FIRE FIGHTERS EXAMPLE BLAZE IN KILLARNEY NATIONAL PARK

Kerry Fire Service has spent last Sunday night battling a large fire which impacted approximately 150 acres of Killarney National Park near Dinis. Crews from Killarney and Kenmare stations battled the blaze and were thanked for their hard work by Kerry County Council who echoed the call of the National Parks and Wildlife Service for a stop to the illegal setting of gorse fires, particularly at a time when emergency service are dealing with a national public health emergency.


The Minister for Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht Josepha Madigan TD has condemned those who started a fire which led to the loss of 150 Acres of prising habitat in Killarney National Park as "reckless and irresponsible" and she has promised that "the full rigour of the law will apply." "This is a despicable and heinous crime at the best of times but more especially now. It is a malignact which has diverted emergency services at this critical time in our country. It is illegal to burn land at this moment and those that do face penalties. It is now prime season for nesting birds, breeding mammals & regeneration of growth & habitats after the winter.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation and the NPWS will be following up with the Garda authorities and Kerry Fire Services to ascertain the circumstances surrounding the blaze.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank

both the Kerry Fire Service and the National Parks and Wildlife Service staff of my Department in Killarney who worked tirelessly through the night to quench the fire in the Dinis region of the park. I would also appeal to everyone to be conscious of the danger posed by fire – any fire – but particularly on open ground which can very quickly spread out of control. We have all seen how homes and lives can be threatened and we can also see the damage to the landscape and to valuable habitats caused by illegal and uncontrolled fires."

ISSUE STATEMENT

At Liebherr Container Cranes, we place the health and welfare of our employees, their families and the wider community, first and foremost. Over the past number of weeks, we have implemented remote working, staggered working and break hours, strict social distancing and extensive hygiene measures at our factory and remote facilities. We would like to commend our employees for their efforts and cooperation in this respect. On 28th March, the Department of the Taoiseach published a list of essential service providers permitted to continue operating, under new public health guidelines. The list includes the manufacture of products necessary for the supply chain of essential services.

The guidelines also allow for an extended window to allow for the wind down of complex manufacturing operations. Liebherr Container Cranes has decided to proceed with an orderly, temporary wind down of complex operations to help limit the spread of COVID-19. Clarification on eligibility of Liebherr Container Cranes for the published subsidy scheme is awaited from the Irish Revenue authorities. Liebherr Management has worked intensively over the last days in the interests of our employees in this respect. As an essential part of the global and local supply chains, we will continue to be available to supply essential service and support to our many customers worldwide who use our machines at ports to help keep global supply chains moving. This will require a reduced level of staffing at our factory. We continue to work in utmost cooperation with the latest government information, regional authorities and other stakeholders with respect to working arrangements for our employees and company. We look forward with optimism to reaching a balanced environment in which to commence operation as normal once again, which will hopefully be in the not too distant future.

EMPLOYER ADVICE: TEMPORARY COVID-19 WAGE SUBSIDY SCHEME

EMPLOYER ADVICE: TEMPORARY COVID-19 WAGE SUBSIDY SCHEME

From March 26, 2020 an eligible Employer will be supported through the subsidy scheme and will refund Employer up to a maximum weekly of €410 for each qualifying Employee. The scheme will apply to Employers who top up Employees' wages and those that aren't in a position to do so.

HOW DOES AN EMPLOYER KNOW IF THEY WILL BE CONSIDERED ELIGIBLE

Employers must self-declare to Revenue that they have experienced significant negative economic disruption due to Covid-19, with a minimum of 25% decline in turnover, retain Employees on payroll and have an inability to pay normal wages and other outgoings.

CAN AN EMPLOYER SEEK INCOME SUPPORT FOR ALL EMPLOYEES?

The scheme is available for Employers who retain staff on payroll; some of the staff may be temporarily not working or some may be on reduced hours and/or reduced pay. The Scheme is confined to Employees who were on the Employer's payroll as at 29 February 2020, and for whom a payroll submission has already been made to Revenue in the period from 1 February 2020 to 15 March 2020. Employers are encouraged to facilitate Employees by operating the scheme, by retaining Employees on their books and by making best efforts to maintain a significant, or 100% income, for the period of the scheme. The names of all Employers operating this scheme will be published on Revenue's website in due course, after the scheme has expires.

HOW LONG WILL SUPPORT BE PROVIDED UNDER THE WAGE SUBSIDY SCHEME? The scheme will run for 12 weeks from 26 March 2020.

HOW IS THE SCHEME PROCESSED THROUGH PAYROLL?

Employers make this special support payment to their Employees through their normal payroll process. Employers will then be reimbursed for amounts paid to Employees and notified to Revenue via the payroll process. The reimbursement will, in general, be made within two working days after receipt of the payroll submission. There is no minimum amount that the Employer must pay in order to be eligible for the scheme, but the Employer will need to enter at least €0.01 to run payroll.

WHAT HAPPENS WHERE AN EMPLOYER SEEKS INCOME SUPPORT FOR AN EM-PLOYEE WHO WAS NOT ON PAYROLL FROM FEBRUARY 29, 2020?

If an Employee, identified with their PPSN, was not included in a payroll submission reported to Revenue between 1 Feb 2020 and 15 March 2020 with a pay date from Feb 29, 2020, then the Employee is not eligible, and the Employer will not be refunded for this Employee.

