Frank scales new heights in epic adventure

A Killarney man who is living in Dubai is currenty Aundertaking an epic adventure with the aim to climb the tallest mountains on each continent.

Frank McCarthy from Fossa has just completed Mt. Aconcagua, the rooftop of South America, the tallest mountain in the Western and Southern hemispheres and the second highest of the Seven Summits after Everest at 6,961m / 22,840 ft and has now completed his third Seven Summit.

"My trip was aimed towards my goal of climbing the seven summits over the next few years, the tallest mountains on each continent of the world", Frank told Killarney Outlook.

"I have already previously climbed Mt Kilimanjaro (5,895M / 19,341FT), tallest mountain in Africa, and Mt Elbrus (5,642M / 18,510FT), the tallest mountain in continental Europe and my next goal is to pursue either Mt Denali in Alaska (North America), Mt Vinson (Antarctica) or Mt Everest (Asia) in 2024", Frank, who is the son of Frank Snr. and Mairead McCarthy said. "For Aconcagua, I'm based in Middle East, full time in Dubai at the moment and I joined an international team of climbers from Argentina, Canada, Estonia, France, Malaysia, and America and met climbers like Nimsdai (from the Netflix documentary 14 peak Peaks) on the mountain who also paved the way for our summit success", Frank added.

Frank has now set his sights on either Mt Denali in Alaska (North America), Mt Vinson (Antarctica) or Mt Everest (Asia) in 2024 and will hopefully share his adventures with the readers of Killarney Outlook.

FAMILY COMES FIRST for Brendan Griffin

Kerry TD Brendan Griffin has announced that he will not be seeking a nomination to stand in the next general election.

The Keel based TD made the announcement on Monday night stating that the reason was a straightforward one. "I have two young sons and I want to be around them more for tahe remaining years of their childhood," he said

"Politics demands absolute commitment and is an extremely time and attention consuming profession," he said.

"It is also a job that takes you away from home and loved ones for long periods of time on a regular basis. And when you are at home, your mind is often preoccupied with any number of issues and challenges," he writes.

Brendan Griffin served as Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Tourism and Sport with special responsibility for Tourism and Sport, from June 2017 to June 2020.

He is a TD in the 33rd Dáil having been previously elected to the Dáil in 2016; he was first elected in February 2011 from the Kerry South constituency, topping the poll with 8,808 first preference votes.

He served as a member of a number of Oireachtas Committees, including: Transport, Tourism and Sport (Chair; and Irish Language, the Gaeltacht and the Islands. Brendan has previously served as a member of Kerry County Council since June 2009, when he was elected from the Dingle Electoral Area. He also contested the 2004 local election in the same area, after which he worked as Parliamentary Assistant to Jimmy Deenihan TD, until 2007, when he established his own business.

In a statement issued on Tuesday, An Taoiseach Leo Varadkar said "Brendan Griffin is a brilliant representative for Kerry. I understand entirely that he wants to spend more time with his family in the future. He was an excellent Minister for Tourism & Sport and throughout his career has been a very effective advocate for rural Ireland.

"Brendan has worked tirelessly for the people of Kerry. His legacy includes the two greenways in North Kerry, progress on the south Kerry greenway; which is now in the early stages of construction, improvements on the new Cork to Kerry road; including the Macroom bypass, financial support for Kerry Airport and for sports clubs throughout the county. And above all, Brendan has shown unstinting service for the people of Kerry as their public representative."

Cllr. Bobby O'Connell has announced he will put his name forward to contest the election.

A look back in time....

A s Killarney Legion approaches its Centenary year Enda Walshe looks back at how far the Club has come since its foundation in 1929. The Club was founded on a March evening when a group of eleven men held a meeting in the Temperance Hall in High Street. To give reference to today this is where O Sheas Tyre Centre is situated in High Street. The Club's first Chairman was Maurice O Leary, first Secretary Maurice O Leary. A Treasurer was not elected as money was scarce in those days. The first captain of the Senior team was Vincent Doyle. For the record the Founding Members were Maurice O'Leary, Joe Cooper, Vince Doyle, Michael O'Leary, Martin Wade, Denis Hussey, Paulie Regan, Timmie Casey, Larry Horgan, Liamie Leary and Michael Cooper.



The Club crest was only designed in 1993 and completed a year later by Fergal O'Carroll and his father, the late Jim O'Carroll. Featured on the crest are a football and a sliotar, the three blue lozenges represent the three Lakes of Killarney. The doorway to the oratory on Innisfallen Island is in the top segment of the crest while underneath is the fruit of the Arbutus tree, which is synonymous with Killarney.

Notable members through the years are the Lynes of Cleeney, the seven brothers Fr Michael, Donie, Teddy, Tom, Denny, Jackie, Con and not forgetting sister Maura who was mother to the famous Spillane brothers in Templenoe. Johnny Culloty captained Kerry to their 21st All Ireland in 1969, one of five Senior medals he would win in a stellar career while in more recent years James O Donoghue was the Club first All Star in 2013, a feat he repeated in 2014 when also becoming the GAA/GPA Footballer of the Year. Legion club members photographed in the 1970s and including Vince Doyle, who was the very first captain of the Legion senior team, and Mickey O Leary, who was also one of the founding members.

The late Weeshie Fogarty had no mean football career but it's fair to say his broadcasting career would rival that. Known as the Voice of Kerry Football he sadly passed away in 2018.

The Club has made great strides off the field in recent years with a state of the art all weather pitch, fully flood lit, another pitch with a 300 seater stand and PA system, a fully equipped gym and four large dressing rooms.

MISSION BLUE ANNOUNCES IRELAND'S FIRST 'HOPE SPOT'

Greater Skellig Coast deemed critical to the health of the ocean by global organisation

large swathe of ocean off the south west A coast of Ireland has been added to a list of 'Hope Spots' by a global marine conservation movement. Mission Blue is led by legendary oceanographer Dr. Sylvia Earle and now has a



scientifically identified as critical to the health of the ocean. Existing spots include the Galápagos Islands, the Great Barrier Reef, the Northwest Passage and parts of Antarctica. Some locations are already formally protected, while others still need defined protection.

