


"It promoted shopping and the fabulous


Athletic Scribblings Recall A Century of Athletics

All past and present club members and athletics supporters from around the county are welcome to attend. The book retails at $\in 15$ and will be available to purchase on the night.







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
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

Nice to see shopping festival in Killarney - but the town is losing out

It is nice to see new luxury fitted shops like the Dutch owned Rituals open in Killarney. The shopping festival by Chamber and others seems to have been a great success. Certainly, the Killorglin & District pipe band went down very well on Saturday. But I couldn't help notice that it was the same four or five bags in all the pictures representing the same four or five stores: The truth of Killarney shopping and services from cobbler to photo printer is we have to go to Tralee for many basics. The current application submitted by Lidl Ireland to Kerry County Council spells it out in black and white. The German retailer wants to build its second Killarney store in the Park Road, at the eastern end of what was the old Torc Hotel site. It will need a material contravention of the development plan as the site is zoned mixed use, not retail. That means Lidl must persuade councillors, after public consultation, to vote in favour.

The current mixed-use zoning allows cultural, office, medical, residential and hotel facilities.

Lidl argues the new store will be "a net gain" for the broader retail catchment of Killarney. The town is losing out to Tralee which has 'a more diverse competition-led retail attraction" it says.

Killarney catchment has a population of over 31,000 currently, it estimates. Approximately 10% of the convenience retail spend available within the catchment area is "leaking" to competing centres, while the town of Killarney also gains from passing tourist trade.

But the leakage will persist due to "the level and relative lack of diversity of retail provision within the catchment area," the application states.

It reminds me of the late 1990s when concern about a dearth of shopping in Killarney led to the Outlet Centre and to Deerpark. One question no one is asking: why is Killarney always playing catch up when it comes to shops and basic services? It's a question for the Chamber of Commerce and for the council, both of whom are needed to get ahead of things.

All political parties have a mountain to climb in Killarney

Sinn Féin is suffering the effects of multiple scandals blowing up on them all together-scandals that are months old.

Let's face it, Sinn Féin is a party that brokes

no leaks and is so tight, nothing gets out. Marxist style, it doesn't behave like normal parties. Normally. So this 12th of July style bonfire of the Shinners makes one wonder if the Israeli intelligence services are at work! But I wouldn't write SF off. Even though I can't see how Pa Daly will get 20 per cent of the first preference vote and have a surplus over quota of 2800 votes this time round. There will be precious little for him in Killarney - he has not endeared himself to those concerned about immigration, for instance. The party took the same moral high ground in Dublin lost its core voters and is since trying to do a handbrake U-turn.

Tralee and Listowel will come out strongly for Daly and the Ferris factor surely is firmly behind to ensure his survival. Even so, other parties, notably Fianna Fáil sense an opportunity.

The common acceptance that there's no vote for Sinn Fein in Killarney, compared with other parties, is not quite the case either. The local elections saw the two SF candidates Kennelly and Switzer take 587 or just 4.1 per cent of the first preference vote. Not a huge showing. But remember this, Fine Gael got only 4.6 per cent - 653 first preference votes in Killarney. And not so long ago Killarney was regarded as a Fine Gael leaning town. Fianna Fáil did not cover themselves in glory either although Niall Kelleher did manage 9.2 per cent of the No. One votes. He also got the Lion's share of the Maura Healy-Rae surplus. Fianna Fail are in poll position in Killarney when it comes to parties, it could be argued. But going by the June results, all parties have a mountain to climb in Killarney. And the Ukrainians will have no vote in the Dáil elections to save necks!



Mixed Use: the way forward for tourism I was sent to a conference on Lighthouse tourism in Valentia Island last week and was astonished at the visitor figures and the highly commendable approach by multiple agencies coming together. Briefly, the 16 of the 60 or so lighthouses open to the public had 384,000 visitors in 2023, with three quarters of these spending time in the vicinity.

Valentia Lighthouse at Cromwell Point had 20,000 visitors . And this has all come about in just nien years.

What came across was the mixed-use approach, for want of a better term. First of all, all Ireland's old lighthouses are functional buildings. They are operational, automated, and centrally controlled from Dún Laoghaire, the headquarters of Irish Lights. They are essential for ferries, sailboats, yachts, cruise liners and fishing craft and operate for shipping in the way control towers work for aircraft.

Many are also tourist centres. And these remote

and beautiful buildings are beacons of light for their communities who hold them in great affection. Valentia Lighthouse for instance hosts concerts and meetings for locals and for tourists.

(It made me think about how Muckross cafe for instance is an essential meeting place now for coffee and lunch for many Killarney people as well as for tourists. It really needs to be much bigger and higher ceilinged as the acoustics are poor).

We have to diversify more in Killarney. Niche tourism - which is a tourism that is not simply one dimensional - seems to be the way forward. Nor should we depend for much longer on just the 19th century when we have a much older product waiting to be explored such as Inisfallen, which we all hold in great affection. We could even turn part of St Finan's into a museum to 19th and 20th century psychiatry, if we had the energy and wherewithal. As well as apartments. Mixed use may be the way forward for tourism. 
"We will be led in prayer by Fr. Vitalis Barasa with festive carols by candlelight", Rhonda Daly, organiser of the event told Killarney Outlook.



PRESIDENT HIGGINS SIGNS PRESIDENTIAL PARDONS for Mr Sylvester Poff and Mr James Barrett

President Michael D. Higgins this week signed two Presidential Pardons at an event in Áras an Uachtaráin for Mr Sylvester Poff and Mr James Barrett, who were executed in Tralee Gaol on 23 January 1883.

