

# Message in a Bottle' INITIATIVE

Killarney Lions Club has launched a new initiative called Message in a Bottle aimed at helping older people, people living alone and people with medical conditions in cases of emergency. Message in a Bottle is a simple idea that encourages people to keep their basic medical details in a common place where, in cases of emergency, it can be easily accessed by Paramedics, Gardaí, Fire-fighters, and first responders.

The initiative was launched on Monday 27th November at the Killarney Avenue Hotel. It was attended by representatives from medical, emergency, first responder and retirement organisations in the Killarney area. They heard about the benefits of the initiative, which started in Ireland eight years ago, from Damian Carbery, National Coordinator of Message in a Bottle, Lions Ireland, and James O'Loughlin, Ennis Lions Club.

The 'bottles' (a plastic container) will be distributed through various organisations over the coming months. A person who wants to use

it completes their personal and medical information on a form that is then put in the container. They then put the container in the fridge, and put self-adhesive green crosses on the front door of their home and on the door of the fridge. In the event of an accident or incident within the home, the first responder/ emergency services on the scene will be alerted to the bottle by the label on the door.

"When we heard about Message in a Bottle from Lions Ireland we felt it benefit the local community in Killarney," said Denis Doolan, President of Killarney Lions Club. "We suggested it to emergency, first responder and medical organisations who provide such services in our community, and they were very supportive. If it helps even just one person to get the help they need more quickly and effectively, it will be well worth it." 

#### **KERRY FOOD HUB HONOURED**

#### AT CHAMBERS IRELAND ANNUAL AWARDS

The innovation and employment offered by the Kerry Food Hub based in Firies has been recognised this week with a prestigious national award. Kerry County Council was presented with an honour at the Chambers Ireland annual awards at the weekend in recognition of how the Food Hub promotes economic development in the county.

The Kerry Food Hub is managed by a board of social entrepreneurs and its purpose-built food production facilities in Firies provide start-up entrepreneurs and food businesses with the opportunity to expand and develop in purpose-built facilities.

Since opening in 2016, the Hub's artisan occupants have quickly built strong relationships with food industry professionals in their key markets. They have also found the Hub a great location from which to serve retail

outlets in the major urban centres in the county.

In 2022, The Kerry Food Hub, completed ten new 1,000sq ft food grade production units and launched artisanmarket. ie, a multi-vendor online marketplace linking artisan food producers and professional buyers.

Fifty-five people are currently employed by the food entrepreneurs operating from the Kerry Food Hub.

Cathaoirleach of the Castleisland-Corca Dhuibhne Municipal District, Cllr Bobby O'Connell said:

"The overall aim of the Kerry Food Hub is to enhance employment, it was the was the vision of local farmer David Gleeson. # Not a single house for the town that pays the highest rates in the county

The town that pays the highest share of rates in the county won't get a single social house in the next two years, the annual budget meeting of Kerry County Council heard.

It was Labour councillor Marie Moloney who highlighted and spotted the anomaly in the housing table.

"The housing delivery programme is very disappointing in the Killarney Electoral Area to 2025. There is not one single house. Absolutely nothing."

Short of six apartments in Flemming's Lane, Killarney was getting nothing, she repeated "Killarney pays more rates than anywhere else," Marie continued to some jeering from non-Killarney councillors. "Yet nothing, not a house" was being built to show for the hefty rates contribution.

Luckily, a housing body in Barraduff had built houses, she added.

"I want to see something happen on the ground, some development in Killarney. It's just not good enough,' she said, referring to the council's commitment to get a loan to buy housing land.

The meeting also heard how working people were being excluded from the housing market and it was really only those on social welfare who could qualify for a social house. €670 a week for a single person and 723 for a couple was the threshold, which meant

a working family would not qualify, Tralee's to Dublin for a graduation scheduled that Sam Locke pointed out. Wednesday in nearby Buswell's. Only to find

"Only a person on the dole can qualify," he said.

Enterprising Killarney - away from the rich agricultural resources of north Kerry - is all too often the focus of envy in the council. Aoife Thornton of Listowel said Killarney had plenty of pools yet its sport and Leisure centre was getting an allocation of  $\[ \in \]$ 411,000 while there was only  $\[ \in \]$ 60,000 for the north Kerry pools of Ballybunion and Tralee.

I have found this 'Killarney gets too much attitude right across the county in my decades of covering council meetings. It is cross party too. Sinn Fein were especially fixated at one stage - An exception is Mayor Jim Finucane of Fine Gael. As chairman of the Kerry Education Board he has been very even handed and has even promoted a third level college for the town.

It does not stop with political representatives. I have had heated arguments in Tralee with senior council officials, now retired, about Killarney 'taking everything'. Actually, Killarney gets very little, other than what it does for itself.

#### The tinder box

The Dublin riots shocked the nation and damaged its reputation. The Parnell Square area of Dublin and the north west inner city area is shockingly down at heel and has suffered from decades of neglect.