CAN AN EMPLOYER APPLY FOR AN INDIVIDUAL WHO HAS BEEN OFFERED A JOB WITH THE COMPANY BUT WHOSE START DATE HAS BEEN DEFERRED?

The scheme is confined to Employees who were on the payroll since February 29, 2020 in the payroll that was reported to Revenue between 1 Feb 2020 and 15 March 2020 so where a start date has been deferred the Employee would not satisfy these conditions.

IS THE SCHEME OPEN TO DIRECTORS?

If Directors are paid through the payroll system and are included in the relevant payroll submissions for an eligible Employer, then they are eligible to receive the wage subsidy.

CAN STAFF ON SICK LEAVE AND/OR ISOLATING QUALIFY FOR THE SCHEME?

If the eligible Employer retains them on the payroll then they can continue to operate the wage subsidy scheme insofar as the Employee is not in receipt of any other benefit.

WHAT IS PHASE TWO?

In Phase 2, by no later than 20 April 2020, the operation of the scheme will ensure that the Subsidy paid to Employers will be based on each individual Employee's Average Net Weekly Pay, subject to the maximum weekly tax-free amounts. Further information on how these arrangements will work will issue shortly but not before going to print. WHAT ELIGIBILITY SUPPORTING PROOFS MAY BE REQUESTED BY

REVENUE IN THE FUTURE?

- · If for some reason the decline in turnover was less than 25% the business should retain documentation supporting its rationale for believing that it would suffer such a decline, cancelled work/contracts etc
- · Copies of documentation submitted to a financial institution as part of the negotiation of forbearance measures with the financial institution.
- · Copies of notifications or communications to Employees or Trade Unions or staff representative bodies of salary/wage cuts implemented as a direct result of the COVID-19 pandemic.
- -Copies of documentation that show that any cash reserves in the business that are required to fund debt that is equal or
- · Evidence of reliance on the Government Credit Guarantee Scheme or overdraft facilities or other borrowings for capital
- In the case of start-up businesses, for example, evidence of a decline in investment by at least 25% arising from the

A new telephone helpline has been launched in Kerry this week to assist members of the public in accessing non-emergency and non-medical services and to provide support and advice to people during the current public health emergency.

The free, confidential phoneline service has been established by the new COVID-19 Kerry Community Response Forum which includes over a dozen agencies and organisations who have come together to mobilise and coordinate the community and voluntary response to the current crisis, particularly in responding to the needs of vulnerable households and individuals.

The FREEPHONE number 1800 807 009 is now up and running and will be available from 8am to 8pm seven days a week. A text line (text 'SUPPORT' followed by your NAME to 50555) is also available for the hearing impaired or those who require a call-back from the service while requests can also be e-mailed to covidsupport@kerrycoco.ie.

The helpline, which is manned by trained volunteers, is focussed primarily on ensuring that vulnerable members of the community or those living alone can access deliveries of essential items like groceries, medicine and fuel. Where another agency or organisation can provide more appropriate information or advice, the caller will be connected with other

organisations or services if required.

10,000 information leaflets including details of the new freephone number and other information are being distributed around the county over the coming days. This will be done through existing networks like the Kerry Public Participation Network, sporting organisations, local development companies and hundreds of community and voluntary groups across the

Said Niamh O'Sullivan, Head of Kerry County Council's Community Department: "The group wants to harness the energy and generosity of people who have come forward to offer support to people in the community who require assistance and advice. The aim is to ensure that a coordinated, safe and reliable volunteer support network is available to those in need and that people in need of that assistance know who to contact for advice. Our work will complement much of the voluntary work which already taking place in communities across Kerry."

Said Hillary Scanlan, Community Work Manager with the HSE, "There is a very long and proud history of voluntary and community activity in Kerry and also a strong commitment from the state agencies to work in partnership with communities to develop local responses to unmet need. The community and voluntary sector has again stepped up to respond to the current Covid19 crisis and ensure that basic needs of food, fuel, and medications are being provided"

Said Chief Superintendent Eileen Foster of the Kerry Garda Division: "An Garda Síochána is here to reassure and support the community during the weeks ahead. We are working with other agencies as one for the benefit of all."

SHOULD YOU BE CONSIDERING SWITCHING YOUR MORTGAGE

Yes, because some of the Irish mortgage lenders have much lower mortgage interest rates compared to others. There has been a lot of discussion recently in the media recently as regards mortgage switching this is because there can be a very substantial difference in interest rates and monthly repayments between lenders. For example on a mortgage of €200000 over 30 years based on a property value of €300000 and comparing current fixed interest rates one lenders 2 year fixed rate is as slow as 2.30% (3.50% APR) which costs €770 per month whereas another lenders 2 year fixed rate is as high as 3.30% (APR 3.96%) monthly repayment €876 per month. The monthly repayment for the lender with the higher rate is a staggering €106 per month more expensive. Over the term of the mortgage you could pay €38,271.60 (approx) more in interest, this figure will change depending on interest rate changes in the future. Of course you would need to qualify for the mortgage with the new lender and also there are many other considerations and information you need to know before proceeding further. Most lenders will also cover the cost of paying the legals fees for switching your mortgage. COVID-19 INFORMATION

and advice for taxpayers and agents

The following guidance will assist employers and employees experiencing difficulties arising from the impacts of COVID-19 regarding compliance with certain reporting and filing obligations and the satisfaction of certain other tax related conditions. In all cases where restrictions imposed by COVID-19 affect the applicability of Irish tax legislation on an employee/employer's tax position, records should be maintained outlining the circumstances and should be available to Revenue on request.

