Liam Waldron, Rachel Griffin and Luke O'Sullivan will go on to represent Ireland at the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair in Dallas, Texas next year.

Supported by Intel Ireland and Boston Scientific, SciFest is the largest, most inclusive all-island STEM fair programme for second-level students in Ireland. 



#### PROVENCE HAS NEVER BEEN **NEARER**

Peter Mayle may have spent a year in Provence and drew on it successfully to become a novelist. I occasionally spend three days there and it is a transfusion of light and colour. Especially this time of the year when the country is coming down in dismal grey. Who knows what a year would do for me. I may never find out. But there is no law against dreaming. Yet!

Associated with the summer and lavender fields, one of the great Provencal seasons is actually Advent and Christmas. The blue skies and cold are perfect for parades, spiced wine and galettes on the amber and pink suffused streets. The first weekend of Advent is when the lights are switched on in Aix, a most beautiful and enchanting city.

There is a grand parade after Mass in Provencale, the old language, when young and old turn out in costume with drums and flutes up and down the main street, the Cours Mirabeau. It is then the grand fair of the Santons is blessed and opened.

The Santons are the little clay hand-painted figures that crowd the Christmas cribs in this part of the world.

They were given an injection of life during the French Revolution when Christmas cribs were banned. The haymaker, the wine grower and the lavender picker, not to mention the boule player all took the place of the holy family. And they didn't leave when the wisemen crept back. In fact, each year there are new figurines, still in 18th/19th century costume. In among the cackling geese (we spotted one biting the behind of a farmer), this year's "new" Santons,

include a woman boule player and a woman reading a newspaper paper. I saw the horsemen of the Camargue and there seemed to be more black bulls, probably as bullfighting is being threatened. There too was a painter meant to resemble the great Cezanne out in the lavender fields working en plein air. This must be in deference to the huge Cezanne exhibition in London at the moment.

Public displays of the Christian crib are still meant to be banned in the French Republique but no one takes too much notice of the rule. There is a huge "crib" right smack in the centre of Aix with the holy family among the hundreds of figurines.

It is easy to get to Aix-Marseille now - at long last. For years there was a trek to Paris or Lyon and a train down as no direct flights operated from Ireland in the winter. Now the two hour journey is from Shannon direct, followed by a short bus ride to Aix. Heaven!

#### AIR AND RAIL



The under-24s are greatly in favour of banning internal flights a new survey has concluded.

The article in the Irish Times stated the Economic and Social Research Institute (ESRI) found a majority of those questioned are in favour of banning non-essential domestic flights (57 per cent).

I was asked to canvass the opinion in Kerry where the regional flight to Dublin is hard won. Diarmaid Griffin of the Killarney Greens is all for external flight connections, and the more the better direct to Farranfore. However he makes the valid point rail has been in Killarney since before the visit of Queen Victoria. But it has been neglected. The current 20 per cent cut in rail fares is not enough for Killarney and he is approaching Transport Minister Eamon Ryan, a Green, for further cuts for the regions.

The trick is to "deincintise" air travel, Diarmaid believes. Short-term, air travel may seem cheaper, but long-term there is an environmental cost.

But it still takes three hours by rail to get to Dublin, Kathleen O'Regan-Sheppard, director of Kerry Airport points out. And people in business and tourism and with health needs don't want to spend so much time coming and going.

The big question I have is how can three airports - Cork, Kerry, Shannon within more or less an hour of each other all survive? Unless Dublin shares out some of their phenomenal gains, I can't see it. The solution to me is a mix of fast rail in and out of Kerry, which can only be realised with new track, and airports with specific connections the way Shannon was once the only "port" to the USA.

With high speed rail we could return to dividing airports per global region, so that all can survive and all of us can benefit.

Meanwhile, new statistics from Kerry Airport reveal numbers on the regional Kerry to Dublin route have hugely increased.

Some 71,211 have used the regional Kerry Dublin route, now run by Ryanair, to the end of October. This compares with the same period in 2019, pre-Covid, when 49,660 passengers travelled on what was then the subsidised PSO flight operated by Stobart Air.

Overall, Some 302,239 have used Kerry airport between January and October compared to 318,948 for the same period in 2019.