The Greater Skellig Coast stretches from Kenmare Bay in Co Kerry to Loop Head in Co Clare and covers an area of roughly 7,000km2 home to critically endangered sharks, globally important seabird colonies, and animals threatened with extinction which rely on these areas for breeding and feeding.

The area has been championed by Fair Seas, a coalition of Ireland's leading environmental non-governmental organisations and networks, with the support of Sea Synergy, a marine awareness and activity centre based in Kerry. Fair Seas has been campaigning for the Government to designate a minimum of 30% of Irish waters as Marine Protected Areas (MPA) by 2030. The Greater Skellig Coast is one of 16 'Areas of Interest' identified for possible MPA designation by the organisation.

Mission Blue was founded by American oceanographer, explorer and author Dr Sylvia Earle. She has been National Geographic's Explorer in Residence since 1998 and was named the first Hero for the Planet by Time Magazine.

Mangerton Lamb and Kerry Beef, So Why not Killarney Venison?



Happy New Deer! Well, really, happy new deer approach: the sudden conversion by Green Minister Eamon Ryan to the need to cull deer is very welcome. But how come he was unaware that an annual cull of tens of thousands already takes place on this island? In fact, 2021/2022 saw a record number of 55,000 wild deer shot by licensed hunters. No-one knows how many deer have been poached or hunted illegally - it could be in the tens of thousands.

News is also coming through that up to 300 are to be taken out from Killarney National Park this year.

Along with a cull there is the call to eat more venison. For many the taste is too "gamey" and there is a strong smell from it while cooking but we could get used to it, given the proper marketing. Damien Hannigan of the Irish Deer Commission says getting deer to the Irish consumer market is not as simple as it appears.

Damien, a renowned deer stalker and hunter with experience here and in Scotland says the sale of venison is far more organised and successful in Scotland.

Damien and the Irish Deer Commission want a network of approved larders around the country to store and supply deer locally.

Would it be too far a step to suggest that we set up a supply line for hunting parties in Killarney and such that along with Kerry lamb and Kerry beef we have Kerry venison on the menu?

We could do the same for supermarkets and set up venison tasting to convert the local population.

Who will take advantage of Fine Gael's dilemna with Griffin out?

The news that Brendan Griffin will not run for the Dail next time is a huge disappointment for Fine Gael and there is a sense also the people of Kerry will lose out as they have much to thank him for.

Elected in 2011, in his early 30s, Griffin unseated Tom Sheahan who had won the seat back for Fine Gael after a long, long dry spell for the party in Kerry South.

The young whipper-snapper Brendan was from a new generation of professional

politicians especially in Fine Gael. Like others including Tom Sheahan, he had spent a comparative wet week in the county council before soaring to parliamentary honors. He was seen as a rising star of the Leo era. Alas and alack, he did not rise as quickly as expected.

National Geography and gender may have been factors in his failure to get the Chief Whip position.

In a heart-felt interview with Jerry O'Sullivan on Kerry Today, Brendan spoke openly of the toll politics takes on family life of TDs from Kerry. The chief whip's job would have suited him better being in the Dail, he also said.

Covid and being around his family for a long stretch for the first time was one of the factors too in his decision.

But who will Fine Gael focus on now if Brendan is out? Among councillors Listowel's Aoife Thornton is regarded as a certainty if she runs. I am not convinced. The gender advantage is not what it was. And Aoife though very able, is practically unknown even in Tralee and in Killarney and the south. Patrick Connor-Scarteen has history to his advantage in this era of Independence and Civil War commemorations. He also now lives in Killarney and works in Kenmare.

Castleisland based Bobby O' Connell, former mayor of Killarney and currently deputy chair of Kerry County Council, enjoys the geographical advantage Griffin has positioned between north and south and with the east to his back as Griffin had the west. He is also highly experienced and is the leader of Fine Gael in the council. A nononsense person, O'Connell's chairmanship of council meetings in recent months is being looked upon as a template for effective running of council meetings which ramble pointlessly all too often. I wouldn't rule him out.

But what of Tom Sheahan? Could he stage a comeback? Revenge is a dish best eaten cold, they do say.

There are some who think Fine Gael's dilemna will be Sinn Fein's gain. But the shine seems to have gone off the Shinners. The last general election's very real prospect of two seats for Sinn Fein in Kerry seems to be in the rear view mirror.

Much of the slippage is of Sinn Fein's own making and has to do with their persistent attempts to bring the house down on anyone from journalists to TD who dare question them or put a toe-nail wrong. Their input into the Paschal Donohoe affair showed a terrible lack of maturity and a pursuit of petty matters. Also I suspect people expect more from Sinn Fein than other parties on the immigration issues. There was a really angry response from followers in Killarney and elsewhere to Pa Daly's Facebook post criticising immigration protestors in Killarney and the post had to be taken down.

Could the Healy-Raes take advantage of Fine Gael confusion? Is three candidates out of Kilgarvan quite out of the question? Should Maura be on the ticket, the independents would enjoy much sought after gender balance. Wouldn't it be just like them!

I can't see how Fianna Fail will take advantage of Fine Gael troubles unless they decide quickly on a likely candidate from Kerry South.

Plastic in lake Perch

The volume of plastic washed up with the recent floods all along the lake shore has to be seen to be believed. The river banks are just as bad.

The New Entrance where the Lower Lake had flowed onto the meadow is littered with plastic bottles, broken bags and cans and bottles.

It prompted memories of the 1980s cleanups organised by the late Eugene O'Shea, Michael Lucey, Marcus Counihan, mise and others of the Killarney Greens with great help from the late Norma Lougheed and the Killarney girl scouts.

We hear a lot now about plastic in the bellies of whales but our lake fish are suffering too.

Qualified angling instructor and guide Mick O'Brien who runs Killarney Fishing Tours and international fishing school tells me the lake perch are especially susceptible and plastic bits are regularly found in their bellies.

The principal culprits for spreading plastic are birds. Flooding washes the plastic from fields into the Flesk and Deenagh rivers and then onto lakes.

Crows pick at plastic especially if it contains food and fish eat the plastic strips, is the theory.