Benefit in Kind (BIK)

Tax treatment of reimbursements by an employer to an employee regarding holiday/flight cancellations or in relation to costs of assisting employees returning to the State

Provided the employee is integral to the business and was required to return to deal with issues related to the COVID-19 crisis by his or her employer, the costs incurred are reasonable and the employee is not otherwise compensated (i.e. via an insurance policy or direct claim to the service provider), a BIK will not arise. This may include costs related to family members who were on holiday or due to go on holidays with the employee.

Employer provided equipment

A BIK will not arise where employers provide equipment such as laptops, printers, scanners and office furniture in order for employees to set up a working space in their homes.

Employer-Provided Vehicles

For the duration of the Covid-19 restrictions, where an employee is in receipt of a vehicle (car or van) provided by his or her employer, the following may apply:

(a) Employer Takes Back Possession of the Vehicle Where an employer takes back possession of the vehicle and an employee has no access to the vehicle, no BIK shall apply for the period.

(b) Employer Prohibits Use

Where an employee retains possession of a vehicle, but the employer prohibits the use of the vehicle, no BIK shall apply if the vehicle is not used for private use. Records should be maintained to show that the employer has prohibited its use and no such use has occurred, for example communication from employer, photographic evidence of odometer etc.

(c) Employer Allows Private Use

Where an employee has a car provided by his or her employer and the circumstances in the previous example don't apply. limited or reduced business mileage (if any) is undertaken during the period of the COVID-19 crisis and personal use is limited the amount of business mileage travelled in January 2020 may be used as a base month for the purposes of calculating the amount of BIK due. Thus, the percentage applied in the calculation of the cash equivalent, which is based on annualised business mileage, may have regard to the actual business mileage for January 2020, for the period of the COVID-19 restrictions. Appropriate records should be kept, for example business mileage

travelled in January, amount of private use, photographic evidence of odometer etc.

Employee Continues Working

Where an employee continues to undertake business travel as usual in an employer-provided vehicle, the usual BIK rules will apply. Further information on the taxation of employer-provided vehicles is available in the Tax and Duty Manual Part 05-04-02, Benefit-in-Kind, Private use of Employer-Provided Vehicles.

e-Working and Tax

Guidance on the tax treatment of e-workers and remote workers.

Payment of taxi fares

Where an employer pays for a taxi to transport an employee to or from work due to health and safety concerns, BIK will not apply for the duration of the COVID-19 period only.

Small Benefit Exemption

Section 112B of the Taxes Consolidation Act 1997, allows one voucher per year up to the value of €500 to be given to an employee by his or her employer tax free, provided certain conditions are satisfied. Where an employer wishes to recognise efforts of frontline or other key staff working during the COVID-19 crisis, either by accelerating part of a reward (voucher) usually paid later in the year, or making an additional voucher award, the requirement that only one voucher issues (as per s112B(1)(d)) is concessionally waived for the 2020 tax year, where the additional award is related to an employee's exceptional efforts during the COVID-19 crisis.

This concession only applies to employees who continue to work during the restricted period. All other conditions of the section must be met, for example the maximum (cumulative) value may still not exceed €500 but, as stated above, the requirement to only issue one voucher will be waived. Appropriate documentation must be retained by an employer where this concession is availed of.

Real-time foreign tax credit (FTC) for Restricted Stock Unit (RSU) cases. In respect of 2019 cases for whom real-time foreign tax credits were provided through the payroll, the 31 March 2020 filling deadline will be suspended. In such circumstances, the 2019 income tax return for such employees will revert to the standard income tax filing date (31 October 2020) for that return or any extended filing deadline for that return as appropriate. The employer notification to Revenue in relation to such cases should be made as soon as possible but no later than the extended income tax filing date where applicable.

Share schemes filing obligations

The filing deadline for all 2019 share scheme returns is being extended from 31 March 2020 to 30 June 2020.

Special Assignee Relief Programme (SARP)

The 90-day employer filing obligation, which is a requirement for an employee to be eligible to

benefit from SARP relief, is extended for a further 60 days. It is anticipated that such an extension should provide sufficient time for employers to file the required return, but exceptional cases may be submitted to Revenue for consideration on a case by case basis.

Trans-Border Workers Relief

If employees are required to work from home in the State due to COVID-19, such days spent working at home in the State will not preclude an individual from being entitled to claim this relief, provided all other conditions of the relief are met.

PAYE Dispensation Applications

Given the unprecedented circumstances and the restrictions on travel as a consequence of COVID-19, Revenue will not strictly enforce the 30-day notification requirement for PAYE dispensations applicable to short term business travellers from countries with which Ireland has a double taxation treaty who are going to spend in excess of 60 workdays in the State in a tax year.

Foreign Employments - Operation of PAYE

Revenue will not seek to enforce Irish payroll obligations for foreign employers in genuine cases where an employee was working abroad for a foreign entity prior to COVID-19 but relocates temporarily to the State during the COVID-19 period and performs duties for his or her foreign employer while in the State.