#### **BUSKING LAWS - TELLING THE TUNES APART**

The public is invited to comment on the long awaited Killarney busking laws which are to be implemented in March in time for the tourist

While the laws are an attempt to bring harmony and reduce street noise especially late at night, one wonders how they will in fact be policed.

Gardai as well as council enforcement officers will be able to monitor the performances and impose fixed charge notice fines of 75 euro for those in breach, it is proposed.

Offending performers ending up in the District Court can be fined up to 1,500 euro.

Offensive language and singing the same song over and over look set to be outlawed.

Under the new laws, "a Street Performer must not use lewd, offensive, or racist language or conduct (including song lyrics) as part of his/her act".

But while it is easy to pick out offensive language (almost any word spoken these days can be subject to offending someone, I am tempted to say), monotony is still difficult.

"A street performer who plays music and sings songs must have a sufficient repertoire to avoid constant repetition," according to the laws.

Who can prove if the song or tune is exactly the same as the one previously? I would have great difficulty in telling most traditional Irish tunes apart. I thought Pat Shortt captured the thing exactly in one of his shows where the same traditional tune was played over and over going around a roundabout only given a different name. I say good luck to the gardai and the council in trying to parse the Killarney street music.

The concert will include traditional Ukrainian carols - Christmas songs that are performed during many winter holidays in Ukraine. In addition to solo songs, all guests will hear the performance of young violinists, the 5 Yershovy's sisters and the performance of Ksenia Rusnak, who masterfully plays the ancient Ukrainian instrument - the bandura.

Bandura is a relative of the medieval lute, known in Ukraine since the 12th century as kobza. Folk songs and Cossack poems are usually performed on the bandura. Residents of Killarney will have a unique opportunity to hear virtuoso playing on this instrument and be transported back to the 16th century. It was during this period that playing the bandura became very popular in Ukraine.

At the invitation of Ukrainians there will be surprise performances from some Irish musicians who will take part in the concert.

"It is very important for Ukrainians to share our Christmas traditions with the local community, and at the same time learn how Christmas is celebrated in Ireland:, Natalia Krasnenkova, one of organizers told Killarney Outlook.

"Despite seemingly different cultures, we have many points in common. So, for example, the famous Christmas song Carol of the Bells, which is performed all over the world, was written by the Ukrainian composer Mykola Leontovych and is known in Ukraine as "Shchedryk"", she added. With this concert, Ukrainians also want to thank the entire local community for their warm welcome and hospitality, they also want to collect funds for a shelter in the city of Khotyn in Ukraine. In this house, priests receive

women and children who lost their homes and suffered violence during the war. The house is in dire need of electricity to keep the little refugees and their mothers warm.

"Every year we with our children sing carol songs from home to home home, in the churches, spreading the good





## A fantastic read....

## THE 20TH SLIABH LUACHRA JOURNAL LAUNCHED

The growth of facilities for visitors to Killarney, in the 19th century, is recalled in the latest issue (the 20th) of the Sliabh Luachra Journal which is written by journalist and historial Donal Hickey has just been launched.

An article features the experiences of the authors of two guide books who were among the early tourists who travelled from Cork to Killarney, via Millstreet and Rathmore.

In 1822, George Newenham Wright, an Anglican clergyman, told of finding two principal streets in Killarney, Old and New Streets, and three "tolerable" inns.

However, when William Balch, an American Christian minister and campaigner, came in 1850 tourism had developed further and Killarney had at least seven hotels, including the Royal Victoria (now the Castlerosse) and the Muckross Hotel (now Muckross Park Hotel). Balch was enraptured by the scenery of Killarney. "It seemed to me there could not be found a more beautiful place on earth. I certainly do not recollect the sight of one in all my travels," he wrote.

Two veterans of the showband era, Neilly O'Sullivan, of The Radiant, and Jim McAuliffe, of The Specialists, are interviewed for an article which recalls the halcyon days of the 1950's and '60's when ballrooms like the Gleneagle, in Killarney, attracted thousands of dancers, week after week.

The Radiant was based in Scartaglin and the Specialists, in Rathmore.

Neilly O'Sullivan, who has lived for many years in Killarney, drove his band's VW minibus to venues all over Munster. On the roof of the

minibus was an illuminated sign with the band's name.