The sheer volume of plastic from the lake is astonishing. I have no doubt some people are throwing cans and bottles into the lake and river directly. The deliberate dumping of household waste in woods near the Flesk has begun again, I am told

Mick has come across dead foxes by the Flesk recently and strongly suspects they too had eaten plastic.

It is something we should be very aware of and it may be time to get a local information campaign organised. Not to mention a 1980s style clean-up.

RSA and local authorities remind landowners to cut hedgerows to prevent road safety hazards

The Road Safety Authority (RSA) and the County and City Management Association (CCMA) are calling on land-owners to cut their hedgerows before the March 1 deadline, to ensure they are not causing a potentially serious road safety hazard.

Overgrown hedgerows and roadside verges can result in road fatalities and serious injury collisions. Properly maintained hedges also protect vulnerable road users who are not forced onto the road by overgrown hedges. It additionally affords motorists a clear view of what is in front of them or around the a bend, especially on local rural roads in the case of sightlines at junctions or obstructions to road



signs.

In accordance with the Wildlife Act, it is an offence to cut, grub, burn or otherwise destroy any vegetation growing on any land not then cultivated or growing in any hedge or ditch, between 1st March and 31st August. There are some exceptions to this including if there are grounds to act for road safety reasons. Local authorities can and do either take direct action themselves or serve a notice on the landowner to do something in such instances.

KILLARNEY IS THE ECONOMIC ENGINE FOR KERRY

Killarney has evolved to become an international must-visit destination and it is unquestionably the economic engine for the rest of the county, Fáilte Ireland Chairman Paul Carty has said.

Over 55 per cent of visitors to Killarney also spend time in other parts of Kerry and towns, like Dingle, Kenmare and Tralee, really benefit from the spin-off, he told the attendance at the Kerry Skal President's dinner in Killarney at the weekend.

Mr Carty said the role played by tourism in the county should not be underestimated as the industry supports over 3,500 jobs in Killarney and over 7,000 in the rest of Kerry.

He said the hard work put in by tourism professionals in Killarney over the years is paying off and when Fáilte Ireland surveyed hundreds of domestic and international tourists, at the height of the season last August, they couldn't speak highly enough of their experience with 97 per cent saying they were very satisfied.

"The national figure is 90 per cent so Killarney is actually seven per cent higher than the national average and that's truly exceptional," he said.

The Fáilte Ireland chairman said his organisation is acutely aware of the challenges that Killarney has faced in recent years and the challenges it currently faces and every support possible will be provided to help.

Mr Carty said Fáilte Ireland last year launched a destination and experience and development plan for Killarney, in partnership with industry stakeholders, and that will see the town reach its full potential through sustainability and the development of year-round tourist attractions.

"We will give the visitors more reasons to visit, more reasons to stay and compelling reasons to visit in the off-peak which will lengthen the season and provide more sustainable jobs, with a focus on the luxury and family market," the tourism body chief stated.

Mr Carty acknowledged that the current trading environment is very difficult and he said one of the things that keeps him awake at night is a concern over the availability of hotel rooms with over 25 per cent of rooms around the country already full or not available.

"From a humanitarian point of view, the Government had to do what they did and I commend them and I think they are doing a brilliant job on that but the consequence is the fallout for tourism and particularly pubs, restaurants, visitor attractions, retail and others.

"They say for every one euro spent on accommodation \in 2.50 is spent on the peripheral businesses," he added.

Mr Carty said costs were also a big concern with energy bills, in particular, going through the roof and putting businesses under serious pressure. He said while there is a huge demand in the American market to holiday in Ireland in 2023, another issue was the lack of availability of golfing opportunities to cater for the demand in the five-star market and it is nearly impossible to get tee-times in courses around the country while the cost of car hire was also problematic.

Mr Carty said staffing was a serious problem for the industry as so much talent was lost during Covid.

"An awful lot of great people left our industry and they're not coming back so there is a great shortage," he said, adding that Fáilte Ireland was working hard to overcome the difficulties being experienced.

There has always been a problem locating chefs but now the staffing crisis is across the line with problems recruiting middle management, front of house staff, waiting staff and kitchen porters.

Mr Carty underlined providing value for money in the face of rising costs was essential going forward and that's why it is "absolutely crucial" that the Government keeps the hospitality VAT rate at nine per cent.

'BALLYSEEDY' TO BE SCREENED AT KERRY CIVIL WAR CONFERENCE

A unique dramatised account of one of the darkest days of the Civil War in Kerry will be screened at the Siamsa Tíre Theatre in Tralee in February as part of the programme of events for the three-day Kerry Civil War Conference, which marks the centenary of the conflict.

Ballyseedy, which was written and presented by the well-known broadcaster and journalist, Pat Butler, will be shown during the conference on Friday, 24 February at 8.00pm. The dramatised documentary tells the story of the execution of eight anti-Treaty IRA prisoners near Tralee on 7 March 1923 as the war in Kerry reached new depths of violence and barbarity. It was first broadcast on RTÉ One television in 1997 and repeated in March 1998 and has not been shown publicly since then.

The upcoming screening has been arranged by the organisers of the Kerry Civil War Conference which runs from 23 to 25 February and which features over twenty historians, experts and academics in discussion about the war in Kerry and beyond and its legacy a century later, as well as other commemorative events. The conference is supported by the Department of Culture under the Decade of Centenaries Programme for 2023.

Before the screening on 24 February, Pat Butler will be interviewed by Jerry O'Sullivan of Radio Kerry about how and why he researched and produced the programme, and why it is so important as a historical resource. Admission to the event is free of charge but pre-booking is required through the Siamsa Tíre Box Office.

Owen O'Shea, one of the organisers of the Kerry Civil War Conference, said that the forthcoming conference is an appropriate time to present the 90-minute docudrama.

'We are extremely grateful to RTÉ for agreeing to share the programme with us and to Pat Butler who spent so many years researching and writing the piece. As the only televisual representation of events at Ballyseedy, it is a hugely important resource which contains interviews with eyewitnesses who are no longer with us,'he said.