PAYE Exclusion Order -Irish Contract of Employment

Regarding employees who are working abroad for a foreign employer under an Irish contract of employment where a PAYE exclusion order is in place, the position will not be adversely impacted where the employee works more than 30 days in the State due to COVID-19.

Residence rules - Force Majeure circumstances

Existing guidance states that where an individual is prevented from leaving the State on his or her intended day of departure due to extraordinary natural occurrences or an exceptional third party failure or action – none of which could reasonably have been foreseen and avoided – the individual will not be regarded as being present in the State for tax residence purposes for the day after the intended day of departure provided the individual is unavoidably present in the State on that day due only to 'force majeure' circumstances. Where a departure from the State is prevented due to COVID-19, Revenue will consider this 'force majeure' for the purpose of establishing an individual's tax residence position.

Renewal of existing Customs Special Procedure Authorisations

Authorisations due for renewal in March and April have been extended to 31 May.

1. Munster V Biarritz – Cardiff, May 2006

3. Ireland V New Zealand - Chicago, Nov 2016

Ireland's first win over the All Blacks in 2016, broke a 111-year record, which saw Ireland come close over the years. This was a game with a difference as the match was played in a sold-out Soldier Field in Chicago, only 2 short weeks after Munster and Ireland legend Anthony Foley's death so it was always going to be emotional for the Irish fans present and watching from home like myself. A cracking match with plenty of tries by both sides but Ireland secured the game and a first win over the All Black's with Robbie Henshaw's try in the end. However, for me to see the Irish players standing in the figure 8 when the haka took place, was spine tingling and very emotional as the rugby community paid tribute and remembered Axel.

4. Kerry V Donegal – 2014 All Ireland

In 2014, the summer was a lively one for Kerry GAA, culminating in a final against Donegal at HQ on the 21st of September. Kerry made many of the headlines that summer with the semi-final matches V Mayo. Feisty affairs to say the least the semi-final was a cracker, but the replay went to extra time with Kerry securing the win at the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick. The media were losing the run of themselves as they tend to do when it comes to Kerry and no one better than Joe Brolly who had declared the production line of Kerry footballers came to an end. Kerry and Donegal battled in the final and Kerry just about secured the win, with a very spirited comeback from Donegal and a great game to be at Croke Park for. However, the Kieran Donaghy interview was something else with the Kerry legend uttering "Well, Joe Brolly, what do you think of that?" Fantastic, simple as that.

The Ireland team was taking part in their first ever World Cup and the country had pretty much lost the run of itself as it tends to do with sporting occasions. Big Jack Charlton was the man in charge and the team fielded greats such as Paul McGrath who played with Aston Villa! I can clearly remember the penalty and Timofte lining up to strike. How Bonner got horizontal like that, it was magic. Then Dave O'Leary scored the winner! The party atmosphere was something else and will never be forgotten.

1.David Feherty Irish Open, Killarney 1991

While Nick Faldo won the 1991 Irish Open ,which was held on the Killeen Golf Course in Killarney,and Payne Stewart,the colourful American golfer, now sadly passed away, the main attraction, I was fortunate enough to witness Northern Irelands David Feherty shoot ,what is to this day, the course record 65(7 under par) in the final round. I struck back to the course early that morning and Feherty, accompanied only by his caddy,an official cardmarker and about 4 spectators set off down the first fairway.He was well down the leaderboard ,hence the early start. In the following 3 and a half hours we got an up close and personal exhibition of golf which hasnt been bettered in Killarney since. Aware of the sparse crowd around him and perhaps feeling a little awkward he struck up plenty conversation with us along the way and talked freely most of of hundred by the closing holes but the abiding and the enjoyment of getting a rare chance to converse with a professional golfer in the middle of a top ranking tournament.

2.St Paul's vs Merry Monk Ballina 1996

Back in the 1990s the Basketball scene in Ireland had a new heavyweight.Initially St Vincent's Killarney lead the way,then the Cork clubs Neptune (or Burgerland as they were known), Blue Demons and Dublin clubs came to the fore. But the emergence of a force from the West, Ballina, saw lots of honours head to the Mayo town. Backboned by the McHale brothers, especially Liam and the high flying Deora Marsh they came to Killarney pre Christmas 1996 for a National Cup quarter final tie. Team Kerry Spring Killarney were having a solid season with the American duo of Nick Browning and Corey Jackson backboning the side. In the week of the game, Browning suffered an injury that ruled him out of the cup tie and as was the procedure at the time a replacement could be drafted in. Terry Smith had played for Killarney previously and answered the call to line out for his old team. The Presentation Gym was jam packed as usual with the best team in the country coming to town. But Terry Smith preceded to put on an exhibition of high flying dunks, blocks and spectacular play that I haven't seen matched in a gym since. He got able support from Corey Jackson while Cormac O Donoghue excelled at both sides of the court. The Pres Gym was heaving the whole night long as Ballina were sent packing out of the Cup.