"As the electric sign on the roof 'radiated' for miles, dancers could see us coming over the hills of Kerry and the excitement began," Neilly said.

Jim McAuliffe recounted how The Specialists played in many top ballrooms of the era, including the Television Club, Dublin, the Gleneagle, and the Brandon, in Tralee, where they once shared a stage with world heavyweight boxing champion, Joe Frazier.

"I enjoyed every minute of my time playing with The Specialists," he said.

However, signs of the demise of the showband era were apparent from the early 1970s as discos and more pop-orientated bands began to take over. "By 1975, changes in the entertainment scene were clear for all to see," lim said.

As might be expected, traditional features music strongly in the journal, published by Cumann Luachra, with articles by wellknown trad musicians Michelle O'Sullivan and Emma O'Leary.

### THINK BEFORE YOU PARK

ADVICE FOR SPECTATORS ATTENDING THE MOLLS GAP STAGE

Spectators attending Saturday's Rentokil Initial Killarney Historic O'Connor. Rally are warned of the need to park in a safe and in an unobstructive "Last year manner on Moll's Gap.

The iconic stage will be used three times this year – a first for any Killarney

The entire stage from start to finish will close to public traffic at 6:45 am. Any cars still in transit at that time will be escorted to the end of the stage.

Starting stage one on schedule is paramount to getting all three runs completed during the day.

Fans are advised to get into the stage well before the 6:45 am deadline. If traffic gets too busy on the approach to the stage from the Muckross House entrance or the Kenmare side exit, Gardai may decide to close the road early on safety grounds.

Once on the stage spectators are advised to park well off the road. Cars parked too close to the edge of the stage may be towed away.

"Think before you park is the message," said clerk of the course Anthony

"Last year we came very close to losing the opening stage as there was too much

spectator traffic on the stage at the appointed road closed time - this cannot happen this year. We are appealing to spectators to work with us – don't be the one to cause the stage to be cancelled."

Additionally, there will be no parking allowed at the small car park at Derrycunnihy Church, on either side of the road at Ladies' View and some laybys on the ascent to the summit.

"Often is the case that fans go in early, park in a dangerous place and walk away from the car to watch further into the stage, and we cannot find the driver, they may be in for a surprise when they see their car on the back of a tow truck," added the clerk of the course

Club officials will patrol the stage throughout Friday night and vehicles will be towed if deemed necessary.

## **KERRY'S JUNIOR CYCLE** CANDIDATES DELIVER SUPERB **EXAM RESULTS**



#### **OUTSTANDING RESULTS**

After an interminable five-month delay, Junior Cycle exam results were finally issued by the State Examinations Commission (SEC) on Wednesday, 23rd November to 67,130 candidates nationwide, including 1,955 (964 female/991 male) from Kerry. Results were available in schools from early morning and candidates also had access to their results online from 4pm

on the 23rd, November. Junior Cycle exam results in Kerry were superb and well up to the high standard of previous years.

#### **DESCRIPTORS**

Six new grade descriptors - Distinction, Higher Merit, Merit, Achieved, Partially Achieved, Not Graded - are now used in the reformed Junior Cycle programme, replacing the old A, B, C, D, E, F and NG grades. The Junior Cycle exams were cancelled in 2020 and 2021 and replaced with a system of school assessments. In 2020 and 2021, Junior Cycle exams were held in November for a very small cohort of early school-leavers and adult learners. In the 2022 exam all subjects were examined under the new Junior Cycle grade descriptors. English, Irish and Mathematics were examined at both higher and ordinary levels while all other subjects were examined at common level. 2022 also saw Irish examined at two strands with T1 aimed at native speakers and T2 aimed at nonnative speakers.

#### **COMMEND**

While the Junior Cycle exam results were exceptionally late this year, the SEC must be commended for providing a Junior Cycle exam for the first time since 2019. The SEC had very significant examiner shortages which delayed marking at both Leaving Certificate and Junior Cycle. The SEC also provided a deferred sitting of the Leaving Cert exam in July for students unable to sit exams in June due to serious accident, injury or illness, close family bereavement or Covid-19.

#### **NUMBERS**

Consequently, the Leaving Cert results were

published much later than normal, on 2nd September, and the Leaving Cert subject appeal results came out five weeks later on Friday, 7th October, in time for the CAO offers. The number of candidates who sat for the Junior Cycle exam this year was also about 3,080 or 4.4% up on the 2019 figure, when the exams were last held for all candidates.

