



## €17MILLION OUTDOOR DINING SCHEME ANNOUNCED

There has been broad welcome for the new Outdoor Dining Scheme which has been announced by Minister Martin, Fáilte Ireland announce new Outdoor Dining Scheme in partnership with Local Authorities This week Minister for Tourism Catherine Martin TD and Fáilte Ireland announced details of a new €17million Scheme.

The Outdoor Dining Enhancement Scheme comprises two parts and will be delivered in partnership between Fáilte Ireland and Local Authorities across the country. Part One of the Scheme will provide funding for individual tourism and hospitality businesses to develop and increase their own outdoor seating capacity. Funding allocated under Part Two will enable Local Authorities to develop permanent outdoor public dining spaces in towns and urban centres, similar to those that exist in various European cities. Initial application will be opened on April 12th, 2021.

Announcing the Scheme Minister Catherine Martin said "This Scheme has two main objectives: firstly, to enable individual tourism and hospitality businesses increase their dining and seating capacity in the short-term and secondly to enable a long-term strategy for local authorities to develop appropriate permanent weatherproofed outdoor dining infrastructure".

The scheme will be administered by local authorities and, Moira Murrell, Chair of the CCMA Rural Development, Community, Tourism, Culture and Heritage (RCTCH) Committee stated:

"Local Authorities are looking forward to administering this Scheme for individual businesses, as well as delivering year-round all-weather outdoor seating options to boost the appeal and attractiveness of our cities and towns. Following the success of the Street Furniture Grant Scheme, implemented by some Local Authorities in 2020, we look forward to creating outdoor dining experiences around the country that not only benefit locals, but are also attractive to domestic and overseas visitors when the sector re-opens. Developing outdoor infrastructure is a key element of answering the consumer demand for more flexible dining options."

Minister for Education Norma Foley TD has welcomed the announcement.

The duel aim of this programme is to provide funding for individual tourism and hospitality businesses to develop and increase their own outdoor seating capacity and to enable Local Authorities to develop permanent outdoor public dining spaces in towns and urban centres. The Scheme will supplement the extensive work and programmes already undertaken by local authorities, Fáilte Ireland and wider Government across the county in supporting the hospitality sector throughout this pandemic.

Each Local Authority can apply for up to €200,000 under this element of the scheme which will be open for applications on April 12th, 2021 through Local Authority websites.


#### Part One of the Outdoor Dining Enhancement Scheme covers Outdoor Seating and Accessories.

This is open to individual tourism and hospitality businesses including hotels, cafes, restaurants and attractions where food is sold for consumption on the premises. Local Authorities will administer the Scheme through their internal business perspective and processes. All applicants will be required to comply with planning codes, legislative and other compliance requirements. The Scheme aims to expand on the work done in 2020 by Local Authorities in supporting businesses and will support individual independent hospitality and tourism businesses towards the cost of equipment to provide additional outdoor seating and facilitate these businesses to increase their outdoor dining capacity for the summer of 2021. Applicants can apply for a grant of up to €4,000 (up to 75% of the ex-VAT cost of equipment purchased/installed). Costs for outdoor tables, chairs, umbrellas, electric heaters, screens/windbreaks, plant stands and wooden platforms will be covered under the Scheme. Expenditure must be incurred between 1st April 2020 and 30th September 2021 and the scheme will open for applications on April 12th 2021 through Local Authority websites.

## Part Two of the Scheme covers Weatherproofing & Outdoor Dining Infrastructure

This will support Local Authorities to upgrade and enhance streets and public spaces and implement weather-proofing solutions which will facilitate year-round outdoor dining in urban tourism centres. This element of the Scheme will facilitate medium-large scale, weather-proofed dining areas for a collective of businesses in a single zone/street, similar to those that exist in various European cities. Each Local Authority can apply for up to €200,000 for a maximum of 2 locations. Additional funding may be made available subject to the quality and economic value of the proposals. Permanent robust and design appropriate weatherproofing structures, including parasols, electric heaters, wind breakers/ screens and associated enabling works to accommodate these interventions on a longterm basis will be included. Roof structures and awnings will be considered subject to planning requirements being adhered to. Key is that these remedial works will increase the outdoor dining capacity within our cities and towns, whilst also ensuring the safety of diner and pedestrians.

he development of new cycle paths in Killarney is expected to commence this this summer. This follows agreement by local councillors on the proposals to develop a new cycling infrastructure in Killarney town.

The €5m project will go to tender shortly with construction expected to begin in the mid- to late summer. The new infrastructure includes a total of 3.8km of cycle paths on Rock Road, Lewis Road, Park Road, the Gaelscoil Road and Deerpark Road.

Cathaoirleach of the Killarney Municipal District, Cllr Brendan Cronin welcomed the decision by the Killarney Municipal District members to unanimously approve the Part 8 planning process. He described the project as transformative for the town.

'By providing segregated cycle lanes, this project will facilitate particularly the more vulnerable road users and it will provide important linkages between residential areas, schools and sporting facilities. These improved walking and cycling facilities will have a positive impact on the health and wellbeing of the community and will help to improve traffic flow by facilitating a modal shift from cars to cycling and walking, he said.

'I was delighted with the very significant levels of community engagement in the process which included an online webinar and over 90 submissions from the public. The overwhelming majority of submissions welcomed the cycle lanes project and a number of amendments were made to address concerns raised in the submissions.

"I also want to pay tribute to the elected members who recognised the importance of the project and worked closely with the communities around Killarney, raising issues on their behalf and ensuring that this is a project that will be welcomed round Killarney town,' said Cllr Cronin.

Meanwhile The Cathaoirleach and Chief Executive of Kerry County Council have welcomed the announcement of €5.6m in funding for projects in Kerry under the Active Travel Programme.

Cllr Patrick Connor-Scarteen said that critical leisure and recreational infrastructure projects across Kerry would benefit from the funding.

## **SUMMER START** FOR KILLARNEY CYCLE PATHS PROJECT

'It is great news for the county and an acknowledgement of the hard work of Kerry County Council in developing these projects that Kerry is receiving €5.6m in funding today,' he said.

'The development of our cycling and walking infrastructure is as important as it ever was and will ensure that walkers and cyclists will be able to avail of improved facilities.'

Chief Executive Moira Murrell said that the development of sustainable transport infrastructure remained a key priority for the local authority.

'I would like to thank Kerry County Council staff who have developed these projects in recent years and which can now progress to being constructed for the benefit of all our citizens,' she said. Speaking to the Killarney Outlook this week, week, Cathaoirleach Cllr. Brendan Cronin has also welcomed the funding to complete the flesk cycle/walkway and the substantial money allocated to begin work on the Rock road and Deerpark/ Gaelscoil routes which Councillors voted through last week. These works will now be under taken in 2021.

Later on in the week, the children brought in their creative and colourful Easter bonnets and they had an Easter Parade. Hats off to the children, parents and staff!














# Kerry Youth honoured at Award Ceremony

## 3 in a row for Castleisland Community College at Lee Strand Garda Youth Achievement Award

 $\Gamma$ he Lifesavers group from Castleisland Community College won the Community Safety Award because they showed great initiative, leadership and dedication throughout their project in Transition Year.

From a series of questionnaires and research they selected to raise awareness about the importance of heart health and how to maintain a happy and healthy heart through keeping active and healthy eating. They were shocked to learn every day 13 people die in Ireland from cardiac arrest. They carried out a survey in school and found that only 5% of the students had CPR training, and less than 2% of these would be confident enough to use it in an emergency. They concluded that practical hands on training would build skills and confidence in this area and help save lives. If you perform CPR, you can double, if not triple, the person's chance of survival. So they researched the work of the Irish heart foundation and knew they wanted to partner

with them to train students in CPR through their CPR for Schools Programme. Once completed the students were equipped to train all students in Castleisland Community College. A huge achievement.

They wanted to engage with the local community and so they again worked with the Irish Heart Foundation to get their Mobile Health Unit to Castleisland. It offered free blood pressure checks, pulse checks, lifestyle advice and heart health information. This had a huge impact in the community as 64% of those who attended were referred on to a GP for further check-up possibly saving many lives.

The group partnered with Slí na Sláinte to map out walking routes and create a display board at the entrance of the school. This encouraged more students to get active and students could also track their steps leading to a healthier happier heart and will be the group's legacy to Castleisland Community College. They also created a peer mentoring programme for first years and organised events like a rugby

tournament In an emergency phone call, the responder asks for the Eircode which is often not to hand or is still often unknown. So the students saw an opportunity and designed fridge magnets with a space to write your Eircode. IT was well received by members of the local community. The students set up a stall at Garveys Super Valu and gave out the magnets. The Eircode magnets has the potential to save many lives as in these pressurised situations it is something you can forget and gives the ambulance services your exact location.