3.Man Utd vs Roma Champions League Quarter Final 2007

I have travelled to Old Trafford,home of Manchester United, on many occasions but none matched this one. The first leg, which was played in the Olympic Stadium in Rome,ended in a 2-1 victory for Roma. A negative feature of it however was the crowd trouble before, during and after the game. Having travelled to Manchester on the day of the game security was especially tight around the city. As we approached the stadium the fear became reality as riots and scuffles broke out around the stadium concourse. The police had their hands full. Having successfully entered the ground safely the match eventually took centre stage. And what a night was had. By half time Man Utd had swept into a four goal lead and as the players headed to the dressing rooms at half time the place was rocking. And there was no let up in the second half as Ronaldo, Carrick, Rooney and Co. cashed in for 3 more goals. It was a privilege to witness a team in full flow who would, 12 months


later, lift the Champions League trophy on a wet night in Moscow.

4. Kerry Vs Mayo All Ireland Semi Final Replay 2014

If you were to present a case for playing more games outside of Croke Park ,this one would be on top of the file. Having come back from the dead in the drawn game in Croke Park, Kerry would have been mighty relieved to still be in the race for Sam. The general consensus for the replay was that the momentum would have been with Mayo and there is no better supporter than a Kerry one that's written off. With the Dublin Donegal semi final booked into Croke Park for the Sunday this replay was fixed for the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick on the Saturday evening. By throw in time 40000 had gone thru the Ennis Road turnstiles and boy were they in for a roller coaster. Kerry started well, Mayo then took over Kerry battled back to lead then Mayo bounced back.It was a real rip roaring Championship game played at 100 miles per hour. I watched it again recently and the intensity really was astonishing. What made it even more enjoyable, if that was possible, was the big part my clubmates played in it.Brian Kelly started in goal, James O'Donoghue bagged 2-6 while Jonathan Lyne kicked the 2 insurance points. Also a Mark Griffin shoulder on Aidan O Shea, which put a halt to his gallop, had the whole place shuddering. Kerry went onto win the final that year of course where Kieran Donaghy provided the post game highlight of "What do you think of that Joe Brolly?".Great times!!

5.Galway vs Waterford All Ireland Hurling Final 2017

This novel pairing could be classed as the battle of the Bridesmaids. Galway, with only 4 All Ireland titles to their name ,the last one being 1988,took on Waterford who hadn't won one since 1958, I think, but who had tried manfully in the 2000s thru the likes of John Mullane, Dan Shanahan and Ken McGrath .Usually with an Ireland there is always one team the neutrals would get behind but even those from non competing counties couldnt make their mind up who to shout for.It made for a unique atmosphere. You could sense the hunger in both set of supporters and as the game went to and fro towards the finishing line the intensity in the stand was only matched by those on the field. Galways just had their noses in front in the closing minutes but the supporters, stung by previous setbacks, were almost too tense to enjoy it. It was only when a Waterford attack broke down in the last minute resulting in a Galway lineball that the dam of emotion could be opened. As Joe Canning stood over the sliothar you could see the tide of Galway supporters in the Cusack Stand, to a man, woman and child, swell in an explosion of emotion. In all my times in Croke Park I dont think I've ever heard a roar as loud as the one that greeted the final whistle .The West was definitely awake that evening!!!



JIMMY O'SULLIVAN-DARCY

takes a look at all things sport...

First, let's just be honest here. There isn't exactly a lot of sport happening right now. So when I say that this is all about sport, I mean there will be mentions of sport at occasional and surprisngly random intervals in this column this week. At one point, I am going to throw in a massive lie, a simply outrageous piece of nonsense that will sound genuine to the casual reader but which real experts will be able to spot. If you can spot that lie, mentally broadcast it to me and I will send you good wishes, because I am psychic.

(No, that wasn't the outrageous lie. That was very tame by my standards).

I am actually protecting myself there, because I might get a few things wrong. Normally, I would go to the library and double-check the newspapers and reports from the time, but that's not an option at the moment. Like everyone else, I have a new appreciation of how great it is to live in a community like ours. I do think we are sometimes forgetful of it at ordinary times. I know that I often am, and the Killarney library is one of the places that are and always have been great to me and I hope will be again soon. Until then, I have to rely on my own meagre resources, and those who know me will acknowledge that I make very eccentric distinctions between my imagination and actual reality. That's why I'm not allowed into Star Wars conventions anymore. It's also why I might get one or two things wrong here; I'll ask for yere patience.

NON-COUNTY MINORS

Kerry's development pathway has a lot of small steams that run into rivers that become an ocean. A great big successful green and gold ocean (even by my standards, that may be the worst metaphor of all time. That would be a very freaky ocean).

You have the Cumann na mBunscoil, with people like Tomás Ó hAiniféin and his brother Colm, the great Mary Jo Coffey, and Bainisteoir na Mna Declan Quill on board. You have the Post Primary Games after that. Christy Killeen from Finuge, one of the true giants, was recently kind enough to send me a list of all the past winners of all the past winners of the Kerry competitions - I'm not sure if it's just because I have a strong interest in the colleges (they are the perfect blend of passion and dedication without cynicism) so I don't know if other people would find these lists interesting. They may be worth printing next week, I'll ask a few people what they think (yes, of course by phone and email, not in person).

You have coaching and development programmes under Terence Houlihan and run by Donal Daly and the GDAs. The likes of Vince

Cooper, Micheal Quirke, PJ Reidy, Geraldine O'Shea, and many more do more work than people realise and aren't mentioned enough when harvests are gathered. Pat O'Shea with Munster is not just integral to a lot of the process; he's also responsible for it. Most people will know of his contribution to both Kerry and Dr. Crokes as a manager – that's only a small tip of a very small iceberg.