In line with articles 13.6 and 13.9 of the Constitution, the pardons have been granted following a recommendation by Government. This recommendation took account of a report by Dr Niamh Howlin, Associate Professor at the UCD Sutherland School of Law, which found that the trials and conviction of Poff and Barrett included legal and procedural deficiencies which were 'so inconsistent with

the legal standards of the period and so objectively unsatisfactory and unfair, that they render the conviction unsafe'.

The ceremony was attended by the Minister for Social Protection, Heather Humphreys TD. Also in attendance were relatives of Sylvester Poff (aged 38 at the times of his execution) and James Barrett (aged 24), including Mr Poff's great grandson Tomo Burke, as well as representatives of the Castleisland District Heritage Group, a group based in Kerry who have raised awareness of the case and worked with the Department of Justice on the pardon process.



WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. If you are coming close to retirement then you are probably wondering what options you have when you want to get access to your pension. It depends on what type of pension you have but generally there are four options:

Tax Free Cash: Most people will be entitled to a tax free lump sum, the amount varies however generally you will get at least 25% of the value of your pension in a tax free cash lump sum.

Taxable Cash: You may also be able to take sum of your pension in taxable cash.


Annual Pension: This is a guaranteed income usually paid monthly for the rest of your life that is purchased with the money left after your tax free lump sum, this is subject to taxation.

Approved Retirement Funds: You may be entitled to keep some of your money in an approved retirement fund, money can be taken from the fund to give you a regular income, usually monthly. This is subject to taxation also. Taxation at retirement is often much lower than when you are working.

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

Snow and ice are reflective, so the

sun's damaging UV rays can reach your eyes from below as well as above. UV exposure is cumulative, so although you may not feel any immediate effects, you could be putting yourself at risk of long-term damage and risk cataracts and age-related macular degeneration (AMD) if you don't wear good quality sunglasses or goggles.





TRIBUTE TO ROWING LEGEND *Noel Casey*


It is with great sadness that members of Muckross Rowing Club learned of the passing of Noel Casey, who passed on Wednesday 23rd October. A native of Sneem and descending from the sporting legend of his father Jack (one of the seven famous Casey brothers inducted into the Irish Sports Hall of Fame), Noel lived a truly unique life that was steeped in rowing from close to birth until his very final year. Early life in a peninsular home meant that rowing was initially an essential form of transport – Noel recalled how his grandmother Bridget rowed with him to church and to shop and how he first learned rowing technique around the age of four.

Noel moved to London for work as a teenager where he went on to row and subsequently coach for over 50 years, in addition to his work in construction. Noel began rowing at Vesta Rowing Club on the Thames in 1966. From the late 1970s, Noel's coaching career included successful years with both Vesta RC and Thames RC where he guided crews to victory at Henley and the British National Championships. Noel was later appointed Head Women's Coach for Great Britain at the 1984 Los Angeles Olympic Games.

At the turn of the century, Noel returned to Sneem and in the years to follow Muckross RC would become the beneficiary of Noel's unrivalled knowledge, passion and coaching capacity for the sport of rowing. Between 2007 and 2009, Noel guided the Senior Women of Muckross to unprecedented success, winning three consecutive Senior Eight and Senior Four Irish Championship titles, together with a clean 'sweep' that included the Womens Senior Pair title in 2009. Noel's limitless enthusiasm and energy for coaching also extended to the junior ranks. Noel oversaw much of the transition in Muckross from a sweep bias (single oar rowing) founded in the Killarney Six tradition to sculling success (two oar rowing). The Irish Rowing Championships of 2009 also saw the Muckross Mens Junior Double crew place second bettered only by the Skibbereen competition that featured a young Paul O'Donovan. In 2009, this was the club's highest achievement in junior Championship sculling. Muckross trips to Eton for the Wallingford Regatta saw Noel link his Irish and British rowing communities, with great memories of practice spins on the Thames and visits to Vesta RC.

At an age where many rowing coaches would set about retiring, Noel was only getting started on a final rowing chapter – the setting of which was closer to home with Kenmare Rowing & Boat Club. In Kenmare, Noel went on to inspire and enable a new generation of young rowers – succeeding in the attainment of not one but two first national titles for Kenmare RBC in 2019, including the Womens Senior and Mens Junior Single Championships. In his time with both Muckross and Kenmare, Noel became a familiar face at the National Rowing Centre where he kept a close eye over his charges through trial events and Championship Regattas.

It is seldom we get to meet and be guided by a legend of the sport. The gifts that Noel brought to Muckross extend beyond the Championship titles – they extend to a renewed confidence he gave us to grow the club and strive to achieve at the highest levels. Noel modelled the necessary commitment to achieve on the water - freshly shaved and suitably attired, Noel would be first to early morning training on a winter weekend morning, unphased by the 40 kilometre journey



over the mountain to Killarney. Despite a tough exterior and often direct manner, Noel's wit and charm were well known to those he coached. To have Noel with us once more in the coaching launch in Muckross this June will be long remembered.

Noel's impression on the sport of rowing and a countless number of rowers was truly immense. From the banks of the Thames to Lough Leane and Kenmare Bay, Noel will be fondly remembered and greatly missed at the water's edge. Noel was a tremendous supporter and friend of Muckross Rowing Club and indeed all of the rowing clubs in Ireland and the UK that were fortunate to know his presence. A rowing man to his core and a legend of the sport across seven decades – is cinnte, ní bheidh a leithéid ann arís.

We extend our deepest sympathies to Noel's family. Our thoughts and prayers are with Noel's daughters Bernie and Caroline, son-in-law Noel, grandchildren, great-grandchildren and extended family.

DISABILITY AND SPECIAL NEED ASSESSMENTS

In my time in the Dáil I have continuously raised the need for the long-term care needs for disability patients in Kerry and in particular the need for St. Mary of the Angels which is being closed down by stealth. I have also highlighted the long delays for many special needs and mental health assessments, including autism and ADHD assessments, it is taking far too long for a child to be assessed.