'Ballyseedy is synonymous with the darkest days of the Civil War in Kerry and Pat's work sets the events of 7 March 1923 in the context of the trip mine explosion at Knocknagoshel the previous night and the wider story of how and why the war in Kerry became so visceral and violent,' he added.

Pat Butler said that the programme had its origins in the smoke-infused front room of his parents' house in Cork, in 1957, when, as a nine-year-old, he heard whispered references to 'the birds eating the flesh off the trees at Ballyseedy Wood'.

'No one would explain to me what that meant. Forty years later, dark deeds hinted at in an early draft of Niall C. Harrington's Civil War memoir, A Kerry Landing, sparked my old curiosity. Six years of research in Kerry led to the Ballyseedy documentary. The film explores the dark night of the national soul - the slaughter that was the Civil War in Kerry. The national silence about the Irish Civil War was finally broken, Pat explained. The screening of Ballyseedy takes place on Friday, 24 February at 8.00pm at Siamsa Tíre in Tralee. CONFIRMATION OF OVER €2 MILLION IN FUNDING FOR KERRY WALKING AND CYCLING INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

There has been broad welcome for the confirmation of €2,350,000 in funding for 26 walking and infrastructure projects in Kerry. This substantial investment will provide for the development of segregated cycle lanes and widened footpaths, new walking and cycling bridges, and new pedestrian crossings.

Some of the major projects receiving funding include the Rock Road Killarney (\in 778,000), the Listowel Greenway Link (\in 700,000) and the Canal to Town Centre, Tralee (\in 100,000).

Funding is also provided to allow eight schools in Kerry to join the Safe Routes to School Programme providing infrastructure and facilities for safer cycling and walking routes.

The eight schools receiving funding are:

- Moyderwell Mercy Primary School €65,000
- Mercy Secondary School, Mounthawk, Tralee €45,000
- Sacred Heart Primary School, Castle Street Upper, Tralee € 40,000

- Presentation Secondary School, Ballymullen,Tralee €35,000
- Scoil Mhuire na mBriathre (CBS Primary), Tralee €15,000
- Fossa National School, Killarney €5,000
- Intermediate School, Killorglin €5,000
- Scoil Mhuire B, Killorglin €5,000

Minister Norma Foley said: I welcome confirmation of this significant funding which will enhance and develop walking and cycling infrastructure across the county. The Safe Routes to School Programme has seen a myriad of imaginative and fun ways for our school communities to reinvent their active pathways to schools. This widening of the programme will have a transformative effect on the daily commute for these eight schools in Kerry."

Skilled personnel urgently needed in booming economy

By all accounts, the Irish economy is booming and a budget surplus in predicted again this year. The experts are forecasting that the Irish economy will flourish for the next three years as we enter the post pandemic period. The economy has gathered strong momentum and is expected to provide full employment by 2024, much earlier than previously expected. Employment is set to grow by about 5% to 2024, driven by a record number of women in the workplace, probably as a result of wage increases and flexible and blended working conditions. It is expected that the jobless rate will fall to 4.5% in 2024, which is defined as full employment. However, as the country gets close to full employment labour shortages are already beginning to emerge and the job vacancy rate has reached the highest level on record.

College applicants are opting in large numbers for science, engineering and information technology courses. Science is riding the crest of a wave with attractive jobs available in industrial, medical and research science. In the current 'green wave', environmental, agricultural, marine and physical sciences are employment friendly.

The acceleration of social media platforms, artificial intelligence, data analysis, automation and digital communication has forever changed long established business practices. Many more business transactions are taking place online so the demand for courses in analytical and digital skills, e-business, software and coding skills has increased.

The critical need for housing and infrastructure is causing strong demand for courses in civil, mechanical, electrical, environmental and structural engineering, architecture, quantity surveying, valuation surveying, property management and auctioneering.

Front line healthcare workers – Doctors, Pharmacists, Nurses, Physiotherapists and allied health care staff are well regarded for their heroic work in difficult circumstances. Demand for all courses in health sciences will be at an all-time high this year.

Civil and Public service jobs showed how resistant they are to unpredictable economic circumstances. Every civil and public service worker remains on the State payroll at all times while private sector workers are more dependent on a favourable economic and health climate. Thankfully, after two difficult years, private sector employment, in areas like tourism, retail and hospitality, made a strong recovery in 2022.

With so much emphasis in the jobs market on skilled and well-qualified personnel, college applicants are aware that their chances of employment are considerably increased by a competitive qualification. The demand for skilled crafts people is at an all-time high for those who would prefer to 'earn and learn.' Young people are looking at the skills' set needed in the work environment of the future. They realise that a strong work ethic, highdigital skills, adaptability and a passion for one's qualification makes one more employable in a rapidly changing work environment. The bounce is back in the economy so seize the moment!

BIGGEST SCANDAL OF OUR LIFETIME

Kerry County Councillor moved an

A Emergency Motion calling for an emergency meeting with the Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly, the new Chief Executive of the Health Service Executive, Bernard Gloster and the Minister of State at the Department of Health with special responsibility for Mental Health, Mary Butler to address as a matter of extreme urgency, the CAMHS scandal, following further damning reports recently published.

Speaking at a recent meeting of Kerry County Council, Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill said "The treatment of children in our county has sent shockwaves through the hearts and minds of parents all over this country. There has to be accountability to the families and patients involved throughout Kerry. The Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group must be at the heart of this meeting. Twelve month's ago they invited me to attend a meeting in Dail Eireann with Mary Butler and her Department Officials, which our own Minister Norma Foley helped to organise. There are still a number of outstanding issues that the Kerry CAMHS Family Support Group have asked me to raise" said Councillor Cahill. "Children have got lost in the follow-up, 140 are on anti-psychotic drugs, there is inconsistency with the acceptance rates, lack of capacity to provide therapeutic programmes, over prescribing of drugs, lack of physical monitoring, lack of governance, no one has been held responsible to date and CAMHS do not have their own budget" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.



"This is, by a long, long way, the biggest scandal of our lifetime. Children and their families have been destroyed, many for ever. The most vulnerable in society have been betrayed by those that they put their trust in" stated Councillor Cahill. "I request this Emergency meeting, in fact I believe we should demand this meeting Cathaoirleach, it's the very least we as Public Representatives can do on behalf of the children and their families who have been severely traumatised" added Councillor Cahill.



