Killarney man who was recently diagnosed with cancer has undertaken the The Streets of Killarney 5 Mile Road Race 2025 and is raising much needed funds for Cancer Trials Ireland CLG.

Ciaran Brosnan and his wife Charlene took part in the race with the hope of raising €500, however at the time of going to print this week, they have raised an incredible €23,383, for the charity.

On a post on social media, Ciaran said that he was in the middle of a chemo treatment plan. "My prognosis is good thanks to modern medicine, the quick thinking of my GP and how good the Irish healthcare system has been. Since my diagnosis, the one stat that has startled me is that 1 in 2 of us will get some kind of cancer in our lifetime, which means 50% of the people reading this will get cancer", he said.

Cancer Trials Ireland is the leading cancer research trials organisation in Ireland. Our vision is to provide every patient with cancer access to high-quality and potentially life altering cancer trials and make Ireland a highly attractive location to open cancer trials. Our mission is to develop and provide access to the most efficient and effective cancer clinical trials network, which includes research units, clinical and operational leadership, and enabling services. We work with the foremost Medical, Surgical and Radiation Oncologists, as well as Haematologists and Research Specialists (Oncology Research Nurses, Translational Scientists, Data Managers, Pharmacists and staff) in Ireland. 98% of all cancer treating specialists in Ireland are members of Cancer Trials Ireland.

Speaking to Killarney Outlook, Chairperson of Killarney Valley AC, Jerh Griffin said that both Ciaran and Chantelle completeed the race with incredible support from family, friends, fellow participant's and the vast stewarding team that amounted to 100 volunteers.

Ciaran and Charlene were officially welcomed on the evening to the start line by Chairperson of the municipal council Maura Healy Rae and by chairperson of Killarney valley ac Jeremiah Griffin where they were wished well and thanked for bringing awareness to cancer research.



Mountain Meitheal concludes - bring on the Tidy Towns

A 17-strong group of volunteers from the Kerry branch of Orienteering Ireland this week turned out to give their time and a huge effort to the final Killarney Mountain Meitheal outing of the season.

They joined a group of over 20 regular voluntary workers clearing the



hugely invasive rhododendron species and helping to restore the woodland habitats in Killarney National Park.

The Mountain Meitheal – supported by the National Parks and Wildlife Service with the invaluable support of the Trustees of Muckross House – held no less than 53 work camps between October and this week with an average over 20 volunteers per outing.

"These sessions are essential for keeping key areas free of rhododendron and giving native plants an opportunity to regenerate naturally," said volunteer Johnny McGuire.

"Thanks to the hard work, in all kinds of weather, we're already seeing great results," he added.

For the summer months the volunteers will now turn their hands to the Tidy Towns Meitheal with the aim of keeping Killarney Looking Good for the season ahead.

The first outing of the season will be on Monday, May 12 meeting at the bottle bank in the High Street car park at 6.00pm and everybody is welcome to lend a hand.



Living Life with A Service Dog

In this week's Killarney Outlook, Michelle Corcoran, a parent of a child with an autism service dog shares her experience and raises awareness about autism service dogs and service dogs in general.

Service dogs play a crucial role in supporting individuals with various disabilities, especially those on the autism spectrum. These specially trained dogs provide not only companionship but also vital assistance in navigating everyday challenges. However, a common issue faced by service dog handlers is a lack of public understanding regarding how these dogs should be treated in public spaces.

Many people may feel inclined to approach or pet service dogs, often without realizing that such actions can disrupt the dog's important work. When a service dog is approached, it can lead to distractions that may compromise the safety and well-being of the individual they are assisting. It is vital that we educate the public about the importance of allowing these dogs to focus on their tasks, as well as the etiquette surrounding service animals.

When my son Joshua was diagnosed with autism, our lives changed dramatically. Navigating the world became a challenge, filled with anxiety and uncertainty. However, our journey took a significant turn when Baron, an autism service dog bred and trained by

Autism Assistance Dogs Ireland (AADI), became part of our family.

Baron is not a pet; he is a crucial support system for Joshua. His presence helps ease anxiety during challenging situations, enhancing Joshua's confidence in navigating a world that can feel overwhelming. Baron guides Joshua in public, providing him with an independence he never had before. With Baron by his side, Joshua feels safer, showcasing how transformative the bond between a child and their service dog can he

As we share public spaces with Joshua and Baron, I often notice a lack of awareness about how to interact with service dogs. While enthusiasm and curiosity are heartwarming, it's essential to understand that these dogs are working animals. A key rule to remember is: Do not approach or pet a service dog while they're working. Baron's focus is entirely on Joshua; any distractions can interrupt their essential tasks and compromise their safety and wellbeing.

We are delighted by engagements and questions from the public, as they provide opportunities to educate and raise awareness. However, it is crucial to leave Baron to focus on his job. Instead, I encourage everyone to observe from a distance and appreciate the important work he is doing. If you encounter

a child with a service dog, use the moment to explain the boundaries of interaction, teaching them about the dog's significant role.

While our overall experience in public areas such as retail stores, hotels, and restaurants has been positive, there have been instances where staff were not aware of Irish legislation surrounding the rights of access for service dogs. It is essential for businesses to understand and comply with these laws to ensure that service dogs and their handlers can access public spaces without hindrance.

Baron has not only transformed Joshua's life; he has also profoundly impacted mine. Knowing that my son has a reliable support system in Baron gives me peace of mind, allowing our family to engage more fully with the world which was not always possible before baron came into our lives.

So, the next time you see a service dog, remember to admire from a distance. Acknowledge the bond they share with their handler, and together we can contribute to a culture of respect and understanding. Our collective effort can make a difference—not just for Joshua and Baron, but for countless families who rely on the dedication of service dogs every day.