Elaine Murphy their teacher stated 'the students displayed great enthusiasm in the course of their work. Overall, we at Castleisland Community College are so proud of the Lifesavers achievements. This is the third consecutive county title won by the school and Lifesavers hope to win the National Community Safety Award for the second time.'

### S: Hi Edele, what year did you graduate from St. Brigid's?

E: Hi Sheree, the year 1998.

### S: Were you involved in any extracurricular activities in school?

Staying safe and stopping the spread of Covid-19 this Easter - a message from the HSE, An Garda Síochána and local authorities

The statutory agencies in the Kerry area I involved in the ongoing response to Covid-19 have urged people to Stay home and Stay Safe this Easter. As the bank holiday approaches and as households plan how they can mark Easter, representatives of the HSE, an Garda Síochána, and Kerry County Council have come together to remind everyone that although it's difficult, there can be no gatherings or celebrations indoors.

All the agencies worked together to coordinate the community response to the Covid-19 crisis for more than a year. Today, they asked the people of Kerry to Hold Firm for a little longer on the tough but necessary measures to make sure the county doesn't lose the progress made in recent months.

The acting Director of Public Health for the region Dr Anne Sheahan said:

understand that this weekend in particular, it will tempting to visit friends and family. Unfortunately, I also know from our experience after Christmas that visits between households greatly sped up the spread of Covid-19. We are now close to a major ramping up of the vaccination roll-out, and we need to hold on just a little longer," Dr Sheahan said.

Dr Sheahan also reminded people that when it comes to Covid-19, it's always safer to be outdoors.

"This weekend, think about making the most of what's within your 5k with walks and picnics - but remember that if you happen to meet a friend or family member while you're out, you still need to keep a two-metre distance," she

Any indoor visits, whether it's a playdate, gettogether or cup of coffee carries risk - and the more people involved, the greater the risk, Dr Sheahan warned.

Mayor of Kerry, Cllr Patrick Connor-Scarteen appealed to people in County Kerry to make every effort over the Easter period to limit the spread of the coronavirus:

"I can appreciate that people are frustrated and anxious to return to some more normality in their lives and that over the Easter break, people will be tempted to meet and travel more than they should. But case numbers remain high and we are so close to a ramping

up of the vaccine programme that we cannot afford to go backwards. So my appeal is to everyone to play their part in continuing to adhere to restrictions which are in place for everyone's benefit."

Assistant Commissioner Michael Finn said:

"An Garda Síochána is appealing to the public this Easter to continue to follow the public health guidelines by staying home and staying safe. We as individuals have the power to protect ourselves and our communities.

"The best way of keeping safe is to stay home. If you are going out, please only undertake necessary journeys and exercise within 5km of your home. An Garda Síochána's high visibility checkpoints continue throughout the region. This will also include patrols at local amenity sites.

"The vast majority of people are playing their part in helping prevent the spread of Covid-19. However, we are still finding groups gathering, house parties, etc. This in not just breaches of regulations, but it also create a risk for those attending and everyone they come into contact with afterwards. This Easter, please stay at home and stay safe."

Dr Sheahan also appealed to the people of Kerry not to host visitors from other parts of the

"If someone wants to visit you here in Kerry over the Easter bank holiday, it's really important that you tell them not to come. Everyone in the county has worked very hard to turn the tide on Covid-19 infections in the last three months, and an influx of visitors could put all of that at risk. Kerry has done tremendous work, and we don't want to see that undermined over the next few days. We can do this for just a little longer, and look forward to much better times ahead".

## FOLEY WELCOMES OVER €500,000 IN FUNDING FOR KERRY ETB

inister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed a Government funding (DFHERIS) announcement of €507,500 for Kerry Education and Training Board (KETB) under the Devolved Capital Allocations for 2021.

The funding forms part of Project Ireland 2040 and will be provided via SOLAS for the delivery of small-scale and necessary infrastructure and improvement works, and for the purchase of equipment.

Under this funding programme, ETBs will be in a position to make decisions around smallscale FET investment priorities locally, and to ensure that projects can be advanced quickly

and efficiently. The grant also allows ETBs an opportunity to consider future accommodation needs and to procure professional expertise to conduct condition surveys of existing buildings, with a view to a strategic approach to estate planning and development.

In addition, funding has also been provided for the introduction of an emergency health and safety works programme. Commenting on today's announcement, Minister Foley said: "This funding is a further endorsement of the importance of Further Education and Training. It will provide vital support to Kerry ETB as it enhances and develops the FET sector in the county."

## KELLEHER CRITICISES AN TAISCE

## for delaying new cheese manufacturing plant in Kilkenny

- Glanbia must find alternative uses for extra milk produced rather than make cuts to farmers' incomes -

"It appears to me that certain NGOs feel that they, rather than the Irish government, should set government agri-food policy," said Fianna Fáil MEP, Billy Kelleher.

Kelleher was commenting as a proposed Glanbia cheese manufacturing plant in Bellview, Co. Kilkenny has been delayed by planning, and now legal, challenges by An Taisce.

"An Taisce have opposed the development on the basis that any increase in dairy production, which would be needed for the cheese plant to operate, would be 'untenable'.

"The Department of Agriculture, and the Irish Government, have decided that they want to increase dairy production in Ireland. An Taisce do not get to decide what government policy is; the Irish Government do. It is planned, and supported by the Government, to increase dairy production to 9.49 billion litres by 2027.

"This milk has to go somewhere. The proposed Glanbia cheese facility where they plan to make Gouda for the European market is an ideal destination for this additional milk supply.

"An Taisce's planning and legal challenges are damaging to job creation in terms of construction, and damaging to Irish dairy farmers who will feel the pinch in 2022 when Glanbia apply caps on production due to the failure of the new plant to open on time.

"Many dairy farmers have taken out loans to finance increased dairy production on their farms to supply milk to this new facility.

"We need a quick decision on their spurious challenges so that we can move on with developing the production facility and ensuring that dairy farmers do not lose out.

"Furthermore, I would call on Glanbia to work with dairy farmers to find alternatives to cuts in production levels. With all the additional ferry capacity, perhaps milk can be shipped to plants overseas rather than seeing farmers lose out?" concluded Kelleher.

## Minister Foley welcomes over €5.5million in funding

Minister for Education and Kerry TD Norma Foley has welcomed the announcement of €5,644,500 in funding for walking and cycling projects in towns and villages across Kerry.

The announcement is the first ever major active travel investment programme for rural Ireland.

Among the projects that it will support are the creation of new footpaths and segregated cycle lanes, reconstructing old or damaged paths, cycle parking, improved road crossings, design work for new pedestrian and cycling bridges, and closing roads to car traffic

Minister Foley said: "I welcome this funding which will continue to make Kerry towns and villages a safe place for walking and cycling. The projects being funded today will make a real difference to rural life and ensure that communities across Kerry are better connected."

#### CYCLE LANES WELCOMED

As the Municipal District Council has unanimously given support to the cycling proposals along the town streets/roads Councillor Michael Gleeson is pleased to welcome the allocation of finance by government for the the work to proceed. I am especially delighted to welcome the funding to allow for the completion of the Cycleway cum Walkway from Ross Road to Muckross Road, partially by the northern bank of the River Flesk.

"I have been promoting this project for many years as its completion will a wonderful addition to the recreational facilities in the Killarney area. It will also help to reduce traffic levels on those every busy roads. I hope that work will recommence very soon", Cllr. Gleeson told Killarney Outlook.

Research shows that exploring Ireland by car is popular with US visitors especially. In 2019, 43% of all American holidaymakers hired a car while visiting Ireland." ## More adjustments made to Leaving Cert written exam to lighten the load for anxious students



nformation is flowing fast and furious from the exam authorities to the extent that further guidelines are hardly issued when they are overtaken by events. That was very much the case last week when the State Examinations Commission (SEC) insisted that it would be inappropriate for teachers and students to wear face masks during the oral language exams which began last Friday, 26th March. Following an outcry from the stakeholders, the SEC did a volte-face and issued further quidelines insisting that face masks must be worn during the orals.

In the meantime, the SEC has published a 64page document setting out further adjustments to the 2021 Leaving Cert exam papers to lessen the load for students as they study for and sit the exams. The SEC already published assessment arrangements for the Leaving Cert exam back in September and updated the document in December. The original document sets out the adjusted arrangements for students taking the Leaving Cert in June, taking account of the way their education was disrupted during the past two academic years. The aim of the most recent adjustments is to lessen the work load for students during the next two months.

