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
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FROM THE EDITOR

"The Liebherr Story" was officially launched at the Europe Hotel & Resort, attracting a crowd of over 250 attendees. The importance of the Liebherr container crane factory, and the Liebherr hotels to the people of Killarney, Kerry and beyond was clear to see with a mix of former and current employees, suppliers, TDs, councillors members of the public and members of the Liebherr family helping to launch Tom Foley's wonderful new book.

Following a warm welcome from Gerry Bunyan, MD-Sales at Liebherr Container Cranes Ltd, Mary Buckley, Interim CEO of the Industrial Development Authority (IDA Ireland) and Moira Murrell, Chief Executive of Kerry County Council spoke at length about the role both organisations played and continue to play in the long history of Liebherr in Ireland. Finally, we heard from the author, Tom Foley, who reminisced about his time at Liebherr, about the people he worked with, and the many stories he collected as he wrote The Liebherr Story. His engaging style, humour and lively anecdotes ensured that the audience were spellbound.as he spoke. Tom had a few prescient words about the delegation that served to illustrate the importance of their initiative in tracking down Hans Liebherr. The repercussions of that single act are still felt today, almost 70 years later.

"Were it not for their intervention, somebody else, in some other hotel, in some other town, perhaps, even in some other country, would be standing here this evening, launching The Liebherr Story"

Liebherr's presence in Killarney and its importance to the people of Kerry and beyond, is generational and the opportunity and affluence that accompanied Liebherr's arrival is keenly felt to this day.

HOUSE PRICES RISE IN KERRY

"he average price of a second-hand, three-bed semi ∶ in Kerry rose by 2.6% in the first three months of the year, according to the latest national survey by Real Estate Alliance.

The average cost of three-bed homes in the county is now €300,000, up from €292,500 in December 2022, the Q1 REA Average House Price Index shows.

By concentrating on the actual sale price of three-bed semis, the survey provides an up-to-date picture of the second-hand property market in towns and cities countrywide.

Across Kerry, first-time buyers made up 40% of the market during Q1 with 15% coming from buyers moving

The average time taken to complete a sale in the county is now seven weeks, down one week from an average of eight in the previous quarter, the survey shows.

In Killarney, the average price for a three-bed semi is now €360,000, up 2.27% from an average of €350,000 in the previous quarter, while the time to sell has fallen by one week to seven over the same period.

"There has been very little property for sale during this quarter. With no new houses under construction, the number of houses for sale is at its lowest level ever," said Donal Culloty of REA Coyne and Culloty, in Killarney.

€270,000 IN FUNDING ANNOUNCED FOR KERRY HISTORIC PROJECTS

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D Norma Foley welcomes confirmation of the allocation of €270,500, in funding for three Kerry historic sites through the Historic Structure Fund (HSF).

TOURISM BOUNCES BACK

With business already ahead of 2019, meeting demand for hotel rooms and activity slots is the big challenge, according to participants at the highly successful Meitheal trade show.

Despite the rain and the cloud, significant business - millions of euro worth - was done for 2024 as well as 2023 at the classy event in the INEC.

Pre-booked ten minute consultations with 450 lrish businesses all smartly set out on white tables, had waiting lists for the hundreds of interested buyers, a system local Failte Ireland rep correctly likened to 'speed dating' at the three-day event.

And it was a very smart system and an apt comparison: ten minute slots were closely monitored and announced from the centre stage as buyer and seller got down to business immediately.

A few trends are worth noting from my visit on Wednesday morning:

Representatives from the UK were thinner than usual on the ground - but the USA and Canada are strong this year while the United Arab Emirates, Dubai and the Far East too are surprisingly strong, according to those spoke to.

'The Germans are back in force too,' according to Ray Sinnott the estate manager of Congreve House in Waterford.

Congreve House is a model business for the future. A late 18th century historic house and gardens, and restaurant, and managed by a trust, its 70 acres of pleasure includes accessible gardens and also a large vegetable and fruit garden to supply its restaurant.

And this kind of 'sustainability' and farm to fork activity makes it a sell - especially for continentals as well as the moreexotic and middle eastern market, Ray told me.

They are also developing old lodges to cater to the ultra luxury overnight stay market.

These are two ideas we might take away for Muckross and or Killarney House, I said to myself: Pleasure gardens are no longer

enough - we must return to the days of growing tomatoes and veg in the historic houses and maybe rent out a gate lodge or two!

Some 66 buyers from Global inbounds selling the UK and Ireland to China, India and Japan were in Killarney for the trade show.

And apparently, these more exotic markets cannot get enough of Ireland.

A barometer of trends as well as trade, the Meitheal is reflecting the strong US dollar and also the post Covid trend for outdoor activities. Agents for continental Europeansare seeking the soft rain of Irish summers to escape July and August temperatures, I was told.

There is big demand is for the outdoors and family and small group activity.

Golf is back with a bang and demand for 'hidden courses' in Donegal and Sligo and Mayo and the northwest is unprecedented alongside the champion and better known links courses of Kerry and the east.

There was much praise for the direct private flights for the weekends into Kerry Airport and the helicopter service down to Hogs Head.

General flight access was back to 2019 levels but more flights into Shannon was needed.

Demand for accommodation is strong everyone told me. "The challenge we have is offering availability to clients, new and existing," Brian Miley, group business development manager with the Gleneagle Hotel Group said. As well as the Gleneagle in Killarney, the Maritime in Bantry in West Cork is part of the group.