Early intervention is essential to ensure children and adults with special needs difficulties are given the correct diagnosis and treatment.

It is not acceptable that children and adults are waiting up to 2.5 years for assessments. People whose children are diagnosed with autism have an awful struggle. In recent days I met a family with three autistic children, it is a heavy cross for a couple to bear and a huge expense. God almighty, imagine the burden and the cost for a family with three children to be able to manage.

I have also raised other issues such as the disabled person's grant. That is such a good grant operated by Kerry County Council. The Minister of State must recognise how building costs and labour costs have gone up over the past two to three years. Everyone is talking about it. To build a normal house has increased from €250,000 to €450,000. The situation is replicated when someone applies for a level-access shower. I believe our local authority is as good or better than many local authorities. It operates the grant system for disabled people, people who get strokes, people who fall and different things happen to them so that they need a level-access bathroom. We always got a grant of about €6,000 or €6,500 to deal with improving the bathroom in order to make it accessible for people with disabilities. However, €6,500 is no longer enough, given how building costs have gone up. This needs to be dealt with.

CAHILL REITERATES CALL FOR MASSIVE INJECTION IN FITZGERALD STADIUM

All of Kerry would benefit from the proposed development of Fitzgerald Stadium in Killarney according to Fianna Fáil General Election candidate Michael Cahill. "I am again calling on the Tanaiste, Micheál Martin, the Minister for Finance, Jack Chambers, Minister for Sport, Thomas Byrne and the Government to row in behind the Kerry County Board with a massive injection of funding in the redevelopment of Fitzgerald Stadium. Kerry deserves a "state of the art" Stadium" emphasised Councillor Cahill.

"The additional visitors would not alone benefit Killarney and surrounding districts, but I believe that a ripple effect would be felt from Tarbert to Tahilla, Killorglin to Valentia, Cahersiveen to Kenmare, Castleisland to Dingle, Ballybunion to Ballinskelligs" said the experienced Councillor.

"Fitzgerald Stadium has hosted many iconic GAA occasions in the past and it will continue to do so, as well as a wide range of other fantastic events, following this development. I have rowed in behind this massive project since the very beginning and I expect and I am confident that the call to Government to support Kerry in this fabulous venture will be heard loud and clear and not alone will it be heard but will be supported with action and significant investment " added the Fianna Fáil man.

MEP KELLY LEADS NEW CAMPAIGN to end biannual clock change

Seán Kelly, MEP for Ireland South and leader of the Fine Gael Delegaton in the European Parliament, has reiterated his call for the European Union to finally end the outdated practice of biannual clock changes. Having campaigned for nearly a decade on this issue, Mr. Kelly is pushing for the matter to be brought back onto the political agenda in the upcoming parliamentary term.

"I have been working for many years to see the end of this outdated practice," Kelly said. "It is time to put an end to the biannual clock change, which has been proven to have negative effects on health, well-being, and safety. The practice is no longer fit for purpose in today's world." Kelly is leading a new campaign in the European Parliament and

highlighted the broad political support behind his initiative, with MEPs from every political group signing a joint letter to European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, calling for action. "This is not a partisan issue," he said. "There is widespread agreement across the political spectrum that the clock change needs to end. MEPs from all groups have joined me in this call, showing that this is about


In the letter, Kelly and his colleagues pointed to the extensive public backing for the proposal. "Citizens across Europe have spoken," he said. "In 2018, a public consultation saw 84% of participants favour ending the clock change. This is a clear mandate from the people, and it is high time the European Commission acted on it." The negative impacts of clock changes on health are well documented. "Studies have shown that changing the clocks can disrupt sleep, increase the risk of heart attacks, and lead to more traffic accidents," Kelly stated. "In addition, the energysaving argument that once supported this practice is outdated. In fact, we now know that changing the clocks could actually increase energy consumption during the winter months."

Kelly is confident that with renewed momentum, progress can finally be made. "The European Parliament already passed a resolution in 2019 with overwhelming support, yet the matter has stalled. We need to move forward decisively in the next parliamentary term."

Concluding, Kelly remarked, "Abolishing the clock change would simplify life for millions of people across Europe. It's a practical and popular measure, and I am committed to seeing it through."

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

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KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council.

Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards

A builder built an extra thirteen houses in an existing housing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take $\leq 20,000$ via a bond from the builder.

Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does not entice builders to build houses.





This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.

road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008. This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder \leq 45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



It must be said that while Ormiston wasn't featuring heavily on the scoring charts, her rebounding was integral to a dominant period. Leah Mc Mahon hit a three and Killester had to sit down and redraw their plans. Destiny Strother and Haiby brought them level temporarily as Simeone O Shea, Denise Dunlea and Ormiston made sure it was a six point lead at half time, 42-36.

Gracen Kerr was fast out of the traps in the third quarter , her five points helping to open up the gap. Not for the first time Clarke hit a big outside shot for the champions but Ormiston started clocking the points and midway through the third quarter another Marinkovic three had St Pauls ten clear, 54-44. Defensively the home side were keeping Killester at bay for the most part but a trio of threes from Sarah Courtney and Clarke halved the deficit , despite further baskets from Ormiston and Scanlon.

Siofra O Shea and Meabh Barry started the fourth quarter and Ormiston extended the advantage to seven, 64-57. But Killester were soon to make a big move as an unsportsmanlike foul called on Marinkovic yielded four points, courtesy of Ali Connolly and Samanthan Haiby.

It looked as if St Pauls had weathered that storm thanks to some great defensive play from Scanlon and further points from Rheanne O Shea. It left them 68-63 clear heading into the final furlong but Killester showed champion qualities to pull the game out of the fire. It was Haiby who would be their headline maker. She first stepped out to hit a three from the corner and then drove to the basket to complete a three point play. St Pauls did get some looks but couldn't get the baskets needed as the visitors headed back to the capital with the points. Another one for the hurt locker for St Pauls but one to use in the future Final score Utility Trust St Pauls 68 Killester 73.