You have Bord na nÓg, now Coiste na nÓg, with Tommy Cronin as Chairman, Mags Evans as Secretary, and Damien McCarthy as PRO. Tom Keane was Chairman before Tommy. Even locally, the real structure of the GAA is not the mandarins up in Croke Park (ye sold private tv rights in secret and ye introduced the nonsensical and badly named 'super 8s'), it lives and breathes on the ground and through the people. Ar scath a chéile a mhaireann na daoine (I'm trying to use isolation to develop my Irish profiency; there is a risk that I may be inadvertently inventing a new language). It means that the people live in one anothers' shadows. The shadows cast by the likes of Patsy Cremin, Dan Dwyer, Peggy Horan, Jackie Looney, Johnny Culloty, Bernie O'Connor, Mick Allen, Con Griffin, Michael O'Callaghan, John Barry, Bill Riordan, Donie O'Leary,....look, if I was to list everyone, ye all know that it would make a very long and very illustrious phone book, but those people cast long and wonderful shadows. Donal O'Donoghue of Spa, God rest him, always told me as a small boy that I was a great footballer - it was a really kind thought, but it was most definitely the most outrageous lie I have ever heard in my life. With the possible exception of Donald Trump.

The Development Squads (Denny Doolan, Johnny Brosnan, and many more were integral to them) have always been a key part of the structure, and much more so in recent years. Back in 2010, people like Bernie Reen, Eamonn Whelan, Donal Daly, Liam Ó Rocháin, Eamonn O'Sullivan, and many more got together and set up a new approach to Kerry at underage. The players from that new structure started coming just as Kerry were heading into a twenty year absence of All Ireland minor titles in 2014. Ye all know what happened in the following five years. It wasn't a coincidence.

It's very, very rare for a player to pass unnoticed through all those pathways and emerge later as an elite player. Very rare. I think that Paudie Clifford is the only member of the current panel who didn't play Kerry minor. We don't actually know the current panel, which I find utterly bizarre. You want us to get behind the Kerry team for the year and support them in their games this year – but their identities are secret? Wow. It's like Batman left Gotham and came to live in Killarney – that would be so cool.

Other modern players who didn't play county minor but went on to success include Ryan



McMenamin, Philly Jordan, Lee Keegan, Brian Fenton, Kevin McManamon, Bernard Brogan, Conor McManus....A friend sent me a team of such players, and it got me wondering if there were great Kerry footballers who didn't play county minor. So, being me, I decided to see if I could find one.

My Team

Goalkeeper: Diarmuid Murphy of Dingle. I was in the Sem in 1992 when we won the Hogan Cup - in fact, I was widely considered as the best player on that team. The likes of Seamus Moynihan, Killian Burns, the late and truly great John Doyle, Niall Mangan, Conor O'Donnell, Breandán Mac Gearailt....all good footballers, but I was unquestionably the best. I met one of the team recently. "Jaysus, Jimmy," he said to me. Do you remember the time you practically carried us on your back all the way to winning the All Ireland? Do you remember the three goals you scored from midfield and the penalty you saved? It's an awful pity that you got injured afterwards running into that burning orphanage to save all those children." "Arrah, I do," I replied modestly, "And I'm sure it cost Kerry a few All Irelands afterwards that I wasn't there, but I still feel that it was the right thing to do, and Nelson Mandela said the same thing when he gave me the Nobel Prize". True story. Okay, that's the outrageous lie, I wasn't within a donkey's roar of that team even if you gave the donkey a full set of concert speakers. But Liam O'Sullivan from Ballymac was the goalkeeper, and genuinely brilliant, and I just could not remotely understand how he didn't make the Kerry minors. His club-mate Daithi O'Regan was in goal, and the sub keeper was lad that I in all my teenage certainty hadn't heard of. It was Diarmuid Murphy, and, though he was on the bench all through, he never got a run as a Kerry minor. He did okay afterwards, though! I have a notion that Peter O'Brien didn't play Kerry

minor because of other commitments, but I may well be wrong there – Peter was always recognised as a fantastic goalkeeper.

Full back line: Donie O'Sullivan from Spa is obvious. Donie was actually a late bloomer (he didn't even make the Sem panel for the Corn Uí Mhuirí. But when he bloomed....there were a few controversies when the Team of the Millenum was selected, but no-one had any debates or quibble about Donie's name being included. Likewise Tom O'Sullivan from Rathmore. Sean Counihan was one of many who saw the potential of the Rathmore player from a young age, but he missed out on the minors. Ronan Shanahan from Stacks is a more recent corner back and fell out of favour, but I always thought that he did fairly well for Kerry. He got toasted once by a Dublin forward, but that has been true of every defender in the country in recent years. Mick Morris. I've looked up the minor teams for the relevant years and I don't see his name anywhere, so I hope I am right that he never played minor for Kerry. He played afterwards, won two All Irelands in 1969 and 1970, and he also represented Ireland in both basketball and golf.