Credit where credit is due to Minister for Education, Norma Foley and the SEC for running the State exams in a fair and efficient manner despite very difficult circumstances. The quality and integrity of the exams was as good as ever and hopefully, the 2023 state exam results will be published much earlier for the convenience of Leaving Cert and Junior Cycle students.

#### **CERTIFICATION**

The reporting process at Junior Cycle culminates in the award of the Junior Cycle Profile of Achievement (JCPA) to students. The JCPA replaces the Junior Cert and consequently the SEC no longer issues these certificates. The JCPA confirms the level of achievement across all areas of learning including Classroom-Based Assessments (CBA), Short Courses, Priority Learning Units and other areas of learning, as well as the SEC exam results.

#### **IMPORTANT**

The Junior Cycle exam is often overshadowed by the more public Leaving Cert exam but it's a very important exam in its own right. It's a prestigious exam of the SEC and it's the first opportunity for second level students to engage with a public exam of this nature. With very few students now leaving school after this exam, the Junior Cycle is a passport to Senior Cycle education, which is a further two years - three years if the optional Transition Year is included. During the final two years of Senior Cycle, students take the traditional Leaving Certificate (LC), the Leaving Certificate Vocational Program (LCVP) or the Leaving Certificate Applied (LCA).

**FINALISE** 

Normally, after the publication of Junior Cycle results, schools give Fifth Year students a few days to firm up their subject grouping for Senior Cycle. Unfortunately, the passage of time has overtaken that option this year as the first term is almost at an end. Hopefully, students have settled into Fifth Year and are happy with the Leaving Cert subjects they selected back in September. They should now start to think about their college course options and the related careers. This time next year, it will be their turn to apply for college. Congratulations to all candidates, who received Junior Cycle exam results.







Sam Bayley National Park and Wildlife Conservation Ranger in Killarney National Park, will be providing information and regular video features on his work as a Conservation Ranger. 

Coach Jarlath Lee will be glad to get a couple of weeks work into his squad ahead of two home games pre Christmas. Those clashes against Moy Tolka Rovers and SETU Waterford Vikings will offer them an opportunity to get their season back on track. After winning two of their first three games they've now lost three on the spin. To be fair it hasn't been an ideal opening to the season with key figures injured or unavailable and there's no doubt that with a fully fit squad available they are a match for anyone in the league. He lamented "We need a full squad to have a big say in this league. Rui, Ronan and David are serious players to be missing so we'll be looking to have some good training sessions in the next two weeks".

### THREE KERRY TEAMS INTO MUNSTER FINALS

Munster Senior Club Semi-Final: Kerins O'Rahillys Éire Óg (Ennis)

Rahillys set out their stall early on, with Jack Savage pointing straight from the throw-in and Tommy Walsh slotting a goal just two minutes later. #### KERRY GAA CONVENTION

The big talking points after the Kerry GAA Convention every year tend to be the election of officers, the state of finances (in a very healthy state, thanks to good management, the success of the Kerry GAA Store, and a certain marketing phenomenon from Fossa.

The announcement at Kerry GAA Convention of plans for a €72 million upgrade to the Fitzgerald Stadium raised more than a few eyebrows when Chairman Patrick O'Sullivan raised the matter at Convention. Personally, I am hugely in favour of it. We haven't hesitated to spend money on Currans (including the purchase of an additional seven acres) but Fitzgerald Stadium needs work done - why not go all the way and build a modern multi-functional facility? The rebuild of Croke Park was one of the GAA's biggest ever projects, and that was a massive success. True, Pairc Uí Caoimh's revamp went way over-budget and was plagued with

teething problems all through, but that's not a model that anyone plans on following.

The Fitzgerald Stadium is the jewel in the crown, but that jewel hasn't had a real polish in a long time. Bits of it clearly need some work done, and I feel that we may as well do the job once and do it right besides fixing bits and pieces here and there. We all know that you are going to have to upgrade eventually, and it's not going to get any cheaper - in fact, it will only get more expensive the longer we wait.