Kerry Fianna Fáil County Councillor Ahas proposed a brand new connection between the peninsula's of Iveragh and Corca Dhuibhne.

Councillor Michael Cahill put forward a Notice of Motion at a recent Meeting of Kerry County Council calling for a feasibility study to be carried out on the provision of a Car Ferry THE KERRY FERRY

service between Cahersiveen and Dingle during the summer season.

"This would allow our visitors to enjoy the spectacular scenery of both peninsulas in a much more accessible way, while relieving some traffic congestion at the same time" stated Councillor Cahill.

"There would obviously be а very large initial

investment required in such a project, but I am convinced that it would be a phenomenal success and prove itself by repaying its supporters financially. As a bonus, it could also be the beginning of a completely new, closer relationship between the peninsula's of Iveragh and Corca Dhuibhne" said Councillor Cahill.

"In my opinion the South Kerry Greenway, when ready will attract within a very short period of time, in excess of one million visitors per annum" said the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

"We must plan for the future and I believe my proposal should form part of Kerry County Council's Tourism Strategy" said the Fianna Fáil man.

"I believe this project if it gets off the ground and I believe it will, will become known as the Kerry Ferry and has the potential to surpass the Tarbert to Killimer ferry in the context of numbers" added Councillor Cahill.

A ferry service operated between Caherciveen and Dingle during the mid 1990's and the service was discontinued partly as the vessel was not ideally suited to the coastal environment.

In response to Councillor Cahill's Motion, Kerry County Council said "The proposal to examine the feasibility of running a future service between Caherciveen and Dingle, could be considered in consultation with the appropriate stakeholders".

PRICE GOUGING

Fianna Fáil Councillor Michael Cahill is to ask Kerry County Council to call on the Commission for Regulation of Utilities to initiate an investigation into what appears to be price gouging by the suppliers of electricity and gas in this country.

"Gas prices have returned to the levels they were at before Russia invaded Ukraine, yet there has been no sign of this being passed on to consumers. The present Government has supported us with €600 per family, but the utility companies have not passed on any reductions" stated Councillor Cahill.

"This carryon by the suppliers really takes

the biscuit. We are in the middle of a massive cost of living crisis and families are under enormous financial pressures. The Government intervened and now we are witnessing extraordinary greed on behalf of the suppliers" said an angry Councillor Cahill.

"They were quick enough to raise their prices, so maybe if the Commission for Regulation of Utilities would check this out as a matter of priority, we might get to the bottom of it. Any reductions should be passed on with immediate effect" added the Rossbeigh based Councillor.

GLAUCOMA

What is Glaucoma?

Glaucoma is the name given to a group of eye conditions where the optic nerve at the back of the eye is damaged It is often linked with raised pressure within the eye, although the eye pressure can sometimes be normal. When the nerve is damaged it can start to cause problems with the peripheral vision (side vision) and, if left untreated, can cause permanent damage. With early treatment, further damage can be prevented. Glaucoma may not have

symptoms and this is why it is very important to have regular sight tests.

Risk Factors

Age is the biggest risk factor for glaucoma. However, your risk also increases if you have family members with glaucoma.

Symptoms

The danger with open-angle or chronic glaucoma (slow

onset) is that, in the early stages, your eyesight may seem perfectly normal. There is no pain, but your peripheral vision (side vision) is being damaged. Eventually your central vision can be affected. This can be described as tunnel vision because it feels like looking down a long tube. It's important to have regular sight tests as open-angle glaucoma often does not have symptoms.

Treatment

Open-angle glaucoma is usually treated with eye drops which reduce the pressure in the eye. You will need to use these daily. Occasionally people with open-angle glaucoma need surgery to control the pressure.

The biggest crowd for many a day at a Killarnev basketball occasion witnessed a Derby game that was high in intensity, had plenty thrills and spills, and although an argument could be made that it was slightly lacking in quality at times , endeavour and effort were in full supply. Killarney Cougars betrayed the look of a team looking for its first win as it brought a huge hunger to the game, and while the defeat was their lot in the end, they could gleam plenty of positives out of the encounter. They succeeded in frustrating the Lakers offence, Jack Ferguson aside, for long periods and with Esebio Strijdhaftig and Darren Townes pulling the strings they actually held a nine point lead early in the second half. But the huge effort they invested in taking the game to the Lakers took its toil and a stronger and more energetic home squad swept past them like a tsunami in the final guarter. The win gave the Lakers their sixth win of the season and they head to Limerick next weekend with a wet sail to face the Southern Conference top team the Sport Eagles.

Prior to tip off there was 24 seconds of applause, impeccably observed, in memory of the late Garreth Blount, a talented and well known basketball player from Cork who passed away at an all too early age with cancer.

Jamie O Sullivan was rewarded for his recent upsurge in form with a starting berth alongside Jack Ferguson, Aron Walker, Rui Saravia and Ronan Collins but it was the Cougars who shone brightest early on. Tommy Bowler, Darren Townes and Esebio Strijdhaftig all combined for twelve early points. Dutch guard Strijdhaftig who started the season as a Laker, looked keen to impress from the off while Captain Saravia helped settle the home side. It was only a matter of time that Jack Ferguson would warm up and he did so in typical fashion, hitting thirteen points on the spin. Another Laker old boy Andy Fitzgerald was sticking at it while Jack O Sullivans' cameo tightened the game to a point, 21-20 in Cougars favour. Townes' three from the free throw line was answered by another Ferguson three, and it saw the Cougars hold sway at quarter time, 24-23. The second quarter was low in scoring but

high in honesty as every ball was fiercely contested and it was from these moments that fed the Cougars momentum. Jack Ferguson found himself on three fouls and with Esebio, Townes and Bowler clicking the Cougars held the initiative. Senan O Leary and Jack Ferguson brought it back to two, 30-28 before Aron Walker was afforded the freedom of the gym to ram home a monster dunk. Darragh Lyne made his first appearance of the season for the Lakers and his two assists set up Ferguson and Ronan Collins. But Esebio and Townes kept the Cougars in it, a point emphasised by Conor Flynns three pointer, which was the halftime difference, 38-35.