Megan Ormiston had 15 points and 21 rebounds, Rheanne O Shea and Anja Marinkovic shared 26 equally, Gracen Kerr had 8, Simeone O Shea, Denise Dunlea and Leah McMahon had 3 apiece .

Samantha Haiby had the game high 22 points, leva Bagdanaviciene 13 as well as Michelle Clarke while Sarah Courtney hit an important ten.

A bye in the National Cup and a free weekend in the league leaves St Pauls without a game now until Saturday November 17th. That weekend will see them travel to play league bottom side Galway Mystics. The following week they are at home to the Portlaoise Panthers with the November programme being finished with a trip to Dublin to play Trinity Meteors . On paper these are a run of games where St Pauls will be looking to pick up some more points which some of their earlier performances probably deserve.

DR. CROKES FINISH WITH A FLOURISH

Senior County Final: Dr. Crokes 3-8 Daingean Uí Chúis 0-11

Dr. Crokes are back on top of domestic injury was actually fantastic for Tom and very football in Kerry, after completing a clean sweep of league, club, and county titles, having already won the East Kerry Championship. They were the better team - they have unquestionably been the best team in Kerry all year (the Kerry Ladies are obviously the best team from Kerry this year). They only lost one game in total out of 21, and that defeat to Dingle in the opening round of he club championship had a certain amount of controversy to it.

Spare a thought for Dingle. They were magnificent. Crokes had to be at their best to see ff the challenge of unquestionably the second best team in Kerry. Despite being on the losing side, and not playing his usual starring role in the final itself, Paul Geaney is my player of the County Championship for the third year in a row.

Dingle did everything right. They came with a great game-plan, got their tactical matchups absolutely spot on, and had Crokes floundering for long periods. Dylan Geaney had the opening salvo within seconds of the throw-in but dropped it short, only for an uncharacteristically wayward clearance by Shane Murphy to see Paul Geaney instantly snap over the opening score. Tom O'Sullivan, superb at both ends of the field (I still say that the enforced break through badly wanted) set up Dylan Geaney for point number two. I've questioned Dylan's county credentials on a few occasions, looked for a bit more consistency - no-one ever doubted his shooting talent -he has finally convinced me and I want him getting real game-time in next year's National League, not the occasional late cameo.

David Shaw, another certainty for a Team of the Championship, swung over a beauty to open Crokes' account, but Cathal Bambury pounced at the other end, his close range shot rising over the crossbar. Four points in the opening four minutes - if you saw it in the inter-county game, Jim Gavin would be on his holidays right now. A great move between Paul and Dylan Geaney saw Tom O'Sullivan fist over the bar – I'd say he though briefly about goal, but a point was the right move. 0-4 to -0-1. It would have been more but for a great interception by Evan Looney. I'd say Jack O'Connor will want that phone number as well!

Dingle's defence was superb, bottling up Crokes and forcing awkward shots from distance. Conor O'Sullivan had a fantastic duel with David Shaw – I do feel that his withdrawal through injury sucked a bit of moentum out of Dingle. Their tackling and turnover rate was ferocious. Big numbers in

defence and breaking at speed through the Geaneys....simple, but very, very effective. Dingle hit the post - Brian Looney did well to clear the loose ball under pressure from Cathal Bambury. Really cool when it mattered. Both sides had efforts drop short before Dylan Geaney kicked an absolute beauty. 0-5 to 0-1.

Crokes needed somebody to step up and steady the ship. Cometh the hour and all that no better man than Gavin White, who sensed the moment and drove forward., gathering from Gavin O'Shea and calmly splitting the posts. Twenty minutes gone. That was a big moment; suddenly Crokes started looking more like themselves, with Mark O'Shea getting on top in a crowded midfield, well assisted by a deep-lying Cian McMahon who was superb at snaffling up loose ball. and Brian Looney and Gavin O'Shea beginning to find space. Brian Looney had a free shot at goal that skinned harmlessly across, but advantage was in play after Maidhcí Lynch was somewhat carelessly pulled back. A tiny mistake, but on days like this it gets





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punished, and Micheal Burns swung over the free. Cian McMahon won the kick-out but this time Dingle were able to force a turnover and paul Geney was wide with a decent chance at the other end. Up burst Gavin White again to slot his second point and there was just a point between them.Tom Leo O'Sullivan was edged away from goal, but had the presence of mind o cross to Dylan for the last score of a first half largely dominated by Dingle.

Dingle came out bustling with energy again, despite having lost the impressive Conor O'Sullivan – Michael Flannery stepped in seamlessly. Dylan Gaeney snapped over his fourth point from play. They hit two wides – honestly, I did feel that of all teams, when you have Crokes on the rack you need to kill off he game fast. Leave them a lifeline and they'll just rise again.

Micheál Burns had a good effort from distance, but Gavin Curran came out to gather confidently – a great sign of an assertive and confident goalkeeper. His handling was excellent all day – but the day wasn't over.

Tom Leo O'Sullivan got inside the cover and had Cathal Bambury unmarked to his left, but Shane Murphy read it absolutely perfectly and got down fast to block. Tom Leo took the '45 himself (first one I ever saw him take) but his excellent effort hit the post and wide.

Crokes had gone almost a quarter of an hour of the second half scoreless when another high ball dropped in the Dingle square. Michael Flannery got a hand to it but the ball spilled loose and Gavin O'Shea superbly scooped it up and quickly fed it to David Shaw to drill it home. Instinctive genius by O'Shea; not for the first or last time.

Barry Dan O'Sullivan boomed over a majestic point to nudge Dingle back in front, 0-8 to 1-4. Dingle weren't going away; those lads have real steel. But they were facing a very different animal now. They say that a shark can smell blood in water up to a mile away. Crokes, especially their more experienced campaigners, have honed that kind of killer instinct.