The latest adjustments apply to the written exams only. In the case of Irish and the modern foreign languages, there is no change to the aural component nor is there any change to the listening component in music. There are no further adjustments to practical coursework, orals and practical performance tests. Given the proximity of the written exams, these further adjustments aim to maintain the overall structure and layout of the exam paper. This means that no new material has been added to the papers and, for the most part, no material removed. The latest amendments mainly involve changing the instructions on the exam papers. The adjustments, in almost all cases, provide students with further choice by reducing the number of questions to be answered in the exam. While this will reduce the time needed to complete the exam, the duration of each exam remains unchanged, thereby reducing time pressure on the students.

For most subjects, the total marks for the exam paper will be reduced and there may be a small redistribution of marks within exam papers as a result of the introduction of further choice. However, in the case of subjects with more than one paper and subjects with practical coursework, oral, aural or listening tests, the relative weighting between the other components and the written paper will be retained. To achieve this, some re-weighting of the components may be required during the grading process. The introduction of further choice and the reduction in the number of questions to be answered means that the exam no longer covers the entire syllabus or subject specification.

While every effort was made to ensure consistency in the reduced demand on students across different subjects and levels, the different structures of the exams placed significant limits on the degree to which this could be achieved. However, the great majority of students take six to eight subjects, therefore, in the round, the benefit accruing to students from these changes will be broadly even across the range of subjects they take. It is conceded, however, that this will not be true in respect of all subject combinations.

In order to provide teachers and students with as much clarity as possible, the document provides a description of what students will be required to answer in each subject and draws attention to how it differs from what is usually required. The amended instructions for

each subject, as they will appear on the exam paper, are also provided. The entire document, entitled. 'Further adjustments to the written examinations, Leaving Certificate 2021' is available at www.gov.ie/leavingcertificate and each Leaving Cert student would do well to carefully study the instructions in the subjects s/he is taking.




"A scheme for insulating all primary homes and adapting their heating systems to an affordable type must to completed before turf cutting can cease and this should be funded centrally from Brussels" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"The EU cannot be allowed to pull the rug from under our feet and let us freeze in winter" said Councillor Cahill.

"If viable, affordable alternatives are provided, the sad fact is that "A day in the Bog" will be no more, due to it's labour intensive nature" stated Councillor Cahill.

"There are things like the Meitheal, whereby groups of neighbours got together to cut the turf, save the hay etc. That sense of camaraderie is being lost. Rural Ireland is becoming an empty place without any emigration to blame but the loss of our way of life" added Councillor Cahill.

## Keeping the wheel turning...

Killarney Rotary Club President, Anne Alcock take a look back at the club's beginnings



e've all seen it. That intriguing little emblem that looks like a wheel. We might even have benefitted from it in some way. Rotary? What is it? When did it start? Although the original Rotary Club roots stretch all the way back to Illinois, USA in 1905, the Killarney Rotary club (twinned with Kendal, UK and Staffanstorp, Sweden), started up in 1983. One of its founders, John Shanahan of Shanahan's Garden Centre Faranfore, remembers how this happened.

"Different groups of people, with different interests and from a range of different professions got together to have a chat to see how they could share those interests within the local community" he says. " Most of the work was and is, directed to good causes locally, but also beyond." One of these former undertakings, was the very successful Young Musician of the Year competition. Many of the winners are, according to Rotarian Ciara Irwin-

Foley, "now performing professionally, or teaching." Even without that Rotary has competition, been active in Youth Leadership competitions, and "mock interviews" for school-leavers. These, together with the famous Wine and and the Art evening fashionable fundraising Afternoon tea, have of course, all been put "on hold." Anne Alcock, Killarney's "Pandemic president" has been talking about keeping that Rotary wheel turning, over the past year.

"Everything had to be re-configured within a lock-down context" she said. The club's usual face-to-face Wednesday meetings in the Great Southern Hotel, had to cease. ("I'm missing meeting for the chat, and seeing friends" says John Shanahan). However Despite physical invisibility, most members have endeavoured to keep in touch in whatever way, including social media, and Zoom meetings. We have made some contributions, managed a few projects, are actively planning for more, and earlier this month members had the opportunity to attend the first ever virtual Rotary Ireland District-Conference.

With an overall theme entitled "Caring for the planet, our Communities and Ourselves" this virtual conference has been hailed a "great success" by Youghal-based District Governor, Conny Ovesen, while Killarney Rotary club secretary Eduard Schmidt Zorner found it "very informative and instructive and also a great vehicle to learn about other opinions, skills and activities... This conference opened the view to other areas."

True, for the first speaker was Ontariobased Jennifer Jones, the first-ever female International presidential nominee 2022/23, who spoke of the importance of sharing one's personal "Rotary Moment" to inspire and create change. The ideal of Rotary being to see a world where people unite to take action within communities and within ourselves - and thus create change for good. Public Servant Mark Mellet DSM Chief of Staff of the Irish Defence Forces, epitomised this shared action for good, and who spoke at the conference alongside Jason Dempsey (International Service Chair). Their mutual collaboration has made it possible for Killarney (amongst other Rotary clubs) to support a Rotary project in South Lebanon with the help of the Irish peace-keepers.

Every project starts with a person with an

idea, and in Rotary, a huge network (there are 1.2 million members worldwide, and approximately 35,000 clubs) helps to make that idea effective. During the conference, participants viewed several short videos highlighting Rotary funded humanitarian projects - among them international peace-maker scholarships, educational aid, mother and baby support, health-programmes, Shelter

boxes in Disaster areas, Bikes-for-

Africa (where Tralee and Dingle Rotary have been particularly involved) and the very effective Rotary Polio Eradication project. This particular project-funding is beautifully evidenced here in Killarney with the Purplefor-Polio crocus lawn at St Mary's Church of the Sloes. Bulbs were also planted on a lawn of the Franciscan Friary.

Being caring of others implies an ability to care for self, and well-known speaker and specialist Dr Ide Delargy gave a practical and informative input on wellbeing and self-care during this time of pandemic. She was followed by Science Presenter and author Gloria Barnett, who spoke energetically on the challenges of plastic pollution - again with practical implications. Sarah Jane Cromwell shared the story of her diversity journey, and we heard also from several inspiring young people who belong to the youth wings of Rotary called Rotaract (Over 18's), and Interact (School based). With huge enthusiasm, Matthew Lee the District Rotaract rep told us of new Rotaract clubs opening "during lockdown" in Cork and also Belfast, and of "E clubs - a Rotaract club on line" Other young people echoed Matt's vitality and gave reasons why they want to either join up, or keep up with their Rotary interaction. One liked "the power of people getting together" - "to meet new people and make new friends, and get involved in worthwhile projects and make a difference."

With Rotary's five core values of Fellowship, diversity, integrity, leadership and service, you can't say better than that! With young people like these, the future of Rotary looks bright. They are the future! Anne Alcock.



There is a new book out by Gerry Forde exploring the history of the rivers and the bridges in the Boggeragh Mountains around the hinterland of Donoughmore Parish.

Beautifully illustrated maps and stunning pictures of the structure of old masonry arch bridges stretching back to Oliver Cromwell's time. But if you want to know the history of the townland you live in and how townlands as we know them came about, then this is where you will find the route to

There is a social history of Ireland at that time up to the Great Famine. The very last MacCarty's of Blarney Castle and their family connections to Kings of England. The descendants of the family of one of the Carrignavar poets and how they ended up as Chiefs of The Choctaw Native American Nation after the Great Famine, Was this the connection that informed the Choctaw people about the famine and the inspiration of the \$170 collected in sympathy for the starving Irish citizens during the Great Famine. The development of roads in Cork County through Donoughmore and in particular "The Butter Road" or Kerry Road,

the new road from Kanturk to Cork in the 1.700's. and in the 1820's Richard Griffith's new road from Sliabh Luachra.

An interesting description he introduces refers to "2 shilling houses" from Griffith's Valuation and that about 50% of the population for many generations survived in the poorest of conditions in basic mud cabins. The people" who lived survived and thrived" in them thanks to the wonderful mothers of Ireland, is the development of the poorest class of houses over 200 years to the brink of disaster in the 1840's. Margaret Smith's poem "Verses on the Present State of Ireland" describes the state of the people during the period of the Penal Laws. Arthur Young's description in 1778 of the cost of building these mud cabins and with that the cost of planting of an acre of potatoes at that time. Here too he claims what could be the first written commentary on a game of hurling, a history of thoroughbred horses, their connection to the Battle Of The Boyne and afterwards to the horse that cost the life of Art O'Leary. The original Ordnance Survey and Griffith's Valuation is covered with the personalities from the British Army Ordnance Corp who carried out the survey for the maps in 1841. But it is the beautiful photography of the countryside and the detailed pictures of the structure of so many old masonry bridges, many of them hidden, which people will remember. There is a story with all 71 bridges and so many of them recorded that it must be a record for any parish in Ireland. The book finishes with an assessment of Richard Griffith and the Sliabh Luachra Fiddle Master Padraig O'Keeffe. At the end of the book is an instruction on how to follow Griffith's Valuation for yourself which could be

adapted for any parish in Ireland. Gerry Forde is a member of Donoughmore Historical Society and proceeds from sales of "The Bridges Of Donoughmore" will go to Donoughmore Cross Cemetery heritage and Donoughmore Community Council.