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
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The Charity' 2025 raises €10,000 for Irish Wheelchair Association

HOUSING FOR ALL, **HOW ARE YOU!**

Several strands in the housing crisis involving Kerry have emerged together over the last week. New minister for Housing, James Browne is essentially returning social housing to local authorities. He is setting targets for all councils.

The reality is councils by not being allowed to be directly involved in housing have actually interfered in the housing market.

Snapping up whole housing estates like Cronin's Wood to hand over to an agency for social housing, drives those seeking to buy their own home out of the town completely not too far off the 17th century when people were driven out of Killarney to Gneeveguilla Barraduff and such.

I asked for figures about direct builds in the light of Minister Browne's new approach. A reply from the council reveals: KCC added only 32 units to its housing stock last year, 20 by direct build and 12 by acquisition.

At the same time, the stark reality of too much Airbnb is revealed in the new ESRI report which lays bare the explosion of holiday lets in Killarney in the last decade.

One in six houses in Killarney now are Airbnb and noise disturbance as well as removing housing supply from long term letting are issues.

What is really surprising is that in Killarney almost half of those who are hosts are NOT the single families or individuals trying to boost income which you would expect - but multiple property owners, many "hosting" five and more properties.

This is far from the comely picture normally painted of homely landladies and small operations.

In the Gaeltacht the plethora of short lets is actually undermining the language itself.

The ESRI report is a wake up call for Killarney and for the Government- the thing has to be reined in not just in terms of population but in

terms of number of houses being let.

Then we have the astonishing news revealed by Pa Daly of Sinn Fein:

"Not one property was delivered under the Local Authority affordable purchase scheme and just one property was delivered in the Cost Rental Tenant in Situ Scheme.

Pa adds: "Rents are also going through the roof. The average rent in Kerry has jumped an eye watering 64% in the last five years."

I see lots of calls by Fianna Fail and the Government independents like the Healy-Raes and the Cahills seeking to free up rural planning. With respect, one-off houses in the country will not solve the housing crisis in Kerry. The only solution is housing units in towns at an affordable price for all ages.

A crisis needs strong politicians and radical solutions - even if it means politicians and political parties have to upset their big donors and powerful backers. I am increasingly of the view Sinn Féin should be handed the housing ministry, even though they are in opposition. They seem the only party with the bottle to take on the vested interests.

THE ARAS PHÁDRAIG AND THE GREEN LAWN

Anger is mounting in Killarney over the traffic crisis. I know that Niall Botty O'Callaghan is not one bit pleased with the plans for the Green Lawn car park which he says are not as he was led to believe. He is going head-to-head with management on the issue.

A head of steam is also building about the Aras which will have to be voted on again. Taking out almost 60 car spaces is the big issue there. Prominent people like Kathleen O'Regan Sheppard are also questioning the need for a theatre saying it was not what was intended by the friars who wanted the building to be for community activities like dancing classes.

We already have the INEC, Kathleen says. The loss of car spaces will be hugely felt by

mass goers, she said on Radio Kerry. Pressure will be coming on the Killarney MD

councillors.

wants to see a 300-seat theatre and training

Martin Grady, is to vote against the plans. He

But he does not want council land to go to the HSE which "has a massive property portfolio" already in town.

The height argument in Killarney was lost years ago, with the building of the Plaza Hotel, the Reeks and the huge multi-storey buildings at the top of High Street and lower New Street. Besides, Lewis Road already has huge multistorey buildings where the old mineral water factory was.

Niall O'Callaghan will not be opposing the plans - doing so would risk funding of perhaps 21 million euro in all being invested in Killarney, is his view. And without the HSE input the Aras and other town centre projects are at risk.

"Are we going to leave the Aras idle for another 15 years?" is Niall's question.

I am reminded how not so long ago the public swimming pool in Killarney was stoutly opposed by hoteliers and tourist interests saying there were enough swimming pools in the town. They were very persuasive about the loss to the public purse. But the majority in the Killarney Town Council resisted the huge pressure, supporting then Minister John O'Donoghue and availing of the generous grant money for the public pool.

The fine pool off the bypass is a great asset to south Kerry and Killarney. And while it is costing a few bob, just as a theatre will, isn't that why we pay taxes - for essential amenities as well as services?



THE PEOPLE'S POPE

Pope Francis' death and funeral touched a chord that was probably last experienced on the death of "the people's princess", Diana. In fact, it was curious how the phrase "people's Pope" was repeatedly used last week. Francis was the people's Pope in a way that has not been experienced previously even on the death of the Polish Pole, now saint John Paul. Diana's strides against the stuffiness and aloofness of the royals won her that title; and Francis' battle with the Vatican curia and his attempts to break out of the rigidity and pomp of centuries earned it for him.

The number of young people in Rome for the funeral surprised many. If we wanted a template of what it is that attracts the younger generation it was there in the simple coffin in St Peter's Square: simplicity and sincerity and a sense of humour. The world is producing fine young people at the moment. They are not at all the spoilt of recent generations. But people who understand the threat to the planet, are not hung up about things like race and sexuality. Even if I don't agree with them on Gaza!They are also increasingly aware that science does not have all the solutions: man does not live by bread alone and that too needs to be recognised.

One wonders how many little boys will now be called Francis?


