face of adversity, because yet again they came back, showing a really likeable defiance. They really are growing in confidence. Not there yet, but an awful lot closer to the standard of team they need to be than they were when they started. Kennedy Amechi was blocked when he tried to punish the Bray keeper for straying too far off his line, but again the audacity in trying it is a good sign. Late on – too late, unfortunately, to make a material difference to the outcome – Cian Barrett sent in a lovely free and Cian Brosnan applied a great finish from close range to leave just a goal in it.