The five-year plan aims to deliver investment programmes for rural towns and villages through the €1 billion Rural Regeneration and Development Fund, and an enhanced Town and Village Renewal Scheme.

The immediate goal of this blueprint is to help rural Ireland to recover from the impacts of COVID-19, enable long-term development of rural areas, and create more resilient rural economies and communities for the future. Welcoming the announcement, Education Minister Norma Foley TD said: "I welcome this Government announcement which will provide a major boost, not just for the people in Kerry but for those who wish to return and work in a rural setting. We have all adapted to new ways of working over the course of the pandemic and this blueprint will afford people the opportunity to rediscover local communities without having to change their career path. This ambitious plan shows Governments' commitment to investing in vibrant rural communities which act as economic, cultural and social alternatives to city life."

Next up is a Special Award for 2 players who have represented Kerry so well over the past decade - Brian Kelly & Jonathan Lyne

With 2 swings of his right boot Jonathan Lyne wrote himself into Kerry GAA folklore.The Gaelic Grounds in Limerick was heaving, tension was in the air as Mayo and Kerry went toe to toe for the 2nd time in a week in a real blockbuster. The game was in the balance when Jonathan was introduced in the 58th minute and as it went to extra time, "a grain of rice" could tip the scales. That grain of rice came from Cleeney. Jonathan came from a strong Legion and Kerry bloodstock. His Grandfather Dinny captained Kerry in the 1947 All Ireland Final in the Polo Grounds New York vs Cavan. His cousins, the Spillanes of Templenoe, came later. But here was Jonathan carving his own piece of history. His 2 points in extra time on that August Saturday evening in 2014 were greeted with roars that could be heard in New York. They ensured Kerry made it to Croker for an All Ireland Final they would win but everyone will tell you the year was made that day in Limerick. Jonathan's Kerry career started in 2008 with the minors, followed by

three years at U21.

He made his senior championship debut vs Clare in 2012 in the very same Gaelic Grounds and was a regular starter in the preceding years in the National League. 2015 was probably his best year in a Kerry Jersey, solidifying his place at left half back, making 7 League and 6 Championship appearances. The team made it all the way to the All Ireland final that year, losing by 12 points to 9 to Dublin. But so effective was Jonathan on the day he kept his direct opponent, no less than Ciaran Kilkenny, scoreless while helping himself to a point.

He deservedly was nominated for an All Star in 2015. He continued to be a regular member of the squad in the intervening years where his versatility meant he was a vital member of the squad. Having opted out in 2018 to do a bit of travelling he found himself recalled by Peter Keane and again was a very influential member of the panel. On New Year's Eve 2020 he announced his inter county retirement but his performances for the club have not waned one bit and he's sure to be an integral part of the Clubs senior team for years to come.

### JOHN HEGARTY HALL OF FAME

This year's recipient of the Vincent Doyle Memorial Cup for the Hall of Fame is John Hegarty.

John joins a veritable list of club legends such as Johnny Culloty, Weeshie Fogarty, Pat Healy and Tommy Regan to name but a few.

John played at all levels and was renowned as a stylish "tough teak" defender. He has been one of the most loyal supporters of all teams both in Direen and throughout the County.

He has been the Club's delegate to the East Kerry Board for many years. As a long standing member of the Development Committee he has helped oversee the development of our wonderful facilities in Direen.

John has been a consistent supporter of all club fundraisers and Hegarty's Shop continues to be one of our club Lottosmain outlets. We thank John for all he has contributed to the club and welcome him as one of the most deserving ever inductees into the Hall Of Fame.

### MINI EGGS ROCKY ROAD

This is a really easy recipe and it's a great one for young kids to help out with

#### Ingredients

400g of dark or milk chocolate, finely chopped 200g of condensed milk 60g of butter

100g white chocolate chips

200g of digestive biscuits, roughly crushed 200g of mini marshmallows

150g mini eggs

#### Method

1.Line a square baking tin with parchment paper.
2.In a large sauce pan melt the butter with the condensed milk. The second the butter has melted and mixed through the condensed milk, take it off the heat and stir in the chocolate until completely melted and combined. Leave to cool for a minute

3.Add in the white chocolate chips, broken digestive biscuits, mini marshmallows and half the mini eggs 4.Stir with a wooden spoon until completely combined.

5,Pour the mix out into the lined baking tin and press down using a wooden spoon

6.Push down the rest of the mini eggs on to the mix (If you want a smoother finish over the top of the rocky road spread some more melted chocolate over the top.)

7.Place the tin into the fridge and allow to set in the fridge for up to 1-2 hours.or more Slice into 12 pieces and serve.

# THE PARTY OF THE P

#### Ingredients

350g frozen peas

1 tin chickpeas (240g drained)

3 tablespoons gram flour

2-3 garlic cloves crushed

2 teaspoons cumin seeds

2 tablespoons miso paste

Salt and pepper to season.

1 tablespoon frozen coriander (or a good handful of chopped fresh coriander)

Spray oil to spray pan with for frying

1 scallion for garnish

#### Method

Defrost peas and then blitz them with the chickpeas in a blender until they are crushed but not completely smooth. In a bowl mix this mixture with the rest of the ingredients. Form the mixture into patties (I made 8 from this quantity) and pan fry on medium heat for about 4-5 minutes each side. I garnished with a little chopped scallion.

For the red pepper and tomato dipping sauce 2 tomatoes

6 baby peppers (or 1.5 normal red peppers)

1 onion roughly chopped

1 teaspoon of sugar (optional)

100ml vegetable stock

1 tablespoon olive oil

Sprig of fresh parsley to garnish

In a baking tray put your oil, peppers, tomatoes and onions. Make sure all the vegetables are well tossed in the oil. Roast in the oven for about 35 minutes on 200 degrees. Take tray from oven and

allow to cool before removing skin from the peppers and tomatoes. Put all your veg (and sugar if you prefer a sweeter style sauce) and the remaining oil in a blender with the 100ml vegetable stock and blend until smooth. Pour sauce into a small dipping sauce bowl and garnish with a little sprig of parsley. This sauce freezes perfectly and is lovely to toss pasta in also so any leftover sauce will not go to waste. I love the flavour and the colours of this little dish.



# **COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS** YOUR GUIDE TO THE NEW CHANGES

In line with the plan set out in COVID-19 exceptions. Resilience & Recovery 2021: The Path Ahead, the Government has announced the phased easing of some restrictions for the month of April, to commence on 12th April.

#### **VACCINATIONS**

If you have received the second dose of the vaccine more than 2 weeks ago, you can meet with other fully vaccinated people from 1 other household indoors without wearing masks or staying 2 metres apart. This measure comes into place immediately. If you have received the second dose, you have to wait 2 weeks until you can meet other fully vaccinated people indoors.

#### FROM 12TH APRIL

**Schools**: In-school teaching to fully return Meeting other households: You can meet 1 other household outside but not in your garden or theirs Travel: You can travel within your county or within 20km of your home if crossing county boundaries Construction: All residential construction can restart as well as early-learning and childcare projects.

#### **FROM 19TH APRIL**

GAA: Training for and playing of National Governing Body sanctioned and organised adult inter-county National Gaelic Games Leagues not including under 20 or minor competitions

Elite sport: High performing athletes, as approved by Sport Ireland, can resume.

#### **FROM 26TH APRIL**

#### (subject to prevailing public health situation)

Outdoor sport: Outdoor sports facilities can reopen (for example: pitches, golf courses and tennis courts, other facilities as appropriate)

**Outdoor attractions:** visitor Outdoor attractions can reopen (for example: zoos, open pet farms, heritage sites). Amusement parks are not permitted to open

Underage sport: Underage non-contact outdoor training in pods of 15 or fewer can restart

Funerals: Maximum attendance at funerals will increase to 25.

#### **UNDER CONSIDERATION FROM 4TH MAY** (subject to prevailing public health situation)

Full reopening of construction activity Phased return of non-essential retail commencing with click and collect and outdoor retail, for example: garden centres/nurseries

Recommencement of personal services on a staggered basis

Reopening of museums, galleries and libraries Recommencement of religious services on a staggered basis

#### SCHOOLS AND HIGHER AND **ADULT EDUCATION 12TH APRIL 2021 ONWARDS** (POST EASTER HOLIDAYS):

In-school teaching to fully return. Higher and adult education

Higher, further and adult education should remain primarily online.

#### **CONSTRUCTION**

From 12th April, all residential construction can restart as well as early-learning and childcare projects.