Annual Creative Arts Exhibition – "WORK" opens at Siamsa Tíre


Exhibited work comes from learners enrolled in

DENIS KERINS RETIRES

After a Lifetime of Service to Education



fter more than 26 years of service : in leadership at Scoil Phobail Sliabh Luachra (SPSL), Denis Kerins retired last October, leaving behind a legacy marked by compassion, commitment, and dedicated leadership. Colleagues, past and present gathered recently to celebrate this special occasion and the career of a man who was much admired by staff, students, parents and members of the local community in Rathmore. Mr. Kerins served as principal of SPSL from 2008 until his retirement in October 2024, having previously held the role of deputy principal since 1998. His long-standing presence in the school has left an indelible mark on the entire school community.

Denis began his teaching career in 1970 with County Dublin VEC, teaching Science at Stillorgan Vocational School for seven years. Following a career break in which he volunteered on a horticultural and education project in Lesotho, Africa, he returned to the classroom at St. Kevin's Community College in Clondalkin, where he taught for a further nine years, before moving to Kerry and joining the team at what would become SPSL.

As principal, Denis oversaw significant building projects and school extensions, helping to future-proof the school for generations to come. His leadership was especially evident during the Covid-19 pandemic, where he navigated the challenges of remote teaching and learning with calm, compassion, and an unwavering focus on student and staff wellbeing.

A standout moment during his tenure was the celebration of the 25th anniversary of SPSL's founding — the amalgamation of St. Mary's Secondary School and Rathmore Vocational School. The event symbolised the unity, growth, and spirit of the school, all values Denis worked tirelessly to uphold.

Known for his tireless work ethic and approachable manner, Denis was a steady presence in the lives of students and staff alike. He was especially mindful of those who faced personal or academic difficulties, always ensuring support was available for those who needed it most. Such sentiments were widely expressed by colleagues who spoke on the night about Denis and how he will be remembered in SPSL.



Since 2021 these donations along with the many other individual donations too numerous to mention here are included in the large cheque presented April 16th, 2025. Currently there are 470 people living with MND in Ireland and sadly 20 of these people live in County Kerry which has the highest number of MND sufferers per capita in the country, and It costs the Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association approx. €2.75 million to provide these services annually, but it is sad to report that 85% of this figure is heavily dependent on fundraising.

EMERGENCY CENTRES RAISED AT KCC MEETING

At a recent Kerry County Council meeting, Cllr. John O'Donoghue raised the following Notice of Motion:

"In our recent briefing, ESB Networks stated that going forward they would see generators being utilised when necessary in the Community Hubs set up to great effect during the last storm. I now ask that that we would write to them and ask that in advance of next winter, they would liaise with these centres to ensure electrical wiring/infrastructure etc within the buildings are set up for a generator, and that they would provide assistance, either financial or by doing the work themselves, to facilitate this".

We recently received an excellent briefing from ESB networks where current policy and work practices were discussed. One item which came up for discussion was the emergency centres set up during the recent storms. These were a huge success and I know that here in my own area, Spa Gaa Club's facilities were made available and those who availed of them were extremely thankful as it allowed them to charge phones etc and have showers. There has been much talk recently of generators being provided to those who may need to maintain power to lifesaving equipment, but it was explained to us that it is not as simple as connecting a wire to the generator in order to power the house. With this in mind I am asking that the ESB would identify the buildings they plan to use as emergency centres in the future, and that they would contact the organisations who own these buildings and install any electrical infrastructure necessary to operate a generator in case they suffer a power outage during a storm. It is imperative that any centre set up for use in times of emergency would not have any impediment to their delivery of service. It is equally important that this work is done in advance of them being set up again.

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A well deserved honour for Ring of Kerry Founder Denis Geaney

You won't always recognise people who change the world. You think of people like Elon Musk or Steve Jobs. In an earlier age you'd think of the little Corsican (Napoleon wasn't that short; it was English propaganda), the first Caesarean emperor of Rome, or Bismarck pulling the European strings. When it comes to people who change the world, you don't necessarily think of quiet-spoken, friendly Currow natives.

And you'd be wrong. In 1982 Denis Geaney, a cycling enthusiast, was chatting with some friends in Seamus McCarthy's popular gym. Cycling wasn't exactly a mainstream activity back then, well before the likes of Seán Kelly and Stephen Roche, and the likes of Denis and the Looneys Pat and Theresa weren't pretending that it was. But they liked it, and Denis had an idea that it would be useful. How about a cycle for charity? They debated it as friends do, partially in jest but mostly in

I doubt if they thought it would make much of an impact on the world. How could it? What they were thinking was that Tralee General really needed a dialysis machine and they could play a small part in raising the necessary funds. That was it. That was all that they were trying to

Where to cycle? What would draw the support of a largely indifferent public? Carrauntoohil was mooted. Not a bad idea; maybe in hindsight a little bit impractical. Some-one else – history does not record who, it may well have been Denis himself – suggested the worldfamous Ring of Kerry. 110 miles in one go. For amateurs, but enthusiastic amateurs. Difficult? Sure. Impossible? No.

Denis set to organising it, and there is a lot of organising in setting up such a thing. But the right man was on board to do it. In the end, 46 cyclists came on board and completed the cycle thanks to a host of volunteers along the way. A total of £10, 600 was raised, a huge sum in the context of the times – a pint of guinness cost a pound back then.

43 years later the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle is one of the most popular annual events in the calendar. For safety reasons - and safety is always treated as paramount - participation is limited to 9500. There are hundreds of volunteers along the way, including medical staff and gardaí. Over €20 million has been raised for a huge number of worthy causes. All of it goes to charity, neither Denis nor any of his cohorts, the likes of Cathal Walshe (long-serving PRO and a great charity contributor in his own right), Dan McCarthy, John Shepherd, and Paddy O'Donoghue, have ever taken a single cent for themselves. That's not who they are.