Cue Kieran O'Leary. One of the most emblematic players in Crokes' history, and once again he reminded all of us why that is. Cian McMahon's probing ball was deflected and looked like being gathered harmlessly, but O'Leary waited for his moment and very deftly picked the defender's pocket, just about managing to get a shot off while falling....Gavin Curran did superbly to take a lot of the force out of it, but not enough....it bobbled just over the line a fraction ahead off a despairing defender's lunge.

Dingle were faltering badly now and Crokes were rampaging forward. Evan Looney gathered in the right corner and calmly cut across, ghosting past hapless defenders before picking his spot for a third goal in five minutes.

Crokes were in cruise control now. Micheál Burns lofted over a point. Kieran O'Leary added another. Paul Geaney pointed a free – his first score since the opening minute . Conor Geaney pointed and took a shot at goal, but Crokes were ready to deal with it comfortably.

Micheál Burns finished off a great move involving Kieran O'Leary and David Shaw. Dylan Geaney replied in kind, but it was Dingle's final score and their bolt was shot, with Micheál Burns kicking two class points to close out a rollercoaster of a game. Comfortable for Crokes in the finish, but only in the finish.

Evan Looney was the popular choice for man of the match. While Evan certainly had a great game and his goal was a thing of composed beauty, he is unquestionably he breakout player of this County Championship, I really thought that the bit of leadership and inspiration by Gavin White when Crokes were barely hanging on was the crucial factor. Yes, the first goal was the turning point, but the narrative of the game was about getting to that point.

A special mention for Brendan Griffin. I really thought that was an exhibition of firm but unobstrusive refereeing.

Crokes will face Castlehaven of Cork on November 10th at a home venue (one presumes Lewis Rd.). I haven't had any look at Castlehaven yet but I was told early on by Cork people that Castlehaven woud be very strong in the football this year as their dual players Cahalanes etc.) were knocked out of the hurling early on and have been concentrating on the big ball.

Ardfert are a club that have sometimes been outclassed - like Firies, they wouldn't be drawing from a deep population base - but very rarely have I seen the actually out-battled with a game on the line. At the start of the Premier Junior, I and I'd reckon most people were looking at Ballymac, hot favourites of course, St. Senans, Keel (they are coming) and a very solid Castlegregory outfit. Oh, and Ardfert's young but very talented contingent and their Kerry hurlers. Firies? Decent team, but they are only in their second year up from junior and word was that Jack Sherwood was minding an injury. I knew Firies were solid, no question about that, and had young guns themselves, but

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the title? Nope, couldn't see it.

Did well in the group to qualify, but got well beaten by Ardfert in their third game. Even at the famous 'airport derby' with neighbours Currow, absolutely cracking football, but I didn't expect the winners coming from that game. Impressive scoring, though, better than I expected, and they definitely showed their character. But I knew they had character anyway; that has never been in guestion with Firies. It was the Ballymac game that made everybody blink. Not because they took Ballymac to school; they didn't. Ballymac were every bit as good as them in an enthralling game of football. But you kind of kept expecting Ballymac to finally burn off Firies' challenge, and Ballymac did lift their game....but Firies stayed with them every inch of the way. It wasn't any one spectacular moment; it was doing everything relentlessly right over and over again. Contesting everything, hunting and harrying, executing the basics non-stop. Over eighty gruelling minutes. It's much harder than people think, and Firies were comfortable doing that. The young guns of Horgan, Palmer, Doe may be the headliners, but I found myself looking at he likes of Mike Daly, Diarmuid O'Mahony, and Darragh Brosnan with a new appreciation for what they bring to the table. You live, you learn.

A wet, slippy pitch and ball for the final. I don't mind, that doesn't always negate skill, sometimes it can actually magnify it.

Odhran Ferris and Diarmuid O'Mahony exchanged early ponts before a Nathan O'Driscoll brace put Ardfert ahead. Darragh Brosnan, after a clever short '45, and Stephen Palmer levelled matters. Ardfert had more of the play but were struggling to find openings in Firies' rearguard. Firies themselves were taking long shots that were going close (especially Michael Daly) but never quite close enough. In the 24th minute, Jordan Brick found Earnán Ferris and he cut in for a brilliant goal. 1-3 to 0-3 at the break. Low enough scoring for the quality of football.

Nathan O'Driscoll kicked another brace to put five points between them. Firies pulled one back but good play by Daihí Griffin saw Odhran Ferris reply. Ardfert, to my eyes, looked like they weren't sure whether to protect that lead or push to extend it. I did think they needed to commit to one decision or the other – instead they seemed to try and compromise between both. I don't know; hindsight might be colouring my perception in that regard. But for Firies it was very simple. Five points down and clock ticking? Speak now or forever hold your peace.

They spoke. In fact, they almost roared. Suddenly Firies were just reaching out and grabbing the game by the scruff of the neck, especially Mike Daly and Niall Donohue. Three frees from James Horgan and points from play by Daly after a great turnover, and suddenly the game was in the melting pot. Niall Donohue tore up the field to kick an absolute monster score. 0-9 to 1-6.

Nathan O'Discoll notched his fifth point to nudge them back ahead, but James Horgan



replied. John Egan forced a great turnover and Ardfert worked the ball up the fieldforr a Colin Walsh mark. Just seconds left, but Firies and the effervescent Donohue had one last throw of the dice and the All Ireland minor and Hogan winner was never going to miss that one.

Extra-time. Both teams had been through this in their semi-finals. Firies had the momentum now though and a tiring Ardfert couldn't live with them in extra-time, not even with Diarmuid O'Mahony picking up a late black card.

The very best of luck to him in his new role.