Another suggestion that might have seemed to come a bit from left field is the suggestion of Croke Park assisting teams with accommodation in Dublin during the summer months, with the Chairman paying tribute to John Mulhern of Kerry airport for arranging flights home for the Kerry hurling team after the McDonagh Cup Final. The fact is that accommodation in Dublin is prohibitively expensive and counties can't afford to book early before they know who is playing in the big games. But at a macro level, the GAA know that there will be teams playing in those games - it should be possible for them to book accommodation for teams well in advance. It's a simple idea - and a very good

The debate regarding the age change at minor grade was also raised, with the Chairman expressing his disappointment at Croke Park's lack of leadership on the issue. I could not agree more. As far as I am concerned, the change to U17 and to 'odd' ages at juvenile level has been a disaster and more and more counties are pushing for a return to U18 and U21.

Kerry GAA is in a good place right now, but this is no time to rest on laurels.

### MICK MEAGAN RIP

In some ways, he was almost a forgotten part of our soccer history. I don't think he ever really got the credit he deserved for helping to usher in a new era of management. There is an old trope in most sports, especially soccer, of the 'blazers' running the sport from ivory towers without any practical understanding of the necessities of actual management. It actually goes back to the so-called 'golden age of parliamentary democracy' of 19th century England, where the class system was absolutely rigid. 'Gentlemen', essentially feudal landlords governed sports institutions, mere players were not considered remotely capable of it.

Throughout the forties and fifties, Ireland's soccer team was quite literally elected by committee. In many cases they were sincere, but almost always parochial. Soccer was huge in Dublin at the time - it was the 'local' sport, as opposed to more 'culchie' GAA fostered by guards, teachers, and civil servants who had moved to Dublin a generation beforehand for work. Dublin had a thriving underage scene and a lot of Irish players were getting to play professionally in England.

The trouble with the FAI's five man committee was that they had no clue what they were doing. There was no such thing as travelling over to England regularly on scouting missions; a lot of the teams were picked based on newspaper reports, plenty of which had their own agenda too.

The sixties saw the dawn of a new era. Much greater education, improved facilities, and, quite simply, a demand for better standards. It's a bit simplistic but not untrue to say that Irish people were no longer as willing to be subservient. The famous Ireland v Yugoslavia match in 1955 was a real statement of intent.

Archbishop John Charles McQuaid called for a ban or at least a boycott (McQuaid was not the ogre he is often painted as, his autocratic nature was typical of it's time and in this case, he had a point, given Tito's persecution of the Catholic Church). Much to his discomfiture, the ordinary working class of Dublin ignored him and went to the game. No big deal nowadays, but back then it was seismic. The famous 'Bishop and the Nightie' affair seven years later on a young Gay Byrne's Late Late Show was a far more trivial affair in comparison.

The Irish public, and much more importantly the Irish players, were looking at the organisation behind the Irish team and comparing it very unfavourably with their club teams in England and the international players that they were sharing dressing rooms with.

Ireland failed to qualify for the 1968 European Championships, but had shown enough to raise expectations. By 1969 the FAI reluctantly had to bow to public pressure and appoint an actual manager to the Irish team. Mick Meagan was one of the most respected players around. He had played in the Dublin Leagues before signing for Everton, winning the First Division and the FA Charity Shield. He had also played for Huddersfield and Halifax, where he was still playing when the Irish post was offered.

He was somewhat of a surprising choice, with Noel Cantwell the likely favourite in most people's eyes. One of his big champions was one of Ireland's best players, who had been amazingly dropped by Ireland despite being one of the generals on the Leeds team who won the title in 1969. Johnny Giles' support carried a lot of weight in the room (Eamonn Dunphy was far less influential). Noel Cantwell, the former Man United captain, was the other main candidate. He vies with Denis Irwin as the best left back Ireland has ever produced and was having great success at managing Coventry at the time - he and Meagan had played together with Ireland. I can't help but surmise that the FAI, who were reluctant to cede control, saw Cantwell as less malleable than Meagan, but that may be a bit unfair.