Half back line: Paul Murphy is an obvious choice. He was always a good minor, but wasn't considered county class. As I recall, it was a small bit of a surprise when he was select at wing back for the Kerry U21s in 2012 - he was an absolute revelation and two years later he was man of the match in an All Ireland Final. Seamus Murphy from Camp usually played midfield or up front, but his brother Sean was one of the best wing backs of all time (the famous Small Jer O'Leary was one of the first to spot his talent; he pointed him out to a young Mick Allen of Firies at a colleges game - two good judges of football) and the 1969 Final has his name attached. Like I say, it would possible be cheating to put Seamus into the half back line - but I've cheated way worse in my time, so I am fine with it.



Mick Gleeson -SPA GAA.

Midfield: Like I say, both Seamus Murphy and DJ Crowley would fit in there fine. Donal Daly is an obvious choice. The Firies man was so good a foil for Darragh Ó Sé that people forget how great a footballer he was in his own right. Trust me, he was always good on the main stage, just as he is now behind the scenes in his coaching role. Aidan O'Shea from Glenbeigh/Glencar is beside him. Aidan's career as a player was unfortunately cut short by injury. He was as good as any of them – but Jack O'Shea's job took him to Kildare and he only played for Kerry after minor.

Half Forward Line: Bingo O'Driscoll from Annascaul. Many years ago I used to play soccer with Fossa's B team. We were a team that had more enthusiasm than skill. We genuinely had a worse record than Malta at the time and Malta had never won a single match. Looking back, in all fairness, we were brutally bad (honestly, a young Michael Fassbender was a decent midfielder. He was in midfield because he could actually run a bit, which was unusual for us). But we got drawn the cup one year against a bunch of lads who had decided to throw in a team for the craic, and we travelled back to Annascaul in confident delusion. Everyone else was still confident as we togged off in the ditch (one passing car beeped at us; I still don't know if it was meant as applause or horror). But I was the only one who followed football, and I was recognising Bingo and Johnny Driscoll, Genie and Fox Farrell, Vincent Knightley...."Lads, I think these guys can play a bit"...we lost 7-0, and Bingo had a hat-trick.

Centre forward: you have DJ Crowley. DJ was the first Rathmore man to be man of the match in an All Ireland Final. His goal in 1970 four minutes from time was one of the best of all time. Believe it or not, DJ made his debut for East Kerry only because Sem teacher Pat Moynihan was unavailable because of a clash with the Sigerson Cup, and he only made his debut for Kerry because he came to a tournament game

as a spectator, having played earlier in the day for Garda. Kerry were short, some-one saw him arrive, knew he had boots, and his name was called over the tannoy to ask him to come to dressing room. A bemused DJ lined out, played well, and two years later was man of the match ijn Croke Park for the All Ireland champions. Mikey Geaney didn't play Kerry minor, he made the U21s in 2010. I have a notion that Ned Fitzgerald of St. Marys didn't play Kerry minor. The inescapable truth is that South Kerry was shamefully overlooked in those days where travel was much harder and longer. His son Maurice most definitely played minor and I have a notion that Seamus did as well

Full Forward Line: Oh boy. Mick Gleeson from Spa in one corner. Mick was in the vanguard of a rejuvenated Spa. Garry McMahon scored the fastest goal in any All Ireland Final in 1962, fisting to the net straight from the throw-in. It was the first televised final. Eoin 'Bomber' Liston simply has to be in there. Bomber was nicknamed after Gerd Muller of Germany (Ger O'Keeffe was nicknamed Gadocha after the Polish winner) and another late bloomer. His brother Pádraig was considered the best of the brothers until Mick O'Dwyer took Bomber under his wing and added speed to his already muscular frame. Kieran Donagy is one who surprises people. He made the Kerry minor panel in 2000. That was a great team - Colm Cooper, Declan O'Sullivan, Declan Quill, Éanna Kavanagh, Seamus Scanlon, DJ Fleming.... Donaghy was well down the list as potential midfielders and his Kerry career looked very much like petering out on the sidelines in early 2006. It was Johnny Culloty who mentioned the idea of putting Donaghy in full forward against Longford in 2006 when Kerry looked down and out....the rest is history.


LOOKING BACK

GOOD NEWS

A stray black lab mix, started hanging around Benavides Heights Elementary School in Eagle Pass, Texas about 7 years ago, when she was just a puppy. She would come to the school each day, play with the children during recess and accompany them to and from school. While the pup was friendly, it was clear she didn't have a home. No one knew where she spent her nights or weekends, but she would show up every school morning, ready to spend the day delighting her friends. At first, the school staff was concerned about a dog on school grounds. But eventually they, too, grew to love the happy, good-natured dog and started feeding and caring for her. One Day everything

changed for Debbie when she was hit by a car near the school. Her school friends sprang into action, staff member, Ronald Zawacki-Maldonado a school literary specialist rushed her to the veterinarian and, after several visits, it was clear Debbie would need specialised care. Mr. Zawacki-Maldonado decided he would cover the cost for her care, and give her a safe, permanent home with him. The accident had torn tissue on Debbie's legs and injured her spinal cord. Debbie spent weeks at the offices of the South Texas Veterinary Specialists in San Antonio, in treatment and physical therapy. Thanks to the quick action of her friends at Benavides Heights, her new owner's kindness, and the work of her veterinary team, Debbie made a full recovery and is safe and sound in her new home when she is not visiting her friends in the Elementary School under the watchful eyes of her new

HOW TO IMPROVE ENERGY EFFICIENCY WHILE COOKING

I Minimize the area that needs to be heated. In other words, don't heat up the entire oven to cook a single piece of fish; Take advantage of having the oven on. Cook double amounts so that you have leftovers; it takes less energy to reheat than to cook. For instance If you are roasting fish or baking pasta, then I roast

vegetables alongside.