Killarney as a complete destination was in strong demand by the international agents and there was 'displacement' particularly with tour business being turned away because of the high numbers of refugees in three star hotels in the town, it was acknowledged.

"Tours want Killarney. Putting them in other locations is not an option," one seller observed. Paul Mockler of Failte Ireland said those at the fair were mainly seeking four and five star accommodation across the island and this demand was being met, so far. There are 'challenges' both this year and next in meeting accommodation demand because of the number of hotel rooms now occupied by refugees, but tourism was 'a creative and resilient industry', he also said.

KILLARNEY LOCKS HORNS WITH THE BEST OF BRITAIN ON WILD ISLES

Sir David Attenborough's Wild Isles showed some extraordinary footage of the Killarney Red Deer. It was simply stunning. My one disappointment was that the episode from



Killarney was so short. But it was quality rather than quantity. The few minutes of footage easily outshone the rest of the hour-long programme, in my unbiased view.

I hope the BBC will release permission to use the clips as promotional material for Killarney. Even stills would be great.

Now, while the landscape and everything was superb, I am back to my old Sir David complaint: the lack of a pat on the back for man. The deer in Killarney would be extinct only for the efforts of local men and women. Yes, humans, particularly landlords and the upper crust hunting parties from the UK, were the cause of the deer's decline. But some acknowledgement must be given for the extraordinary protective nets thrown around the 6,000 year old deer over the last 50 years by the two legged local species.

SPRING IS BEGINNING, THANKFULLY

We have had a tough old winter in Killarney and there has been only a rare blue sky since October. Last week we all shared in the unexpected grief of much loved local families and there was such a blanket



of sadness and fellow feeling across the whole area, it will not lift for some time.

But spring is slowly arriving, all by itself and undisturbed. The catkins have given way to green leaves and rarely has there been seen such remarkable Magnolia displays on that tree on the Muckross Road. The cherry is starting to come out. The town is all yellow and full marks to the daffodil bulb planters of Kerry County Council and to the yellow tulip planters at Muckross.

I have been caught up too in the frenzy of the Kerry baby story - dragged into it yet again, as it is dragged up again is my honest feeling about the whole thing. The past is a foreign country, is my strong view and this is especially so when it comes to the inexplicable. Most people, and particularly women, even those much younger than myself, want to move on from that traumatic story and that awful dark period enveloping it. What is to be gained now by raking back ten decades and dragging us back into something that is difficult to understand even for those of us who lived through the 1980s in Kerry? 1983, 1984 and 1985 - the circus that was the 8th amendment, what followed it, and the Kerry Babies tribunal - is thankfully an alien world to a lot of us now and we would rather not remember it. While some quarters are adamant about justice and penalties, and righting wrongs, nature this time of year reminds us of another, maybe a softer kind of justice at work . It tells us the purpose of the passage of time can be healing, and sometimes, just sometimes, things may be better left alone and undisturbed.




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APPLICATIONS FOR CAO COLLEGES BECOMING MORE REGIONALISED



ESTABLISHED

During the last few years, the establishment of new Universities has gathered pace. Third level education has evolved during the past fifty years since students had only a choice between Trinity College Dublin (TCD) and the National University of Ireland (NUI) which had three main constituent colleges UCC, UCD and UCG as well as the clerical University in Maynooth. UCG is now called University of Galway while Maynooth, which is now a rapidly expanding lay college, is called Maynooth University (MU). **DOMINANT**

National Institutes of Higher Education (NIHE) were established in Limerick and Dublin and were later upgraded to University of Limerick (UL) and Dublin City University (DCU), respectively. These seven universities dominated the third level scene offering mainly Honours Bachelor Degrees at Level Eight on the current National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) to undergraduate applicants.

REGIONAL

Regional Technical Colleges (RTC) were built around the country from the 1970's to make a variety of third level and training courses available locally. The RTC's were gradually upgraded to Institutes of Technology (IT) status as their portfolio of courses continued to expand. These colleges provided entry to third level at Higher Certificate (Level Six) and Ordinary Bachelor Degree (Level Seven) levels as well as Honours Bachelor Degrees (Level Eight). The Minister for Higher Education has promoted a policy to upgrade the ITs to Technological University status and that transition has gained momentum over the past few years.

TECHNOLOGICAL

Dublin Institute of Technology (DIT) quickly became Technological University Dublin (TUD). Cork Institute of Technology (CIT) and Institute of Technology Tralee (ITT) amalgamated to become Munster Technology University (MTU), with main campi in Cork and Tralee. Athlone Institute of Technology (AIT) and Limerick Institute of Technology (LIT) came together as Technological University of the Shannon (TUS) with main campi in Athlone and Limerick. South East Technological University (SETU) is made up of the former ITs in Carlow and Waterford. Three former ITs along the Atlantic seaboard, GMIT, LYIT and ITS have been upgraded to Atlantic Technological University (ATU) with main campi in Galway, Letterkenny and Sligo. Dundalk Institute of Technology (DKIT) is still ploughing a lone furrow but its only a matter of time before it gains full University status either on its own or with one of the newly established Technological Universities.

BOOST

University status has given the technological sector a huge status boost and has been one of the reasons why the number of CAO applicants to technological universities has risen this year. Preliminary March figures released by the CAO indicate that college applicants are applying to technological colleges in greater numbers than ever before. As the new technological universities have recorded a bump in application numbers, some traditional universities have suffered a slight decline in applications.