It is an area of social deprivation with generations. While columnists in ivory towers fret over the rise of the far left and the far right (or is it the other way around?) across Europe, the real underlying reason is close to home: Ignoring the cry for help. Only the late Tony Gregory, one of my heroes, tried to do anything. And he failed.

Meanwhile, at the other end of town just the previous week, wall to wall security was thrown up when a protest in support of Palestine was announced. We had gone to Dublin for a graduation scheduled that Wednesday in nearby Buswell's. Only to find it cancelled and the whole area cordoned off after we got off the train, well before any sign of trouble.

Contrast this with Thursday last where even the crime scene had been disturbed and crowds had already gathered. And no convincing response. One of the few commentators to identify perhaps the reason for the riots was journalist Emma O'Kelly on the RTE website.'The tinder is there ready to ignite' - Dublin riots (rte.ie)

Quoting a school principal, her piece pointed directly at the social inequalities and the 'tinder' being ready to be harnessed by sinister elements.

The effect of immigration on communities deprived with generations has been ignored. There is no interrogation either of the sometimes overwhelming feeling and mental health repercussions of large and sudden immigration on locals in towns like Killarney, Tralee and Rosslare. Of no longer hearing your own language on the street, for instance. Not to mind seeing a GP. Think about this for a minute. Ireland was a closed society for centuries apart from the English and the odd German. There is sudden large immigration. No one in authority allows any kind of discussion except to patronise us all as 'welcoming' when they land communities with thousands of guests. But if a question is raised, we are shut down and cancelled as racist! Politicians across all parties, and the main media too, are losing the room on immigration. I liken their lack of attention to bad parents who allow an older child languish ignored in the corner while the new baby, naturally enough, demands - but is given all the attention. Good parents ensure the older child is listened to, and they take time to ask him how he feels. It's time our politicians, and maybe our media too, learned some good parenting tricks.

#### Clapping, alas, no longer

The fine Irish tradition of clapping when flights landed has gone, alas. I miss that and so do others I know.

It represented a kind of innocence. A wonder. Like the wonder of childhood. We hadn't always been an island who took to the skies. Partly because we couldn't afford Aer Lingus! And when we did fly, we were overjoyed and over-anxious too. There was a complexity of feeling. When we landed there was sheer relief. Everyone in the plane broke out in spontaneous applause and clapped

the pilot. I loved it. Even when it became sort of embarrassing and the sophisticated Europeans next to me looked bewildered.

When did the clapping stop?

Something tells me we have changed, changed utterly. It's probably called self-consciousness. Maybe we are too aware of ourselves these days.

And I have another question for airlines. When did travel mags become all advertisements and no picture stories? Some changes are not for the good. We still need stories and pictures to look at.

#### HR ADVICE AHEAD OF WORKPLACE CHRISTMAS PARTY SEASON!

A Christmas party can be a great team-building opportunity. However, there is common mistakes and mishaps that can happen and leave an employer liable. Very often workplaces throw caution to the wind with these events but whilst most workplace Christmas parties end up being great fun events, some things can go wrong and when they do, they can go badly wrong. So, employers need to plan

#### What is the advice?

It is important that Employers ensure that employees understand the standard of conduct expected of them at these events, and that they are expected to observe the provisions of the Dignity at Work policy and anti-bullying and harassment policies at work-related events.

The actions of employees at a Christmas party may potentially damage working relationships, and reflect negatively on the business and lead to complaints or possible disciplinary actions. Employers have a duty of care to all employees and should take reasonable steps to ensure that inappropriate conduct at these events does not arise.

#### What are some reasonable steps an employer can take to prevent an incident occurring?

Prior to holding the Christmas party, or any work-related event at any stage of the year, it should be made clear to employees that should there be an incident or a subsequent allegation, that these will be dealt with in exactly the same manner as if the incident had occurred during working hours.

Policies which should be brought to employee's attention prior to the event should be: The Dignity at Work policy, Email and social media policy, Attendance at work policy & Grievance and disciplinary policies

#### Employers need to keep in mind:

Attendance - If the Christmas party is out of hours, employees should be made aware of the fact that they are not obliged to attend.

Drink - Employers also need to be sensitive to employees who don't drink alcohol, and should ensure there are non-alcoholic drinks available.

Inappropriate discussions - Christmas parties or work-related events are not the appropriate location for discussions in relation to performance, promotion, salary or career prospects. Words of encouragement and good intentions can be misinterpreted and may cause future issues.

Absence management - Where the Christmas party falls on a day when employees will be required to attend work the following day, employers should communicate to staff not to be at work under the influence of alcohol so that they do not endanger their own or another person's health and safety at work.

Social Media - Not all publicity is good publicity! So, inform employees that they should not post pictures or comments to social media that would adversely affect the company's reputation or the privacy of colleagues. They should also be aware of the consequences of a breach.