Mick Meagan's tenure as Ireland manager did not go well. He had two 1-1 draws in his first three games, but that was as good as it got for two years. In thirteen games (two of them 'unofficial' friendlies), he only won once, an unofficial game against the German Olympic selection. Ireland just didn't have the players, and the match arrangements by the FAI for away games were woefully inadequate. It is impossible at this remove to gauge his actual managerial ability - he certainly had plenty of success afterwards in the League of Ireland, but that wasn't a high benchmark for international competition. What is certain is that his players both liked and trusted him (the combination is rare enough at a high level of management) and his team selections were honest, itself a big step forward. After a 2-1 defeat to Italy finished off their European qualifying group with



Ireland long out of contention, he tendered his resignation and was replaced by Liam Tuohy (who only lasted a year in the job before being replaced by John Giles).

Mick Meagan played for Bray Wanderers, Shamrock Rovers, and Dundalk and managed the latter two. His contribution to Irish soccer may have been understated, but it was absolutely immense. May he rest6 in peace.

### **ATHLETICS**

There will be a reunion of Kerry NACA members n December 28th in Daly's Riverside in Currans. The NACA was the governing body of Irish cycling and athletics from 1922 to 2000. Their policy ofg refusing to recognise partition meant that it wasn't recognised by the International Amateur Athletics Association of the Union Cycliste Internationale. There were

attempts to resolve the political imnpasse from 1967 onwards and in 2000 it was officially dissolved into the Athletics Association of Ireland. The political stance may be the NACA's most recognised characteristic, but more important is the amount of young people, in Kerry and elsewhere, who got the opportunity to train and compete at a high level under their auspices, and December 28th is an opportunity for members to reminisce about the many great days in Kerry athletics.

### **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

### I BOUGHT A PROPERTY THAT HASN'T BEEN LIVED IN FOR YEARS, WHAT GRANTS CAN I GET TO DO IT UP?

The Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant gives funding for refurbishing vacant and derelict homes. To qualify:

Your home must have been vacant for 2 years or more

Your home must have been built before 1993 You must own the home, or be in the process of buying it

You must live in the property as your principal private home after the work is done

You must have tax clearance from Revenue and your tax affairs must be in order.

You must have paid your local property tax, if applicable.

You must not have already got funding under the grant

#### How much is the grant?

You can get up to  $\le 30,000$  to renovate a vacant property and an additional top-up grant of up to  $\le 20,000$  if the property is derelict. The grant includes VAT.

If the renovation costs more than the grant, you will have to pay for the additional costs.

You can apply to the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) for other grants to help improve the energy efficiency of your home.

If I have already commenced refurbishing the property, can I get the grant?

The grant must be approved before any work

### Grant to refurbish vacant or derelict homes

begins.

### What does the grant cover?

The grant covers:

Demolition work and site clearances including the removal of hazardous materials

Work on foundations, rising walls, floor slabs, damp-proofing and underpinning

Work on chimneys, suspended timber floors and structural timbers

Work on internal walls, stairs, landings, doors, windows and applied finishes

External walls and roof completions

Building services such as plumbing, heating, ventilation, electrical services and telecommunications

Painting and decoration needed because of the work

Extensions that meet the planning regulations and are part of the wider refurbishment

Necessary external works and site development Professional services associated with work

Is the grant available everywhere?

Yes, the grant is now available in all areas. You can get it if you are refurbishing a vacant home in a city, rural area, or a town or village. You could initially only get the grant for vacant homes in regional towns and villages. But on 15 November 2022, it was extended to all areas.

### How are applications for the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant prioritised?

Applications for the Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant are prioritised in this way: 1. First-time buyers and 'fresh start' applicants.

2. Applicants with particular needs who are selling or have sold their current home and want to refurbish a vacant home to live in. Particular needs includes people with disabilities and older people.

3. Anyone else who is selling or has sold their home and wants to refurbish a vacant home to live in.

#### You are a first-time buyer if:

You have not previously bought or built a property to live in.

You do not own or have an interest in any property in Ireland or abroad.

You are a 'fresh start' applicant if you previously owned a home, but you no longer have a financial interest in it because:

You are now divorced, separated, or your relationship has ended.

You have gone through personal insolvency or bankruptcy.

#### How do I apply?

Send a completed application form, supporting documents and a quote for the renovations to your local authority. The supporting documents must prove that you own the home and that it is vacant or derelict.




Welcome back dear student. "When my anxious thoughts multiply within me, ⊠Your comforts delight me" (Psalms 94:19). Well here we are in the final month of the year! 


