COST

The huge increase in the cost of attending college in urban areas has caused many applicants to set their sights on the local technological universities which continue to expand their portfolio of courses. What's very evident from the CAO statistics is that a growing number of applicants are not even applying for courses that they would like to do because they simply cannot afford to. CAO applicants are applying for courses that are closer to their homes and the new technological universities are benefitting as a result.

LEVELS

The other huge attraction is that the technological universities are offering a Higher Certificate after two years and an Ordinary Bachelor Degree after three years to students who do not wish to progress further. The 'Big Seven' Universities offer only Honours Degrees, with a few course exceptions, at the end of the duration of the course. The risk attached to entering an Honours Degree course is dropping out before completion without a qualification on the NFQ. The new technological universities are offering a get out option at Higher Certificate Level 6 and Ordinary Degree Level 7. It's unlikely that the other Universities will go down that road.

NEW COURSES

The traditional universities are bursting at the seems with numbers and while they may have experienced a slight decline in applications this year, they still have the blue riband courses and the reputation for teaching excellence and research that will sustain them into the future. The obvious next step is to regionalise new course development in the new technological universities rather than allowing the Big Seven to have a monopoly of highly sought after

The rare and native bred is distinguished its black colour, grazing outdoors in all seasons and is extremely hardy. The newborn calf can expect a long and peaceful life grazing in the National Park - the half moon close to Torc Waterfall is a popular grazing field.

Kerry cattle are a rare breed of dairy cattle - native to Kerry, descended from the Celtic Shorthorn, brought to Ireland as early as 2000 BC considered one of the oldest breeds in Europe, known for their milk quality and gentle nature.

Killarney National Park recognises

the importance of conserving the historic Muckross Herd. Former owners of Muckross Estate, Arthur Rose Vincent, were passionate about the Kerry. Today, the rare bred are cared and managed by chief Herdsman, Mike Fleming, particularity for preservation and agricultural heritage. UNDER INSURANCE, CUSTOMER SURVEY FINDINGS.

JOHN HEALY FROM HEALY INSURANCE ON WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT UNDER INSURANCE

Home owners may have received a letter recently from their Insurer regarding "under insurance". The Central Bank of Ireland has instructed insurers to

contact all home owners to highlight this critical issue. As an Insurance Broker we have been highlighting this matter for a number of years to our customers as the cost of building has been increasing steadily since before the pandemic. Last year Zurich Insurance carried out a survey of over 1,000 Irish consumers. Its key findings

According to the research, 51% of homeowners surveyed are correctly insuring their properties, while over 1/3 of homeowners (36%) are incorrectly insuring their properties by

basing their calculation on their homes' market value as opposed to its rebuild cost. An insurance valuation refers to the 'building sums insured', which is the full cost of rebuilding a property including the cost of site clearance and architects' fees. This should not be confused with the market value.

A further 36% of people who took out a home insurance policy did not take any action to calculate their buildings sums insured, i.e., the rebuild cost of their home. However, one in four people used the rebuild cost calculator operated by the Society of Chartered Surveyors Ireland or another reputable operator, while 15% of homeowners organised a bespoke rebuild valuation through a building's surveyor.

Meanwhile, over a quarter (26%) of homeowners have reviewed the cost involved in rebuilding their home within the last year, 20% reviewed

two years ago while a similar figure (19%) have left it three years or more. Almost 1/5 of homeowners (18%) have never reviewed the cost to rebuild their home or can't remember doing so. High and rising inflationary costs across the construction sector mean homeowners should be reviewing their rebuild cost annually when renewing their policy to avoid the possibility of homes being underinsured

I would recommend that you review your reinstatement sum insured sooner rather than later and continue to review during the year. In order to get a definitive individual reinstatement value on your house you should contact an independent qualified surveyor.


Laura Brennan was just 25 years old when she was diagnosed with terminal cervical cancer. She died 18 months later but during those months, she made an incredible impact through her work as a HPV vaccine campaigner. With Laura's help, HPV vaccine uptake in Ireland increased to 80%. The catch-up programme gives people who were eligible, but may have missed out on the vaccine in school, a chance to get this safe and effective vaccine.

The Laura Brennan HPV Vaccination Catch-Up Programme is open to:

- Females who have completed second-level school and are 24 years of age or younger;
- · Females in 2nd to 6th year of secondary school; and
- Males in 2nd to 4th year of secondary school (or 5th year if they have skipped transition year this school year).

Community Registered General Nurse for School Vaccinations with the HSE South Lee team, Dallas Brennan, said: "The most common cancer caused by the HPV virus is cervical cancer in females. However, the HPV virus can cause other cancers and conditions that can affect males, so I would encourage all those who are eligible to make an appointment. It's a single dose and a very safe vaccine."

The HPV vaccine will be delivered by HSE vaccinators only and is available free of charge through HSE vaccination clinics and schools. The 1st year school immunisation programme will continue as normal throughout 2023. The National Immunisation Advisory Committee has recently advised that only one dose of HPV vaccine is required in those aged under 25. Most people will only need one dose of HPV vaccine. However, anyone with a weak immune system will require three doses.