# URGES KERRY SCHOOLS TO APPLY FOR NEW SOLAR PANEL GRANTS

Minister for Education Norma Foley has urged schools in Kerry to apply for solar panel grants to reduce their energy costs and their emissions.


The solar for scheme will provide eligible schools with 6 kilowatts of roof-mounted solar PV, which equates to approximately 16 solar panels.

Kerry is one of the 11 counties in the country in the first phase of the Solar for Schools scheme.

The Department of Education is contacting Kerry's 132 primary schools, 26 secondary schools and 3 special schools to encourage them to apply. Minister Foley said: I hope that as many schools as possible in Kerry apply for this scheme to reduce their energy costs and their carbon emissions." Minister Foley said that the installation of solar panels would allow schools to make savings on their energy bills every year.

"It will significantly reduce costs for schools by between €1,200 and €1,600 euro per year if they have 16 solar PV panels installed," she said. The solar PV panels in schools will be connected to the electricity grid, so that the schools can generate income by powering other homes and businesses with clean energy when schools are closed at weekends and during school holidays.

Minister Foley said that schools can apply for the scheme quickly and easily online using the new School Hub system, once they get three

quotes from solar PV contractors.

"It is our absolute intention that it will be very much a user friendly application process. So for the very first time, we're using our geographic information system as a means for schools to liase wit hthe department. There will be very little time required for an online application and it should proceed very quickly," she said.

Schools will be provided with funding from the Department of Education to have the PV panels installed by a registered contractor, with guidance from the Department of Education.

The rollout will begin in 11 counties - Kerry, Clare, Donegal, Galway, Kilkenny, Leitrim, Limerick, Offaly, Waterford, Wicklow and the Dublin City Council area in Dublin.

The intention is to include a further eight counties in phase two in Q2 2024 and the remaining eight counties in Q4 2024. It is intended that all eligible schools across the country will have the opportunity to apply to the scheme by end 2024.







The 5 Ways to Wellbeing are simple actions to practice each day to maintain or improve our mental health and wellbeing.

Connect: Make time each day to connect with people around you – family, friends, colleagues and neighbours, at home, work school or in your local community. By staying connected and nurturing these relationships we feel happier and more secure, giving us a better sense of purpose.

Go for a walk or a run. Step outside. Cycle, play a game, garden or dance. Discover a physical activity you enjoy which suits your lifestyle and level of mobility and fitness. Research has shown that being physically active can improve your mental health and wellbeing.

Take Notice: Be aware of the world around you and what you are feeling. Be curious. Catch sight of the beautiful. Notice the changing seasons. Savour the moment whether you are walking to work, eating lunch or talking to friends. Pay attention to the present moment - to your thoughts, feelings and to the world around you.

Keep Learning: Try something new. Rediscover an old interest. Sign up for that course. Cook a new recipe. Take on a new responsibility. Setting yourself a new challenge and learning a new skill will increase your confidence which can improve your mental health and wellbeing. Give: Giving to others is good for you. Do something nice for someone else. Thank someone. Volunteer your time or join a community group. To see yourself and your happiness linked to the wider community can be incredibly rewarding and create connectedness with the people around you.

Kerry Mental Health Association has expressed its sincere thanks to the principals, teachers and students at Presentation Secondary School, St Patrick's Secondary School and Castleisland Community College for taking part in this great mental health initiative.

The charity intends to engage with the schools again for a new project in 2024 with a view to promoting the mental health and wellbeing of the students and their families.

#### RSA URGES ADULTS NOT TO GIFT E-SCOOTERS, SCRAMBLERS OR QUAD BIKES THIS CHRISTMAS

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) is urging adults not to purchase e-scooters, scramblers or quad bikes for any children this Christmas.

Following the passing of legislation earlier this year permitting their use, people will be allowed to drive e-scooters on Irish roads next year. However, under the regulations, children will not be allowed to use them. Under the legislation, which will come into force in 2024, you must be 16 years or older to use an e-scooter

The RSA is also reminding parents that quad bikes and scramblers pose a safety risk to children and are urging

them not to gift them this Christmas.

Three e-scooter riders were killed and 48 seriously injured on Irish roads between January 1 2022 and September 24 2023. During the same period, one other road user was killed and 11 more seriously injured in collisions involving e-scooters.

Casualty figures show that between 2017 and 2021, 88 people were injured in collisions involving a quadbike or scrambler on a public road. In the same period, there were four fatalities involving quad bikes or scramblers on public roads.

#### **COMMON EYE CONDITIONS**

#### Glaucoma

Glaucoma represents a number of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged. It is often asymptomatic and is often linked to raised pressure within the eve.

When the nerve is damaged, it starts to cause problems with peripheral vision and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage.

#### Cataract

A cataract happens when either all or part of the lens in the eye becomes cloudy. There are different types of cataract, but the most common is agerelated cataract.

Cataracts are very common, being the main cause of impaired vision in the world. If left untreated they can lead to partial or total sight loss.

Cataracts are very easily diagnosed by optometrists.