The half time cup of tea clearly suited the Cougars better as they flew out of the third quarter traps, Alexander Fleming and Tommy Bowler hitting threes, and Townes going to work inside. Rui Saravia, playing a disciplined game on three fouls, and Ferguson hit back as did Aron Walker and Jamie O Sullivan. When Esebio picked up his fourth foul and Ferguson converted two free throws to level it at 48 each, one could almost sense a little tremor in the swing of momentum. Townes, Jack Lynch and Flynn fought against the dying light though and with Walker, Collins with a three and the two Jacks, Ferguson and O Sullivan, pulling the Lakers level a grandstand fourth guarter was in the offing. But that little tremor in momentum soon became an earthquake as a ravenous and fresher Lakers side upped the ante to a level the tiring Cougars found hard to live it. Despite Andrew Fitzgerald hitting the opening salvo the Lakers guickly took over. The Jacks combined beautifully for the O Sullivan version to land a great basket and Paul Clarke hit a nice jump shot. Esebio and Tommy Bowler hit back but then Aron Walker ,who conceded afterwards " that he couldn't throw it into the ocean in the first half", hit two rapid fire baskets and then a huge three to open out a nine point lead, 72-63. The highlight of the game and the biggest cheer though was reserved for Jack O Sullivan, who channelled his "inner Air Jordan ", to almost pull the rim but definitely the house down with a spectacular dunk. Ferguson, almost politely and under the radar hitting 34 points on the night, followed that up with a three point play and suddenly the lead was out to sixteen, 79-63. Conor Flynn and Townes hit consolation scores before Senan O Leary and Jamie O Sullivan had the last word to see the Lakers run out 85-66 winners.

Result aside, the occasion and the capacity crowd reflects the enthusiasm for basketball in the town of Killarney and it's doubtful that there was a bigger attendance at any other venue this weekend.

Top Scoring for the Lakers was Jack Ferguson with 34 points. Aron Walker an important 13, Jack O Sullivan(10), Rui Saravia and Jamie O Sullivan had 8 each, Ronan Collins 5, Paul Clarke 2, Senan O Leary 4, Marko Bencic 1, Darragh Lyne, Oisin Spring, Mark Sheehan, Eoin Carroll. Darren Townes was Cougars best with 23, Esebio Strijdhaftig had 16, Tommy Bowler(9), Conor Flynn(7), Jack Lynch(4), Andrew Fitzgerald (4), Alexander Fleming(3).

Reflecting after the win Coach Jarlath Lee was delighted to get another win but his euphoria was tempered by a hint of frustration. " We didn't rebound at all in the first half and found it hard to get going but we talked about it at half time, about playing to our strengths, and you could see midway through the third guarter the worm started to turn. We got our passing, our fast breaks and our overall game going. We had an expectation that we would do well in this game and maybe sometimes that can affect because the Cougars were definitely up for it". The two Jacks, Ferguson and O Sullivan, and Aron Walker came in for recognition. " Aron got his rebounding, passing and shooting going when we really wanted it while Jack O Sullivan is a great kid, just seventeen, super potential and able to dunk it like that".

The Lakers are on the road this Saturday when they face the Southern Conference leaders the Limerick Sport Eagles in the UL Arena. A repeat of the Leagues opening fixture when the Eagles soared to a 80-69 win in Killarney there has been a bit of a shift in the dynamic since then. Manny Payton, the league's top performer last season, has moved onto pastures new since Christmas and in his stead has come in Brendan Barry, a player in a similar vein to Jack Ferguson. Proficient around the three point line the battle between the two will be integral to the result. The Eagles possess in Jason Killeen a big man inside and his duel with Aron Walker will also be crucial. Jack Coyne and Stephen King are another two to watch as the Lakers look to repeat last season's win over the Eagles at the same venue. Tip off is 7pm.

KERRY ON THE LOSING SIDE Donegal 0-13 Kerry 1-9

At first, it felt like a sickener. Kerry looked in control for a lot of this game, and losing to a point in injury time felt a bit hard done by. To add insult to injury, Donegal's fifth point late in the first half was clearly confirmed afterwards as being wide.

Look, that stings, but to be honest I have nothing but sympathy for that umpire. These lads do their best in trying circumstances and the man just made a mistake. It happens – I know that I would easily be capable of making just such a mistake, and I can imagine how the poor man felt afterwards.

Look, it's easy to go looking for excuses, and a lot of supporters of team sports tend to default to that position. But the simple truth is that one controversial score, early enough in the game to absorb it and come back, at a stage when Kerry were five points ahead on the scoreboard....that's not remotely the reason that we lost this one.

It was a mix of good and bad for Kerry. The defence, which still has Gavin White and Brian Ó Beaglaíoch to come back in, was rock solid. Yet again, a Tom O'Sullivan display leaves me mystified as to how he hasn't picked up two All Stars in the past two years. Jason Foley had Paddy McBrearty in his pocket until the dying seconds, and McBrearty is a canny operator that guy was a Donegal senior while doing his Leaving Cert. Paul Murphy served real notice that he is as good a defender as is out there and a lot better than most. Mike Breen definitely looks like a very genuine championship contender. Graham and Tadhg are superb at their quietly understated roles. Top marks to the defence.

I've seen some criticism of Shane Murphy's kickout stats, especially in the third quarter – I reject that. We lost six out of nineteen kick-outs, and I blame Shane for two of them at most. I actually think his kick-outs have improved an awful lot. The kick-out is not just about the keeper, and I honestly thought that Shane was hitting his targets....when he had a decent target to aim at. Which brings me to midfield. Both the lads worked their socks off. I was especially impressed with Barry O'Sullivan's defensive positioning and work-rate, this is a player and a real option. We'll need those options. We never really dominated midfield here. David Moran has stepped down, Joe O'Connor is unfortunately unavailable with a dreaded cruciate injury, and Diarmuid O'Connor is dealing with a less serious injury that still leaves him unavailable at the moment. I don't want Seán O'Shea playing midfield, even though he is well capable of it; it would be robbing forward Peter to pay midfield Paul. Nor do I want Adrian Spillane out there, I think his supplementary work from the wing is a key component for Kerry. Now, my own theory there is that the heavy training of this time of year - and it very much can't be put off, we will plain and simple need that muscle later on and the work done at this time of year decides that. We needed a break, but other teams were working, having completed their county and district championships before we do (very few counties have a separate club and county championship). We are effectively playing catch-up, and Jack O'Connor has been very straightforward in acknowledging that.