LADIES GAA

I'm putting the camogie and the football under the one umbrella. Ironic enough, considering the week that's in it. I was aware -we were all aware – of the impending fixture clash that was arising last weekend for Abbeydorney, Cillard, and Clanmaure. I was just hoping that common sense would prevail. I don't want to be lighting fires; ladies' sport has it tough enough in this county anyway. Casual misogyny prevailed long enough and frankly, I can tell you hand on heart as someone in press boxes regularly that it isn't gone away at all. Occasionally dormant, but certainly not extinct.

There's talk that the Munster Championship fixtures for Ladies Football and Camogie were fixed last January. That isn't true. The Mai O'Connell Cup, named for a great Kerry is a new camogie competition for the Intermediate and Junior Clubs in Munster and those fixtures were only confirmed in early August. That's certainly not excusing anything; I'm just outlining the facts.

Sunday, October 5th, I drove over to John Mitchels GAA Complex to report on the Abbeydorney v Ballymac Kerry Junior A Final. I think throw-in was 12 o'clock, followed by the Kilcumin v Killarney Legion Junior B Final. I couldn't actually stay for that one; I had to drive to Beaufort for the St. Brendans v Kenmare Shamrocks Mens' County Championship game, and hen drive back to Tralee for the Ladies Senior Final between Castleisland Desmonds and Southern Gaels. I suppose it's the Kerry version of a jet set lifestyle! The Senior Final had been moved back to 6.30pm, which I'd consider very late for kids of a wet Sunday evening for the domestic highlight game. But it had been moved back to accommodate the mens' quarter-final between East Kerry and St. Kierans in Austin Stack Park. We were told that was because St. Kierans couldn't play on the Saturday because they deserved the extra days' rest and they wanted to play in Austin Stack Park. The ladies had already been promised Austin Stack Park, but that was why the time was put back so dramatically. Except that St. Kierans have since released a strongly worded statement making it clear that they made no such request. St. Kierans have always supported Ladies football, very much so - think of Desmonds, Scart, Cordal....I have no idea what went wrong in arranging that fixture, but wires got badly crossed somewhere.

I hadn't realised the possibility of a clash between the football and the camogie in Munster until talking to both Abbeydorney and Ballymac.

Abbeydorney were expected to play Mungret in Abbeydorney at 1.00pm on Saturday, October 26th.

Cillard were expected to play Croagh/Kilfinny in Kilmoyley at 2.00pm on Saturday 26th.

Clanmaurice were expected to play Moneygall in Moneygall, also at 2.00pm on Saturday 26th.

Caoimhe Spillane, Amy O'Sullivan, and Laura Collins play for Clanmaurice camogie.

Niamh Quinn, Roisín Quinn, Ruth O'Connor, Alanna Maunsell, Maura McDonald, Amy McCarthy, and Aoife O'Sullivan all play for Cillard camogie.

All of the above – all of them – play for Abbeydorney ladies footballers. None of them are panel players; they are starters.

These fixtures were arrranged well beforehand. The clubs did flag the obvious clashes that would arise. I have no idea what formal written communication passed between secretaries, etc., but this should have been obvious. It's a bank holiday weekend; switch games around. You have room to manouevre in the schedule.

Except that it just didn't happen. And when Abbeydorney, faced with the prospect of having eleven players have to choose (and no player, ever, should have to make a choice like that) raised the issue, they got no solace whatsoever.

This is not a new problem. It's new to Kerry clubs, simply because we didn't have Kerry camogie clubs in Munster competitions. But this is common, far too common, in Cork, Clare, and Limerick. I assume Tipperary and Waterford also, but I personally can't confrm that. When it cmes to Cork, the likes of Breige Corkery, Rena Buckley, Mary O'Connor, Hannah Looney, and more recently Meabh Caalane and Libby Coppinger have regularly flagged the problems.

Congratulations to Nora Fealey, Chair of Kerry LGFA, and Anne Marie Russell, Chair of Kerry Camogie, on resigning from the Munster Council in protest and releasing a statement announcing same. They did try to find diplomatic solutions. Neither of these are people who court controversy for its own sake, and I've met both at the grassroots of both codes for many years. Publicising the enormous failure of the Munster Councils in this matter was a last resort, but they had tried the alternatives and it was important, I would say absolutely crucial, that they back their players when it comes down to player welfare. I tend to be a little cautious about the phrase 'player welfare', I find that it's often a refuge of sanctimony and self-righteousness by people whose main motivation is their own self-importance. This was not that at all. This was the exact opposite, this was people standing up for their players, and it needed to happen.

In the end we got a token compromise. Croagh/Kilfinny, very generously, agreed to come to Kilmoyley to play the game at 11.00am.

Mungret had a player flying back from the US so couldn't do too much but did agree to move their game to 3.30pm. A little bit of breathing space. An opportunity for girls to play both games on the one day.

Croagh/Kilfinny and Mungret, and Moneygall for that matter, have absolutely no blame in this ridiculous scenario. That falls squarely on administrators – the problem was staring everybody in the face even as they confirmed the fixtures, and it's not a new story anyway, but it seems that there was nobody to grasp the obvious nettle.

When players are expected to play two full games in the space of a few hours, and that's considered the good news, the solution rather than the problem, you know that the parent organisation abandoned all pretense at player welfare a while back.

It has been announced that there is na active plan, promoted by Mary McAleese among others, to bring the GAA, LGFA, and Camogie under one umbrella by 2026. This has always been an obvious move to me. Same games, pretty much the same rules, definitely the same facilities. It would be preposterous to have a separate camogie, ladies football, and mens' football/hurling pitch in one parish. Impractical and expensive, but also quite literally stupid. It's the same game, the same kids, the same communities. Of course there are potential problems. Who pays for development and maintenance? Who gets priority? There absolutely would be expenses. There would also have to be administrative compromise. I've always thought that double headers between all the various codes (including post primary and quite possibly cumann na mbunscoil) would be great but it's rare because it's actually

very complicated to organise.