Denis stayed on as President of the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle until 2008 and remains actively involved to this day. It was announced this week that he is being honoured with a fully deserved Civic Reception.

Oh, and the dialysis machine in Tralee General? It's not called Tralee General anymore, it's University Hospital Kerry. And yes, it took a while, but they got a dialysis machine thanks to the Ring of Kerry Charity Cycle. That's how people change the world.

High-Risk Forest Fire Warning in Place -Coillte Urges Public to be Vigilant During May Bank Holiday Weekend



STATUS ORANGE HIGH FOREST FIRE RISK WARNING IN PLACE NATIONALLY UNTIL 12PM TUESDAY 6TH MAY

All Forest Fires in Ireland arise from human activity

A status orange high fire risk warning is in place across the May Bank Holiday Weekend due to current dry weather patterns.

The warm, dry conditions Ireland is currently experiencing are expected to continue into the weekend, increasing the risk of fire spreading, particularly with low humidity and moderate winds.

With increased visitor numbers to local forests expected over the May Bank Holiday, Coillte is urging the public to avoid lighting fires or barbecues in high-risk areas outdoors and to remember:

Do not light fires in the outdoors around forests or open land.

Do not attempt to intervene or fight forest fires under any circumstances. Gather all family/group members and move to a safe fuel-free location

such as a car park, upwind of the fire.

Telephone Fire and Rescue Services via 112 and report the fire and its location.

Evacuate if instructed to do so, and cooperate with all Emergency Service Instructions

Landowners and rural users should stay alert, report any suspicious activity to An Garda Síochána, and ensure emergency access routes remain clear.

With the weather becoming warmer and dryer, dead grasses, gorse and heather become much more flammable and fire spreads quickly once ignited. These forest fires can be devastating and almost always arise from preventable human activities- whether this be the lighting of barbecues or campfires in wooded areas or the burning of land that spirals out of control.

The ramifications of forest fires are far reaching and severe. Not only do they jeopardise public safety and the lives of those in the Emergency Services and working in forestry who are battling the flames , but they also wreak havoc on ecosystems, wildlife, and protected habitats. The ecological damage and heightened emissions of CO2 pollutants can be profound and enduring, requiring years, if not decades to recover. At this time of year, wildlife is especially vulnerable to fire such as ground nesting bird species.

Forest fires also exact a heavy financial toll on forest owners, encompassing the costs of firefighting operations, the devaluation of timber resources, and the expenses associated with rehabilitating scorched landscapes and replanting the forest.

Forest fires are extremely dangerous, they should never be approached and members of the public should never attempt to extinguish them. Visitors to forest recreational areas are urged to comply with fire safety protocols, respect relevant bye-laws, and ensure that parked vehicles do not obstruct access for emergency services.

Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant:

€2.9 million paid out in Kerry to bring 54 homes back into use

Croí Cónaithe Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant

The Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage, James Browne TD has today published figures which show that over €112 million has been paid out to Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant applicants, bringing more than 2,000 homes back into residential use from vacancy nationwide.

More than 12,400 applications for the grant have been received across Ireland by the end of March this year.

A new interactive story map developed by Minister Browne's Department has also been launched with today's statistics. The map shows the far reaching impact of the grant scheme across the country since its launch. Information includes the number of grants issued per local authority since the scheme's launch. 'Before and after' images of some of the refurbishment works already carried out by grant recipients under the scheme are available to view.

The new map is available at: Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant statistics The number of grants being paid out continues to rise significantly each quarter, as works on properties are completed. More than 11 grants were issued in Kerry Q1 2025 on completion of works, according to the new figures.

Overall, since the launch of the grant in July 2022, in Kerry there have been 583 applications, 306 approvals and 54 grants issued up to 31 March 2025.

"Puffin's courtship can sometimes involve food especially during the breeding season. Male puffins, will sometimes exhibit their ability to catch and carry fish. This is one way to impress potential mates and show them their skills which is important for raising chicks. The more common display of courtship is called "billing" rubbing their beaks together and head jerking movements. The Atlantic puffins form monogamous bonds and often rerturn to the same burrow with the same mate year after year.

CRONIN EXPECTS NO HOME COMFORTS IN KILLARNEY

For Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin, current leaders of the NAPA Auto Parts Irish Tarmac Rally Championship, this weekend's Assess Ireland Rally of the Lakes represents their home fixture. They are both members of the organising Killarney and District Motor Club, and Galvin is from the town. Cronin, meanwhile, hails from Ballylickey, in the far south west of County Cork, but still within the Killarney club's extensive hinterland. While the rally may be on familiar territory for the defending Tarmac Champions, it was not especially kind to them last year, and they will be hoping for a more successful outcome on this occasion.

Twelve months ago, they took the lead on stage two, and built up a sizable advantage of over half a minute through the next few tests. It seemed that they were on an unassailable path to victory, but that outcome was undone by a puncture on Ardgroom. They eventually took fastest time on ten of the event's fourteen stages, but that was not enough to undo the damage, and the win went to Callum Devine and Noel O'Sullivan, marking their third Rally of the Lakes success in a row. Cronin and Galvin went on to win the Tarmac Championship, but only after tie-break had to be invoked to separate them from Devine and O'Sullivan, who finished the year on the same points total.

Devine and O'Sullivan will lead the Rally of the Lakes field away from the Killarney start as the No. 1 seeds in their Skoda Fabia RS. They will be followed by Cronin and Galvin in the M O'Brien of Companies/Shane Casey Electrical Services Citroën C3 Rally 2, with Matt Edwards and David Moynihan next up in their Hyundai i20N. Welsh visitor, Meirion Evans, co-driven by local man, Ger Conway, starts at four in a Toyota GR Yaris.