I also think it affected our forwards, especially in the corners. Tony and Killian are best on dry ground when they can make darting runs and shimmy past players. January football in a cold and wet Ballybofey in the middle of heavy training...they'll give you everything, but you aren't going to see their best. The forward who shone brightest, without a doubt, is Darragh Roche. He was in top form from start to finish. He won a free and grabbed the rebound when Tony Brosnan's effort hit the post to slot over. Caolan McColgan, later man of the match (I was slightly more impressed by Conor O'Donnell) replied and Dara Ó Baoill picked off a good score. Tony was unlucky to see another good free come back off the woodwork, this time gathered safely and cleared. Paul Murphy scored arguably the best point of the game, a

beauty from long distance that was an instant reminder of his fantastic score to finally kill off Dingle's challenge in the County Championship. One thing Jack O'Connor must be pleased with is Kerry's tackling. Jack has always been a believer in pressing the ball. He doesn't require you to win the ball in every tackle, that's never going to happen, but you need to get pressure on. Make the pass that little bit harder, buy the players behind you time, even if it's just a few seconds. If every player does that, gets close enough, gets strong enough, then that will make every single scoring opportunity for the opposition into hard work. That's exactly what Kerry did here. Dara Moynihan pressed on a pass from Mark Curran to Brendan McCole, a small thing that's indicative of a mindset. Nineteen times in twenty it will come to nothing, but that one time.....you can argue that the goal was lucky from Kerrry's standpoint. I'd reply that Dara made his own luck in that one. Mike Breen with a great steal, and Killian Spillane made it 1-4 to 0-2. Adrian deftly picked Caolan McGonagle's pocket and Micheál Burns found Tom O'Sullivan for a trademark beauty. Conor O'Donnell did pull one back, he really looked sharp to me, but Kerry were the better side here. Darragh Roche turned in along the endline and was robust enough to find space... and accurate enough to use it. Back came Doneghal, only for Barry O'Sullivan to intercept and Darragh Roche made it 1-6 to 0-3.

O'Donnell split the posts again, and Caolan McGonagle added another.

Let me say this once, and say it clearly. Yes, it absolutely was wide. Yes, the match officials made a mistake, human beings sometimes do that. It was nothing any kind of a turning point whatsoever. Kerry were still in front by four points, and their destiny was very much in their own hands.

Donegal were rising. Dara Ó Baoill was just millimetres wide of the post with a goal chance. Good effort, but I think Shane Murphy had his angles well covered. Just before half-time, Johnny McGroddy reduced the gap to a goal.

I think we didn't quite have the legs for the second half. Donegal have a bit more fitness work done. Kerry left a few chances behind them. Dara Ó Baoill gathered from Stephen McMenamin to shoot over. Conor O'Donnell launched a homing missile with his left leg, superb technique and a brilliant score. A good turnover by Mark Curran ended up with Jamie Brennan pointing – it could have been under as well as over. Luke McGlynn scored Donegal's sixth point on the trot to put them in front.

Paul Murphy scored a long distance beauty. Ruairí Murphy, Pa Warren, and Donal Down O'Sullivan were on the field now for Kerry, and I think management will be delighted with their impact, especially the Kilgarvan man. He hasn't had a lot of minutes in the jersey but he took his chance like one to the manor born.

The problem was that Kerry weren't really incisive. Three wides on the trot didn't help our cause. Look, that's not any long term problem. Consider two Cliffords, Seánie O'Shea, and Paul Geaney. Stephen O'Brien is well in the mix as well. I'm not afraid of our shooting accuracy or our concession rate going forward. Ruairí Murphy kicked a great point to level matters – to be honest, I thought at first look that it was wide, but the replay was clear.

McMenamin found McGonagle, who kicked his third point of the day. Just on seventy minutes, Donal Down O'Sullivan wisely opted to fist over. He could arguably have gone for goal, but it was a very doubtful chance and taking the simple point was absolutely right. I heard a debate recently about whether players should be forced buy rule to go for goal or at least have to kick it over; I disagree vehemently.. Decisionmaking is a n important part of playing the game, probably the most important. Just to put it on the record, by the way, I also dislike the forward mark, it robs the game of an element of skill.

Level pegging, and I was quite willing to shake hands ona draw at that stage. Donegal, to their credit, could smell blood in the water and went hunting. Shane Murphy made a superb save. Donal O'Sullivan had a good effort drop short. Paddy McBrearty had been in Jason Foley's pocket pretty much all day long. The Ballydonoghue man was Kerry's best player for me. I remember Cork's Mark O'Connor giving a defensive exhibition against none other than Maurice Fitzgerald one day, real quality defending. Maurice only got away from him twice all game. Guess who ended up with two goals? The great ones can do that. Paddy McBrearty only got away from Jason once....but once was enough for him to kick the winner. Fine margins...

I don't want to delve too much into it, but it has to be acknowledged. Look, I personally don't believe for one second that Kilmacud Crokes were doing anything deliberate. It was an oversight in the dying minutes of a tense game that they were winning. Why would they risk that for so small an advantage with such a big penalty? In a television match being watched by thousands? It makes no sense.

But they did have an extra man on the field. That's the simple and blunt truth of it, and a replay is the usual sanction for that (forfeiture or a fine were possibilities if Central Council chose).

Did the match officials make a mistake in allowing the sub onto the field without ensuring that another player had come off? Arrah, yeah, but the original error still falls foursquare on the team who put on the sub.

It makes it awkward all round. At least two high profile players are away on well-earned holidays. Inter-county managers are not going to be pleased, to say the least, to have these players called back out of their hand. I wouldn't be thrilled with it myself. But the bottom line is that it happened, and Glen are entitled to a replay. It's unfortunate, and there will be a small asterisk over the eventual winners after this mess, but it is what it is at this stage. Glen should never have had to make a formal objection; I feel that was Central Council's version of Pontius Pilate washing his hands, to be honest.

But I feel that a replay had to be awarded. Like I say, I don't believe that Kilmacud were trying anything on. But if a replay hadn't been ordered, I do genuinely feel that there would be teams later on this summer who absolutely would try it on. Precedent matters. You may think I am being cynical, but if so I suspect that you are being a bit naive.

For the very little that it's worth, that's my take on it.

CLUB HISTORY

As the Club approaches its Centenary year it is always important to remember how far the Club has come since its foundation in 1929. The Club was founded on a March evening when a group of eleven men held a meeting in the Temperance Hall in High Street. To give reference to today this is where O Sheas Tyre Centre is situated in High Street. The Club's first Chairman was Maurice O Leary, first Secretary Maurice O Leary. A Treasurer was not elected as money was scarce in those days. The first captain of the Senior team was Vincent Doyle. For the record

the Founding Members were Maurice O'Leary, Joe Cooper, Vince Doyle, Michael O'Leary, Martin Wade, Denis Hussey, Paulie Regan, Timmie Casey, Larry Horgan, Liamie Leary and Michael Cooper.

The Club crest was only designed in 1993 and completed a year later by Fergal O Carroll and his father, the late Jim O Carroll. Featured on the crest are a football and a sliotar, the three blue lozenges represent the three Lakes of Killarney. The doorway to the oratory on Innisfallen Island is in the top segment of the crest while underneath is the fruit of the Arbutus tree, which is synonymous with Killarney.

Notable members through the years are the Lynes of Cleeney, the seven brothers Fr Michael, Donie, Teddy, Tom, Denny, Jackie, Con and not forgetting sister Maura who was mother to the famous Spillane brothers in Templenoe. Johnny Culloty captained Kerry to their 21st All Ireland in 1969, one of five Senior medals he would win in a stellar career while in more recent years James O Donoghue was the Club first All Star in 2013, a feat he repeated in 2014 when also becoming the GAA/GPA Footballer of the Year.

The late Weeshie Fogarty had no mean football career but it's fair to say his broadcasting career would rival that. Known as the Voice of Kerry Football he sadly passed away in 2018.

The Club has made great strides off the field in recent years with a state of the art all weather pitch, fully flood lit, another pitch with a 300 seater stand and PA system, a fully equipped gym and four large dressing rooms.

FOCUS ON ALPINES

The vast majority of alpine plants are easy to grow in any reasonably well drained garden soil, alpines are ideal plants for rockeries and gaps in stone walls and they will give you colour from early spring right through the summer, the most important thing when choosing your alpine plants is to make sure you find out the growth rates so that one alpine plant won't take over other alpine plants in the rockery.

A good example of this would be an alpine called Cerastium (snow in summer) which is quite a quick growing alpine and spreads quickly in a short space of time. it can tend to take over small rockeries. having said that it is a beautiful plant with silver foliage and is covered, as the name suggests, in beautiful white flowers. It can be pruned back to keep it under control.

There are also lots of alpines which are compact and can make perfect mounds and shapes. alpines are also great fillers for stone walls. an ideal plant for this would be a Campanula or aubrieta.

The aubrieta is a pink flowering plant that you see growing out of a lot of grottos. alpines can also be used in containers such as in troughs or window boxes but try to choose ones that are evergreen so that you will have some colour all year round.

Welcome back dear student "...my steps have held closely to Your paths; my feet have not staggered" (Psalms 17:5). King David noted that even with a multitude of enemies and problems there was a key to being able to endure and overcome – keeping a right heart before God, and following His paths. The beauty of God's creation is that each human being is an individual, with finger prints, toe prints - even tongue prints that no one else has – and God also has a unique destiny for each one of us which is found by following His path (Jeremiah 29:11-14). Often wild animals get killed on the roads. It's awful to see such beautiful creatures lying dead on the roadside. They meet their end having darted out into traffic on roadways that cut through their habitats and ancient pathways that they follow by scent. It's the cost of modernisation. But those pathways have always been there, and that's why the animals follow them, leading them to water and nourishment. We are no different.

God promises us rest and refreshment when we do things His way, for our own good - not for His. The prophet Jeremiah wrote "thus says the Lord, stand by the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, where the good way is; then walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls" (Jeremiah 6:16). This reveals that God has spiritual pathways for people to travel on. I'm not talking about new age or pagan practices. We are all on a journey, navigating through life, but often we are not consulting or listening to the GPS that God has left for us – His Word. Animals instinctively recognise their pathways and they don't like to leave them. It's much easier for them to travel ancient paths than to waste energy marking out their own way, where untold dangers and predators may lie in wait. But unlike the wisdom that animals intuitively use, many people prefer to do a Frank Sinatra so we can say 'I did it my way'! Hence problems and disasters result because their human pride knows better than God.

"Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalms 119:105). Deep within ourselves we all know that we need a relationship with our Creator to find His plans for our lives. But so often we've ignored that inner witness and chosen wrong paths - lured by all kinds of distractions and temptations which bring destruction. The Lord knows everything about you and me. You were 'knit together' by Him in your mother's womb (Psalms 139:13-18). In fact God embroidered you. Embroidery is an intricate and elaborate type of sewing craft that creates a piece of art. God calls you His 'prized masterpiece' - created by Him to do good works (Ephesians 2:10). But our enemy the devil is a destroyer. He has diverted many of God's beautiful children down pathways of destruction where the plans God had for those people were thwarted and laid waste. Remember, the greatest gift God gave each one of us is a free will. We have the choice to follow Him and be blessed, or reject Him and follow the devil, because there are really only two paths in life - God's way or Satan's (John 10:10). God sent His Son Jesus to be our Deliverer, so call upon the Lord Jesus and ask Him to bring you back onto the right paths (Psalms 119:133). Life with the Lord is exciting!