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

WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash

Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

It is extremely important that you take your time and have all the options explained to you in plain simple English and that you understand all your options clearly before you make your final decision. As well as the above there is much more to be discussed about your pension. You should discuss your retirement options with a financial advisor who has access to a number of different pension providers before making any decisions, he or she will help you with the above options and any other queries you may have.





WHAT IS MEIBOMIAN GLAND **DYSFUNCTION (MGD)?**

made up of three layers - an oily (lipid) layer, a watery (aqueous) layer, and a sticky (mucous) layer. MGD is when the glands that make the oily layer of the tears are not working properly and this allows the watery layer of the tears to dry out. The Meibomian glands are inside the eyelids, and the openings are on the edge of the eyelids. The outer oily layer stops the watery layer of the tears from drying out. When the glands become blocked, the oily part of the tears cannot be released. This causes the watery tears to dry up more quickly which results in the eye becoming dry and can make it feel sore. It is not usually a serious condition, but can cause discomfort and sometimes blurry vision. If it is not treated, the glands may stop

The normal tears of the eye are :

working permanently. MGD can cause dry eye. It is common to have a combination of MGD, dry eye and blepharitis.

Risk factors

MGD is a common condition and can affect anyone. However, it is more likely to happen after the age of 50, if you have diabetes or oily skin conditions and it is also more common in women.

The eyelids can become sore and

swollen as the glands become blocked. As the eyes become dry, they can feel itchy or gritty, as if there's something in the eye. The eyes may be red, and if they're sore, may be watery, which can cause vision to become blurry.

TREATMENT

Treatment involves releasing the oily tears from the glands using hot compresses. You need to get a face cloth, or cotton pads, soak them in hot (not boiling) water, close your eyes, and hold the hot cloth onto your eyelids. Wet the cloth again with hot water and keep applying the compress for at least five minutes. Repeat every day until the condition gets better. You can also use products known as 'heat bags' that are specifically designed for this condition. These bags make it easier to direct the heat and are much more effective than a hot cloth. To help stop the glands from blocking up again continue the treatment every day for a few minutes. Massaging your eyelids can also help to release tears.

If the hot compresses or heat bags don't work, referral for further treatment may be required.







KERRY FALL TO GALWAY National League:

Galway 1-13 Kerry 0-14

It was a bit of a strange one. It almost had the feeling of an anticlimax. Going into this game, Kerry could still mathematically qualify for a League Final or be relegated, but the smart money was on neither, and so it proved, with Kerry finishing the day safely in the no man's land of mid table. Grand, with our late start back to a full training regime and the amount of players rested or recovering during the campaign, safety suits me just fine. I don't want Kerry in Division two. I want Kerry players, especially new players to this level, coming into Division One football; I just think it gives a better base for later.

Kerry and Galway. Always a classic. Two teams with a long established reputation for playing open, fearless football. Catch and kick purists with a fantastic history, and honours close enough to even throughout that history. Walk into any GAA bar in either county, or most bars outside them, and ask whether Mick O'Connell or Seán Purcell was the better footballer. Then sit back and relax – that discussion will run for a while.

A repeat of last year's final, and that was a cracker of a game. David Clifford versus Shane Walsh, scoring giants of the modern game. Comer and Geaney waiting in the wings on either side, and I believe the inherent danger of both is underestimated. This game had all the ingredients of a thriller.

It didn't happen. I won't say that it was a damp squib; that would be an injustice to the honest efforts of both sides, but it felt more like an exercise in intellect rather than ardour.

Johnny Heaney and Shane Walsh opened Galway's account very quickly. It felt a little bit too easy to me. Gavin White has returned from his enforced break in flying form, and he teed up Tom O'Sullivan for our opening score. Ruairí Murphy looked lively on his first real start and he floated in a dangerous ball in the direction of David Clifford, but keeper Bernard Power was out well to deal. John Maher put Galway 0-3 to 0-1 up - Galway in recent years have somehow been able to unearth these big, rangy midfielders out of nowhere, and they all seem to know where the posts are. Maher was outstanding here. Mind you, Barry Dan O'Sullivan replied with a fine point of his own. Barry Dan has really played himself into contention during this campaign, but I will say that the absence of Adrian Spillane's work-rate and clean aggression has been very noticeable in a Kerry midfield that has been industrious but unexceptional. We don't have a fear laidir to replace David Moran; that's not a natural role for Diarmuid O'Connor either, fine footballer though he is.

Matthew Tierney, Mr. Consistency himself, and

Shane Walsh with a free had Galway ahead by 0-5 to 0-2. Kerry were stuttering a bit up front. Both sides were defending in big numbers – catch and kick purism became an endangered species 30 years ago and I think we can now declare it extinct – but Galway had greater range to their firepower. Kerry were trying to thread it in close and getting turned over. Part of that was a clear over-reliance on David Clifford. The big man had an off day, but why Kerry kept hitting ball into a man being double-teamed at minimum remains a sorrowful mystery to me. We were the architect of our own misfortune too often.

Shane Murphy did very well to smother a good chance for Tierney, but Tomo Culhane popped over the rebound. Paudie Clifford was doing most of his work in the Kerry half of the field, tackling ferociously and driving forward at speed, and he clipped over a nice point with his left leg. Tom O'Sullivan cut the gap to two points. Paudie, Tom, and Gavin White were probably Kerry's most effective players overall, with all three playing similar roles running from deep. John Maher and Barry Dan O'Sullivan swapped scores – Barry Dan's was arguably the best point so far.