"We've seen how fickle rallying can be, especially over the past couple of years," says Cronin. "We had a good lead built up on the Lakes twelve months ago when we got the puncture on Saturday afternoon, it cost us well over two minutes. Any chance of winning the rally was gone and I really felt like parking it up, but Mikie : pushed me on to keep going. We had another few fastest times on the Sunday, and wound up fourth. Later on in the season we won in Ulster, that was really important in terms of the Tarmac Championship, and we got it on the Cork '20' on the tie-break. This year we've seen both sides again, we got the win in West Cork after Jon Armstrong had his engine problem after the final stage, then on the Circuit of Ireland a couple of weeks ago we had the brake issues when we were leading with a couple of stages to go, and ended up eighth at the finish. You have to put in the times, but you need a bit of luck as well to get it over the line.

While he may be on home ground this weekend, Cronin is taking nothing for granted with regard to the rally or the championship, and is quick to recognise the strengths of the opposition. "Callum and Noel started the year late, but they already have a maximum score from the Circuit, and they always go well in Killarney, they've won the last three. They've also won in Donegal for the past two years. If they were to repeat those results again this season it would be very difficult to hold them back from winning the championship. Matt and David have had two nonfinishes, so they've nothing to lose by going all-out from now on. I expect that Meirion and Ger will be pushing us also, we've seen what the Toyota can do on the British Championship rounds. We'll have to give it our best to stay in the mix. These two rallies will be crucial to how the year unfolds for all of us."

The Ceremonial Start of the Assess Ireland Rally of the Lakes will take place in Killarney town centre on Friday evening. There is an early start for the crews on Saturday, with the first of the day's nine stages getting under way at 8.13am. The layout will consist of three loops of three stages. Headford, Lisbabe and Red Bog, to the east and north of the town. The rally will re-start on Sunday morning with the famous Molls Gap stage at 10:50am, and this is followed by Beallaghbeama and Shanara. This loop is repeated in the afternoon, making a total of six stages on Day 2. The Finish Ramp celebrations will take place at Rally Headquarters, the Gleneagle Hotel, at 5.15pm.

Keith Cronin and Mikie Galvin are supported by M O'Brien Group of Companies, Shane Casey Electrical Services, Michelin Tyres, Cronin's Centra (Ballylickey, Union Hall, Leap, Millstreet and Dundrum), Cronin's HomeValue Hardware, Daybreak Westlink, Cremin Coaches, Seafoods, Keohane Citroën Racing, and Race and Rally Motorsport. 



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Plan your strategy for the final weeks before the State Exams

TIME MANAGEMENT

As exam candidates attend school for the final term before the State Exams begin on the 4th June, they have already done a fair amount of work. Many exam candidates have worked diligently and consistently throughout the year. Others may have been less focussed and motivated as they travelled the road to next June's exams. But the fact remains that every exam candidate has a foundation of work, however solid or precarious, on which to build over the next few weeks. Efficient and careful use of the remaining weeks will be enough to get you safely over the finish line. No matter how little work you have done, you can still achieve a worthwhile result in your exam if you put your best effort into the final weeks. It's also important to appreciate that you know a great deal more than you realise.

SMART GOALS

The immediate priority now is to reassess your goals and make a plan of action. The time for procrastination has well and truly passed. It's essential to have clear goals and an action plan to help you to be successful. If you are to achieve your academic goals, they will have to be SMART – specific, measurable, achievable, realistic and time-lined. Your focus must now be on your total readiness for June's exams. Avail of all the help at your disposal during the next few weeks to ensure that you are in tip top shape for the challenge of the exams.

ATTEND

The subject teacher at school, who after all is the expert, will guide you through the last few weeks in revision, exam techniques and overall subject strategy. Attend school regularly during the final term and maintain a diligent work schedule to give yourself every possible chance of achieving your goals. Be clear in your own mind as to what exactly your goals are. Have confidence in your ability to achieve them. Have a plan to accomplish your aim

and, critically, execute your plan by doing the necessary work.

REVIEW

Carry out an honest review of your exam programme straight away. Make a decision about the level – higher, ordinary or foundation - of the paper you will answer in each subject. Set a target grade in each subject. Convert each grade to CAO points and add up your six best scores. Now you have a target grade in each subject and an overall points' target to help motivate you. It's vital at this late stage to set realistic goals. For example, if you feel you may not be able for a higher-level paper in a particular subject, are you not far better off taking an ordinary level paper in that subject where you may achieve a decent grade? Consider what you would like to do after the Leaving Cert exam. A singular determination to achieve enough points to get a place in your course of interest is a great motivator. Perhaps, your primary motivator should be to do yourself justice in the exam and to achieve results that reward your ability and effort. Having clear and focussed goals will make your last term more productive and rewarding.

CHALLENGE

Regard the next few weeks and the actual exam as a challenge that you will meet headlong and with determination. Approach it with confidence and belief in yourself. Take total control of your life and channel your energy in a positive direction. Every time you have a doubt or a negative thought about yourself replace it with a positive one. You will feel better about yourself if you are in control of your situation. To assume that control set aside some time to make out a plan of action. Decide what topics you need to revise between now and the exam. Make out an overall time schedule, a weekly schedule and a daily schedule. Make out that plan of action over the next few days.





WHEN CAN YOU ACCESS YOUR PENSION & WHAT ARE YOUR OPTIONS WHEN YOU WANT TO RETIRE?

You can normally get access to your pension from age 60, a lot of the rules depend on whether you are an employee or self employed. 