So I've always been an advocate of integration, and plenty disagree with me on that. Not because of misogyny, but more simply that 'we' (a lot of these do nothing much for the GAA either, truth be told) need to sort out our own difficulties within the GAA organisation before incorporating others. Fair enough; we can agree to disagree.

Except that several of those people have said to me in recent days, and not unkindly, "If they can't even agree on something simple like this, how are we supposed to incorporate the camogie and ladies football in with our games?".

This week, I really wish I had a good reply to that. And I just don't.

CORN UÍ MHUIRÍ Group One St. Brendans Killarney 3-4 Coláiste Choilm, Ballincollig 0-4

Honestly, I wouldn't be happy if I was either team after this one. The Sem took the points, and that's the key thing at this stage, but they won't need to be told that a very serious improvement is needed. Ballincollig, despite having the strong wind, adopted a very defensive structure and the Sem found it very hard - too hard, really to break down. Ballincollig have a certain excuse - in all fairness, taking Cork U20 midfielder Darragh Clifford off the board (he is injured) was a colossal blow for them. Bringing Danny Miskella back as a midfielder in his place was a mistake in hindsight; the Sem knew to close down the star forward and it left Ballincollig fairly toothless. Worse, a specualative long ball from Oisín Fleming deceived everyone and slipped into the net. After just ten minutes the unfortunate keeper slipped while about to clear and inadvertently passed to a lurking Josh Bowler, who deftly controlled it and slotted to the emty net. Tough on Ballincollig; they had actually defended well in numbers. Wat will worry the Sem - a lot - is that they could only at 1-2 from play and two Joey McCarthy frees. There was a brilliantly worked 1-1 in the second half, Bowler with his second goal and it was a great one. Ballincollig played far better football in the second half, but couldn't put in on the board. One point from play and three frees in total? From a Sem perspective, that's a good result from a poor display.

I actually did commentary on the game for Clubber. Even by my very low standards, the commentary was absolutely brutal, but Ballincollig (a lovely outfit to deal with, by the way) were wearing white numbers over blue and white stripped jerseys. Anybody else see a potential problem there? I did my limited best. Some days are like that; you just do your best and get on with it.

St. Francis Rochestown 3-12 St. Flannans Ennis 1-8

The Sem need to beat one or the other to be sure of advancement. In fairness,

Rocco looked very good, Neville O'Shea in particular winning ball and setting up very quick attacks. They led by 2-8 to 1-2 at halftime and the likes of Ben Delaney, freetaker Dara O'Sullivan, and Pádraig McGrath had the game effectively beond Flannans. I certainly wouldn't write off the Clare side, for whom dual player Harry Doherty impressed.

Group Two PS Inbhearr Scéine 3-8 Clonakilty CC 1-11

The headline game. Inbhearr Scéine (apparently it's now 'lver Scéine'?) were making their debut in the Corn Uí Mhuirí, and an impressive debut it was. Clonakilty are no small scalp to claim. One feature of this year's competition so far - and I know it's early days - is the primacy of players who have played senior for their clubs. Jack Tagney was the standout player for the Kenmare side, no surprise after his contribution to the club's championship runs, and he finished with 1-5. His goal early in the second half, followed straight away by another from Neal O'Shea, put Kenmare in the driving seat. Liam O'Sullivan impressed as a sweeper and captain Jac O'Sullivan was otstanding around the middle. This was a very good team display, and the Donnchadh Ó Núanáin champions have clearly proven that they belong at the top grade.

Hamilton HS Bandon 3-10 Coláiste an Spioraid Naomh 1-6

Bandon have been there or thereabouts for the bones of a decade now and have an impressive stream of talent. This is a fairly new team, but they were always in control against Simcox Cup holders CSN. In recent years, the O'Sullivan Cup is a strong indicator of the top teams in Kerry - Mounthawk and Tralee CBS will contest this year's final - I'm not sure that Cork's Simcox Cup has quite the same relevance. I'm not sure if people realise how much broader Cork fotball is - in all fairness, those multiple strands are hardr to weave together. Right now, I'd expect that the clash between Inbhearr Scéine and CSN will decide this group, and I'd be very slow to call it.

Group Three Mercy Mounthawk 4-16 Abbey CBS 0-8

We shall not dwell on this. Clubber did consider whether we should stream the opening match of the reigning champions, but looking at who Mounthawk have available from their Hogan Cup team, it wasn't disrespect towards Abbey CBS (it's great to see a Tipperary outfit willing to step up) that made us think this would be onesided. On this occasion Tomás Kennedy was the main man 1-7, 1-6 from play. Paddy lane contented himself with a 'mere' 2-1, and Ben Murphy drove forward for 1-3. This was fill your boots territory; Mounthawk look well equipped for much tougher tests.

St. Pats Castleisland 2-14 Skibbereen CS 2-9

The rise of St. Pats Castleisland has been one of the graetstories of recent years. A lot of the credit has to go to the had work of Pa McCarthy – that's a shrewd voice added to Jack O'Connor's managemnt team – but the likes of Richard Cotter and the many underage coaches in the area dseverve enormous credit as well. It's not a coincidence that St. Kierans are the Kerry Minor Champions. This was a hard battle all the way through but goals from Michael Horan and Ruarí Brosnan got Castleisland the win.

It's early days, but you'd fancy St. Pats to beat Abbey CBS in the next round – fair warning, that big defeat to Mounthawk does not mean that Abbey are necessarily weak; I don't see anybody except maybe Traee CS really landing a glove on Mounthawk, truth be told. But Castleisland have a great chance of advancing to the knock-out stages, and that' a big step forward for them.