0-7 to 0-5. My assessment was that Galway were outplaying us but not pulling away. Workrate was keeping us in the game, but we were capable of much better. I kind of fancied us to lift the tempo a bit in the second half, especially with the fresh options on the bench. I'd have actually been inclined to take David Clifford off and look to open different avenues of attack – David looked a bit tired to me and Galway were focussing on keeping a tight leash on him – I'd have liked to see us test them with different

options.

Then disaster struck, or at least a mishap. It wasn't a good goal, far from it. A high and hopeful punt by Paul Conroy into our goal, and it just fell awkwardly for Shane Murphy as he collided with the post, dropping into the net. Almost an exact replica of the goal that Shane Ryan conceded against Tyrone. Not a big deal to me, certainly not a major mistake. That kind of thing can happen; it's your response to it that counts, and Shane went on to have a fine game. Uncontested kick-outs aren't a real barometer for championship, but he made two very good saves along the way.

Kerry responded well to that goal, Gavin White once more breaking the line and pointing himself before Donal Down O'Sullivan won a free converted by a relatively subdued by hardworking Seán O'Shea.

Half-time Galway 1-7 Kerry 0-7

Barry Dan had picked up a knock in the first half and his return to play was brief before being replaced by Dara Moynihan. Dara has had an outstanding League, and once again here he brought a refreshing directness. Galway had the first attack of the second half but once again Paudie Clifford snuffed it out and Dara Moynihan won a free converted by Seán O'Shea. That seemed to give the Kenmare man confidence as he profited from a great Jack Barry catch to point from play. Just one point in it now, and Kerry looking the hungrier side. Cathal Sweeney fisted over a Galway point he could maybe have gone for the green flag. Damien Comer was on by now, and he used his prodigious strength to force an opening and slot over. 1-9 to 0-9.

Gavin White teed up Paudie Clifford for a goal







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chance, but it was well blocked. Seán O'Shea put over the '45, making that difficult art look very easy. Dara Moynihan was fouled as he burst through on goal, with O'Shea duly punishing. Shane Walsh, locked in a hard battle at full forward with Jason Foley (I'm surprised Galway didn't bring Walsh out and give him space to operate; we all know what he's capable of) pointed two frees, sandwiching a free from David Clifford. Good work by Seán Kelly saw Galway sub Rob Finnerty kick an absolute beauty to put a goal between the teams again. Walsh made it four with a free – the truth is that Seán O'Shea could well have seen a black card for that one.

Paudie Clifford kicked a Kerry point to put just a goal between them and Kerry went looking for exactly that. Seán O'Shea almost got in, but was well blocked, and the '45 was scant enough consolation. I'd be happy enough with Kerry after the National League. Remember, we have a month now to recuperate and tighten up. The training week in Portugal will do a lot; it always does. Teams have learnt that drawing Tadhg Morley into a man-marking role opens our defensive shield; I'm sure Paddy Tally will be looking at that. Midfield is a bit of a problem area, despite the emergence of Barry Dan. I think we are slightly too reliant on Seán O'Shea and David Clifford for scoring threats. That injury to an impressive Darragh Roche came at a bad time. Donal Down has definitely shown that he's an option, but I'm hoping that Paul Geaney will show his County Championship form. We absolutely need Adrian Spillane on one wing to bolster midfield and we need Paudie Clifford's industry. That's four fairly automatic selections up front, with just two jerseys up for grabs between Geaney, O'Brien, Spillane (Killian), Roche, O'Sullivan, Moynihan, Burns, Murphy.....

I wouldn't swap places with Jack o'Connor for all the tea in China. I'm looking forward to seeing the calls he makes, though.

KERRY HURLERS FALL SHORT

Hurling National League: Offaly 0-23 Kerry 0-19

This is a game that depends on your perspective. If you are a glass half full kind of person, then this was Kerry's best display this year, full of heart and drive and hunger. We out-worked and out-fought an Offaly side who have shown a vast improvement over the past couple of years. If you are a glass half empty kind of person, and I'm afraid I fall into that category, then the simple fact is that all our good hurling was wasted by our inability to put the ball over the bar. Look, in every field sport in the world, scorers, finishers, are the most valuable commodity. Hurling has a far wider scoring range than football, with players very capable of scoring from inside their own half nowadays (something which detracts from the skill of the game for me) and you simply need to be putting away most of those chances. That's the only part of Kerry's display that let them down last Saturday – but their conversion rate was truly abysmal. I made it ten wides in the first quarter alone. In hurling, ten wides over the course of a game means that you are statistically likely to lose.

Eoghan Caghill and Shane Conway swapped early scores. Shane added a free and Eoin Ross put us two up. Eoghan Cahill pointed an Offaly free but Daniel Collins fired over. Cahill (2f) and David Nally (f) nudged Offaly in front. We were dominating play at this stage with some great hurling, but already clocking up misses. I knew

– I'm honestly not playing Mr. Hindsight here – that Offaly would make us pay once they got the strong wind in the second half. Shane and Jordan Conway exchanged scores with Charlie Mitchell and it was all square, 0-6 apiece. We lost the talismanic Mikey Boyle to injury at that stage, always an ominous sign. Mikey is the cornerstone of this team. Mind you, springing a sub the quality of Eric Leen is going to calm any nerves.