EASY SHINY NAILS!!

Buff normal nails once a month for a high shine but if your have ridges or peeling you may need to buff them more often. Do not over buff your nails or they become weak and brittle. Gently buff over and back until you are satisfied, do not go too hard or overdo it.

The Four Way Buffing Block (from €3 in pharmacies) is an essential tool for naturally groomed nails. It has a different grit on each side which is often labeled by numbers to guide you when using it.

Side 1 is to shape your nails by filing them. Side 2 is to smooth your nails and any ridges you may have. Side 3 has a finer grit which you can buff a little faster with to



really smooth your nails. Side 4 is to polish and shine the nails so you can buff faster here to finish. Buffing your nails increases the circulation to your nail bed making it stronger. It removes any ridges and dull nail cells leaving a smooth, healthy shine.

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THE IMPORTANCE OF EXERCISE FOR BONE HEALTH

When most people think about exercise, weight loss, building muscle and heart health sprinf to mind. But there is another important reason to stay active-your bones!

As we get older our bone density naturally decreases causing them to be more fragile and more susceptible to fractures. Conditions such as osteopenia and osteoporosis are becoming more and more common especially in women after menopause. The good news is that we can slow or reduce bone density loss through exercise.

When you move your body especially through resistance or weight bearing exercises, it puts stress on our bones. This stress is good and causes the bones to become denser and stronger in order to handle the load.

The great news is that simple lifestyle changes can make a huge difference. Weight bearing exercises such as walking or dancing can easily be included into your daily routine and assists bone growth. Try to aim to get at least 30 minutes of eight bearing exercises every day.

Strength training in the gym or at home 2-3 times per week builds muscle and increases the strength put on bones which in turn strengthen them. Start small by doing bodyweight exercises or using a resistance band and make sure to include rest days!

Exercise isn't just about how you look but more about how you feel. Prioritising bone health can help prevent serious injuries and boost your activity levels and independence in the future.

WHAT IS BLEPHARITIS?

causes to become red, swollen and inflamed. It doesn't normally cause serious damage to the eyes, but it can be very uncomfortable. It tends to be a long-term condition, which means you're likely to need ongoing treatment. Severe cases do have a risk of causing long-term damage, but fortunately these are quite rare.

TYPES OF BLEPHARITIS

There are two main types of blepharitis - anterior and posterior.

Anterior blepharitis

When the front (anterior) part of the eyelids becomes sore, this can be caused by an infection, allergy or a general sensitivity to bacteria present on the eyelids. It can also be associated with some scalp conditions, such as very dry or oily skin and dandruff.

Posterior blepharitis

Also known as meibomian gland dysfunction (MGD) is when the glands that make the oily part of your tears become blocked. Both types of blepharitis can cause dry eye or make it worse if you already have it. Many people will have a combination of blepharitis, meibomian gland dysfunction and dry eye.

RISK FACTORS

Blepharitis is more common in people over the age of 50, but anyone can develop it. This is often because the glands that make the normal tears, particularly the oily part of

the tears, tend to become less effective as you get older.

SYMPTOMS

Blepharitis can cause crusting and white scales may stick to the roots of eyelashes. Your eyelid edges may become red and your eyes will feel gritty, burning, sore or itchy. If you experience these symptoms, make an appointment with vour optometrist.

TREATMENT

There is a range of products designed especially for treating blepharitis, such as sterile pads, individual moist wipes and separate cleaning solutions.

As part of the treatment, you need to remove all the crusting and debris from the edge of your eyelids and from between your eyelashes. You should use a special lid cleaning product. Treatment of blepharitis is a long-term procedure. You may not see any improvement for several weeks.

Continue the treatment twice a day for at least one month, then less often as it starts to get better. You will probably need to continue to clean your lids at least twice a week to help prevent the blepharitis from returning.

Ministers announce additional resources for Local Authorities as they prepare to move to the national electoral registration system

Total funding allocation for 2025 is now €3m - building on significant progress to date

Minister for Housing, Local Government and Heritage James Browne TD, and Minister of State with responsibility for Local Government and Planning John Cummins TD, today (Monday 28 April) announced additional staffing for local authorities to intensify work on their electoral register data. The additional resources, agreed with the County and City Management Association, will be in addition to existing staff, and to the €1.7m already allocated to Local Authorities across the country this year to build on work done in 2023 and 2024.

The Ministers have now made over €3m available to local authorities for 2025 as they enter a critical phase of the electoral registration modernisation project.

The two elements of funding will enable local authorities to build on progress in 2023 and 2024 to update the electoral register and in addition, will put in place two additional staff resources in each local authority specifically to address identified data issues in preparation for the move to the new national electoral registration system in 2026.

The Electoral Reform Act 2022 made significant changes to the electoral registration process, including introducing rolling voter registration and enabling online applications. More than 880,000 online applications to register as a voter have been received and processed by Local Authorities.

HOUSING CRISIS

Kerry's newest County Councillor, Fianna Fáil's Tommy Cahill, has identified the provision of Planning Permission for homes on family-owned land in the county, as one of the key factors in tackling the housing crisis.

"I believe that Planning Permission rules need to be loosened up a little to facilitate the building of more homes for our young people setting out in life and that we must come up with new initiatives to encourage and support it. I'd like South



Kerry/Iveragh to be a pilot area to develop cluster/community housing for all of our people. We need Kerry County Council to come on board and initiate a scheme of low cost sites to get people up onto the property ladder" stated the Rossbeigh Councillor.

"Kerry County Council have responded to my suggestions by advising that their Planning Department offers a pre-planning service and will actively engage with landowners and other stakeholders who wish to develop such an initiative. I welcome that, but I would go one step further and say that KCC should be leading this initiative on behalf of the people of Kerry" said Councillor Cahill.

"Let's put a proper framework around this, utilise the expertise we have within Kerry County Council, identify initiatives and funding, lobby our Government to legislate appropriately in order that affordable homes can be built in Kerry in an orderly manner. If we all put our heads together, have an open mind on the way forward, we will discover solutions to this housing shortage" said Tommy Cahill. "Planning laws and Wastewater Treatment issues are two major obstacles that must be dealt with. If we crack these two nuts, we will be heading in the right direction on housing unit supply" added Councillor Cahill.

Council No-Show Is Dereliction of Duty - Griffin

Kerry County Councillor for the Corca Dhuibhne Electoral Area, Tommy Griffin, has described Kerry County Council's failure to provide a representative for a crime prevention meeting in Milltown as a dereliction of duty. Last night (Monday) over 150 people attended the meeting in Nagle Rice Community Centre in the town, which was organised and chaired by Cllr Griffin.

Members of An Garda Síochána and Cluid Housing Association were present to listen to concerns from the local community in relation to anti-social behaviour and social housing policy in Milltown. However, despite initially accepting an invitation, Kerry County Council said that it would not be sending a representative on the day of the meeting.

Cllr Griffin said that he was not just disappointed with the decision by Kerry County Council, but was disgusted by it.

He said: "This meeting was about bringing key stakeholders together to discuss in a sensible and respectful way the challenges facing Milltown in relation to crime prevention and balanced future development. That the local authority, perhaps the most important public stakeholder would refuse to attend is a slap in the face to the local people in Milltown, over 150 of whom saw it important enough to attend the meeting last night.

"Kerry County Council, as our local government, has an obligation to engage with local communities, especially in relation to areas such as forward planning and demographic shifts. I have recently worked very hard with the local community and Kerry County Council officials to help finalise a draft Town Plan, but now that this phase of work has concluded, it seems Kerry County Council has no further interest in one of Kerry's most rapidly growing

population centres. "At a time when far-left and far-right extremism is becoming more and more of a feature of online and everyday life, factual and balanced grassroots

community fora such as this meeting have never been so important. Decision makers in County Buildings need to review this case and consider whether ignoring the local people who they are there to serve is really a wise policy.

"I will be raising this no-show at the next meeting of Kerry County Council and will be demanding better for the people who elected me to represent them. Kerry County Council needs to work with communities not alienate

Lydia McDonagh did get a shellshocked Cork on the scoreboard but Kerry were lording the middle third and putting it on the scoreboard. Caoimhe Evans, Rachel Dwyer, and Siofra O'Shea fired over and Danielle and Siofra added frees to make it 1-8 to 0-2. Katie Quirke had Cork's second point and she tried hard all through, but got very little change out of a tigerish Eilís Lynch.

Melissa Duggan, ostensibly a cornerback, is very much in the Tom O'Sullivan school of raiding from deep and kicked another Cork point. Siofra O'Shea replied with a free and Caoimhe Evans added her second point of the game. Just before the half-time whistle, Danielle made it 1-11 to 0-3 to Kerry, and the game looked done and dusted.

Cork are Cork. Even on the hard days, they will always muster some kind of response. They had the wind at their backs now and, more importantly, they had the character to stand up and be counted. Kerry were showing a little bit of complacency perhaps – certainly, it was Cork

who were giving off a sense of urgency now and it began to pay dividends.

Katie Quirke was in the eye of the storm and reeled off three rapid points (1f). Abigail Ring also split the posts. Emma Cleary and Quirke with another free made it 1-11 to 0-9 – that was six points on the trot from Cork. Just five points in it now; I was getting worried.

A six point win didn't flatter Kerry in the finish, not after that devastating first half, but Cork will take serious encouragement out of their fightback in the second.

And yes, Down have shipped two tough defeats, but they have come against top teams (Carlow are virtually certain to go into the final as favourites over Laois). Are ye really sure that we are going that much better than Down? Maybe have a glance at the recent history books - or go back a lot further if you want. Ben Murphy drove through everyone – too easily for me – and forced a good save out of Billy Curtin. In fairness, back came Cork, and Dylan O'Neill's effort was cleared off the line – I'm told it was Killian Dennehy, I just couldn't make out the player at the time.

Kerry were already asserting themselves in the one on one exchanges though. Ciarán Collins adroitly fisted over. SOCCER **Marc Canham**



The news broke last week that Marc Canham would be leaving the FAI shortly and retuning back to his native England. It was Billy Shakespeare, nigh on as good a writer as myself, who said "The evil that men do lives after them; the good is oft interred with their bones". Or, if I may borrow a phrase from my mother - who wouldn't be taking too much guff off me and even less off Billy - "If you can't say something good about some-one, say nothing at all."

I am racking my brain as I review Caham's brief

enough FAI career. I have nothing at all to say except that I wish him well on farther shores. Much farther shores. And can we please throw out that ridiculous development proposal, at least attempt to develop a system that involves a funding model for League of Ireland development academies (the League of Ireland is currently enjoying a popularity that hasn't been seen in over half a century - but the vast majority are still operating at a loss, and the LOI clubs have made it very clear that Abbottstown is not going to be operating their academies through their facilities) and a coaching programme that doesn't involve three hour bus journeys each way for juveniles. The Emerging Talent Programme wasn't perfect, but it was a lot better than the new proposals, but the ETP's were cancelled on the same day taht Marc Canham announced his 'promotion' to Chief Football Officer. If that sounds suspiciously like corporate guff at best, well spotted. It's no secret that the League of Ireland, Junior Leagues, Schoolboy/Schoolgirl Associations, and the FAI have all been at loggerheads with each other. Delaney and co. regularly exploited that divide. Hill, Courell, and Canham only succeeded in widening the cracks.