### CLLR. O'DONOGHUE QUERIES ASSIS-TANCE FOR PEOPLE WHO SHORT TERM LET

'llr John O'Donoghue : has raised a notice of motion at the recent **Kerry Council Meeting on** what provision, if any, has been put in place to assist people within the county & country who put their savings, and particularly their retirement funds, into renovating buildings for short term letting and now find themselves in contravention of the law?"

Cllr. O'Donoghue said: "This issue has been a hot topic recently and unfortunately it looks as though the Government are steadfast in their intention to prohibit people from short term letting their properties, something I feel will have colossal ramifications on a County so dependent on tourism as Kerry is. I feel very strongly that the housing crisis in our country is a result of the failure of successive governments to provide such housing. A decision was taken some years ago to place the provision of housing in the hands of private developers, a decision which backfired spectacularly when the developers were then allowed to buy out their requirement to dedicate units for social housing by paying a comparatively small penalty. Now here we are again, finding ourselves at a juncture where private individuals are being asked to do the job of central government and provide long term rental properties. All that being said, my motion is coming here on behalf of people who, finding themselves in houses with more rooms than they need, due to their families growing up and moving out, decided to renovate their primary residence I order to short term let it. I can give you a specific example of a couple I am dealing with. Finding themselves at retirement age, in a house where their children had moved out, thankfully they still are in good health and feel they still have much to contribute to in society. Being willing and able, they decided to put their retirement fund into renovating their house which would serve the dual purpose of providing them with something to occupy their free time, while also benefitting the tourism industry within the County. They now find themselves in the impossible situation where their retirement funds are used up, and they are unable to rent out their property. Understandably, long term letting is not an option, as were they to take in troublesome tenants, they would no longer be able to live in their own house. I feel this new directive is extraordinarily unfair on such individuals, and propose that we as a Council write to the Minister and ask him to change the legislation to make allowances for such people who have made the renovations to their property".

Cllr. John O'Donoghue's motion was supported by his colleagues and the Council will now write to the Minster asking for a change in the Legislation.

### FURTHER PROGRESS ON THE SOUTH KERRY GREENWAY

Kerry County Council has confirmed in a reply to Fianna Fáil Councillor, Michael Cahill, that consultants will be appointed in early 2023 to prepare the Statutory Application to secure planning consent for those sections of the South Kerry Greenway that were omitted in the An Bórd Pleanála approval decision.

Speaking at this month's meeting of Kerry County Council, Councillor Cahill said "It is hugely important that Planning Permission can be granted to all parts of the South Kerry Greenway, including the sections from Ballycarbery/Castlequin to Cahersiveen and onwards to Renard Point and to connect up with the Skellig Ring."

"It's fantastic to hear that progress is being made to ensure all areas will be included in the full South Kerry Greenway project and as an added Christmas present, I have been advised that works will commence on sections of the route within the next couple of weeks" said Councillor Cahill, an avid supporter of the South Kerry Greenway from the very outset.

"It is anticipated that the construction phases will be rolled out over the next three years with a number of sections being opened as they are completed in 2024 and 2025. As I have said many times before, this project will transform all of Caherciveen/Glenbeigh/Iveragh/South Kerry and beyond, for generations to come, providing employment through business opportunities and helping to stem the tide of emigration. It will indeed be a Gamechanger for Kerry and I am proud of my support and input to it from the very beginning" stated the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

### FOCUS ON CHRISTMAS HOUSEPLANTS

This is the time of year when people will give and receive gifts of houseplants such as Cyclamen, Azalea, Gardenia, Poinsettia etc. Christmas houseplants obviously give their best display this time of the year but they have to be kept in the right conditions like the right temperature and humidity level to prolong their lives into the new year and longer.

The conditions of a house environment can be a challenging place for houseplants because of central heating which is very drying to houseplants especially for ones that come from humid tropical parts of the world.

There are several ways to improve conditions for your plants in the house. You can avoid placing them in draughts, especially in places where temperatures will fluctuate from very hot to very cold or in very hot areas like above or beside a radiator. Water your plants by placing them in a container of water for about twenty minutes.

For plants that need more humidity place them on a tray of gravel with some water but make sure that the plant is sitting on the gravel not the water.