A relatively subdued Pádraig Boyle picked off two frees, Shane Conway with another. Daniel Collins and Kyle O'Connor had points from play. This was a lot more like it. Kerry were much sharper in the second quarter. Eoghan Cahill and Pádraig Boyle exchanged frees, with Boyle adding a point from play. Offaly finished the half strongly with two frees from Cahill and a Dara Maher point. Shane Conway had a bread and butter free late in the half but somehow it curled wide – you'd nearly bet the house on Shane converting that while wearing a blindfold. It happens sometimes, even to the very best.

Half-time Offaly 0-13 Kerry 0-10. Realistically, given the wind factor and how defensive Offaly had been structured in that first half, three points was never going to be enough for Kerry. Sure enough, Offaly played much more on the front foot in the second half. Cilligan Kiely and Eoghan Cahill (4) to two Pádraig Boyle frees trimmed the gap. Charlie Mitchell nudged Offaly in front. Then they put on a burst with two Paddy Clancy points and another from Jason Sampson to open up a four point lead. We were always chasing after that. Never far away, but never really closing the gap either. Pádraig Boyle and Brandon Barrett (all of Kerry's subs impressed) pulled two back, but Cahill replied with two frees. 0-21 to 0-17 and the clock really ticking against Kerry now, David Nally and Liam Langton closed out Offaly's scoring. Shane Conway and Pádraig Boyle pulled back frees, but that spelled the finish of Kerry's league campaign.

Has it been a good campaign for Kerry? Let's be honest. Not really. Our play is good. The likes of Jason Diggins, Dan Goggin, and Jordan Conway have really stepped up to match the standard of proven performers like the Boyles (Pádraig still scored eight points on an off day), Eoin Ross, and Fionán Mackessy. We have a

Look, I genuinely don't think Ireland are going to qualify for the Euros. I haven't thought it since the draw was made. But I've actually been hugely impressed with our progress over the past 18 months. People seem to have some sort of collective amnesia about how bad we were. Remember 5-1 to Denmark? 4-1 to Wales? Luxembourg? I'm not trying to be mean, it's not as if Ireland can look down on anybody, but beating Luxembourg 1-0 would have to be considered a bad result. We lost. Okay? We lost 1-0 to Luxembourg. We celebrated – may the saints preserve us – we celebrated a 1-0 win

over Malta. That's where Ireland were.

People were sceptical when Stephen Kenny was appointed. I was a bit more realistic. I knew full well that there wasn't going to be any big queue of applicants for the job, given the state that we were in. Who was going to touch that poisoned chalice? Mind you, I did roll my eyes a bit when Stephen Kenny said that he was going to get Ireland to play the ball on the ground. Pass it out from the back. Sure, Stephen, that's a great lad. Fair play to you. It'll take about two friendlies for you to cop on to the fact that there's a reason why the team that has a completely failed administration, a shamefully neglected domestic league, poor facilities, one of the lowest ratios of qualified coaches to players, and whose main elite pathway is the boat to England don't play it out from the back. I look back at those days - and that's the very recent past – and I have to say fair play to him. I didn't pay too much attention to the Latvia game. Getting Mikey Johnston capped was the main thing for me. I don't know much about the lad - as always, Irish media are hyping him up as a major talent but I don't see any queue of suitors at his door, so time will tell. Evan Ferguson got his first goal. Ferguson does look exceptional, to be fair, but we have a long tradition of hyping up some young lad who struggles thereafter to nail down a starting jersey in the Championship. The nonsense that was talked about Troy Parrott was brutally unfair on a young lad.

So, no, the superclubs who like to pretend that financial fair play are mild suggestions, not rules (and invariably succeed) are not vying with each other to sign these buding superstars. But the likes of O'Shea, Smallbone, Ferguson, Ogbene, maybe Idah (my jury is still out; he's good but I'm suspicious about his technical ability) are real players who aren't afraid to take it on. Let us hark back to the days when our greatest threat was Shane Duffv's forehead from a corner. I'm not knocking Duffy, a fantastic servant for his country always, but this is a different Ireland. Are we great? No, far from it. But we are far greater than we were, and I think Stephen Kenny has done a fantastic job so far.

France were coming off the back of a big win, putting three early goals past the Dutch. They will be right up among the favourites for the Euros, never mind qualifying. They really do have world class players, and a lot of them. They won a World Cup and narrowly lost another. On paper, they should have blown us away, and I absolutely thought they would. I'd have taken a 2-0 loss and been grateful that we kept our scoring difference down. Instead we were unlucky not to come away with a point.

France were better than us. There is no denying that. A bit crisper on the ball, a bit more ambitious. But not a lot better, I expected them to drive at us with far more pace. They appeared to be trying to craft out intricate goals instead of going directly for the jugular, and they weren't really getting anywhere. Yes, Gavin Bazunu did have saves to make, but nothing that would have your heart in your mouth. France should really have scored after ten minutes after Bazunu was rounded, but