Until then, construction is closed with the some

#### **RETAIL AND SERVICES** (example: hairdressers,

beauticians, barbers) Face coverings must be

worn. All retail is closed except for essential retail.

All non-essential services are closed.

See the list of essential services at Level 5.

Click and collect: Click and collect from nonessential retail outlets is not permitted.

Click and deliver will continue to be permitted.

The government will consider the phased return of non-essential retail commencing with click and collect and outdoor retail, for example: garden centres/nurseries, after 4 May

#### SOCIAL AND FAMILY GATHERINGS IN YOUR **HOME OR GARDEN**

No visitors are permitted in private homes or gardens except for essential family reasons such as providing care to children, elderly or vulnerable people, or as part of a support bubble.

Other settings outside your home or garden: From 12th April, you may meet people from 1 other household outdoors, but not in your garden or theirs. Any meetings outdoors should be safe, with continued practising of social distancing and other safe hehaviours

Masks should be worn in crowded outdoor spaces.

#### **WEDDINGS**

Up to 6 guests are permitted.

#### **ORGANISED INDOOR GATHERINGS**

These are controlled environments with a named event organiser, owner or manager.

For example: business, training events, conferences, events in theatres and cinemas or other arts events (excluding sport).

No organised indoor gatherings should take place.

#### **Organised outdoor gatherings**

These are controlled environments with a named event organiser, owner or manager. For example: outdoor arts events, training events.

No organised outdoor gatherings should take place.

#### **EXERCISE AND SPORTING EVENTS**

Training: People may meet with people from one other household in outdoor settings when taking

From 19th April, training can resume for National Governing Body sanctioned and organised adult intercounty National Gaelic Games Leagues not including under 20 or minor competitions

High performing athletes, as approved by Sport Ireland, can resume from 19 April.

From 26 April subject to public health advice at the time, outdoor sports facilities can reopen (for example: pitches, golf courses and tennis courts, other facilities as appropriate).

Activities should take place between a maximum of two households. Facilities including club houses and any indoor facilities (for example: changing rooms, showers, kitchens, meeting rooms), apart from essential toilet facilities must remain closed. There should not be any return to team sports or

Services will be held online. This will be reviewed

Attendance at funerals: The maximum attendance at funerals is currently 10. From 26th April, the maximum attendance at funerals will increase to 25, subject to public health advice.

#### MUSEUMS, GALLERIES AND OTHER CULTURAL **ATTRACTIONS**

All venues closed. This will be reviewed by 4 May.

#### BARS, CAFES AND RESTAURANTS (including hotel restaurants and bars)

Take away food and delivery only.

Wet pubs: Closed.

Nightclubs, discos, casinos: Nightclubs, discos and casinos will remain closed.

Hotels and accommodation: Open only for essential non-social and non-tourist purposes.

Work from home unless essential for work, which is an essential health, social care or other essential service and cannot be done from home.

#### TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS

Domestic: People are required to stay at home except for travel for work, education or other essential purposes, and will be permitted to take exercise within 5km of home. From 12 April, you can travel within your own county or within 20km of your home if crossing county boundaries.





## Is it more difficult to get a mortgage to build my home than a mortgage to buy my home?



R876 Kenmare Place – traffic can divert onto the N71 at Kenmare Place.







# Shaping your Brows at home

#### Here is what you will need

- A good quality pair of slant tip tweezers
- A spoolie brush(small bristle brush)
   A brow pencil or brow powder & brush
- · A cosmetic scissors to trim
- A mirror with good lighting, to view
- the whole face

Start with a cleansed face & brush your brow hairs into shape with your spoolie brush.

Using your pencil or Brow powder it is best to fill your brows into the desired shape, this acts as a stencil. You can now see the hairs outside this which need to go. Pluck hairs 1 hair at a time by gently stretching your brow tight with one finger while tweezing in the direction the hair is growing. If you need to trim with a scissors, comb hairs upwards and only trim unruly longer hairs. Darker hairs on the lip may also be trimmed with a scissors or tweezed

by gripping hair near the root and tweeze in the direction of growth. Tips

Twice a week is enough to tweeze to maintain your shape. Do not use a compact mirror or magnifying mirror, this will distort your idea of the brow shape in relation to your face. Do not use a kitchen sissors to trim. Do not shave. Pay attention to the direction you are tweezing as tiny blood vessels may burst if you tweeze in the wrong direction and can cause inflammation and scarring. Grip hairs near the base to avoid hairs breaking. If you over tweeze, do not repeat on the other evebrow.

# B WELLS TIPS ON RUNNING SHOES TO GET STARTED ON YOUR FIRST 5K

#### Ok so its your first time getting out on the road running?

You don't need an expensive pair of running shoes to get kick started, however we would advise a few tips when selecting what running shoes to wear on Monday.

- 1) Wear a comfortable pair that you have worn before and you know wont cut you or are too tight or too loose.
- 2) Choose a shoe with good support and cushioning.
- 3) Don't wear a fashion pair of runners that are flat like Converse as there isn't much support or cushioning in these. These runners are designed to look good... and not for jogging.
- 4) make sure you break the runners you are going to wear in over the weekend. So pop them on for a few hours especially if they are ones you have not worn in a while.
- 5) Wear socks as you can get blisters when your feet sweat and believe us you don't want blisters on week 1.
- 6) If you have had your feet assessed in the past and you have been told you have fallen arches or over pronated feet etc. then you must wear the runners that were prescribed to you or insoles. Injuries will flare up if you ignore the advice given to you by the experts.
- 7) If you feel after the first week or 2 that your feet are just not liking the runners you are wearing and its the discomfort of your runners that are holding you back rather than your running fitness we strongly advise investing in a new pair... with covid getting the feet assessed is not possible but maybe seeking advice from an expert online or doing a bit of investigation will be well worth your while as running comfort and cushioning and support is essential.

Don't worry if you are unsure as the couch to 5k is all about discovering your body and how it moves and how it feels when you stat running and sometimes until you get moving you will never know if you need a different type of runner or if you have any issue in the feet. So maybe you can go treat yourself after the 6 weeks is complete and everything is open!!!! All we want to create is awareness that running shoes can be the game changer to comfort and performance so don't ignore discomfort.



#### **SCREEN TIME, FACTS FOR PARENTS**

Most parents worry about how much time children are spending on digital devices. Here are the facts

#### WHAT IS BLUE LIGHT?

Most parents worry about how much time children are spending on digital devices. Here are the facts

Sunlight contains red, orange, yellow, green and blue light rays. Combined, this spectrum of coloured light rays creates what we call 'white light' or sunlight.

Depending on where they fall on the spectrum, light rays have long wavelengths (with less energy) or short wavelengths (with more energy).

Blue light is a high-energy visible light and has shorter wavelengths. It is known as blue light because it is on the violet-blue band of the spectrum.

Blue light is naturally present in sunlight but is also something we can see from screens such as TVs, computers, smartphones and tablets.

#### Can blue light damage my child's eyes?

There is currently no scientific evidence that blue light causes damage to the eyes. However, there is evidence to suggest that carrying out near tasks, involving looking at something close-up, such as using mobile devices, screen time and reading a book, can increase eve strain for those who do this for long periods of time. What is digital eye strain?

Digital eye strain happens when a lot of time is spent using near vision, for example, reading on screen or playing online games.

One of the main symptoms is temporary blurred vision but other signs such as sore and tired eyes, dry eye and headaches are also associated with digital eye strain.

#### Can blue light affect my child's sleep pattern?

Using screens close to bedtime may contribute to poorer sleep, which may mean your child's concentration levels are lower during the day. This may be because blue light is linked to the suppression of the hormone melatonin which makes us feel sleepy. However, there is a range of other factors linked to disrupted sleep.

#### Can blue light filtered lenses help?

Some people report that lens coatings that filter blue light make their eyes feel more comfortable or are helpful before bed.

#### IS THERE A LINK BETWEEN SCREEN TIME AND SHORT-SIGHTEDNESS?

Short-sightedness, or myopia, is increasing throughout the world. Family history, ethnic background, environment (living indoors, in cities) and carrying out near tasks, such as screen use, have all been linked to the development of myopia. However, there is no clear evidence to suggest that screen time alone is the direct cause. But, there is good evidence to suggest that children who spend more time outdoors are at lower risk of developing short-sightedness.

#### TIPS FOR KEEPING YOUR CHILD'S EYES HEALTHY

Get them outdoors - regular play and exercise can help prevent or reduce the development of myopia (short-sightedness). Studies show two hours of outdoor activity a day is ideal1

Use night settings - using night settings, if your device has them, may help children sleep by reducing the amount of blue light given off by the screen during night-time hours

Make sure digital devices are turned off at least an hour before bedtime

Book your child in for a sight test at least every two years, from the age of three.