I Don't put a small pot on a large element, a 6" pan on an 8" electric burner wastes more than 40% of the heat produced by the burner. However, choose the smallest appropriate pan to do the job since it requires less energy to heat.

If possible, invest in high-quality cookware with sturdy bottoms. A pan with a warped bottom can use 50% more energy to boil water. An electric element is significantly less efficient if the pan does not have good contact with the element.

Glass and ceramic are more efficient in the oven than metal. Copper-bottomed pots also heat up faster. I keeping a stove and microwave clean can help with efficiency. When burners in the oven or cooker top fill up with food waste, this absorbs heat and reduces burner efficiency. If they're shiny, they reflect the heat back up to the pan. Microwaves work best when there are no food particles inside.

I Make sure previously frozen foods have defrosted fully and that meat has come to room temperature before cooking. This helps with even cooking and speeds up the process. If roasting vegetables, cut smaller to cook faster. I Cut the heat early, especially if you use an electric cooker and oven. The residual heat will continue to cook the food. An oven will keep baking if you resist the urge to open the door.

STATEMENT FROM UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL KERRY REGARDING COVID-19

*niversity Hospital Kerry (UHK) continues to work at pace to bring the hospital to a state of readiness to deal with the COVID-19 crisis.*Similarly with each hospital across the country and indeed across Europe, the situation is very dynamic and is changing by the hour. Staff at UHK are determined to bring about the optimum state of preparedness by taking the proactive necessary steps in accordance with guidance from the South / South West Hospital Group, the Health Protection Surveillance Centre, the Department of Health and the HSE.

By way of update on same: Emergency Department Activity

The Emergency Department at UHK is continuing to accept all Emergencies - There will be a clear division pathway between normal emergency and respiratory (Potential COVID-19) emergency patients.

COVID Patient Flow Hub

A patient flow hub room has been established within UHK and is manned 24 hours a day - This is effectively the base for management of all COVID-19 inpatients at the hospital.

Staffing

Many medical, nursing and therapy staff from across the hospital are being redeployed and upskilled to assist their colleagues in dealing with COVID-19 patients. All other cohorts of staff are being deployed as required to meet daily changing demands e.g. cleaning, HCAs, portering, logistics, clerical, laboratory, radiology.

Bed Capacity

UHK is working closely with our Community partners to ensure the appropriate and timely discharging of vulnerable patients. The recent announcement regarding private hospitals is very much welcome, and here in Kerry, the additional bed capacity of the Bon Secours Hospital Tralee will greatly assist in dealing with this crisis. Within UHK, works are nearing

completion of an additional 30 bed ward which will also boost our capacity to manage COVID-19 patients.

PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) and Medical Equipment

University Hospital Kerry is working closely with the South / South West Hospital Group and national logistics to ensure that all our staff have appropriate PPE to care for COVID-19 patients.

Outpatient Clinics

The evolving COVID-19 issues have required cancellation of face to face out-patient clinics in UHK. Urgent face to face outpatient clinics are continuing in UHK, though very limited and based on urgent need only.

To allow standard UHK outpatient clinics to continue and avoid the cancellation of clinics, UHK have commenced 'Virtual Clinics', which means a consultant can call a patient (via telephone) to review his or her health care needs. The purpose of the 'Virtual Clinics' is to continue the care for UHK patients during this adverse event and as far as feasible to meet patients' health care needs. Following the telephone consultation, the telephone contact is tracked with a written note.

With National guidance and direction, the urgent high priority UHK Endoscopy procedures were suspended on Monday the 30th of March 2020. Much discussion and engagement with UHK and private hospital services is taking place with senior management to set out a workable solution to continue delivery of urgent high priority Endoscopy procedures.

In relation to Maternity services, booking clinics are now taking place at the Tralee Institute of Technology. Patients are being contacted with regard to the change in location. Online videography has been prepared for Maternity Parent Education and will be shared on UHK's social media this week. Regarding visiting restrictions, please note:

Women admitted for induction of labour or in

labour can have one nominated companion. This companion can only join the woman when she is in labour or called for caesarean section

- · For all other inpatients, including Antenatal inpatients and Postnatal inpatients, no visitors are allowed
- · For patients in the Neonatal unit, mothers only are allowed
- · For Outpatients, only the women attending the appointment are allowed – No partners, children or companions are allowed

Donations

UHK has been completely humbled by the outpouring of support from our community, with generous offers of goods and services of all descriptions. For donations of medical supplies including PPE, our drop off location is Unit 1 B, Clash Industrial Estate, Mon-Friday 9.30-12.30 and 14.30-16.30hrs. From there, our logistics team will evaluate same and if suitable, UHK will utilise as part of our PPE replenishment daily. UHK will reply to all donators, suitable or otherwise. All products should be in their original packaging - unopened and unexpired. The medical equipment we're grateful to accept at this time includes:
