The death has occurred of Gene Moriarty, unexpectedly on the 22nd of May 2023. Beloved husband and best friend of Margaret (Nee Murphy) and devoted father of Amy. Sadly missed and dearly loved by his family, brothers-in-law Noel, Gearóid and Seán and his wife Máire, sister-in-law Martina and her husband Brendan (Kelliher), nieces, nephew, Amy's partner Mikey, relatives, his many friends and all in the Fossa GAA Community.

All club members were deeply saddened on the passing of our hugely active stalwart member and friend Gene Moriarty. Born at Fossa Cross Gene Moriarty is surely a Fossa Man Apart. He recalled that

Aptly an article about himself is titled "Football & A Sense of place" the title alone demonstrates the love of his parish, his local club and football. Gene had a massive knowledge of all youngsters who played for Fossa and took a great interest in who they were, where the parents were from, grandparents and if any football or sporting connections. He got great joy in our victories at all age group but would burst with pride when our players went on to represent Schools, Development Squads, Colleges, District and County teams. He took great delight and immense pride in the last year when 2 Celtic Crosses came to the club followed by the club's All Ireland Junior win. Fossa apart Gene also had a great knowledge of the East Kerry teams and phenomenal memory of the Kerry teams since the foundation of the GAA.

Currently Gene was serving as registrar and County Board delegate, which he has done for over the last decade and his opinions were always valued at our executive meetings.

Our sincere and deep condolences to the family at this time, he will be sadly missed.

Requiem Mass for Gene will take place today, Friday 2nd June at 11am in The Prince of Peace Church Fossa will burial afterwards in Kilbonane Graveyard.

Killarney Looking Good Competition returns

Over three decades after it was first initiated, to help improve the aesthetic values of the town, the Killarney Looking Good Competition is back with a vengeance with a new committee, new categories, new sponsors and a whole new approach.

When the project was first launched in 1991 it was a relatively low-key community event but it grew in importance with each passing year, culminating in some style when Killarney won the prestigious overall award in the national tidy towns competition in 2011.

After an enforced three-year absence since 2019, due to the pandemic, the competition has now been given a whole new lease of life and the 2023 version was officially launched this week by Mayor of Killarney, Cllr Niall Kelleher.

Awards will be presented in 26 different categories and high achievers in the business and residential community will be honoured at a gala prizegiving ceremony at the close of the tourist season.

This year two new categories are being introduced in memory of two remarkable people who played massive roles in keeping Killarney looking its best down through the years.

Yvonne Quill, who passed away last October, was the driving force behind the Killarney tidy towns campaign for several years and she was at the helm when the sought-after overall award was secured 12 years ago.

This year the Yvonne Quill Memorial Award will be presented to the volunteer of the year – a person who the adjudicators consider to be a standout contributor – in the overall effort to keep Killarney tidy.

Up to the time of his death in January 2020,

Fr Michael Murphy was the public face of tidy towns and he played a huge part in Killarney, Kenmare and Sneem winning the overall national award in 2011, 2000 and 1987 respectively. Affectionately known as Fr Tidy, this year the Killarney Looking Good Competition will honour his memory with a special Pride of Place award.

In the business community, there will be awards for the best large and small commercial premises, best newly painted premises, best signage and the best retail award with prizes also for the most impressive hotel, public house, restaurant, café, guesthouse and best public building as well as the most improved premises.

In the residential categories awards will go to the best large and small estates, best private residence, best roadside garden, best floral display and best friendly planting award.

Other categories include a green hospitality award, a corporate special responsibility award, a restoration award, best school and a special biodiversity award.

Several highly commended awards will also be

up for grabs and the winner of the prestigious overall award will be announced at the prizegiving ceremony.

The Killarney Looking Good Competition is organised by Killarney Chamber of Tourism and Commerce and Killarney Municipal District Council and the new committee comprises Sandra Dunlea – a daughter of the late Yvonne Quill – Kathleen Foley, John O'Mahony and Johnny McGuire who is spearheading the project.

MD O'Shea & Sons are the new overall sponsors of the competition and O'Mahony Media Ltd is the media sponsor.

The competition will run throughout the tourist season and businesses and residential areas will be monitored on an ongoing basis.

The Tidy Towns group meet on a weekly basis to help and assist the fantastic outdoor staff at Kerry County Council who keep Killarney Looking Good on a daily basis. The next group meeting is at the Bottle Bank in the High Street Car Park on Monday next June 5th at 6pm and new volunteers are always welcome.

At's the talk of the town... With Anne Lucey

Anne Lucey looks at the positive news happening in the town of Killarney



Roll on Al

Artificial intelligence - the kind that imitates the human - is getting lots of attention these days. Full credit to the RDI hub on the Killarney Road, Killorglin, for facilitating a discussion on it with David McWilliams just months back and before it hit the headlines so strongly.

We are all half in dread of AI and the takeover by computers. But last week I came to the conclusion it might be no bad thing. That was after spending two whole afternoons in pointless conversations with a human when I was trying to access bank statements online. The problem was I could not for an unknown reason receive the bank verification code to my mobile phone to view the things. Now, surely there is an alternative, surely you can email it to me? I asked the helpline after finally getting through to a voice. No. No, alternative.

Postage was the only option. It would take a week and the cost ? She had no access to this information.(It amounted up to 30 euro) The kind of intransigence I encountered set me thinking: Could a robot be any worse? What makes us human is flexibility. It is being able to assess situations and if needs be crossing out and overlooking this and introducing that. Compromise is the art of living. Taking a chance, and listening is what humans do - or at least used to do.

We are at the moment falling between two stools. On the one hand, we now have perfect tracking, gathering and box ticking. Thanks to computing. On the other hand, we are not using this programming as the mere tool it is. Instead we are being used by it. Those at the human end are terrified to steer off the sheet and to act outside the box. So, people caught by speed van machines only five kms over the speed limit get smacked with a fine just as much as those 50 kms over. It's the machine who decides, stupid! And there is no negotiating.

I see it more and more at council and other meetings - officials promptly closing down ideas on the same basis.

We have accepted and introduced systems, devised by computers and assessed largely by computers. And we continue to front them as humans - but in a slavish way.

It is difficult to reach that human voice whether it is eir or banks or state body. There

are many automated procedures to get over. And when you do succeed to the human voice, there is great relief. But the relief is short-lived. Invariably there is nothing they can do, and the frustration and near despair multiplies. Then you begin to wonder if the game is already up. And then you say, a robot, imitating a human, might actually come up with a solution and feel freer to do so.

Humans used to do that.

Benchmarking the National Park

Great to see more benches in the National Park, something this column has highlighted, thanks to a reader.

But beach facilities at Dundag, Killarney's beach, are the real benchmark during this beautiful fine weather.

It is after all only 40 years since the suggestion was first put forward at council level!

All week there are people at Dundag, often until late in the evening. They number our many Ukrainian refugees, our tourists and many regular locals all enjoying the fantastic weather and going for a dip.

There are as many at Dundag as at small coastal beaches which are all fully kitted out. Where are our facilities? With all humans, toilet facilities are much needed. There is an obvious improvised area in the rhododendron thicket to the left and it has all the signs of it with toilet paper and other material, not to mention bluebottles.

Some of the fine afternoons see up to 200 people and where else can they go?

Then there is the need for a boardwalk at Dundag as it is very difficult to walk into the water over the sharp stones.

I witnessed some clever individuals popping

stones in a row as they left the water. If everyone contributed a stone, we would soon have a causeway. In the meantime would it not be a great idea to suggest that some of the next tranche of community funding for welcoming Ukrainian refugees would be applied for a boardwalk, toilets and showers at Dundag beach?

By the way, guess who was spotted in Muckross Gardens on Monday late afternoon: Ex Taoiseach Bertie. I have met every Taoiseach over the last 30 years and more, and Bertie is still my favourite, and by far the most down to earth and approachable. Wasn't benchmarking his idea? And 'a lot done, more to do'? Could apply to Dundag, methinks.

E-Scooters are not meant to be on the public roads

There is some confusion over e-scooters. Recently, an attempt to ban them on greenways in Kerry failed. But the Garda press office tells me they are in fact illegal on public roads anyway. And greenways are public roads. Hats off then to Tralee FF councillor Johnny Wall who consistently raises the problem of e-scooters around Tralee.

He told a recent meeting how an elderly lady was knocked down by one and suffered a broken hip. Johnny has tracked them travelling at 30 kms an hour in and around Tralee.

The thing is E-Scooters are mechanically propelled vehicles, they go at speed and they are utterly silent.

But there is no regulation in place. I asked the Department of Transport and they said:

'Until such time as the regulations are in place to govern the use of e-scooters, the use of e-scooters on public roads and in public places will remain 'illegal'.

It is anticipated that the Road Traffic and Roads Bill 2021 will be enacted and this will give the Minister for Transport power to make regulations to govern their use on public roads and in public places.



'CONDITION ORANGE' – HIGH FIRE RISK ISSUED

The National Parks and Wildlife Service has appealed to the public not to light fires or barbecues in public places. The NPWS has increased ground crews on fire patrol and ramped up aerial monitoring with helicopters and drones. Early Summer is a precious time for wildlife and their vulnerable young, especially ground-nesting birds and mammals who are now rearing their young.

This appeal is following a 'Condition Orange' – High Fire Risk. Be Prepared, issued by the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, valid until 06/06/2023

Condition Orange will generally derive from extended periods of low precipitation, moderate relative humidity and low to moderate wind

conditions which have the capacity to significantly increase the risk of wildfire initiation and spread.

The Director General of the NPWS, Niall Ó Donnchú, has also asked for everybody's cooperation to protect nature and said:

"While NPWS has increased ground crews and monitoring from the air this week, we still need to enlist your help to protect nature at this high risk time. We ask that members of the public not light fires or barbecues in any National Parks or Nature Reserves, or indeed in nature generally. We are also asking that the public be vigilant and report any fire activity without delay."

A Garda based in Tralee, who was diagnosed with breast cancer last year, has created a music video inspired by Elton John. Mary Gardiner, a mum of three, originally from Bishopstown in Cork, has released the video to coincide with 100K in 30 Days for breast cancer in aid of The Marie Keating Foundation. Also starring in the video are 10 women who all have their own experiences of breast cancer. One of them is Stephanie Blake, a mother of three boys, who is Mary's right-hand woman.

"When I was diagnosed with breast cancer in January 2022, I played Elton John's song I'm Still Standing to my children. I said that it was going to be my come back song. I've listened to it for the last year and a half as the song has real meaning. I can really relate to the lyrics", Mary said.

"I'm still off work but in 2020, I did the Jerusalem video with An Garda Siochana and thought another video would be a bit of fun. If it brings a smile to people's faces, I'm happy. I have 10 brilliant women in the video with me who either all had breast cancer or are going through treatment at the minute. I met some of them through our chemotherapy sessions and kept in touch. When I asked them to take part in the video, they were just thrilled. We also have cameos from Pat Spillane, Billy Keane and Elaine Kinsella and I'm so thankful for their support. I also want to thank Timmy Dowd who produced and edited the video. He didn't know what he was letting himself in for!"

Mary was diagnosed with breast cancer in

January 2022 and started chemotherapy the following month for four months. She had a mastectomy last June and finished



all of her treatment in February 2023. "I took part in 100K in 30 Days last year while going through treatment and it really kept me going. Two days after I signed up, people had donated \notin 4,500 and by the time I'd finished, I'd raised \notin 40,000. The day after I finished, I went to Cork for my mastectomy, I was exhausted and needed the rest! I can't wait to do 100K in 30 Days again in June and I'd love everyone to join me to create as much awareness as possible for breast cancer and also raise as much funds as possible for a very worthy cause. As I say, I have cancer but I'm not cancer," said Gardiner.

100K in 30 Days have teamed up with the Marie Keating Foundation to support their vital breast cancer services. Marie Keating lost her life to breast cancer 25 years and her son Ronan Keating will be running 100K across the 30 days of June to raise awareness and show support for the Foundation he and his siblings set up in her name. 20 YEARS KENYA **EDUCATION** PROJECT



Eddie Sheehy looks back at two decades of work in Kenya

The Kenya Education Project is celebrating its 20th year of work in the village of Embulbul , Kenya. What started out as a visit by a nurse and three teachers in 2003 to a newly created parish on the outskirts of Nairobi has developed into a registered charity involved the education of young people at primary and secondary level. There, many families live in challenging conditions of poor housing, unemployment and slum conditions where there is an absence of basic services such as running water, electricity, sewerage and waste disposal. The first primary school consisted of corrugated sheds alongside a noisy busy road with dust often drifting into the classrooms. Teaching and learning was a challenge then with overcrowded classrooms and a lack of basic teaching aids which we take for granted here in Ireland.

In those early years of involvement a sponsorship programme was set up by the school to enable needy students to get an education. The Kenya Education Project sponsored approximately 15 students at a cost of 100 euro per student. This sponsorship has been highly sought after as it guaranteed recipitants a hot meal each



school day as well as books and school Needy children were also equipment. helped through the provision of a school uniform.

Within a year a secondary school opened to serve the needs of the families who could not afford to send their children to boarding school, private school or government schools, all of which required money to avail of them.

A yearly table guiz and a collection in fossa church were the chief fundraisers for the project. These enabled the sponsored programme commitment to increase over the succeeding years to a situation where today 85 students are sponsored , some at primary level, others at secondary level. As well as this commitment a number students are helped with fees for university or colleges of further education. This increased involvement is a reflection of the increasing funds which the project has received. A notable source of support comes from schools in the Killarney area and throughout Kerry. Many schools in the Killarney area give generously to the project each year through a variety of fundraising activities such as no uniform days, sports events, contributions from Communion and Confirmation classes, Easter parades, Halloween events and Christmas Carol singing.

The interaction with students on school visits is heartening, leading to many questions and discussion on education and living conditions in both parts of the world. The annual coffee morning has been a great success. This helps to provide a summer camp for 30 children from the village during holiday time. Donations from the Business community, Community groups and individual donations keep providing educational opportunities for children who face multiple challenges on a daily basis. Without this generous support on so many fronts the work of the project could not continue.

The project has sponsored a feeding programme in the village for a number of years to give children a hot meal 5 evenings per week. Upwards of 60 children avail of this vital service ensuring that they receive one hot meal per day. Many attend schools that do not provide food at lunchtime. With rising food and fuel costs it is becoming more expensive to sustain the programme but thankfully some generous donors from the Business sector in Killarney are ensuring its continued viability.

Over a number of years links with the local St. Vincent De Paul group have strengthened and helps to provide assistance in practical ways to needy families in the village through the gifting of clothes, footwear, food donations and financial support in meeting emergency medical needs as attending hospitals for treatment can really challenge a family's resources. On visiting homes in the village the conditions people live in can be clearly seen. Older men and women who have no pension or other state supports often living alone, depend on charity and neighbourly support. Water, an essential and a basic human need has to be bought each day by village dwellers.



People often ask if changes can be seen in the 20 years. For sure the provision of the schools has given a lift to the area. 300 students attend secondary and 360 in primary employ a staff of 33 with a further 32 ancillary staff. New families have moved into the area. The cost of renting rooms has increased and land is increasing in value. This has resulted in the loss of the much loved and used football pitch to commercial and residential use. The Chinese government has invested heavily in infrastructure in the country. Streets, road and rail links have been improved. The effects of climate change were seen recently with continued heavy rains causing flooding in homes in the village. This has led to the destruction of property and soil erosion. The school is striving to be self-sustaining, rearing a dairy herd on the school grounds and building a biofuel facility, using the animal waste to provide energy and so reduce the dependence on wood when cooking for 700 each school day. Education is a gateway out of poverty for all, but many have to wait to access further education and training, resulting in much youth unemployment in a country where population has grown to 46 million since independence. Wages are low. Life continues to be challenging, especially for older men and women facing medical treatment and care without any state support when a crisis emerges in their lives. School fees are an on-going challenge for families and many sacrifices are made to ensure children receive an education.





YOU'VE DONE THE HARD WORK SO 'PLAY A BLINDER' IN THE **2023 STATE EXAMS**



By Billy Ryle

EXAM TIME

With the state exams beginning next Wednesday, 7th June, for about 134,800 Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle candidates, this is the final weekend for major revision. Stick to your study plan on Saturday and Sunday. Concentrate on subjects being examined during the first week. As the exams run into the subsequent weeks, the optional subjects are nicely spaced out allowing for study days. PRIORITISE

Leaving Cert candidates should prioritise last minute work in English, Home Economics, Engineering, Geography and Mathematics Paper One and get it done by Sunday night. Likewise Junior Cycle candidates should do the same in English, Religious Education, Irish, History, Geography and Maths. On Monday, concentrate on the tips and predictions for subjects being examined the first week. Don't cram on the days before the exam as this may cause confusion and fatigue.

SKIM

Spent an hour or two on Tuesday skimming over your notes for Wednesday's exams and leave it at that. Some relaxed leisure will be more beneficial than spending the day cramming material that you may not recall anyway. You need a clear and alert mind going into the exams on Wednesday morning.

NOTES

On the evening before each paper spend an hour or so looking over your notes so that the important concepts and ideas are fresh in your mind. Heavy study sessions on the night prior to any paper are not a good idea as you will be exhausted the following morning. Instead, relax and get a good night's rest. Put all thoughts of the following day's exam out of your mind. If you find it difficult to sleep, try a little non-academic reading for a short while. EQUIPMENT

Over the next few days check your equipment and assemble your exam materials - black or blue biros, pencils, ruler, eraser, drawing instruments, calculator and so on. Have at least two biros or fountain pens in case one doesn't work properly. It's time, too, to organise your personal needs such as a watch and tissues.

RELAX

A few nerves are normal on the first day so be prepared to deal with it. A relaxation exercise or maybe a shower to freshen up will do the trick. Eat a nutritious breakfast as you'll need the extra reserves of energy. Finally, go through your equipment checklist before leaving home. CENTRE

On Wednesday morning arrive at the exam centre at least a half hour before the exam begins. For all subsequent exams be present about fifteen minutes before the appointed time. Spend the few minutes before entering the exam centre on your own in peace and quiet. At all costs, avoid groups that are involved in last minute revision. If you need to, use the bathroom before you enter the exam centre. Be in your seat a few moments before the exam is due to begin. Synchronise your watch with the clock on the wall and use your watch or the clock to help you pace your work. DESK

Check your seat and desk for firmness and stability. A shaky desk will torment you and distract you during the exam. When the answer book is distributed, fill in the required details and read the directions. When you receive your question paper read the instructions carefully in case there is any change of format. Don't be put off by your first glance at the paper. It's new and it will look unfamiliar at first. Once the exam begins, keep to your prepared answering plan and address the questions which are asked. REMAIN

If you finish a paper before the time is up, do not leave the exam centre. Recheck your work and extra information may come to you. Attempt an extra question only when you have thoroughly answered the previous questions. Once an exam is over, spend as little time as possible on a post-mortem. Focus on the next paper and when the entire exam is over, forget about it and enjoy your summer. There is no advantage in dwelling on what might have been. Be happy and satisfied that you have done your best. Good luck to all candidates starting exams next week.

CHECKLIST

• Concentrate on subjects being examined in the first week

- Complete major revision by Sunday night • In a relaxed study session on Monday concentrate on tips and predictions
- On Tuesday just skim over your revision notes for an hour or two
- Have a clear and alert mind going into each exam
- Arrange the equipment and materials you will need for the exams
- · Organise your personal needs such as a watch and tissues
- Spend the few minutes before entering the exam centre in peace and quiet
- Be in your seat a few minutes before the start of each exam
- · Check that your seat and desk are firm and steady
- Read the instructions carefully
- Know what to expect but be prepared for the unexpected
- Use all the time available to you
- Once an exam is over, avoid protracted post-mortems
- The exams are a marathon rather than a sprint
- Eat well during the exams when you'll need lots of energy
- Avoid over-exposure to the blistering sun
- Keep fluid levels high to avoid dehydration
- Take regular aerobic exercise during the exam period
- Exam timetables are available on www. examinations.ie
- Leaving Cert results will be published on Friday, 25th August
- CAO Round One offers will be available at 2pm on Wed., 30th August
- Good luck to everybody doing exams.







CAN SLEEP LINES CAUSE WRINKLES?

EYES IN THE SUN

Too much sun can damage the : eyes. As with skin damage, it is the ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun which causes problems. There are two types of UV rays: UV-A

and UV-B.

Over time, the effects of UV rays may help cause several eye problems. UV-A

can hurt your central vision. It can damage the macula, a part of the retina at the back of your eye.

UV-B

The front part of your eye (the cornea and the lens) absorbs most UV-B rays, but these rays may cause even more damage to your eyes than UV-A rays.

WHAT EYE PROBLEMS CAN UV **RAYS CAUSE?**

Macular Degeneration

UV rays may lead to macular degeneration, a leading cause of vision loss for older people. Cataract

UV rays, especially UV-B rays, may also cause some kinds of cataracts. A cataract is a clouding of the eye's natural lens, the part of the eye that focuses the light we see.

Pterygium

Another UV-related problem is a growth called pterygium. This growth begins on the white of the eye and may involve the cornea.

Eventually, the growth may block vision. It is more common in people who work outside in the sun and wind.

Skin Cancer

Skin cancer around the eyelids is also linked to prolonged UV exposure.

Corneal Sunburn

sunburn, Corneal called photokeratitis, is the result of high short-term exposure to UV-B rays. Long hours at the beach or skiing without proper eye protection can cause this problem. It can be very painful and may cause temporary vision loss.

Protecting your eyes from the sun If you are spending time outdoors, especially in the summer or on holidays abroad, make sure that you and your children have good quality, dark sunglasses with UV protection. Look for the British Standard (BS EN ISO 12312-1:2013) or the CE mark, which is the manufacturer's assurance that the sunglasses have been made to the appropriate safety standards. You can also protect your eyes by making sure to wear a hat with a brim or a sun visor in bright sunliaht.





PADRAIG HARNETT GOLDEN BOOT AWARD FOR THE GAYNOR AND KENNEDY CUP

Padraig Harnett, leader, visionary, and a person who is missed near and far within the football family. My first meeting with Padraig Harnett was in 2010 and at that meeting he informed me that the Kerry School boys league was interested in expanding its geographical spread to all of the county and not just the urban centres for the girls game.He also discussed if we in Kenmare would be willing to enter underage girls teams in the league or even if there was a girl good enough could even play with the boys. I laughed and said your mad rolled my eyes to heaven and walked off, he rang me the following day and asked me what were the obstacles and I said everything "how could a girl tog off with fellows" and he remarked "is that the only issue" I laughed and said "yes, and I think the boys at that age would over run any girl" to which he replied "What if they could play a year down" 13s playing in 12s" yes was his reply" and that was that .Padraig had championed the idea at SFAI (School Boys Football Association Of Ireland now called Schoolboys/girls Football association Of Ireland) and got the idea through the committee stages and was voted upon a couple of years later, and the rest was history. Padraig always felt that the equality of the girl's game was a cause that needed to be championed at national level and his belief that, with proper structure we could achieve this in Kerry and in Ireland. In 2019 his dream became a reality when the SFAI became involved in the running of all girls' underage games, teams, and leagues from 16s down for both

boys and girls. Padraig was always part and parcel of the underage games in this country, and I was like the rest of the SFAI delighted when Covid was over, and he joined us for the Gaynor and Kennedy Cups in which he worked in the media office with Padraic Clarke and Tom Ambrose. His attention to detail when it came to the scorers in games was impeccable and he was the person behind the "Golden Boot" award for

highest scorer at both the Gaynor and Kennedy last year. I was delighted when Padraic Clarke approached us in Kerry in March with the idea that the "Golden Boot" award for both competitions would be named in his honour. A big thank you to our colleagues in the SFAI for their gracious acknowledgement of the honour bestowed on Padraig, we miss him every day.

KERRY V CORK PREVIEW

It's easy enough to predict that Kerry will win here - I made the same confident prediction in 2020, by the by. Exactly how the game will pan out is a different story. Cork's narrow win over Louth not being broadcast doesn't help. My understanding is that Cork played good football and moved the ball well, but made hard work of finishing the moves on the scoreboard. That shouldn't be an issue Kerry are still hurting after that battering from Mayo, but Jack O'Connor isn't one for wholesale changes. I would bring Adrian Spillane in at wing forward; we need his robust presence to bolster midfield. Cork have Ian Maguire in top form and a physical Colm O'Callaghan out there; that pair are a real handful. Cork also have Brian Hurley back and on song. He's deadly, one of the best forwards around. Jason will have his hands full – I can see him breaking a lot of ball and his fellow defenders will have to be ready for that. Against that, Kerry have at least one better (three if Geaney and Seán O'Shea hit form) and we won't leave as many chances behind. Factor in that Cork will be without Meehan and Tommy Walsh in their full back line and Ruairí Maguire stilla doubt, and Kerry should be capable of doing a lot of damage. Seán O'Shea has struggled of late and was undeniably flat against Mayo, but I'd persevere with him. I don't see the energy for midfield in him and I don't want him starting on the square - he proved last year against Dublin how dangerous he is at ghosting in there. I don't see Stephen O'Brien or Killian Spillane (if fit) starting but I see them doing a fair amount of damage later on.

Tadhg Morley has understandably been targeted by opposition teams this year. I imagine Cork will do the same and try to use Powter to drag him out of position. That's a danger - Powter has an instinct for gaps and we need some-one else to pick him up. I expect - and hope - that Paudie Clifford will be deployed from deep. There are a lot of calls in Cork for Powter to be deployed back in a more defensive role. That would be amn awful mistake by John Cleary - he doesn't have enough players that can lead the front line. They do get the ball down there fast. We'll also have to be careful with those long runs out of defence - Cork have worked hard on a long kicking game and will hurt us if we leave space. I made no secret that I was impressed with Cork in the National League. Prone to maybe ten minutes of lapses amid sixty of good football. I still say that Hurley and O'Mahony's absence against Clare cost them hugely; they are a better side than they showed. They also have no burden of expectation and nothing to lose here, whereas that Mayo game definitely hangs a cloud over Kerry. Kerry were limpid enough during the League but I thought we were biding our time, so I wasn't worried. I am now, that Mayo game was time to show something and we were stuck to the ground.

But the bottom line? Scoring power. We have plenty of it – jaysus, Kerry have good forwards who can't even get a place on the bench. Cork simply don't.

As for the minor? It's notoriously hard to hit on the right combination at minor, even harder since the drop in age. Kerry had very, very slow starts in both their games and were well on top in the second half. I don't read much into the Limerick game. No disrespect, but they were very limited as a threat. Cork have real cutting edges. Sheedy and Coakley are great players and have plenty of back-up. So far, we have been a little too reliant on Paddy Lane. Then again, Boyle and Kirby are a phenomenal midfield pairing and that always gives you a puncher's chance. There won't be any handle going after the hatchet in this game, since both sides go through to a quarter-final (like the senior, it all feels a little too drawn out for me) but I still think Kerry have better individual players overall and I think, possibly against the grain, that they will shade this one by a few points.

SHELL-SHOCKED KERRY SEEN OFF BY CORK Ladies Munster Final: Cork 5-14 Kerry 2-17

Once upon a time – alas, it is now so long ago that it must be classed as a story suitable for such a beginning – Kerry were the undisputed queenpins of gaelic football. The sport was in its relative infancy back then, but Kerry's ladies team had footballers as majestic as their male counterparts – and Kerry were the undisputed kingpins of the game back in those halcyon days as well. The sport hadn't a fraction of the popularity it has gained since then - a lot of credit must be given for the dedicated work put in at the grassroots over the last generation. A lot of credit has to be given to Cork as well they were arguably the most phenomenal team Ireland has produced in the modern era when you include their dual stardom (the bulk of them were unbeatable with the camán as well). I wanted to begrudge them, I really did, but I could never rid myself of a sense of admiration. Kerry, despite the undisputable brilliance of the likes of Mags O'Donoghue, Bernie Breen, and Geraldine O'Shea, never really had a collective strong enough to withstand the sheer power

of the likes of Valerie Mulcahy, Bríd Stack, Juliet Murphy, Breige Corkery, Rena Buckley, Angela Walsh....

It's an odd thing with me. It's been a long time since Meath have beaten Kerry or been a power in the mens' game, but I was at an age impressionable enough when O'Rourke and Hayes and McDermott and Fay were in their prime to still feel nervous about Meath over thirty years later. That was a devil's team that never knew when they were beaten. Cork's ladies teams have that same power, in my mind at least. Cork, even after slipping off their peak, are still an intrinsic benchmark. Beating Cork is a definitive statement.

The Kerry Ladies have been flying in recent times. Darragh Long and Declan Quill have done a phenomenal job. We were within a whisper of an All Ireland last year =- that's been a long enough drought. Winning Division One established us with a favourites tag this year. I wasn't overly worried about that group game in Munster – Kerry experimented and still had a lot in the tank when needed. For me, the Munster Final in Mallow was going to make a real statement about our prospects.

Unfortunately, it did. It would be easy to misread it. After all, Kerry left two penalties go unrewarded, and that was the margjn between the teams at the finish. We were without Paris McCarthy or Erica McGlynn. You could argue that the referee didn't do us any favours – Emma Costello executed what I considered a brilliant tackle late on, only for a free to be called that ended up with a Cork score. If you are really looking for excuses, you can probably find them.

A former teacher of mine had a saying. "Whinging ain't the same as working". In other words, forget about looking for excuses. Look for reasons, look for what went wrong on your part, and correct it. Don't go assigning blame – appointing responsibility is a different and necessary thing for a team to improve.

Kerry got taken to school here. Cork knew full well how dangerous Kerry can be if they get any sliver of space around the goal - so they never gave Kerry that sliver of space. They didn't send high ball in towards Emma and Kayleigh. Instead they worked on moving the ball in short, sharp burst that left Kerry grasping at thin air,. It was well-planned and brilliantly executed. They had three quick points on the board straightaway - Doireann O'Sullivan (2) was on fire. Kerry actually worked a very good move between Niamh Ní Chonchúir (I thought Niamh was our best player, a warrior in the trenches) and Louise Ni Muircheartaigh to give Hannah O'Donoghue a goal chance, but it was well smothered on the line. Would the narrative be different if that had gone in? I genuinely think so, it would have put Kerry on the front foot and put a sliver of doubt into Cork. Instead Orlaith Cahalane set up Libby Coppinger and

we were 1-3 to 0-0 down. Doireann added her third point before Anna Galvin opened Kerry's account. It made no difference, Doireann pointing again and Cahalane again teeing up a ghosting Coppinger for goal number two. Kerry settled a small bit with points from Aishling O'Connell, Niamh Ní Chonchúir, and Lorraine Scanlon. They also brought on Louise Galvin, whose physical presence was needed to bolster a flagging midfield. Hannah O'Donoghue had a goal chance blocked by Shauna Kelly. We were at least asking questions of Cork now.

Cork had answers. Eimear Kiely could have gone for goal, but opted to set up Cahalane for a point. Louise Ní Muircheartaigh picked off two, but Ciara O'Sullivan nabbed another Cork goal and Doireann kicked another point. We were scrambling for a foothold on this game. Just before the break Doireann O'Sullivan kicked a point, then intercepted the kick-out and fed Katie Quirke for a fourth goal. 4-10 to 0-7 at half-time, and it was a fair reflection.

Louise opened the second half with a free. Lorraine Scanlon made a great run but it skewed off her boot. Kerry were looking much sharper now and won a penalty. Louise stepped up but her shot skimmed the wrong side of the post. It felt like that kind of day. She slotted two frees straight after though, while Anna Galvin's goal effort was blocked. Cork's defenders seemed to have dropped a fraction in intensity, or maybe Kerry rose. Danielle O'Leary kicked a point and Niamh Carmody and Ní Muircheartaigh combined to set up Hannah O'Donoghue for a goal. Aishling O'Connell kicked a point and it felt like Kerry could narrow that gap, 4-10 to 1-12 felt difficult but manageable.

Ciara Butler had made one great save to deny Eimear Kiely in that period, but she could do nothing when Kiely sent a clever pass to a drifting Orlaith Cahalane, who made no mistake from close range. The gap no longer felt manageable.

Kerry kicked the next three points through O'Donoghue, Ní Muircheartaigh, and O'Leary. In fairness, you can't question their character. With eight minutes left they won another penalty, but Louise's shot lacked any real conviction and Meabh O'Sullivan gathered comfortably. Fiadhna Tangney did get a Kerry goal late on and Danielle O'Leary drew another save out of O'Sullivan. Technically, you can argue that Kerry won the second half by 2-11 to 1-4, but it's a fairly thin argument.

The truth is that the scoreline is slightly

flattering to Kerry, if anything. Cork could have pushed harder on the second half pedal if they had needed to.

Cork go into a group that includes Galway and Tipperary in the All Ireland series. Kerry face a tougher task, having to face Leinster champions Dublin (they had two goals to spare over reigning All Ireland champions Meath and are still peppered with All Ireland winners) and a tricky enough tie against Cavan. Kerry are unquestionably better than they showed here. Whether they can produce on cue is the auestion.

Things are about to get very interesting!

All Ireland Intermediate Camogie **Championship:**

Kerry 2-8 Westmeath 1-11

After a disappointingly flat display against Cork in the Munster Intermediate Final, Kerry needed to hit the ground running in the opening match of their All Ireland Intermediate campaign. Last Saturday they emerged from Cusack Park in Mullingar with a share of the spoils, but had to dig very deep to do so. Midway through

the second half Kerry were five points down and staring into the abyss, but they dug really deep and showed magnificent character to come back and earn a draw - in fact, almost snatching a win at the death.

Scoring from play was an issue early on for both teams, with defenders like Sara Murphy, Niamh Leen, Muireann Scally, and Dearbhail McLoughlin well on top of their briefs. On the quarter hour mark Aoife Behan reacted sharpest to a loose ball in the Westmeath square and deftly fired it home to give Kerry the advantage. A worry for Kerry going forward, though, is that the goal was their only score from play over the hour. Westmeath responded strongly with experienced campaigners Amelia Shaw and midfielder Megan Dowdall, who shared an enthralling battle with Kerry's Kate Lynch all through, leading the way. Two wellstruck frees for the in-form Jackie Horgan had Kerry narrowly in front at the break. Half-time Kerry 1-2 Westmeath 0-4

The home side came storming out of the blocks in the second half, with Megan Dowdall for once shaking off the shackles and showcasing her undoubted quality with a cracking goal. A string of points followed, with Westmeath's half back line making dangerous forays and Aoife McGrath impeccable on free-taking duties. With guarter of an hour remaining, Kerry were trailing by 1-8 to 1-3 and matters looked bleak, to say the least - a defeat here looked almost inevitable given Westmeath's dominance and a loss would almost certainly have put the kibosh on Kerry's hopes going forward.

Kerry's response was everything that anyone could have hoped for, showing as much character as class and plenty of both. They began to run at Westmeath, forcing the beleaguered defenders to cough up frees, and that's expensive with a sharpshooter like the outstanding Jackie Horgan on the field. Bit by bit Kerry reeled in that big lead and with minutes to go. With four minutes left on the clock, Caoimhe Spillane wove through the defence as she bore down on goal, only to be illegally halted. Referee Eoin Morrissey had no hesitation in signalling the penalty and Patrice Diggin drove a rocket to the net to put Kerry ahead by a point.

Credit to Westmeath, they showed character themselves to keep the heads up and get down the field for Megan Dowdall to nervelessly slot an equalising free. You couldn't begrudge them; neither side deserved to lose a game this

spellbinding.

Next up for Kerry is a season-defining game at home in the Fitzgerald Stadium against Meath. The Royal county opened their campaign with an emphatic 6-19 to 2-3 win over a young Laois side. Kerry staged a comeback in Trim to beat Meath in their first win of this year's National League and went on to see off an Aoife Minogue inspired Royal County in a thrilling Diision 2A Final in Croke Park. Kerry had big support that day and it made a huge difference and Kerry manager Pat Ryan and his charges are asking for a packed house again in the Fitzgerald Stadium to lift the team to victory on Saturday, June 10th..

SEM LIFT AODHÁN Ó CHONCHÚIR CUP

Colleges First Year League Final: St. Brendans Killarney 5-10 Tralee CBS 3-6

There was a little bit of extra spice in the Post Primary First Year League Final played last Friday, in Kerry's Centre of Excellence. It was the first real foray into management for Footballer of the Year David Clifford, whereas his opponent on the line was a brilliant young footballer himself until injury curtailed his inter-county career, but Fergus Clifford picked up plenty of silverware with Sneem/Derrynane, Spa, and Listry in his playing days and is widely recognised as one of the foremost coaches in the county - not least by his famous nephews, who obviously paid attention to him along the way! David was joined on the Sem sideline by fellow manager Paul Moriarty while Fergus was joined by Ger O'Connor.

The First Year League is played under slightly different rules than the other post primary competitions, since the primary goal is coaching and development. There is a five goal rule, where a team that have scored five goals can only score points from then on (the idea being to prevent matches becoming totally one-sided and allow the opposition an opportunity to get back in the game). More significantly, players are only allowed one hop and one solo before they must play or release the ball. We are all familiar with the dominance of stronger players in younger age groups, where the bigger players tend to have more of an impact. This gives every player a chance to get some game time and forces every player

to learn how to assess and utilise options. Similarly, juvenile hurling in Kerry uses a 'two touch rule' that teaches players to think as part of a team collective.

The Sem went into this match as favourites after their displays in the group stage, but they were rocked on their heels right from the throw-in as midfielder Tom Lenihan burst through for a goal for the Green. The Sem responded with points from Daniel Cronin and Samuel Scroop to nudge a point in front before the outstanding Danny Kingston raised a second green flag for Tralee CBS. The Sem were beginning to fire up their engines, though, with Daniel Cronin putting them in front with a goal of their own and he added a second one soon afterwards. Tralee had brilliant forwards, especially Kingston and the equally impressive Calvin O'Sullivan, but they had to survive on limited scraps of possession as the Sem were simply winning too many individual duels throughout the field. A third goal just before the break from Liam McCarthy meant that the Sem went in at half-time leading by 3-6 to 2-1. Man of the match Daniel Cronin completed his hat-trick soon after the restart. There was no way back for Tralee, but they showed impressive heart and guts all through and did get the consolation of a very well-executed goal of their own from Cillian O'Brien. It made no material difference as the Sem still had most of the possession and tagged on la late goal from substitute Liam O'Mahony to complete a convincing victory and retain the Aodhan Ó Chonchúir Memorial Cup to join the O'Sullivan Cup, Corn Uí Mhuirí, and Dunloe Cups in the school, while Tralee CBS have the Frewen Cup, Russell Cup and the Darra Ó Donnabhain (Munster U16.5 C hurling) cups in their cupboard.

The Aodhán Ó Chonchúir Cup commemorates a shining light of talented young sportsman who tragically passed away in 2018 after an accidental collision in a game in this competition, and it was presented by Kerry Colleges Officer Weeshie Lynch.

It would appear that David Clifford brings that midas touch to everything he does on a football field – he'll be hoping that won't be the last piece of silverware he gets his hands on this year!

NON-COMPETITIVE GAA FOR JUVENILES

Mention of that one hop one solo rule in that Aodhán Ó Chonchúir Schools Final opens the door for a slightly more controversial topic. The GAA have strongly reiterated their rule that GAA games featuring U12 players or under must be completely non-competitive. No cups or trophies, no medals, no knock-out stages. No league tables or championships. No scorelines are to be kept.

I understand the principle. I agree with a lot of it. I want kids able to play and enjoy the games. No pressure. No sense of failure - that is absolutely crucial. The only failure in underage sports is the kids who feel unwelcome or intimidated in their local sports club - and it isn't the kids who have failed in that instance. I fully support the silent sideline initiative, whereby only the coach can speak directly to the players. Do not live your sporting life vicariously through your children. Their job is not to fulfill your dreams. It's your job to enable theirs along the way to adulthood. That adult intensity creates a pressure and often a hostile environment. Kids have no natural; antipathy to wards opponents; they take their lead from the adults they know. But the kids should not lose out on the thrill and adventure of competing because the adults can't handle it. Don't put an outright ban on competition at those grades. Coach the coaches better and get the clubs to police their supporters better. We all know there have been too many unsavoury incidents at minor and juvenile games in the last few years. I want life bans, heavy club fines, and gardaí reports. I want the GAA landing on those people like a ton of bricks. But taking competitive games away from kids is no answer to that nonsense. Smaller pitches for younger players is crucial. Quite simply, kids can't kick the ball that far

and they'll spend too much time and energy simply chasing it down on a big pitch, with the physically stronger kids able to dominate. You want a small pitch, close contact, every kid getting regular touches. You want them playing with the ball, not effectively competing in sprints as they chase it. Likewise a smaller goal. Smaller the better. Adjust the rule. Five goal rule or even less. Kicks over the bar count double – points are often harder for young kids to kick anyway. Roll on/roll off subs is, of course, quite rightly implemented across the board already. You can tweak the rules to increase parity and participation. Do not over-complicate it.

Do not try to artificially tweak the scorelines or, heaven forbid, manufacture frees against one team for the sake of keeping the score close. Kids have a very strong sense of justice. Do not lie to them, regardless of how well-intentioned it is.

Completely non-competitive? No scores kept? This is a sledgehammer being used to crack a nut. Look, I'm only offering an opinion, but I have coached kids' teams. Understand something. Kids are competitive by nature. It is literally human nature. Think about the games you played as a child. Cowboys and indians (is that politically correct nowadays? Neither myself nor the kids really care). Cops and robbers. Chasing. Games of catch. Leave a group of kids alone for a while, and they will develop a game of their own, and it will have a competitive nature. Feel free to check with teachers and parents; I did do that.

You can't just decide to suddenly make kids non-competitive. If you tell kids that this doesn't matter, that there is no winner or loser, straight away their interest in it drops. They want to do their best, and the way they gauge it is against their peers. They make that decision, not you. But you can harness it in a healthy way. You can teach them the concept of team spirit. Of being proud of themselves and, equally important, being proud of each other. How to support and encourage each other. How to show sportsmanship to opposition players. Lining up to shake each others hands after a game may seem a little hokey and a little americanised. I don't care, because I promise you that it works. The most important lesson that a child can learn in a training session is that the game is fun and that they want to come back next week. That's it. You get a lot of talk about inculcating skills - that's secondary. Anyone, anywhere, ever, who has coached an underage team knows that you include a game in your training session, because that's the bit that interests them. The kids want to play. Winning and losing are not remotely bad life lessons. In fact, they are invaluable, provided that neither is over-emphasized.

A real bugbear of mine, and I've felt this for a long time, is the emphasis on developing longterm success. You get an awful lot of talk about nurturing players for the Kerry senior team of the future. Jaysus. Trust me. The Kerry senior team of the future won't be short of players. Please stop thinking that producing the next David Clifford or Roy Keane or Sonia O'Sullivan is successful coaching. It's not, it really isn't. It's great if it happens, but it's completely incidental. You want to know what makes a successful coach? If you have 25 kids coming up to the first coaching session at six or seven years of age (the GAA now goes to to U5) and those 25 children are still playing the game by the time that they reach minor, then you are the greatest coach I have ever seen bar none. Kids love wearing the club jersey. Being part of the club, effectively the community. Seeing a team photo or their name in the paper is an unimagined thrill (I wouldn't put scorelines in the paper or focus on individuals too much; always emphasis the team. It's worth noting in that context that the GAA, more than any other organisation in this country, is a full and broad parish-based organisation. Kids love feeling a part of that.

Deciding that their games don't actually matter – and you can pretend to kids that they do, but kids are more intelligent than you are giving them credit for – is akin to telling kids that they are better off choosing another sport. The GAA's current approach isn't a step in the wrong direction; it just goes much too far along that road. Dial it back a bit.

There's no point in dressing this one up. This was poor, arguably Kerry's worst display so far. That it follows our best, a hard-fought and precious away win over Athlone, is doubly disappointing. To say anything else would simply be dishonest. You can argue that the defeat to Galway (9-0) was worse, but I don't think it was. Kerry were a little bit naive and open-eved about that on and tried to go one-

on-one on their home ground with a team that are simply burning through the entire division. They sliced us open repeatedly because Galway were simply that far ahead and that much sharper than us.

Wexford didn't feel like that. I won't say it ever really felt like we could have won, but we should definitely have been capable of making them work an awful lot harder for a win. We had a few half-chances in the first half, but nothing that really sucked air out of anybody's lungs.

Wexford went close early on and Aaron O'Sullivan was forced into a great save after a sliced clearance. Kerry did have a chance after a good break, Nathan Gleeson with a clever back heel to tee up Seán McGrath (lovely bit of skill, but I thought they should have onetwoed it earlier, there was a three-on-two in the Wexford defence) but the shot was always rising. Wexford were always more dangerous with good balls into the Kerry box - we never had enough bodies into theirs fast enough or enough control down the wings. Corban Piper should have scored with a free header but made amends with a long ball deftly squared by Aaron Dobbs for a simple Danny Furlong finish. Textbook stuff.

It got worse fast. Dobbs got on scoresheet himself – to be fair, it was two great passes to open the chance and a lovely switch finish. I don't mind the goals we concede to skill, it's the others ones that hurt. 2-0 at half-time.

The third one hurt. Another long ball into our defence, a header straight up instead of out, and a simple chance for Furlong to tap home. Wexford were pressing high up the pitch, and could afford to as they sensed more goals against a tentative Kerry. Dobbs made it 4-0, deftly turning in a corner at the near post – nicely done, but again, these are chances that should be shut down instantly.

I have a lot of sympathy for the fifth goal. Kerry passing it in the defence, looking to open a space as Wexford chased them down – Wexford didn't chase, they just closed off the angles.... until one fatal second of dwelling on the ball, a dart and steal, and basically a tap-in.

Aaron O'Sullivan made two great saves. The truth is that Wexford keper Noel Heffernan could probably have brought a book to read in that second half. Kerry didn't have a single attack, let alone an actual shot on target. Late on Dobbs powered home a header from a corner to finish off a bad and somewhat dispiriting night for Kerry.

Minister Foley confirms over €8 million investment in Kerry health care services

Minister for Education and Kerry T.D Norma Foley confirms the announcement of an €8.94 million investment in Capital Funding to support Kerry Healthcare services across 2023.

University Hospital Kerry will receive over €8.5 million in funding this year for a host of key projects including €4.5 million to extend and refurbish the existing pathology laboratory.

In this tranche of funding, €3 million is being made available to UHK for the provision of a state-of-the-art new obstetrics theatre.

Cahersiveen Community Hospital will receive €240,000 for the provision of a new Ambulance Station and €200,000 for refurbishment and extension works.

In 2023, investment in healthcare infrastructure, equipment and furnishing of health facilities is €967m with a further €50m provided for capital infrastructure COVID-19 actions.

This is a total national investment of €1.017 billion. Minister Foley said: "I have received confirmation this morning that almost €9 million in funding is being awarded to key healthcare facilities in Kerry for 2023. This significant funding is a clear endorsement of the excellence in vital healthcare provision delivered on a daily basis throughout the county by teams of dedicated professionals.

"This funding will significantly enhance the provision of vital ambulance services

and healthcare provision in Cahersiveen. In total, University Hospital Kerry is awarded €8.5 million for this year which will provide for significant

extension and enhancement of maternity facilities, a new obstetrics theatre and the continued improvement and upgrading works to oncology services among other crucial investments.

have consistently advocated for enhanced and additional health services with Minister Donnelly and I wish to thank my Cabinet colleague for prioritising the enhanced provision of healthcare services in Kerry." See the full list of projects below:

UHK: €4,500,000 for the vertical extension and refurbishment of the existing pathology laboratory.

UHK: €300,000 scoping of works to include interim solution and Aseptic Compounding Unit.

Cahersiveen Community Hospital: €440,000 for the provision of a new ambulance station and for refurbishment and extension works.




A Word of Victory

Welcome back dear student we love the 'hazy days of summer', they evoke thoughts of a more relaxed pace of life enjoying barbeques, ice-cream and the beach. Yet we are only travellers here - this place is not our home no matter how nice we make it (Hebrews 13:14). Our physical bodies will all die one day and then what? Most people don't want to think about it, leaving it up to 'que-sera-sera' — what will be will be. But when something happens that's a horrific place to be without God and His Salvation (Romans 10:9-17; Ephesians 2:12). Some trust in their birth religion 'hoping' that because they fulfilled all the regulations, that rituals or beseeching saints will carry them safely on. Others proclaim that they don't believe in anything - that when you're gone - that's it; there's no more. How wrong they are, and how tragic when they find out the truth.

What the world's culture emphasises is all focussed on a very shallow level. 