#### **COVID UPDATE**

Clubs in the 26 Counties/National Fixtures Programme In terms of the immediate future, it is expected that the Government in the South will publish any proposed changes to the current restrictions by the end of next week and we will communicate again with our Clubs and County's at that point in terms of the implications for GAA activity. In the interim, we would again reiterate that the GAA have not decided on what competitions may or may not be facilitated in any revised national fixture programme for 2021. As we have stated previously, such decisions will be a factor of how much time is ultimately available to us, both for an inter county season and for the broader participation levels that will be necessary for a meaningful club season at both adult and underage levels.

Cover under both the Injury Benefit Fund and Liability insurance policy is conditional on clubs being in compliance with return to play guidelines and requirements.

- Particular care is advised in planning for travel to and from training – i.e. only persons from your own bubble should travel in the same vehicle.
- Games are not permitted until further notice.
- Use of other indoor facilities such as bars, kitchens or meeting rooms is not permitted under the current regulations.
- Outdoor Handball facilities may be used for Handball training
- Astro Turf facilities may be used by non-GAA bodies, presuming health guidelines are followed in relation to maximum numbers of 15.
- Walking tracks on GAA property may continue to be used.
- Other outdoor events, such as drive in bingo or fundraisers organized by our clubs and which involve people gathering in groups of more than 10 people are not permitted.

The above provisions relate to Club activity only. Collective Inter County training sessions are not permitted for any age group in either jurisdiction and breaches of this can and will be dealt with under Rule 7.2 (e).

2020 Injury Fund Extension to 31 May 2021

Given that no activity has been possible for January to March 2021 a further two-month extension of Injury Fund cover has been ratified by Coiste Bainistíochta. This will now take the 2020 cover term up until 31 May 2021.

This means that the GAA Injury Benefit Fund cover remains in place based on existing 2020 team registrations. Units do not need to register or pay for their 2021 teams until re-invited to do so. Details with regards to registering and payment for the 2021 GAA Injury Benefit Fund will issue once we have more clarity from Government as to what the coming months may look like.

It is a condition of the extended 2020 Injury Fund cover to 31 May 2021 that in advance of any permitted return to train or play in either April or May, "All players will still be required to be individually registered for the 2021 season on the new "Foireann" membership system." 2020 player registrations will "NOT" carry over into 2021 and cover will be declined if a player is not fully registered for the 2021 season in advance of any return to train or play in 2021.

Pause on "Loss of Wages cover" from 1 January 2021

Following discussion at a meeting of Central Council on Saturday 20th March last, it was agreed to review the following two options as alternatives to the current pause that has been applied to the loss of wages cover that forms part of the wider Player Injury Benefit Fund.

1. Offer all our playing members who may feel that loss of wages cover is a prerequisite

for participation in GAA activities for 2021 to individually subscribe to a stand-alone GAA endorsed personal injury cover plan for 2021.

2. Review the 2021 Injury fund premium payable by each of the 1,500 units and potentially increase this premium by 25% to partly cover €1.3m of the forecasted €3m fund deficit to May 2022 if loss of wages cover is to be reinstated during this term. The funds ongoing deficit is primarily due to the absence of gate receipts during this term which ordinarily sub-vents the shortfall in the fund annually.

General In a general context, while there are undoubtedly some challenges ahead for the Association, there is also plenty of hope that with the availability of vaccines and the roll out of the inoculation programmes North and South of the border, a summer filled with Gaelic Games activity lies ahead.

In the meantime, we await the upcoming government announcements and will continue to communicate regularly with all units. We also request that you keep yourself updated with all communications given the fluid situation that we now find ourselves operating in. Finally, we want to remind you all of the importance of personal responsibility for our actions in relation to Covid-19 as we work together to ensure the safety of everyone in our community.

After over ten years as fitzgerald stadium Event Safety Manager, & CE Supervisor John Lenihan retires last week We wish John the very best in his retirement on behalf of all in East Kerry GAA

Event Safety Manager at Fitzgerald Stadium John Lenihan has called time on his role by announcing his retirement from the job, which made him one of the best-known faces at the Killarney venue over the last decade. John was

2017 East Kerry GAA Person of the Year and has given ongoing service to the GAA community in East Kerry, over many decades, ranging from club, through County (Coiste na ng), Fitzgerald Stadium and East Kerry GAA Board and extending to the broader community.

ng for 11 years and was Delegate to East Kerry and County Coiste na ng. John also served on the County Coiste na ng in many capacities in the 1990s. He started as fixtures secretary for U12 games from 1993 to 1996 (reference Caoga Blian ag Fs), moved on to Secretary in the latter end of the decade and served as joint vice chairman in 2001.

His involvement in G.A.A. administration continued when John served as East Kerry Board secretary with chairman Ger Galvin, from the early 2000s up to 2007, moving on then to representing his club on the Board as a Delegate. Other events hosted include 4 finals in File Pheil nang 2016 Finals.

In 2012, recognising the importance of facilitating access to the necessary training for stewards, John organised a training course, presented by Munster Council, in Killarney to over 40 Stewards from around the County.

John has also been involved in voluntary Stewarding at a number of events in the area including the GAA Annual Congress (2004, 2006) in the Great Southern Hotel, in the tenure of Sean Kelly (Kilcummin) as Uachtarn CLG and at the Ordination of the Bishop of Kerry (2013).

# Kerry Racing News

While Jack Kennedy sat out the meeting, another of Kerry's Cheltenham Festival heroes, Bryan Cooper, was among the winners at Navan on Monday. Kennedy didn't take up his rides for the week after taking a fall at Thurles less than 24 hours after his historic Cheltenham Gold Cup success on Minella Indo. But Cooper got on the Navan scoresheet when teaming up with his Cheltenham Festival winning trainer Paul Nolan to win the second division of the two-mile maiden hurdle with 2/1 favourite Coventry which went clear after the final flight to score by all of seven and a half-lengths from the Jessica Harrington-trained Ya Ya Baby.

Listowel conditional rider Tom Kelly rode the first double of his career at Limerick on Sunday and he shared the first of his winners with Athea-based Eoin McCarthy. The pair combined to land the opportunity handicap hurdle with 14/1 chance Cosmic Rock which came from off the pace and got up in the dying strides to pip the I Don't Get It by three-parts of a length.

In contrasting style, Kelly won the handicap chase on the Enda Bolger-trained Midnight Maestro, the horse that gave him his first winner at Leopardstown's Christmas meeting. Never far off the lead and jumping well throughout, the 17/2 chance eased clear from the final fence to beat Henry de Bromhead's Game Of War by an easy five and a half lengths.

# **SOCCER** *Ireland 0 Luxembourg 1*




Ouch. There is absolutely no saving this one. This is a disaster and a serious indictment of Irish soccer. The worst thing about is that it comes after what I considered to be a very good Irish display against Serbia. I had real hope going into this one and it's the hope, as they say, that kills you.

The simple truth is that Ireland were red-hot favourites against Luxembourg and both could and should have beaten them. There were no great issues with team selection - yes, we had a long list of injured players, but aside from John Egan and Darren Randolph, who among them was really going to be crucial? Conor Hourihane? Callum O'Dowda? The muchhyped-but-vet-to-show-substance Adam Idah or Aaron Connolly? Kevin Long? Ah, lads, I can hear the scraping of the bottom of the barrel. I'm not meaning to offend these guys, great servants of the acuse and elite players at a tough sport, but they simply aren't at this level and their club status is a clear reflection of that. But we were playing Luxembourg, a team ranked 98th in the world by FIFA. They had only won just one away game in World Cup qualifiers prior to playing Ireland. This really should have been points in the bag.

3-5-2 had worked very well against Serbia – I was delighted to see it and still consider it our best approach for the future. Stephen Kenny wants Ireland to dominate midfield possession and play controlled football – great, so do I. The trouble was that Luxembourg were ready for it and pressed us hard in midfield. Their tackling was better. More significantly, their passing was an awful lot better. The hard truth is that Ireland were torpid and our wing backs especially were getting caught in no man's land. Were we tired after the game in Belgrade? I honestly don't know, but our energy levels definitely weren't the same.

Vincent Thill tested Gavin Bazunu early on, a tame enough effort. It was a lot more than Ireland could manage, though. An early injury to Matt Doherty didn't help, though he lasted until half-time. To be fair, Ireland did create one great chance, and it was superb play, a flowing move started by the young keeper and finishing with James Collins stabbing Calum Robinson's cross towards goal – the keeper saved it at close range more by luck than skill.



# FINDING JACK CHARLTON

Jack Charlton featured in a brilliant documentary 'Finding Jack Charlton' that was broadcast on Irish television last week. It brought back the memories of those long and glorious summers where Irish fans turned World Cups into parties and we were actually able to hold our own against the likes of England and Italy. We were raw, and naive, and ebullient, and Big Jack was like an indulgent father letting the children play. Halcyon days that we thought would last forever.