#### Age-related macular degeneration

Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) affects the central part of the vision and is caused by damage to the macular region of the eye, which is the part of the retina that provides high-resolution, central vision.

There are two main types of AMD – dry and wet. AMD is the most common cause of sightimpairment that affects older people.

#### **Dry Eye**

Dry eye syndrome is a common condition that occurs when the eyes do not produce enough tears or they evaporate too quickly.

Dry eve can lead to the eve becoming red, swollen and irritated, and in certain cases cause considerable discomfort for the sufferer. In very rare cases dry eye can be a sight threatening condition.

#### Red eye

Red eve comprises a number conditions such conjunctivitis or burst blood vessels in the eye and are usually nothing to be unduly concerned about.

However, if the eye is painful this could be a sign of something more serious such as iritis (inflammation) or acute glaucoma.

While the majority of red eve conditions are shortterm issues, they could be a symptom of other more serious conditions, such as acute glaucoma which is medically urgent and could result in loss of sight in that eye.

#### Watery eye (epiphora)

Watery eve is a condition that is usually caused either by tears not draining correctly from the eye or, paradoxically, as a result of an underlying dry eye condition which results in irritation.

This can cause blurred vision, sore eyelids, swelling and vision impairment. Severe cases of watery eye can cause significant discomfort sufferers.

# Benefits and entitlements following a death

After a bereavement you may need financial support. The Department of Social Protection (DSP) provides certain once-off payments to help out families during this difficult time. Your local Community Welfare Officer deals with some of these payments.

You must have made a certain number of PRSI contributions to be eligible for some social welfare payments. You may be eligible for other payments, if you pass a means test or if you are in urgent need. Time limits apply for many payments, so apply as early as is possible.

You cannot be expected to do everything right away, but if the deceased was getting a social welfare payment or you were claiming for them as a dependant or you were getting a Carer's Allowance to look after them, it's important that you notify the Department within the first few days of the death.

Notifying the Department does not mean the payment will be taken back immediately. In many cases, the spouse, civil partner, cohabitant, parent or carer may continue to receive a payment for 6 weeks following the death.

## What happens when a person being cared for dies & carer was in receipt of Carers Benefit/

Payment of Carer's Allowance (full or half-rate) continues to be made for 12 weeks after the death of the person you were caring for while payment of Carer's Benefit continues to be made for 6 weeks after the death of the person you were caring for.

If you are getting Carer's Allowance (full or half-rate) on behalf of a spouse, civil partner or cohabitant and that person dies, you can continue to get Carer's Allowance for 12 weeks plus the State Pension/Invalidity Pension/Disability Allowance etc (if in payment to that person) for 6 weeks after the date of death. If you were getting Carer's Benefit, you continue to get it for 6 weeks and any payments your spouse or partner was getting.

Domiciliary Care Allowance continues to be paid for 3 months in cases where the child being cared for has died.

## Is there any help available with funeral costs? You can get help with the cost of the funeral in certain circumstances. The Widowed or Surviving Civil Partner Grant is a once-off payment to widows/widowers/surviving civil partners with dependent children. This grant is a once-off payment of €8,000.

If someone dies from an accident at work, a Funeral Grant is available. To be eligible for this grant, the death must have resulted from an accident at work, an accident while travelling directly to or from work or an occupational disease. It amounts to €850.

Whether you qualify or not for one of the above grants you may be eligible for an Additional Needs Payment to help with funeral costs if you are on a low income. Each case is decided on its merits. The Community Welfare Service prefers if you apply before the funeral takes place, but in practice, most people apply afterwards.

In many cases a payment or a grant cannot be paid until all the necessary documentation is received. If you are claiming the grant, you are responsible for the production of certificates, documents and any information required, for example:

- Death certificate
- · Birth certificate
- Marriage or Civil Partnership certificate (to prove your relationship to the deceased)
- Funeral receipts
- The deceased person's Personal Public Service (PPS) number
- Your PPS number may also be required What social welfare payments are available to the bereaved?

If you were living with or dependent on the deceased, any current benefits or payments you are getting may change, or you may be able to claim additional benefits. Depending on your income and circumstances you may be entitled to a social welfare payment in your own right. A Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's Contributory Pension and related social welfare benefits may be payable if either you or your deceased spouse or civil partner has enough PRSI contributions.

A Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's (Non-Contributory) Pension is paid

to widowed people or surviving civil partners without dependent children, who do not qualify for a contributory pension and who pass a means test.

A Guardian's payment is paid to the child's guardian up to the child's 18th birthday or 22nd birthday if he or she is in fulltime education.

A One-Parent Family Payment can be paid to you if you are parenting alone as a result of the death of your spouse, civil partner or cohabitant. If you also qualify for a Widow's, Widower's or Surviving Civil Partner's Contributory Pension you will have to choose which payment is of most benefit to you because you cannot get both.