As for the idea of an international senor manager reporting directly to a 'Chief Football Officer'.....why? Is the administrative officer and I am not knocking administrative officers in general, they provide a genuine crucial role in any organisation - going to over-rule a senior manager? Are they going to take coaching sessions?

Marc Canham presumably did his best. But I don't think it's presumptuous to hope for better, much better, from whoever lifts that poisoned chalice next.

BACK TO THE EIGHTIES

Right up to the late seventies, the English League (long before the 1992 'Premiership' was surprisingly democratic, with a large number of club vying for the winners' enclosure every year. I know the wage cap was long abolished by then - apparently the Premiership are mooting the idea of introducing a team salary cap again, good luck with that and in the meantime, let us know how that famous 115 charges against Man City for breaching FFP regulations is going. Man United were dominant for a long time. They had a lad from Cork who was one of the most consistent players I ever saw and had a great knack for scoring goals. That's a lot more Gráinne agus Fionn Mac Cumhal than Diarmuid agus Gráinne about Wrexham's story.

Those of ye who attended secondary school in the eighties will get that Irish cultural reference. Pretty much all of gaelic culture's romantic stories could absolutely double up as horror movies - mind you, those of a delicate disposition should stay very far away from the original stories from the Grimm brothers. Snow White.....no. All of that manufactured controversy about how the recent film wasn't true to the original story? That original story is far worse than anything you are imagining; it really was.

I studied Teoraíocht Diarmuid agus Gráinne for Irish. Well, I'll rephrase. I was supposed to study Diarmuid agus Gráinne. And that reminded me of something.

Liverpool are Premiership winners. And deservedly so. Don't any rubbish about moneyball - that nonsense applied to statistical stop/start sports with individual plays. It's a

useful tool for a lot of things, but a fluid field sport like soccer? No. Congratulations to Liverpool. They have been consistently the best team in England this year and they deserve. They are almost so good I could learn to hate them again.

KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL STOPPING HOUSE BUILDING IN KERRY

With the country in the midst of a unprecedented housing crisis and builders are putting the blame for this squarely on the shoulders of senior management staff of Kerry County Council, accusing them of making the problem worse.

ERRATIC PLANNING DECISIONS WITHOUT CONSEQUENCES FOR KERRY COUNTY COUNCIL

Builders have expressed the view that it is easier to build houses in Cork than it is in Kerry. In Cork, for example, builders carry out the work, a snag list of any outstanding issues is created, the builders rectify those issues and any bond funds are promptly returned to the builder. Bond funds are amounts of money held back from the builder by the bank until all work has been completed. If the council delays signing off on the completion of the snag list, the bond funds are not released back to builder and they are left out of pocket. In Cork, once the snag list has been signed off, the maintenance of any new housing development is promptly taken over by Cork County Council. Builders claim that it is much more problematic dealing with Kerry County Council. It can take years for an official snag list to be created. The saga does not end here. When that list is finally completed, more maintenance issues are added. Builders have claimed that this final stage can take years and can add unnecessary financial stress. In effect, builders are being used to maintain an estate, post-build. In many cases, the builder ends up just forfeiting the bond, as it becomes too costly to continue completing the constant snag lists generated by Kerry County Council. Works are rarely carried out with these bond funds and ultimately the money ends up in the road maintenance programme for the whole county.

While waiting for Kerry County Council to take over the maintenance of their estate, the residents are obliged to pay for that maintenance themselves, and all the while, Kerry County Council continue their delaying tactics. These residents already pay road tax which goes towards road maintenance. And they are also paying local property tax. Why are the most pressured group in society being treated so badly? Typically these are young people with young families struggling to pay bills and Kerry County Council has the power to make their lives a little bit easier but unfortunately, the opposite is the case.

A number of County Councillors have said that they do not have the power to change things. They were critical of council management who have just brushed their concerns aside.



A builder built an extra tilliteren houses in an existing nousing estate. The builder rerouted heavy traffic away from the estate and used an existing farm road at the rear of the site to access the building site. The photo shows the relief road and this road was in existence long before his company built these houses. After the houses were built the Council instructed the builder to go onto private property and dig up the relief road and turn the area into a green field otherwise Kerry County Council will take €20,000 via a bond from the builder. Kerry County Council contacted this publication stating that the heading of this article is "grossly misleading and incorrect". Nobody wants badly built estates but this example does

not entice builders to build houses.



This is a photo of a manhole that was built in 2008.

This manhole is in perfect condition after sixteen years.

The specifications on building a manhole has changed recently and Kerry County Council wants all the manholes in the estate dug up and rebuild under the updated specifications and this work will cost the builder £45,000.

Kerry County Council does not accept that this decision is a gross abuse of power. There is no appeal system and no consequence for the decision makers.



This is a photo of an item on a snag list from a builder. Kerry County Council wants the builder to remove the fence and replace it with a fence that's a few inches taller. Because there is a slope in the green area the fence measures 2 mtrs when measured from the back and 1.85mtrs when measured from the front because of the slope in the green area. Does it really matter if this fence is a few inches shorter. This is an example of the nonsense that builders have to put up with from Kerry County Council.





"The Lord is good to all; He has compassion on all He has made. The Lord is Trustworthy in all He promises, and Faithful in all He does. The Lord upholds all who fall and lifts up all who are bowed down." (Psalm 145:9-14)