'Finding Jack Charlton', filmed over the last 18 months of the World Cup winner's life, had a lot more than fond nostalgia as its calling card. It was a wonderfully gentle and sympathetic exploration of the all-too-common tragedy that is dementia as well as Jack's sad relationship with his estranged brother, Bobby (Irish Times journalist Peter Byrne's autobiography is the best on that touchy but significant subject). It's early in the year to be talking about awards, but Gabriel Clarke's documentary will surely be in those conversations when they arise.

It deserved a goal, and the whole conversation about Irish soccer might have been completely different. Might have, but probably not....it was our only shot on target. Luxembourg, especially Thill and Rodrigues, always looked the more likely side to conjure a goal. In fact, one very nearly arrived on 41 minutes, Bazunu having to race back to tip away an audacious effort at a volleyed lob from Rodrigues.

Stephen Kenny started ringing the changes at half-time, but it only seemed to sow confusion in the ranks – McClean (who replaced Clark on 60 minutes) and Browne as wing backs? Hah? I'd have Browne in the hole all day long ahead of Brady, whose four of five years ago is a declining memory.

Thill opened the second half with a dangerous free kick that curled just wide, but Browne should have done much better with a free header (to be fair, from a good cross by Brady). Thill almost bundled his way through for a goal – Bazunu doing well to block his path. Then it was Ireland's turn again, James Collins with an overhead kick that wasn't too far away.

A draw wasn't going to be good enough for

Ireland, and you could almost hear metaphorical whetstones on metaphorical knives for Stephen Kenny as the deadlock continued. Five minutes from time, it got an awful lot worse. A long ball by Luxembourg wasn't properly dealt with and Gerson Rodrigues pounced with an arrowing shot into the bottom corner, giving the hapless Bazunu no chance at all.

1-0. To Luxembourg.

The calls for Stephen Kenny's head have been growing steadily ever since. The FAI coming out and promising to stand by him doesn't mean much - our qualifying campaign is effectively in tatters already. They'll respond to public pressure on the matter and the likes of Paul McGrath and Tony Cascarino calling for Stephen Kenny's head won't help. Personally I see no point in changing the manager. We have been blaming management for the failings of the Irish team and the slow and steady decline over the last three decades, but the actual truth is that the likes of Giovanni Trappatoni and Martin O'Neill were hugely successful at club level, while Mick McCarthy is currently thriving at Cardiff. Most of these managers followed the

template of Jack Charlton in playing to Ireland's limitations, a pragmatic approach that had limited success. But during their time England's recruitment horizons were expanding far beyond English Irish, Scots or Welsh shores, with a consequent decline in investment in Irish players.

Getting rid of Stephen Kenny would cost us the buy-out of his contract (E550,000 a year) without having any effect on the quality of our players. That said, Kenny picked a strange time to take up the cudgel on behalf of migrant workers in Qatar. The likes of Norway and Germany have done so (and quite rightly) but with a lot more credibility than Ireland have right now.

Given the historic failings of the FAI and the dominance of GAA in particular in Irish sport, one can make a strong argument that our decline is just a reversion to the mean after the heady days of the Charlton era. Soccer in Ireland traditionally had to contend with A. a hostile GAA, B. a perception that it was a 'garrison game' i.e. a largely unfair perception of it as pro-British and anti-Irish, C. historically awful administrations, riven with accusations of corruption from the very beginning and the infamous 'Split' between Dublin and Belfast, D. a failure to expand beyond urban environs for decades (with the honourable exceptions of Sligo and Longford), and E. a complete overreliance on England to develop players of a national quality.

Irish soccer has stagnated for a long time. with no proper development pathway, a substandard league that lacks broad support, and inept administration at all levels. Roy Barrett had the temerity to suggest that the FAI continuing to pay Robbie Keane's contract may affect staff morale – yes, Roy, I suspect that the E70 million gaping hole in your finances because of maladministration might be a bigger problem? Meanwhile, other nations, especially smaller ones, have tightened up. Ireland's loss to Luxembourg wasn't the only underdog biting moment. Armenia, 99th in the world, beat Iceland (46th) 2-0. Spain, ranked 6th in the world, struggled to beat Georgia (89th) with a last minute winner and eked out a draw against a limited but game Greece (53rd). In our own group, Portugal coughed up a draw to Serbia - that would have been good news for Ireland in other circumstances. Pride of place has to go to Malta, though. The team ranked 176th in the world somehow managed a 2-2 draw with Slovakia (33rd)

It's an unfortunate reality that Irish supporters have been very slow to face, but the manager of the Irish team is neither the origin nor the cure for our problems. The woes of the Irish team are only one symptom of a much deeper malaise. Stephen Kenny can't do anything about that. Nor can he magically produce goalscorers – we simply don't have any.

He'll probably end up scapegoated, like every lrish manager before him, except one, Jack Charlton.

# Treaty United 0 Bray Wanderers 0

Newly formed Treaty United played their first ever League of Ireland match and came away with a hard-earned point. Harder earned than it needed to be, it must be said, with midfielder Sean McSweeney picking up a fairly careless second yellow card in the 66th minute that put his side under a bit of pressure for the remainder of the game. Neither side could conjure a winner, though. Killarney man Matt Keane was excellent for Treaty United in the middle of the field - in fact, he came closest to breaking the deadlock in the first half, but couldn't keep his blistering effort down. With the team reduced to ten men, manager Tommy Barrett replaced him in the 67th minute with Ardfert native Shane Lowth, a more defensive minded player.

One documentary that is already up for an award, and may well have won one by the time you are reading this, is the Laochra Gael episode featuring Kerry's own Kieran Donaghy. The programme featured his rise to GAA stardom via The Underdogs, his basketball career and passion, and it very sensitively handled his troubled but ultimately affectionate relationship with his father. The programme was shortlisted in the sports category in the inaugural RTS Ireland Television Awards.

# Pro14 Final: Leinster 16

#### Munster 6

Ardent Munster fans will sympathise with Irish soccer supporters – they are in much the same straits themselves. Not only have they concluded a full decade without a trophy but this was their sixth defeat in a row to their hated rivals. Worse, it was arguably the easiest victory of them all. Leinster, with one eye on Europe, could afford to start with Johnny Sexton, Tadhg Furlong, Ryan Baird, and James Lowe.

Leinster took control right from the start, with Robbie Henshaw in particular bringing his tremendous Six Nations form to the



provincial side. Ross Byrne slotted an early penalty. Henshaw is instrumental aagin in nearly setting up the opening try, but the final pass is misdirected - a real let-off for Munster. Leinster kept the pressure on, with Munster's discipline faltering in the face of Leinster's onslaught. Ross Byrne doubled the lead with another penalty but Joey Carbery replied in kind. There was just 3 points in it but in fairness, it didn't remotely reflect Leinster's superiority in virtually every facet of the game. The only problem for Leinster was translating that into scores, with the final pass going astray on several occasions. The closest they came was when CJ Stander held up Scott Fardy over the line - it's sometimes easy to forget how much immense power Stander packs. Joey Carbery's second attempt at a penalty with the last kick of the half drew Munster level at 6 apiece.

Leinster seemed to take a more direct approach in the second half and it paid rich dividends. Jack Conan was initially held up next to the posts but eventually crashed over for a try that Byrne converted. To make things worse for a creaking Munster, Peter O'Mahony had to depart with a blood injury while Johnny Sexton came into the fray for Ros Byrne. In fairness to Munster, the flesh might be weaker than in the days of O'Connell and O'Callaghan, but the spirit at least is still willing and they battled all the way. It was a losing battle, though, emphasized by another Leinster penalty before the finish.

With JJ Hanrahan, Darren Sweetnam (on his way to join Ronan O'Gara at French club Rochelle), CJ Stander (returning to South Africa), and Billy Holland (retiring) all unavailable for next season, Munster have a serious rebuilding job on their hands. This defeat will, unfortunately, call into question whether Johann Van Graan is the man to do it.

#### Hanrahan Sians For French Club

Currow native JJ Hanrahan looks set to leave Munster and sign for French club Clermont Auvergne. Hanrahan played for Munster originally and also spent two years with Northampton beforning returning. He has rarely been first choice, currently playing second fiddle to the returning Joey Carbery, and the move to a French club may well prove a big step forward for him – French club rugby is both more lucrative in general and also of a higher standard in general. JJ impressed

the French side earlier on this season, scoring 24 points against them in a Champions Cup match.

The 28 year old told munsterugby.ie that "it was difficult to hear the news regarding my future with Munster Rugby, however, it has been a dream come true and a privilege to represent my home province and wear the jersey for eight years. I have lifelong friends from this club, and I am very proud to represent the people of Munster and in particular the people of Kerry. Equally, I believe I am going to a club with very similar traditions and values in Clermont and it's an opportunity I am extremely excited for. Currently my main focus is to give everything I have to the Munster jersey during my time left here in Ireland."

#### **ROWING**

Killorglin Duo Set For European Championships Killorglin has been a wellspring of rowing talent in recent years and it doesn't come as any surprise to hear that Monika Dukarska and Aileen Crowley have been selected to represent Ireland in the Womens' Pair at the European Rowing Championships in Varese, Italy, on April 9th-11th. The pair qualified for the Olympics at the 2019 World Rowing Championships. Aileen Crowley won bronze at the 2020 European Rowing Championships in Poznan - Monika Dukarska missed out through injury but the two time World Champion is back in top form and the Killorglin pair will look to build on Ireland's big success at last year's European Championships.



#### **MOTOR-RACING**

Lewis Hamilton is already hot favourite to retain his Drivers Championship for the fifth year in a row and record eighth time in total after holding off Max Verstappen to win the Bahrain Grand Prix. It was a close-run thing; Verstappen actually overtook Hamilton with three laps to go but faced being penalised if he did not surrender the lead, having run off the track during the overtake. He currently shares the record of seven titles with none other than Michael Schumacher, whose son Mick made his debut in the race. The debutant finished 16th, last of the classified runners, but it was nonetheless a very decent debut. It's worth remembering that his father failed to finish in his first ever Formula 1 race for Team Jordan, the Belgian Grand Prix in 1991.

# TENTATIVE RETURN TO SPORTS ACTION

The Government's announcement of the easing of restrictions last Tuesday has given some light at the end of a long, dark tunnel for a lot of people, especially those who are hoping for



some return of normal sporting activity.

Inter-county GAA teams will be allowed to return to full contact training and challenge games from April 19th . Adult club training resumes in Northern Ireland a week earlier, on April 12th. The GAA will be hopeful of completing a regionalised and compacted National League before running off a Championship that is expected to include a back door. Minor and juvenile non-contact training in all sports in pods of 15 can resume on April 26th. The GAA have accepted the possibility of the club season extending into 2022 – here in Kerry, the 2020 Club Championships have yet to be completed. The GAA are expected to release a national fixture list next week.

It has to be stressed that all fixtures and dates are dependent on circumstances, with Nphet already cautioning the Government that numbers of infection could rise.

The GAA have urged all teams and clubs to adhere strictly to the timetable laid out, with the disappointing news this week that Cork County finallists Castlehaven are under investigation by the gardai for an alleged breach of restrictions by holding a full training session.

Ireland's scheduled hosting of four European Championship matches (Poland, Sweden, and Slovakia as well as a quarter-final tie likely to involve England) has been placed under threat after UEFA announced that it wanted at least 25% capacity in all hosting stadia. It has requested that guarantee by April 7th, an unrealistic time frame certainly in Ireland's

case. As it is, the Departments of Health and Sport are working on making exemptions to quarantine rules for visiting teams and officials.

#### Ireland 1 Qatar 1

Ireland's dismal run of form continued on Tuesday night. Ireland's friendly with Qatar was looked on as a chance to get back on scoring track after that enormously disappointing result to Luxembourg, but Ireland failed to build on a promising start. James McClean had an early shot deflected to the net after a very well-worked corner. Qatar had an initial ruling of a penalty overturned – Bazunu's challenge had been outside the square - but other than that it was Ireland doing the pressing, albeit still without much in terms of a cutting edge in the scoring zone. Their best chance was actually a defender's deflection again, with the keeper making a good save, while Shane Long's long goal drought continued as he failed to convert a one-on=-one chance. Nonetheless Styephen Kenny's side was much the happier at the halfway mark.

It all went wrong just two minutes after the resumption, the defence allowing Mohammad too much room to get off his shot. 1-1, a bad goal to concede, and Qatar grew in confidence from then on. A pity, because once again Ireland seemed to lose energy levels as the game went on. A late free header by Josh Cullen couldn't get past the Qatari keeper and Ireland's chance to record a first win in 13 games, 10 of them under Stephen Kenny, continued, leaving the manager under increasing public pressure.



# COPING WITH GRIEF

Whilst we may often think of grief resulting from the death of a loved one, any loss can cause grief. These losses may include divorce or the break up of a relationship, a miscarriage, loss of a pet, loss of our health, a job, a cherished dream, a friendship, financial security, or selling the family home.

Physical symptoms are also common such as weight loss/gain, insomnia, fatigue, nausea, aches and pains. Forgetfulness and poor concentration are also symptoms of grief. All of these feelings are perfectly normal and there is no right or wrong way to feel. Sometimes people can feel guilty about their anger - but it is okay to be angry. It is important not to go through this alone and to talk and share


your feelings. This may be with family and friends or you may prefer the support of a counsellor. Counselling can offer the space and time to talk through your feelings and overcome obstacles to your grieving. Allowing yourself time to experience your feelings is very important even if, at times, they are difficult. For many people their faith, prayer, meditation or going to church can be a great solace in times of loss. Support groups where you can share your sorrow with others who have experienced similar losses can be also be of tremendous help.

It is vitally important that you take care of yourself when you are grieving. You are coming to terms with a major upheaval in your life so give yourself permission to take things a bit easier. Your energy may be low, so do not place too many demands on yourself and make sure you get enough rest and sleep. It is important to look after your physical health by eating healthily and getting some exercise each day. Don't rush things and put off making major decisions such as moving home or changing jobs for at least six months to a year.

Welcome back dear reader.... 'the life of the body is in the blood' (Leviticus 17:11 NLT). This week we celebrate the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ, the Lamb of God who sacrificed His life so we could be forgiven of our sins and set free. When Jesus was eating 'the last supper' with His disciples, He was actually celebrating Passover which was instituted by God for His people to remember how He miraculously delivered them from slavery (Exodus chapter 12).

God promised that He would deliver His people from their enemies and He did. He told Moses to have each family kill and prepare a perfect lamb. They then put the blood of the lamb over the doorpost of their houses and stayed inside that night while the angel of death swept through the land. The death angel could not cross any threshold that had the blood of the lamb upon it. This is why the Israelites celebrate Passover. God's people were passed over by the spirit of death protected by the blood of the lamb as judgment was poured out upon their oppressors.

Later God told Moses to take two goats and kill one and shake its blood over the people as they gathered to confess their sins and worship God (Leviticus 16:1-34). This blood temporarily covered and made atonement for their sins. The remainder of the blood was poured upon the other goat known as the 'scape-goat', who was then hunted out into the wilderness ceremonially taking all the people's sins with him. But the forgiveness that the people received was only a short term remedy and had to be repeated every year.

When Jesus took the bread and cup that night at Passover, He told His disciples that He was about to become the one-time-for-all Passover Lamb (Hebrews 10:1-39). This New Covenant God made with mankind replaced the blood of goats and lambs which was never a permanent solution for sin. So God sent His Son Jesus to become our scape-goat, the Lamb of God (John 1:36; John 3:16). Jesus was beaten beyond recognition, so that He resembled a hunk of meat upon the Cross. This beating was for our bodies to receive healing (Isaiah 53:3-12). He was nailed to the Cross to pay the price for our sin and curse because 'the wages of sin is death' and 'cursed is everyone who is hung on a tree' so that we could be made righteous and live blessed. Jesus became sin for us - this is why the Father turned His face away from Him, because God cannot look at sin. Jesus died all alone so that we could be forgiven of our sins and restored back to God as if we had never sinned and receive eternal life. He took our sins and paid the ransom that we could never pay. And God then raised Him back to life on Resurrection Sunday defeating death and sin forever (Mark chapters 14, 15, 16). Hallelujah this is the Good News!

# ALPINES

The vast majority of alpine plants are easy to grow in any reasonably well drained garden soil, alpines are ideal plants for rockeries and gaps in stone walls and they will give you colour from early spring right through the summer, the most important thing when choosing your alpine plants is to make sure you find out the growth rates so that one alpine plant won't take over other alpine plants


A good example of this would be an alpine called Cerastium (snow in summer) which is quite a quick growing alpine and spreads quickly in a short space of time. it can tend to take over small rockeries, having said that it is a beautiful plant with silver foliage and is covered, as the name suggests, in beautiful white flowers.

It can be pruned back to keep it under control.

There are also lots of alpines which are compact and can make perfect mounds and shapes, alpines are also great fillers for stone walls, an ideal plant for this would be a Campanula or aubrieta.

the aubrieta is a pink flowering plant that you see growing out of a lot of grottos, alpines can also be used in containers such as in troughs or window boxes but try to choose ones that are evergreen so that you will have some colour all year round.