If a person dies because of an accident at work or occupational disease, Death Benefit under the Occupational Injuries Scheme may be paid to their surviving spouse or civil partner.

## Are there any other additional payments?

Bereavement can cause financial

difficulties. The Supplementary Welfare Allowance Scheme provides financial support to people with low incomes. You may qualify for a weekly supplement payment under the scheme to meet certain special needs, for example, help with rent and fuel costs. In addition, payments can also be made for urgent or exceptional needs.

There are specific rules about taxation in the year of a person's death, for example, a tax refund may be due. There are also extra credits for parents in the years following the death of a spouse or civil partner. If you are a widowed person or a surviving civil partner, you can claim an increased personal tax credit. The amount of the tax credit depends on whether or not you have dependent children and when your spouse or civil partner died.

#### KATIE TAYLOR BECOME UNDISPUTED WORLD CHAMPION

The last time that Katie Taylor locked horns with the undisputed super-lightweight world champion Chantelle Cameron, it was the English girl who triumphed in a contest for the ages – something that boxing in general has been lacking for too long as the big guns in the mens' heavyweight scene continue to play ducks and drakes and bluster. There was none of that here; two professionals who spoke respectfully about each other and set about their business in the 3Arena with refreshing honesty and fantastic skill.

On this occasion, Katie had her homework done and let Cameron dictate the pace, staying out of trouble with fast feet and even faster flurries of counter-punches, which has always been the best weapon in her arsenal. She didn't talk too much in the week coming up to the fight, staying politely guarded, and she didn't play to any gallery as she entered. There was no showmanship here, and no need for it. The boxing spoke for itself.

Just as in the first fight, a few of the judges' scorecards didn't really reflect the fight (98-92? What fight was that lad watching?) but the result was fair.

The first round was tight, with Cameron looking to lay down a marker but not really getting the shots on target. Taylor did slip to the ground at one stage, but it was just a slip and the referee knew that.

The second round was....I won't say all Katie, but she was the one landing the shots. Cameron probably needed to adjust her gameplan at that stage, but that's very easy for me to say from the sofa. A clash of heads drew a cut on Cameron – unlucky, but a confidence boost for the challenger in front of her home crowd.

In fairness to Cameron, she has guts and came back hard in the fifth. The question now was whether she could sap Katie's energy – the Bray woman is 37, and at this elite sporting level, that counts. But it was Cameron who was doing the pushing. She did make up a lot of ground in the fifth, with Katie forced to clinch her way out of trouble, but she was back to her best in the sixth, landing a big right. She was still clinching, but now it was more tactical than desperation. breaking Cameron's momentum. Cameron did land some great shots late on, but she knew she was in trouble and so did Katie, who stayed very calm and continued to fight her own fight, keeping the distance and nailing those fast counters.

A defeat here would probably have been the end of the road for Katie. But victory, hard-fought against such a tough opponent, means that at a time when people are finding Tyson Fury talented but tiresome, there are two fighters whom everybody and anybody would



surely want to see meet again to decide the trilogy. Does Croke Park beckon? I'm not so sure that public pressure – and there will be plenty – will hold as much sway as commentators seem to think.

Is Katie the greatest Irish sportswoman ever? I'll still give my nod to the great Sonia O'Sullivan, largely based on a mainstream rather than a minority (but growing) sport, but just like this fight, it's a very close-run thing.

## SLIABH LUACHRA BOXER IN WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Best wishes to Mary McDonagh of Sliabh Luachra BC who as I write is currently preparing for her quarter-final in the World Junior Boxing Championships in Yerevan, Armenia. Mary's rise in amateur ranks has been nothing short of phenomenal in the past two years. She is the current All Ireland and All Cadet champion and the current European silver medallist. She recently won the Manchester and Barum Cup Box Tournaments in England, being named best female boxer in the latter, as well as winning gold against the Hungarian champion while representing Munster recently. In a week where Kelly Harrington and Michaela Walsh at the IABA National Elite Boxing Championships, it's great to see a Kerry boxer following in the footsteps of Katie Taylor and helping to forge a path first walked by the Bray phenomenon.

To say that it was asking a lot of the Kerry Intermediate Champions to see off their Cork counterparts in a Munster semi-final just one week after that pulsating battle in Tralee is not to take anything away from John Evans or his Cill na Martra team. They were magnificently resolute and earned their win the hard way, especially having come in as underdogs in popular opinion.

It looked good for Milltown/Castlemaine as Brendan Casey and Éanna O'Connor (f) nudged them into a two point lead. In fact, they had what looked like a good case for a penalty when Éanna O'Connor appeared to be held back in the square. However, Cill na Martra soon fired up their engines and kicked three points in a row through Seán and Cianie Ó Fóirréidh and a Damien Ó hUrdail free. In fact, they could have led by more; Cill na Martra were ferociously winning ball but not always making the best use of it. Éanna O'Connor levelled matters with a superb free. Seán Ó Fóirréidh and Tadhq Ó Corcara both came up on the overlap from the half back line to kick great scores that put Milltown/Castlemaine 0-5 to 0-3 ahead. Cathal Moriarty, a driving force all through, fisted over to pull one back but Damien Ó hUrdail restored that two point gap at half-time, 0-6 to 0-4.

Clanmaurice made it back to back Munster intermediate titles but, worryingly, were down to the bare bones, with just seventeen in total on the panel, including a sub goalkeeper.

Clanmaurice showed a greater ability to take their scores in a game that was a slow burner initially. They led by 0-3 to 0-0 after seventeen minutes, Patrice Diggin with two well-struck frees and Anne Marie Leen with a great score from play. Aoife McLoughney and Patrice Diggin exchanged scores but the Tipperary side, in fairness to them, were getting a grip on proceedings now. Clanmaurice's defence was under pressure but that's a great defence and they were always able to clear their lines. McLoughney did pick off two frees and corner back Áine Linnane hit a great point to leave it deadlocked at 0-4 apiece at the break.

Clanmaurice were in trouble at the start of the second half as Gillian McKenna gathered a high ball and struck for a Shannon Rovers goal. Brilliantly executed, but not a chance I'd have expected Clanmaurice to cough up, to be honest. The unflappable Diggin picked off two frees to trim the gap and Caoimhe Spillane hit a trademark score from play. Rovers replied but Patrice fired over two more to nudge the Kerry outfit in front and added another after good work by Jackie Horgan.

Then came disaster, as McLoughney's low '45 in the 62nd minute somehow evaded a tangle of bodies and slipped into the net. Clanmaurice a point down and just seconds left. Comet the hour....cometh Patrice Diggin. She superbly won the puck-out and won a free. It would have been an extremely difficult one for anybody else, but that's just bread and butter stuff to her and the white flag was duly raised.

Jackie Horgan and Patrice ('45) put Clanmaurice in front at the start of extra-time and Jackie Horgan's clever strike of a ball across from Ciara Moloney ended up in the net. McLoughney pulled one back before the turnaround but Clanmaurice with a four point advantage were not to be overhauled, restricting Rovers to just one point while Patrice took her own tally to 0-11.

The issue of playing numbers is one that will need to be considered in the long term. Camogie has seen quite a rise in Kerry over the past decade or so and Clanmaurice have most definitely been the flagship. The likes of Killarney camogie are coming through strongly at underage but there is still a gap that needs to be filled. The simple truth is that Kerry have fantastic skill on the playing fields in camogie, but plenty of space on the subs' bench and at the levels Kerry are aspiring to, that comes with a price tag. However, that's a discussion for another day; this should be one of celebration as Clanmaurice prepare for an All Ireland semifinal against Kilmessan of Meath. The two sides famously met in the All Ireland Junior Final in 2017, with Kilmessan prevailing in a replay. Nine of the current Clanmaurice panel played in those games.

## O'SULLIVAN CUP FINAL PREVIEW

St. Brendans Killarney v Mercy Mounthawk, Tuesday Dec 5th at 1.00pm, Austin Stack Park

The pair met in a Corn Uí Mhuirí semi-final and the O'Sullivan Cup Final last year, with St. Brendans prevailing in both and eventually capturing both cups.

This year both have again looked like the form teams on view, albeit this time around Mounthawk look like slight favourites.

Both sides came unscathed through the earlier stages before the Corn Uí Mhuirí kicked off. The Sem dismissed St. Michaels Listowel with plenty to spare and then saw off a young but talented Corca Dhuibhne side by 4-14 to 1-15. The scoreline may have been a little flattering but the victory was deserved, with Alex Hennigan notching 1-7 and Callum Cronin 2-2. Mounthawk got a tough enough test from St. Pats Castleisland, only pulling away late on, before beating Coláiste an Sceilge by just a single point, and could be grateful to a lucky enough long ball that dropped into the Coláiste na Sceilge net at a crucial moment. Paddy Lane, not surprisingly after his star turns with Mounthawk last year and the Kerry minors this year, was the main man with a remarkable 0-12 to his name.

Nobody laid a glove on Mercy Mounthawk in the Corn Uí Mhuirí group stage as they topped their group with plenty to spare. The Sem had a tougher road, though. They opened with a confidence-boosting victory over Coláiste Choilm Ballincollig but came out of Rathkeale's 3G artificial pitch with a draw against St. Flannans. That left things dicey and the Sem needing to beat a strong Patrician Academy Mallow to be sure of progression and they did so with a 0-13 to 0-8 victory in Banteer last Wednesday week.

The Sem have a great defence. Shay O'Meara is a superb keeper. Dara Stack was my man of the match against Patrician Mallow and Luke Daly in particular showed some really tigerish defending as well. Kerry U20 Keelan O'Shea is a mainstay of the team, with pacy Luke O'Neill and Adam Byrne well able to drive forward.