Group Four IS Killorglin 2-5 Patrician Mallow 3-13

Mllow went to a semi-final last year, losing out to Tralee CS, and it genuinely was no surprise to me. They have six of that starting team back again and they will be just as dangerous again. Killorglin are back in the A grade after a three year absence, and the fact that ISK and Pres. Milltown are both in the Corn Uí Mhuirí is indicative of population trends; I thinkMid Kerry is a growing force in Kerry football. Killorglin put up a great early battle but could only find points from Fionn Kennedy and Tomás Joy, and a goal from Dylan O'Connell gave Mallow a hard-earned 1-4 to 0-2 half-time lead. Cian Cooney added another Mallow goal early in the second half but Charlie Griffi maintained his habit of nicking in for goals. Mallow were that litle bit better at picking off ther points and while Fionn Kennedy did get in for a second ISK goal late on, it was the Cork side who pulled awav.

De La Salle Macroom 1-15 Mitchelstown CBS 2-5

Macroom, coached by Kerry's Shane Ryan, sent out a real warning notice. They ave a lot of last year's team, more than I expected, including the likes of Denis O'Mullane (1-3) and Seán O'Leary (0-4 from wing back). Mitchelstown gave them a very good battle. It was 1-4 to 0-7 at half-time but Macroom's greatr firepower, especally from long distance, saw them begin to pull away in the second half. A late Mitchelstown goal from a penalty rebound trimmed the gap, but Macroom were full value for their win. Killorglin basically have to win their next two games, and there is absolutely nothing easy in this group. Up against it, I'm afraid.

Group Five Tralee CS 2-15 PS Chorca Dhuibhne 0-12

A much, much closer game than it sounds. PS Chorca Dhuibhne gave every bit as good as they got and can feel very hard done by. For fifty minutes there was nothing between two excellent sides -if anything, Corca Dhuibhne actually deserved obe ahead, considering that Oisín O'Hallran had denied Cian Mac Gearailt with a stunning save. But when the chips were down, a very experienced Tralee side rose to the challenge. With ten minutes left, the Green led by 1-9 to 0-11. Then last year's finalists finally cut loose. Key to it was Liam Óg O'Connor from Ardfert. The dual player was absolutely immense, with no less a player than two year Kerry minor Seán Ó Cuinn simply bouncing off him harmlessly, and he helped set up five points on the trot that effectively killed the game. Corca Dhuibhne wll be disappointed at the result, but certainly not the display; their fate will depend on the result against Pres. Milltown (a three team group is merciless) and it's all to play for. Tralee CBS? This result along, especially a nine point scoring difference, practically guarntees them the knock-out stages. Ominously - and I'm surprised it wasn't mentioned by people afterwards they did this without Ryan O'Driscoll, Seán Óg Brosnan, and Garóid White. Any of that trio would litrally walk onto any other starting fifteen in the whole competition. Tralee are only gearing up as yet. As I say, a repeat of last year's final would not surrise too many people at all, especially considering the Tralee pair wll be meeting in this year's O'Sullivan Cup as well. Pres. Milltown a Bve

SOCCER European Qualifier Ireland 6 Georgia 0

The first of a two legged play-off. Georgia, with respect, would not be very highly rated in the womens' game. Ireland were fairly wasteful in the first half and a dogged Georgia were able to keep it to 1-0 until an unlucky but fairly blatant handball allowed KatieMcCabe to blast home from the penalty spot. 1-0 at half-time, and I kind of doubt that Eileen Gleeson was singing too many players' praises in the dressing room. However, coming up to the 60 minute mark, Kyra Caruso scored with a very clever back flick of Abbie Larkin's ball in and suddenly Ireland were finding cruise control. The last quarter was a procession. Katie McCabe chipped the keeper - honestly, that should have been a bread and butter save. Jessie Stapleton kind of forced the ball in with her body from an inswinging corner – VAR took far too long; I'm assuming they suspected handball but make the call one way or another, people. Marissa Sheeva made it ive in a long injury time and there was still time for Aoife Mannion to nod home a fifth and effectively kill the tie in the first leg.

Possibly more significant is Slovakia's 2-1 win over Wales. We are almost certan to be facing th winner of that two-leg tie or a place in the European Championships, which would be a great achievement for Eileen Gleeson.

England's Lionesses lost 2-0 to Germany, but only a fool would read too much into that. Erik Ten Hag becomes the latest manager to walk away from Manchester United. It's been inevitable since he slow start to this season. 12th place isn't where they would expect to be I don't actually think it's an unfair reflection of their play. Good luck to Ruben Amorin, but hat won't have any happy ending either. The top players are not joining a team sitting in 12th place in England, guaranteed European footbal is a minimum expectation. 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



"Justice will rule in the wilderness and righteousness in the fertile field. And this righteousness will bring peace. Yes, it will bring quietness and confidence forever. My people will live in safety, quietly at home. They will be at rest. Even if the forest should be destroyed and the city torn down the Lord will greatly bless His people..." (Isaiah 30:16-20).

Welcome back dear student, firstly, a huge bravo to all those who travelled to the March For Jesus in Dublin last week. It was a huge success. The organisers received great feedback from the Guards who policed the event with excellence. The sound of the worship resounded throughout the city - it was spine tingling. Praise God for His Mercy for Ireland, and next year's event will no doubt be even bigger, as us Christians let government know that as people of faith we may not be the loudest voices, BUT we are many; AND we are committed to see the darkness turned back (Isaiah 60:1). It was an encouraging day for each to see that we are not alone, and though it may feel like things are dark right now, the Truth is the devil is still a liar, and God is still on the Throne - and His people are willing to take a stand for Him.

In trouble folks are quick to call upon the Lord. Relationship with God can be taken for granted or become a ritualistic habit. Like a . . . 'Hey - I need something God, where are you?