Collins was able to cut out the final pass. A real let off. John Egan had a good block on Mbappe. Antoine Griezmann always looked very dangerous for France. Ireland? Ferguson, to his credit, chased everything in the frustrating position of lone striker, but our

main strategy was containment. The evergreen Coleman is consistent excellence. Dara O'Shea on the other side has grown into a strong and reliable performer. John Egan was our general in the trenches. France just could not break down that trio. Matt Doherty was himself. He's never going to be the gamechanger but he'll never let you down either. A solid professional. Ogbene and Knight did a lot more tracking backwards than forwards - it's not like France gave them much choice in the matter. Knight was only fair, to be truthful, though he did work very hard. Ogbene was fantastic. He had a young players' fearless attitude, relishing every chance to go at the ball and unafraid to use it. Josh Cullen is our cover and our outlet more often than not, and does it well. It's a difficult and often unappreciated role, not so much being the player to clear the lines as the player who ensures that they aren't immediately threatened again. Unfortunately for him, the abiding memory will be the hospital pass he gave away for the goal. It's just one small mistake from a player who doesn't make many, but it's a reminder of why these guys are millionaires and you and I aren't. This is very nearly the top level of the world game (I believe that Champions League top teams are a good bit better than national teams) and that one small mistake is how fine the margins are.

Nathan Collins was another who was forced to stay closer to his own goal than he would have liked, often dropping in to close the space when Coleman was being pulled away by Mbappe's movement. He so nearly wrote himself into the history books with that late header. Ireland went reasonably close a couple of times late on once we had to go for it, but that one....Maignan clawed that out, and I'm not sure how.

Did we really deserve a draw? I suppose not really. But we ran one of the best teams in the work very close. That wasn't a bad night for Ireland at all, far from it, when you match expectation to reality.

All that said, it's important to remember that it counts for nothing. France have two played and two wins with five goals scored. Ireland have one down and nothing on board.

We absolutely need to beat Greece. Ireland are always good at being the plucky underdogs. Backs to the wall defending, looking to scramble a late goal . But when we are favourites, when we are expected to come out and go after a team that we should be beating....that's where we often go wrong. That's where the cracks appear.

To sach maith, ach níl leath na hoibre deanta. All to play for.

Walsh is also the first of many overseas competitors in the rally.

Waterford's Andrew Purcell will have Londonbased Kerry co-driver Shane Buckley on the notes in their Skoda Fabia R5

Both Walsh and Buckley and many more will be fighting to take home to London Irish Motor Club Perpetual Shield which is presented to the highest-placed overseas competitor in the event

Gary Kiernan and John McCabe top the Modified entry in their Ford Escort, one place ahead of Mark Alcorn and Donal McAleney in a similar car. Both drivers won the national section of the first two international rallies in Ireland this year.

The top ten is completed by the Wicklow/ Mayo pairing of Daniel Barry and Lorcan Moore (Skoda Fabia R5), the all-Cork crew of Daniel Cronin and Donnchadh Burke (Polo GTI R5) and Monaghan's Richard Moffett Darragh Kelly (Toyota Starlet RWD).

The latter two drivers are previous winners of the Kerry Winter Rally and will be hoping to bring home even more silverware from the Kingdom this weekend.

Other top modified drivers include Ed O'Callaghan from Limerick and Donegal's Kevin Gallagher in a Darrian T90 GT9r.

Fan favourites Gary McPhillips from Monaghan and Frank Kelly from Tyrone are also on the modified entry list.

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1300 KERRY PEOPLE WAITING

for Orthopaedic outpatient appointments

eputy Michael Healy Rae TD has revealed that 1,318 people with Kerry addresses continue to wait for outpatient appointments for orthopaedics in UHK, CUH and the South Infirmary Cork, in figures exclusively revealed to him following a parliamentary question to the Minister for Health Stephen Donnelly.

It has led the Independent TD to renew his calls on better promotion of the EU Cross Border Directive scheme which is a refund scheme.

"While I appreciate waiting times for appointments and procedures have been increased due to the Covid-19 pandemic but that should not be reason enough for the Department of Health not to explore every possible avenue to reduce them as quickly as possible.

"One Thousand Three Hundred people on a waiting list is just not acceptable in this and age when there is actually another avenue for

people which is free to them by using the EU Cross Border Directive scheme which is a refund scheme." Deputy Michael Healy Rae stated.

Currently 1,318 people with Kerry addresses

are awaiting orthopaedic outpatient appointments in three separate hospitals with 999 of them alone awaiting appointments at University Hospital Kerry (UHK) in Tralee, while a further 307 are awaiting calls from the South Infirmary Victoria University Hospital with another 12 on the waiting lists of Cork University Hospital (CUH)

DANNY HEALY RAE ON VACANT HOUSING

in the Dáil Wednesday 29 March 2023



As the Taoiseach knows, I travel nearly every road in Kerry on a consistent basis. One of the roads I travel very often is the road from Kenmare, through Kilgarvan, down to Clonkeen then Flesk and into Killarney. Without going along the road, I can count in my head that there are 55 vacant houses from the top of the town in Kenmare down to the Kerry Way in the Curraglass townland. That is hardly going up or down any of the byroads off that - a short walking distance maybe. There is a certain amount of public

transport on this road.

Why are these houses vacant? Can we do anything? We must explore every avenue we can when we hear about the housing crisis and people ending up without a home. Surely we should be doing more to entice the owners of these houses into the rental market. We certainly know that the tax at 52% or 56% is keeping many of them out of that market. Owners in this area will not command large rents. They will only get €600 or €700 a month. After paying tax, they only have €300 to pay the bills. Confidence is gone in the private rental market and people are afraid that they will lose their houses and be unable to get them back when they want them. They have the right to get their houses back. Will the Government do something to relax the rules of the Residential Tenancies Board, RTB, which are too stringent and restrictive and prevent people from entering the market?

Will the Government also do something for those who are without a home, cannot find a house to rent and are not on the housing list? We must help people who are on the housing list, but those who are not on

it need a house as much as everyone else. They cannot afford to buy but are just above the threshold to join the housing list. Could we involve local authorities in renting houses? Perhaps they could succeed. People are afraid they will not get their houses back if they go private.

The Government was able to offer €800 tax free to house owners who accommodated Ukrainians. Why can we not offer the same sum to accommodate our own people? Surely our own people are first and foremost. The Ukrainians are not to blame for the misfortune that has befallen them, but our people must be looked after. This is one of the areas I am asking the Government to explore.

I object in the strongest way to the Government's proposal that houses should be compulsorily purchased. Instead, the Government should talk to the owners and try to find out whether they would be interested or, if they had a problem, try to deal with it. The Government should certainly not go down the road of CPOs because it will turn every landowner and house owner against it. That is what owners were afraid was happening in the Dail today. If they are banned from getting their houses back, it would be the same as an extension of going down the CPO route, which

There is much that we can do together, that being, to explore why these houses are vacant. There are vacant houses up all the other roads around Rathmore, Scartaglin, Gneeveguilla, Brosna and Knocknagoshel. There should be no one homeless. For people who came to this country fleeing the war, we were able to help them with transport and so on. The same could be organised as well.

We need to do more because the State will never be able to build enough new houses. It is a plus and a big bonus and start that we have these houses.

- mini marshmallows on top of the cookies and bake for 2 more minutes, take out of the oven and leave to cool. 8,Melt some milk chocolate and spoon on top of the cookies and then place mini eggs on top, leave the cookies to cool fully before eating, Enjoy














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








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

FOCUS ON ALPINES

The vast majority of alpine plants are easy to grow in any reasonably well drained garden soil. Alpines are ideal plants for rockeries and gaps in stone walls and they will give you colour from early spring right through the summer. The most important thing when choosing your alpine plants is to make sure you find out the growth rates so that one alpine plant won't take over other alpine plants in the rockery.

A good example of this would be an alpine called Cerastium (snow in summer) which is quite a quick growing alpine and spreads quickly in a short space of time. It can tend to take over small rockeries. Having said that it is a beautiful plant with silver foliage and is covered, as the name suggests, in beautiful white flowers.

It can be pruned back to keep it under control. There are also lots of alpines which are compact and can make perfect mounds and shapes. Alpines are also great fillers for stone walls. An ideal plant for this would be a Campanula or aubrieta. The aubrieta is a pink flowering plant that you see growing out of a lot of grottos. alpines can also be used in containers such as in troughs or window boxes but try to choose ones that are evergreen so that you will have some colour all year round.

Welcome back dear student, we're still studying fear. Last week we discussed how fear imprisons people but Jesus came to 'set the captives free' (Luke 4:18). Many people have little understanding why Jesus, the Son of God, came to this earth or why He had to die on the Cross and then be raised from the dead (1st Peter 2:23-25; John 3:16). Galatians chapter five tells us that "it was for freedom that Christ has set us free". Freedom! Picture what that looks like for you — to live free from the fear that stunts a joyous life. Those who live in fear are not free. Fear is sin - causing one to come out from under God's blessing (trusting in Him), to living under Satan's influence instead. So who do we trust in? Are we truly believing what God has promised, or are we believing the lies that the devil harasses our minds with?


We've all experienced fear at various times — while going through a crisis; perhaps in an abusive situation, or in financial difficulty — the spirit of fear doesn't care, because the ultimate aim of Satan is to destroy God's people and incapacitate them, in order to prevent God's will for their lives coming to pass. But Jesus came so that we could be set free to enjoy our lives and not live in fear. Look we often pray 'let Your Kingdom come and Your will be done on this earth as it is in Heaven' don't we? Yet, there is no fear in Heaven, so what are we doing tolerating it here? It's sin! It comes from not knowing God as Father; the One Who gave us life — He who 'knit you together in your mother's womb', carefully designing your intricate internal workings! (Psalm 139:13-18). When we know Who God truly is we enter into a place of rest. "...for He is our God, we are the people He watches over, the flock under His care. If only you would listen to His voice today" (Psalm 95:7)

Jesus said that "the thief comes only to steal, to kill and to destroy, but I have come that you may enjoy your lives in abundance" (John 10:10). John chapter ten deals with shepherding and sheep, and ties in to Psalm 23 and Ezekiel chapter 34, where God reveals Himself as the Good Shepherd Who tends to and protects His sheep. "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want". Study Psalm 23 for yourself friend — you often hear it at funerals, but it's a song of the blessed life not death!

Sheep don't fret about anything when they know that their Shepherd is with them-protecting them from predators; making sure they have plenty of provision, ensuring they can sleep and bring forth their young in safety, without having to worry about anything. In fact the only time sheep could fear is when their shepherd isn't around, because then they are vulnerable. Jesus made the point that His sheep know His voice and follow Him, and that He knows them! "He made us and we are His, we are His people, the sheep of His pasture" (Psalm 100:3; John 10:27). What a privileged place to live. The One Who created you and me knows, cares for, protects and provides for us. That's the place of true rest and that peace only comes from knowing God and living in His Presence (Psalm 91:1-2; Isaiah 41:10-13). Fear not dear friend!