In midfield, Jamie Moynihan needs absolutely no introduction and is growing in authority with every game (also well able to pick off his own score from range as well) while I think Jack O'Sullivan is very under-rated. He has played very well this year.

Up front it's no secret that the Sem are fairly reliant on Callum Cronin as the creator and Alex Hennigan as the executioner. That's a little too simple, Josh Bowler's speed will become more prominent as he gets game-time under his belt (he was committed to a soccer contract until recently) and both Oisín Fleming and Pádraig O'Donoghue are well capable of kicking good scores

Nonetheless, the fact is that Mounthawk will quite wisely be targeting Hennigan inside. It would not surprise me if Mounthawk manager Aidan O'Shea drops Jack Murphy back and brings Oisín McGibney out to pick up Callum Cronin. That's a big sacrifice as the younger of the Murphy brothers has been a driving force for them, but possibly a necessary one. Mounthawk have a great goalkeeper in Michael Tansley, the senior keeper for St. Brendans' divisional team, but I haven't seen that full back line under real pressure yet. Mind you, that's because Mounthawk are so dominant in most of their games.

Daniel Kirby and Cian O'Gara are a formidable midfield pairing – Kirby especially will have to be watched as he likes to break forward and score.

Attack is where Mounthawk are dangerous.

the forty. Iomas Kennedy is a big man inside – personally, I'd move Seán Corkery in from the right wing and switch Kennedy out to the forty, he has more to his arsenal than a role as a target man demonstrates. Paddy Lane is absolutely lethal if he gets a fraction of time on the ball to set himself up and he is merely deadly when under pressure. You can't get too close to him; he's too quick on the turn and has an unerring instinct for goal. When you add in the likes of Niall Collins (a brilliant kick-passer), James Fisher, and an under-rated Noah Townsend, Mounthawk are holding a lot of aces.

Injuries, unfortunately, will be a key feature. That's just a hard truth of football in December, especially after so long a playing season. As it stands, the Sem are missing their captain Timmy Moynihan, Maidhcí Lynch, and Neil O'Carroll, while Mounthawk are almost certainly going to be without Ben Murphy (the Stacks man is probably the best player of his age group, and I'd argue that holds true even in a national sense).

The momentum probably favours Mounthawk slightly for this one, and they would absolutely relish winning their first ever O'Sullivan Cup, not to mention a little payback for last year's defeat. But as always, the O'Sullivan Cup, like a lot of colleges' football, defies predictions. I'm looking forward to a great game.

#### SOCCER Kerry FC

Unfortunately, I'm not a fan of the recent news out of Kerry FC. I always get jittery when a club doesn't have a manager in place. This is actually the busiest time for managers. Anyone who follows any professional league in any sport will tell you that this is when you target your recruitment. You check who is in or out of contract. You look at what's coming through your system and see what's coming through others. You make your phone calls.

Look, Conor McCarthy is a great coach and he'll make a fantastic Head Coach. James Sugrue is as experienced as any KDL player and was on the sideline and Derek O'Shea was one of the

but a team manager at simply a different thing. You need one person making those decisions on a day to day basis. You need a fulcrum. You need a captain on deck for any ship to sail smoothly. I'm going to worry until Kerry FC appoint an actual manager, and the sooner that happens, the better.

Brian Ainscough's switch to Dundalk FC appeared from the outside to have been a surprise decision to most of the people involved. Losing your main investor never looks good, but I'm actually less concerned at that. My understanding is that Ainscough was essentially the head of a consortium whose finances are largely remaining with Kerry FC. He got the chance to invest in a League of Ireland Premiership club with a strong established record instead of a fledgling club. I can't blame him in those circumstances. Certainly LOI clubs look like a reasonably decent investment at the moment as attendances continue to show an upward curve, but how sustainable any of that is remains to be seen, especially with the limitations on facilities. European competitions

around €200,000 to an LOI club. Winning the League is around half that, while Jonathan Hill is paid about 20% more.

Regardless of how sound the investment model is, I wish Brian Ainscough nothing but luck. This is the guy who more than anyone else made League of Ireland soccer happen in Kerry. It would not have happened without him, and I hope it continues and prospers in his absence.







#### BEAUFORT BRIDGE TO BEAUFORT VILLAGE

## MONSIGNOR HUGH O'FLAHERTY

been asked by Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill, to include a fitting memorial to the internationally renowned World War 2 hero, Monsignor Hugh O'Flaherty, in the Public Realm plans for Cahersiveen town, under the Town Regeneration Plan. Monsignor O'Flaherty, a former resident Cahersiveen who was responsible for saving the lives

of 6,500 Allied soldiers and Jews in Rome, during the conflict, is buried in the grounds of the Daniel O'Connell Memorial Church in Cahersiveen town centre.

"Mons O'Flaherty became known as the Scarlet Pimpernel of the Vatican during his heroic exploits and he still has strong family connections with Cahersiveen. His neice Pearl Dineen was interviewed on Nationwide on RTE the other night, in a programme dedicated to him. The remains of Monsignor O'Flaherty rest in peace in the grounds of the Daniel O'Connell Memorial Church since his death in Cahersiveen on the 30/11/1963, 60 years ago" stated Councillor Cahill.

Kerry County Council have : "I have studied the Monsignor, watched programmes and read books about his truly fascinating life. For decades there was very little known about him here at home in Ireland, whereas internationally he was a hero, he was a hero in Rome, he was a hero in Europe and he was a hero throughout the world. He put his life continuously at risk while trying to save the lives of others, namely Italian Jews and Allied Troops and airmen in Rome, while at the same time trying to avoid the Nazis and the Gestapo" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

> "In 1960, Monsignor O'Flaherty suffered a serious stroke during Mass and was forced to return to Ireland. Shortly before his first stroke in 1960, he was about to be confirmed as the papal nuncio to Tanzania. He moved to Cahersiveen to live with his sister, at whose home he died on the 30th of October 1963, aged 65. In early '63 while very unwell he travelled to London as a special guest on the TV Programme, This is Your Life, when 8 million viewers tuned into the BBC to see this great man" said the Fianna Fáil Councillor.

> "I believe the timing is now right, on the 60th anniversary of his death, for a fitting, permanent memorial to be placed in the heart of Cahersiveen town, to honour this great man. I have asked Kerry County Council to include such a fitting project in the Public Realm plans, under the €19.5 million Town Regeneration Scheme in Cahersiveen" added Councillor

## Road Improvement Works at Dun Buí, Cullenagh, Beaufort

Road improvement works are currently being : carried out at Dun Buí Housing Estate at Cullenagh, Beaufort by Kerry County Council. Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill has thanked all involved for their patience and perseverance in getting this project over the line at long last.

"A big thank you to Kerry County Council, its Senior Roads Engineer, Pádraig Teahan, and Area Engineer, John Sugrue who put in a lot of hard hours to bring this to fruition. I must also thank the residents of Dun Buí for their patience over recent years, while arrangements : based Councillor. were being put in place, such as the 'Taking in Charge' of the Estate in May 2020" stated Councillor Cahill.

"On a personal level, I am delighted that the road in Dun Buí is being brought up to the highest standard. This is a beautiful estate in Beaufort and the residents had to put up with massive craters full of water for years and years and thankfully this has now come to an end. I am pleased that we have been able to assist the residents in this matter" said the Rossbeigh

"The project is being carried out by Kerry County Council under the Community Involvement Scheme and the total cost of the works involved is almost €110,000 with an €11,000 contribution from the residents. The Scheme includes major drainage works and surface dressing. Because of the complexity of the case, it has taken a while to get to this point, but I am sure everybody will now be happy with the outcome" added Councillor Cahill.

## **PARKING CHARGE CONCESSIONS for Christmas period**

Kerry County Council has announced details of concessions in parking charges over the Christmas period. Each year, the Council provides limited free parking in Tralee, Killarney and Listowel in an effort to encourage people to shop locally and support local businesses in the run up to Christmas.

The parking charge concessions apply in Tralee, Listowel, and Killarney from 4th to 31st December inclusive with varying arrangements in each of the towns. In Listowel, there will be free on-street parking subject to a two-hour limit all day every day with free unlimited parking continuing in all off-street car parks throughout the period.

In Tralee, there will be free parking in all Council-owned car parks subject to a two-hour limit between 9.30am and 2.00pm each day.

In Killarney, free parking, subject to a two-hour limit, will be available between 9.30am and 2pm in the Glebe Car Park, Fair Hill Car Park, and the Upper and Lower New Street Car Parks. A parking charge of just €2 per day will apply in the Rock Road Car Park, High Street Car Park and Lewis Road Car Park.

## WINTER AND SPRING

## BEDDING PLANTS

Between now and the summertime there is still plenty of time to put a big of colour in the garden with some winter/spring flowering bedding plants. It is probably best this Spring to use them in containers and baskets as the ground is saturated from the amount of rainfall we have experienced.

The first thing you have to do is choose the type of container you want. There are lots to choose from i.e. Terracotta, glazed, plastic and wooden. Now that you have chosen a pot, the first and most important thing to do is sort out the drainage. All terracotta and glazed pots should already have drainage holes in them. Plastic ones probably won't so you will have to punch some holes in them. Next you need to put some gravel or aero board broken up over the holds of the pot and then cover with some landscape fabric like Mypex. Now it is time to add some compost and ideally some slow release fertilizer mixed with it. Then choose some plants. Firstly choose a center piece and always make sure that center piece is evergreen and suitable for the size of the container. This way you will only have to change the bedding plants from season to season. Here is a list of good winter/spring bedding plants for containers: Primroses, Polyanthus, winter pansies, cyclamen, ornamental cabbages and trailing ivy.

Welcome back dear student, "therefore, I will always remind you about these things—even though you already know them and are standing firm in the Truth you have been taught. 


